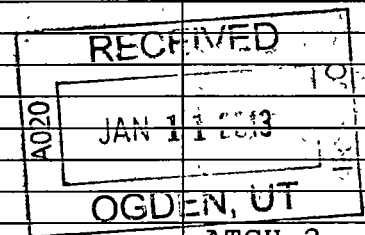

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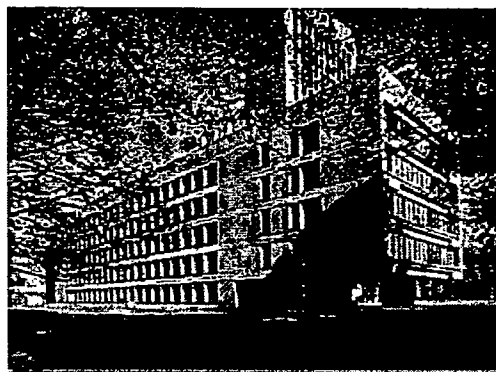

Introduction

The Dreyfus Prize in the Chemical Sciences is awarded to an individual in a selected area of chemistry to recognize exceptional and original research that has advanced the field in a major way. The prize is awarded biennially and consists of a citation, a medal, and a monetary award of \$250,000.

The inaugural Dreyfus Prize was awarded to George Whitesides of Harvard University in the field of materials chemistry, honoring the accomplishments of the Dreyfus brothers, Camille and Henry. The second Dreyfus Prize was awarded to Tobin Marks of Northwestern University in the field of catalysis.

Topic

The 2013 Dreyfus Prize will be awarded in the field of **chemical instrumentation**. A PDF of the 2013 prize announcement can be found [HERE](#).

Selection

The prize will be awarded for the invention or development of instrumentation that has greatly advanced the chemical sciences. The prize is generally awarded to an individual. If the cited advance is substantially interdisciplinary, those aspects that represent original chemistry should be made clear.

Eligibility

The prize is open to individuals, both domestically and internationally. There is no restriction on the number of nominees from a given institution, nor is institutional approval required. Present Dreyfus Foundation Advisors and consultants, previous Dreyfus Prize winners, and Nobel laureates are not eligible.

Nomination Procedure

Any person may nominate a candidate for the Dreyfus Prize. Self-nominations are not accepted. All nomination materials and letters of support are due at the Foundation office by March 1, 2013. A decision will be announced in early May 2013.

Required Information

Nomination package: The nomination should be formatted on 8 1/2 x 11-inch paper, using 12-point font size. Assemble it as:

- 1 The online nomination form
- 2 Nomination letter (three-page limit)
- 3 CV of not more than four pages (include highest degree and advisor)
- 4 List of not more than ten total papers and patents relating to the nomination

Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program

The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program supports the research and teaching careers of talented young faculty in the chemical sciences. Based on institutional nominations, the program provides discretionary funding to faculty at an early stage in their careers. Criteria for selection include an independent body of scholarship attained within the first five years of their appointment as independent researchers, and a demonstrated commitment to education, signaling the promise of continuing outstanding contributions to both research and teaching. The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program provides an unrestricted research grant of \$75,000.

Eligibility

The Camille Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Awards Program is open to academic institutions in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America that grant a bachelor's or higher degree in the chemical sciences, including biochemistry, materials chemistry, and chemical engineering. Nominees must hold a full-time tenure-track academic appointment, and are normally expected to have been appointed no earlier than mid-year 2007. Awardees are from Ph.D. granting departments in which scholarly research is a principal activity. Undergraduate education is an important component of the nominee's activities. Examples of areas of interest include (but are not limited to): the increase in public awareness, understanding, and appreciation of the chemical sciences, innovative approaches to chemistry education at all levels (K-12, undergraduate, and graduate); and efforts to make chemistry careers more attractive. Research proposals are not customarily considered.

Aspects of proposals that are important are:

- broad applicability beyond the submitting institution
- specific and detailed descriptions of the chemistry associated with the proposal
- uniqueness of the project

Favorable consideration also is given to:

- a plan for sustaining this project, if relevant
- significant institutional support or other sources of funding
- evidence of expertise of the PIs and/or identified consultants
- plans to assess effectiveness, including over the longer term

The Foundation's Web site has listings of awards approved in recent years. Applicants may review these listings for a general sense of the Special Grant Program, although the historical award listings do not imply a topical preference for projects. Current Special Grant Program Awardees.

Budget

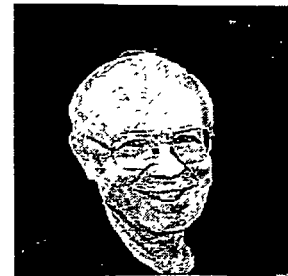

The Jean Dreyfus Boissevain Lectureship awards provide an \$18,500 grant to bring a leading researcher to a primarily undergraduate institution to give a series of lectures in the chemical sciences. The lecturer is expected to substantially interact with undergraduate students and faculty over the period of the visit. The program provides funds to host the speaker and support of summer research opportunities for two undergraduate students.

Eligibility

Applications for the Lectureship award will be accepted from departments in the chemical sciences at primarily undergraduate institutions in the States, Districts, and Territories of the United States of America. Eligible departments grant a BS or MS degree in chemistry, but not a PhD. Institutions are restricted to only one application annually for this program. Institutions that receive an award are not eligible to re-apply for five years.

Selection

Jean Dreyfus Boissevain

Jean Dreyfus Boissevain was President of the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation from 1956 until her death in 1991. Born in Chicago, in 1931 she married Camille Dreyfus, founder and chairman of the Celanese Corporation of America and of the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation. Her second husband, Ernest W. Boissevain, died in 1984.

An operatic soprano and patron of the arts, as Jean Tennyson she sang with several leading European and American opera companies, including La Scala in Milan, the Chicago Civic Opera, and the San Francisco Opera Company. She also sang on the CBS Radio program "Great Moments in Music" from 1942 to 1946.

After World War II, Mrs. Boissevain founded the Artists Veterans Hospital Programs of the Musicians Emergency Fund, which presented concerts for patients in veterans hospitals. She also served as a patron of the Philharmonic Society of New York and as vice chair of New York City's Lewisohn Stadium Concerts. She was a trustee of the New York City Opera and a principal supporter of the Spoleto Festival.

Mrs. Boissevain received several awards, including the Stella della Solidaneta from the Italian government, the St. Olaf Medal from the King of Norway, and an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from the University of Vermont.

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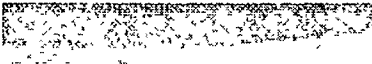
