Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. (1) Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

Glens Falls Hospital (Hospital), a voluntary, not-for-profit charitable corporation, incorporated in the State of New York, operates a comprehensive healthcare system serving Warren, Washington, Northern Saratoga, Essex and Hamilton counties including a full service hospital in Glens Falls, New York. The Hospital established Adirondack Health Services (AHS) as sole member of the Hospital. The Hospital and AHS are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Following is a summary of the Hospital's significant accounting policies

(a) Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements, which are presented on the accrual basis of accounting, have been prepared consistent with Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) *Accounting Standards Codification* (ASC) 954 which addresses the accounting for healthcare entities. In accordance with the provisions of the ASC 954, net assets and revenue, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, unrestricted net assets are amounts not subject to donor-imposed stipulations and are available for operations. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently, restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity.

The Hospital considers events or transactions that occur after the balance sheet date, but before the financial statements are issued, to provide additional evidence relative to certain estimates or to identify matters that require additional disclosure. These financial statements were issued on March 29, 2012 and subsequent events have been evaluated through that date

(b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of the accompanying financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions about future events. These estimates and the underlying assumptions affect the amounts of assets and liabilities reported, disclosures about contingent assets and liabilities, and reported amounts of revenues and expenses. Such estimates and assumptions include the valuation of investments, the allowance for uncollectible accounts, estimated third-party payor settlements, self-insured reserves, and asset retirement obligations. These estimates and assumptions are based on management's best estimates and judgment. Management evaluates its estimates and assumptions on an ongoing basis using historical experience and other factors, including the current economic environment, which management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. Management adjusts such estimates and assumptions when facts and circumstances dictate. As future events and their effects cannot be determined with precision, actual results could differ significantly from these estimates. Changes in those estimates resulting from continuing changes in the economic environment will be reflected in the financial statements in future periods.

(c) Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statements of operations and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

In September 2010, New York State enacted the New York Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (NYPMIFA or Act) to provide clear standards of fund management for those charged with governance of institutional or endowment funds NYPMIFA updates and in some cases retains provisions of previous New York State laws governing the management of institutional funds Among its various provisions, it requires that those responsible for managing institutional funds adopt a written investment policy, requires diversification of investments, and provides institutions with a process by which donor restrictions can be lifted. The Act allows an institution to determine the appropriate level of endowment expenditure, subject to donor-imposed restrictions expressed in the gift instrument. However, it establishes a rebuttable presumption of imprudence if such expenditure in any year is greater than 7.0% of the fair market value of an endowment fund

The Hospital classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund, if any

(d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less

(e) Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue and accounts receivable are reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from third-party payors, patients and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

(f) Charity Care and Provision for Bad Debts

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its Patient Financial Assistance Program without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue. The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. The level of charity care, measured on the basis of established costs, is approximately \$2,107,465 and \$2,001,035 for 2011 and 2010, respectively. The cost of charity care

provided was determined based on the application of a ratio of overall hospital costs to patient charges. Included in patient service revenues for 2011 and 2010 is \$597,000 and \$419,000, respectively, from uncompensated care pools and income from restricted endowments.

The Hospital grants credit without collateral to patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party agreements. Additions to the allowance for estimated uncollectible accounts are made by means of the provision for bad debts. Accounts written off as uncollectible are deducted from the allowance. The amount of the provision for bad debts is based upon management's assessment of historical expected net collections, business and economic conditions, trends in Federal and state governmental health care coverage, and other collection indicators. Services rendered to individuals when payment is expected and ultimately not received are written off to the allowance for estimated uncollectible accounts.

The Hospital annually conducts a comprehensive assessment of the community and charitable benefits it provides. The most recent assessment was completed in April 2011 and culminated with the issuance of the Glens Falls Hospital Community Service Plan, a copy of which is available from management upon request.

(g) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents, patient and other accounts receivable, accounts payable, and accrued expenses approximate fair value, given the short term nature of these accounts Long-term debt instruments are carried at cost. Fair values are estimated based on quoted market prices for same or similar issues such as duration. The fair value of long-term debt approximates \$55,133,000 and \$54,786,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

(h) Investments and Investment Income

Investments in marketable equity securities, mutual funds and commingled fund, debt securities, and hedge fund of funds are reported at fair value ASC 820, Fair value Measurements, defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See note 6 for a discussion of fair value measurements

Investment income, including interest, dividends, and realized gains (losses) derived from operating cash, mortgage and bond indenture escrow, professional liability trust and a portion of the board resolution funds are included in other operating revenue. Investment income, including interest, dividends, and realized gains (losses) on the remaining portion of board resolution funds and the change in unrealized gains (losses) on all unrestricted investments are included in nonoperating revenue. All investment income, including changes in unrealized gains (losses) on assets which are associated with temporarily or permanently restricted donor funds are recorded as a component of the appropriate net asset category.

(i) Excess of Revenue over Expenses

The statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenue over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include contributions of long-lived assets (including assets

acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

(j) Deferred Financing Expenses

Issuance costs related to the Revenue Bonds have been deferred and are being amortized over the term of the bonds. The amount of issuance costs amortized for each of the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 was approximately \$280,000.

(k) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost or, if received as a gift, at fair market value established at the date of the gift. The carrying amount of assets and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts when such assets are disposed of and the resulting gain or loss is included in operations. Depreciation and amortization of property and equipment, including plant and equipment under capital leases, are computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets or lease periods, ranging from 5 to 40 years, as appropriate. Net interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. No interest was capitalized in 2011 or 2010

Gifts of capital assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of capital assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire capital assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service.

(1) Investments in Joint Ventures

The Hospital has investments in joint ventures to provide imaging, group purchasing services and health information services. The Hospital's investments in these joint ventures, which are classified in the balance sheets as other assets, represent the net amount of its capital contributions to the joint ventures, adjusted for cash distributions, and its equity in the net income (loss) of the joint ventures since inception

(m) Functional Expenses

The Hospital provides general health care services to residents within its geographic location including medical and surgical care, emergency care and outpatient surgery. Expenses related to providing health care services for 2011 and 2010 are approximately \$242,125,000 and \$242,402,000, respectively

(n) Tax Status

The Hospital is classified for tax purposes as an organization under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code), and as such it is generally exempt from income taxes under the provisions of Section 501(a) of the Code

The Hospital recognizes the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not of being sustained Recognized income tax positions are measured at the largest amount that is greater than fifty percent likely of being realized upon settlement. Changes in recognition in measurement are reflected in the period in which the change in judgment occurs. The Hospital did not recognize the effect of any uncertain income tax positions in either 2011 or 2010.

(o) Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the 2010 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2011 presentation

(p) Recently Adopted Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2011-07. Health Care Entities (Topic 954) *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue. Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities* (ASU 2011-07), which requires certain health care entities to change the presentation of their statement of operations by reclassifying the provisions for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual adjustments and discounts) Additionally, those health care entities are required to provide enhanced disclosure about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. The new pronouncement also requires disclosures of patient service revenue (net of contractual adjustments and discounts) as well as qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Hospital early adopted the provisions of ASU 2011-07 for the year ended December 31, 2011, including a retrospective adoption to 2010. The change in presentation did not significantly impact the Hospital's financial position, results of operations or cash flows.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU 2010-23, *Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure* (ASU 2010-23), which clarified the disclosure of charity care provided by health care organizations, providing that such disclosure should be, measured using cost and that related reimbursements recorded should also be separately disclosed ASU 2010-23 is effective for annual periods beginning on or after December 15, 2010, with retrospective application required. The adoption of ASU 2010-23 did not have a material impact on the accompanying financial statements

In August 2010, the FASB's Emerging Issues Task Force (EITF) issued consensus 09-K. *Health Care Entities Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries* (ASU 2010-24), which provides that the net presentation of receivables for insurance recoveries and related claims liabilities is not permitted ASU 2010-24 is effective for interim and annual periods beginning after December 15, 2010. The adoption of the ASU did not have a material impact on the accompanying financial statements.

(2) Revenue and Third-Party Reimbursement Agreements

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Inpatient acute care services rendered are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge in accordance with the Federal Prospective Payment System (PPS) for Medicare and generally at negotiated or otherwise pre-determined amounts under the provisions of the

New York Health Care Reform Act (HCRA) for all other payors Inpatient nonacute and outpatient services are paid at various rates under different arrangements with third-party payors, commercial insurance carriers, and health maintenance organizations. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined per diem rates, discounts from established charges, fee schedules, and reasonable cost. Medicare outpatient services are paid under a prospective payment system whereby services are reimbursed on a predetermined amount for each outpatient procedure, subject to various mandated modifications.

In addition, under HCRA, all non-Medicare payors are required to make surcharge payments for the subsidization of indigent care and other health care initiatives. The percentage amounts of the surcharge varies by payor and applies to a broader array of health care services. Also, certain payors are required to fund a pool for graduate medical education expenses through surcharges on payments to hospitals for inpatient services or through voluntary election to pay a covered lives assessment directly to the Department of Health (DOH)

The Hospital is required to prepare and file various reports of actual and allowable costs annually Provisions have been made in the financial statements for prior and current years' estimated final settlements. The difference between the amount provided and the actual final settlement is recorded as an adjustment to net patient service revenue as final adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to audits, reviews, and investigations. Final Medicare settlements have been determined for all years except 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2011. During 2011 and 2010, net patient service revenue was impacted by approximately \$406,000 and \$(246,000), respectively, due to actual settlements and changes in assumptions underlying estimated future settlements.

The laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action, failure to comply with such laws and regulations can result in fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs. The Hospital believes it is in compliance with applicable laws and regulations and retroactive adjustments, if any, would not be material to the financial position or results of operations of the Hospital. The Hospital has classified a portion of the accrual for estimated third-party payor settlements as long term liabilities because such amounts, by their nature or by virtue of regulations or legislation will not be paid within one year.

(3) Patient Accounts Receivable and Related Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Patient accounts receivable are reflected net of an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of patient accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past collection history, business and economic conditions, trends in governmental and employee health care coverage and other collection indicators for each of its major categories of revenue by payor to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major categories of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. Throughout the year, the Hospital, after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted, will write off the difference between the standard rates (or discounted rates if applicable) and the amounts actually collected against the allowance for doubtful accounts. In addition to the review of the categories of revenue, management monitors the write offs against established allowances to determine the appropriateness of the underlying assumptions used in estimating the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Hospital estimates fair value based on a valuation framework that uses a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). Financial assets recorded at fair value by the Hospital on a recurring basis are investments. The three levels of fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described below.

- (a) Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical assets and liabilities
- (b) Level 2 Inputs, other than quoted prices in active markets, that are observable either directly or indirectly and fair value is determined through the use of models or other valuation methodologies
- (c) Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and require significant management judgment or estimation in the determination of fair value

The Hospital follows the accounting provisions of ASU 2009-12, *Investments in Certain Entities that Calculate Net Asset Value per Share (or its Equivalents)* ASU 2009-12 allows for the estimation of the fair value of investments in certain investment companies for which the investment does not have a readily determinable value by using net asset value (NAV) per share or its equivalent as a practical expedient

Fair values for marketable equity securities, mutual funds and corporate bonds are based on quoted market prices or dealer quotes, where available. The Hospital values certain bonds and notes issued by governmental entities or agencies using matrix pricing obtained from a third party vendor to determine fair value. Matrix prices are based on quoted prices for securities with similar coupons, ratings, and maturities, rather than on specific bids and offers for the designated security.

A portion of the Hospital's investment portfolio consists of a commingled fund and a hedge fund of funds. The Hospital is generally required to consider such investments as Level 2, even though the underlying investments may not be difficult to value or may be readily marketable. The Hospital records the fair values of these alternative investments based on NAV reported by the fund managers. Since the NAV's are used as practical expedients to estimate the fair value of the alternative investments, the hierarchy levels into which these investments are classified are based primarily on the Hospital's ability to redeem its interest in each fund at or near the date of the balance sheet. Accordingly, the inputs or methodology used for valuing or classifying investments for financial reporting purposes are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with holding these investments, or a reflection on the liquidity of each fund's underlying assets and liabilities.

The Hospital has unsecured lines of credit with available proceeds of \$12 million maturing on June 30, 2012. There were no advances outstanding on the lines of credit at December 31, 2011 and 2010. Interest on these lines of credit is at the Bank's prime rate plus 0.25% or the Wall Street Journal prime rate, depending on the financial institution, ranging from 2.87% – 3.25% at December 31, 2011 and 2010.

(a) Spending Policy

The Hospital has permanently restricted endowment funds of \$1,506.672 for each of the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 Income generated from these endowment funds is to be expended for dental free care, indigent care, health education and general operating expenses. The amount of endowment appropriated for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 were \$16,900 and \$18,333, respectively.

(b) Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

Investment objectives focus on long-term capital growth through a combination of income and asset appreciation consistent with prudent investment practices and the preservation of capital to ensure availability of funds for future financial needs at the discretion of the Investment Committee within its scope of authority. The Investment Committee recognizes that prudent investing includes taking reasonable risks in order to increase the probability of achieving the targeted investment returns. The portfolio of funds will be structured to maintain prudent levels of diversification. In terms of relative risk, the volatility of the portfolio should be in line with general market conditions.

Net property and equipment includes approximately \$3,750,000 and \$5,736,000 applicable to capital leases at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Construction in progress consists primarily of the EPIC electronic medical records system with costs of approximately \$4 million through December 31, 2011. The remaining commitment for the project is approximately \$4.8 million with expected completion during 2012.

(10) Self Insured Liability Trust Fund

Effective October 1, 1988, the Hospital adopted a policy of self-insuring the primary portion of their professional liability insurance. An irrevocable trust was established for the purpose of setting aside assets based on actuarial funding recommendations. The trust agreement was created to cover liability claims arising from incidents occurring after June 30, 1982 and reported on or after October 1, 1988. The Hospital has purchased a claims made policy effective August 30, 1988, to cover claims in excess of the limits provided by the self-insured trust on a per claim basis and in the aggregate

Effective October 1, 1995, the Hospital also adopted a policy of self-insuring the primary portion of their general liability insurance on an occurrence basis. Similar to malpractice, the Hospital has a claims made policy to cover claims in excess of the self-insured limits on a per claim basis and in the aggregate

Management accrues for the professional and general liability reserves and the corresponding charge to operating expenses based on estimates of asserted and currently identifiable unasserted claims, if any, and a provision for unknown incidents. Such claims have been included in the estimated liability for self-insurance claims as determined by the Hospital's actuary. The Hospital's management believes that none of these claims will expose the Hospital above the insurance limits or self-insurance reserves applicable at the dates of the alleged incidents.

During September and October 2003, the Counties of Warren and Washington Industrial Development agency (Issuer) issued Civic Facility Revenue Bonds, Series 2003 A (\$36,200,000), 2003 B (\$20,000,000) and 2003 C (\$12,435,000) for the purpose of financing the Hospital's expansion and renovation construction project, refinancing the Hospital's Series 1975 and 1979 Bonds issued by the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York, fund a debt service reserve, and provide the funding for the financing expenses. The Bonds were issued pursuant to the terms of a trust indenture by and between the Issuer and HSBC Bank USA, as trustee (Trustee), dated as of September 1, 2003 (the Indenture)

The Bonds are special obligations of the Issuer payable solely from and secured by a pledge of payments to be made under an Installment Sale Agreement, dated September 1, 2003, between the Hospital and the Issuer As additional security for the Bonds, the Hospital and the Foundation, as the initial members of an Obligated Group, issued Obligated Group Notes to the Trustee pursuant to a Master Trust Indenture and Supplemental Master Indenture. The Obligated Group Master Notes are a joint and several obligation of the Obligated Group members secured by a pledge of and lien on the gross receipts of the Obligated Group members and a lien on portions of the Hospital's real property. The scheduled payment of principal and

interest on the Bonds when due is guaranteed under an insurance policy issued by Financial Security Assurance, Inc

The Master Trust Indenture requires mandatory sinking fund deposits beginning in 2021 to support the payment of the Term Bonds due on December 1, 2027 and 2035, respectively. Further, the members of the Obligated Group must satisfy certain financial performance and reporting requirement covenants annually as long as the Bonds are outstanding. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, management believes the Obligated Group was in compliance with its financial covenants. During 2009, management agreed with Assured Guaranty. Municipal Corp. (formerly known as Financial Security Assurance Inc.) (AGMC or Bond Insurer) that a reserve account would be established for approximately \$3.8 million and the days cash on hand liquidity requirement would be reduced.

Under the terms of the Indenture, the Hospital has established certain funds with the proceeds of the Bonds, including the maintenance of a debt service reserve fund. Included in the accompanying financial statements, classified as assets whose use is limited, are the Hospital's balances in these funds at December 31 as follows.

(12) Employee Benefits

Employee Retirement Plan – The Hospital sponsors a defined contribution plan covering substantially all full-time employees. The Hospital has agreed to make contributions between 2% and 4% of a participant's gross earnings up to statutory levels based on years of service. The participant may elect to contribute a portion of their salary up to a federally determined limit. The Hospital will match 50% of eligible employee contributions up to 2% of a participant's gross earnings. Total expense related to the defined contribution plan for 2011 and 2010 amounted to approximately \$3.878,000 and \$3.796,000, respectively

Other Postretirement Benefit Plan – The Hospital sponsored a defined benefit health care plan that provided postretirement medical benefits to full-time employees who worked 15 years and attained age 55 while in service with the Hospital The Hospital subsidized these benefits at different levels depending on the employee's year of retirement Benefits for retirements prior to 1993 are fully subsidized The Hospital's contributions for retirements in each year after 1992 are fixed at the 1992 contribution level and phased out by 20% each year Employees retiring after 1996 receive no benefits under the Plan The Hospital's policy is not to fund the net periodic postretirement benefit cost accrued However, the Hospital makes annual contributions toward its portion of the retirees' medical insurance premiums

The estimated amount of net actuarial gain that will be amortized from unrestricted net assets into net periodic postretirement benefit cost in 2012 is \$31.812. Additional actuarial gains and losses that arise in subsequent periods and are not recognized as net periodic postretirement benefit cost in the same period, will be recognized as a component of unrestricted net assets. These future actuarial gains and losses will be recognized as a component of net periodic postretirement benefit cost on the same basis as the amounts recognized in unrestricted net assets.
