



Bhutanese Refugee Empowerment

The population in Shutan mainly consists of two communities, the Drukpas and the Lhotshampas. In 1985, conflict between resulted in a mass exodus of Lhotshampas to Nepal. Starting from then until 1994, more than 110,000 Lhotshampas took refuge in seven UNadministered camps in Nepal living in very poor conditions

The United States eventually volunteered to resettle 60,000 of these refugees, with the remainder destined to go to other developed nations. In 2008, they began arriving in the United States in what the UN has described as one of the world's largest resettlement efforts ever. These refugees are given only a few months of support from the government and the resettlement agencies. After that, they are required to become self-sufficient. The most pressing needs are for financial assistance, employment, and basic material needs. They also require support to help them make the transition to this

These are poor farmines who cannot afford to buy essentials such as blankets, writer tackets, and toys for their children. Many have no jobs or are students and have no income. Although the VolAgs (Voluntary Agencies), or resettlement agencies, provide some support for the first few months, it is not adequate

Though many of the refugees are educated and can speak English, many of them have remained unemployed. And because agency support and government aid is not available to them for an extended period of time, the assistance of Sewa International is quickly becoming a lifeline for many of

Sewa International USA is providing:

Currently, our chapters in various cities, along with various local organizations, are working to fulfill the immediate and longer-term needs of these refugees with several more chapters gearing up to help. INTRODUCTION

India is one of the fastest growing countries in the world in terms of GDP. Food importing country of 1970's has become food surplus country in just 40 years. Unfortunately, some areas were left out in this development approach due to various reasons. They are mainly tribal areas situated in various parts of the country. Ironically these areas are rich in natural resources and provide vital ecosystem services like Carbon sequestration, water recharge etc. The Dangs (Gujarat) is one of them. As current development policies are not effective for development of these areas, out -of-box thinking is necessary to achieve development in this area.

ABOUT DANGS



Dang lies in Sahyadri Mountains, a biodiversity hotspot in the world. The Dangs is located between 105 and 1317 meters altitude above sea level. Most of the villages are situated in forest areas. The four major rivers in the Dangs are the Gira, Purna, Ambika and Khapri. A special feature of the Dangs is the fact that the watershed limits coincide with the administrative boundaries. There is hardly any rainfall runoff entering from any adjoining areas to the Dangs. The district receives an annual average rainfall of about 2373 mm. The rainfall is spread over a period of about 90 days. Dangs is a

tribal district. There are 13 tribes residing in Dangs, but majority population is of Bhils, Kokanas and Varlis. Three other tribes are declared as Primitive tribal Groups who are still living in pre-agriculture stage of hunter-gatherers. Apart from social stratification in tribal groups, one can observe traditional natural resource based

stratification in these groups. Bhils are mainly hunter gathers and in timber trade, Kokanas rely on agriculture, Kotwalis are mainly bamboo based artisans whereas Kathodis are Kath making groups.

LAND USE

There is high pressure on land in the district, since majority of the land is forestland (59%) and only a limited amount of land is available for agriculture to support a growing population. Another limiting factor is that 68% of the land is situated on a slope. The forestland is predominantly reserve forest, with restricted access for the local population and also some protected forest. The total forest area of the district is about 1062 Sq km (850 Sq km Reserved Forest and 212 Sq.km of protected forests). The second category in land use is cultivable land 36 5% of the total area of the Dangs. In comparison to these two main categories, the land used for grazing (0.15%) and the non-cultivable waste land (0.88%) is very limited. There is literally little space for infrastructural development or expansion of agricultural lands.

GENESIS OF WORKSHOP

The Dangs is one of the poorest districts identified by Planning Commission of India. The area is facing acute poverty and rate of migration is high. Dr. Ambedkar Vanvasi Kalyan Trut, Surat is a non-government organization working in Dangs for last 5-6 years on issues related to education, health and allied issues. While working with tribal community, organization realizes that it is necessary to intervene in root causes of poverty and migration to make any improvement in situation of local community. At the same time, various development programmes with good financial support are being implemented by government and other NGOs to improve natural resources and local community. Unfortunately many of these programmes are not getting desired results except few. So it is necessary to understand why these programmes are not getting desired results. The organization also felt that Local community has specific ideas about their development and it is necessary to understand them before planning any development activities for them.

A study was organized with the help of YOJAK Center for Research and Strategic Planning for Sustainable Development, Pune based organization engaged in research based sustainable development planning.

Study includes primary data collection, review of secondary data and interviews of local community, development practitioners, researchers, government officials, bankers and other interested in local development.

The study was limited to identifying constraints and possible intervention sectors. It is imminent and necessary to identify economically feasible, locally possible and socially just technological options for actual interventions in identified sectors. It was also felt necessary to share these options with local community before planning any intervention as it is for them and will be largely by them in future.

This workshop was planned with this background to involve various experts from leading agriculture universities, government institutions, and NGOs. The workshop was to discuss technological intervention regarding agriculture, forest, and land & water management. Local community was invited to be part of the workshop to understand the technologies and provide their inputs.

CURRENT SITUATION OF NATURAL RESOURCES OF DANGS - RETROSPECTIVE STUDY

WATER

Even though the Dangs has a high annual rainfall (2200 mm) compared with the average rainfall of the whole of Gujarat (852 68mm), both drinking water and water for irrigation is scarce. The lack of adequate recharge structures is one of the main reasons for this lack of water.

Groundwater is main source of drinking water. Availability and demand situation has imbalance in the area. Groundwater availability has fallen from 122mcm in 1984 to 72mcm in 1997. It must have worsened further in last 13 years.

Irrigation water situation is not very difficult. Open wells are major source of irrigation. As they are limited, total irrigation is limited in the area. Surface water resource is negligible due to inaction as well as topographical limitations of the area.

FOREST

The dangs old name was Dandakaranya means bamboo forest. It is main land use of the area More than 59% land is under forest area. The area is biodiversity-rich with more than 550 species of plants found in the area. Unfortunately the forest is being harvested in uncontrolled way for last many years. The so called scientific management of forests has replaced diverse forest into teak monoculture. Rich tradition of Malki trees has also converted into teak plantation in the boom of scientific management. Forest is only source of fodder for animals in the area. All villages are dependent on forest fuel wood on same forest.

LAND

It is major invelihood source of the area. Most of the people are dependent on land for their subsistence. At the same time it is the limiting factor. Only 40% land is out of forest. So there is limited scope for horizontal expansion of agriculture. Land quality is very poor with low organic matter and other nutrients. Water storing capacity of land is very limited.

Due to the absence of any storage mechanism and the decreased forest cover, large scale soil erosion takes place and the topsoil is getting completely washed away. The traditional slash and burn cultivation practices also contribute to the erosion since there is no tree canopy to break the intensity of the heavy rainfall. The decreased soil conditions lead to poor yields, uneconomic returns, reservoir sedimentation, and the reduction of storage capacity, ecological imbalance and flash floods.

LIVEHOOD PROFILE

Agriculture

Agriculture is main livelihood activity in the district. This is mainly at subsistence level and production is mainly for self consumption. The average land holding is 1.58 ha but most of it in parts and on slopes. Irrigation is very low with only 13% of cultivable land is under irrigation. Rice, Nagli, Chick pea, ground nut and Varai are major crops of the area. Agriculture pattern is shifting from Ragi to rice. Very low use of chemical fertilizer is a characteristic of the area.

Labor

Labor is an important livelihood activity which is mainly for cash income. The labor is involved in agriculture, forest and migrant labor for agriculture, construction, miscellaneous work. Local labor rates are very low compared to standard wages of Gujarat or NREGA minimum wage rate.

Animal Husbandry

Animal husbandry is mainly practiced for bull power and not as an income generation activity. There are strong tribal cultural reasons for the same. Infrastructure facilities regarding modern animal husbandry are poorly developed in the area.

Forest based livelihood

Forest is another important livelihood option for cash income as well as subsistence support. Villages are entirely dependent on forest for fuel wood purpose. Non-Timber Forest Produce (NTFPs) like Mahua flowers and seeds are being collected by tribals for centuries for self consumption and sale. Other NTFPs are teak seeds, medicinal plants, honey, bamboo and gum.

Forest is an important source for labor both through forest department's work as well as bamboo harvesting by Pulp Company. Communities like Kotwalis are entirely dependent on forest for livelihood as they are artisans who make bamboo baskets and other products.

Migration

It is important source of cash income. The migration ranges between 40 to 75% as per remoteness of village. The main push factors for migration are lack of employment opportunities, farming as the only source of income, lack of land, no irrigation facilities and therefore no opportunities for cultivation during winter and summer and shortage of water. The main pull factor is the possibility to earn cash and to have another source of income besides agriculture. Average duration of migration is 7 months mostly after monsoon season but landless people migrate in lead periods of monsoon too.

CASE OF HYBRID RICE PROMOTION

High yielding varieties of rice mostly hybrids were promoted in the area by extension agencies and private sector companies to overcome low productivity of local rice. This single step has multi-dimensional effect on entire system of Dangs:

Seed security is lost and farmers are dependent on markets for seed. They are paying 'quoted' price for rice seed

As hybrid varieties are less tolerant to vulnerable situations like heavy rains in Dangs, average loss due to climate conditions has increased in last few years.

Shift from traditional nutritious Ragi to rice has compromised nutritional security of the tribes.

Increase in production cost has led to increased debt on farmers.


Loss or raditional vegetable cultivation system 'Vavalı' on bank of rivers has been reduced in small pockets as the shads are mostly switched to rice cultivation.

These a vide ranging impacts directly affecting quality of life in this tribal area as affecting livelihood, health, sufficiency and traditional knowledge of the community.

University in the presence of Chief guest Dr. M.C. Varshneya, Ex-Vice Chancellor, Anand Agriculture University, and organizing committee members Shri Himanshubhai Bhat, President, Dr. Ambedkar Vanvasi Kalyan Trust, Dr. Gajanan Dange, President, YOJAK, Pune and Shri Bhagavatiprasad Mundhra, Chairman YOJAK, Pune Dr. A.N.Sabalpara Director of Research, Navasari

Deans, a rofessors and other faculty members from various colleges and departments from University were present a long with villagers from 50 villages each of Dang and Tapi districts.



Dr. Varshneya in his Key note address highlighted need to combined efforts by voluntary organizations, government institutions and local community for sustainable development. He emphasized on technological interventions supported by community institutions in Dangs. He provided various examples of technological interventions possible in Dangs area. He suggested the establishment of dedicated centers for Bamboo research and Dangi cattle conservation in Dnags. He also urged for up-scaling the activities of Millet research center.

Dr. A.R Pathak in his inaugural address praised the effort of joint workshop and ensured that university will provide all possible support in sustainable development of Dangs. He explained various efforts of university for hilly areas and appealed community members to increase their contact with university through KVKs and various departments

Dr. Gajanan Dange provided an overview of current situation of natural resources in Dangs. A detailed presentation was given to audience regarding situation of water, forest, livestock, land resources etc. Community members actively participated in the session by providing local examples of situation

Shri Uday Lature, Director, YOJAK proposed vote of thanks.

SESSION 1 AGRICULTURE PRODUCTIVITY - ISSUES AND POSSIBILITIES

The session was chaired by Dr. A.N.Sabalpara, Director of Research, Navasarı Agriculture University and co-chaired by Shri Kapil Sahasrabuddhe, Vice-President, YOJAK.

Rice Productivity



Dr. Vashi, Navasan Agriculture University gave detailed presentation on situation of rice, possible interventions in Dangs, need of promotion of improved varieties, possible help university can provide. Participants enthusiastically asked various questions as rice is close to their heart. Salient points of his presentation:

Hybrid rice variety promotion has resulted into nominal overall productivity increase in rice in the area.

There is an urgent need of promotion of improved varieties

Seed production should be taken up at village level

Approaches like community rice seedling nursery should be adopted for uniform transplanting, healthy growth of seedling, and for avoiding climate stress

Millets - possibilities in Dangs

Dr. P.P Choudhary, Head, Hill Millets Research Station, Navasari Agriculture University shared his views on Millets possibilities in Dangs. Millets was major crop some 20 years back, but rice has replaced the same Following are salient points of his talk

Low rate of millet seed replacement is observed

'Raab' making process needs to be reduced/stopped at earliest

New agronomical practices need to be demonstrated

Participants were keen to know about more drought and pest resistant varieties in millet. Dr. Choudhary shared information about varieties developed by university and its characteristics. He also shared that they have some seed for distribution on pilot basis and farmers' clubs should take lead in the process

SESSION 2 DIVERSIFICATION, POST-HARVEST ACTIVITIES, RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

The post lunch session was chaired by Dr. Gajanan Dange, President YOJAK. The session was regarding diversification of agriculture, post harvest activities and resource development.

Shri Parag Pandi, from University gave information about post harvest operation and possible opportunities in Dangs regarding same. He asserted need to group based processing units in villages.

Shri Rajendra Dahatonde, in-charge, Krishi Vigyan Kendra Nandurbar shared his experiences of agriculture and forest based enterprises from Nandurbar district. Nandurbar area has geographic and environmental conditions similar to Dangs and is predominantly habituated by tribal community KVK Nandurbar has worked with the tribal community from Navapur, Dhadgaon and Akkalkuwa to establish Mini Rice Mills, Small Processing units comprising of Oil Expeller, Mahua Extraction plant, Dal mill, Aonla candy unit and Palash Sharbat unit. He discussed about investments required. The presentation gave confidence to community members that they can also undertake similar activities in their home areas

Dr. N.L. Patel, Dean Horticulture College, Navsari Agriculture University gave detailed presentation regarding horticulture situation, possible intervention, efforts of university. He emphasized on use of low cost bamboo based shed nets for cultivation of vegetables. He stressed that the situation in Dang is very useful for such practices as people have small land holdings, high wind velocity, and heavy rainfall. The situation demands more than traditional agriculture and fortunately we have simple technologies for the same. He requested community to visit shed net units in the college and appealed them to use university technical support for their betterment.

Dr. I. A Mehta, Joint Director, Gujarat Land Development Corporation gave detailed presentation of Watershed development in Gujarat and Dangs. He shared information about possible watershed interventions in Dangs and appealed community to participate in Watershed development programmes implemented by government.

Shri. Mori, Chief Executive Officer, DHRUVA an organization promoted by BAIF gave excellent presentation on activities of DHRUVA in Dangs. He shared their six point agenda of Agri-Horti-Forestry based livelihood, Soil conservation, Water Resource Development, Value addition, Micro-finance and Micro enterprises. He has suggested various activities which were tried by DHRUVA in Dangs area. He has shown DHRUVA's willingness to provide all kind of support to work in Dangs area.

In the last presentation of the day, Dr. A. Das, Navsari Agriculture University shared their experiences of various experiments carried out in Dangs under National Agriculture Innovation Programme. He shared possible activities to be implemented by local community for agriculture productivity improvement in the area. He emphasized on soil and water conservation and development in the area for long term benefits.

The day was started with recap by Dr. Dange on Day 1 presentations and issues raised by various speakers.

Dr. R.G. Patil, shared his experiences regarding soil and water management practices useful in Dangs. He showed their research regarding soil and water situation in the Dangs and highlighted need to immediately take corrective measures for it. On management side, he has given three point agenda – promotion of micro irrigation technologies for water management, use of low cost poly houses for cultivation and

nutri agement for better productivity. An innovative Idea emerged out based on their research is considering small land holding in the Dangs. The technology is low cost and useful for given it is 3-5 farmers with single water source. The farmers were very interested in such solutions and asked at questions regarding same.






Shri Milind Thatte, Vayam, Jawhar, Thane, Maharashtra discussed about Forest Rights Acts and its usefulness in Dangs area. He shared their experiences of getting community forest resource rights provided under act. He emphasized that along with individual rights, villagers should work for community rights. He shared example of Mendha-Lekha village which has received community rights. The village has started selling bamboo from their forest and earned Rs 1 crore in one year. Village has put aside some percentage of this income for forest management and conservation and remaining amount will be

used for community welfare. He gave information about the Act, how to use it and extended his support if community, is interested in undertaking process for community forest rights. Many community members have shown interest in activities and met him personally for guidance.

Shri Sunit Deshpande, Sampoorna Bamboo Kendra, Lavada, Amaravati, Maharashtra shared his work with bamboo tisans and gave very inspiring presentation of strength of bamboo as major economic product in the forested areas. In his talk, he discussed types of bamboo, its uses, possible commercialization of bamboo products, technology required etc. He emphasized on providing prestige to bamboo artisans and suggested exploring local markets along with outside markets for bamboo products.

Dr. D D Carg gave presentation on Livestock management and possibilities in Dangs.

Achievements

(Experiences/Memoirs)

The major achievement of HSP is in creating a band of selfless, dedicated women to do social service with missionary zeal. They have been infused with a purpose and goal in their life. Young women with necessary educational background are trained in such a manner that they will be able to face all difficulties and challenges with confidence in their chosen field of social service. Initially, sevavratis dedicate 3 years for social service. In many cases the sevavratis have served for more than 3 years. There are instances of sevavratis serving for more than 15 years and some have expressed that they will serve for life. The creation of a band of more than 3000 such sevavraties is a great achievement.

Apart from the above, the HSP has also trained persons who unlike the full time sevavratis do social service part time in their area. They are also equally dedicated and selfless, like the full time sevavratis. The creation of a selfless human resource necessary for social service in this age of commercialization is HSP's achievement.

HSP believes that education is the base for the betterment of the society and hence lays emphasis on it. The HSP has started the Gurukula system of education which is notably different from the usual education we find in schools. One such Gurukula is reserved entirely for girls. A new type of nursery education is evolved after some research, which has won the appreciation of all who has visited the nursery schools. Training is given to Anganavadi teachers also. An All India training camp for such teachers from other states was oganized. The Central Social Welfare Department has invited the HSP to train the organizers of Awarenes Generation Camps who in turn train poor women in rural areas.

Modern life marked by stress and strain has disturbed many mentally and emotionally. Medical advice is very costly for an ordinary people. To serve their needs a project called 'Prasanna Apta Salaha Kendra' is started. Qualified doctors from NIMHANS (the premier institute of the country in the field of mental health) counsel the needy. More than 1000 mental cases, 700 family cases and 500 rehabilitation cases have been served and got relief from this center. In view of the increasing demand the HSP has opened two more branches in Bangalore. A 'Child Guidance Clinic' has been started recently. There are invitations from other states to start such service centres. Smt. Pankaja, the coordinator of Prasanna Apta Salaha Kendra was decorated with an award as 'Vidyaratna' in 1998. The Indian Psychiatric Association of Karnataka honoured the Kendra in the year 2002 for its services. Many institutions like Guild Associations, Rotary Club, Lions Club, Junior Chambers, Inner Wheel, Peiples Education Society, etc., have recognized and appreciated the activities of the Kendra' The Kendra has conducted workshops at Pune and Aurangabad besides many districts in Karnataka with the help of NIMHANS.

HSP is actively interested in dealing with environmental problems. It has prevented deforestation. It has championed the movement for Eco-preservation Shri Anant Hegde, who has been working in this movement for the last 25 years in Western Ghats is an awardee of the Karnataka Government. The most important aspect in this regard is documentation of Bio Diversities. The Pratishthana has selected persons from various villages of Sagar, Thirtahally and Hosanagara Taluks and trained them do the survey of all species of life and plant. This programme is undertaken with the collaboration and guidance of the Indian Institution of Science, Bangalore. The data collected has been published. This is done with a view to prevent the modern tendency of patenting the heritage old things.

In other fields of activities like Yoga, learning of Samskrit and organizing women in various activities, the Pratishthana has achieved substantial success. This is evident from the statistical data (1) A day long Surya Yajna and Samuhika Surya Namskars is been organized every year on the occasion of Ratha Sapthami. A large gathering of over one thousand three hundred persons including several hundred women performs 108 Surya Namskars at a strech (2) Similarly six hundred ladies from all sections of the society performed Lalita Sahasra Nama Japa & Yejna at Marsoor Lalitavana. (3) Deepa Puja is becoming popular in many towns, villages and slum localities where women belonging to different sections of society come together participate in good numbers. In 2002-03 in more than two hundred places nearly 18,000 women participated in Deepa Puja programme. Sevavratis visit houses and advise people to lead a better life. This includes work towards eradication of untouchability, alcoholism, and such other bad practices. The number of houses contacted in this regular-family-contact-programme by the sevavratis is increasing every year.

The Pratishthana has given more attention to poor, backward and tribal people. The Sevavratis have stayed in the colonies of tribal and nomadic people like Harina Shikary in Bijapur, Beggars Colony in Bidar and several slums areas in Bangalore city. They are conducting Shishuvihar, Samskar Kendra, Bhajan Mandalies, Free Tuition Classes in these areas. More than 30% of our activities are confined to this section of the society.

The sevavratis are the key to all the work done by the Pratishthana as they are the persons who visit houses for regular contact programme, run schools, and mobilize women for all activities. District wise camps are organized periodically for women. The participation of women in these camps is amazing. For example, at Bidar more than 1000, at Bijapur, more than 3000 women participated. The 'Matru Sangama' conducted at Mangalore on 6th Feb 2000 was unique in the sense the number of participants was more than 46000. In this camp women from all walks of life (from Beedi worker to editor of a leading magazine) participated. It also included students, workers, housewives, factary labourers, and intellectuals like professors, lecturers, doctors, advocates, etc.,

Achievement may be said to be considerable. Yet the Pratishthana's endeavour is to achieve still more to build a vibrant, strong, organized, harmonious, self reliant, and an ideal society. The Pratishthana has decided to continue the movement of social transformation through sevavratis with the active and willing co operation of public at large.

From Editor's Desk

The catastrophe in Leh, Laddakh and the surrounding rural areas saw RSS swayamsevaks and Sewa volunteers rushing in for providing succour to the flash flood affected. The disaster in Leh and the villages around is difficult to contemplate, the terrain being rugged and air being thin. It is more than a fortnight and the govt agencies are yet to provide normal power, water supply and communications. A senior political leader like Shn L. K. Advani is on record asking his party. Parliamentanians to donate at least Rs 10,000/- from their salaries to Sewa Bharti J & K.

Laddakh is sparsely populated area as compared to the rest of the state of Jammu & Kashmir and yet providing relief is a Himalayan task. It is in this trying hour that we need to extend our hand and go a mile longer to help the flood affected people. SI invites donors and well wishers to join hands for providing relief to the flood affected population of this tough terrain.

Relief And Rehabilitation Efforts By Sewa Organisations on in Leh

Hundreds of people got killed and thousands are missing and numerous were injured in worst ever cloud bursts and flash floods in Leh which caused unprecedented destruction in the entire district in general and Leh town in particular on August 6. In these adverse conditions, volunteers of Sewa International, Sewa Bharati, Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarathi Parishad (ABVP) and the Vanvasi Kalyan Ashram started allout rescue and relief operations. The leaders of all these organizations met the Dy Commissioner Leh, Chief Executive Councillor of LDHC and Brigadier Dutta of Army and submitted them written letters extending full support to relief and rescue operations. They appreciated the relief operation by all these organizations.



In the meantime, the Sewa Bharati J&K through its unit in Leh in association with the Ladakh Phande Tsongpa had already established a relief operation camp in Leh and is looking after the nees of the affected people

In Jammu, the Sewa Bharati organized an emergency meeting in which social workers of many organizations were present to chalk out the strategy to provide immediate relief to the victims of the disaster. All members paid homage to those who died in the disaster and formed a relief committee under the name of Ladakh Aapada Sahayata Samiti to assist the victims and affected families in Leh. Brig. (Retd.) Shri Suchet Singh has been unanimously elected president of the Samiti. Dr. Kuldeep Gutpa is secretary and Shri Abay Pargal will be treasurer. As an immediate measure, some cash donations were immediately transferred from Jammu to the group of sewa volunteers working in Leh. They purchased whatever relief material they could get from the nearby local markets and started distributing them. According to latest reports, a relief package of 2,000 blankets, a set of utensils for 500 families, 2,000 clothes and 500 shoes is on the way and will soon reach the calamity site. Some injured from Leh who have now amved at Jammu.

are also being contacted by Sewa Bharati workers to provide them necessary help.



According to Shri Suchet singh on an average a family requires at least 4 quilts, 4 blankets and equal number of mattresses ,4 pillows and a big dam. All this material is necessary for high altitude places like Leh where the temperature goes below zero degree Celsius during winter months which start October, latest by early November. The approximate cost of these items works out to Rs 6,500 per family of four members. In clothing sweaters, warm shirts, inners, jeans/warm trousers, jackets are required. The average cost works out to around Rs 8,000. As regard to the utensils the minimum requirements are one pressure cooker of at least 5 liter capacity, 6 plates for lunch/dinner, 6 glasses, 6 katon, 2 patila wih lids, 2 buckets per family. The approximate cost works out to around Rs 2,000.



"The cost of constructing dwelling units compnsing two rooms (one room 12X12 and the other one 12X15 including kitchen) in mud with tin roof will cost approximately Rs 2-2 25 lakh without labour component for which we intend to involve the beneficiary. The estimates are only tentative and may vary depending upon the requirements of the site Similarly, the requirement is based on an assumption of four member family the factual position can be assessed only after the connectivity is restored", Shri Suchet Singh added

Sewa International Aid Appeal For Cloudburst And Flash Floods In Leh (J&K)

CLOUDBURST, resulting into flash floods, triggered by sudden overnight heavy rain on the 6th August 2010, killing approximately 150 people as per latest report and over 500 people missing. Many people are still believed to be trapped under debris of buildings. Five villages – Nimmo, Basgo, Shapoo, Faing and Ney, apart from Choglamsar and Leh town have been very badly hit, where all communication systems, bus stands, Hospital and many other buildings have been washed away. Leh airport inundated with mud and water has been rendered non functional.

A distance of 150 kilometers – from Pang village on the Rohtang – Leh highway up to Nimoo on the Leh – Srinagar highway has been hit, hence the road connectivity to the city has been cut off from the rest of India

SEWA INTERNATIONAL, started relief activities in association with local partner organization Sewa Bharati Jammu, Jammu & Kashmir from the early morning of August 6, 2010 by providing food and temporary shelter to the affected

From Untouchable to Businesswoman

PLENTY of people exchanging free hugs in Times Square last Sunday traveled a long way to reach New York, but it's safe to say that few covered anything like the distances Kakuben Lalabhai Parmar had. This is not just a matter of mileage, although certainly it's a hike from Madhutra, a rural village in the western Indian state of Gujarat, to 42nd Street

At a practical level, Ms. Parmar's trip required a series of unusual conveyances, among them a bullock cart, a trishaw, the flatbed of a Jeep and the open-topped shuttle bus she rode to reach an airport before boarding a form of transport she had seldom seen up close before, let alone ndden.

At a deeper cultural level, her journey is yet stranger and more wonderful, embodying as it does a half-century of global feminism and the evolutionary arc of modern India. In the cattle-herding community Ms. Parmar belongs to, one among a cluster of groups categorized by the Indian constitution as "scheduled castes," women were traditionally bound not just to their region or village but to the home

"My group was treated as untouchables," said Ms Parmar, 50 And if the community was untouchable, its female members were still more disadvantaged by being invisible. Married at 14, the mother of seven, Kakuben Lalabhai Parmar was well into adulthood before she came face-to-face with a man who was not a close relative

Yet here she was in Midtown Manhattan last weekend, wrapping her arms around the strangers who gather there regularly to dispense affection, some of them understandably astonished at the apparition clad in a mirror-spangled skirt and a tie-dyed shawl, her throat and hands and arms lavishly adomed with the homemade tattoos that are a form of what Ms. Parmar termed "affordable beautification" in the far reaches of Gujarat

And here she was, too, a businesswoman setting up shop at the Asia Society, where a group of artisans gathered for three days to sell their wares; and at CVS buying bargain shampoo and \$1 hair omaments for her five daughters, and at the Metropolitan Museum of Art on Sunday

morning, pointing out to this reporter that the cooking vessels of the 12th Dynasty of Egypt (from about 1800 B C) look exactly like the pots she uses to cook dal at home.

Not a lot seemed to faze her She took in stride urban commotion, the assorted indignities of travel, the novelty of seat belts, in-flight movies and also elevators, escalators, yellow cabs, mattresses and the abundant forms so standard in life that could be unnerving to an illiterate whose signature is a print of her thumb.

"I already experienced the biggest change in my life," she said, speaking a Gujarati dialect through an interpreter, "when I first got the chance to come out of my house and participate in society".

Ms Parmar's moment of liberation came roughly 20 years ago, when the not-for-profit Sewa Project formed a unit in her village to help preserve endangered handicrafts and, equally, to provide the people who make them a form of alternative employment.

"We never even thought of getting income from selling this stuff before," said Ms. Parmar, who sews patchwork embroideries that incorporate vivid threads and reflective shards labonously cut by hand from mirror scrap she buys by the pound

The cloth, at least, may be familiar to readers, since it is the kind used in the making of a slouchy "It" bag being hauled around this summer by Cameron Diaz, Nicole Richie and other celebrity entities

The price tag on a satchel made from mirrored patchwork and bearing the label Simone Camille is about \$2,000, a sum equivalent to two years of Ms. Parmar's income. Yet even on the modest \$60 a month she earns sewing pillow covers that require almost a week's work and that sell in her local market for \$15 a pair, she has become the family's chief breadwinner. She holds title to her own cattle, has a personal account with a microfinance credit union and is quick to point out that while this may seem insignificant to a New Yorker accustomed to such symbols of Western wealth as reliable electricity and plumbing, it is considered a vast change in circumstance for a woman from rural India, even now

"When I was a girl, all the assets belonged to the father or the husband or the brother," Ms. Parmar said Fnday. Squatting on the floor of the Asia Society's grand marble lobby, she demonstrated her technique for cutting mirror shards into diamond, oval and triangular shapes and a pointed form called a "crow," using the sharpened edge of a terra cotta roof tile. She multitasked ceaselessly, stopping to spread out pillow covers for one buyer's approval, and explain the eye-dazzling motifs she uses to another, all the while keeping a sharp eye on the sales totals, eyeglasses perched at the tip of her nose

"In those days, the husband was in charge of everything," she explained to a visitor "What could you do, with no skills and no education?" Now as a globetrotter, an informal ambassador for Sewa and the Crafts Council of India — one of a growing number of groups committed to preserving traditional folkways in India, a country where, by some estimates, 40 million to 60 million people gain at least part of their living making handicrafts — she finds herself in circumstances she could never have foreseen.

She flies around the world on her own. She takes taxis. She shops at Walgreens and somehow manages to domesticate the experience of visiting a world-class museum like the Met by finding creative kinship there between her own utilitarian patchworks ("We never wasted a scrap of fabric," she said) and a Malian mud cloth or a Sudanese tent divider embroidered with Venetian trade beads and cowne shells. She proselytizes in an easy and natural way for the importance of educating women, getting them out of the house and into jobs.

Thanks to the work she does now, she says, with a high-pitched hoot, her role in family life inverts that played by the generations of women who came before her

"Now that I have my own business and make my own money, my husband shows me respect," Ms. Parmar said. There are even occasions, she said, when he helps her out with her accounts. "He's my secretary," she added with a laugh.

School Kit Drive By Seva Sahayog

- The first project taken up by YFS Hyderabad was the school kit drive It was designed in time for the start of the school year
- A school kit consists of 1 school bag, 6 long note books, 1 com pass box, 2 pens and 20 labels
- The kit was designed to prevent dropouts from schools due to financial constraints and lack of motivation to study further
- The call for 'Gift a School Kit for Rs 250' was well received and funds for 2400 school kits were collected by YFS volun teers within 2 months
- These kits were then distributed by the volunteers in various government schools across the city and rural areas of AP Titbits:
- 1. Nine years back, Shri S.S. Narayanan, a retired Assistant Executive Engineer of Madras Port Trust, found that Rs. 40,000 had accrued in his father Sankaranarayanan's savings bank account, being the monthly Railway pension over the years. As all the sons and daughters of retired Station Master Sankaranaraynan were leading contended lives, and were looking after their parents Sankaranaraynan - Rukmini well, the father advised Narayanan, to use the amount in such away to benefit the needy in the society. Within a week, Narayanan and his siblings together added Rs 10,000 to it and donated the amount to Madhava Seva Samiti, which identified meritorious school going children of daily wage earners in Chetput, Chennai (Tamilnadu, Bharat), for the last eight years, the interest proceeds of the amount is awarded to nine such children in memory of Sankaranaraynan -Rukmini at functions organisd by Seva Bharati This year the function saw two college students receiving similar awards, thanks to the thoughtful donation by Shri Sundar Nathan, a software professional working on E - learning projects in the US. He has instituted, on the advise of his mother Smt Saroja, a growing corpus in memory of his father late B Viswanathan, a top business executive in his lifetime. 2. Vanshidhar project high school under Bhandra block at the Lohardaga-Ranchi road (Jharkhand, Bharat), comprises more than 700 girls in 6th to 10th standard. The double-stoned school building earlier functioned from six rooms, including the office. "Now it has nine rooms with three of them constructed with the guru dakshina of our students," said Meera Bakhla, principal of the school "Earlier we used to merge two or three sections to run classes in a single room but thanks to our students and their guardians who came forward for the noble cause," Meera Bakhla said. "Parents of majority of girls are daily wage earners but their eagemess towards their children's education surprises us," said Muneshwar Mahto, Mathematics teacher of the school. More than

80 per cent of the students passed the Matriculation examination conducted by the Jharkhand Academic Council this year. It is to be noted that the district is infested by Naxal terrorism involving blasting of school buildings.

3. Shri Devinder Sharma is a food and trade policy analyst. He also chairs the New Delhi-based Forum for Biotechnology & Food Security. In 1999, he persuaded farmers of Punukula village in Khammam district of Andhra Pradesh, Bharat, to go in for bio fertilizers A few farmers began experimenting with Non-Pesticidal Management (NPM) practices. A year later, the highly contaminated environment began to change for the better. Soil and plant health looked revitalised, and the pests began to disappear. Such was the positive impact both environmentally and economically that by 2004 the entire village had stopped using chemical pesticides. Restoring the ecological balance brought back the natural pest control systems. Along with the pesticides, the pests too disappeared Surrounding villages promptly emulated this By now 3,18,000 farmers in 21 districts of Andhra Pradesh are using compost manure and earthworm to enrich the soil The health of farmers greatly improved with the disappearance of pesticides Cost of farming too fell by 35 percent Farmers of Ramachandrapuram in Khammam district had been bogged down by debts as a result of use of chemical fertilizers. After they took to bio fertilizers, in just two years, 386 of them could redeem the lands they had mortgaged
