NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AS OF AND FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2011 AND 2010 (In thousands)

1. BASIS OF PRESENTATION AND ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation — The consolidated financial statements of ThedaCare, Inc. and Affiliates (ThedaCare), include the accounts of Theda Clark Medical Center, Inc. (TCMC), Appleton Medical Center, Inc. (AMC), New London Family Medical Center, Inc. (NLFMC), Riverside Medical Center, Inc. (RMC), and Shawano Medical Center, Inc. (SMC) (collectively the "Hospitals") and various physician clinics (Clinics). Besides the Hospitals and Clinics, the consolidated financial statements also include the following

The Heritage, a division of ThedaCare, operates a 136-unit retirement center and 18-unit assisted living center

Peabody Manor, a division of ThedaCare, operates a 58-bed skilled nursing facility

ThedaCare Behavioral Health Services, a division of ThedaCare, operates various clinics which provide outpatient substance abuse and mental health services

ThedaCare at Home, a division of ThedaCare, provides home health services, durable medical equipment, nursing and related home health services, including infusion therapy and respiratory care services

Ingenuity First, a division of ThedaCare, provides comprehensive occupational medical, counseling and training services

Appleton Medical Center Foundation, Inc. and Theda Clark Medical Center Foundation. Inc. are not-for-profit foundations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes and whose primary function is to raise support for AMC and TCMC, respectively

George F Peabody Foundation. Inc is a nonstock, not-for-profit corporation which receives gifts and bequests, administers and invests funds, and disburses payments for the encouragement of effective elderly health care

Community Hospice Foundation, Inc is a nonstock, not-for-profit corporation which receives gifts and bequests, administers and invests funds, and disburses payments for the support, use, maintenance and operation of ThedaCare at Home hospice services

Wolf River Area Healthcare Foundation. Inc is a not-for-profit foundation organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes and whose primary function is to raise support for NLFMC

Shawano Medical Center Foundation, Inc is a not-for-profit foundation organized and operated exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes and whose primary function is to raise support for SMC

The Internal Revenue Service has determined that all of the above entities are not-for-profit organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code All of the above entities are also exempt from Wisconsin income taxes

Effective January 30, 2011. SMC affiliated with ThedaCare in order to provide high quality, low cost health care and to create a healthier Shawano community. Under terms of the affiliation, SMC retains its current name and identity, as well as its board of directors and its foundation, Shawano Medical Center Foundation, Inc (SMCF). ThedaCare is the sole corporate member of SMC, and the hospital and its employees (including physicians) became part of the ThedaCare system. The operating results of SMC and SMCF have been included in the consolidated financial statements since the date of the affiliation.

The unaudited consolidated pro forma financial information is not necessarily indicative of the results of operations that would have occurred if the affiliation had been completed on the date indicated, nor is it indicative of future operating results

Effective December 31, 2010. ThedaCare acquired Appleton Cardiology Associates (ACA), a group of 16 physicians and 117 other staff members which provides cardiovascular services. ThedaCare purchased in exchange for cash of \$4.945 and assumption of ACA's "paid time off" liability of (\$205) assets in the amount of \$5.150 for fixed assets (\$3.448) and goodwill (\$1.702). The fair value of these amounts was determined by appraisals. ACA continues to operate its full-time offices at AMC and TCMC, plus its local satellite offices. This was a result of an effort to bring together the area's best cardiovascular resources and technology to offer patients enhanced services and easier access to physicians, as well as offering greater stability as healthcare reform advances and providers deliver more patient-centered care. The operating results of ACA have been included in the consolidated financial statements since the effective date of the acquisition.

The consolidated financial statements have been presented in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as recommended in the Audit and Accounting Guide *Health Care Entities*, published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants All intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation. Significant accounting policies are described below

Cash Equivalents — ThedaCare considers all undesignated and highly liquid short-term investments with a maturity of three months or less when acquired to be cash equivalents. Short-term investments of money market and cash balances that are yet to be reinvested are not considered cash equivalents.

Inventories — Inventories are valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market

Board-Designated Investments — Board-designated investments represent funds designated by the board of directors to be used for the replacement, improvement and expansion of facilities (see Note 7)

Assets Whose Use is Limited — In addition to board-designated investments, assets whose use is limited also includes assets held by a trustee under bond indenture agreements. These funds consist of government securities, money market funds and other highly liquid short-term investments (see Note 7)

Investments — Investments are designated as trading securities and generally recorded at fair value Short-term investments may consist of cash balances that have yet to be reinvested, as well as marketable securities that are used to fund the operating needs of the organization. Long-term investments may consist of cash balances, as well as marketable securities, that are restricted for debt service or for the Foundations' endowment funds.

Land, Buildings and Equipment — Land, buildings and equipment are stated at historical cost. Items of an ordinary maintenance or repair nature are charged directly to expense as incurred, and major renewals or improvements which extend the useful life of the buildings or equipment are capitalized. Cost and related accumulated depreciation for property sold or otherwise retired are removed from the accounts, and gains or losses on disposition are included in operations. Assets under capital leases are amortized over the shorter of the lease period or the life of the asset.

Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives used for depreciation purposes are

Land improvements5 to 25 yearsBuildings and improvements10 to 40 yearsEquipment3 to 15 yearsComputer hardware and software3 to 5 years

Bond Issuance Costs — ThedaCare amortizes bond issuance costs over the terms of the bonds. The amortization is calculated using the effective interest method. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, accumulated amortization of bond issuance costs was approximately \$6,867 and \$6,386, respectively.

Long-Lived Assets — ThedaCare periodically evaluates the carrying value of land, buildings and equipment, and other long-lived assets. Long-lived assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. There was \$233 of impairment charges related to intangible assets in 2010 and none in 2011.

Goodwill — ThedaCare records as goodwill the excess of purchase price over the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired Goodwill is recorded at cost and is included in other assets in the consolidated statements of financial position Goodwill is not amortized ThedaCare follows a twostep process for impairment testing of goodwill, which is performed annually as well as when an event triggering impairment may have occurred. The first step tests for impairment, while the second step, if necessary, measures the impairment. The da Care has elected to perform its annual analysis as of December 31 Goodwill of \$1,702 was acquired in 2010 through the acquisition of ACA Due to a decline in high revenue producing activities caused by shifting practice patterns, revenues and operating profits have been lower than expected ACA reevaluated its earnings forecast for the next five years based on the lower-than-expected revenues and operating profits Based on the revised earnings forecast, ThedaCare determined that goodwill was impaired at December 31, 2011 ACA calculated its fair value and the amount of the impairment using a discounted cash flow method Based on the impairment analysis. ThedaCare recorded an impairment charge of \$851 related to goodwill at December 31, 2011, which is recorded within depreciation and amortization expense in the consolidated statement of operations Goodwill was \$851 and \$1,702 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010. respectively

Residency Fee Deposits — Residency fee deposits associated with The Heritage are no longer collected. The remaining deposits held are being refunded by reducing the tenants' monthly rents. When a tenant leaves. The Heritage refunds the total amount due immediately.

Deferred Gain on Capital Leases — In 2003, ThedaCare entered into a sale-leaseback arrangement Under the arrangement. ThedaCare sold the building located at 2701 East Enterprise Avenue and leased it back for a period of 15 years. The leaseback has been accounted for as a capital lease. The gain of approximately \$311 realized in this transaction has been deferred and is amortized into income as the asset is used and depreciated.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments — The carrying amounts for cash, accounts receivable, and accounts payable approximate their fair values due to the short-term nature of these accounts. Based on current rates available for long-term debt of market participants, amounts included in the consolidated statement of financial position are estimated to have a fair value of \$270,127 compared to a carrying value of \$259,427 at December 31, 2011. At December 31, 2010, the fair value was \$251,601 compared to a carrying value of \$258,567. The fair value of investments and assets whose use is limited is determined as described in Note 7.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets — Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity

Net Patient Service Revenue — Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. Laws and regulations governing government and other payment programs are complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates could change by a material amount in the near term. Changes in estimates relating to prior years increased net patient service revenue by \$927 and \$1,529 in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Operating Income — The consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets include operating income. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from operating income, include investment income, contributions net of related expenses, and nonrecurring gains and losses such as pension curtailment gains, which management views as outside of normal operating activities

Other Operating Revenue — Other operating revenue consists of rental income, equity in affiliates' earnings, cafeteria and vending proceeds, medical records, governmental incentives received for implementation of electronic health records systems and various programs. Included in rental income are amounts from residential units, an assisted living center, and various other entities occupying hospital and clinic space.

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses — The consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets and consolidated statements of changes in total net assets include amounts labeled excess of revenue over expenses which represent results of operations and nonoperating income Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include pension-related changes other than net periodic pension cost, reclassifications of restricted net assets and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

Contributions — Unrestricted contributions and bequests are recorded in the year received or pledged Donor restricted contributions and bequests are recorded in the year received or pledged as additions to permanently restricted net assets or to temporarily restricted net assets. Restricted contributions are held in restricted net assets until assets are disbursed or utilized in accordance with the donor's instructions. When a donor restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets as other operating revenue (if time restricted or restricted for operating purposes) or as net assets released from restrictions in other changes in unrestricted net assets (if restricted for capital acquisitions). Donor restricted contributions for operating purposes whose restrictions are met in the same year as received are reported in nonoperating income.

Distributions — During the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, \$205 and \$1,070, respectively, was distributed to Appleton Medical Center Foundation designated to the ThedaCare Community Fund

Income Taxes — ThedaCare follows FASB guidance on income taxes. Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes, which addresses the determination of whether tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded in the financial statements. Under this guidance. ThedaCare may recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more likely than not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by taxing authorities, based on the technical merits of the position. Examples of tax positions include the tax-exempt status of ThedaCare, and various positions related to the potential sources of unrelated business taxable income (UBIT). The tax benefits recognized in the financial statements from such a position are measured based on the largest benefit that has a greater than 50 percent likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, there were no unrecognized tax benefits identified or recorded as liabilities.

ThedaCare files Form 990 in the U S federal jurisdiction Tax returns filed by ThedaCare are generally open for examination for the years 2008 through 2011

Use of Estimates — The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. The use of estimates and assumptions in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements is primarily related to the determination of the net patient accounts receivable and settlements with third-party payors, as well as the determination of fair value of ThedaCare's alternative investments, and the projected benefit obligation relating to ThedaCare's defined benefit pension plan. Due to uncertainties inherent in the estimation and assumption process, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in these estimates and assumptions in the near-term would be material to the financial statements.

Laws and Regulations — The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations, specifically those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Recently, federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenues from patient services. Management believes ThedaCare is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

Professional Liability Insurance — The Hospitals have professional liability insurance with limits of \$1,000 per claim and \$3,000 in aggregate for claims made during a policy year. Losses in excess of these amounts are generally fully covered through each hospital's participation in the mandatory Injured Patient and Families Compensation Fund of the State of Wisconsin.

Employee Health Care Benefits — ThedaCare self-funds health benefits provided to employees Total expenses relating to self-funded health benefits were \$33,949 and \$30,671 for 2011 and 2010, respectively. To limit the losses on individual claims. ThedaCare had a stop-loss insurance agreement with a third-party on both medical and pharmaceutical claims in excess of \$450 per insured person Effective January 1, 2012. ThedaCare no longer has this stop-loss insurance agreement

New Accounting Standard — During the year ended December 31, 2011. ThedaCare adopted the disclosure guidance contained in the Financial Accounting Standards Board's (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2010-23. Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure - A Consensus of the FASB Emerging Issues Task Force—This ASU requires that the measurement of charity care by a health care entity for disclosure purposes be based on the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care, and that ThedaCare provide disclosure regarding the method used to identify or determine such costs—The measurement and disclosure requirements in this ASU were required to be applied to all periods presented in the consolidated financial statements—See Note 4 for further information

Pending Accounting Standard — In July 2011, the FASB issued guidance which amends the current presentation and disclosure requirements for health care entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time the services are rendered without assessing the patient's ability to pay. This guidance requires health care entities to reclassify the provision for bad debts from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue. In addition, this guidance requires more disclosure on the policies for recognizing revenue, assessing bad debts, as well as quantitative and qualitative information regarding changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. This guidance will be applied retrospectively to all prior periods presented and is effective during interim and annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011. Upon adoption of this guidance. ThedaCare will reclassify the provision for bad debts related to prior period patient service revenue from operating expenses to a reduction in revenue.

Subsequent Events — ThedaCare has evaluated subsequent events for potential recognition and /or disclosure through April 26, 2012, the date the consolidated financial statements were issued

Reclassifications — Certain items in the consolidated financial statements and notes as of and for the year ended December 31, 2010 have been reclassified to be consistent with the classification as of and for the year ended December 31, 2011

2. OTHER AFFILIATES

ThedaCare includes in other operating revenue income relating to affiliations. During 2011 and 2010, approximately \$1.062 and \$598 of income was recognized, respectively. ThedaCare accounts for its investment in the following affiliates under the equity method of accounting.

Gold Cross Ambulance Service. Inc — ThedaCare owns 50 percent of Gold Cross Ambulance Service. Inc (Gold Cross), a not-for-profit corporation formed by area hospitals to provide ambulance services to the community

Premium Healthcare. Inc — ThedaCare owns 50 percent of Premium Healthcare. Inc. a corporation formed to assist in the administration of contracts on behalf of health care providers and to develop and implement systems of utilization management and quality control for services of health care providers

Groth Clinical Services, LLC — ThedaCare owns 50 percent of Groth Clinical Services, a corporation formed to manage the supplies and productivity of the outpatient surgery area at AMC

Aylward Clinical Services, LLC — ThedaCare owns 50 percent of Aylward Clinical Services, a corporation formed to manage the supplies and productivity of the outpatient surgery area at TCMC

The total investment related to these affiliates on the consolidated statements of financial position is \$4,782 and \$4,089 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

3. NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

ThedaCare has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements for the Hospitals with major third-party payors follows.

Medicare — Inpatient acute care and certain outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Inpatient nonacute services and defined medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospitals are reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospitals and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospitals' classifications of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Hospitals. The percentage of gross revenue applicable to services provided to Medicare patients was approximately 41 percent in 2011 and 38 percent in 2010.

Medicaid — The Hospitals are providers under the Title XIX Wisconsin Medical Assistance (Medicaid) program. Under this program the Hospitals are legally bound to accept the amount determined by the State as payment in full for each patient's charges. The Medicaid program reimburses a fixed amount per discharge based on each patient's Diagnostic Related Group (DRG) for inpatient services. Payment for services rendered to Medicaid outpatients is, subject to certain limitations, based on an indexed amount per outpatient visit. The accompanying consolidated financial statements reflect the estimated amounts to be reimbursed under the program. The percentage of gross revenue applicable to services provided to Medicaid patients was approximately 9.9 percent in 2011 and 10.2 percent in 2010.

ThedaCare has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospitals under these agreements includes discounts from established charges and other arrangements.

The Clinics are reimbursed from Medicare based upon a resource based relative value scale (RBRVS) fee schedule Clinic Medicaid reimbursement is based on the lower of each clinic's cost charges or a specified rate per visit

4. CHARITY AND OTHER UNREIMBURSED CARE

ThedaCare maintains a policy whereby patients in need of medical services are treated without regard to their ability to pay for such services. ThedaCare provides care to these patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than the established rates. Charity care eligibility is established based on limited or no insurance coverable, income compared to published poverty levels and family size, as well as other factors. Because ThedaCare does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. ThedaCare maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. Charity care is measured based on ThedaCare's estimated direct and indirect costs of providing charity care services. That estimate is made by calculating a ratio of cost to gross charges, applied to the uncompensated charges associated with providing charity care to patients. The amount of charity care provided during 2011 and 2010 was approximately \$6.671 and \$4.799, respectively.

6. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Cash — ThedaCare maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts, which at times may exceed federally insured limits. Management regularly monitors ThedaCares' cash balances along with the financial condition of the financial institutions to minimize this potential risk.

Accounts Receivable — ThedaCare grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and insured under third-party payor agreements. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, the mix of gross receivables from patients and third-party payors are approximately as follows.

7. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS AND INVESTMENTS AND ASSETS WHOSE USE IS LIMITED

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, ThedaCare uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches. ThedaCare often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. ThedaCare utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques. ThedaCare is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories.

- Level 1 Quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities
- Level 2 Observable market based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data. Level 3 valuations incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets and liabilities.

In determining the appropriate levels. The da Care performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities that are subject to fair value reporting. At each reporting period, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

ThedaCare holds investments in certain money market funds and certificates of deposit in which cost approximates fair value and debt and equity securities which are traded on the New York Stock Exchange and NASDAQ. All such investments are considered Level 1 items. Investments in certain corporate bonds and asset backed securities are valued at fair value based on the applicable percentage of ownership of the underlying company's net assets as of the measurement date, as determined by the Fund Manager and are considered Level 2 items. In determining fair value, the Fund Manager utilizes valuations provided by the underlying investment companies. The underlying investment companies value securities and other investments on the fair value basis of accounting. Alternative investments, are considered Level 3 and reported at fair value and represent investments in offshore feeder funds. These funds are made up of several underlying managers each of whom manages their own portfolio. These managers invest primarily in marketable U.S. equities. The long-term investment objective of the alternative investments is equity-like returns with half the volatility of the equity markets with better downside protection than the equity markets. Fair value is determined based on the net asset value of the underlying funds. For the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, the application of valuation techniques applied to these investments has been consistent.

The alternative investment funds contain redemption restrictions ranging from quarterly redemptions with 30 days' notice to annual redemptions with 100 days' notice, and redemption of certain of the alternative investments is restricted for up to two years after the initial investment. Alternative investments that may not be redeemed for more than a year as of December 31, 2011 totaled \$3.918. As of December 31, 2011, there are no unfunded commitments relating to ThedaCare's alternative investments.

11. DEFERRED EMPLOYEE BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS AND PENSION PLANS

Defined Contribution Plan

ThedaCare offers a defined contribution retirement and 403(b) savings plan in which substantially all employees may participate. For employees age 19 and over, the plan includes a 75 percent match on the first 4 percent of eligible wages contributed to the plan by employees, plus an annual employer contribution from 3 to 8 percent of eligible wages based on years of service to employees who meet a minimum hours requirement and are employed as of the last day of the plan year (December 31). ThedaCare also contributes a transition contribution equal to 7 percent of eligible wages to employees age 55 and over who had at least 10 years of service as of January 1, 2010. ThedaCare will make transition contributions through 2016. Total defined contribution expenses were approximately \$21.637 and \$18,870 during 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Deferred Compensation

ThedaCare provides certain executive compensation plans which vest over a one to five year time period, and are paid out once the balances are fully vested Related liabilities are \$2,278 and \$1,725 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

Pension and Other Post Retirement Benefits

The ThedaCare Pension Plan, which was frozen in 2009, is a defined benefit pension plan which covers all full-time and many part-time employees of ThedaCare who have completed one year of service and attained the age of 21. ThedaCare funds contributions to the Plan based on actuarial computations using the projected unit credit method. Benefits are based on years of service and the employee's average compensation for the five highest consecutive years of service. ThedaCare contributed \$6.800 and \$28,000 to the plan during 2011 and 2010, respectively. The contributions for ThedaCare's pension plan for the year ending December 31, 2012 are anticipated to be \$11,400. The contribution for Thedacare's other postretirement benefits for the year ending December 31, 2012, are anticipated to be \$320.

ThedaCare provides certain benefits to eligible employees after their retirement date. Such benefits include life insurance and the additional claims cost in excess of standard premiums for medical and dental benefits. ThedaCare funds benefit costs on a pay-as-you-go basis. During 2011 and 2010. ThedaCare made benefit payments totaling approximately \$250 and \$240, respectively.

ThedaCare considered the historical returns and future expectations for returns in each asset class, as well as targeted asset allocation percentages within the pension portfolio. For postretirement benefit obligation measurement purposes, a 9 percent annual rate of increase in the per capita cost of covered healthcare benefits was assumed for 2012. The rate is assumed to decrease by 1 percent per year to 5 percent in 2016 and remain at the level thereafter.

14. ENDOWMENT FUNDS

The ThedaCare endowment consists of 18 individual funds established for a variety of purposes. Its endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments. Net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Directors of ThedaCare has interpreted the state of Wisconsin UPMIFA as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation. ThedaCare classified as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net asset is classified as temporarily restricted net assets

Funds with Deficiencies

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor requires ThedaCare to retain as a fund of perpetual duration Deficiencies of this nature that are reported in unrestricted net assets were \$9 and \$7 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. These deficiencies resulted from unfavorable market fluctuations that occurred after the investment of new permanently restricted contributions and continued appropriation for certain programs that was deemed prudent by the Board of Directors

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

ThedaCare has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the organization must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period(s) as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that exceed the price and yield results of the S&P 500 index while assuming a moderate level of investment risk

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives. ThedaCare relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). ThedaCare targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

ThedaCare has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year 5 percent of its endowment fund's average fair value over the prior 12 quarters through the calendar year-end proceeding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy. ThedaCare considered the long-term expected return on its endowment.

15. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

At December 31, 2011. The da Care had commitments totaling approximately \$2,342 related to construction projects and major equipment purchases

16. LITIGATION

ThedaCare is involved in litigation arising in the normal course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, it is management's opinion that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on ThedaCare's financial position or results from operations

17. RESTATEMENT

Subsequent to issuance of the consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2010, management determined that an accounting error, as described below, was included in the previously issued financial statements. As a result, the consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2010 have been restated. The restatement had no impact on net cash provided by operating activities in the 2010 consolidated statement of cash flows.

ThedaCare made an error when recording an adjustment to its defined benefit pension plan liability that affected its accrual for its annual retirement and transition contributions to its defined contribution retirement and 403(b) savings plan as of December 31, 2010, resulting in an understatement of accrued liabilities and benefits expense. The consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2010 have been retroactively restated for the error in the amount of \$11,623.
