#### Note 1. Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

**Nature of organization:** FirstSolutions is a not-for-profit corporation, organized to provide medical and health care services to the community of Duluth, Minnesota, and the surrounding area

FirstSolutions is the sole corporate member of Bridgeview Company, a for profit corporation organized under the laws of the state of Minnesota for the purpose of providing administrative support services to companies in health-related fields and to provide business processing services in health-related fields

During all or part of 2011, FirstSolutions and Subsidiary (FirstSolutions) provided the following services

Health management
Claims processing - nontraditional (Elderly Waiver)
Medical clinic and pharmacy services

Health management and medical clinics and pharmacy services have been accounted for as discontinued operations during 2011 (see Note 9)

A summary of FirstSolutions' significant accounting policies follows

**Principles of consolidation:** The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of FirstSolutions and Bridgeview Company. All material intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

**Use of estimates:** The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

**Risks and uncertainties:** The uncertainty in the economy, both nationally and in Minnesota, and the increased focus on health care reform with the recent political changes could impact FirstSolutions' business for the coming year

**Cash and cash equivalents:** Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use

**Patient accounts receivables:** Patient accounts receivable, where a third-party payor is responsible for paying the amount, are carried at a net amount determined by the original charge for the services provided, less an estimate made for contractual adjustments or discounts provided to third-party payors

Patient accounts receivable due directly from the patients are carried at the original charge for the services provided less amounts covered by third-party payors and less an estimated allowance for doubtful receivables based on a review of outstanding amounts on a monthly basis. Management determines the allowance for doubtful accounts by identifying troubled accounts, by using historical experience applied to an aging of accounts and by considering the patient's financial history and credit history and current economic conditions. Accounts receivable are written off when deemed uncollectible Recoveries of receivables previously written off are recorded as a reduction of bad-debt expense when received.

Claims processing receivable: The claims processing receivable is the amounts advanced by FirstSolutions on approved claims for the Elderly Waiver Program The balance is due from Blue Cross Blue Shield of Minnesota (BCBSM)

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

Investments: Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the deficiency of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. FirstSolutions has classified all of its investments as trading

FirstSolutions invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the value of investment securities will occur in the near term and, that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

**Inventories:** Inventories of medical, laboratory, radiology and pharmaceutical supplies, and pharmacy drugs, are valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market

**Property, equipment and deprecation:** Property and equipment is stated at cost if purchased or, if donated, at fair value at the date of donation, which then becomes its cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives of property and equipment are as follows.

**Assets limited as to use:** Assets limited as to use are invested in cash and mutual funds and are assets set aside by the board and restricted by donors to be used for scholarships. The board retains control over their portion and may at its discretion subsequently use it for other purposes.

Claims processing deposit: The claims processing deposit was provided by BCBSM to fund the future payment of claims for the Elderly Waiver Program Funds not used for the payment of these claims will be returned to BCBSM at the end of the Elderly Waiver Program contract

**Net assets:** Unrestricted net assets are those funds presently available for use by or on behalf of FirstSolutions including amounts available or general and administrative expenses. These unrestricted net assets may also include board-designated funds. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. These are primarily contributions that are restricted for scholarships. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Permanently restricted net assets are contributions that have donor-imposed restrictions whereby the amount of the gift is to be held in perpetuity and only the income generated can be used as stipulated by the donor. FirstSolutions had no permanently restricted net assets as of December 31, 2011 and 2010.

Operating revenues: The majority of operating revenues from continuing operations are obtained from nontraditional claims processing and rental income Revenues are recorded as services are performed Nontraditional claims processing is the processing of nonmedical claims related to the provision of services for the Elderly Waiver Program Rental revenue is generated from leasing space in a medical clinic and pharmacy building located in Two Harbors

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

**Net clinic and pharmacy revenue:** FirstSolutions has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered.

The laws and regulations under which the Medicare and Medicaid programs operate are complex, subject to change and subject to interpretation. As part of operating under these programs, there is a possibility that governmental authorities may review FirstSolutions' compliance with these laws and regulations. Such review may result in adjustments to Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements previously received and subject FirstSolutions to fines and penalties. Although no assurances can be given, management believes they have complied with the requirements of the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

**Deficiency of revenues over expenses:** The statement of activities includes deficiency of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from deficiency of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, changes in temporarily restricted net assets and loss on discontinued operations

**Income taxes:** FirstSolutions is exempt from federal and state income taxes, except when engaging in business activities that are considered to be unrelated to its tax-exempt purpose

Not-for-profit organizations may become subject to income taxes if qualification as a tax-exempt entity changes, if unrelated business income is generated, and in certain other instances. Not-for-profit organizations are required to assess the certainty of their tax positions related to these matters and, in some cases, record liabilities for potential taxes, interest and penalties accompanied by footnote disclosures. Management evaluated FirstSolutions' tax positions and concluded FirstSolutions has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements to comply with the provisions of the guidance. With few exceptions, FirstSolutions is no longer subject to income tax examinations by the U.S. federal tax authorities for years before 2008.

Fair value measurements: FirstSolutions reports its fair value measures using a three-level hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. This hierarchy, established by generally accepted accounting principles, requires that entities maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are as follows.

- Level 1. Quoted priced for identical assets or liabilities in active markets to which FirstSolutions has access at the measurement date
- Level 2. Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. Level 2 inputs include
  - quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets,
  - quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active,
  - observable inputs other than quoted prices for the asset or liability (for example, interest rates and yield curves), and
  - inputs derived principally from, or corroborated by, observable market data by correlation or by other means
- Level 3. Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability should be used to measure the fair value to the extent that observable inputs are not available

When available, FirstSolutions measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. At times Level 1 inputs may not be available for certain assets and liabilities that FirstSolutions is required to measure at fair value (for example, unconditional promises to give and in-kind contributions)

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

The primary uses of fair value measures in the FirstSolutions' financial statements are for the valuation of marketable securities

Recent accounting pronouncements: In May 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued updated accounting guidance related to fair value measurements and disclosures that result in common fair value measurements and disclosures between U S GAAP and International Financial Reporting Standards. This guidance includes amendments that clarify the application of existing fair value measurement requirements, in addition to other amendments that change principles or requirements for measuring fair value and for disclosing information about fair value measurements. This guidance is effective for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011. The adoption of this guidance is not expected to have a material effect on FirstSolutions' consolidated financial statements.

**Subsequent events:** Management has evaluated subsequent events through March 12, 2012, the date the financial statements were available to be issued

#### Note 3. Retirement and Postemployment Benefit Plans

FirstSolutions provides a defined-contribution pension plan covering substantially all nonunion employees. Pension expense is based on a percentage of total eligible compensation and was \$181,024 for the year ended December 31, 2011 and \$385,057 for the year ended December 31, 2010. FirstSolutions also contributes to a defined-contribution pension plan covering all union employees. The plan is funded monthly based on an amount per hour worked. Contributions to the plan and the charge to operations amounted to \$27,125 and \$121,199 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

FirstSolutions sponsors a tax-sheltered annuity plan whereby employees can defer up to \$16,500 per year of their annual salary, not including catch-up provisions for those over 49 and/or with over 15 years of service with their employer. Contributions made to the plan by participants are immediately 100 percent vested. FirstSolutions is not obligated to nor does it contribute to the plan.

Both the defined-contribution pension plan and the tax-sheltered annuity program were discontinued at December 31, 2011, and were replaced by a 401(k) retirement plan

Medical benefits that FirstSolutions offers to several of its physicians meet the requirement of a qualified postretirement medical benefit plan. The plan is noncontributory. For 2011, an annual projected rate of increase in healthcare costs of 8.0 percent was assumed by Management, reduced 0.5 percent per year until 5.0 percent in 2017 and later. The net period postretirement benefit cost including special events, reduced medical benefits expense by \$2,320 and \$115,951 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The accrued liability for the benefit was \$159,431 at December 31, 2011 and \$177,355 at December 31, 2010, which is included in accrued liabilities.

As of December 31, 2011, there were four vested physicians/spouses that continue to be covered by this plan

#### Note 4. Contingencies and Commitments

FirstSolutions purchases professional and general liability insurance to cover medical malpractice claims. The professional medical liability insurance has policy limits of \$2,000,000 per incident and \$4,000,000 in the aggregate. Covered personnel include all the staff physicians at FirstSolutions' two medical clinics and the eight pharmacists at their three clinic pharmacies. The coverage is on a claims-made basis. Losses on medical malpractice claims are estimated based on claims in excess of per-claim or aggregate coverage and claims incurred but not reported during the claim year. Management estimates there were no losses on medical malpractice claims in excess of insurance coverage for 2011 and 2010. Tail coverage for the physicians and pharmacists is being provided by the purchaser of the clinics and pharmacies as part of the purchase agreement.

FirstSolutions is subject to various other legal and governmental proceedings involving routine litigation incidental to the business. The consequences of the above-referenced litigation and regulatory action are not totally determinable at this time but, in the opinion of management of FirstSolutions, after consulting with legal counsel, any ultimate liability in excess of reserves currently recorded is not expected to have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of FirstSolutions.

#### Note 5. Leases

FirstSolutions leases office space under an operating lease, which expires in 2012 Rental expense for 2011 was \$268,271 and for 2010 was \$885,952 The future minimum payments under the noncancelable lease is \$113,246

FirstSolutions leases a clinic building to Lake View Memorial Hospital, Inc. (Lake View) under an agreement which expires in July 2012 (see Note 6) Future rental income is \$278,294

#### Note 6. Clinic Building Lease

In July 2008, FirstSolutions sold its Two Harbors clinic practice to Lake View

In connection with the purchase of the clinic practice, Lake View leases a portion of the clinic building, including the common areas, which resulted in lease revenue of \$450,758 and \$399,560 during the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively Additionally, the transaction included a provision whereby Lake View agreed to purchase the Two Harbors clinic building by July 28, 2012 at the fair market value of the property. In no event will the purchase price be lower than \$3,082,500 or higher than \$3,767,500.

FirstSolutions owns property in Two Harbors, Minnesota, which is leased as described in Note 6. The carrying value of the property is shown under rental above. Subsequent to year-end, FirstSolutions sold an office building located in Two Harbors. The value of this property is included in assets Held for Sale.

#### Note 8. Concentrations of Credit Risk

FirstSolutions maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts, which at times may exceed federally insured limits. FirstSolutions has not experienced any losses on such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash.

#### Note 9. Discontinued Operations

FirstSolutions ceased quoting and writing insured policies as a health maintenance organization (HMO) in 2009 Discontinued operations include amounts related to the cessation of this operation. The gross revenue includes final settlements on premiums and claims

In 2010, FirstSolutions ceased operations of the TPU2 Claims Processing Center, which included layoff of the remaining staff. In addition, the Community Nursing Service was sold to an outside entity for approximately \$15,000.

In 2011, FirstSolutions sold its clinics and pharmacies. The total sales price for the transaction was approximately \$2,884,000. The revenues and expenses related to these activities are included in discontinued operations.

FirstSolutions ceased its Health Management line of business as of December 31, 2011 Health management was the provision of care, disease, and utilization management provided remotely by registered nurses on behalf of health plans and TPA companies

#### Note 10. Subsequent Events

In January 2012, FirstSolutions sold an office building located in Two Harbors, Minnesota The sales price was \$403,000 and included the land, building, improvements and miscellaneous equipment and furniture The building had been used for claims processing and had been unused in 2011 and the majority of 2010

As of January 1, 2012, FirstSolutions became First Community Health Foundation. The amended articles of incorporation and bylaws were filed with the State of Minnesota. The purpose of the Foundation will be for charitable, scientific, and educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) including promotion of health and disease prevention, education and coordination of services in medically underserved populations, provide resources for the provision of health services for improving the physical and mental condition of the residents of the region, and actively participate in efforts to identify community needs and opportunities in dealing with chronic disease issues as well as finding a means to address them

The board of directors of FirstSolutions will become the board of directors of the Foundation The Foundation will retain all assets and liabilities of FirstSolutions, except for those transferred to Bridgeview Company
