

# 1. Background, Principles of Consolidation, and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Saint Luke's Health System, Inc (the System) consists of Saint Luke's Hospital of Kansas City (Saint Luke's), Saint Luke's Northland Hospital (North), Saint Luke's South Hospital (South), Saint Luke's East Hospital (East), and their direct and indirect subsidiaries. The corporate entity, Saint Luke's Health System, Inc (the Corporation), contains the System's information technology, finance, marketing, and general management functions. The System and its primary operating entities are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the Code) and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. Certain supporting subsidiaries are subject to federal and state income taxes.

The System's primary business operation includes acute and behavioral health-related services in both hospital and clinic settings. In addition, the System provides home care services and care to the terminally ill and manages properties utilized primarily for physician offices and clinics. Substantially all of the System's expenses relate to providing health care services.

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the following primary operating entities

All significant intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated in the consolidated financial statements

Anderson County, Hedrick, and Wright Memorial facilities are leased from the local community or government, while the System provides for the operations of these facilities. The financial position and results of operations of these facilities are included in the consolidated financial statements and include combined total net assets of \$29.9 million and \$30.0 million as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. These leases are evergreen leases, which require a one-year cancellation notice by either party. Currently, the System has no reason to believe that these arrangements will be terminated.

#### **Accounting Policies**

The System's accounting policies conform to US generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) applicable to health care organizations

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with U S GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period Actual results could differ from those estimates

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with generally a maturity of three months or less when purchased, excluding assets limited as to use by Board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements

#### **Short-Term Investments**

Short-term investments are primarily comprised of cash and cash equivalents, U S government obligations, corporate obligations, and corporate equity securities internally designated as current assets because such amounts are available to meet the System's cash requirements

#### Accounts Receivable

The System provides health care services through inpatient, outpatient, and ambulatory care facilities that provide services in the greater Kansas City metropolitan area and surrounding communities and grants credit to patients, substantially all of whom are local residents. The System generally does not require collateral or other security in extending credit to patients, however, it routinely obtains assignment of (or is otherwise entitled to receive) patients' benefits payable under their health insurance programs, plans, or policies including, but not limited to, Medicare, Medicaid, health maintenance organizations, and commercial insurance policies

Accounts receivable are stated at net realizable value. The allowance for uncollectible accounts is based upon management's assessment of historical and expected net collections, considering business and general economic conditions in its service area, trends in health care coverage, and other collection indicators. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage (including copayment and deductible amounts from patients), the System analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for uncollectible accounts and a provision for bad debts. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, the System records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. Accounts are written off when all reasonable internal and external collection efforts have been performed. These adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis and are adjusted as needed in future periods. Accounts receivable are charged to the allowance for uncollectible accounts when they are deemed uncollectible

The allowance for uncollectible accounts as a percentage of accounts receivable decreased from 17% at December 31, 2010 to 12% at December 31, 2011, primarily due to an increase in accounts qualifying for financial assistance

#### **Inventories**

Inventories consist primarily of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals and are stated at the lower of actual cost, generally on the first-in, first-out basis, or market

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment are recorded at cost or, if donated, at fair value at the date of receipt Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows

Land improvement	8 to 20 years

Leasehold improvements are amortized over the corresponding lease, and such amortization is included in depreciation expense

#### **Capitalized Interest**

Interest cost incurred on tax-exempt borrowings designated for construction purposes, along with interest earned on such borrowed funds, is capitalized over the duration of the related construction projects Imputed interest cost incurred on construction financed through internally generated funds or other borrowings is capitalized over the duration of the related construction projects when the project is material in cost and time Capitalized interest is subsequently amortized over the lives of the related assets

#### **Asset Impairment**

The System considers whether indicators of impairment are present and performs the necessary test to determine if the carrying value of an asset is appropriate Impairment write-downs are recognized in operating income at the time the impairment is identified, except for any alternative investment impairments, which are recognized in investment income (loss), net

#### Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under self-insurance arrangements and indenture agreements and restricted donations. Investments in equity and debt securities are measured at fair value

The System considers its investment securities as trading securities Investment income (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) from trading investments is recorded as other income (loss), which is included in excess of revenues over expenses, unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law or derived from assets held by trustee under self-insurance arrangements or under indenture agreements Gains and losses with respect to disposition of marketable securities are based on the specific-identification method

Investment income earned by assets held by trustee under self-insurance arrangements and under indenture agreements is reported as other revenue Restricted investment income and net gains or losses on investments of donor-restricted funds are added to or deducted from the appropriate restricted net asset balance

The System also holds investment positions in other trusts, limited liability investment companies, and hedge funds of funds (collectively referred to as investment companies), which are reported using the equity method of accounting based on information provided by the respective investment companies. The values of investments held in investment companies are determined by the investment managers or general partners and may be based on estimates that require varying degrees of judgment and financial data supplied by the underlying investee funds. Generally, the net asset's value reflects net contributions to the investee and an ownership share of realized and unrealized investment income and expenses. The financial statements of the investees are audited annually by independent auditors. Changes in the equity method of investments in the investment companies are recorded in other income (loss)

The System's assets limited as to use are exposed to various kinds and levels of risk Fixed income securities expose the System to interest rate risk, credit risk, and liquidity risk As interest rates change, the current value of many fixed income securities is affected, particularly those with fixed interest rates Credit risk is the risk that the obligor of the security will not fulfill its obligation Liquidity risk is affected by the willingness of market participants to buy and sell given securities

Equity securities expose the System to market risk, performance risk, and liquidity risk Market risk is the risk associated with major movements of the equity market, both international and domestic Performance risk is the risk associated with a company's operating performance Liquidity risk, as previously defined, tends to be higher for international equities and equities related to small capitalized companies

#### **Interest in Net Assets of Foundations**

Saint Luke's Foundation, Inc and the Spelman Medical Foundation (the Foundations) are deemed to be financially interrelated organizations to Saint Luke's, North, South, East, Wright Memorial, and Home Care and Hospice for contributions received by the Foundations for which the donor has either specified a participating entity as the beneficiary or has not granted the Foundations variance power (temporarily or permanently restricted contributions received by the Foundations) Saint Luke's, North, South, Wright Memorial, and Home Care and Hospice record their interest in the net assets of the Foundations in the consolidated balance sheets under the caption interest in net assets of foundations and as a component of temporarily and permanently restricted net assets These net assets held by the Foundations are primarily restricted to support the related hospital's medical and research programs and provide funding for equipment and capital improvements

#### **Deferred Financing Costs**

Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the debt is outstanding using the bonds outstanding method

#### **Derivative Financial Instruments**

As part of its debt management program, the System enters into interest rate swaps. The System recognizes these derivative instruments as either assets or liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets at fair value. The accounting for changes in the fair value (i.e., gains or losses) of a derivative instrument depends on whether it has been designated and qualifies as part of a hedging relationship and, further, on the type of hedging relationship

The System has not designated its derivatives as hedges, and the change in fair value of the interest rate swap contracts is recognized as a component of other income (loss) The System does not have any fair value hedges or hedges of a net investment in foreign operations

#### **Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Assets**

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the System has been limited by donors primarily for patient care, health care education, or property Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the System in perpetuity with the related investment income expendable to support the donor-designated purpose, which is primarily for patient care, health care education, or property

#### Contributions, Bequests, and Pledges

Pledges, less an allowance for uncollectible amounts, are recorded as receivables in the year made Restricted contributions and bequests are reported as additions to the appropriate restricted net asset category Resources restricted by donors for plant replacement and expansion are added to unrestricted net assets to the extent expended within the period Resources restricted by donors and grantors for specific operating purposes are reported in other revenue to the extent used within the period

#### **Performance Indicator**

The System's performance indicator is excess of revenues over expenses, which includes all changes in unrestricted net assets other than the contribution of property, equipment, and other, pension-related charges other than net periodic pension costs, and other changes in net assets

#### **Operating and Other Income (Loss)**

The System's primary mission is to meet the health care needs in its service areas through a broad range of general and specialized health care services, including inpatient acute care, outpatient services, physician services, and other health care services. Activities directly associated with the furtherance of this purpose are considered to be operating activities. Substantially all expenses are related to providing health care services to the community. Other activities that result in gains or losses peripheral to the System's primary mission are considered to be other income (loss). Other income (loss) activities include investment income (loss), excluding assets held by trustee under self-insurance arrangements and indentured agreements, income or loss on investment in affiliates, gain or loss on interest rate swaps, and loss on bond refunding and defeasance.

#### Reclassifications

Certain balances in the 2010 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation. The effect of such reclassifications did not change total net assets or excess of revenues over expenses

#### **Adoption of Accounting Pronouncements**

In July 2011, the System adopted the authoritative guidance issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) requiring the reclassification of the provision for uncollectible accounts associated with patient revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue Additionally, the guidance requires enhanced disclosure about policies for recognizing revenue, assessing uncollectible accounts, and qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for uncollectible accounts. The System opted to early adopt this guidance in 2011

On January 1, 2011, the System adopted the authoritative guidance issued by the FASB to clarify for health care entities that estimated insurance recoveries should not be netted against related claim liabilities. Additionally, the amount of the claim liability should be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. Adoption of the guidance did not have a material impact on the System's consolidated financial statements.

On January 1, 2011, the System adopted the authoritative guidance issued by the FASB requiring that cost be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes and the method used to identify the direct and indirect costs of providing charity care also be disclosed Other than requiring additional disclosures, adoption of this new guidance did not have a material impact on the System's consolidated financial statements

#### **Recent Accounting Guidance Not Yet Adopted**

In May 2011, the FASB issued guidance to amend disclosure requirements related to fair value measurement. The guidance expands disclosures for Level 3 fair value measurements, addresses nonfinancial assets' highest and best use, and permits fair value adjustments for assets and liabilities with offsetting risks. The guidance is effective for the System with the reporting period beginning January 1, 2012. Other than requiring additional disclosures, adoption of this new guidance will not have a material impact on the System's consolidated financial statements.

## Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

#### 2. Charity Care

The System is dedicated to providing both services and leadership in caring for the needy and accepts all patients regardless of their ability to pay. The System provides such care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Since the System does not attempt to collect amounts initially determined to qualify as charity care, such charges are not included in net patient service revenue. The cost incurred in providing these services of \$34.1 million and \$27.7 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively, is included in the System's operating expenses and is estimated using the 2010 overall Medicare cost to charge ratio. In addition, the System provides care for medically indigent patients covered under the Medicaid welfare program at rates substantially below standard charges.

The System has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the System at amounts different from its established rates Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments For uninsured patients who do not qualify for charity care, the System recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before bad debt), is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts for patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments due to future audits, reviews, and investigations Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and investigations

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term Noncompliance with Medicare and Medicaid laws and regulations can make the System subject to significant regulatory action, including substantial fines and penalties, as well as exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs The System's net patient service revenue increased by approximately \$0.7 million and \$3.4 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively, due to revised estimates consisting primarily of retroactive third-party adjustments for years that are subject to audits, reviews, and investigations

Private equity funds are generally not available to be redeemed except as distributed by the fund As of December 31, 2011, the System had committed \$14.9 million to additional investments in private equity funds. The majority of the hedge funds of funds held are redeemable on a quarterly basis with 60 days' notice. The System requested full redemption, effective March 31, 2009, of its investment in a hedge funds of funds with a fair value of \$12.7 million. Redemptions were received during 2010 and 2011 with a remaining fair value of \$1.8 million at December 31, 2011. Another hedge funds of funds with a fair value of \$0.5 million at December 31, 2011, has been requested for a full redemption in 2011, which is expected to be redeemed fully in July 2012.

The Master Trust Indenture (the MTI) dated as of December 1, 1996, with subsequent amendments, sets forth the covenants relating to and provides the terms and conditions upon which borrowings under the MTI may be issued and secured The MTI provides that the borrowings under the MTI are the joint and several obligations of each of the members of the Obligated Group Currently, the Corporation, Saint Luke's, North, South, and East are members of the Obligated Group and comply with covenants, undertakings, stipulations, and provisions contained in the MTI The tax-exempt revenue bonds have been issued through Missouri Health & Educational Facilities Authority, the proceeds of which were used by the Corporation primarily to finance capital projects and to refinance existing indebtedness

The obligation of the Corporation to make payments on the indebtedness under the MTI and any additional notes is a general obligation of the Obligated Group and any future members of the Obligated Group, which is not secured by a pledge or mortgage of, or security interest in, any assets of the Obligated Group or any future members of the Obligated Group Nonetheless, the MTI imposes certain restrictions on the actions of the members of the Obligated Group for the benefit of all holders of notes issued under the MTI Such terms include, among others, restrictions on liens on the property of the members of the Obligated Group, restrictions on the incurrence of additional indebtedness, maintenance of certain debt coverage and liquidity ratios, and provisions governing the transfer of the property of the members of the Obligated Group

During 2010, the Corporation issued series 2010A bonds in the amount of \$1000 million at fixed annual rates ranging from 2 00% to 5 25%. The proceeds of the series 2010A bonds were used for the payment of certain capital expenditures and to refund series 1996A, B, and P bonds (\$427 million). A loss on bond defeasance of \$877 thousand was recorded in 2010 in other income (loss) related to the refunding

The Corporation's unsecured variable rate debt is variable rate demand bonds. These bonds, while subject to long-term amortization periods, may be put to the Corporation at the option of bondholders in connection with certain remarketing dates. The Corporation maintains an irrevocable letter of credit in the event of a failed remarketing for its variable rate debt, which expires in October 2014. If the bonds were not remarketed, the first installment on the term loans would be payable one year after the term loan date, and such bonds are classified as long-term debt in the consolidated balance sheets. The letter of credit has additional financial covenants required of the System.

#### **Interest Rate Swap Agreements**

The System is a party to multiple interest rate swap contracts that effectively convert various variable rate demand bonds to fixed rates. Interest rate swap contracts between the System and a third party (counterparty) provide for the periodic exchange of payments between the parties based on changes in a defined index and a fixed rate and include counterparty credit risk, which is the risk that contractual obligations of the counterparties will not be fulfilled. Concentrations of credit risk relate to groups of counterparties that have similar economic or industry characteristics, which would cause their ability to meet contractual obligations to be similarly affected by changes in economic or other conditions. Counterparty credit risk is managed by requiring high credit standards for the System's counterparties. The counterparties to the interest rate swap contracts are financial institutions that carry investment-grade credit ratings. The interest rate swap contracts contain collateral provisions applicable to both parties to mitigate credit risk. There was no collateral posted at December 31, 2011 or 2010. The System does not anticipate nonperformance by its counterparties.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date The Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures Topic of the FASB's Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurement)

Certain of the System's financial assets and financial liabilities are measured at fair value on a recurring basis, including money market, fixed income and equity instruments, and interest rate swap contracts. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy and a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value are as follows.

Level 1 – Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities as of the reporting date Level 1 primarily consists of financial instruments such as money market securities and listed equities

Level 2 – Pricing inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are either directly observable or that can be derived or supported from observable data as of the reporting date Instruments in this category include certain U S government agency and sponsored entity debt securities and interest rate swap contracts depending on the significance of the credit value adjustment

Level 3 – Pricing inputs include those that are significant to the fair value of the financial asset or financial liability and are not observable from objective sources. In evaluating the significance of inputs, the System generally classifies assets or liabilities as Level 3 when their fair value is determined using unobservable inputs that individually, or when aggregated with other unobservable inputs, represent more than 10% of the fair value of the assets or liabilities. These inputs may be used with internally developed methodologies that result in management's best estimate of fair value. Instruments in this category include interest rate swap contracts depending on the significance of the credit value adjustment. During 2011, the level of the fair value hierarchy for interest rate swaps was changed from Level 2 to Level 3 because the credit value adjustment increased to more than 10% of the fair value of the swaps

Certain of the System's alternative investments are primarily made through LLCs and LLPs, which provide the System with a proportionate share of the investment gains (losses) The System accounts for its ownership in the LLCs and LLPs under the equity method

The fair values of the securities included in Level 1 were determined through quoted market prices. The fair values of Level 2 securities (primarily fixed income securities) were determined through evaluated bid prices based on recent trading activity and other relevant information, including market interest rate curves and referenced credit spreads, and estimated prepayment rates, where applicable, are used for valuation purposes as provided by third-party pricing services where quoted market values are not available. Level 2 investments include common trust fixed income funds, common trust equity funds, and U.S. government and agency securities. The fair values of the interest rate swap contracts are determined based on the present value of expected future cash flows using discount rates appropriate with the risks involved and are included in Level 2 or Level 3 depending on the significance of the credit value adjustment Due to the volatility of the capital markets, there is a reasonable possibility of significant changes in fair value and additional gains (losses) in the near term subsequent to December 31, 2011

The carrying amounts reported in the consolidated balance sheets for cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, other current assets, and current liabilities are reasonable estimates of their fair value due to the short-term nature of these financial instruments. The fair value of the System's fixed-rate bonds are based on quoted market prices for the same or similar issues and approximate \$403.5 million and \$363.3 million as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The carrying amount of the System's fixed-rate bonds as recorded in the System's consolidated balance sheets was \$383.7 million and \$392.3 million as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The fair value of the System's variable rate bonds approximates the carrying amount of \$140.0 million as of December 31, 2011 and 2010.

#### 8. Retirement Plans

The System has a defined benefit pension plan (the Plan) covering substantially all employees who have attained age 21 with at least one year of service Plan benefits are based on years of service and the employees' compensation. The Plan provides for payments commencing at age 65, with certain provisions for early retirement. The System's policy is to make annual contributions to the Plan equal to the amounts accrued for pension liability within the range permitted. In September 2010, the System froze the Plan As a result of this change, the System recognized \$0.8 million of curtailment income in 2010.

The System employs a total return investment approach, whereby a mix of marketable equity securities, common trust fixed income funds, common trust equity funds, and alternative investments are used to estimate a long-term return of plan assets for a prudent level of risk The System's goal is to manage the duration of both assets and liabilities to meet changes in the liabilities Risk tolerance is therefore established through careful consideration of plan liabilities and plan-funded status

The System determines an expected long-term rate of return for plan assets in consultation with its external investment advisor. The System reviews historical market performance by investment asset class along with current economic outlooks for asset class performance in order to estimate its long-term rate of return assumption. Peer data and historical returns are reviewed to check for reasonableness.

The System participates in a 401(a) defined contribution retirement plan that covers substantially all employees meeting the eligibility requirements set forth under this plan. The System contributes an amount based on a percentage for eligible employees who contribute to the tax-deferred 403(b) plan or the 401(k) savings plan. In 2011, the System converted to a defined contribution plan with an enhanced match. The System recorded expenses of \$21.4 million and \$2.3 million related to these plans during 2011 and 2010, respectively, which are included in employee benefits expense in the consolidated statements of operations.

The System maintains a Supplemental Executive Retirement Plan (SERP) with similar assumptions to the System's cash balance defined benefit plan As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the SERP's plan assets were \$4.8 million and \$10.1 million, respectively, and the SERP's benefit obligation was \$6.1 million and \$10.5 million, respectively. The System recorded expense of \$0.3 million and \$0.7 million related to the SERP during 2011 and 2010, respectively. Changes in plan assets and benefit obligations included in unrestricted net assets during 2011 and 2010 related to the SERP resulted in an actuarial (loss) gain of \$(0.6 million) and \$0.2 million, respectively.

#### 9. Insurance and Self-Insured Risks

The System provides for medical malpractice and general liability exposure through a combination of self-insurance and third-party insurance carriers

Professional and general liability coverage for Saint Luke's, North, East, and Saint Luke's Cancer Institute is provided through the Saint Luke's Hospital Trust (the Trust), a revocable trust fund Through the Trust, these entities maintain a self-insured retention of \$3 million per occurrence and \$9 million in annual aggregate Contributions to the Trust are made based on funding levels recommended by an independent actuary

For entities participating in the Trust, expense is based on paid claims and the actuary's discounted estimate of the eventual cost of claim settlements, including estimates for claims that may have occurred during the periods but were not yet identified and reported, and the probable timing of the payment of these claims Accrued malpractice losses were discounted at an annual rate of 4 9% in 2011 and 2010

South established a trust (the SLS Trust) to self-insure professional liability risk beginning on January 1, 2005 Cushing established a trust (the CMH Trust) to self-insure professional liability risk beginning on April 1, 2007 The coverage provided by both the SLS Trust and the CMH Trust is \$200,000 per claim and \$600,000 in the aggregate

The Kansas Health Care Stabilization Fund provides coverage in the amount of \$800,000 per claim and \$2.4 million in the aggregate Claims-made excess coverage, as discussed below, is provided by a third-party insurance company along with the other System entities Prior acts coverage also is provided through each trust. The funding contributions to each trust were based on recommendations from an independent actuary. South and Cushing continue to insure general liability exposure through an insurance policy purchased from a third-party insurer.

Anderson County, Wright Memorial, Hedrick, and Crittenton obtain both general and professional liability coverage from a third-party insurer

#### 9. Insurance and Self-Insured Risks (continued)

Effective August 1, 2003, the System established the RRG to provide coverage to employed physicians and related staff. The RRG has the capacity to insure physicians who are not employed by the System, and it currently insures one independent group. The RRG, which is domiciled in South Carolina, is wholly owned by the System and provides the first layer of coverage for such employed physicians up to a limit of \$250,000 per claim in Missouri and \$200,000 per claim in Kansas per physician. Coverage above those levels, up to \$1 million per claim and \$3 million annual aggregate and excess coverage, is provided by third-party insurers or the Kansas Health Care Stabilization Fund, as applicable. Certain of these policies are on a retrospective-rated premium basis, and premiums are accrued based on the ultimate cost of the experience to date of the provider. For premium assessment purposes, these participating entities are subject to the experience of a group of providers. Adjustments of estimated actual expenses, if any, are included in the period that such adjustments are determined. The RRG's expense is determined in a manner similar to Saint Luke's self-insured expense.

The System carries excess insurance coverage for general and professional liability exposures that is purchased from a third-party insurer A modified claims-made excess policy with a built-in seven-year tail in the amount of \$25 million provides excess coverage for the Trust exposures only An additional claims-made policy in the amount of \$25 million provides excess coverage over the primary layers for all the other entities An additional layer of excess coverage in the amount of \$25 million is purchased to cover all of the System's entities for a total available excess coverage of \$50 million

In the event the claims-made policies are not renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance coverage, claims based on occurrences during their term, but reported subsequently, will be uninsured Management is currently not aware of any incidents that would result in losses, which could have a material adverse impact on the accompanying consolidated financial statements

The System similarly provides for health insurance and workers' compensation coverage through a combination of self-insurance and third-party insurers. Liabilities have been established for known claims and estimated claims, which have been incurred but not reported

#### 10. Transactions With Related Party

Saint Luke's is a party to a financial guarantee with risk not reflected on the consolidated balance sheets. That arrangement is with Kansas City Orthopedic Institute, a related party. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the guaranteed liability totaled \$0.2 million and \$0.4 million, respectively. Saint Luke's believes the risk of loss associated with this guarantee to be minimal.

The System has adopted the provisions of ASC Topic 460 (formerly FSP FIN 45), which specifically includes minimum revenue guarantees granted to a business or its owners within its scope. The System enters into agreements with nonemployed physicians that include minimum revenue guarantees for up to 36 months. These guarantees were \$13.0 million and \$21.1 million as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and are included in current and noncurrent liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets as appropriate. The net maximum amount of future payments that the System could be required to make under these guarantees is \$13.0 million and \$21.1 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively
