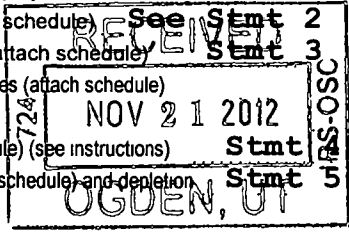

## SUMMARY OF 2011 PROJECTS

### JANUARY

***Space, Science and Security—The Role of Regional Expert Discussions, New Delhi, India conference***—This conference began as a joint SWF-SIPRI project intended to ascertain the influences on developing India's increasingly militarized space program. The event started a dialogue within India on space and security, something that had not previously occurred. The conference allowed SWF a foray into Indian policy circles and demonstrated that we are one of the top space policy organizations for Indians to go to for more about international trends in space security. SWF is also becoming the go-to organization within DC for information on India. (*Space Sustainability*)

***Supporting The Space Show***—SWF continued to support the One Giant Leap Foundation, with the 2011 funds going entirely towards equipment, software, and time to give *The Space Show* the capability to do live streaming audio and video webinars. David Livingston completed three tests of the system with multiple guests and produced archived video. This project increased SWF's name recognition, supported a key information outlet on space issues, and provided some useful information on creating multimedia content. SWF will continue to support The Space Show in 2012 and will focus efforts on developing two webinars for broadcast. (*Education and Outreach*)

### FEBRUARY

***Scientific and Technical Subcommittee of the United Nations Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space (UN COPUOS)***—Attended and participated in the 48<sup>th</sup> Session of the Scientific and Technical Subcommittee of UN COPUOS. SWF has found the UN COPUOS meetings to be invaluable for establishing relationships with key States, UN entities, and other NGOs to further our work in key focus areas. Ray Williamson gave a statement on SWF's 2010 and 2011 activities during the general exchange of views agenda item. Brian Weeden made a technical presentation on Galaxy 15 during the agenda item on the long-term sustainability of space. Brian also worked with Tom Jones from the Association of Space Explorers (ASE) on a technical presentation about SWF's October 2010 NEO MPOG Workshop, which Mr. Jones presented during the NEO agenda item. Ray, Brian and Agnieszka Lukaszczyk also participated in the discussions of the International Committee on GNSS (ICG) and the working groups on NEOs and the Long-Term Sustainability of Space. (*Space Sustainability, Space Policy and Law, Human and Environmental Security, Planetary Defense*)

***Technical research and publications in support of SSA—Paul Cefola***—Throughout 2011, SWF sponsored Paul Cefola to conduct research and write and present papers, and attend technical conferences in support of the Open Source Software for SSA (OS4A) project. These technical conferences were selected in coordination with the Project Manager, Brian Weeden, for their relevance to the 2011 goals for the OS4A project. Paul Cefola's work in 2011 increased awareness of the shortcoming of current SSA capabilities, developing a roadmap for the OS4A project, and creating interest in it within the technical community, (*Space Sustainability*)

## MARCH

***Space Situational Awareness Website Development***—The purpose of this project is to develop and launch a website that: increases awareness of the ground and space-based sensors around the world that could be used for space situational awareness (SSA); invites participation by the global community of experts to validate, add, and export data on global SSA sensors; and enables analysis of potential sensor combinations based on that data. This project is aimed at communicating the role that non-traditional sensors (especially those that are commercial or scientific) can play in contributing to SSA and in highlighting the importance of global participation and cooperation. The website is scheduled to launch in 2012. (*Space Sustainability*)

***International Security Brainstorming Workshop, Brussels (for internal discussion only)***—This all-day brainstorming meeting was intended to foster open, creative, and frank discussions on how to address space and security issues and how to promote international security in the realm of outer space. Specifically, this event was designed to bring in several key space and international security thinkers to help SWF in shaping its future engagement in this area. The discussion at the meeting confirmed the SWF opinion that there is a significant divide between the international security community and the space community. There was consensus on the need for a glossary/definitions list. Overall, the best part to come out of the meeting was the affirmation that SWF is a leader on space-related international security issues relating to space. (*Space Sustainability*)

***Conference on the Potential for Verification of Compliance with Space Treaties***— This workshop was meant to inform decision-makers from national defense ministries, foreign ministries, academia, and international organizations, from the U.S. and Europe primarily but also from other key spacefaring nations, of: what verification would look like in terms of key space issues (debris, SSA, space environment); the political and technical issues involved with pursuing an effective verification regime for space security/sustainability; current proposals on the table for pursuing such a regime; and how to push this important issue forward. This workshop was a step in the right direction – it was in many ways an exploratory meeting designed to get the topic of verification internationalized outside of U.S. circles. Additionally, it was designed to carry out a high level event in Brussels to support the awareness of our European office. (*Space Sustainability*)

***Imaging Notes***—This project continues the partnership started in 2008 with Blueline Publishing to create the quarterly release of *Imaging Notes*, which presents SWF material on the use of space systems for environmental and human security. Each issue contains an SWF column written by Ray Williamson or Leonard David. Ray is also the editor. Most of the magazine's funding comes from advertising; SWF provides the balance of the magazine's income. SWF will continue to support Blueline Publishing in 2012 and is in discussion to revise and evolve the publication toward a more space sustainability-based focus. (*Human and Environmental Security*)

## APRIL

***UN COPUOS***—Legal Subcommittee—The second in the series of three annual meetings where SWF has permanent observer status. SWF attends this subcommittee meeting to keep abreast of legal issues under discussion there, to continue our representation at COPUOS, and to continue

consolidating our position as a reliable and engaged permanent observer on space law issues. Ben Baseley-Walker presented the SWF statement on our work on space law specifically and more generally on emerging legal norms. (*Space Policy and Law*)

**UNIDIR Annual Space Security Conference: Laying the Groundwork – From TCBMs to Verification**—UNIDIR’s 2011 Space Security conference was co-hosted by SWF with the support of the governments of the United States, Canada, Russia and China. As part of the UNIDIR space security annual series that SWF has supported for several years, the 2011 conference was designed: to improve international understanding and dialog on transparency and confidence-building measures (TCBMs), to focus on the increased willingness of the U.S. to engage on this topic, as support to the upcoming Group of Governmental Experts (GGE) on space security; and to discuss key political hurdles in moving forward the debate on international security and space, particularly related to verification. The conference placed an emphasis on building foundations together, which has been hindered by a lack of shared understanding of the foundations that underpin space security discussions. This event tied into the discussions held in Brussels about the need for a common lexicon. (*Space Sustainability*)

**Space Security Index**—The Space Security Index is an annual publication that captures all the global events from the past year and assesses their impact on space security. It has become the global reference on this subject. Project Ploughshares oversees creation of the SSI and manages the researchers (who are mostly graduate students from The George Washington and McGill Universities). This year, Brian Weeden continued as a researcher and author of two chapters of the report. In an effort to improve the accuracy and broad utility of the report, SWF convinced the SSI Governance Group, of which SWF is a member, to renew its focus on quality issues and to solicit ideas for a possible new structure for the report, which has remained nearly the same since inception, despite a number of changes in the context of and approach to outer space. SWF also spearheaded the practice of moving back preparation of the report’s executive summary for publication and delivery to the annual June meeting of COPUOS. The Executive Summary was also released in June in DC; the full report was released in August and a second briefing was held in Brussels in November. (*Space Sustainability*)

**Community Remote Sensing Legal Paper – Annelie Schoenmaker**—Soon after SWF began to examine the potential for the new field of community remote sensing to contribute to better governance of satellite-provided information in support of human and environmental security, we became aware that active pursuit of these methods raised a number of legal issues for practitioners. Accordingly, we contracted with Annelie Schoenmaker to prepare a paper examining these issues in detail. That paper is available on the SWF website. She has offered to write a less technical version for the readers of *Imaging Notes*, with whom SWF partners. (*Human and Environmental Security*)

## MAY

**International Academy of Astronautics Planetary Defense Conference, Bucharest**—SWF provided support for this conference, whose organizing committee was led by SWF Advisory Committee Members Bill Ailor and Richard Tremayne-Smith. Since 2004, the Planetary Defense Conference has been the premier event that brings together experts to discuss the latest developments in detection and warning, characterization, mission planning, and deflection technologies. Brian Weeden co-chaired a session on legal and policy frameworks. (*Planetary Defense*)

**Space Generation Congress, Cape Town, South Africa**—SWF funding supported travel for several SGC participants and a Working Group on Space for Society. Agnieszka Lukaszczyk served as the Subject Matter Expert and Ray Williamson presented a lecture on “21<sup>st</sup> Century Challenges on Bringing Space Benefits to People.” Tiffany Chow took part as a member of SGAC. (*Education and Outreach*)

**UN - IAF Workshop on Space for Human and Environmental Security, Cape Town, South Africa**—SWF funding supported travel for key participants. Ray Williamson attended and made a presentation, “Data, Information and the Challenge of Reaching the End User.” (*Space Policy and Law*)

## OCTOBER

**International Astronautical Congress 2011—travel support and event**—Tiffany Chow, Agnieszka Lukaszczyk, Brian Weeden and Ray Williamson presented papers in the technical sessions and took part in the Technical Committee on Space Security and its Subcommittee on Dual Use Technologies. SWF papers from the Session on Space Sustainability, Chaired by Dr. Peter Martinez and Agnieszka Lukaszczyk, will be published next year in *Space Policy*. The journal will also include a summary of the session and the summary of a panel discussion on space sustainability led by Peter Martinez. Travel support to IAC was provided for Joyetta Chatterjee from McGill and to Emmanuelle David and Alanna Krolikowski to provide further data for a research paper. (*Space Sustainability, Education and Outreach*)

**International Manfred Lachs Space Law Moot Court Competition**—SWF supported the Association of U.S. Members of the International Institute of Space Law (AUSMIISL) to organize the North American portion of the Manfred Lachs Space Law Moot Court Competition. SWF then provided travel funding support to send the winning team from Florida State University to the International Astronautical Congress in Cape Town, South Africa to participate in the international competition. The team from Florida State University won this year’s competition. (*Education and Outreach*)

**United Nations Institute for Disarmament Research (UNIDIR) Hi-tech Threats Study**—Working with UNIDIR, SWF has begun this project on emerging hi-tech threats to global stability working on space and cyber security to use an established network of experts to provide education on the highly complex and fast-moving topics of space and cyber security. By developing insightful and timely analyses of related international initiatives; and by facilitating discussion at the national and international level, this project aims to implement a dynamic, innovative approach to addressing emerging questions that will shape the next decade of international security discussions. On-going through March 2012. (*Space Policy and Law*)

**2011 Beijing Space Sustainability Conference, Beihang University Project**—This is a 3-year partnership with a group of faculty and graduate students at Beihang University in Beijing to help foster Chinese technical expertise at the University level in the areas of active debris
