(1) Description of Organization

(a) Corporate Organization

Rockingham Memorial Hospital (the Hospital) is a nonstock, nonprofit, 501(c)(3) tax-exempt corporation that provides acute care and other healthcare services to residents of Harrisonburg, Virginia and the surrounding area

(b) Principles of Consolidation

The Hospital is affiliated with its subsidiaries through the legal relationship of sole "member" or sole "stockholder" As sole member/stockholder, the Hospital has those rights and powers prescribed by law and provided in the subsidiaries Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the following subsidiaries

- Valley Wellness Center, Inc d/b/a RMH Wellness Center is a Virginia nonprofit corporation that provides preventative healthcare and rehabilitation services at its facilities in Harrisonburg, Virginia
- Rockingham Health Services, Inc., a taxable entity

(c) Business Combination

On May 1, 2011, Sentara Healthcare (Sentara) replaced Rockingham Health Care. Inc. as the sole member and parent of the Hospital Simultaneously, the Hospital replaced Rockingham Health Care. Inc. as the sole member and parent of RMH Wellness Center and Rockingham Health Services Rockingham Health Care remains a separate, unaffiliated legal entity

Pursuant to the business combination agreement. Sentara committed to expend a total investment of \$269,000 over a 20-year period to support expansion and enhancement of medical services in Harrisonburg and the surrounding area. This amount will be expended pursuant to plans and budgets approved by the Hospital's Board of Directors and Sentara.

(2) Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded as earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding amounts held in investments and assets whose use is limited

(c) Accounts Receivable and Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts

Accounts receivable are reported at net realizable value Balances not paid within 30 days are considered past due Balances are considered delinquent when they are outstanding for 120 days with no activity at which time the balances are transferred to a collection agency and the balance is moved to the allowance for uncollectible accounts Balances are written off after all reasonable collection efforts have been made. The allowance for uncollectible accounts is based on historical bad debt experience and management's evaluation of the components of accounts receivable.

(d) Investments and Assets Whose Use is Limited

Investments in readily marketable debt and equity securities are carried at fair value All investments, except for the portion required for payment of current liabilities, are classified as noncurrent assets

Readily marketable investments are deemed to be trading securities, therefore, investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses) is included in nonoperating gains (losses), net, unless restricted as to use by donor or law. Cost used in the determination of gains on sales of investments is based on the average cost of the investment sold.

The Hospital invests in alternative investments in the form of limited liability companies or partnerships. Alternative investments are accounted for under the equity method based on the Hospital's interest in their underlying net assets. Alternative investments are typically not readily marketable, accordingly, their fair value may be different from their carrying value and that difference could be material. The Hospital's share of alternative investment gains and losses is included in nonoperating gains (losses), net Alternative investments are included in investments and assets whose use is limited in the consolidated balance sheet. Investments recorded under the equity method are evaluated for impairment when events or changes in circumstances are identified that may have a significant adverse effect on the fair value of the investment. No impairment was recorded on equity method investments for the year ended December 31, 2011.

The Hospital's investments are exposed to several risks, including interest rate, currency, market and credit risks. It is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term due to these risks and such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the consolidated financial statements.

Assets whose use is limited include assets held by trustees under the 2006 bond indenture agreement for payment of costs incurred for construction of the new hospital facility and for bond principal and interest. Assets whose use is limited also includes assets designated by the Board of Directors to function as an endowment fund, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use as deemed appropriate, and as consistent with donor intent.

(e) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Estimated useful lives range from 5 to 20 years on major movable equipment and 10 to 40 years on buildings, fixed equipment and improvements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. Gains or losses on disposal of property, plant and equipment are included in operating income. Repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

(f) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The Hospital assesses long-lived assets for impairment by determining whether their carrying value can be recovered through the undiscounted future operating cash flows generated by the assets. The amount of impairment, if any, is measured by comparison of the fair value of the assets to their carrying value. Fair value is determined using market data or projected discounted future operating cash flows using a discount rate reflecting the Hospital's weighted average cost of capital.

(g) Derivative Financial Instruments

The Hospital recognizes the fair value of derivative financial instruments as assets or liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet. The Hospital has elected not to use hedge accounting with respect to any of its derivative financial instruments. Accordingly, the change in fair value of these instruments is included in nonoperating income, net. Net cash settlement amounts are included in interest expense.

(h) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received.

Net assets and their related changes are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose, or which have not yet been appropriated for expenditure. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity. Related income is classified as temporarily restricted until expended. Refer to note 5 for discussion of the Hospital's endowment fund spending and investment policies. Net assets have been primarily restricted for the provision of healthcare services.

(i) Nonoperating Gains (Losses), Net and Excess of Revenues over Expenses

Activities related to the provision of healthcare services are reported as operating revenues and expenses. Activities which result in gains or losses unrelated to the Hospital's primary mission are considered to be nonoperating.

The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues and gains over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include nonperiodic changes in funded status of retirement obligations and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using donor-restricted contributions)

(j) Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as changes to estimates become known and tentative and final settlement adjustments are determined

(k) Charity Care

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, related charges are not reported as revenue.

(1) Income Taxes

Rockingham Memorial Hospital and its subsidiary, the RMH Wellness Center, have been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the Code), and as public charities under Section 509(a) of the Code. The Hospital's subsidiary, Rockingham Health Services. Inc. is a for-profit corporation subject to federal and state income taxes. Federal and state income tax returns subsequent to 2007 are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service and state taxing authorities.

(m) Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with U S generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include valuation allowances for receivables, recoverability of long-lived assets, self-insurance accruals, third-party payor settlements, and retirement obligations. Actual results could differ from those estimates

(n) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measuring date Financial Standards Accounting Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, Fair Value, establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to

The pronouncement establishes principles and requirements for how a not-for-profit entity determines whether a combination is a merger or an acquisition, applies the carryover method in accounting for a merger, applies the acquisition method in accounting for an acquisition, including determining which of the combining entities is the acquirer, and determines what information to disclose to enable users of financial statements to evaluate the nature and financial effects of a merger or an acquisition

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payers follows

Medicare Under the Medicare program, the Hospital receives reimbursement under a prospective payment system (PPS) for inpatient services. Under the hospital inpatient PPS, fixed payment amounts per inpatient discharge are established based on the patient's assigned diagnosis related group (DRG). When the estimated cost of treatment for certain patients is higher than the average, providers typically will receive additional "outlier" payments. The majority of outpatient services provided to Medicare beneficiaries are prospectively reimbursed based on service groups called ambulatory payment classifications (APCs). The remainder of outpatient services are paid on a cost basis or based on a fee schedule. The Hospital is paid for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospital has final settled with the Medicare program through the 2006 cost report year.

Medicaid The Medicaid program is administered by the Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) of the Commonwealth of Virginia, pursuant to federal and state laws and regulations DMAS receives funding for program expenditures from both the federal government and the Commonwealth of Virginia Federal or state law or regulations may affect limits on Medicaid payment. The majority of Medicaid recipients in the Hospital's primary service area are enrolled in health maintenance organizations (HMOs). These HMOs contract with the Medicaid program to provide primary and acute care services to enrolled Medicaid recipients. The Hospital is paid for substantially all services rendered to Medicaid HMO beneficiaries on a prospective payment basis. There are certain Medicaid patients excluded from the HMO program for which the Hospital is reimbursed based on a DRG-based prospective payment system, which is subject to certain limitations and possible retroactive adjustment. The Hospital has final settled with the Medicaid program through the 2010 cost report year.

Anthem Inpatient services rendered to Anthem subscribers are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per discharge Outpatient services are either reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per test or procedure or percentage of charge. The prospectively determined rates are not subject to retroactive adjustment.

In addition to Medicare, Medicaid, and Anthem discussed above, the Hospital also provides services to beneficiaries of numerous other third-party payors. These payors pay based on negotiated contractual rates which include prospectively determined rates per discharge and discounts from established charges.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 34% and 5%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended December 31, 2011 Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. In 2011, the effect of these settlement adjustments was to increase net patient service revenue by approximately \$1,046.

Due to the nature of the governmental cost report settlement process, the complexities of governmental and nongovernmental patient billing and other financial statement exposures that are inherent in the provision

of healthcare services, the Hospital has established financial accounting and reporting policies that formally govern the establishment of associated liability estimates beyond those related to specifically identifiable events. The establishment of related liabilities is based on a number of factors, including net patient service revenue volumes. The Hospital believes that such policy properly provides for the Hospital's routine and nonroutine exposures consistent with industry accounting principles and practices. These estimated liabilities are included in other long-term liabilities on the consolidated balance sheet in the amount of \$11,584 as of December 31, 2011.

Wellington Trust Company This category consists of investment in a privately traded fund. This fund primarily invests in a well-diversified portfolio of publicly traded securities. Austin Capital Safe Harbor This category includes investments in hedge funds with diversified investment and market strategies. The funds in this category utilize long-short strategies, for both equity and fixed income positions. The fair values of the investment in this category have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investments. The Hospital can redeem funds on a quarterly basis with a 65-day notice.

K2 Highland Overseas This category includes investment in a number of funds to provide a well-diversified portfolio of low correlating market strategies with rigorous attendant risk controls. The fair values of the investment in this category have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investments RMH can redeem funds on a quarterly basis with a 91-day notice.

UBS Trumbull Property Income Fund This category includes investments in real estate both in the form of direct ownership of real estate or through other real estate funds. This category seeks to provide a combination of a fixed return and participation in cash flows from the properties as well as a participation in gains from sales and refinancing. The fair values of the investment in this category have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investments. RMH can redeem funds on a quarterly basis with a 60-day notice.

Silver Creek Low Volatility Strategies This category includes investments in low volatility hedge fund of funds and special opportunity private equity portfolios. The fair values of the investment in this category have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investments. The Hospital's investment in this category has surpassed the required lock-up period. However, due to recent market conditions. Silver Creek has published a draw-down schedule under which its investors may redeem funds over the next several years.

AIG Private Equity Portfolio This category includes investments in several AIG Private Equity funds. This category includes investments of approximately 35% in U.S. buy-out companies. 15% in venture capital opportunities. 30% in foreign buy-out and venture capital funds. 10% in secondary market funds and 10% in private companies. These investments cannot be redeemed until the end of the initial investment period, which is scheduled to end in 2012.

CMS Entrepreneurial Real Estate This category includes investments in several real estate funds that invest primarily in U S residential real estate. The fair values of the investment in this category have been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investments. Currently, this fund is in the distribution period, and RMH can expect to continue to receive distributions until the stated end of the fund (including possible extensions)

OCM Principle Opportunities Fund This category includes investments in funds that focus on obtaining equity positions, which provide total ownership, control, or significant influence at attractive prices by taking advantage of market inefficiencies. These investments cannot be redeemed until the end of the initial investment period, which is scheduled to end in 2011.

The Hospital's limited investment companies are reported on the equity method based on the underlying net asset value of the investment. Due to the nature of the underlying investments held, changes in market

Limited investment companies totaling \$31,174 at December 31, 2011 are redeemable at their net asset value under the current terms of the subscription agreements, and therefore, their carrying value approximates their estimated fair value. However, it is possible that these redemption rights may be restricted or eliminated by the funds in accordance with the underlying agreements in the future.

Limited investment companies totaling \$3.538 at December 31, 2011 are not redeemable at net asset value under the terms of the partnership and/or subscription agreements. Although a secondary market exists for these investments, the market is not active and individual transactions are typically not observable. When transactions do occur in this limited secondary market, they may occur at discounts to the reported net asset value. Depending on the nature of the investment and other investment features such as lock-up periods, redemption fees, future funding commitments, etc., such a discount could be significant.

The note receivable from Pleasant Run, LLC bears interest at 6.5% and is expected to be repaid in July 2013. One of the members of Pleasant Run, LLC is also a board member of the Hospital.

Shenandoah Shared Hospital Services, Inc (SSHS) and VaLiance Health, LLC are cooperative hospital service organizations that provide healthcare services to area hospitals. Effective June 7, 2011, the SSHS Board of Directors voted to liquidate the organization due to changing conditions in the healthcare industry. The terms of the plan of liquidation called for SSHS to transfer the majority of its operations and related equipment and other operating assets to the voting members of SSHS at the current book value for these assets. The amount of these transfers reduce the equity of the respective members. Equipment totaling \$3,833 was transferred from SSHS to the Hospital Additionally, during 2011, the Hospital purchased services from SSHS totaling \$8,289. Amounts payable to SSHS totaled approximately \$276 at December 31, 2011.

VHA Mid-Atlantic States. Inc provides group purchasing and other healthcare industry-related services to its member hospitals. Virginia Solution SPC, Ltd. (the Captive) is an insurance captive that underwrites hospital and physician liability and workers compensation policies for its member hospitals. The Hospital has a 17% ownership interest in the Captive.

(a) Hospital Revenue Bonds

In December 2006, the Hospital obtained tax-exempt financing of \$190,000 through the City of Harrisonburg Industrial Development Authority (2006 IDA Bonds) The proceeds were used to fund construction of a new hospital facility

The maturity date of the 2006 IDA Bonds is August 2046. The first principal payment of \$950 was made in August 2011, thereafter, principal payments will be made annually as the underlying bonds reach their maturity dates, with the final principal payment of \$11,670 to be made in August 2046. Under the terms of the related bond agreement, the Hospital has the right beginning in August 2016 to redeem all or a portion of the 2006 IDA Bonds maturing after August 2017.

The 2006 IDA Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's revenues as well as by a security interest in unrestricted current assets, tangible personal property and investment securities held by the Hospital Interest is paid semiannually. The 2006 IDA Bonds carry fixed interest rates from 4.5% to 5.0% with various maturity dates, the weighted average all-in rate is 4.715%. Interest expense on the Series 2006 IDA Bonds was \$9,000 in 2011.

During 2009, the Hospital obtained tax-exempt bond financing of \$30,000 through the City of Harrisonburg Industrial Development Authority (2009 IDA Bonds). The 2009 IDA Bonds carry a variable interest rate (67% of the one-month LIBOR plus 167 basis points). The Hospital entered into an interest rate swap agreement that effectively fixes the rate of the 2009 IDA Bonds at 3 275% for five years through April 2014. The 2009 IDA Bonds have a 30-year amortization schedule with annual payments of \$1,200, beginning in April 2015. The holder of the Series 2009 IDA Bonds. SunTrust Bank (SunTrust), reserves the right to renegotiate the terms of this debt at the end of five years.

The 2009 IDA Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's unrestricted revenues as well as by a security interest in unrestricted current assets, tangible personal property and investment securities held by the Hospital Interest expense on the 2009 bonds was \$953 in 2011

On September 1, 2010, the Hospital obtained tax-exempt bond financing of \$75,000 through the City of Harrisonburg Industrial Development Authority (2010 IDA Bonds) to reimburse the Hospital for building costs paid from operations. The bonds were issued in three series (2010A, 2010B, and 2010C) each in the authorized principal amount of \$25,000.

The maturity date of the 2010 IDA Bonds is September 15, 2040. The terms of the Series 2010A Bonds require installments of \$1,000 on September 15 of each year commencing on September 15, 2016. The Series 2010B and 2010C Bonds are to be repaid in equal installments commencing on September 15, 2012 through the maturity date of the bonds. Under the terms of the bond agreement, RMH has the right to redeem any or all of the 2010 IDA Bonds at its discretion.

The 2010 IDA Bonds are secured by a pledge of the Hospital's gross revenues as well as by a security interest in unrestricted current assets, tangible personal property and investment securities held by the Hospital. The 2010A Series bonds carry interest at 67% of the one-month LIBOR plus 185 basis points. The 2010B and 2010C Series bonds carry interest at 67% of the one-month LIBOR plus 175 basis points. However, these interest rates will increase over the life of the bond if the Hospital does not reduce its debt on the 2009 or 2010 IDA Bonds by \$30,000 by the second anniversary of the closing date. The maximum rate of interest that could be paid on the 2010 IDA Bonds would be 67% of the one-month LIBOR plus 260 basis points. Interest expense on the Series 2010 IDA bonds was \$970 in 2011.

(b) Note Substitution

In November 2011. Sentara approved an amendment to the Master Trust Indenture including adding the Hospital as an affiliate to the Sentara Obligated Group Sentara and the Hospital subsequently initiated debt restructures whereby the promissory notes securing a portion of the Hospital's debt were substituted with the credit of promissory notes issued under the Sentara Master Trust Indenture. The substitution of the promissory notes transfers the primary obligation under the debt from the Hospital to Sentara. As of December 31, 2011, the Hospital's Series 2010 and 2009A IDA Bonds totaling \$75,000 and \$10,000, respectively, were substituted. These amounts are now reflected as due to Sentara Healthcare in the Hospital's table of long-term debt. Principal and interest repayment terms did not change. The Hospital's Series 2009B-C and Series 2006 IDA Bonds totaling \$20,000 and \$161,746, respectively, were substituted in January of 2012.

As a result of such actions, all obligations issued under the Hospital's Master indenture have been cancelled and discharged

(10) Retirement Obligations

The Hospital maintains a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan currently covering approximately 78% of its employees (the Plan) Benefits are based on employees 'vears of service and compensation

As of January 1, 2008, the employee retirement plan was frozen for purposes of participation by new hires and rehires. In addition, the Plan was amended effective December 31, 2008 to allow participants at December 31, 2008 the choice to remain in the Plan or freeze their benefits as of December 31, 2008 and move to a new defined contribution retirement and savings plan beginning in January 1, 2009. Employees who had not met participation requirements as of December 31, 2008 have been placed in the new plan. Service will continue to accrue for purposes of vesting and early retirement eligibility for participants of the Plan who have elected to freeze their benefits.

The Plan conforms to the requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) The Hospital's funding policy is to contribute amounts to the Plan sufficient to meet the minimum funding requirements of ERISA

The effect of the business combination accounting on amounts included in unrestricted net assets at May 1, 2011 was to reduce previously unrecognized net actuarial losses and prior service cost by \$24.914

For the year ended December 31, 2011, the Hospital recognized a decrease in net assets of \$26,111 related to nonperiodic changes in plan assets and benefit obligations

The estimated actuarial loss for the Plan that will be amortized from accumulated other comprehensive loss into net periodic cost over the next year is \$819. No assets of the Plan are expected to be returned to the Hospital for the year ending December 31, 2012.

(a) Investment Policy and Strategy

The overall financial objectives for the Plans' assets are (1) to provide funds for the timely payment of the Plans' obligations and (2) to produce an investment rate of return that improves the overall funding status of the Plans consistent with the first objective. The investment objective of the Plan seeks to strike a balance between higher returns and controlling funding status volatility. To achieve its objectives, the Plan's assets are allocated based on a target allocation approved by the Hospital's Board of Directors. A registered investment manager has been approved by the Hospital's Board of Directors and reviews fund performance at each quarterly meeting. The Plans' targeted asset allocation by asset category is as follows.

The Hospital has also implemented a 403(b) matching savings plan. The plan is a defined contribution plan and is available to employees with one year of service. The Hospital's expense during 2011 related to this plan totaled \$2,305.

(11) Charity Care and Other Community Benefit

(a) Charity

The Hospital is committed to providing quality healthcare to all, regardless of their ability to pay Patients who meet the criteria of its charity care policy receive services without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The criterion for charity care considers the household income in relation to the federal poverty guidelines, the equity value of real property and/or other assets, and other factors. Under the Hospital's charity program and in accordance with federal requirements, patients who are verified as uninsured receive a discount from the Hospital's full charges. Patients whose income levels and other criteria meet the requirements of the Hospital's charity program receive additional discounts on a sliding scale if adjusted gross income is less than 400% of federal poverty levels. Income and asset information obtained from patient data are used to determine patients' ability to pay. The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it furnishes under its charity care policy.

Due to the complexity of the eligibility process, the Hospital provides eligibility services to patients free of charge to assist in the qualification process. These eligibility services include, but are not limited to, the following

- Financial assistance brochures and other information are posted at each point of service. When patients have questions or concerns, they are encouraged to call a toll-free number to reach customer service representatives during the business day. Financial assistance programs are also published on the Hospital's web site and included on the statements provided to patients.
- The Hospital provides assistance to help patients complete applications for Medicaid or other government payment assistance programs, or apply for care under the Hospital's charity care policy, if applicable
- Any patient, whether covered by insurance or not, may meet with a Hospital representative and receive financial counseling from the Hospital's dedicated financial assistance unit

Costs incurred are estimated based on the cost to charge ratio for the hospital and applied to charity care charges. Since the Hospital does not pursue collections of amounts determined to meet the criterion under the charity care policy, such amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue. The Hospital provides support to other charitable organizations through direct contributions and sponsorships as well as free community health screenings and health education throughout the Hospital's service area. The Hospital also underwrites the costs of training health professionals Additional costs for similar activities carried out across the Hospital and its subsidiaries are not specifically accumulated and include salaries and other operating expenses.

(14) Commitments and Contingent Liabilities

(a) General Liability and Malpractice Insurance

Effective June 2004, the Hospital entered into a joint venture agreement with four Virginia health systems to establish Virginia Solution SPC. Ltd (the Captive), which provides primary professional liability, general liability, and workers' compensation insurance to each of the respective entities Effective June 2010, a sixth health system joined the Captive. As of December 31, 2011, the Hospital owned a 17% equity interest in the joint venture, which is accounted for under the equity method of accounting. The remaining 83% is owned by the remaining hospitals. The Hospital recognized equity in the income of the Captive of approximately \$843 during the year ended December 31, 2011, which is included in other nonoperating gains (losses), net on the accompanying consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets. The investment in the Captive of approximately \$3,631 has been included in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet as of December 31, 2011.

The Hospital insures its professional and general risks through insurance policies issued by the Captive, a multi-provider captive insurance company. The Captive provides primary professional liability insurance on a claims-made basis with limits of \$2,000 per claim and \$6,000 aggregate. Primary general liability coverage is also provided by the Captive on a claims-made basis with limits of \$2,000 per occurrence. The captive provides primary worker's compensation liability insurance.

on a claims made basis with limits of \$500 aggregate Effective July 1, 2011, the Hospital purchased excess coverage of \$20,000 per claim and \$20,000 in the aggregate provided through a Sentara excess liability policy

Professional liability policies entered into on a claims-made basis and must be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance if claims incurred during their term but asserted after their expiration are to be insured. The estimated liability for professional and general liability claims will be significantly affected if current and future claims differ from historical trends. While management monitors reported claims closely and considers potential outcomes as estimated by its actuaries when determining its professional and liability accruals, the complexity of the claims, the extended period of time to settle the claims, and the wide range of potential outcomes complicate the estimation. In the opinion of management, adequate provision has been made for the related risk. Based on actuarial estimates and claims history, the Hospital has recorded a liability for potential claims incurred but not reported of \$824 at December 31, 2011.

(b) Employee Health Benefits

The Hospital is self-insured for employees' healthcare benefits. Payments under the plan are limited to \$250 per claim and \$2,000 in total for the year. The Hospital has third-party insurance coverage for any losses in excess of such amounts. The liability associated with these claims total \$1.888 at December 31, 2011.

(c) Lease Commitments

The Hospital leases various equipment and properties from unrelated parties under operating leases expiring during the next six years. Laws and regulations governing Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. The Hospital, through its compliance program, seeks to ensure compliance with such laws and regulations and to rectify instances of noncompliance. Compliance with such laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action, which can include fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

The Hospital has identified potential violations of the Stark Law, which generally prohibits a financial relationship between a referring physician and healthcare facilities receiving any such referrals absent specific contractual language. The Hospital has self-disclosed these potential violations to relevant regulatory authorities, and expects to work collaboratively with these authorities to determine what, if any, fines and penalties might be appropriate. Management believes that the ultimate outcome to this matter will not have a material effect on the Hospital's consolidated financial statements.

(17) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

The Hospital's endowment consists of approximately 250 individual funds established for a variety of purposes. As required by U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

(a) Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Hospital has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act as adopted in the Commonwealth of Virginia (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Hospital classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund

The remaining portion of the endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Hospital in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Hospital considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds

- (1) The duration and preservation of the fund
- (2) The purpose of the Hospital and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of the Hospital
- (7) The investment policies of the Hospital

(d) Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Hospital has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a long-term stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain or increase the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Hospital must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period as well as amounts for which donor stipulations have been met but the funds have not yet been appropriated for expenditure. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to generate adequate returns to accomplish this result, accepting some degree of short-term volatility while attempting to avoid excessive portfolio risk.

(e) Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Hospital relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Hospital targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its longer return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

(f) Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Hospital has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year the greater of 50% of the total return earned or 3% of the perpetual endowment fund. In addition, the Hospital has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year 10% of the total return earned for management expenses of the endowment fund. In establishing this policy, the Hospital considered the long-term expected return on its endowment. Accordingly, over the long term, the Hospital expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow while meeting required spending of the endowment. This is consistent with the Hospital's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

(18) Related Parties

Members of the Hospital's governing boards and senior administration may, from time to time, be associated, either directly or indirectly, with companies doing business with the Hospital. For members of the senior administration, the Hospital requires annual disclosure of significant financial interests in, or employment or consulting relationships with, entities doing business with the Hospital. These annual disclosures cover both the members of the senior administration and their immediate family members. When such relationships exist, measures are taken to appropriately manage the actual or perceived conflict in the best interests of the hospital. There are written conflict of interest policies for both the Hospital that require, among other things, that no member of a governing board may participate in any decision in which he or she (or an immediate family member) has a material financial interest. Each governing board member is required to certify compliance with the conflict of interest policies for the Hospital. When such relationships exist, measures are taken to mitigate any actual or perceived conflict, including requiring that such transactions be conducted at arm's length, for good and sufficient consideration, based on terms that are fair and reasonable to and for the benefit of the Hospital, and in accordance with applicable conflict of interest laws. No such associations that have been disclosed are considered to be significant.
