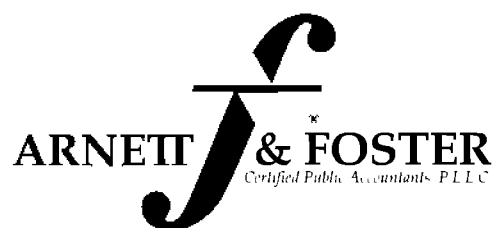

Note 1. Nature of Operations and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of operations: Davis Memorial Hospital (the Hospital) is a not-for-profit acute care hospital located in Elkins, West Virginia. The Hospital provides acute inpatient, outpatient and emergency care services for residents of Elkins and surrounding areas. Admitting physicians are primarily practitioners in the local area. The Hospital was incorporated in West Virginia and is affiliated with Davis Health System, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation. The Hospital and its subsidiary are under the control of Davis Health System, Inc.

The Hospital owns 100% of the common stock of Health Facilities, Inc., a for-profit corporation. The investment is reported in the financial statements by the equity method of accounting. The wholly-owned subsidiary should be consolidated with the Hospital for the Hospital's financial statements to be presented in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

A summary of significant accounting policies is as follows:

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Basis of presentation Net assets and revenues, gains and losses are classified based on donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Hospital and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted - Resources over which the Board of Directors has discretionary control. Designated amounts represent those net assets which the Hospital has set aside for a particular purpose.

Temporarily restricted - Resources subject to donor imposed restrictions which will be satisfied by actions of the Hospital or passage of time. (None at December 31, 2011 and 2010)

Permanently restricted - Resources subject to donor imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Hospital or for which perpetual trusts have been established. The donors of these resources permit the Hospital to use all or part of the income earned, excluding capital appreciation, on related investments for unrestricted purposes. (None at December 31, 2011 and 2010)

Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

Gifts of cash and other assets are reported at fair value and are presented as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions.

Cash and cash equivalents: For purposes of reporting the statement of cash flows, the Hospital considers all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions, penalties or other arrangements under trust and endowment agreements, and all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents excluding amounts classified as limited as to use by Board designation and other arrangements under trust agreements

Patient accounts receivable: Patient accounts receivable are carried at the original charge less an estimate made for doubtful or uncollectible accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. The allowance is based upon a review of the outstanding balances aged by financial class. Management uses collection percentages based upon historical collection experience to determine collectibility. Management also reviews troubled, aged accounts to determine collection potential. For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts. Recoveries of accounts previously written off are recorded as a reduction to the provision for bad debt expense when received. Interest is not charged on patient accounts receivable.

The Hospital's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients increased from 75 percent of self-pay accounts receivable at December 31, 2010, to 76 percent of self-pay accounts receivable at December 31, 2011. In addition, the Hospital's self-pay write offs increased approximately \$579,000 from approximately \$2,718,000 for the fiscal year 2010 to approximately \$3,297,000 for fiscal year 2011. Both increases were the result of negative trends experienced in the collection of amounts from self-pay patients in fiscal year 2011. The Hospital does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write offs from third-party payors.

Supplies inventory: Supplies inventory, which consists principally of supplies, are stated at latest invoice cost, which approximates lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market.

Assets limited as to use: Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements and designated assets set aside by the Board of Directors for specified purposes, such as future capital improvements, employee benefits, and self-insurance malpractice claims, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Hospital have been reclassified as current assets in the balance sheets at December 31, 2011 and 2010.

Investments: Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities.

Property and equipment: Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful lives of each class of depreciable assets and is computed by the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to expense as incurred. Interest costs incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets are capitalized as a component of costs of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, and equipment are reported at fair value and are presented as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Hospital reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Excess of revenues over expenses: The statement of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

Net patient service revenue: The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different than its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 38 percent and 9 percent, respectively, and 36 percent and 8 percent, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

Charity care: The Hospital provides care to patients, who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy, without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue in the Hospital's financial statements.

Estimated malpractice liability: The liability for estimated medical malpractice claims includes estimates of the ultimate costs for claims incurred but not reported. Beginning in 2006 the Hospital began accounting for its liability for estimated medical malpractice claims by offsetting payments made to fund the captive insurance company owned by Davis Health System, Inc.

Bond issuance costs: Costs incurred in issuing the Series 1998 bonds are being amortized over the life of the original bond issue by the effective interest method.

Income taxes: The Hospital is exempt from Federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and similar state statutes relating to not-for-profit organizations.

Unrelated business income tax: There is currently very little guidance in the IRS Code on what activities should be subject to unrelated business income tax (UBIT). The IRS has indicated that they are studying the issue and may issue additional guidance. As a result, at this time there is uncertainty regarding whether the Hospital should pay income tax on certain types of net taxable income from activities that may be considered by taxing authorities as unrelated to the purpose for which the Hospital was granted non-taxable status. In the opinion of management, any liability resulting from taxing authorities imposing income taxes on the net taxable income from activities deemed to be unrelated to the Hospital's non-taxable status is not expected to have a material effect on the Hospital's financial position or results of operations.

The Hospital is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits or any tax examinations for years prior to the fiscal year ended December 31, 2008

Reclassifications: Certain 2010 amounts have been reclassified to conform with the 2011 presentation. The reclassifications had no impact on previously reported net assets.

Subsequent events: The Hospital has evaluated subsequent events through April 4, 2012, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

New or Recent Accounting Pronouncements: In August 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Health Care Entities Topic 954 (Accounting Standards Update No. 2010-23) of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification *Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure*. The amended disclosure requirements are effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010 and must be applied retrospectively. Management's policy for providing charity care, as well as the level of charity care provided, shall be disclosed in the financial statements. Such disclosure shall be measured based on the provider's costs of providing charity care services. If costs cannot be specifically attributed to services provided to charity care patients (for example, based on a cost accounting system), management may estimate the costs of those services using reasonable techniques. The Hospital adopted the amended disclosure requirements on January 1, 2011. Note 8 reflects the amended disclosure requirements. Since the new guidance amends disclosure requirements only, its adoption did not impact the Hospital's balance sheet, statement of operations, or cash flow statement.

Health Care Entities Topic 954 (Accounting Standards Update No. 2010-24) of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification *Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries* is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2010. A health care entity should not net insurance recoveries for medical malpractice claims against a related medical malpractice claim liability. Additionally, the amount of the claim liability should be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. A cumulative-effect adjustment should be recognized in opening net assets in the period of adoption if a difference exists between any liability and insurance receivables recorded as a result of application. Early application is permitted. The Hospital adopted Topic 954 (No. 2010-24) requirements on January 1, 2011. Implementation of this standard did not materially impact the Hospital's financial statements.

In July, 2011, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-07, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities*. The amendments in this Update become effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2012 and must be applied retroactively. The amendments in this Update require certain health care entities to change the presentation of their statement of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts). Additionally, those health care entities are required to provide enhanced disclosure about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. The amendments also require disclosures of patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) as well as qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Hospital adopted the amended requirements on January 1, 2011. Adoption of the amendments in this Update were retroactively applied to January 1, 2010 and resulted in changes to previously reported amounts. The changes that resulted were a decrease of \$5,567,188 in total revenues, gains and other support and total expenses in the statement of operations for the year ended December 31, 2010. Note 8 reflects the amended disclosure requirements.

Note 2. Cash Concentrations

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Hospital to significant concentration of credit risk consist principally of cash. The Hospital maintains cash with financial institutions which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Hospital believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash.

Note 3. Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Hospital is located in Elkins, West Virginia. The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. At December 31, 2011, assets limited as to use had approximately \$9,521,000 invested in seven mutual funds, five of which have value that exceeds 10% of the Hospital's total investments in these mutual funds. The Vanguard Short-Term Corporate Fund represents 35% of total mutual funds. The investment seeks to provide current income. The fund invests at least 80% of assets in short and intermediate term corporate bonds and other corporate fixed income obligations. It typically maintains an average weighted maturity of between one and four years. The fund may also invest in U S government securities, bank obligations, commercial paper, repurchase agreements, and dollar-denominated foreign securities. The Washington Mutual Investors Fund represents 15% of total mutual funds. The fund seeks to provide current income and the opportunity for growth of principal consistent with sound common-stock investing. The fund seeks to be at least 95% invested in equity-type securities. The fund invests in stocks that meet strict standards evolving from requirements originally established by the U S District Court for the District of Columbia for the investment of trust funds. The strategy seeks to provide a high level of current income by investing primarily in first and second lien senior floating rate loans and other floating rate debt securities. The fund focuses primarily on the healthiest segment of the bank loan market – loans that have ratings of BB or B.

The State of West Virginia Disproportionate Share Hospital State Plan was amended to provide for a settlement process among participating hospitals. The Bureau for Medicaid services has settled the DSH amounts through 1999. The State has compiled the information for the years subsequent to 1999 to begin the settlement process. There is a proposal to the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (WVDHHR) for settlement of all DSH audits through 2010 with no cash settlements. The laws and regulations governing the DSH settlement process are complex, involving statistical data from all participating hospitals, and subject to interpretation. Accordingly, management of the Hospital is not able to estimate additional settlements, if any, that could arise upon completion of the DSH settlement process.

During 2008, Davis Memorial Hospital was notified by the Medicare intermediary that all cost reports settled within the previous statutory three year period were going to be reopened in order to correct an error in the Medicare determined base rate calculation. Those reports affected include the years ended December 31, 2001 through December 31, 2006. In March 2009, the Hospital received a letter from the Medicare intermediary requesting an overpayment of approximately \$3,400,000. A liability for the \$3,400,000 was recorded at December 31, 2009, in estimated third-party payer settlements. The Hospital made two payments totaling \$120,000 to Medicare in 2009 and then filed a protest and suspended further payments at the advice of legal counsel. In 2010, the Hospital received notice that Medicare was not going to reopen the previously filed cost reports and the request for over payment was retracted. Therefore, the \$3,400,000 liability was removed from the balance sheet and an unusual gain was recorded as a result of this change in estimate. The change in estimate is recorded in Other Income (Losses) in the accompanying statement of operations for the year ended December 31, 2010, due to the unusual nature of the issue.

Note 8. Net Patient Service Revenue and Cost of Charity Care

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

- **Medicare**

Inpatient acute care services and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Inpatient nonacute services and defined capital and medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospital's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization.

- **Medicaid**

Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed based on prospectively determined rates per discharge. Medicaid outpatient services are reimbursed based upon the lesser of the Hospital's charge or predetermined fee schedules amounts.

- **Commercial Insurance Carriers**

The Hospital also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes various discounts from established charges.

- **West Virginia Health Care Authority**

The Legislature of the State of West Virginia has created the Health Care Authority to regulate a hospital's gross patient revenue based on limitation orders compiled from rate schedules and budgets submitted by the hospital on a periodic basis. If a hospital's charges are held to be excessive or unreasonable, the Health Care Authority may require rebates to consumers or adjustments to subsequent year revenue limits.

Charity Care

The Hospital provides charity care to patients who are financially unable to pay for the health care services they receive. The Hospital's policy is not to pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care if the patient has an adjusted income equal to or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Income levels. A sliding scale discount is applied for patients up to 300% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. Accordingly, the Hospital does not report these amounts in the net revenues or in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Hospital determined the costs associated with providing charity care by aggregating the applicable direct and indirect costs, including salaries, wages and benefits, supplies, and other operating expenses, based on data from its costing system. The costs of caring for charity care patient for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$3,200,000 and \$3,350,000, respectively.

The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under its charity care policy, the estimated cost of those services and supplies, and equivalent service statistics. The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized during the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 from these major payor sources, is as follows:

The Hospital qualifies as a disproportionate share hospital for Medicaid. This designation entitles the Hospital to disproportionate share payments from Medicaid. Additional income recorded in 2011 and 2010, as a result of being classified as a disproportionate share provider, is approximately \$222,000 and \$302,000, respectively. In addition, the Hospital received Medicaid Enhanced Payments of approximately \$1.8 million and \$2.7 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively. These amounts are recorded as a reduction of contractual adjustments.

As disclosed in Note 7 to the accompanying financial statements, the Hospital has recorded assets and liabilities for cost report settlement amounts with Medicare and Medicaid. The 2011 and 2010 net patient service revenue was increased (decreased) by approximately \$(198,000) and \$96,000, respectively, as a result of settlements at amounts different than originally estimated.

Note 9. Pension and Postretirement Plans and Subsequent Event**Defined Benefit Plan**

The Hospital has a defined benefit pension plan covering substantially all its employees. The plan benefits are based on years of credited service and the employees' compensation level. The Hospital's policy is to make contributions to the plan in amounts, as actuarially determined, sufficient to fund benefits.

Effective September 30, 2006, the Hospital froze the plan, and then created a 401(k) plan effective January 1, 2007. There were employer pension contributions of \$819,850 and \$826,613 and benefits paid of \$791,889 and \$1,572,802 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Post-retirement employer contributions were \$164,140 and \$165,681 for the years ending December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The Board of Trustees adopted a resolution to terminate the defined benefit pension plan. The liquidation of the plan is expected to occur between May 1 and July 1, 2012. Estimated cost to terminate the plan is approximately \$2.3 million, which approximates the \$2.6 million accrued in the accompanying balance sheet at December 31, 2011. The Hospital plans to obtain long-term financing to cover the costs of terminating the plan.

Plan Assets

401(k) Plan

The Hospital has a 401(k) profit sharing pension plan for eligible employees whereby the Hospital matches employee contributions and can make additional contributions. The amount of the employee's contributions that are matched and the amount of additional contributions are based upon a percentage of employee contributions and eligible salaries, respectively, and are determined annually. Employer expense totaled approximately \$1,040,000 and \$615,000 for 2011 and 2010, respectively, of which approximately \$779,000 and \$350,000 was accrued and included in accrued retirement plan contribution in the balance sheets at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Note 10. Lease Arrangements and Rental Expense

The Hospital leases real property and equipment under cancelable operating lease agreements expiring at various dates through December 2011. Total rent expense for all operating leases for the year ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 was approximately \$606,300 and \$491,800, respectively.

Note 11. Health Insurance Plan

The Hospital is partially self-insured with respect to employee health insurance claims and their health insurance coverage. Under this program, gross charges for employees receiving services at Davis Memorial Hospital are expensed and recorded as an employee benefit expense. To protect itself against extraordinary claims of its employees, the Hospital has purchased stop-loss insurance. The Hospital's cost is limited to \$125,000 per year per covered person. Amounts payable under this plan at December 31, 2011 and 2010, for actual claims and claims incurred but not reported was approximately \$550,000 for both years.

Total expense for health insurance for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 was \$4,456,000 and \$4,733,000, respectively.

Note 13. Advertising Expense

The Hospital's policy is to expense costs for advertising as they are incurred. Advertising costs included in expenses for 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$144,100 and \$146,200, respectively.

Note 14. Medical Malpractice Insurance, Contingency and Commitment

The Hospital obtained professional and general liability insurance from Providers Re SPC, Providers Segregated Portfolio No. 5 (the Captive), which is a captive insurance company domiciled in the Cayman Islands wholly owned by Davis Health System, Inc., with which the Hospital is affiliated, to fully cover medical malpractice claims. Davis Health System, Inc., developed the captive for the purpose of providing professional and general healthcare liability insurance coverage for its affiliated hospitals, Davis Memorial Hospital and Broadus Hospital Association, Inc. The policy acquired from the Captive is a claims made policy. Additionally, effective December 1, 2006, the Hospital purchased reinsurance with \$4,000,000 limits.

From October 1, 2000 through February 28, 2004, and for current claims incurred but not reported to the Captive, the Hospital was self-insured for medical malpractice claims. The ultimate costs of malpractice claims, which include costs associated with litigating or settling claims, were accrued when the incidents that gave rise to the claims occurred. Estimated losses from asserted and unasserted claims have been accrued based on the best estimates of the ultimate costs of the claims and the relationship of past reported incidents to eventual claim payments. All relevant information, including industry experience, actuarial calculations, historical experience, existing asserted claims, and reported incidents have been used in estimating the expected amount of claims to be paid. The accrual included an estimate of the losses that would result from unreported incidents, which were probable of having occurred before the end of the reporting period. Accrued malpractice costs are recorded by the Captive and Davis Health System, Inc. Total provision for self-insured medical malpractice claims charged to expense for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 was approximately \$340,000 and \$408,700, respectively.

The Captive, as described above, had funds at December 31, 2011 and 2010 of \$5,823,377 and \$5,621,515, respectively, available for payment of malpractice claims and expenses.

Davis Memorial Hospital owns 100% of the common stock of Health Facilities, Inc., a for-profit corporation. The investment is reported in the financial statements on the equity method of accounting that approximates the Hospital's equity in the underlying book value of the subsidiary.

A summary of the subsidiary's unaudited assets, liabilities, and retained earnings, results of operations and changes in retained earnings follows. The Hospital's interest in the net assets of the subsidiary is reported as an investment in subsidiary on the balance sheets.

Health Facilities, Inc.'s balance sheet includes a note payable to Davis Memorial Hospital of \$1,482,798 and \$1,423,163 for 2011 and 2010, respectively, accounts receivable of \$29,538 and \$13,650 for 2011 and 2010, respectively, and accounts payable of \$3,801,953 and \$3,262,016 for 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The Hospital records its investment in Health Facilities, Inc. on the balance sheets at the above equity amounts and the net income in the statement of operations, rather than reporting assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses, as it would be reported if consolidated financial statements were issued.

The effect, if consolidated according to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, would be to reclassify and increase reported amounts for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 as follows:

Note 16. Related Parties

The Hospital has several related parties. The entities are related through common ownership or affiliation through Davis Health System, Inc. The entities include Health Facilities, Inc., Central WV Medcorp, Inc., Broadus Hospital Association, Inc., Providers Re SPC, Providers Segregated Portfolio No. 5, Davis Memorial Hospital Foundation, Inc. and Davis Health System, Inc. Davis Health System, Inc. is the parent company of Davis Memorial Hospital and the other named entities except Health Facilities, Inc. Health Facilities, Inc. is wholly-owned by Davis Memorial Hospital, and operates a pharmacy, durable medical equipment sales center and a wellness center. Central WV Medcorp, Inc. is another sister entity that provides physician medical services to the residents of Elkins and Buckhannon, West Virginia, and surrounding areas. Broadus Hospital Association, Inc. is a hospital in the System, providing acute care to the residents of Philippi and surrounding areas. Davis Memorial Hospital provides management assistance to Broadus Hospital Association, Inc. under a management contract. Providers Re SPC, Providers Segregated Portfolio No. 5 is a captive insurance company domiciled in the Cayman Islands, created by Davis Health System, Inc., to provide medical malpractice insurance coverage for the Hospital and Broadus Hospital Association. Davis Health System Foundation, Inc. promotes the maintenance, development, and improvement of the health system.

Captive Insurance

During the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital obtained its professional and general health care liability insurance policy from a captive insurance company wholly owned by Davis Health Systems, Inc., Providers Re SPC, Providers Segregated Portfolio No 5 (Note 14). The Hospital incurs expenses on behalf of this entity. The balance due related to these services was \$875,732 and \$767,732 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Health Facilities, Inc.

The Hospital has made cash advances to Health Facilities, Inc. (Note 15) that are reflected in the financial statements on which it charges interest which was \$59,634 and \$59,634 for 2011 and 2010, respectively. Other transactions with Health Facilities, Inc. include payments by the Hospital for salaries, rents, supplies and other services. Amounts due from Health Facilities, Inc. were \$5,670,661 and \$5,071,089 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Hospital also had amounts due to Health Facilities, Inc. of \$29,538 and \$13,650 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Hospital incurred rent expense of \$138,210 and \$128,805, and housekeeping expense of \$0 and \$10,313, for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for services performed by Health Facilities, Inc. The Hospital also had rental income of \$3,600 from Health Facilities, Inc. for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010.

Davis Health System, Inc.

The Hospital transfers funds to its parent corporation, Davis Health System, Inc. The Hospital also purchases various supplies and other services for Davis Health System, Inc., and has limited transactions with other subsidiaries of Davis Health System, Inc. The Hospital had net asset transfers of \$320,922 and \$0 to Davis Health System, Inc., for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Hospital had amounts due from (to) Davis Health System of \$299,071 and \$359,068 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Broaddus Hospital Association, Inc.

The Hospital incurred costs for salaries and benefits, supplies, malpractice insurance and other services on behalf of Broaddus Hospital Association, Inc. (Broaddus). The expenses were incurred and billed to Broaddus. For the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital incurred \$1,119,372 and \$980,082 for salaries, respectively, and \$441,180 and \$450,922 for supplies and other expenses, respectively, for Broaddus. Additionally, the Hospital performs billing and collection services for Broaddus. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital was due \$756,255 and \$899,761, respectively, from Broaddus Hospital Association, Inc. for these charges and cash advances. No interest is charged on the outstanding balance.

Central WV Medcorp, Inc.

The Hospital is related to Central WV Medcorp, Inc., a subsidiary of Davis Health System, Inc. The Hospital incurs expenses on behalf of this entity for salaries and supplies expenses. The amount of the charges for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 was \$821,282 and \$955,938, respectively. The balance due related to these services was \$463,403 and \$566,120 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Hospital also had amounts due to this entity of \$7,273 and \$200 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Additionally, the Hospital had net asset transfers to WV Medcorp, Inc. during the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 in the amount of \$1,534,417 and \$2,000,000, respectively.

Davis Health System Foundation, Inc.

The Hospital is related to Davis Health System Foundation, Inc., a subsidiary of Davis Health System, Inc. The Hospital incurs minor expenses on behalf of this entity for operations. The balance due related to these services was \$3,491 and \$4,542 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Note 17. Health Care Legislation and Regulation

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of Federal, state and local governments. Government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of various statutes and regulations by health care providers. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time. Management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with fraud and abuse as well as other applicable government laws and regulations. If the Hospital is found in violation of these laws, the Hospital could be subject to substantial monetary fines, civil and criminal penalties and exclusion from participation in the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

Note 18. Derivative Financial Instruments, Unearned Revenue and Contingency

The Hospital has a "forward" contract with First Union National Bank (Union). Under the terms of the contracts, in exchange for up-front fees from Union totaling \$923,000, the Hospital and Trustee on the 1998 Bonds agreed to use funds held by the Trustee under the Bond Indenture to purchase eligible securities, generally zero coupon U.S. Government Securities with the difference between maturity value and market value at the time of purchase being paid to Union. In essence, total interest to be recognized on each security over its life was to be paid to Union on the date of purchase. In effect, through this derivative financial instrument, the Hospital received prepayment of the discounted present value of the expected future interest income on the Trustee funds and was obligated to pay Union all earnings on the funds to be deposited, under the sinking fund requirements of the outstanding bond offering, into these Trust accounts.

The Hospital's goal in this transaction was to obtain ready cash, and to protect itself against potentially unfavorable fluctuations in interest rates. The forward contracts entail market risk for the Hospital since the Hospital will be unable to benefit from potential future favorable interest rate fluctuations. In addition, in the event scheduled deposits are not made into the Trustee funds, or in the case of early extinguishment of the Bonds, the Hospital would be required to reimburse Union the economic equivalent of Union's lost rights under the contracts.

The up-front fees from Union were deferred and are being amortized on a straight-line basis over the life of the 1998 Bonds. The amortization is reported as interest income on the statement of operations. The unamortized amount at December 31, 2011 and 2010 of \$405,101 and \$435,540, respectively, is shown on the balance sheet as unearned revenue. Payments to Union are equivalent to earnings on the Bond Trust accounts and the net impact on earnings of the payments under the forward contract and the earnings on the bond fund are \$0.

Note 19. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures Topic of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value and expands disclosures about fair value measurements

This Topic defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. This Topic also establishes a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

Level 1: Quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange

Level 2: Observable inputs other than Level 1 including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in less active markets or other observable inputs that can be corroborated by observable market data. Level 2 also includes derivatives contracts whose value is determined using a pricing model with observable market inputs or can be derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data

Level 3: Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity for financial instruments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation, also includes observable inputs for nonbinding single dealer quotes not corroborated by observable market data

Fair Value Measurements

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy

Investments and Assets Limited as to Use: Investment securities and assets limited as to use are recorded at fair value on a recurring basis. Fair value measurement is based upon quoted prices, if available. If quoted prices are not available, fair values are measured using independent pricing models or other model-based valuation techniques such as the present value of future cash flows, adjusted for the security's credit rating

Note 20. Electronic Health Records (EHR)

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act ("HITECH Act") was enacted into law on February 17, 2009 as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The HITECH Act includes provisions designed to increase the use of EHR by both physicians and hospitals. The Hospital intends to comply with the EHR meaningful use requirements of the HITECH Act in time to qualify for the maximum available Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments. The Hospital's compliance will result in significant costs including professional services focused on successfully designing and implementing EHR solutions along with costs associated with the hardware and software components of the project. The Hospital has incurred and will continue to incur both capital expenditures and operating expenses in connection with the implementation of its EHR initiatives. The timing of these expenditures does not necessarily correlate with the timing of receipt of the incentive payments and the recognition of revenues. The Hospital estimates that they will capitalize approximately \$6 million and incur approximately \$1 million of additional operating expenses related to implementation of EHR initiatives. The Hospital currently estimates that at a minimum total costs incurred to comply will be recovered through improved reimbursement amounts over the projected lifecycle of this initiative. During the year ended December 31, 2011, the Hospital recognized \$617,123 in revenues related to Medicaid EHR incentive payments.
