Basis of Presentation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of entities owned and controlled by the Corporation All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major or central to the provision of healthcare services are reported as operating revenues and expenses in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets. Other transactions are reported as nonoperating gains and losses

Fiscal Year

The Corporation reported on a July 1-June 30 fiscal year through June 30, 2010 Effective January 1, 2011, the Corporation changed its fiscal reporting period to a calendar year in order to bring its planning and budgeting cycle more in line with its largest payer, Medicare Therefore, the period from July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010, is reported as a six-month transition period

Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is recorded at the estimated net realizable amounts for services rendered Estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payers are accrued in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined Amounts due to/from third parties are based on estimates by management Any adjustments to these amounts are treated as a change in estimate and are included in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets in the period the adjustment is made

Charity Care

The Corporation provides healthcare services to all patients, regardless of their ability to pay The Corporation does not pursue collection from those patients who meet certain criteria under its charity policy Therefore, those amounts are not reported as revenues

Forgone charges for charity care amounted to \$114,643,000 and \$54,152,000 for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively These amounts as a percentage of gross patient revenues were 4 2 percent and 4 0 percent at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively Estimated costs related to providing charity care were \$24,598,000 and \$11,909,000 for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively These costs were estimated by multiplying the percentage of gross patient revenues attributable to charity care patients by the total operating expenses



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Other Operating Revenue

Other operating revenue includes certain investment earnings and gains on the sale of investments of certain affiliates, investment income related to escrow and indenture agreements held in trust and investments held for special purposes and other activities related to the provision of healthcare services

Bad Debt Expense

The Corporation records bad debt expense as its estimate of the amount of gross charges due from patients that will not ultimately be collected Bad debt expense as a percentage of gross patient charges was 3 1 percent and 3 2 percent for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively

The allowance for bad debts is established for accounts deemed potentially uncollectible by management based on contract terms, discharge dates and historical collection experience. Accounts are written off once collection efforts have been exhausted

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation or other arrangements, such as trust agreements. The Corporation classifies book overdrafts, representing outstanding checks in excess of funds on deposit, in accounts payable, except where the legal right of offset exists with the same bank. Such amounts totaled \$2,234,000 and \$2,000,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

Inventory

Inventory, which consists principally of medical and other supplies, is valued at the lower of cost or market on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method

Other Current Assets

Other current assets include notes receivable, prepaid expenses and other nonpatient accounts receivable

Assets Whose Use Is Limited

Assets whose use is limited represent funds designated by the Corporation's Board of Trustees for future capital expenditures and other special purposes and for debt service as required by bond indentures, escrow and loan agreements



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

These assets consist of cash and cash equivalents, U S government obligations, equity securities, fixed income, equity and multistrategy mutual funds and are recorded at market plus accrued interest Realized gains and losses are determined on the specific identification method for securities with fixed maturities and the average cost method for equity securities

Other Long-Term Investments

Other long-term investments, which consist of cash and cash equivalents, US government obligations, equity securities, fixed income, equity and multistrategy mutual funds, are stated at market plus accrued interest. Investment income is recognized when earned

Investments in Others

Investments in others are recorded using the equity method. The Corporation's share of the results of unrestricted operations of these entities is recorded as other operating revenue, nonoperating gains (losses) or changes in unrestricted net assets, depending on the nature of the related income. The Corporation's share of the changes in temporarily and permanently restricted net assets of these entities is recorded as changes in the Corporation's temporarily and permanently restricted net assets.

Property and Equipment, Net

Property and equipment is stated at cost if purchased or market value at date received if donated Upon sale or retirement of property and equipment, the cost and related accumulated depreciation are eliminated from the respective accounts, and the resulting gain or loss, if any, is included in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets The estimated useful lives are in accordance with American Hospital Association guidelines

During periods of construction, the Corporation capitalizes interest expenditures, net of any related interest earnings, as part of the costs of acquiring qualifying assets. The Corporation capitalized \$1,060,000 and \$157,000 of interest on projects under construction during the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively. The net capitalized interest is added to the asset's cost and is depreciated over the asset's estimated useful life.



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Costs incurred for the development of computer software are capitalized and amortized over five years or less

Unamortized Bond Issue Expenditures

Bond issue expenditures are amortized over the period the bonds are outstanding on the straight-line method

Goodwill

Goodwill represents the excess of the purchase price paid over net assets acquired Management evaluates goodwill to determine if it is more likely than not that an impairment exists. If there is a greater than 50 percent likelihood of impairment, the Corporation assesses the recoverability of goodwill by determining whether the amounts can be recovered through undiscounted cash flows of the business acquired, excluding interest. If impairment is indicated by this analysis, measurement of the loss would be based on the market value of the business acquired. Management considers external factors, including local market developments, regional and national trends, regulatory developments and other pertinent factors in making its assessments. No goodwill was considered impaired during the year ended December 31, 2011 or the six-month period ended December 31, 2010. This analysis includes management estimates that are susceptible to significant changes from economic or other factors. Changes in these estimates could result in future goodwill impairments.

Other Assets

Other assets primarily include notes receivable, vendor deposits and the cash surrender value of life insurance policies

Insurance

The Corporation maintains a self-insurance program related to certain of its general, professional and workers' compensation liabilities. The Corporation insures certain of its general and professional liabilities subject to various retention levels. Under the program, the Corporation makes contributions as needed to a revocable trust fund. Investment income and gains and losses on dispositions are retained in the trust fund and are considered in funding requirements. The Corporation also insures certain of its professional liabilities through ASI. Provision is made in the consolidated financial statements for estimates of the value of reported claims and claims incurred but not reported under these programs (Note K).



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

In addition, the Corporation maintains a self-insurance program for its employees' health and dental insurance Provision is made in the consolidated financial statements for estimates of the claims incurred but not reported under this program

Other Current Liabilities

Other current liabilities primarily include deferred revenue related to Medicaid disproportionate share payments

Other Noncurrent Liabilities

Other noncurrent liabilities primarily include the noncurrent portion of reserves for general, professional and workers' compensation liabilities, defined benefit pension plan, BHC physician life insurance retirement plan and certain other benefit liabilities

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Corporation has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose Permanently restricted net assets are those which are restricted by donors to be held by the Corporation in perpetuity

Tax Status

Baptist Health System, Inc is an Alabama not-for-profit corporation and is exempt from income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) BHSA, a for-profit holding company, was organized in 1994 to coordinate the activities of the for-profit subsidiaries of the Corporation

Deferred taxes are recorded for temporary timing differences between amounts reported for federal and state tax purposes and amounts recorded in the consolidated financial statements. The primary timing difference is due to the recognition of net operating loss carryforwards

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the dates of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods Actual results could differ from those estimates



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

The estimates susceptible to significant changes include those used in determining the collectability of receivables, the reserves for general and professional liability claims, the reserves for workers' compensation claims, the reserves for employee group healthcare claims, pension assumptions, the reserves for pending litigation and regulatory audits, estimated third-party payer settlements and the useful lives and recoverability of certain long-lived assets and intangible assets. Although some variability is inherent in these estimates, management believes that the amounts recorded are reasonable

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events and their potential effects on these consolidated financial statements through April 25, 2012, the date the consolidated financial statements were issued

Fair Value Measurements

Generally accepted accounting principles define fair value for financial reporting purposes as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly market transaction between market participants at the measurement date (reporting date) Fair value is based on an exit price in the principal market or most advantageous market in which the reporting entity could transact

Financial Instruments Measured at Fair Value - For each asset and liability required to be reported at fair value, management has identified the unit of account and valuation premise to be applied for purposes of measuring fair value. The unit of account is the level at which an asset or liability is aggregated or disaggregated. The valuation premise is a concept that determines whether an asset is measured on a stand-alone basis or in combination with other assets. The Corporation measures its assets and liabilities on a stand-alone basis then aggregates assets and liabilities with similar characteristics for disclosure purposes. Generally accepted accounting principles establish a hierarchy for inputs used in measuring fair value that maximizes the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs by requiring that the observable inputs be used when available. Observable inputs are inputs that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability developed based on market data obtained from sources independent of the Corporation.



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Unobservable inputs are inputs that reflect the Corporation's assumptions about the factors market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability developed based on the best information available in the circumstances The hierarchy is broken down into three levels based on the reliability of inputs as follows

Level 1 - Valuations based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Corporation has the ability to access Since valuations are based on quoted prices that are readily and regularly available in an active market, valuation of these products does not entail a significant degree of judgment

Level 2 - Valuations based on observable inputs, including quoted prices (other than Level 1) in active markets for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, such as interest rates, yield curves, volatilities and default rates, and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data

Level 3 - Valuations based on inputs that are unobservable and significant to the overall fair value measurement As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Corporation had no Level 3 investments

If the determination of fair value measurement for a particular asset or liability is based on inputs from different levels of the fair value hierarchy, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the entire fair value measurement falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety Management's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and considers factors specific to the asset or liability measured

The fair value of common stock, equity pools and other equity investments is based on quoted market prices in an active market for identical assets and liabilities as of the reporting date. The fair value of common stock, equity pools and other equity investments is categorized within Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

The fair value of fixed maturity securities and fixed income pools is estimated using recently executed transactions and market price quotations (where observable) Fixed maturity securities are generally categorized in Level 1 or Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy, in instances where significant inputs are unobservable, they are categorized in Level 3 of the hierarchy

Financial Instruments Not Measured at Fair Value - Some of the Corporation's financial instruments are not measured at fair value on a recurring basis but, nevertheless, are recorded at amounts that approximate fair value due to their liquid or short-term nature Such financial assets and financial liabilities include accounts receivable, accounts payable, accrued expenses and lines of credit The Corporation's long-term debt is carried at cost. See Note G for disclosure of the fair value

Discontinued Operations

In previous years, the Corporation has divested several facilities, some of which qualified for discontinued operations treatment. The amounts reflected as loss from discontinued operations in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in unrestricted net assets represent the residual revenues and expenses from those discontinued operations.

Recent Accounting Developments

Management considers the applicability and impact of all accounting standards updates (ASUs) issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) ASUs not listed below were determined to either not be applicable or to have a minimal impact on the consolidated financial statements

Effective January 1, 2011, the Corporation adopted accounting standards regarding insurance claims and related insurance recoveries, which clarifies that a health care entity should not net insurance recoveries against a related claim liability. The adoption did not have a material impact on the balance sheet, results of operations or cash flows

Effective January 1, 2011, the Corporation adopted accounting standards regarding charity care, which requires that the measurement of charity care for disclosure purposes be based on the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care. The adoption had no impact on the Corporation's disclosures, which already measured charity care based on the direct and indirect costs of providing the care.



NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

In September 2011, the FASB issued revised guidance related to the annual evaluation of goodwill for impairment. The new guidance permits companies to first perform a qualitative assessment to determine if it is more likely than not that the fair value of the reporting unit is less than the carrying basis. If the results of that assessment do not indicate that there is a greater than 50 percent probability that the fair value is less than the carrying basis, no further calculations related to goodwill impairment are required until the next annual evaluation or unless events and circumstances indicate it is more likely than not that the carrying value of the reporting unit is greater than the fair value As permitted by the FASB, management elected to implement the provisions related to this ASU as of December 31, 2011

In May 2011, the FASB issued an ASU which expands the disclosure requirements for certain fair value measurements. For fair value measurements categorized within Level 3 of the fair value hierarchy, an entity will be required to disclose the valuation process used by the reporting entity and the sensitivity of the fair value measurement to change in unobservable inputs. In addition, an entity will be required to disclose, by categorization level of the fair value hierarchy, items that are not measured at fair value in the balance sheet, but for which the fair value is a required disclosure. The ASU is effective prospectively for interim and annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011 Management does not expect the implementation of this ASU to have an effect on the balance sheet, results of operations, or cash flows, but does expect additional disclosures to be made related to its long-term debt

In July 2011, the FASB issued an ASU that requires health care entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time the services are rendered, even though they do not assess the patient's ability to pay, to present the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) on their statement of operations. The ASU is effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2011 with a retrospective adjustment to all prior periods presented. Management does not expect the implementation of this ASU to have an effect on the balance sheet, results of operations, or cash flows, although the format of the statement of operations will change and additional disclosures will be required.

NOTE B - NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

The hospitals contributed 92 percent of the Corporation's net patient service revenue for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010. The hospitals have agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments at amounts which differ from the established rates. Following is a summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payers.

Medicare

Most inpatient acute care services, most outpatient services and home health services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries and certain medical education and capital costs are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Inpatient acute care rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Certain medical education costs, bad debt reimbursement and disproportionate share payments are paid based on tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Corporation and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary

Cost reports have been audited by the fiscal intermediary through 2007 for three hospitals and through 2006 for one hospital. The Corporation's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Corporation as well as a postpayment review by the RAC program (Note K). Approximately 33 percent and 32 percent of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Medicare beneficiaries for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively

Medicare HMO

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicare-eligible beneficiaries enrolled in Medicare Advantage programs are generally paid at rates which mirror traditional Medicare Approximately 20 percent and 21 percent of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Medicare HMO subscribers for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively



NOTE B - NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE - Continued

Blue Cross

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to most Blue Cross subscribers are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates or based on a cost reimbursement methodology. For cost reimbursed services, the Corporation is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Corporation and audits thereof by Blue Cross. Cost reports have been audited for all hospitals through 2010. Approximately 23 percent of the hospitals' gross patient revenues were derived from Blue Cross subscribers for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010.

Medicaid

Effective October 1, 2009, a new plan for reimbursing Alabama hospitals for Medicaid claims was approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Under the new plan, hospitals receive enhanced disproportionate share payments and quarterly supplemental access payments in addition to fee-for-service payments for inpatient and outpatient services with inpatient service fees paid on a per diem rate and outpatient service fees paid on a fee schedule. In addition, private hospitals, such as the hospitals operated by the Corporation, are assessed a revenue tax. Approximately 12 percent and 11 percent of the hospitals' gross revenues were derived from services rendered to Medicaid beneficiaries for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively

Other Third-Party Payers

The Corporation has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payments to the Corporation under these agreements includes discounts from established charges and prospectively determined rates.

In November 2005, the Special Care Facilities Financing Authority of the City of Birmingham-Baptist Medical Centers issued tax-exempt Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of \$249,260,000 for the benefit of the Corporation The Corporation agreed to make payments equal to debt service on the Series 2005-A Bonds and, as evidence of its promise to pay, the Corporation issued its note under its Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005, between the Corporation and BPHI (together, the Obligated Group) and the Bank of New York Trust Company, N A, as master trustee Proceeds of the Series 2005-A Bonds were used to refund certain outstanding bonds, pay costs of issuance, fund a reserve fund for the Series 2005-A Bonds and provide additional funds for capital improvements

On June 25, 2009, the Corporation executed a bond tender transaction, issuing \$11,373,000 in 2009-A and 2009-B taxable bank bonds to purchase \$14,580,000 2005-A bonds at a discounted rate and issued \$25,000,000 of 2009-B for a refunding of outstanding bonds. The 2009-A and 2009-B taxable bank bonds were issued pursuant to a \$60,000,000 Financing Agreement with Regions Bank dated May 6, 2009. The bank bonds are secured under the Corporation's Master Trust Indenture dated November 1, 2005. Current payments are interest only, with principal due May 6, 2014. Of the \$60,000,000 Financing Agreement, the Corporation utilized \$11,373,000 for the bond tender transaction and \$25,000,000 to refund Series 2007-A bonds. The remaining bonds totaling \$23,627,000, restricted for refunding outstanding Series 2001-A and 2005-A bonds, were not issued prior to the required effective date of May 5, 2010. Although these bonds were issued as taxable bank bonds, all were converted to tax-exempt prior to June 30, 2010.

The Obligated Group granted to the master trustee, for the benefit of the holders of outstanding Series 2005-A, 2001-A, 2009-A and 2009-B Bonds, a security interest in pledged revenues of the Obligated Group and a mortgage on the Princeton and Walker hospitals

Under the Master Trust Indenture, the Corporation has covenanted that it will not create or grant a lien or mortgage on any of its property now owned or subsequently acquired (except for certain permitted encumbrances) or pledge any of its revenues as collateral for any of its indebtedness subsequently incurred, unless all notes issued pursuant to the Master Trust Indenture are collateralized equally and ratably with such indebtedness



NOTE G - LONG-TERM DEBT - Continued

Additionally, the Corporation has agreed to maintain a debt service coverage ratio of not less than 1 to 1. However, if the debt service coverage ratio is less than 1 1 to 1, the Corporation has agreed to retain an independent consultant to make recommendations to increase such debt service coverage ratio. The Corporation's debt service coverage ratio under the Master Trust Indenture for the year ended December 31, 2011 is 1 663 to 1. The Master Trust Indenture does not require a debt service coverage ratio calculation for a six-month period. Due to the change in the fiscal year previously discussed, the Corporation elected to calculate on a calendar year period, January 1, 2010-December 31, 2010. This resulted in a debt service coverage ratio of 1 307 to 1.

On October 14, 2011, under the terms and conditions of the New Markets Tax Credit Program, the Corporation and BPHI entered into financing agreements for a net borrowing of \$3,695,000 with Wells Fargo - Baptist Health System Investment Fund, LLC (WF), Wells Fargo Community Development Enterprise Round 8 Subsidiary 3, LLC and Empowerment Reinvestment Fund XVII, LLC Proceeds of the borrowing were used for capital improvements to the Princeton campus Current payments on all notes are interest only, with principal payments beginning January 1, 2019 through the maturity date of October 1, 2041 Pursuant to an Investment Fund Put and Call Agreement between the Corporation and Wells Fargo Community Investment Holdings, LLC, subsequent to a seven-year compliance period, either party may exercise the right and option to sell/purchase the membership interest in WF If this option is exercised by either party, the Corporation then would have the right to cause the indebtedness under the New Markets Tax Credit Program to be cancelled

The fair value of the Corporation's variable rate debt is the carrying value due to the variable rates associated with the borrowings. The fair value of the Corporation's remaining fixed-rate debt is based on quoted market rates. The estimated fair value of the Corporation's total long-term debt was approximately \$277,478,000 and \$275,630,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

On February 29, 2012, the Corporation borrowed \$12,600,000 from People's Capital and Leasing Corp The loan is secured by capital expenditures related to the inpatient electronic health record system implementation (Note K) and has a fixed interest rate of 4 44 percent The loan will be repaid over a 48-month period beginning March 31, 2012

NOTE I - INCOME TAXES

The Corporation has adopted guidance relating to uncertainty in income taxes which requires entities to assess their uncertain tax positions for the likelihood that they would be overturned upon Internal Revenue Service (IRS) examination or upon examination by state taxing authorities. In accordance with this guidance, the Corporation has determined that it does not have any positions at December 31, 2011 and 2010, that it would be unable to substantiate

The Corporation has filed its tax returns for all years through December 31, 2010 The tax returns for 2008 and subsequent periods are subject to audit by taxing authorities



NOTE I - INCOME TAXES - Continued

The Corporation's for-profit affiliate, BHSA, and its subsidiaries are subject to federal and state income taxes. There was no current provision for income taxes for the year ended December 31, 2011 or the six-month period ended December 31, 2010.

At December 31, 2011, BHSA had federal net operating loss carryforwards of approximately \$58.975.000 expiring in years 2012 to 2030. Since recoverability of the net operating loss carryforwards is unlikely, the Corporation has provided a 100-percent valuation allowance for the estimated deferred tax assets of approximately \$23,628,000 at December 31, 2011.

NOTE J - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Corporation paid \$1,089,000 and \$632,000 for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively, for certain support services of the Foundation, including salaries and benefits of the staff dedicated to the Foundation. The payments of these support services are considered a donation of services and are not required to be reimbursed to the Corporation.

In addition, the Corporation received donations from the Foundation of approximately \$2,189,000 and \$730,000 for the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, respectively These donations were primarily used for charity care reimbursement and capital equipment acquisitions

The Corporation has staffing agreements with a physician practice that is owned by a trustee of the Corporation, the purpose of which is to provide staff that have the training, experience and qualifications necessary to assist physicians performing thoracic, cardiac and vascular surgery. This agreement was terminated March 31, 2012. For the year ended December 31, 2011 and the six-month period ended December 31, 2010, the Corporation incurred expenses associated with the staffing agreement totaling \$399,000 and \$227,000, respectively

NOTE K - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Citizens Hospital is subject to an agreement with the previous owner, which restricts the Corporation's ability to unilaterally sell the facility. Under this agreement, the Corporation may be required to commit additional funding prior to the transfer of the facility if the Corporation ceases to operate the facility as a not-for-profit hospital



NOTE K - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES - Continued

The Corporation maintains a self-insurance program related to its general, professional and workers' compensation liabilities. The Corporation insures its general and professional liabilities subject to various retention levels. The Corporation has accrued management's estimate of its liabilities for amounts due under these plans, including an estimate for incurred but not reported claims

A number of lawsuits have been filed naming the Corporation as a defendant. The lawsuits allege damages of various amounts related to the general and professional liability of the Corporation. While the amount of the ultimate losses cannot be determined, in the opinion of management, the losses will not differ materially from the liabilities recorded in the consolidated financial statements for such losses.

The Corporation is self-insured for its employee health and dental insurance claims The Corporation uses a third-party administrator to process claims under the plan Reserve estimates are included in accrued expenses and include the estimate for claims incurred but not reported under this program

The Tax Relief and Health Care Act of 2006 made the Recovery Audit Contractor (RAC) program permanent and mandated its nationwide expansion by 2010. This program was established by CMS to conduct postpayment reviews to detect and correct improper payments in the fee-for-service Medicare program. CMS has awarded contracts to four RACs that have implemented the permanent RAC program on a nationwide basis. Each RAC has discretion over the types of reviews and record requests it conducts as long as it follows the CMS defined statement of work. The RAC conducting audits in the state of Alabama is Connolly Healthcare. As of March 15, 2012, CMS increased the medical record limits on annual RAC requests from 1,120 to 1,784 for the four hospitals. The Corporation has evaluated the potential impact of reviews under the RAC program and believes the estimated amounts accrued in the accompanying consolidated financial statements are sufficient based on current information available.
