



Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations and Principles of Consolidation

Washington Regional Medical Center primarily earns revenues by providing a wide range of health care services to patients in Washington County. Arkansas, and surrounding areas The consolidated financial statements include accounts of the following entities, which are hereafter collectively referred to as "the Medical Center"

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2011 and 2010

Washington Regional Medical System (the Medical System) is the parent and sole member of the Hospital and primarily earns revenue by providing physician clinical and hospital services. The Medical System is also the sole member of Washington Regional Medical Services (Medical Services), Washington Regional Medical Foundation (the Foundation), Diversified Credit Services, Inc. and Eureka Regional Health. WR – NWAHV, LLC is a subsidiary of Medical Services. These additional related parties have been excluded from these financial statements.

Noncontrolling Interest

Noncontrolling interest represents the 49% member interest in the Surgery Center and the 20% member interest in the Dialysis Centers owned by outside investors. Effective January 1, 2010, the Medical Center adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards. Codification (ASC) 810-10-65, Transition Related to Statement 160, Noncontrolling Interest in Consolidated Financial Statements, an amendment of ARB No. 51 (FAS 160). Upon adoption, minority interest previously presented in the mezzanine section of the balance sheet is classified as noncontrolling interest within net assets. In addition, the consolidated changes in net assets presented in the statement of changes in net assets include the changes in net assets attributable to the noncontrolling interest. Beginning January 1, 2010, losses attributable to the noncontrolling interest are allocated to the noncontrolling interest even if the carrying amount of the noncontrolling interest is reduced below zero. Any changes in ownership after January 1, 2010, that do not result in a loss of control will be prospectively accounted for as net asset transactions.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Medical Center considers all liquid investments, other than those limited as to use, with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers

Effective July 21, 2010, the FDIC's insurance limits were permanently increased to \$250,000. At December 31, 2011, the Medical Center's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$4,029,000.

Pursuant to legislation enacted in 2010, the FDIC will fully insure all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts beginning December 31, 2010 through December 31, 2012, at all FDIC-insured institutions

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. The investment in equity investees is reported on the equity method of accounting. Other investments are valued at the lower of cost (fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value, and realized gains and losses on other investments.

Investment return that is initially restricted by donor stipulation and for which the restriction will be satisfied in the same year is included in unrestricted net assets. Other investment return is reflected in the statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include (1) assets held by trustees and (2) assets set aside by the Board of Directors (the Board) for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Medical Center are included in current assets.

Change in Accounting Principle

The Financial Accounting Standards Board recently issued Accounting Standards Updates (ASU) No 2011-07. Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue. Provision for Bad Debts and Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities. The major changes associated with ASU 2011-07 are to reclassify the provision for uncollectible accounts related to patient service revenue to be a separate deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual adjustments and discounts) in the statement of operations as well as to require enhanced disclosure about policies for recognizing revenue and assessing uncollectible amounts

The change had no effect on the prior year change in net assets

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Medical Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely)

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2011 and 2010

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Medical Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Supplies

The Medical Center states supply inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost and are depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of each asset. Assets under capital lease obligations and leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

Interest in Net Assets of Washington Regional Medical Foundation

The Foundation and the Medical Center are financially interrelated organizations. The Foundation seeks private support for and holds net assets on behalf of the Medical Center. The Medical Center accounts for its interest in the net assets of the Foundation (the Interest) in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the Interest are included in changes in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Foundation and the Medical Center are recognized as increases or decreases in the Interest.

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt Such costs are being amortized over the term of the respective debt using the effective interest method

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known

Charity Care

The Medical Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Contributions

Unconditional gifts expected to be collected within one year are reported at their net realizable value. Unconditional gifts expected to be collected in future years are initially reported at fair value determined using the discounted present value of estimated future cash flows technique. The resulting discount is amortized using the level-yield method and is reported as contribution revenue.

Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

Self-insured Employee Health Insurance Program

The Medical Center has elected to self-insure certain costs related to employee health. Costs resulting from noninsured losses are charged to income when incurred. The Medical Center has purchased insurance that limits its exposure for individual and aggregate claims. Total expense for claims for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, was \$5,049,544 and \$6,051,992, respectively.

As part of the distinct employee welfare benefit plan (the Plan), a health insurance trust fund exists to satisfy self-insured employee health claim obligations. The trust, along with any excess coverage acquired, constitutes the sole source of funds that may be used to pay the medical benefits under the Plan. No part of the principal or income of the trust can be paid to or reinvested in the Medical Center or be used for any purpose other than the exclusive benefit of employees and their dependents. Contributions for the Plan expenses are provided by the Medical Center and its covered employees. The Medical Center evaluates the costs of the Plan based on projected Plan expenses and determines the amount to be contributed by the Medical Center and the covered employees. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, the irrevocable balances on deposit in the trust fund were \$1,510.021 and \$2,196,121, respectively. These balances are not reflected in the Medical Center's financial statements.

Estimated Malpractice Costs

Prior to the adoption of ASU 2010-24, discussed in *Note* 7, an annual estimated provision was accrued for the self-insured portion of medical malpractice claims and included an estimate of the ultimate cost for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported. Upon adoption of this update, an annual estimated provision is accrued for the entire amount of medical malpractice claims considered probable and includes an estimate of the ultimate cost for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported. Potential insurance recoveries are evaluated separately

Income Taxes

The Hospital and Medical System have been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. As such, they are required to file IRS Form 990 on an annual basis. However, they are subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income. The Surgery Center, the Dialysis Centers and Rehabilitation Services are organized as Arkansas Limited Liability. Companies and treated as partnerships for income tax purposes. Taxable income or loss is reported to the individual members for inclusion in their respective tax returns. Therefore, no provision for federal and state income taxes is included in these statements. The Hospital is no longer subject to U.S. federal income tax examinations by tax authorities for income tax returns filed for years before 2008.

Excess of Revenues over Expenses

The statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers to and from affiliates for other than goods and services and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets)

Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices). Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the period ending date

Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR) Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Payment under both programs are contingent on the hospital continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the Medicare administrative contractor. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program.

The Medical Center recognizes revenue ratably over the reporting period starting at the point when management is reasonably assured it will meet all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period

In 2011, the Medical Center completed the first-year requirements under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs and has recorded revenue of approximately \$2.2 million, which is included in other revenue, within operating revenues, in the statement of operations

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2010 financial statements to conform to the 2011 financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the Independent Accountants` Report, which is the date the financial statements were issued

Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payer coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Medical Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Medical Center's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Medical Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for uncollectible accounts is presented on the statement of operations as a component of net patient revenue.

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates These payment arrangements include

Medicare—Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively-determined rates per discharge and procedure, respectively. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Defined medical education costs are paid based on a blend of prospectively-determined rates per discharge and a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital and the Dialysis Centers are reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and the Dialysis Centers and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor.

Medicaid—Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology, subject to certain cost limitations. Outpatient services rendered to Medicaid beneficiaries are paid based on fee schedules. The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicaid administrative contractor.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2011 and 2010

In addition, the Hospital receives supplemental Medicaid funds under the Arkansas Medicaid program's Upper Payment Limit (UPL) provisions. The Hospital is considered a "private hospital" under the UPL provisions and receives UPL payments based on a prorata share of a statewide pool based on Medicaid discharges. Total revenues recognized under the UPL provision were approximately \$722,000 and \$817,000 for 2011 and 2010, respectively.

In December 2009, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services approved the inpatient and outpatient sections of an amendment to the Arkansas State Medicaid Plan that establishes a provider assessment program retroactive to July 1, 2009 This program assesses a fee, initially of no more than 1% on the net patient service revenue of private hospitals, and allocates the proceeds to supplement Medicaid payments In February 2011, the program was amended to allow the assessed fee to be no more than 5 5% of net patient service revenue The federal government matches the assessment amount at a rate of approximately 3 to 1, and these amounts are allocated to private hospitals in Arkansas based on each hospital's share of the total of the private hospitals' Medicaid discharges and outpatient Medicaid payments Based on its status as a private hospital, the Hospital participates in this program and records the assessed fees and the supplemental payments as expenses and revenues in the period incurred or earned. respectively. Amounts recorded for provider assessment tax expense under this program for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, were approximately \$2.6 million and \$1.8 million, respectively. Amounts recorded for provider assessment receipts under this program were approximately \$5.4 million and \$5.5 million for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

Approximately 37% and 41% of net patient service revenue are from participation in the Medicare and state-sponsored Medicaid programs for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

The Medical Center also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, established fee schedules and percentages thereof, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2011 and 2010

The Medical Center provides discounts on all charges to uninsured patients. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, this discount was 45%. Accordingly, the Medical Center records these discounts as a reduction to net patient service revenue.

Note 6: Beneficial Interest in Net Assets of Washington Regional Medical Foundation

Washington Regional Medical Foundation, whose parent and sole member is the Medical System, was established to benefit the general public and the Medical Center. The Foundation Board of Directors determines the amount, timing and purpose of distributions of Foundation funds. The Medical Center's interest in the net assets of the Foundation is accounted for in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the interest are included in changes in net assets. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, \$1,820,047 and \$2,599,982, respectively, is recognized as the Medical Center's interest in the assets of the Foundation, which includes \$1,336,153 and \$2,573,398, respectively, of contributions received and pledges receivable by the Foundation that are donor restricted to be used for the Medical Center's purposes

Note 7: Medical Malpractice Claims

The Medical Center purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy on a fixed premium basis. In 2011, the Medical Center adopted the provisions of Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2010-24. *Health Care Entities*, which eliminates the practice of netting claim liabilities with expected insurance recoveries for balance sheet presentation. Claim liabilities are to be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. Expected recoveries are presented separately. Prior to the adoption of ASU 2010-24, accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America required a health care provider to accrue only an estimate of the malpractice claims costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported where the risk of loss had not been transferred to a financially viable insurer. There was no material impact of the ASU adoption to the Medical Center's financial statements.

Management has accrued a provision for asserted claims based on advice from legal counsel and the deductible portion of medical malpractice claims and believes the provision is adequate to cover the ultimate losses, if any, from these claims. Approximately \$371,000 and \$685,000 were accrued as liabilities as of December 2011 and 2010, respectively. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term

Washington County Lease Agreement

Under the terms of the Assignment and Lease Agreement (Lease Agreement) dated May 24, 1988, the Hospital leased from Washington County. Arkansas (the County), all then-existing property and equipment for a nominal amount for an initial term of 25 years, with two 25-year renewal options at the same terms. On November 24, 1999, the Hospital exercised the first option for an additional 25-year term, expiring May 31, 2038.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2011 and 2010

The Hospital completed construction of a new facility (North Hills) in August of 2002. The Hospital released its leasehold interest in the original facility on March 1, 2009, so the County could lease the facility to the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences for use as a local campus of the state medical school. In addition, North Hills was substituted for the original facility in the Lease Agreement. This action was taken with the consent of the County and in no way affects the terms of the May 24, 1998, Assignment and Lease Agreement between the Hospital and the County other than as noted here.

(A) Tax-exempt revenue construction bonds (the Construction Bonds) consist of hospital revenue construction bonds in the original amount of \$25,000,000 dated August 1, 2005, which bear interest at 5 0% The Construction Bonds are payable in sinking fund requirements from February 1, 2031 through February 1, 2035 All of the Construction Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after February 1, 2015 The redemption price is equal to the outstanding principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption

Washington County, Arkansas, issued the Construction Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The Construction Bonds are secured by a first mortgage on the North Hills facility, the gross receipts of the Hospital and the assets restricted under the bond indenture agreement. The Construction Bonds have not been guaranteed by the County

The indenture agreement requires that certain funds be established with the trustee Accordingly, these funds are included as assets limited as to use held by trustee in the financial statements. The indenture agreement also requires the Hospital to comply with certain restrictive covenants including minimum insurance coverage, maintaining a maximum annual debt-service coverage ratio of at least 1.2 to 1.0 and restrictions on incurrence of additional debt

(B) Tax-exempt revenue refunding bonds (the Refunding Bonds) consist of hospital revenue refunding bonds in the original amount of \$84.380.000 dated August 1, 2005, which bear interest at 3 375% to 5 000%. The Refunding Bonds are payable in annual installments through February 1, 2030. All of the Refunding Bonds still outstanding may be redeemed at the Hospital's option on or after February 1, 2015. The redemption price is equal to the outstanding principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption.

Washington County, Arkansas, issued the Refunding Bonds on behalf of the Hospital The Bonds are secured by a first mortgage on the North Hills facility, the gross receipts of the Hospital and the assets restricted under the bond indenture agreement. The Refunding Bonds have not been guaranteed by the County

Note 11: Charity Care and Community Benefit

In support of its mission, the Medical Center voluntarily provides free care to patients who lack financial resources and are deemed to be medically indigent. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue. In addition, the Medical Center provides services to other medically-indigent patients under certain government-reimbursed public and programs. Such programs pay providers amounts that are less than established charges for the services provided to the recipients, and many times the payments are less than the cost of rendering the services provided.

In addition to uncompensated charges, the Medical Center also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services that meet otherwise unfilled community needs. Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable.

Note 13: Pension Plan

The Medical Center has a defined contribution pension plan covering substantially all employees. The Board of Directors determines the amount, if any, of the Medical Center's contribution to the plan. Pension expense was \$2,269,265 and \$2,242,062 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Note 14: Related Party Transactions

Washington Regional Medical System

The Medical Center charges the Medical System for rent and various services. The Medical Center's revenues for such rent and services aggregated \$453,209 and \$361,924 in 2011 and 2010, respectively. Transfers to the Medical System of \$12,500,000 and \$11,000,000 were made during 2011 and 2010, respectively. In addition, the Medical Center has included in its financial statements accounts receivable of \$17,383 and \$105,275 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for amounts due from the Medical System. During 2011, the Medical Center determined that certain payments to the System meet recently issued IRS criteria for community benefits and began recording an operating expense for subsidy equal to the amount of the operating loss less the provision for uncollectible accounts at certain clinics. Prior to this determination, these payments were accounted for as transfers to affiliates. For the year ended December 31, 2011, the subsidy expense recorded was \$3,645,000.

Also during 2011, the System began recording the activity, including revenues and expenses, of its hospitalist and neonatology programs in its statement of operations rather than the Medical Center's The net losses for these programs during the years ending December 31, 2011 and 2010, were approximately \$2,400,000 and \$2,100,000, respectively

Washington Regional Medical Foundation

Washington Regional Medical Foundation was established to raise funds to support the operations of the Medical Center and other nonprofit health care entities. The Medical Center currently is assuming responsibility for a portion of the operating expenses of the Foundation. For the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, such amounts aggregated \$503,982 and \$465,046, respectively, and are included in operating expenses. The Medical Center charges the Foundation for various administrative services. The Medical Center's revenues for such services aggregated \$48,461 and \$45,794 in 2011 and 2010, respectively. Transfers from the Foundation of \$1,799,118 and \$1,450,000 were received by the Medical Center in 2011 and 2010, respectively. In addition, the Medical Center has included in its financial statements accounts receivable of \$9,433 and accounts payable of \$13,525 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements December 31, 2011 and 2010

Washington Regional Medical Services

During 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center advanced funds to Washington Regional Medical Services. Interest charged to Medical Services amounted to \$97,335 and \$101,578 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Medical Center leases a building from Medical Services, for which rental payments totaled \$360,443 and \$363,039 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Medical Center has included in its financial statements accounts payable of \$8,924 and accounts receivable of \$6,847 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for amounts due to Medical Services.

Washington Regional MediCorp.

The Medical Center provides various services for Washington Regional MediCorp (MediCorp) The Medical Center's revenues for such services aggregated \$150,000 in both 2011 and 2010. In addition, the Medical Center has included accounts receivable of \$60,335 and accounts payable of \$5,739 in its financial statements as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for amounts due to MediCorp

Diversified Credit Services, Inc.

Diversified Credit Services, Inc. provides collection services for the Medical Center for accounts turned over before February 17, 2008. Subsequent to that date, the Medical Center performed collection activities on all new accounts. The Medical Center's expenses for such services amounted to \$4,293 and \$21,015 in 2011 and 2010, respectively. The Medical Center has included in its financial statements accounts receivable of \$99,646 and \$113,311 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for amounts due from Diversified Credit Services, Inc.

Note 15: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

ASC Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements, defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also specifies a fair value hierarchy, which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies and inputs used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy

Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 securities include equity and fixed income mutual funds, equity securities, money market funds. U.S. Treasury obligations and others. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows and are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 2 securities include mortgage-backed securities, corporate bonds and others. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy, however, the Medical Center did not hold any Level 3 securities at December 31, 2011 or 2010.



Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Medical Center is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Medical Center's commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding performance of contracts. The Medical Center evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, approximately \$118,000 and \$1,060,000 were recorded on the balance sheets in accrued expenses for one such matter, which includes expenses expected to be incurred for litigation. The matter involves performance of a contract, and the plaintiff is seeking a substantially greater amount. During 2011, one aspect of this matter was settled, which resulted in the reduction of the accrued amount by approximately \$875,000. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term


