1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

a. Organization

Community Hospital of Anaconda (the Hospital), located in Anaconda, Montana, is a 25-bed critical access hospital (CAH) and a 62-bed nursing facility. The Hospital provides healthcare services to patients in the Dear Lodge County area. Services provided include acute care hospital, long-term nursing care, emergency room, physicians' clinics, home health, hospice, and the related ancillary procedures (imaging, laboratory, etc.). In 2004, the Hospital was awarded the *Baby-Friendly Hospital Designation*

The Community Hospital and Nursing Home of Anaconda Foundation (the Foundation) was formed in 1995. The purpose of the Foundation is to promote and support the Hospital. The activities of the Foundation include fundraising and administration of donated funds. The Foundation's activity is consolidated with the Hospital because the Hospital is the sole member of the Foundation.

b. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Principles of consolidation – The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital and the Foundation All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Basis of presentation – The Hospital is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets

Cash and cash equivalents – Cash and cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use

Investments and investment income – Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including interest, dividends, and realized gains and losses on investments) is included in the excess of revenue unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenue unless the investments are trading securities.

Net investment income in 2011 consisted of interest and dividends of \$123,804. Net investment income in 2010 consisted of interest and dividends of \$88,121 and realized gains on sales of investments of \$582.

1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued):

b. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Fair value measurements – Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e., the "exit price") in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date

The Hospital classified its investments as of December 31, 2011, based upon an established fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurement)

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below

- Level 1: Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities.
- Level 2: Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments without quoted market prices, but for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly.
- Level 3: Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable

Patient accounts receivable – Receivables arising from revenue from services to patients are reduced by allowances for uncollectible accounts and contractual adjustments based on experience, third-party contractual reimbursement arrangements, and any unusual circumstances which may affect the ability of patients to meet their obligations. Accounts deemed uncollectible are charged against these allowances. Accounts are deemed uncollectible when the Hospital has followed its collection procedures for 120 days after initially billing the patient and no payment activity has occurred

Prepaid expenses – Prepaid expenses are expenses paid during the year relating to expenses incurred in future periods. Prepaid expenses are amortized over the expected benefit period of the related expense. Prepaid expenses include prepaid professional fees, prepaid insurance, prepaid dues, and prepaid maintenance contracts.

Assets limited or restricted as to use – Such assets include assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes

1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued):

b. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Property and equipment – Property and equipment acquisitions of \$5,000 or more each and having useful lives of at least two years are capitalized at cost

Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed on the straight-line method. A half-year convention is used for equipment. Under this convention, one-half year's depreciation is taken in the year of asset acquisition and one-half year's depreciation is taken in the year of asset disposal. Buildings and building improvements are depreciated for the number of months in use. Equipment under capital lease is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the financial statements.

Ranges of depreciable lives are as follows

Buildings and improvements 5 to 40 years Equipment 3 to 20 years

Inventories – Inventories are stated at the lower of cost (first in, first out) or market The major categories of supply inventories are surgical supplies, pharmaceuticals, and other medical and nonmedical supplies used in the Hospital's operations

Excess of unrestricted revenues, gains, and other support over expenses – The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of unrestricted revenues. gains, and other support over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses are consistent with industry practice and include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and capital contributions and grants

Temporarily and permanently restricted net assets – Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity. When the Hospital has both restricted and unrestricted resources available to finance a particular program, it is the Hospital's policy to use restricted resources before unrestricted resources.

Net patient service revenue – Such revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Subsequent events – The Hospital has evaluated subsequent events through April 23, 2012, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued

Federal income tax – The Hospital and Foundation are not-for-profit corporations and are exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code Accordingly, no provision for income tax is necessary. The Hospital evaluates uncertain tax positions whereby the effect of the uncertainty would be recorded if the outcome were considered probable and reasonably estimable. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital has no uncertain tax positions requiring accrual

3. Net Patient Service Revenue:

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payment at amounts different from its established rates. Contractual adjustments under third-party reimbursement programs represent the difference between the Hospital's established rates for services and amounts reimbursed by third-party payors. A summary of payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

- Medicare The Hospital has been designated a critical access hospital by Medicare The Hospital is reimbursed by Medicare for inpatient and outpatient services and hospital based clinic visits and services on a cost basis as defined and limited by the Medicare program. The Medicare program's administrative procedures preclude final determination of amounts due to the Hospital for such services until three years after the Hospital's cost reports are audited or otherwise reviewed and settled upon by the Medicare intermediary. The hospital is reimbursed for skilled nursing facility services under a prospective payment system.
- Medicaid The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with
 final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports. Medicaid nursing
 home services are reimbursed based on costs as defined and limited by the Medicaid
 program. Medicaid rural health clinic services are paid on a prospectively set rate per
 visit.

3. Net Patient Service Revenue (continued):

Blue Cross Blue Shield – Most services rendered to Blue Cross/Blue Shield subscribers
are reimbursed at percentage discounts off ordinary charges or fee schedule rates

The Hospital also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements is discounts from established charges

Revenue from Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 49% and 9%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient service revenue for the year ended December 31, 2011, and 53% and 7%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient service revenue for the year ended December 31, 2010

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient service revenue increased by approximately \$65,000 and decreased by approximately \$90,000 in the years ended. December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, due to differences between original estimates and final settlements.

The Hospital provides charity care to patients who are financially unable to pay for the health care services they receive. The Hospital's policy is not to pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care. Accordingly, the Hospital does not report these amounts in net operating revenues or in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Hospital determines the costs associated with providing charity care by aggregating the applicable direct and indirect costs, including salaries, wages and benefits, supplies, and other operating expenses, based on data from its costing system. The costs of caring for charity care patients for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, were approximately \$427,000 and \$245,000, respectively.

4. Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments:

The Hospital recognized Medicare electronic health records (EHR) incentive payments during the year ended December 31, 2011. The EHR incentive payments are provided to incent hospitals to become meaningful users of EHR technology, not to reimburse providers for the cost of acquiring EHR assets. EHR incentive payments are therefore reported as operating revenue.

The Hospital recognizes the Medicare incentive payment on the date that the Hospital has successfully complied with meaningful use criteria during the entire EHR reporting period. The Hospital attested to meaningful use with CMS on September 30, 2011. The Medicare EHR reporting period is through September 30 of each year.

The Medicare incentive payment recognized is an estimate and subject to audit by CMS. The Medicare EHR incentive payment is based on the discharges reported in the prior year Medicare cost report and the undepreciated cost of the EHR equipment submitted to CMS. The final payment will be based on discharges reported in the current Medicare cost report. A Medicare incentive payment of \$448,610 was recognized as revenue in 2011.

9. Pension Plan:

The Hospital provides retirement benefits through the Community Hospital of Anaconda 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (the Plan), a defined contribution plan. This Plan covers all eligible employees who are not covered by union pension plans. Contributions are based on a discretionary percentage of wages and salaries. The contribution rate for 2011 was 3 00%. Employees are eligible to participate in the Plan after completing one year of service and attaining the age of 21. The profit-sharing plan expense for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, was \$238,992 and \$201,593, respectively. Wells Fargo Management and Trust Company has been selected as the custodian of the Plan's assets. The Hospital is the administrator for the Plan.

Employees represented by the Teamsters Union Local #2 (the Teamsters Union) do not participate in the Plan, but instead receive pension benefits through the Western Conference of Teamsters Pension Trust Fund The Hospital makes monthly payments into the fund at \$1 62 and \$1 59 per hour for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, for each employee represented by the Teamsters Union The Hospital's expenses for these payments for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, were \$39,270 and \$37,908, respectively

Employees represented by the International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 400 (the Engineers' Union), do not participate in the Plan, but instead receive pension benefits through the Central Pension Fund of the Engineers' Union. The Hospital makes monthly payments into the fund at \$4.00 per compensated hour for each employee represented by the Engineers' Union. The Hospital's contribution rate was \$3.75 per compensated hour until July 2010. The Hospital's expenses for these payments for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, were \$42,717 and \$41,033, respectively.

10. Contingencies:

Medical malpractice – The Hospital obtains medical malpractice insurance through Yellowstone Insurance Exchange (the Exchange) The Exchange offers the Hospital a professional and general liability policy on a "claims made" basis with primary limits of \$1,000,000 per claim and an annual aggregate limit of \$3,000,000 The policy has a \$25,000 deductible per claim. The renewal date of the policy is January 1, 2012

No liability has been accrued for future coverage of acts, if any, occurring in this or prior years Also, it is possible that claims may exceed coverage available in any given year

The Exchange is a reciprocal risk retention group formed in the state of Vermont, pursuant to the *Federal Liability Risk Retention Act of 1986*, to form a captive insurance company with several unrelated hospitals located in Montana and other northwestern states. All profits and losses from the operation of the Exchange are allocated by the Exchange's Subscriber Advisory Committee, based on premiums paid, exposure rates, and ownership levels. For financial-reporting purposes, the Hospital accounts for its investment in the Exchange under the equity method of accounting for investments in common stock. The equity method is used in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for multi-provider captive insurance companies.

The Hospital recorded an unrealized loss of \$168.003 in 2011 and unrealized gain of \$270.382 in 2010 on this investment

Litigation – The Hospital is, from time-to-time, involved in litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the course of business Management estimates these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Hospital's future financial position or results from operations

Self insurance – The Hospital partially self-insures the cost of employee healthcare benefits and purchases annual, stop-loss insurance coverage for claims in excess of \$70,000 per claim. Additionally, the Hospital funds the plan to its aggregate annual obligation, it does not accrue any liability for incurred but not reported claims.

Industry regulations – The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditations, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicard fraud and abuse. Government activity continues with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by health care providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed. Management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with fraud and abuse statutes, as well as other applicable government laws and regulations.

While no regulatory inquiries have been made, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions known or unasserted at this time

Health care reform – As a result of recently enacted federal health care reform legislation. substantial changes are anticipated in the United States of America's health care system. Such legislation includes numerous provisions affecting the delivery of health care services, the financing of health care costs, reimbursement of health care providers, and the legal obligations of health insurers, providers, and employers. These provisions are currently slated to take effect at specified times over approximately the next decade. The federal health care reform legislation does not affect the 2011 financial statements.

11. Concentrations of Risk:

Patient accounts receivable – The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from patients and third-party payors at December 31, 2011 and 2010, was as follows

Physicians – The Hospital is dependent on local physicians practicing in its service area to provide admissions and utilize hospital services on an outpatient basis. A decrease in the number of physicians providing these services or change in their utilization patterns may have an adverse effect on hospital operations.

Cash and cash equivalents – As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital maintains deposits in accounts with major financial institutions which exceed the \$250,000 Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation limit. These financial institutions have strong credit ratings, and management believes that credit risk related to these deposits is minimal.

Collective bargaining units – The Hospital has entered into contracts with seven different labor unions. The agreements are effective through dates ranging from 2012 to 2013. Approximately 53% and 55% of the Hospital's payroll expenses were for union employees for the years ended. December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The union agreements cover nurses and employees in the business office, facilities maintenance, dietary, and housekeeping departments.

13. Deferred Montana State Bed Tax Revenue:

In 2003, the Montana State Legislature approved using a portion of the bed taxes paid by the hospitals along with federal matching funding to help reimburse costs incurred while treating Medicaid, uninsured, and underinsured patients. The Hospital's share of the receivable was \$637.890 and \$-0- at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Deferred revenue was \$318.945 and \$511.967 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.
