

We have audited the accompanying special-purpose balance sheets of Exempla Healthcare as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, and the related special-purpose statements of operations and changes in net assets, and cash flows for the years then ended. These special-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of Exempla Healthcare's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these special-purpose financial statements based on our audits.

The accompanying special-purpose financial statements were prepared for the purpose of complying with the Joint Operating Agreement among Exempla, Inc., Community First Foundation, Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth Health System, and Saint Joseph Hospital and are not in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, as the beneficial interest of the Saint Joseph Hospital Foundation is excluded from these financial statements, as discussed in Note 1.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the special-purpose financial position of Exempla Healthcare at December 31, 2011 and 2010, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Boards of Directors and management of Exempla, Inc., Community First Foundation, Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth Health System, and Saint Joseph Hospital, and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

1. Description of Organization and Basis of Presentation

Organization

Exempla Healthcare (the System) is a health care delivery system formed on January 1, 1998, by a Joint Operating Agreement (JOA) among Exempla Inc. (Exempla), Community First Foundation (CFF, formerly LMC Community Foundation), Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth Health System (SCLHS), and Saint Joseph Hospital (SJH). The JOA provides for, among other things, the joint management by Exempla of the combined operations of Exempla and SJH. The JOA establishes an arrangement whereby the gains and losses of Exempla and SJH are shared equally. Exempla entered into a long-term management agreement with SCLHS and SJH containing the specific terms of Exempla's management of the operations of SJH. Under a related document, the JOA can be terminated by Exempla, SCLHS, or CFF if the System fails to meet certain financial ratios for three consecutive years. The last measurement date was December 2010, and the System met the required financial ratios.

Exempla is a Colorado nonprofit corporation exempt from federal income tax on its related income under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3). Exempla has two members, CFF, a Colorado nonprofit corporation, and SCLHS, a Kansas nonprofit corporation, both of which are also described in Section 501(c)(3) and are exempt from federal income tax on related income under Section 501(a).

SCLHS and CFF each has the power to appoint one-half of the members of the Board of Directors of Exempla, and SCLHS has the direct power to appoint management after consultation with Exempla's Board of Directors and to implement SCLHS's policies and procedures. In addition, SCLHS has reserved powers to approve budgets, strategic plans, debt financing, acquisition, or sale of assets and dissolution of Exempla.

Effective April 14, 2010, the members of Exempla agreed to an amendment of the JOA that states that on June 30, 2014, or earlier under certain circumstances, CFF's interest in the JOA and other rights relating to Exempla would be terminated at a price not to exceed \$280 million. The circumstances that would cause the termination to be earlier than June 30, 2014, have not been met as of December 31, 2011.

Exempla is the sole economic member of Exempla Good Samaritan Medical Center, LLC, an entity formed to construct and operate Exempla Good Samaritan Medical Center (EGSMC). Exempla has entered into a management agreement with EGSMC under which Exempla employs all individuals and charges EGSMC for the costs of those employees working at EGSMC and for

a portion of system expenses. SJH, a Colorado nonprofit corporation exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3), is owned by SCLHS. Under the JOA, Exempla employs all individuals and charges SJH for the cost of those employees working at SJH and for a portion of System expenses.

Exempla is also the sole economic member of Exempla Partners, LLC (Exempla Partners), an entity formed to further develop and expand Exempla's community-based allied medical services. Exempla Partners sold its interest in two joint ventures, which were accounted for under the equity method and were not material, in November 2010.

Collectively, the System includes, as its main components, Exempla Lutheran Medical Center (LMC), a 589-licensed-bed acute care hospital, including an 80-bed psychiatric facility, plus a 120-bed skilled nursing facility and 100 senior apartments; SJH, a 565-licensed-bed acute care hospital; EGSMC, a 234-licensed-bed acute care hospital; the practices and clinics staffed by physicians employed by Exempla; and Exempla Partners.

Basis of Presentation

The System's special-purpose financial statements include Exempla (which includes LMC and the practices and clinics staffed by physicians employed by Exempla, and the consolidated subsidiaries of EGSMC and Exempla Partners) and SJH. All intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

In accordance with the JOA, the accompanying special-purpose financial statements exclude the System's interest in the net assets held by the Saint Joseph Hospital Foundation (the Foundation) on its behalf. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) require that an asset be reported for this interest in the balance sheets and that the change in the interest be reported in the statements of operations and changes in net assets. However, because the interest in net assets held by the Foundation has been excluded from these financial statements, they are determined to be special-purpose financial statements not consistent with the requirements of GAAP. Inclusion of those items under GAAP would have increased total assets and temporarily restricted net assets by approximately \$10.3 million and \$10.0 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The change in net assets under GAAP would have increased approximately \$0.3 million and \$0.8 million for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of special-purpose financial statements in conformity with the JOA requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The System provides care to patients covered by various third-party payors such as Medicare and Medicaid, private insurance companies, and health maintenance organizations (HMOs). Amounts earned under these third-party contractual arrangements are primarily at fixed rates, which, for Medicare and Medicaid, are updated annually by the federal and state governments, respectively. Contractual arrangements with insurance companies and HMOs are negotiated periodically for future years. Management continually monitors and adjusts its reserves and allowances associated with these revenues and receivables.

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. The System grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. Possible credit losses are provided for in the System's allowance for uncollectible accounts and contractual adjustments. Adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. Changes in estimates of third-party settlements increased net patient service revenue by \$2.5 million and \$1.5 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively. Settlements of the Medicare and Medicaid cost reports for 2008 through 2011 have not been finalized; however, management believes that adequate provision has been made for the impact of future settlements.

Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 10% and 11% of the System's net patient service revenue for 2011 and 2010, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare program are complex and subject to interpretation. Management believes that it is substantially in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations, and is not aware of any

pending or threatened investigations involving allegations of potential wrongdoing. Compliance with other Medicare laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation. As a result, there is a reasonable possibility that the recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

EHR Incentive Revenue

Included in other revenue for the year ended December 31, 2011, was Electronic Health Records (EHR) incentive reimbursement (EHR Revenue) of approximately \$7.0 million, calculated based on 2011 data, for the Medicare federal fiscal year 2011. Approximately \$8.1 million was received during 2011 from Medicare for this EHR reimbursement based on calculations from 2010 cost report data. The System recognized a liability to Medicare for \$1.1 million for the estimated 2011 cost report settlement that will occur during 2012. EHR Revenue is attributable to the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (the HITECH Act), which was enacted into law on February 17, 2009, as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). The HITECH Act includes provisions designed to increase the use of EHR by both physicians and hospitals. Beginning with federal fiscal year 2011, and extending through federal fiscal year 2016, eligible hospitals and critical access hospitals (CAHs) participating in the Medicare and Medicaid programs are eligible for reimbursement incentives based on successfully demonstrating meaningful use of their certified EHR technology. Conversely, those hospitals that do not successfully demonstrate meaningful use of EHR technology are subject to payment penalties or downward adjustments to their Medicare payments. On July 13, 2010, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) released final meaningful use regulations. Meaningful use criteria are divided into three distinct stages: I, II and III. The final rules currently in effect specify the stage I criteria for physicians, eligible hospitals, and CAHs necessary to qualify for incentive payments; calculation of the incentive payment amounts; payment adjustments under Medicare for covered professional services and inpatient hospital services; and other program participation requirements. The System accounts for EHR Revenue under a governmental grant model and recognizes revenue when there is reasonable assurance that the System will comply with the conditions attached to the incentive payments and that the incentive payments will be received. At December 31, 2011, the System also accrued \$1.3 million and \$0.4 million of estimated Medicare and Medicaid, respectively, EHR Revenue for the three months ended December 31, 2011. Final settlement of these amounts will be determined upon settlement of the cost reports for the year ended December 31, 2012.

Charity and Uncompensated Care

The System accepts all patients regardless of their ability to pay. A patient is classified as a charity patient in accordance with established policies of the System. Essentially, these policies define charity services as those services for which no payment or nominal payment is anticipated, and are designed to assist those patients who are unable to pay for all, or part, of their health care expenses. Because the System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. The costs and expenses incurred in providing charity care services are included in the System's operating expenses and were approximately \$35.1 million and \$31.1 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively. The System estimates the costs of charity care by calculating a ratio of costs to gross charges and applying that ratio to the uncompensated gross charges associated with providing care to charity patients. The System received \$11.6 million during 2011 to subsidize charity services provided.

Additionally, the System accepts patients who are covered by governmental indigent programs. Such indigent programs typically remit amounts less than costs.

Excess of Revenue Over Expenses

The special-purpose statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenue over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses include contributions from related organizations and changes in the funded status of the defined benefit plan (see Note 9).

Contributions and Net Assets

Contributions received from donors are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Gifts are reported as temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that restrict the use of the gift as to time or purpose. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or the specific purpose is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets. Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are recorded at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give are recorded at fair value when the gift becomes unconditional. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying special-purpose financial statements.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The System considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. These investments consist of money market funds and other cash equivalents. Included in cash and cash equivalents is the System's interest in SCLHS's pooled cash arrangement.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, patient accounts receivable, assets limited as to use, accounts payable, and long-term debt. The carrying amounts reported in the accompanying special-purpose balance sheets for cash and cash equivalents, patient accounts receivable, assets limited as to use, accounts payable, and variable-rate long-term debt approximate fair value. Management's estimate of the fair value of the other financial instruments is described in Note 8.

Included in net receivables is the allowance for uncollectible receivables. The allowance for uncollectible receivables is based upon management's assessment of historical and expected net collections and takes into consideration historical business and economic conditions, trends in health care coverage, and other collection indicators. Management periodically assesses the adequacy of the allowances for uncollectible accounts based upon historical write-off experience

by payor category. The results of these assessments are used to modify, as necessary, the provision for bad debts and to establish appropriate allowances for uncollectible net patient accounts receivable.

Inventories

Inventories, which consist of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals, are stated at cost as determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include investments of assets held by trustees for debt service, a deferred compensation trust fund, and a medical malpractice self-insurance trust reserve fund. These investments are reported at fair value.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at historical cost, except for donated items, which are recorded at estimated fair value at the date of contribution. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, which range from 5 to 40 years for buildings, 5 to 30 years for building improvements, and 3 to 20 years for furniture and equipment. Leasehold improvements are amortized on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the useful life of the improvement or the term of the lease.

Unamortized computer software development costs were \$39.1 million and \$46.1 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Amortization expense incurred for capitalized computer software costs was \$9.1 million and \$10.1 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The System periodically evaluates property, equipment, and certain other intangible assets to determine whether assets may have been impaired. During 2011, the System received board approval to begin work on a replacement hospital for SJH, which is expected to open at the beginning of 2015. As a result, the remaining useful life of the building and equipment assets was re-evaluated during 2011. Due to the change in estimate in 2011, additional depreciation on

Related-Party Transactions

SCLHS owns and controls the Midtown Medical Centers I & II (Midtown). Midtown functions as a medical office building, leasing space to physician practices and certain operating departments of SJH. The lease fees charged to SJH and Exempla for this space totaled \$0.7 million and \$1.3 million in 2011 and 2010.

The System purchases medical malpractice insurance coverage from SCLHS, as discussed in Note 10.

Notes payable to SCLHS totaled \$324.0 million and \$331.0 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Interest payable to SCLHS totaled \$6.5 million and \$8.0 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

During 2011, SCLHS provided certain management and other services to the System. The System recognized \$3.5 million in 2011 for these services within supplies, purchased services, and other expenses. During 2010, SCLHS employed certain senior executives of the System and charged the System monthly for the management services of those executives. The System recognized \$1.9 million in 2010 for these management services within supplies, purchased services, and other expenses.

The System purchased SCLHS's interest in a medical parking garage during 2010 for \$4.0 million, which was SCLHS's carrying value in the asset at the time of the purchase. In addition, SCLHS periodically purchases services and other items on behalf of the System. Such costs are reimbursed by the System monthly. Accounts payable to SCLHS totaled \$3.1 million and \$5.4 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and included management services, the amount payable for the purchase of the medical parking garage, and reimbursement due for other purchases on behalf of the System. This amount is recognized within accounts payable at December 31, 2011, in the accompanying special-purpose balance sheets.

The System made equity contributions to SCLHS of \$0.4 million and \$1.6 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Income Taxes

The System accounts for uncertainty in tax positions in accordance with Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 740, *Income Taxes*, which prescribes criteria for the financial statement recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. ASC 740 also provides guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure, and transition. Management has determined that there are no material uncertain tax positions as of December 31, 2011 and 2010. Tax years 2008 through 2011 remain subject to examination by federal and state tax jurisdictions.

Reclassification

Certain prior-year amounts have been reclassified to conform to the current-year presentation.

Adoption of Accounting Pronouncements

In August 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued guidance that requires health care entities to use cost as the measurement basis for charity care disclosures and defines cost as the direct and indirect costs of providing charity care. The amended disclosure requirements were adopted in 2011. The Charity and Uncompensated Care section previously within this footnote reflects the amended disclosure requirements, and the costs of caring for charity care patients in prior periods disclosed in this footnote have been restated. Since the new guidance amends disclosure requirements only, its adoption did not impact the System's special-purpose balance sheets, statements of operations and changes in net assets, or statements of cash flows.

In August 2010, new accounting guidance was issued that clarifies that health care entities should not net expected insurance recoveries against a related claim liability. In addition, the claim liability is determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. A cumulative-effect adjustment is to be recognized in the opening net assets in the period of adoption if a difference exists between any liabilities and insurance receivables recorded as a result of applying this new guidance. The System adopted this guidance effective January 1, 2011. There was no impact to the System's special-purpose financial statements.

New Accounting Guidance Not Yet Applicable

In July 2011, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-7, Health Care Entities (Topic 954): Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities (ASU 2011-7). In accordance with ASU 2011-7, the System will be required to present its provision for doubtful accounts related to patient service revenue as a deduction from revenue, similar to contractual discounts. Accordingly, the System's revenue will be required to be reported net of both contractual discounts as well as its provision for doubtful accounts related to patient service revenue. Additionally, ASU 2011-7 will require the System to make certain additional disclosures designed to help users understand how contractual discounts and bad debts affect recorded revenue in both interim and annual financial statements. ASU 2011-7 is required to be applied retrospectively and is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2011, and interim periods within those fiscal years. Early adoption is permitted; however, the System did not early adopt. The adoption of ASU 2011-7 is not expected to impact the System's financial condition, results of operations, or cash flows; however, it will change the presentation of the

System's revenue and expenses on its statement of operations and changes in net assets and will result in additional disclosure.

Subsequent Events

The System accounts for subsequent events in accordance with ASC 855, Subsequent Events, which establishes general standards of accounting for and disclosure of events that occur after the balance sheet date but before the financial statements are available to be issued. The System has evaluated subsequent events through April 25, 2012, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. Relationship With Kaiser Permanente

During 2002, EGSMC signed a multiyear agreement with a Kaiser Permanente affiliate, specifying the terms under which EGSMC would provide hospital services to Kaiser Permanente members beginning in 2005. Among other things, the agreement specifies payment terms and termination conditions. The agreement contains certain financial conditions relating to the operation of the hospital and provides that breach of the financial conditions would give Kaiser Permanente certain rights, including the right to purchase the hospital at a specified purchase price. Management believes that EGSMC was not in breach of the financial conditions as of December 31, 2011.

A Kaiser Permanente affiliate is also a noneconomic member of EGSMC, giving it certain rights to approve dissolution, reorganization, or voluntary bankruptcy. During 2011 and 2010, certain payments from Kaiser Permanente under the agreement represent advances from Kaiser Permanente and are recorded as subordinated debt (see Note 4).

In 2011, Exempla signed multiyear agreements with a Kaiser Permanente affiliate that specify the terms under which SJH provides hospital services to Kaiser Permanente. Among other things, the agreements specify payment terms and termination conditions.

On April 14, 2010, Exempla, along with EGSMC, signed a Restricted Affiliate agreement to become participants in SCLHS's combined credit structure. This involved issuance of debt under SCLHS's Master Trust Indenture (MTI), amended and restated as of January 1, 1994. SJH is also a Restricted Affiliate under the terms of the MTI. SCLHS is the sole member of the SCLHS Obligated Group under the terms of the MTI. Under the terms of the MTI, debt can be incurred for which the SCLHS Obligated Group is jointly and severally liable. As of December 31, 2011, the outstanding indebtedness under the MTI was \$1,343.1 million, exclusive of the original issue discount. In addition, as of December 31, 2011, there were also guarantees of indebtedness by SCLHS outstanding under the MTI of approximately \$36.6 million. At December 31, 2011, the

SCLHS Obligated Group had unrestricted net assets of \$2,407.0 million, and for the year ended December 31, 2011, had operating revenue of \$2,620.0 million with net income of \$3.4 million. The SCLHS Obligated Group has agreed to certain covenants, including, among other things, a specified debt service coverage ratio, restrictions on issuance of certain debt outside of the MTI, and a restriction on asset dispositions in excess of specified amounts. The consolidated results of the SCLHS Obligated Group and Restricted Affiliates are used to determine compliance with certain covenants of the MTI.

It is the practice of SCLHS to incur indebtedness under the provisions of the Master Trust Indenture and to subsequently reloan the proceeds to its affiliates via an intercompany note for qualified tax-exempt expenditures or to refinance existing indebtedness.

On May 20, 2010, SCLHS issued Series 2010 tax-exempt revenue bonds, of which \$267.9 million was loaned to the System for the purpose of refunding the Exempla, Inc. 2002 Series A bonds, totaling approximately \$49.0 million; the EGSMC 2002 Series A bonds, totaling approximately \$158.4 million; the SJH 1994 note payable to SCLHS, totaling approximately \$26.9 million; and the SJH 2003 note payable to SCLHS, totaling approximately \$27.0 million. The total amount of the bond issuance was \$1.0 billion.

The refinancing of the Exempla, Inc. 2002 Series A bonds and the EGSMC 2002 Series A bonds resulted in an in-substance legal defeasance of those liabilities. The System transferred funds of \$222.5 million to an irrevocable defeasance trust, and the cash flows from those assets approximate the scheduled interest and principal payments of the debt that was extinguished, including redemption premiums of \$3.6 million. The System recognized a loss on defeasance of \$17.4 million, which included the purchase of \$10.3 million in securities to pre-fund future scheduled interest payments of the debt through the irrevocable defeasance trust, the redemption premiums, and the write-off of the unamortized original issue discounts and issue costs of \$3.5 million.

The refinancing of the SJH 1994 note payable to SCLHS resulted in an equity transfer to SCLHS of \$0.6 million, which was the carrying value of unamortized original issue discount and issue costs at the time of the refinancing.

In connection with the Restricted Affiliate agreement, during 2010, the Exempla, Inc. 2002 Series B and the Exempla, Inc. 2009 Series A bonds were transferred to the SCLHS Master Trust Indenture after the Exempla Master Trust Indenture was released. The System made an equity

transfer of \$1.0 million to SCLHS, which was the carrying value of the unamortized original issue discount and issue costs at the time of change in obligor. The 2002B and 2009A notes payable to SCLHS bear interest at a variable rate based on the rate at which the Exempla, Inc. 2002 Series B and 2009 Series A revenue bonds could be sold at par. The interest rate was approximately 0.3% for both notes at December 31, 2010.

On June 13, 2011, SCLHS issued Series 2011 tax-exempt refunding bonds of approximately \$62.6 million, which were loaned to the System as the 2011A note payable to SCLHS for the purpose of refinancing the 2002B and 2009A notes payable to SCLHS. This transaction resulted in an equity transfer to SCLHS of \$0.4 million, which represented the issuance costs derived from the refinancing. The interest rate of the 2011A note payable to SCLHS was approximately 0.7% at December 31, 2011.

During 1994, SCLHS issued Series 1994 tax-exempt revenue bonds (the Bonds), of which \$42.0 million, exclusive of an original issue discount of \$1.7 million, was loaned to SJH for the purpose of financing qualified capital expenditures. As a result, the unsecured note payable between SCLHS and SJH was established. During 2010, this note was paid off with the proceeds of the 2010 note payable to SCLHS.

In 2003, SJH borrowed an additional \$30.0 million from SCLHS, at 5.65% interest, with payments amortized over 30 years. In connection with the loan, Exempla agreed to make specified levels of capital expenditures at SJH through 2007; this obligation has been met. During 2010, this note was paid off with the proceeds of the 2010 note payable to SCLHS.

Under the terms of the EGSMC revenue bond indenture, EGSMC was liable for all obligations issued thereunder. EGSMC agreed to certain covenants, including establishing debt service funds, restrictions on asset dispositions in excess of specified amounts, and restrictions on additional indebtedness. These bonds were secured by EGSMC's revenue and by a mortgage on the majority of EGSMC's property. The bonds were nonrecourse to Exempla. The various bond documents required that certain funds be established and controlled by a trustee to satisfy debt service requirements for as long as any of the bonds remain outstanding. Under terms of the agreement with Kaiser Permanente described in Note 3, EGSMC was required to refinance the bonds before January 15, 2013. EGSMC satisfied this obligation during 2010.

Through the EGSMC bond documents, Exempla loaned EGSMC \$120.0 million and, under the terms of the JOA and in connection with their loan, SJH loaned Exempla \$60.0 million. Exempla loaned an additional \$3.0 million to EGSMC in 2008. The loan from Exempla to EGSMC accrues interest at 6%, is subordinated to EGSMC's revenue bonds, and payment of interest and principal is dependent on EGSMC meeting certain financial ratios. The loan from SJH to Exempla also accrues interest at 6%. These loans are eliminated in the special-purpose financial statements.

EGSMC's multiyear agreement with a Kaiser Permanente affiliate provides for certain capital and operational funding through a subordinated note payable, with a November 2032 maturity date. The note accrues interest at 6%. Payment of interest and principal is dependent on EGSMC meeting certain financial ratios. The note was subordinate to the EGSMC revenue bonds. The note payable provides for a maximum principal amount of \$18.0 million.

During 2007, the System entered into a license agreement with Epic Systems Corporation to access program property for electronic medical record technology. This transaction was recorded as a capital lease and was discounted at 5.4%. Under the terms of the agreement, Exempla will pay \$9.2 million over the six-year term of the agreement, including \$1.3 million in interest costs and \$1.5 million to convert the license agreement to a perpetual agreement at the end of the lease term. Amortization on assets recorded under capital leases is included within depreciation expense.

The System's interest costs were \$14.9 million and \$17.1 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively. Of this amount, \$0.6 million and \$3.8 million was capitalized in 2011 and 2010, respectively, for hospital facility construction by SJH and LMC and other major capital projects. Interest paid, net of interest capitalized, was \$15.5 million and \$7.9 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Rent expense under operating leases was \$11.0 million and \$13.1 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Exempla estimates fair value of its outstanding bonds. The fair value of the 2010 note payable to SCLHS was approximately \$295.5 million and \$267.3 million at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, based on quoted market prices for bonds with similar terms and maturities. The 2011A, 2009A, and 2002B notes payable to SCLHS are variable-rate issues, and their rates are set so as to price the bonds at par at each interest reset date. Accordingly, their fair value approximates their carrying value.

5. Significant Future Commitments

In 2006, SJH discovered life-safety code violations in its north and south patient towers. In late 2006, ESJH notified the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), the Joint Commission, and the Denver Fire Department of such findings, along with an action plan to mitigate the issues, which was approved by the various agencies. Subsequent to that approval, SJH revised its action plan, calling for a replacement of the hospital (rather than construction of additional rooms on the existing site). CMS has granted an extension for the use of the tower

rooms through December 2014. SJH is currently engaged in a major construction project to build the replacement hospital with total contractually committed expenditures of \$201.2 million and estimated total project costs of \$623 million. Spending on this project through December 31, 2011, totaled \$47.1 million. The remaining expenditures will be incurred through December 2014.

Exempla has guaranteed \$3.3 million of debt on an equity method joint venture, which expires on November 1, 2017, or earlier under certain circumstances. The maximum potential amount of future payments that Exempla could be required to make under the guarantee is \$3.2 million. Exempla receives an annual fee for this guarantee. Exempla has also guaranteed repayment of unamortized tenant improvements of an office space lease of an equity method joint venture, which expires on October 31, 2016. The maximum potential amount of future payments that Exempla could be required to make under the guarantee is \$0.5 million.

6. Letters of Credit and Surety Bonds

Exempla has executed one letter of credit totaling \$0.2 million and one surety bond totaling \$1.1 million, both of which have been issued to certain beneficiaries.

All funds invested in the pooled investments program are held in a program sponsored by SCLHS. All investments in the program are professionally managed under the administration of SCLHS. 8. Fair Value Measurement

The System follows the methods of fair value measurement as described in ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, to value its financial assets and liabilities. As defined in ASC 820, fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In order to increase consistency and comparability in fair value measurements, ASC 820 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes observable and unobservable inputs used to measure fair value into three broad levels, which are described below:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for assets or liabilities. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs.

Level 2: Observable prices that are based on inputs not quoted on active markets, but corroborated by market data.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs are used when little or no market data is available. The fair value hierarchy gives the lowest priority to Level 3 inputs.

In determining fair value, the System utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs to the extent possible. The System also considers counterparty credit risk in its assessment of fair value.

9. Pension Plans

Exempla employees participate in a defined contribution plan (the Exempla Plan) covering substantially all employees of Exempla. The Exempla Plan provides, among other things, that the employer may contribute 3% to 6% based upon years of employment, as well as match up to 2%

of wages of employee contributions to a separate 403(b) plan. The System expensed approximately \$19.6 million and \$19.1 million for contributions to the Exempla Plan for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Prior to January 1, 1998, the predecessor to Exempla had a defined benefit pension plan (the Prior Plan), which covered substantially all of its employees. The benefits were based on years of service and employees' final average compensation. Benefits under the Prior Plan have been frozen. Exempla's funding policy is to contribute annually the minimum amount under the requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974. Contributions are currently intended to provide for benefits attributed for services rendered through January 1, 1998.

Exempla recognizes the funded status of the Prior Plan as an asset or liability in its special-purpose balance sheets and recognizes changes in the funded status through changes in unrestricted net assets in the year in which the changes occur. Exempla recognized a decrease to the Prior Plan's funded status of \$6.3 million and \$0.1 million in 2011 and 2010, respectively, through unrestricted net assets.

At the end of 2011, Exempla was in the process of liquidating pension assets for a transfer between trustees. Therefore, the allocation of investments at the end of 2011 does not approximate the target allocation.

Exempla employs a total return investment approach whereby a mix of equities and fixed-income investments is used to maximize the long-term return of plan assets for a prudent level of risk. The intent of this strategy is to minimize plan expenses by outperforming plan liabilities over the long run. The investment portfolio contains a diversified blend of equity and fixed-income investments. Furthermore, equity investments are diversified across U.S. and non-U.S. stocks as well as growth, value, and small and large capitalizations. Other assets, such as real estate, private equity, and hedge funds, are used judiciously to enhance long-term returns while improving portfolio diversification.

Prior to January 1, 1998, SJH employees participated in the SCLHS Retirement Plan. Consistent with the treatment of multiemployer plans, contributions to the SCLHS Retirement Plan were expensed as they became due. Accordingly, no expense has been recognized in 2011 and 2010 related to this plan.

10. Insurance Programs

SCLHS provides an insurance program to insure for various insurable risks. SCLHS obtains insurance through Leaven Insurance Company, Ltd. (Leaven), a wholly owned subsidiary and captive insurance company of SCLHS, as well as third-party insurers and other self-insured methods. Effective October 1, 2010, the insurance programs for SCLHS and Exempla Healthcare were consolidated for all property and casualty coverages, with the exception of workers' compensation insurance.

Effective October 1, 2010, professional liability coverage provides for a self-insured retention of \$2.0 million per occurrence and a \$20.0 million annual aggregate (shared with SCLHS), and a buffer layer of insurance was purchased from Leaven with limits of \$2.0 million per occurrence and a \$5.0 million annual aggregate. For claims reported between March 1, 2006 and September 30, 2010, professional liability coverage provides for a self-insured retention for professional liability with limits of \$2.0 million per occurrence and \$8.0 million in the aggregate, and for general liability with limits of \$1.0 million per occurrence and \$3.0 million in the aggregate. Excess coverages above those limits have been obtained through Leaven. A trust fund was established for the insurance program in 2006, and as of December 31, 2011, the fund totaled \$14.1 million, including a portion for SJH. Funding levels for the trust fund are established annually based upon recommendations of consulting actuaries. The trust fund can only be used for payment of malpractice and general liability losses, related expenses, and the cost of administering the trust. Actuarial-based liabilities of \$13.3 million and \$12.5 million for unpaid claims incurred since program inception are recorded at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. The portion of such losses related to SJH was allocated and charged to SJH. The loss reserves recorded for estimated self-insured professional and general liability, including estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported, are discounted at annual rates of 4% at December 31, 2011 and 2010.

From March 1, 1999 to February 28, 2005, Exempla had purchased professional and general liability coverage on a claims-made basis from Leaven. Limits of liability were maintained at \$2.0 million per occurrence and \$8.0 million in the aggregate. Excess coverage above those limits is retained through commercial insurers. In 2010, Exempla received payment from Leaven for retrospective premium adjustments for loss years prior to March 1, 2006, of \$5.1 million, a portion of which was allocated to SJH.

Exempla has also established self-insurance programs for workers' compensation benefits and certain employee medical benefits. Annual self-insurance expense and funding under the workers' compensation program are based on past claims experience and projected losses. Insurance coverage, in excess of the per occurrence, self-insured retention, has been secured with insurers for specified amounts for workers' compensation. Actuarial estimates of uninsured losses of \$2.0 million and \$1.4 million as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, have been accrued on an undiscounted basis and include an estimate for claims incurred but not reported. A portion of this reserve covers uninsured losses of SJH. For medical and dental benefits, the liability for payment of incurred and unpaid claims is included in accrued salaries, wages, and benefits liabilities.

12. Subsequent Events
