I. ICAN's Personalized Medicine Cancer Case Management Services:

Numerous Awards and Recognition for ICAN's Cancer Patient Advocacy Programs and Clinical Trials Advocacy Programs

Throughout 2011, ICAN continued expanding its Personalized Medicine Cancer Case Management Program Services which include Cancer Patient Advocacy Programs, Clinical Trials Advocacy Programs, as well as Public Education and Information Programs in over 200 separate cancers and cancer subtypes directly serving patients diagnosed with Stage IV cancer. Many patients had been given no viable strategic options before approaching ICAN. The mission of the organization is to seek, through its robust direct navigation services, to extend life with the highest achievable quality of life.

ICAN is dedicated to assisting advanced Stage IV adult and pediatric cancer patients throughout the United States and around the world. Headquartered in the Phoenix-Scottsdale area, ICAN was founded in 1996 on a new paradigm of professional patient advocacy that is both tenacious and creative. This direct advocacy provides the men, and women with whom we work—as well as the parents of children and adolescents diagnosed with cancer—the cutting-edge information services and the advocacy support necessary to empower them to manage effectively their personal battles against cancer.

ICAN's Personalized Medicine Cancer Case Management Services are comprehensive and tailored to the needs of each patient and his or her particular cancer ... emphasizing that patient's medical record and status. ICAN's services include, among other things, connecting a patient with world class specialists and laboratories; helping a patient understand how the specific elements in a treatment plan interconnect and relate strategically to the big picture; working to make sure that the patient is not overlooking some key area of treatment or avoiding a promising avenue of life extension because of misinformation or a lack of information; ensuring that the cancer is appropriately analyzed in terms of its highly individualized molecular profile; and empowering the patient along with his or her family to ask the right questions of the patient's medical team throughout the course of treatment.

The organization is grateful to each and every donor as well as to the tireless efforts of hundreds of talented people from around the world who comprise our all-volunteer Program Services Research Department. Each donor and volunteer has helped ICAN to both establish and maintain our impressive global footprint ... allowing us to provide our 24/7/365 Patient Services and expand our continuum of care to assist Stage IV patients in 50 states and 51 countries to date.

Referrals to ICAN are set in motion by a cancer patient's friends, immediate family, relatives, or fellow cancer patients who have previously worked with or who are currently working with ICAN as well as by those who have attended ICAN special events, community outreach meetings, or oncology conferences. Referrals also come in to ICAN from physicians (often, oncologists and anesthesiologists), specialty laboratory professional personnel, and medical centers as well as through networking, health fairs, job fairs (where ICAN seeks additional volunteer research interns), educational meetings, ICAN's website, other cancer organizations' resource suggestions, in addition to ICAN's social media outreach efforts. Complex cases at ICAN typically require between 20 and 80 hours of Patient Services and Program Services Research Department staff/research associate/intern time per patient.

ICAN prides itself on providing, where appropriate, detailed answers for new cancer case referrals to the organization within 24 to 48 hours of the patient's first inquiry. During 2011, hundreds of referrals to major medical centers, medical oncology, surgical oncology, radiation oncology, radiology, interventional radiology, stereotactic radiosurgery, pathology, and specialty laboratories were made on behalf of patients enrolled in ICAN's Cancer Patient Advocacy Programs as a follow-up to the organization's extended patient case analyses. During the last several weeks of 2011—as a result of the profile of ICAN in the December 12, 2011 issue of *Newsweek*—patient inquiries received from around the world led to hundreds of new cases asking for ICAN services.

The organization is positioned to continue pursuing all of its multi-faceted initiatives at full throttle—an Advocacy Institute project as part of ICAN's overall Research Institute strategic plan; our multi-faceted search system—Remission Coach®—for which ICAN received the official Trademark during the fourth quarter of 2011; our mobile app projects—being developed by ICAN's team of scientists, computer programmers, and clinicians—which will add immeasurable value to the world of drug development; and of course, working to help the growing numbers of patients who are currently on a Wait List because the resources of the organization are perennially overextended, given the endless demand for services.

ICAN has countless anecdotes about bringing patients back from the brink who had otherwise been written off as hopeless. It is due to such successes that ICAN has become a magnet for late-stage cancer patients who have been offered no further options by their medical teams, whether they are in rural settings or in highly-acclaimed comprehensive cancer centers. Because ICAN has a growing world-class reputation for delivering consistent and positive results, other cancer organizations

refer to us patients who have the toughest diagnoses or the rarest of tumors or blood cancers.

Serving as what many patients and medical professionals refer to as a *Remission Coach*®, ICAN provides patients with referrals to top-notch medical teams, recommendations for specific diagnostics that are key to finding the most on-target treatment, cutting-edge information services, patient empowerment tools, clinical trials enrollment strategies, and when appropriate, applications for compassionate use to access promising experimental drugs outside the clinical trials setting.

While the organization's core mission is to provide robust, personalized cancer patient advocacy, ICAN is involved in the drug pipeline across the board—from drug discovery, drug development, and licensing/legal issues through our Scientific Advisory Council; to regulatory issues by virtue of our CEO's participation on the MD Anderson Institutional Review Board (Oncology Panel/Banner Gateway) as well as having an ICAN patient representative on the Oncologic Drugs Advisory Committee of the FDA; to personalized medicine and gene expression profiling issues additionally supported by our International Physicians Advisory Council and our Biomarkers Council; all the way through to our interaction with pharmaceutical companies and biotechs engaged in clinical trials.

ICAN highly values its dream team of more than 700 compassionate volunteers around the world—each a devoted soldier in the fight for the lives of late-stage cancer patients—endowing the organization with critical support behind the scenes, and driving forward the goals of life extension along with the highest possible quality of life for our patients.

ICAN Achievements and Accolades

- ❖ ICAN recently co-sponsored, with the Alliance for Safe Biologic Medicines, an important conference for distinguished scientists and clinicians on the very complex scientific issue of safe biologic medicines and biosimilars. Featured speakers were members of our Biomarkers Council, Eric Thompson, PhD and Brett R. Johnson, PhD. The chairman of our Biomarkers Council, Scott M. Kahn, Ph.D. from Columbia University, and Brett R. Johnson, PhD of Harvard University, represent ICAN as active members of biosimilars organizations and keep ICAN informed of every advance. Monitoring the safety of biosimilars, especially since ICAN deals with biosimilars across its Patient Services network, will continue to be an important issue for the organization.
- ❖ ICAN was profiled in *Newsweek's* December 12, 2011 issue due to the fact that one of our metastatic breast cancer patients has experienced and enjoyed complete remission for well over six years which she has, in multiple media appearances, attributed to ICAN's special advocacy and referral services as

well as the organization's management of her case. This pivotal feature story in *Newsweek* has led to hundreds of additional cases (many of which were multi-faceted and highly complex dealing with numerous cancer centers) coming in to the organization from around the world over the last 11 months.

- ❖ ICAN was profiled as *the* leading cancer patient advocacy organization in *Pharmaceutical Executive's* October 2011 edition which issue saluted 30 years of patient advocacy. The magazine chose to profile four (4) key organizations: one AIDS organization, one Alzheimer's organization, one organization for rare diseases, and selected ICAN to represent the best in cancer patient advocacy.
- ❖ ICAN's CEO Marcia Horn was named a Finalist in the Non-Physician category of *Phoenix Business Journal's* Health Care Heroes.
- ❖ The Drug Information Association announced that the DIA Board would be nominating ICAN's CEO to the board of the leading national clinical trials "think tank" consortium under the auspices of Duke University—the Clinical Trials Transformation Initiative, CTTI. This is a significant honor for ICAN, demonstrating that the foremost association whose membership includes biopharma executives, regulatory executives, and government officials from HHS, NIH, NCI, CMS, CDC, and FDA well understands ICAN's crucial mission on clinical trials advocacy.
- ❖ Having received a full scholarship as a Patient Advocate Fellow to the Drug Information Association's conference in Philadelphia, ICAN's CEO gave two presentations, one of which addressed pharmaceutical company CEOs in a special by-invitation-only executive session at DIA.
- ❖ ICAN's CEO served on evidence-based Technical Advisory Review panels dealing with solid tumors and the issues of comparative effectiveness of current treatments.
- ❖ ICAN successfully nominated a patient to the FDA's Office of Special Health Issues to serve on their Oncologic Drug Advisory Committee (ODAC) as a patient representative. His participation on ODAC has been highly regarded.
- ❖ ICAN's CEO was invited to join an Institutional Review Board (IRB) affiliated with the renowned comprehensive cancer center MD Anderson (at Banner Gateway) and has been an active member of that IRB. While ICAN has reviewed in detail many hundreds of Informed Consent documents over the years with our patients, this gives our CEO the opportunity to be involved in reviewing and editing such pivotal documents in order to explain to cancer patients in clear language a clinical trial which seeks to study and evaluate a promising anticancer compound or a multi-agent combination. This new assignment also affords the opportunity for ICAN's CEO to delve into and

understand the many technical and ethical issues that come before an highly-productive IRB in order to protect patient safety and enhance patient comprehension of the clinical trials process.

- ❖ The FDA's Office of Planning and Analysis in the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research (CDER) invited ICAN to be a special participant at the FDA-sponsored inaugural conference on Patient-Focused Drug Development.
- ❖ Elsevier's *Pink Sheet*—the “go-to” newsletter for the biotech and pharmaceutical industries—requested ICAN's perspective about FDA clinical trials regulations for their high-level pharmaceutical executive suite subscribers, interviewing members of ICAN's Biomarkers Council.
- ❖ *USA Today's* Personalized Medicine research and writing team at MediaPlanet requested ICAN's input on a supplement on Personalized Medicine and molecular diagnostics.

With the continuing challenges facing the economy in the U.S. and in the Southwest particularly, organizations such as ICAN continue to experience a downturn in donations compared with those of five years ago. Throughout 2011, ICAN was nonetheless able to make available its 24/7/365 Patient Program Services by virtue of the in-kind services of 718 volunteers hailing from top-notch sources including: volunteermatch.org, internships.com, idealist.org, linkedin.com, local colleges and universities, as well as additional volunteer and professional recruitment and

networking groups. Moreover, when approached to train and assign community service volunteers who had court-ordered hours to fulfill, ICAN staff and key leadership not only acquiesced, but served as a positive role model and provided an exceptional perspective on helping to fight the War on Cancer.

The majority of ICAN volunteers are actively-employed, part-time, or recently-retired physicians, biologists, chemists, and other professionals in the healthcare arena, as well as professionals in law firms, marketing firms, pharmaceutical or corporate positions. In addition, college students, graduate students, and post-doctoral students apply for ICAN volunteer positions. These volunteers—depending on their capabilities, expertise, and/or interest—are assigned to assist ICAN in areas that range from tumor biomarkers and gene expression profiling information to cancer literature research updates on a per-cancer basis or per-clinical trials basis; from printing and sending out certificates in memory/honor of a cancer patient to providing essential services for our fundraising and friend-raising events (such as our annual Liberty Mutual Golf Invitational and our annual Broadway Theatre Party). All told, ICAN's Board Governance Committee estimates that this massive infusion of volunteer support in 2011 amounted to an in-kind donation to ICAN of over \$5 million, given the quality of volunteer talent and the quantity of volunteer hours which flowed so generously throughout the year into ICAN.

By the end of 2011, ICAN had continued to develop and refine its Internship Programs for high school through post-doctoral students and had launched an Academic Internship department as well on issues ranging from ICAN Patient Program Graphic Design, Mobile App Development, to Healthcare Financing Challenges, and many other issues.

During 2011, ICAN personnel and volunteers also reviewed and researched the issue of compassionate use and expanded access requests of drugs in the clinical trials pipeline for late-stage cancer patients. The infrastructure for **The Muriel Finlayson Williams Compassionate Use Drug Information Program** at ICAN continued to be pursued on behalf of patients who are seeking information about emergency release of promising compounds from their developmental and pharmaceutical sponsors. ICAN's in-house resources and experience in that area date back to 1996 at which time ICAN's Founding Chairman submitted the most comprehensive request for compassionate use that the National Cancer Institute, the developmental sponsor of a certain anticancer drug, had ever received.

In 2011, ICAN Program Services staff continued to respond to the many hundreds of inquiries from all over the United States and abroad relating to specific anticancer compounds, clinical trials options, physician and specialist referrals, laboratory referrals, as well as major cancer center/oncology practice referrals. Because of heightened publicity, the leading inquiry at ICAN throughout 2011 concerned immunotherapy and novel cancer vaccines, especially in the breast cancer and melanoma contexts. Inquiries regarding the EML4ALK fusion gene and ALK-inhibiting drugs such as *crizotinib* (relevant to a sub-population of non small cell lung cancer patients) were also addressed. ICAN Public Education Program Services and Drug Pipeline Information Programs responded to patient and public inquiries seeking information on specific vaccine clinical trials and immunotherapy issues, molecular profiling, whole-genome sequencing, next-gen sequencing, hormone therapy, brachytherapy, proton beam therapy, antiandrogen therapy, steroid therapy, endocrine therapy, biologic therapy, as well as anticancer compounds characterized as vascular targeting agents and angiogenesis inhibitors.

Other areas of patient and public inquiries included: the blood-brain barrier and anticancer drugs targeting brain metastasis (whether solitary lesions or multiple metastases), conventional surgery, radiation therapy, complementary and alternative medicine, multi-drug resistance issues, pain management issues, and palliative care issues (such as fatigue, cachexia, and nausea management). The issues of small bowel obstruction and ascites continued to be especially prominent among gastrointestinal cancer, pancreatic cancer, and ovarian cancer patients during 2011. ICAN Patient Program Services also responded to requests for additional information concerning new diagnostic procedures, epigenetic biomarkers, signaling pathways, new imaging technology, and cutting-edge interventional radiology procedures.

II. Information Technology/Drug Pipeline Initiatives: Remission Coach® and ICAN Mobile App Projects

Over the last several years, ICAN has succeeded in developing a revolutionary medical information search engine. The search system along with its ancillary programs is called Remission Coach® and represents an innovative service which will be housed on one of ICAN's websites for cancer patients and their families. The search engine will enhance and accelerate retrieval of relevant and specific patient-appropriate information.

The international launch and announcement of this ground-breaking search system will catapult the mission, vision, and reach of ICAN to a new threshold of impact. The vision for ICAN is one of growth, evolutionary change, and expansion of the organization's comprehensive Personalized Medicine Cancer Case Management Program Services, including ICAN's Remission Coach®, to meet the escalating needs of an ever-increasing population of cancer patients across the globe. This will result in ICAN needing to develop crucial capacity-building and bioinformatics

resources in the years ahead to meet the overwhelming patient demand for its life-extending services. Working groups to develop a Capital Campaign and oversee Remission Coach® Metrics/Bioinformatics are in formation.

ICAN continues to develop the infrastructure for the organization's capital campaign which will fund its advanced research initiatives as well as Remission Coach® and other projects.

III. Ongoing Development of ICAN Professional Councils, including the Biomarkers Council at ICAN

ICAN's governing board and staff continued to focus on strategic planning and recruitment for the organization's International Physicians Advisory Council, Pharmaceutical Advisory Council, Biotech Advisory Council, as well as its Biomarkers Council.

After an exhaustive international search concluding in 2011, the organization formally announced Scott M. Kahn, Ph.D., as chairman of ICAN's Biomarkers Council. Dr. Kahn is Director of Basic Urologic Research, St. Luke's-Roosevelt Health Science Center and Assistant Professor of Clinical Urology, Department of Urology as well as a Member, Herbert Irving Comprehensive Cancer Center at Columbia University.

Under the leadership of Dr. Kahn, a concerted effort was made to recruit outstanding senior biomarker advisors for the Biomarkers Council. Over the past year the organization fortunate to bring aboard many proven and accomplished biomarker scientists and experts in molecular diagnostics. The Council's current roster of senior advisors includes scientists presently or formerly with Harvard, Columbia, NIEHS, and with Roche/Genentech; Merck; Novartis; Astra Zeneca; Astellas; Janssen; GNS Healthcare; Lab 21; Caris Life Sciences; Epigenomics; Biomarin; Shanghai Bio; and Quorum Review.

(A) Assisting ICAN on Complex and/or Rare Patient Cases

Over the past year, the Biomarkers Council has assisted on a number of patient cases, from pediatric to elderly cancer patients—in the areas of solid tumors and blood cancers. When requested, the Biomarkers Council took immediate efforts to provide its collective knowledge to anonymized patient cases. With each case, the Biomarkers Council provided support on a number of levels. This work included a comprehensive literature review to identify relevant biomarkers and identification of appropriate biomarker service providers. With the more challenging cases, when asked, the Biomarkers Council utilized the skills and expertise of the Council's Senior Advisors. The Advisors provided individualized biomarker reviews for anonymized patients, and more recently, partial genomic sequencing analysis. The Biomarkers Council made use of our growing academic and industry network, vigorously contacting senior industry scientists and members of the global biopharma

community on the behalf of ICAN patients for the purpose of obtaining targeted therapeutic agents or molecular diagnostics.

(B) Biomarker Databases

The Biomarkers Council was tasked with generating a comprehensive database of cancer-associated biomarkers for ICAN. To this end, the Biomarkers Council recruited over 40 interns who were individually assigned specific research projects to identify biomarkers associated with certain cancer and cancer subtypes, therefore supplementing the vast number of research interns already working in this area in ICAN Patient and Research Services under the direction of either International Physicians Council Chairman Robert H. Tamis, M.D. and/or Director of Research Services Regina Marie Klopfer. Our Biomarkers interns generated extensive biomarker files for many solid tumors. Given the exciting proliferation of whole genome sequencing (WGS) articles being published and the extensive amount of published WGS data published over the past year, Biomarkers Council members and ICAN research interns were inundated with new challenges throughout 2011. Dr. Neil Butters, a Senior Advisor on the Council, provided the Biomarkers Council colleagues and ICAN leadership with weekly biomarker updates.

(D) Biomarkers Council Advocacy Projects

The Biomarkers Council actively represented ICAN in many patient advocacy efforts over the past year. Biomarkers Council members actively participated in the Personalized Medicine Coalition, which affords the ability to confer with leaders in the field. Dr. Scott Kahn represented ICAN as an active member of the Physicians

Advisory Board for the Alliance for Patient Access. The AfPA continually monitors and responds to national and regional policy issues that have the potential to influence patient access to treatments and care.

Dr. Kahn attended regional meetings of the AfPA, and participated in Bio Fly-In in Washington, DC, where he met with congressional representatives and their staff members, lobbying on behalf of ICAN and the AfPA. One of the major issues discussed was extension of PDUFA, which was passed by Congress shortly thereafter.

Ajay Malik, PhD and Eric J. Thompson, PhD of the Biomarkers Council assisted with a number of the organization's public releases and statements, including ICAN's response to the FDA's public hearing on Biomarkers, while Brett R. Johnson, PhD represented ICAN as an Advisory Board member for the Alliance for Safe Biologic Medicine.
