	Health Care Services The Medical Center is a tertiary regional referral center which serves a patient community that includes Seattle and its surrounding suburbs, Western Washington and Alaska The main campus located in Seattle includes a hospital, an outpatient clinic, centers of excellence including the Center for Hyperbanc Medicine, Digestive Disease Institute, Floyd Delores Jones Cancer Institute, Heart Institute, Neuroscience Institute and Urology The Medical Center also operates seven regional clinics, and Bailey-Boushay House, a 35-bed skilled nursing facility During 2011, the Medical Center recorded 16,335 hospital inpatient admissions, 22,126 emergency room visits and 830,027 clinic visits. The Medical Center provided charity care and unreimbursed Medicaid services to a total of 5,724 patients. Continued on Schedule O.

(1) Organization and Related Parties

Virginia Mason Medical Center (the Medical Center) is a controlled affiliate of Virginia Mason Health System (the Health System), both Washington not-for-profit corporations. The Health System is the sole corporate member of the Medical Center, has overlapping members on the Board of Directors, and reserves certain rights and responsibilities regarding governance, strategic plans, and transactions of the Medical Center. The Health System raises philanthropic support through a division, Virginia Mason Foundation (the Foundation), and has one other controlled affiliate, Benaroya Research Institute at Virginia Mason (BRI, a Washington not-for-profit corporation)

The Medical Center consists of a tertiary care hospital, licensed for 336 beds, and a multi specialty group practice of 386 full-time equivalent, salaried physicians, providing professional and technical diagnostic and treatment services. The Medical Center also operates a 35-bed skilled nursing facility primarily for AIDS patients. The Medical Center also includes the following controlled affiliates, which are consolidated in these financial statements.

- 1000 Madison, LLC On January 10, 2006, a limited liability company, 1000 Madison, LLC, was organized for the purpose of holding and managing real estate located at 1000 Madison. Seattle, Washington The Medical Center is the sole member of 1000 Madison, LLC On February 17, 2006, 1000 Madison, LLC purchased property located at 1000 Madison to be used for future expansion of the Medical Center for the amount of \$24,000,000 The Medical Center incurred long-term debt under the Master Trust Indenture of \$25,000,000 and contributed the proceeds to the 1000 Madison, LLC, which was used to purchase the property
- 1005 Spring Street, LLC On May 11, 2006, a limited liability company, 1005 Spring Street, LLC, was organized for the purpose of holding and managing real estate located at 1005 Spring Street, Seattle, Washington The Medical Center is the sole member of 1005 Spring Street, LLC On June 1, 2006, 1005 Spring Street, LLC purchased property located at 1005 Spring Street to be used for future expansion of the Medical Center for the amount of \$6,075,000 The Medical Center incurred long-term debt under the Master Trust Indenture of \$7,000,000 and contributed the proceeds to the 1005 Spring Street, LLC, which was used to purchase the property
- Health Resource Services, LLC On July 1, 2008, a limited liability company. Health Resource Services. LLC was organized for the purpose of engaging in group purchasing and consulting services on behalf of healthcare facilities. The Medical Center is the sole member of Health Resource Services, LLC
- Virginia Mason Institute On October 29, 2008, a Washington not-for-profit corporation, Virginia Mason Institute, was organized with the purpose to promote health and education by providing educational services to healthcare organizations, and engaging in research related to the development of procedures and protocols for the delivery of specific healthcare services. The Medical Center is the sole member of Virginia Mason Institute

In 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center provided \$4,397,000 and \$3,967,000, respectively, of operational expense support to the Foundation In 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center provided \$3,450,000 and \$4,119,000, respectively, of operational support to BRI The support for these organizations is shown as a transfer of net assets and is excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations

(2) Contractual Relationships with Group Health Cooperative of Puget Sound

In 1996, the Medical Center and Group Health Cooperative of Puget Sound (Group Health), a not-for-profit health maintenance organization, entered into a contractual relationship in order to serve their respective patients more efficiently and effectively. The current agreement continues through December 2015 when it becomes renewable through negotiation. Under this agreement, the Medical Center provides inpatient hospital services to Group Health members as well as outpatient and physician services. Net revenues from Group Health were approximately 19% and 16%, respectively, of the Medical Center's net patient revenues in 2011 and 2010.

(3) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Presentation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the Medical Center and its controlled affiliates. All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

(b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid financial instruments with original maturities of three months or less at the date of purchase. The Medical Center maintains cash and cash equivalents on deposit at various institutions, which at times exceed the insured limits by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. This exposes the Medical Center to potential risk of loss in the event the institution became insolvent. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, cash equivalents were \$47.072,000 and \$92,669,000, respectively.

(d) Supplies Inventory

Supplies inventory consists principally of medical, surgical and pharmaceutical supplies, which are carried at the lower of cost (current price) or market

(e) Assets Whose Use is Limited

Assets whose use is limited include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements and designated unrestricted assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements, retirement plans, and professional liability claims. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Medical Center have been reclassified as current in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Assets whose use is limited also include temporarily and permanently restricted assets due to donor restriction and are presented in other in the consolidated balance sheet. Assets whose use is limited include investments in joint ventures and are presented in capital improvements in the consolidated balance sheets, refer to note 14.

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, dividends, and other-than-temporary impairment losses) is included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities or are securities whose decline value is considered to be other-than-temporary impairment.

Investments are regularly reviewed for impairment and a charge is recognized when the fair value is below cost basis and is judged to be other-than-temporary. For investments managed by outside investment managers who do not need the Medical Center's management pre-approval for sales, all declines in value below cost are recognized as impairments that are other-than-temporary. These impairment losses are classified as nonoperating in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. A new cost basis is then established for the security

(f) Land, Buildings, and Equipment

Land, buildings, and equipment are stated at cost or, in the case of assets acquired from the Mason Clinic and Mason Properties in 1986, appraised value Improvements and replacements of buildings and equipment are capitalized Maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred. When assets are sold or retired, their cost and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and any related gain or loss is reflected in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. Interest costs incurred during the construction of major capital projects, net of certain interest

income, are capitalized and depreciated as a component of the related assets. During 2011 and 2010, interest was capitalized in the amounts of \$12,156,000 and \$13,963,000, respectively

The Medical Center assesses potential impairment to its long-lived assets when there is evidence that events or changes in circumstances have made recovery of the asset's carrying value unlikely. An impairment loss is recognized when the sum of the expected future undiscounted net cash flows is less than the carrying amount of the asset. In 2011 and 2010, there were no impairment charges

In 2006, 1000 Madison, LLC and 1005 Spring Street, LLC purchased certain properties adjacent to the Medical Center's existing main Seattle campus that are currently held for future use in connection with the Medical Center's long-term campus planning

(g) Depreciation

Depreciation is determined by the straight-line method, which allocates the cost of tangible property ratably over its estimated useful life. Leasehold improvements are amortized over the lesser of useful life or lease term. Estimated useful lives are summarized below.

Buildings	25 - 70 years
Leasehold improvements	3-25 years
Equipment	3-40 years

(h) Deferred Financing Costs

Financing costs are capitalized and amortized through interest expense using the effective interest method over the life of the bonds. Accumulated amortization was \$3,831,000 and \$3,496,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

(i) Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Medical Center in perpetuity.

(i) Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Medical Center are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Donor gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restriction. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as other operating revenues in the consolidated statements of operations.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment without donor stipulations that specify how the assets must be used are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses. Gifts of long-lived or other assets with explicit restrictions that

specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

The Foundation solicits contributions on behalf of the Medical Center and collects amounts from donors intended for the Medical Center's use. The Medical Center recognizes an interest in the net assets of the Foundation that is recorded as beneficial interest and other assets on the consolidated balance sheets.

(k) Net Patient Revenues

Significant portions of the Medical Center's services are provided to patients with coverage under Medicare. Medicaid. Group Health, or other third-party payor plans. These insurance plans, in many instances, limit the amount the Medical Center can receive in payment to amounts less than the standard charges for services. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes discounts from established charges, prospectively determined rates per discharge, and prospectively determined daily rates. Revenue is reported at the net amount expected to be collected from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. In 2011 and 2010, approximately 31% of the Medical Center's net patient revenues were derived from Medicare. Medicaid, and other governmental programs, the continuance of which is dependent upon governmental policies. In addition, approximately 15% and 16%, respectively, of net patient revenues were derived from Premera Blue Cross in 2011 and 2010, and approximately 13% and 14%, respectively, of net patient revenues in 2011 and 2010 were derived from Regence Blue Shield

Under Medicare, the Medical Center is paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge for inpatient acute care services. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Certain other services related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on an annual cost report. Payments for Medicare outpatient services are provided based upon a prospective payment system. Payments are prospectively established and may be greater than or less than the Medical Center's actual charges for its services.

(l) Hospital Safety Net Assessment

In 2009, the State of Washington (the State) enacted a safety net assessment program involving designated Washington State hospitals to provide matching funding from other sources and obtain additional federal funds to support increased payments to providers for Medicaid services. The safety net assessment was subject to approval by the Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) before it took effect. In 2010, CMS approved the two amendments required to fully enact the safety net assessment program.

In connection with the safety net assessment program, the Medical Center recorded estimated increases in net patient service revenue of \$1,500,000 and \$4,953,000 for 2011 and 2010, respectively, but incurred assessments of \$6,728,000 and \$4,953,000 for 2011 and 2010, respectively. The assessment was recorded in federal, state, and local revenue and income taxes on the consolidated statement of operations. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center

had receivables associated with this program of \$716,000 and \$3,142,000, respectively, which are included with other receivables on the consolidated balance sheets. The Medical Center received redistribution payment for the first biennium agreement through June 30, 2011. The amount of the redistribution funds for the second biennium agreement is unknown as of December 31, 2011.

The State has notified the Medical Center that it will reduce Medicaid payment rates for services provided on and after July 1, 2011 Medicaid will reprocess all claims for services provided on or after July 1, 2011 The Medical Center also had payables associated with this program of \$1,159,000 as of December 31, 2011, which is included with other payables and estimated third-party payor settlements, net on the consolidated balance sheets

(m) Estimated Third-Party Payor Settlements

The Medical Center has settled its Medicare cost reports through 2006 Retroactive adjustments under the Medical Center's cost reports are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined and new information becomes available

Estimates of net settlements due to third-party payors were approximately \$10,600,000 and \$7,700,000 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and have been reflected within the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Third-party settlements are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods, as final settlements are determined. Net patient service revenue increased by approximately \$1,100,000 and \$2,300,000, respectively, for 2011 and 2010 to reflect third-party settlements and changes in the estimated third-party reserves for prior years.

(n) Estimated Uncollectibles

The Medical Center provides an allowance for potential uncollectible patient accounts receivable whereby such receivables are reduced to their estimated net realizable value. The Medical Center estimates this allowance based on the aging of accounts receivable, historical collection experience by payor, and other relevant factors. There are various factors that can impact the collection trends, such as changes in the economy, which in turn have an impact on unemployment rates and the number of uninsured and underinsured patients, the increased burden of co-payments to be made by patients with insurance, and business practices related to collection efforts. These factors continuously change and can have an impact on collection trends and the estimation process.

(o) Charity Care and Medicaid Allowances

The Medical Center provides medically necessary care in the hospital or clinic for no fee or a discounted fee, based on the patient's demonstrated inability to pay. Patients may also be eligible for charity care according to a sliding fee scale to discount charges for patients with income at or below three hundred percent of the federal poverty guidelines adjusted for family size. The Medical Center maintains records to identify and monitor the amount of charges forgone for services furnished under its charity care policy. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collecting amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. The Medical Center also estimates the costs to provide charity care based on the ratio of costs to gross charges. In addition to uninsured patients

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qualifying for charity, the Medical Center monitors its allowances or the difference between charges and amounts paid by Medicaid The following information summarizes the cost of charity care provided and Medicaid allowances during the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 (in thousands)

(p) Federal, State, and Local Taxes

The Medical Center has received a letter from the Internal Revenue Service indicating that it is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, except for unrelated business income. The Medical Center is subject to state and local excise taxes on revenues and to property taxes on certain assets. Sales taxes collected from customers and remitted to governmental authorities are accounted for on a net basis and, therefore, are excluded from revenues in the consolidated statements of operations.

The Medical Center adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Interpretation No 48. *Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes (FIN 48)*, included in FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Subtopic 740-10 – *Income Taxes – Overall* FIN 48 clarifies the accounting for uncertainty in income taxes recognized in an enterprise's financial statements in accordance with FASB Statement No 109. *Accounting for Income Taxes* FIN 48 also prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement standard for the financial statement recognition and measurement of an income tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. Only tax positions that meet the more-likely than-not recognition threshold at the effective date may be recognized or continue to be recognized upon adoption. In addition, FIN 48 provides guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure and transition. This guidance did not have a significant impact to the consolidated financial statements in 2011 or 2010

(q) Excess of Revenues over Expenses from Operations

Excess of revenues over expenses from operations excludes certain items that management deems to be outside the scope of its primary business. Items excluded consist primarily of investment income, other-than-temporary impairment, certain interest expense, and other income. Investment income consists of investment income from marketable securities. During 2011 and 2010, \$1,400,000 of interest expense related to debt on cash balances that management could have used to repurchase debt was classified as nonoperating. Other nonoperating gains (losses) include rental income and rental expense.

(r) Excess of Revenues over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and

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contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions, which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets)

(s) Recently Adopted or New Issued Accounting Standards

In August 2010, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2010-23, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure* This ASU is intended to reduce the diversity in practice regarding the measurement basis used in the disclosure of charity care. This ASU requires that cost, including direct and indirect costs, be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes and that the method used to identify or determine such costs be disclosed. This ASU is effective for the Medical Center on January 1, 2011. The Medical Center adopted this guidance in 2011, as reflected in note 3, and it did not affect the presentation on the consolidated balance sheets.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU No 2010-24, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries* This ASU prohibits a health care entity from netting insurance recoveries against related claim liabilities for reporting purposes. Additionally, this ASU requires that the amount of the claim liability be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. This ASU is effective for the Medical Center on January 1, 2011. The Medical Center adopted this standard in 2011, however, it did not affect the presentation on the consolidated balance sheets.

In July 2011, the FASB issued ASU No 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities, which provides financial statement users with greater transparency about a health care entity's net patient service revenue and the related allowance for doubtful accounts. The amendments require health care entities to present the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) on their statement of operations. This standard is effective for the Medical Center beginning after December 15, 2011, with early adoption permitted. The adoption of this standard will affect the presentation of the consolidated statement of operations and disclosures in 2012.

(4) Fair Value Measurements

(a) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Medical Center generally reports the carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents and short-term investments and assets whose use is limited, excluding property held for sale, at fair value, which is based primarily on quoted market prices, if available, or estimated using quoted market prices for similar securities

The carrying amounts reported in the consolidated balance sheets for accounts receivable, accounts payable, estimated third-party payor settlements, and other current liabilities approximate fair value due to the short-term nature of these instruments

The fair value of long-term debt is estimated based on the quoted market prices for similar issues when available, or on the discounted value of the future cash flows using current rates for debt with the same remaining maturities, which are Level 2 inputs. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the

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carrying value of long-term debt, including accrued interest, was \$366,702,000 and \$370,648,000, respectively. As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the fair value of long-term debt, including accrued interest, was \$365,914,000 and \$353,908,000, respectively.

(b) Fair Value Hierarchy

In accordance with ASC Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer between market participants at a measurement date ASC Topic 820 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows

- Level 1 Valuation is based upon quoted prices for identical assets in active markets. Cash
 and cash equivalents, equity. U.S. Treasury obligations, and mutual fund investments are
 included in this category.
- Level 2 Valuation is based upon quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and independent pricing models or other model-based valuation techniques such as the present value of future cash flows adjusted for the security's credit rating, prepayment assumptions, and other factors such as credit loss assumptions for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market Certain fixed income investments and interest rate derivatives are included in this category.
- Level 3 Certain types of securities are classified as Level 3 within the fair value hierarchy because these assets trade infrequently and, therefore, have little or no price transparency Certain fixed income and real estate investments are included in this category

ASC Subtopic 820-10 allows for the use of a practical expedient for the estimation of the fair value of investment companies for which the investment does not have a readily determinable fair value. The practical expedient used by the Medical Center is the net asset value (NAV) per share, or its equivalent. In some instances, the NAV may not equal the fair value that would be calculated under fair value accounting standards. Valuations provided by fund managers consider variables such as the financial performance of underlying investments, recent sales prices of underlying investments, and other pertinent information. In addition, actual market exchanges at year-end provide additional observable market inputs of the exit price. The Medical Center reviews valuations and assumptions provided by fund managers for reasonableness and believes that the carrying amounts of these financial instruments are reasonable estimates of fair value.

The real estate investment fund is recorded at fair value where NAV was used as a practical expedient as of December 31, 2011 and 2010 and is reported in assets whose use is limited. The valuation of this investment is determined using accepted valuation techniques, including complete independent appraisals at least annually for each asset owned by the trust

The Revenue Bonds were issued through the Washington Health Care Facilities Authority (the Authority) and are secured under the Master Trust Indenture, as amended and restated in 2007, and under Loan and Security Agreements with the Authority. The Master Trust Indenture contains certain covenants for the Medical Center, including maintaining a minimum debt service coverage ratio of 1 2 to 1 0 and days cash on hand of at least 70 days as of December 31, 2011. In addition, certain financial tests must be met before issuing additional debt or disposing of property. Interest expense, net of amounts capitalized, was \$6,880,000 and \$4,870,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

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In February 2006, the Medical Center entered into a business loan agreement with a commercial bank to borrow \$25,000,000 to acquire property at 1000 Madison for future use. A renewal of the agreement in January 2011 calls for interest at prime rate or a short-term LIBOR rate plus the applicable margin of 1.25% for the term loan. Borrowings under the business loan agreement expire on January 31, 2014. The agreement is secured under the Master Trust Indenture, as amended and restated. Interest expense was \$390,000 and \$264,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

In May 2006, the Medical Center entered into a business loan agreement with a commercial bank to borrow \$7,000,000 to acquire property at 1005 Spring Street for future use. The agreement calls for interest at prime rate or a short-term LIBOR rate plus the applicable margin of 1.25% for the term loan Borrowings under the business loan agreement mature on June 1, 2016. The agreement is secured under the Master Trust Indenture, as amended and restated. Interest expense was \$99,538 and \$106,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

As security for the repayment of the Revenue Bonds and the two business loan agreements, the Medical Center has granted the Master Trustee a security interest in certain of its accounts, including payment rights, receivables and general intangibles, and liens against certain of the facilities of the Medical Center The amounts held in various trust funds by the bond trustees are also pledged to secure the repayment of the Revenue Bonds

In December 2007, the Medical Center issued bonds in four series (including the reoffered Series 1997B Bonds), with a total face value of \$321,025,000. The proceeds of these bond issues were used for the following purposes to refund, on an advanced and current basis, and to redeem the Series 1997A, to reissue the Series 1997B Bonds as fixed rate bonds, to pay costs of acquiring, constructing, remodeling, renovating, and equipping certain healthcare facilities, to pay interest on the Series 2007 Bonds during a portion of the construction period, to fund the initial deposits into respective debt service reserves for the Series 2007 Bonds, and to pay associated costs of issuing the Series 2007 Bonds. With respect to the Series 1997A. Revenue Bonds, \$60,476,000 was deposited in an escrow account held by the bond trustee to defease the outstanding balance of the Bond Series 1997A. Portions of the defeased bonds were redeemed in 2008 with the remaining bonds redeemed in August 2009. Neither of the defeased debt nor the escrow account is shown on the consolidated balance sheets.

In April 2008, the Medical Center entered into a loan agreement with a municipal corporation to assume the promissory note of \$1.690,000, discounted at 6%, with the acceptance of land and building for a skilled nursing facility. The loan agreement matures on March 31, 2031. The note bears interest at 1%, which can be forgiven under the agreement. The discounted note had accretion of \$17,000 and \$16,000, respectively, in 2011 and 2010.

In June 2003, the Medical Center refunded the Series 1992 Bonds in a transaction, which involved a secondary market purchase and remarketing of the Series 1992 Bonds coupled with a fixed receiver swap with a five year duration. In August 2008, the Medical Center entered into a swap agreement with a two-year duration and renewal option unless terminated earlier by the Medical Center with 10 business days' notice The Series 1992 Bonds were remarketed to Wells Fargo Bank, National Association (Wells Fargo) at a purchase price of par The swap agreement was renewed in August 2010 with a two year duration with similar terms. The Medical Center can terminate with 10 business days notice. Wells Fargo may terminate the arrangement in August 2012 Under the agreement, the Medical Center receives 6 30% from Wells Fargo to offset the 6 30% coupon due on the underlying Series 1992 Bonds, and the Medical Center pays Wells Fargo for the premium equal to the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association (SIFMA) Municipal Swap index plus 150% (160% at December 31, 2011) The swap transaction has not been designated as a hedge as it did not meet the criteria for hedge accounting treatment At December 31, 2011 and 2010, the value of the swap of \$200,000 is included in board-designated investments for capital improvements on the consolidated balance sheets. Accordingly, any changes in fair values of the swap have been reflected within other nonoperating income on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations

The Medical Center entered into a financing agreement with a commercial bank that permits the Medical Center to borrow up to \$10,000,000. The agreement calls for interest at 1.80% above the Daily One Month LIBOR Rate in effect from time to time. The Medical Center must pay an annual commitment fee of one-fourth of 1.00% on the average daily unused amount of the line of credit. Borrowings under the financing agreement mature on September 1, 2012. The agreement contains restrictions on unrestricted liquid assets and tangible net worth. In addition, certain financial tests must be met before issuing additional debt or disposing of property. In December 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center borrowed \$10,000,000 on the line of credit, which was subsequently repaid in January. Interest expense was \$19,000 and \$9,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

The Medical Center is involved in litigation and regulatory inquiries arising in the normal course of business. It is not possible at this time to make a judgment about the outcome of all litigation and regulatory matters. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Medical Center's financial position or results from operations or cash flows.

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(e) Compliance with Laws and Regulations

The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations relate to, among other things, matters such as licensure, accreditation, and government healthcare program participation requirements, regulations regarding reimbursement for patient services, and regulations regarding Medicare and Medicaid billing, fraud, and abuse. Government agencies are actively conducting investigations concerning possible violations of statutes and regulations by healthcare providers. Violations of certain of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs, together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed. Management believes that the Medical Center is in compliance with the fraud and abuse regulations, as well as other applicable government laws and regulations. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

- The Medical Center has two nonqualified defined benefit plans for certain administrators and for physicians who were partners of The Mason Clinic at December 31, 1986. The two plans are included in the physician component in the table below that follows.

(b) Other Postretirement Plans

The Medical Center has a nonqualified executive supplemental retirement plan for certain of its executives. Benefits under this plan do not vest and become payable until the participants reach age 65 while still employed by the Medical Center, or until a participant is involuntarily terminated without cause. Retirement expense was \$835,000 and \$806,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively, and an accrued liability of \$5,160,000 and \$3,641,000 has been recorded for this plan at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and is included in accrued retirement expense in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. (c) Defined Contribution Plan

The Medical Center has a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all employees Maximum contributions are specified by the plan as a percentage of each employee's salary up to certain limits. Benefits are funded annually. Retirement expense for the defined contribution plan was \$17,718,000 in 2011 and \$16,540,000 in 2010.

(d) Other Plans

The Medical Center also has a severance pay program for certain physicians and administrators who were not partners of The Mason Clinic No new employees can enter the Plan effective January 1, 2001. The Medical Center recorded \$1,779,000 and \$1,903,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively, as expense related to these plans. An accrued liability of \$16,761,000 and \$15,623,000 has been recorded for this program at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and is included in accrued retirement expense in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

The Medical Center has a supplemental savings plan for certain executives. The Medical Center incurs no cost under this plan. This plan qualifies as a "top hat" plan under ERISA Participating employees are permitted to defer a portion of their salary until termination, retirement, death, or in the event of an unforeseen emergency. Under the terms of the plan, all deferred compensation, along with all property and rights purchased with those amounts and income attributed to those amounts, remain the property of the Medical Center until paid or made available to the employee or his or her beneficiary. Such amounts are subject to the claims of the Medical Center's general creditors. Participants' rights are equal to those of general creditors in an amount equal to the fair value of the deferred amount of each participant. An asset and an accrued liability of \$2.819,000 and \$2.480,000 have been recorded for this plan at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. These investments are included in the board-designated investments for retirement plans in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet and are included in cash and cash equivalents as Level 1 in note 4

The Medical Center has a deferred compensation plan for certain executives. The Medical Center recorded \$280,000 and \$380,000 in 2011 and 2010, respectively, as expense related to these plans. An accrued liability of \$1,481,000 and \$1,215,000 has been recorded for this program at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and is included in accrued retirement expense in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. These investments are included in the board-designated investments for retirement plans in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet and are included in cash and cash equivalents as Level 1 in note 4.

(12) Self-Insurance Programs

The Medical Center maintains a self-insured retention layer under its professional liability insurance coverage of \$5,000,000 for each public and professional liability claim, the annual aggregate retention is \$23,000,000 through May 31, 2010 Beginning June 1, 2010, the annual aggregate retention is \$19,000,000 The Medical Center carries commercial insurance coverage on a claims-made basis

The Medical Center accrues an actuarial estimate of self-insured losses and related expenses on an occurrence basis, including an estimate of incurred but not reported amounts. The estimated liability for professional liability claims was discounted using an assumed 1.0% and 2.0%, respectively, rate of return in 2011 and 2010. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center has recorded a liability of \$17.655,000 and \$20,500,000, respectively, included in reserve for professional liability claims and other

The Medical Center is also self-insured for the deductible portion of workers' compensation, employee health, unemployment, and the deductible portion of general liability claims. The Medical Center accrues for the unpaid portion of claims that have been reported and estimates for claims that have been incurred but not reported are presented as accrued salaries, wages, and benefits in the consolidated balance sheets

(13) Beneficial Interest in Virginia Mason Foundation

The Foundation solicits contributions on behalf of the Medical Center and BRI, and collects amounts from donors intended for the Medical Center's use. The Medical Center recognizes an interest in the net assets of the Foundation. At December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center has recorded a beneficial interest in the Foundation of \$4,594,000 and \$6,318,000, respectively, included in other assets in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, which corresponds to the assets held by the Foundation on the Medical Center's behalf

The Medical Center recognizes the change in the beneficial interest as part of operations for unrestricted support and a change to the restricted net assets for the portion related to donor-stipulated restrictions

At December 31, 2011 and 2010, \$18,210,000 and \$21,658,000, respectively, of the Foundation's net assets were donor designated for the Medical Center and BRI. The Medical Center has a receivable from the Foundation of \$791,000 and \$1,183,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and a payable of \$6,399,000 and \$6,082,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, included in due to affiliates, net on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets

During 2007, the Foundation received a pledge receivable in the amount of \$20,000,000 from a major donor that is payable in increments of \$2,000,000 for 10 years and is discounted to its present value, using a discount rate of 5 02%. The pledge receivable balance at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, was \$10,000,000 and \$12,000,000, before discount.

(14) Joint Venture

The Medical Center has a joint venture investment accounted for under the equity method consisting of 50% interest in National Purchasing Partners (NPP), a group purchasing program. The carrying amount of the investment in NPP was \$1,699,000 and \$4,192,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, included in board-designated investments on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

The Medical Center has a payable to NPP of \$74,000 and \$702,000 at December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, included in due to affiliates, net on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Cash distributions received during 2011 and 2010, respectively, were \$11,034,000 and \$3,940,000. In March 2012, NPP made a cash distribution to the equity owners with the Medical Center receiving \$3,532,000.

(a) Funds with Deficiencies

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level of the original gifts and the amounts of subsequent donations. In accordance with GAAP, deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets. There were no deficiencies in 2011 or 2010 reported in unrestricted net assets.

(b) Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Medical Center has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Medical Center must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period(s) as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. The Medical Center expects its endowment funds, over time, to provide an average rate of return of approximately 8% annually. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount.

(c) Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Medical Center relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Medical Center targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

(d) Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Medical Center has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year 5% of its endowment fund's average fair value over the prior three-year rolling average in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Medical Center considered the long-term expected return on its endowment. Accordingly, over the long term, the Medical Center expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow at an average of 3% annually. This is consistent with the Medical Center's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

(18) Health Care Reform

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act (Reconciliation Act) were both signed into law in the first calendar quarter of 2010. The legislation went into effect upon signing with provisions to become effective over the next seven years. This legislation is expected to broadly impact the Medical Center's operations, including patient access, service reimbursement rates, and reporting requirements in the future. The Medical Center has evaluated those provisions that went into effect upon signing noting they did not have a significant impact on the 2011 or 2010 consolidated financial statements. The Medical Center has not yet determined the future financial statement impact that this legislation might cause as further provisions become effective
