#### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Organization and basis of presentation

Mid-Columbia Medical Center (the Medical Center) is an Oregon nonprofit corporation located in The Dalles, Oregon. The Medical Center provides various health care and health care related services primarily to residents of the Mid-Columbia region Health Care for the Mid-Columbia Region (Health Care) is the sole member of the Medical Center, as well as the sole member or stockholder of several other affiliated organizations (see Notes 5 and 11).

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts and transactions of the Medical Center's hospital division (the Hospital) and clinic division (dba Mid-Columbia Outpatient Clinics (the Clinics)).

#### Method of accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S.) (GAAP) using the accrual method of accounting which recognizes revenue, income, and gains when earned and expenses and losses when incurred. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management of the Medical Center (Management) to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue, income, gains, expenses, and losses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with remaining maturities of three months or less at the time of purchase by the Medical Center, excluding assets limited as to use (see Note 3)

#### Concentration of credit risk

As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center maintained its bank accounts at two banks. All of the Medical Center's bank accounts are non-interest bearing accounts and are protected by unlimited insurance coverage provided by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation through December 31, 2012.

#### Assets limited as to use

Assets limited as to use primarily consist of assets designated by the Medical Center's Board of Trustees (the Board) for certain operating purposes and future capital acquisitions (internally designated assets), over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes, and assets held in restricted accounts under the terms of loan agreements (see Notes 3, 6, and 12). Internally designated assets which are anticipated by Management to be used within the next year for operating purposes are classified as current.

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying balance sheets (see Note 14). Investment income or loss (including interest, dividends, and realized gains and losses on sales of investments) is included in the excess of revenue over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. The change in net unrealized gains or losses on investments is excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses unless the investments are trading securities or an unrealized loss is considered to be other-than-temporary. Trading securities are debt and equity securities that the Medical Center buys and holds

principally to sell in the near-term As of December 31, 2011 and 2010, all of the Medical Center's assets limited as to use are classified as other than trading securities. The Medical Center's gross unrealized losses on investment securities were not significant as of December 31, 2011 or 2010.

As of December 31, 2011, the Medical Center had investments in cash and cash equivalents, common stocks, mutual funds, and certificates of deposit (see Note 3). Management believes that the Medical Center's credit risk with respect to these investments is minimal due to the diversity of the individual investments, FDIC insurance coverage, and the financial strength of the entities which have issued the securities or instruments. However, due to changes in economic conditions, interest rates, and common stock prices, the fair value of the Medical Center's investments can be volatile. Consequently, the fair value of the Medical Center's investments can significantly change in the near term as a result of such volatility.

#### Patient accounts receivable and allowance for doubtful accounts

The collection of receivables from third-party payors and patients is the Medical Center's primary source of cash and is critical to its operating performance. When the Medical Center provides care to patients, it does not require collateral; however, it maintains an estimated allowance for doubtful accounts. The primary collection risks relate to uninsured patient accounts and patient accounts for which the primary insurance payor has paid, but the patient is responsible for the remaining amount outstanding (generally deductibles and co-payments). The allowance for doubtful accounts is estimated based primarily upon the Medical Center's historical collection experience, Management's estimate of its patients' economic ability to pay, and the effectiveness of collection efforts. Patient accounts receivable balances are routinely reviewed in conjunction with historical collection rates and other economic conditions which might ultimately affect the collectibility of patient accounts when considering the adequacy of the amounts recorded in the allowance for doubtful accounts. Actual write-offs have historically been within Management's expectations. Significant changes in payor mix, business office operations, economic conditions, or trends in federal and state governmental health care coverage could affect the Medical Center's collection of patient accounts receivable, cash flows, and results of operations.

#### Supplies inventory

Supplies inventory is recorded at the lower of weighted-average cost (first-in, first-out method) or market.

#### Property and equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Donated property and equipment items are recorded on the basis of estimated fair value at the date of their donation. Improvements and replacements of property and equipment are capitalized. Routine maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred.

Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation expense in the accompanying financial statements.

Management reviews property and equipment for possible impairment whenever events or circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of such assets may not be recoverable. If there is an indication of impairment, Management would prepare an estimate of future cash flows (undiscounted and without interest charges) expected to result from the use of the asset and its eventual disposition. If these cash flows were less than the carrying amount of the asset, an impairment loss would be recognized to write down the asset to its estimated fair value.

Contributions of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, and equipment are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Contributions of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and contributions of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets would be reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Medical Center reports expirations of donor restrictions as support when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

#### Mid-Columbia Health Foundation (the Foundation)

Health Care is the sole member of the Foundation, which raises funds for various health care providers in the Mid-Columbia region. During the year ended December 31, 2009, the Medical Center pledged \$500,000 to the Foundation, initially payable in equal installments in 2010 and 2011, in support of the Foundation's campaign to raise funds to help finance purchases of diagnostic imaging equipment for the Medical Center. In October 2010, Management decided to pay the entire pledge amount of \$500,000 to the Foundation. The Medical Center and the Foundation are considered financially interrelated organizations under GAAP. Accordingly, the Medical Center recognizes its interest in the net assets of the Foundation as temporarily restricted net assets (see Note 5).

#### Other assets

Other assets include the Medical Center's investments in certain related entities (see Note 12). If the Medical Center owns 50% or less of the voting stock of an investee and can exercise significant influence over the investee's operating and financial policies (generally presumed to be when the Medical Center owns more than 20% of the voting stock of the investee), the Medical Center accounts for such investments under the equity method of accounting, whereby the Medical Center records its proportionate share of the investee's income or loss in the statements of operations and records distributions from the investee as a reduction in the related investment balance. If the Medical Center cannot exercise significant influence over

the investee's operating and financial policies (generally presumed to be when the Medical Center owns less than 20% of the voting stock of the investee), the Medical Center accounts for such investments at cost and records dividends or distributions from the investee as other income when received.

#### Net patient service revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements primarily include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts due from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered and includes estimates for potential retroactive revenue adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Such estimates are adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

A significant portion of the Medical Center's services is provided to Medicare, Medicaid, and OHP patients under contractual arrangements. Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors (i.e., "Medicare severity-diagnosis related groups" or "MS-DRGs"). Such payments include a capital cost component and may be greater or less than the actual charges for services. Most outpatient services related to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed prospectively under the ambulatory payment classifications methodology. Home health services related to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed under a prospective payment system methodology. The Clinic's services related to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology. The Medical Center is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after audits of the Medical Center's annual cost reports by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Medical Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited and final settled by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through December 31, 2006.

Services rendered to OHP beneficiaries are primarily reimbursed at discounts from standard charges or based on fee schedules. Services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are generally reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology. Under this methodology, the Medical Center is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after audits of the Medical Center's annual cost reports by Medicaid. The Medical Center's Medicaid cost reports have been audited and final settled by Medicaid through December 31, 2006.

The laws and regulations governing the Medicare, Medicaid, and OHP programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. In addition, the Recovery Audit Contractors program requires the evaluation of certain Medicare and Medicaid claims for propriety by third-party contractors. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that estimated third-party payor settlements payable - net will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient service revenue was increased by approximately \$1,487,000 and \$400,000 during the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, as a result of revisions of estimates for prior year cost report settlements.

#### Net patient service revenue (continued)

The Medical Center has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations to provide medical services to subscribing participants. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements primarily includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates based on the types of services provided.

Reimbursement based on all of the Medical Center's contractual arrangements was approximately \$82,462,000 and \$81,923,000 less than the Medical Center's established rates for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

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#### **Charity care**

The Medical Center also provides services to patients who meet certain criteria of its financial assistance (i.e , charity care) policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Medical Center's criteria for the determination of charity care include the patient's – or other responsible party's – annual household income, assets, credit history, existing debt obligations, and other indicators of the patient's ability to pay. Generally, those individuals with an annual household income at, or less than, 150% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (the Guidelines) qualify for charity care under the Medical Center's policy. In addition, the Medical Center may provide discounts on a sliding scale to individuals with an annual household income exceeding 150% of the Guidelines. Since the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, those amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue (see Note 2)

#### Electronic health record (EHR) incentive payments

Under certain provisions of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), federal incentive payments are available to hospitals, physicians, and certain other professionals (collectively, "health care providers") when they adopt, implement, or upgrade (AIU) certified electronic health record (EHR) technology or become "meaningful users" - as defined under ARRA - of EHR technology in ways that demonstrate improved quality, safety, and effectiveness of care Health care providers can become eligible for annual Medicare incentive payments by demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each federal fiscal year. Medicaid providers can receive their initial incentive payment by satisfying AIU criteria but must demonstrate meaningful use of EHR technology in subsequent federal fiscal years in order to qualify for additional payments. Hospitals may be eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid EHR incentive payments; however, physicians and other professionals may be eligible for either Medicare or Medicaid incentive payments but not both. Hospitals that are meaningful users under the Medicare EHR incentive payment program are deemed meaningful users under the Medicaid EHR incentive payment program and do not need to meet additional criteria imposed by Medicaid. Medicaid EHR incentive payments to health care providers are 100% federally funded and administered by individual states. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) established the federal fiscal year ended September 30, 2011 as the first year that states could offer EHR incentive payments. Before a state may offer EHR incentive payments, the state must submit – and CMS must approve – the state's incentive plan.

The Medical Center recognizes EHR incentive payments in income using the "contingency model." Under the contingency model, the income from the payments is recognized in the year for which payment is made if all significant contingencies related to the payment are resolved. Generally, the Hospital expects to recognize payments from the Medicare and Medicaid programs in the Hospital's fiscal year that includes the end of the federal fiscal year for which the payments are made. During the year ended December 31,

2011, the Medical Center satisfied certain of the Medicaid AIU criteria. As a result, the Hospital recognized approximately \$701,000 of Medicaid EHR incentive payments as operating revenue in the accompanying 2011 statement of operations. No Medicare EHR incentive payments were earned or recognized by the Medical Center in 2011. Medicaid EHR payments are scheduled to be paid out in decreasing amounts over three federal fiscal years. Medicare and Medicaid EHR incentive payments are subject to audit and/or final approval by CMS and Medicaid.

#### Statements of operations

For purposes of presentation, transactions deemed by Management to be ongoing, major, or central to the provision of health care services are reported as operating revenue and expenses. Peripheral or incidental transactions are reported as other income and expense. The accompanying statements of operations include the excess of revenue over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include the change in net unrealized gains and losses on other than trading securities, contributions from the Foundation for property and equipment acquisitions, contributions to the Foundation for operations, and permanent transfers of assets to, or from, affiliates for purposes other than purchases or sales of goods or services (e.g., write-offs of payables due to, and receivables due from, affiliates).

#### Income taxes

The Medical Center is a tax-exempt organization pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). As such, only unrelated business income is subject to federal or state income taxes. It is Management's belief that none of the Medical Center's activities have generated material unrelated business income; therefore, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

Income tax positions that meet a "more-likely-than-not" recognition threshold are measured at the largest amount of income tax benefit that is more than 50% likely of being realized upon settlement with the applicable taxing authority. The portion of the benefits associated with income tax positions taken that exceeds the amount measured as described above would be reflected as a liability for unrecognized income tax benefits in the Medical Center's balance sheets along with any associated interest and penalties that would be payable to the taxing authorities upon examination. Interest and penalties associated with unrecognized income tax benefits would be classified as income taxes in the Medical Center's statements of operations. There were no unrecognized income tax benefits, nor any interest and penalties associated with unrecognized income tax benefits, accrued or expensed as of and for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010.

The Medical Center files federal information and income tax returns in the U.S. and state information and income tax returns in Oregon. The Medical Center is no longer subject to tax examinations by the related taxing authorities for the Medical Center's U.S. federal and Oregon information and income tax returns for years prior to 2008.

#### Recently issued accounting standards

In August 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2010-23, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) — Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure (ASU 2010-23). ASU 2010-23 requires that cost be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes and that cost be identified as the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care. As a result of the amendments in ASU 2010-23, various techniques will likely be used to determine how the direct and indirect costs are identified, such as obtaining the information directly from a costing system or through reasonable estimation techniques. Therefore, the amendments in ASU 2010-23 also require disclosure of the method used to identify or determine such costs. In the opinion of the FASB, ASU 2010-23 improves current GAAP by requiring all entities to use the same measurement basis of charity care, therefore, enhancing comparability between entities' financial statements. A health care entity does not recognize revenue when charity care is provided, accordingly, the amendments in ASU 2010-23 had no effect on the Medical Center's financial condition or results of operations. ASU 2010-23 was effective for the Medical Center beginning in 2011. The adoption of ASU 2010-23 did not have a significant effect on the Medical Center's financial statements (see Note 2).

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU No. 2010-24, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) – Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries (ASU 2010-24). ASU 2010-24 was issued to provide additional guidance to health care entities regarding accounting for medical malpractice and other similar claims subject to anticipated insurance recoveries. ASU 2010-24 clarifies that a health care entity should not net insurance recoveries against a related claim liability, and requires that a health care entity estimate the amount of the claim liability without consideration of any anticipated insurance recoveries. ASU 2010-24 eliminates an industry exception by requiring health care entities to conform to existing GAAP which generally does not permit offsetting of conditional or unconditional liabilities with anticipated insurance recoveries from third-parties. Upon initial application, the difference between the change in the amount of the liability recognized for claims and the change in the amount of receivables recognized for anticipated insurance recoveries was to be recognized as a cumulative-effect adjustment to opening unrestricted net assets as of the beginning of the period of adoption. ASU 2010-24 was effective for the Medical Center beginning in 2011, and its adoption had the effect of increasing other assets - net and other liabilities by approximately \$958,000 as of December 31, 2011 and had no effect on the statement of operations (see Note 8).

In May 2011, the FASB issued ASU No. 2011-04, Fair Value Measurement (Topic 820) – Amendments to Achieve Common Fair Value Measurement and Disclosure Requirements in U.S. GAAP and IFRSs (ASU 2011-04). The provisions of ASU 2011-04 clarify the FASB's intent regarding application of existing fair value measurement guidance and revise certain measurement and disclosure requirements to achieve convergence of GAAP and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). ASU 2011-04 clarifies the FASB's intent about the application of the highest-and-best-use and valuation premise and with respect to the measurement of fair value of an instrument classified as equity. ASU 2011-04 also expands the information required to be disclosed with respect to fair value measurements categorized in Level 3 fair value measurements and the items not measured at fair value but for which fair value must be disclosed ASU 2011-04 will be effective for the Medical Center in 2012. Management does not expect that ASU 2011-04 will have a significant effect on the Medical Center's future financial statements.

In July 2011, the FASB issued ASU No. 2011-07, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) – Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities (ASU 2011-07). ASU 2011-07 was issued to provide financial statement users with greater transparency about a health care entity's net patient service revenue and the related allowance for doubtful accounts. ASU 2011-07 requires health care entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time the services are rendered – even though they do not assess

the patient's ability to pay – to present the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) on their statements of operations. ASU 2011-07 will require certain health care entities to change the presentation of their statements of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts). Additionally, those health care entities are required to provide enhanced disclosure about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. ASU 2011-07 also requires disclosures of patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts), as well as certain qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. ASU 2011-07 will be effective for the Medical Center in 2012. Management is currently evaluating the effect that ASU 2011-07 will have on the Medical Center's future financial statements.

#### Reclassifications

Certain amounts for 2010 have been reclassified to conform with the 2011 presentation.

#### Subsequent events

Management has evaluated, for potential recognition or disclosure in the financial statements, subsequent events that have occurred through April 23, 2012, which is the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### 2. Community Benefits (Unaudited)

The Medical Center's philosophy embraces a definition of health that acknowledges the interdependence of biological, social, intellectual, environmental, and spiritual components. This definition has broadened the Medical Center's focus and prioritization of resources dedicated to improve the health of the communities within the Medical Center's geographic location. The Medical Center's mission is to lead and act as a catalyst in promoting health for all people in its service area. The Medical Center works to accomplish this by being willing to provide health care services to all members of the community, providing access to health information and support services, and acting as a catalyst and strategic partner in broad-based community initiatives.

In keeping with the Medical Center's mission to serve all members of the community, free care and/or subsidized care is provided. During the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center provided approximately \$5,923,000 and \$7,424,000, respectively, in free or charity care at established rates to qualified patients because of medical need and limited financial resources. Management estimates that the net cost of charity care provided was approximately \$3,048,000 and \$3,722,000 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. These estimates were based on the Hospital's overall ratio of cost to charges in each year. For the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, approximately 6% and 7%, respectively, of all inpatient admissions and approximately 3% of all outpatient visits were classified as charity care.

The Medical Center's Operations Management Team (the OMT) is comprised of its President, all members of the Medical Center's Executive Management Team, and certain other members of Management. The Medical Center's Director of Community Initiatives (the Director) reports directly to the OMT and is dedicated to research, community mobilization, and program coordination of community health initiatives. The OMT acts on the recommendations of the Director

The Medical Center believes in community partnerships and preventive programs which enhance the health and wellness of community members. According to Management, some of the Medical Center's efforts are as follows:

- Provides all community members with access to health information through its Planetree Health Resource Center Library (the PHRC) The PHRC also offers the Planetree Health Lecture Series on various health topics
- Physicians and nurses provide access to free or reduced cost primary care and school nursing services for uninsured students in the local school districts.
- Provides free prenatal classes and support programs focusing on prenatal care, testing, delivery, and post-partum care for high-risk pregnancies.
- Provides meeting facilities for various civic, charitable, and support groups.
- Provides funding and support for the Emergency Medical Service council.
- Provides support for American Red Cross Blood Drives.
- Provides support for the nursing program at Columbia Gorge Community College
- Provides and subsidizes EMT (emergency medical technician) training for several neighboring counties.
- Offers free interpretive services to Spanish-speaking community members, when necessary, for medical or financial dialogue
- · Funds local school districts with financial support and volunteer hours.
- Encourages staff to volunteer to make a difference through service to members of the community.
- Participates in community, senior, and diabetes health fairs by supplying health and safety information, demonstrations, and screenings.
- Sponsors monthly support groups for various health care-related issues and post-treatment support for affected patients.
- Provides a home care helpline service staffed by a registered nurse to help assess home care
  patient needs and link such patients to Oregon and Washington health care facilities, as
  appropriate.

#### 5. Mid-Columbia Health Foundation

As discussed in Note 1 to the accompanying financial statements, the Foundation raises funds for various health care providers in the Mid-Columbia region. Accordingly, generally only those funds restricted for use by the Medical Center are included in the Medical Center's interest in net assets of the Foundation in the accompanying balance sheets. During 2011 and 2010, the Foundation contributed \$253,853 and \$793,736, respectively, to the Medical Center for purchases of property and equipment. In addition, during 2011 and 2010, the Medical Center paid expenses on behalf of the Foundation totaling \$455,625 and \$437,199, respectively.

In January 2008, the Medical Center entered into a loan agreement with G.E. Capital (the G.E. Loan Agreement) to borrow \$10,000,000. The proceeds from the G.E. Loan Agreement were used to repay certain long-term debt, a capital lease obligation, and a note payable under a line of credit agreement. In addition, \$1,500,000 and \$1,000,000 of the proceeds were deposited into the debt service reserve account and deferred maintenance reserve account (collectively, "the reserve accounts") (see Note 3), respectively, as required under the G.E. Loan Agreement, and the remaining portion of the proceeds was primarily used

to pay for capital acquisitions. The G.E. Loan Agreement is due in monthly installments of approximately \$64,000, including interest at 5.85%, through December 2017, with a final payment of approximately \$7,600,000 due in January 2018. Borrowings outstanding under the G.E. Loan Agreement are secured by the reserve accounts, substantially all other assets of the Medical Center, and certain land and a building owned by Health Care with net carrying values of approximately \$60,000 and \$819,000, respectively, as of December 31, 2011. The G.E. Loan Agreement contains a financial covenant, limitations on additional indebtedness, and a prepayment penalty. The G.E. Loan Agreement also requires the prior notification to G.E. Capital of certain proposed additions to indebtedness, which, under the terms of the G.E. Loan Agreement, includes any guaranty.

In August and September 2011, the Medical Center entered into three separate note payable agreements with G.E. Financial (the G.E. Financial notes payable), with the proceeds used to finance certain tenant improvements. Aggregate borrowings under the G.E. Financial notes payable were approximately \$1,533,000. The G.E. Financial notes payable are due in monthly installments aggregating approximately \$29,000 – including interest at 4.98% – through August 2016 (with a final payment of approximately \$6,000 due in September 2016).

In September 2007, the Medical Center purchased a physical therapy (PT) business in The Dalles, Oregon for \$1,500,000 by paying \$300,000 in cash and entering into a \$1,200,000 note payable agreement (the PT note payable) with the sellers. Borrowings under the PT note payable are secured by inventory, accounts receivable, and equipment associated with the operations of the PT business. The PT note payable is due in annual installments of approximately \$293,000, including interest at 7.00%, through September 2012.

In December 2010, the Medical Center entered into a \$2.0 million line of credit agreement (the LOC Agreement) with Columbia State Bank (the Bank) There were no amounts outstanding under the LOC Agreement as of December 31, 2011 or 2010. Any borrowings outstanding under the LOC Agreement would bear interest at a variable rate based on the Bank's "base rate" (3.25% as of December 31, 2011). In March 2011, the Medical Center entered into a capital lease agreement with Winthrop (the 2011 Winthrop Lease) to partially finance the acquisition of certain information systems (IS) hardware and software. The anticipated total cost of such IS hardware and software to be financed under the 2011 Winthrop Lease is approximately \$750,000, and estimated total monthly payments are anticipated to be approximately \$16,000 per month for 48 months. Through December 31, 2011, approximately \$282,000 in IS hardware and software has been acquired and capitalized under the 2011 Winthrop lease, with the remaining equipment anticipated to be installed during 2012.

In March 2012, the Medical Center entered into an additional capital lease agreement with Winthrop (the 2012 Winthrop Lease) to partially finance the acquisition of certain additional IS hardware and software, anticipated to be installed over time. The anticipated total cost of such IS hardware and software to be financed under the 2012 Winthrop Lease is approximately \$500,000, and estimated total monthly payments are anticipated to be approximately \$11,000 per month for 48 months.

#### 8. Commitments and Contingencies

#### **Operating leases**

The Medical Center leases certain equipment and facilities under operating lease agreements which expire at various dates through 2030. Some of the lease agreements contain renewal options. Such lease agreements include a lease of a building from Lone Pine Health and Wellness Center, LLC (Lone Pine), a limited liability company that is partially owned by the Medical Center (see Note 12); certain leases of office space with Health Care that are month-to-month; and certain leases with Dry Hollow Professional Center, Inc. (Dry Hollow), an affiliate of Health Care, that are primarily month-to-month. The Medical Center's lease commitments with Lone Pine are as disclosed below; the Medical Center's lease commitment with Dry Hollow that extends beyond one year is not significant to the schedule below.

#### Other commitments

The Medical Center has entered into agreements related to certain medical equipment which require the Medical Center to pay monthly maintenance and support service fees of approximately \$22,000 through August 2013, approximately \$21,000 from September 2013 through August 2015, approximately \$15,000 during September 2015 and October 2015, and approximately \$14,000 from November 2015 through May 2016.

#### Medical malpractice insurance

Through August 31, 2010, the Medical Center participated in a captive insurance company, Health Future Insurance Exchange (HFIE), with four other hospitals, whereby each participating hospital shared in the payments of medical malpractice claims. Effective September 1, 2010, the Medical Center and HFIE entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (the MOU) with Mountain States Healthcare Reciprocal Risk Retention Group (MSH), a Montana-based captive insurance company. Under the terms of the MOU, the five hospitals participating in HFIE terminated their status as insured hospitals under HFIE and instead became insured member hospitals of MSH. Also under terms of the MOU, in exchange for the transfer of certain cash and cash equivalents from HFIE to MSH, MSH assumed direct responsibility for the management and payment of specified medical malpractice claims which were the responsibility of HFIE as of September 1, 2010 (generally, those medical malpractice claims which were asserted and/or reported to HFIE prior to September 1, 2010, or which relate to events and incidents which occurred prior to September 1, 2010). HFIE was dissolved effective September 30, 2010, and the remaining funds maintained by HFIE were returned pro-rata to its members; the amount received by the Medical Center was not significant to the accompanying financial statements.

Under the insurance arrangement with MSH, the Medical Center is responsible for the first \$25,000 of each of its medical malpractice claims, MSH is responsible for any amounts from \$25,000 to \$1,000,000 per claim and \$3,000,000 in aggregate, and MSH carries excess medical malpractice insurance coverage for amounts in excess of \$1,000,000 per claim up to \$21,000,000 per claim (and \$21,000,000 in aggregate for all claims of the Medical Center and \$61,000,000 in aggregate for all participating hospitals' claims). The insurance policy under this arrangement is on a claims-made basis. Under this policy, medical malpractice claims reported during the policy period are covered; however, any medical malpractice claim that has been incurred but not reported (IBNR) to the insurance company during the policy period is not covered.

As part of participation in MSH, each hospital pays premiums to MSH – calculated by an independent actuary – to pay future medical malpractice claims, as well as premiums for the excess coverage. Annually, the actuary calculates each hospital's required premiums based on the previous years' actual medical malpractice claims history. Each HFIE member joining MSH was required to support its premium with a contribution to a policyholders' surplus account (PSA) in an amount equal to one-third of its 2010 premium. The Medical Center's contribution, which was not significant to the accompanying financial statements, is included in other assets – net in the accompanying balance sheets. Similar contributions to the PSA are required annually. MSH will distribute its annual net income to members in the form of allocations to each member's savings account (SA) in proportion to the premiums paid by each member. In years in which the net income is less than zero, there will be no distribution. If the net amount of PSA contributions made to HFIE members and SA distributions to HFIE members is not sufficient to support the premiums for HFIE members in 2011, additional PSA contributions will be required toward the 2013 premiums.

Based on an actuarial valuation (with estimated future medical malpractice losses discounted at 2.00% as of December 31, 2011 and 3.5% as of December 31, 2010), the Medical Center has recorded estimated liabilities for IBNR medical malpractice claims, which, along with reported claims, aggregated approximately \$1,609,000 and \$517,000 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively (see Note 1), and are included

in other liabilities in the accompanying balance sheets. Management believes that these estimated liabilities are adequate; however, the establishment of estimated liabilities for reported and IBNR medical malpractice claims is an inherently uncertain process, and there can be no assurance that currently established reserves will prove adequate to cover actual ultimate expenses. Subsequent actual experience could result in reserves being too high or too low, which could positively or negatively impact the Medical Center's reported results of operations in future periods

#### Self-insurance

The Medical Center is self-insured for employee accident claims up to \$350,000 per claim and employee health claims up to \$150,000 per employee. Claims are accrued as the incidents which give rise to them become known. The provision and accrual for estimated employee accident and health claims include estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and IBNR claims and are based upon the estimated costs of settlement, including claim settlement expenses. The Medical Center has recorded estimated liabilities for reported and IBNR employee accident and health claims aggregating approximately \$879,000 and \$1,299,000, which are included in accrued liabilities in the accompanying balance sheets as of December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Management believes that adequate amounts have been accrued in the accompanying financial statements to cover estimated employee accident and health claims; however, the establishment of estimated liabilities for IBNR accident and health claims is an inherently uncertain process, and there can be no assurance that currently established reserves will prove adequate to cover actual ultimate expenses. Subsequent actual experience could result in reserves being too high or too low, which could positively or negatively impact the Medical Center's reported results of operations in future periods

In conjunction with the Medical Center's self-insured employee accident claims policy, Health Care obtained a \$425,000 standby letter of credit from a bank that extends through July 24, 2012, and Health Care maintains a restricted certificate of deposit with the same bank as collateral to support payment of the related claims.

#### Risk management

In the ordinary course of business, the Medical Center is exposed to various risks of loss from torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; business interruption; errors and omissions; and natural disasters. However, Management believes that adequate commercial insurance coverage has been purchased for claims arising from such matters. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010.

#### Guaranty

The Medical Center is a guarantor of a loan of Lone Pine (see Note 12). As of December 31, 2011, the Medical Center's maximum guaranty is \$4,500,000, which will be reduced to \$2,250,000 after two years and by \$750,000 in each of the three subsequent years if the borrower and guarantors meet certain conditions. In the opinion of Management, the likelihood that the Medical Center will be required to make any payments under the guaranty is remote, and the estimated fair value of such guaranty is not significant to the accompanying financial statements; accordingly, no liability related to this guaranty has been recorded in the accompanying balance sheets.

#### Collective bargaining agreement

As of December 31, 2011, approximately 18% of the Medical Center's employees are covered under a collective bargaining agreement (the CBA) with the Oregon Nurses Association (the ONA), which expires in June 2012. An extension of the CBA through June 2015 has been approved by the ONA.

#### Regulation and litigation

The health care industry is subject to various laws and regulations from federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Government activity has remained strong with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations which could result in the expulsion from government health care programs, together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of patient services previously billed and collected. Management believes that the Medical Center is in compliance with the fraud and abuse regulations, as well as other applicable government laws and regulations; however, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

During, and subsequent to, the year ended December 31, 2011, seven patients have filed significant lawsuits against the Medical Center claiming negligence and/or battery related to a certain independent anesthesiologist while undergoing surgical procedures at the Medical Center. The Medical Center believes that it has meritorious defenses against the lawsuits and that any related losses will be covered by its medical malpractice policy; however, the ultimate resolution of these matters is presently not determinable.

In addition, the Medical Center becomes involved in other litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the ordinary course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, Management believes that these matters will be resolved without causing a material adverse effect on the Medical Center's future financial position or results of operations.

#### Health care reform legislation

Health care reform legislation was passed in 2010, and – although its constitutionality is currently being considered by the U.S. Supreme Court – it is expected to dramatically impact the delivery of, and payment for, health care services as various provisions are phased in over approximately the next decade. This legislation had minimal impact on the accompanying financial statements; however, Management cannot presently determine the impact of such legislation on the Medical Center's future financial position or results of operations.

#### 9. Retirement Plan

The Medical Center has a contributory, defined contribution retirement plan (the Plan) covering substantially all full-time employees who are at least 18 years old. The Medical Center contributes 3% of each eligible participant's compensation to the Plan

Retirement plan costs associated with the Plan which were charged to operations were approximately \$2,409,000 and \$2,191,000 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

#### 10. Compensation Plans

The Medical Center has incentive and other compensation arrangements for certain employees. The Medical Center has accrued the estimated cost of such benefits to be provided to employees under these arrangements. Expenses charged to operations under these arrangements were approximately \$85,000 and \$81,000 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

#### 11. Affiliated Organizations

The Medical Center – along with several other affiliated organizations – is controlled by, and operates under the supervision of, Health Care. During 2010, the Medical Center wrote off approximately \$331,000 due from Health Care, and Mid-Columbia Health Services Inc. (Health Services) (an affiliate of Health Care which provides certain services for physicians and operated a medical equipment company through June 30, 2010) wrote off approximately \$355,000 due from the Medical Center. Accordingly, unrestricted net assets were increased by approximately \$24,000 during the year ended December 31, 2010.

Management believes that the amounts due from affiliates of Health Care as of December 31, 2011 will be repaid in the ordinary course of business. However, due to uncertainties related to this matter, it is at least reasonably possible that Management's view of this matter may change in the near-term, and this change could have a material impact on the Medical Center's financial statements in future periods.

Health Care provides management and related services to the Medical Center. Fees charged for these services – which Management believes approximates Health Care's cost for these services – were approximately \$1,500,000 and \$1,080,000 for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Such fees are included in purchased services and other expenses in the accompanying statements of operations.

#### 12. Other Related Party Transactions

#### CONet, Inc. (CONet)

The Medical Center maintains an investment in CONet, an Oregon public benefit nonprofit corporation established to facilitate the provision of certain health care services to central and eastern Oregon residents by combining the resources of certain hospitals in the central and eastern Oregon area. The Medical Center works cooperatively with hospitals in other communities through CONet to provide a smooth continuation of health care services. CONet also negotiates managed care contracts on behalf of its member hospitals and provides joint purchasing services. CONet's Board of Directors consists of the Medical Center's President and the chief executive officer of each of five other hospitals in the central and eastern Oregon area. The Medical Center's investment in CONet is being accounted for at cost.

CONet owned certain common stock of Clear One Health Plans, Inc. (COHP) that was attributed to each participating hospital, 16% of which was attributed to the Medical Center. COHP was a corporation which administered the OHP, Clear Choice Health Plans (a Medicare risk plan), and other commercial health insurance and third-party administrator programs in central and eastern Oregon. In May 2010, PacificSource Health Plans acquired COHP for \$26 per share. Accordingly, the Medical Center received approximately \$1,578,000 from the liquidation of its proportionate share of CONet's investment in COHP in June 2010 and recognized a gain of approximately \$1,452,000, which is included in other income - net in the accompanying 2010 statement of operations. Since the cost of the Medical Center's investment in CONet was entirely incurred as a result of the ownership of its proportionate share of CONet's investment in COHP, the Medical Center has appropriately reduced its investment balance in CONet to zero.

CONet had a managed care contract with COHP, whereby the Medical Center provided health care services to certain Medicaid recipients. The Medical Center's net patient service revenue related to this contract was approximately \$1,537,000 for the year ended December 31, 2010. The Medical Center also provided health care services to certain Medicare recipients under a managed care contract with Clear Choice Health Plans. The Medical Center's net patient service revenue related to this contract was approximately \$660,000 for the year ended December 31, 2010.

#### Lone Pine Health and Wellness Center, LLC

Lone Pine's three members are Lone Pine Holdings, LLC (40% ownership interest), I S. Rental Holdings, LLC (30% ownership interest), and the Medical Center (30% ownership interest). Lone Pine was formed in January 2009 to build, own, and operate a building, the construction of which was completed in June 2010 Upon completion of the building, the Medical Center began renting most of the building for certain of its operations (e.g., sleep center, outpatient rehabilitation, etc.) under an operating lease agreement (see Note 8) that requires payments of approximately \$1.4 million per year for a term of 20 years (with two 20-year renewal options) with annual increases based on the consumer price index. The \$1.4 million annual rent was based on the Medical Center occupying the entire building; however, a portion of the building was not occupied by the Medical Center until July 2011 Until the Medical Center occupied this remaining space, its monthly rental payments were reduced by approximately \$14,000. The Medical Center's investment Lone Pine was approximately \$243,000 and \$382,000 as of December 31, 2011 and 2010,

respectively. The Medical Center's investment in Lone Pine is being accounted for using the equity method and is included in other assets - net in the accompanying balance sheets. During the year ended December 31, 2011, the Medical Center received approximately \$107,000 in cash from Lone Pine. During the year ended December 31, 2010, the Medical Center received approximately \$369,000 in cash from Lone Pine, and approximately \$88,000 of the Medical Center's leasehold improvements were paid by Lone Pine in lieu of distributions. The Medical Center's share of Lone Pine's net losses for the years ended December 31, 2011 and 2010 were approximately \$32,000 and \$56,000, respectively, which are included in other income - net in the accompanying statements of operations.

In August 2010, Lone Pine entered into a loan agreement (the Loan) with a bank for \$12,000,000, and the Medical Center is a partial guarantor of the Loan, in an amount up to \$4,500,000 (see Note 8) In connection with the Loan, the Medical Center is required to maintain a deposit account in the amount of \$500,000 with this bank (see Note 3).

#### 14. Fair Value Measurements

GAAP defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and requires certain disclosures about fair value measurements. The hierarchy of fair value valuation techniques under GAAP provides for three levels ranging from Level 1 — which provides the most reliable measure of fair value — to Level 3 which, if applicable, generally would require significant management judgment. The three levels for categorizing assets and liabilities under GAAP's fair value measurement requirements are as follows:

- Level 1. Fair value of the asset or liability is determined using observable inputs such as quoted unadjusted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities,
- Level 2 Fair value of the asset or liability is determined using inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the applicable asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices for similar (as opposed to identical) assets or liabilities in active markets and quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active; and
- Level 3 Fair value of the asset or liability is determined using unobservable inputs that are significant to the fair value measurement and reflect the organization's own assumptions regarding the applicable asset or liability.
