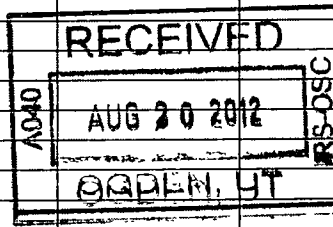

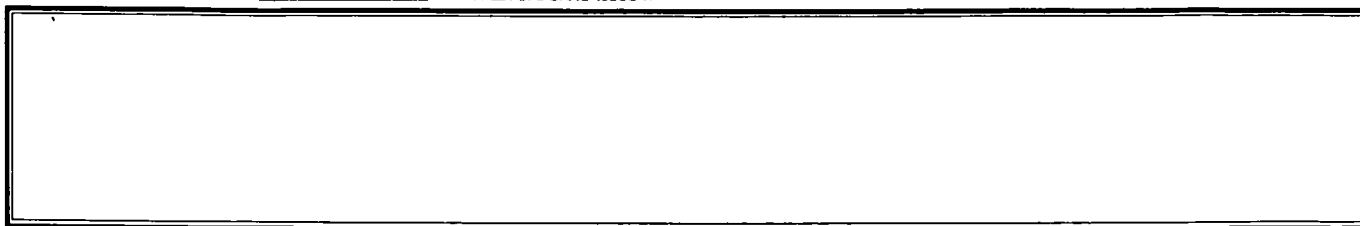

Another scenario or circumstance to stay alert to is calls from individuals claiming to be brokers befriending or coaching for opening a new account by transferring broker or savings/checking account funds This is often done without a total outlook of ones situation, or consideration of funding percentage of total assets and liabilities One should ask how can you verify if this person is the person they claim to be to check references, license(s)/registration(s), complaints, or compliance Like other telephone solicitation calls one can ask that person not to call back anymore, and remove from list The Direct Marketing Association has both phone and mailing list removal agreements when requested with its members Or if feeling threatened or abused enough practice using the techniques of the USA Justice Department anti-crime dog McGruff, public service announcement commercial of "Just hang up the phone", McGruff the Crime Dog says "I should Hang up the Phone" 2

Another website worthy to note with advertising sublimation reservation of its recommendation or suggestion is investopedia com Investopedia com is for the most part a free website with banner streaming ads by sponsors You can however enter long or no ending simulating game contests, in stocks and or stocks and options You can also create a private game for a period of time This can also be regarded as an alternative or variation to "Project Rockwell Job Creation and Development" described earlier This volunteer writer, editor has been involved in these simulated trades as private or competing games for a few years and sometimes experience congestion or slow server times in participating Other websites offer stock evaluations Investment Business Daily like Vectorvest com offers a couple of complimentary samples of their products evaluation and recommendation of stocks, Vectorvest com also has some International exchanges such as Canada and Australia Barchart com has besides USA stocks, Forex and Commodities buy and sell technical indicator data Another source of education can be found through USA investment clubs, all having various degrees of popularity and potential for education They are, unless properly structured

as legal entities limited, unlimited partnerships to keep in mind
for risks of tax and other legal implications of responsibility or

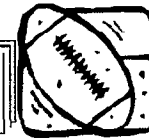

States by States in the United States offer Notary Licenses, International documents as work samples can model those of Attorneys from other Countries. In some States applicants are tested on Affidavits, and other sworn testimony procedures and legal proceeding records such as dispositions.
