Note 1 - Principal Business Activity and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Idaho Elks Rehabilitation Hospital, Inc (the Hospital) is licensed by the State of Idaho to provide certain medical services. In fiscal year 1973, the Hospital was incorporated as an entity separate from the Idaho State Elks. Association of which it was previously a part. At that time, the new corporation received determination from the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations that is not subject to federal or state income tax

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Hospital have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) and as recommended in the Audit and Accounting Guide for Health Care Organizations published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants

Under the accrual basis, revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recorded when an obligation has been incurred. The statement of operations is a statement of financial activities within the current reporting period. The Hospital classifies net assets, revenues, gains, and other revenues and expenses based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, the net assets of the Hospital and changes therein are classified and reported as follows.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets – permanently restricted assets are donor designated gifts which will be maintained permanently by the Hospital. The investment income earned on these permanently restricted net assets is generally restricted as to purpose and is recorded as temporarily restricted net assets.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets – temporarily restricted net assets are primarily available to support the Hospital by providing funds for charity care and nursing education

Unrestricted Net Assets - Net assets not subject to donor-imposed restrictions

The Hospital's policy is to report restricted revenues as unrestricted if the restriction is met in the same period as the revenues are recognized

Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Such estimates include the settlement liability with third-party payors, the allowance for contractual adjustments, and the allowance for bad debts. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of cash flows, the Hospital considers all cash on deposit in demand savings and time deposits with an original maturity date of three months or less to be cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents included in the specific purpose fund are Board designated, and are not used for operations, and thus not included in statement of cash flows. Cash deposits exceeded FDIC insured limits at May 31, 2012 and 2011.

Patient Receivables

Patient receivables are uncollateralized patient and third-party payor obligations. There is no interest charged on past due accounts. Payments of patient receivables are allocated to the specific claims identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, are applied to the earliest unpaid claim.

The carrying amount of patient receivables is reduced by a valuation allowance that reflects management's estimate of amounts that will not be collected from patients and third-party payors. Management reviews patient receivables by payor class and applies percentages to determine estimated amounts that will not be collected from third parties under contractual agreements and amounts that will not be collected from patients due to bad debts. Management considers historical write off and recovery information in determining the estimated bad debt provision. Accounts deemed uncollectible and all private pay balances over 180 days overdue are charged against this allowance.

Inventories

Inventories consist of medical supplies and are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in revenues in excess of (less than) expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from revenues in excess of (less than) expenses.

Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the near term could materially affect account balances and the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements

Fair Value Measurements

The Hospital has determined the fair value of certain assets and liabilities in accordance with the provisions of ASC 820 (formerly SFAS No 157, Fair Value Measurements), which provides a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles

ASC 820 defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date ASC 820 requires that valuation techniques maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs ASC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the valuation inputs into three broad levels

Level 1 inputs consist of quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the related asset or liability. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs related to the asset or liability. All of the Hospital's fair value measurements fall within the level one hierarchy, with the exception of corporate bonds and international bonds.

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment acquisitions in excess of \$500 capitalized and recorded at cost, except for donated assets, which are recorded at fair value at date of donation. All capital assets other than land are depreciated using the straight-line method of depreciation using the following estimated useful lives.

Land improvements	8 to 20 years
Buildings and fixed equipment	10 to 40 years
Major movable equipment	3 to 15 years
Autos, trucks and other equipment	3 to 8 years

Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred whereas expenditures for renewals and betterments are capitalized. Upon sale or retirement of depreciable assets, the related cost and accumulated depreciation are removed from the records, and any gain or loss is reflected in the statement of operations.

Investments in Joint Ventures

Investments in entities in which the Hospital has the ability to exercise significant influence over operating and financial policies but does not have operational control are recorded under the equity method of accounting Under the equity method, the initial investment is recorded at cost and adjusted annually to recognize the Hospital's share of earnings and losses of those entities, net of any additional investments or distributions. The Hospital's share of net earnings or losses of the entities is included in other income (expense)

Bond Issuance Costs

Bond issue costs are capitalized and amortized over the life of the related debt

Goodwill

During the year ended May 31, 2008, the Hospital purchased an audiology practice located in Ontario, Oregon The Hospital paid \$200,000 for the practice, and acquired various fully-depreciated assets of an immaterial value Goodwill represents the excess of cost over the fair value of the net assets acquired from business acquisitions

The Hospital is now required to test the recoverability of its goodwill on an annual basis and at interim periods when circumstances require. The goodwill testing utilizes a two-step impairment analysis, whereby the Hospital compares the carrying value of the reporting unit to its fair value. If the carry value of the reporting unit is greater than its fair value, the second step is performed, where the implied fair value of goodwill is compared to its carrying value. The Hospital recognizes an impairment charge for the amount by which the carrying amount of goodwill exceeds its fair value. The fair value of the reporting unit is estimated using the net present value of discounted cash flows, excluding any financing costs or dividends, generated by each reporting unit. The Hospital's discounted cash flows are based upon reasonable and appropriate assumptions about the underlying business activities of the Hospital's reporting unit. The Hospital performs its test for recoverability for goodwill each year and no impairments resulted from this review.

Assets Limited as to Use

In addition to assets temporarily and permanently restricted per the donor, the Board has set aside certain assets to be used for specific purposes. These purposes include the retirement of long-term debt, acquisition of capital assets, and charitable care. The Board, at its discretion, may use these assets for other purposes.

Compensated Absences

The Hospital has a paid-time-off (PTO) program that allows employees to earn vacation benefits based, in part, on length of service Employees may accumulate PTO up to a maximum of 320 hours. Employees are paid for accumulated PTO if employment is terminated.

Income Taxes

The Hospital is organized as a nonprofit corporation and has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Hospital is annually required to file a Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, the Hospital is subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to its exempt purpose. The Organization has determined it is not subject to unrelated business income tax and has not filed an Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return (Form 990T) with the IRS.

The Hospital believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken affecting its annual filing requirements, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements. The Hospital would recognize future accrued interest and penalties related to unrecognized tax benefits and liabilities in income tax expense if such interest and penalties are incurred. The Hospital's federal Form 990T filings are no longer subject to federal tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2009.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in the future periods as final settlements are determined

On June 1, 2002, the Hospital began being paid under a prospective payment system (PPS) PPS pays the Hospital based on categories of patient services rather than based on cost. Amounts received under these programs are subject to audit and retroactive settlements. Provisions for settlements are provided in the current year's deductions from revenues. Since these settlements are estimates, any difference between the amounts accrued and the amounts settled are recorded in operations in the year of settlement. The Hospital's Medicare and Medicaid cost reports have been settled by the Hospital's fiscal intermediaries through May 31, 2010 and May 31, 2008, respectively.

Revenues in Excess of (Less Than) Expenses

Revenues in excess of (less than) expenses excludes unrealized gains and losses on investments, transfers of assets to and from related parties for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions which were restricted by donors

Charity Care

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. The amount of charges foregone for services provided under the Hospital's charity care policy were approximately \$292,675 and \$344,749 for the years ended May 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Total direct and indirect costs related to these foregone charges were \$191,777 and \$229,745 for the years ended May 31, 2012 and 2011, calculated by multiplying the ratio of cost to gross charges for the Hospital by the gross uncompensated charges.

Advertising Costs

The Hospital expenses advertising costs as incurred

Costs incurred for producing and distributing advertising are expensed as incurred. The Hospital incurred \$349,148 and \$223,744 for advertising costs for the years ended May 31, 2012 and 2011.

Risk Management

The Hospital is exposed to various risks of loss from torts, theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets, business interruption, errors and omissions, employee injuries and illnesses, natural disasters, medical malpractice, and employee health, dental, and accident benefits. Commercial insurance coverage is purchased for claims arising from such matters. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the three preceding years.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2011 amounts to conform to the 2012 presentation

Subsequent Events

The Hospital has evaluated subsequent events through February 14, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued

Note 2 - Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows.

Medicare

Medicare pays a higher reimbursement for rehabilitation services to rehabilitation hospitals than to hospitals and other health care providers that are not classified as rehabilitation hospitals. Medicare has recently implemented the "60% Rule" for rehabilitation hospitals. Currently under this rule, 60% of the Hospital's patients have to meet certain acuity level requirements for the Hospital to retain its classification as a rehabilitation hospital and continue to qualify for the higher reimbursement rates from Medicare. However, this new rule could potentially adversely affect the Hospital significantly in the long-term

Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per visit. These rates vary according to a patient classification system based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through the year ended May 31, 2010.

Medicaid

Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology, subject to an operating cost limit. Outpatient services are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology based on costs as determined in the Medicare cost report, subject to a reduction of 5.8% for operating expenses and 10% for capital expenses. The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the fiscal intermediary. The Hospital's Medicaid cost reports have been final settled by the fiscal intermediary through the year ended May 31, 2009.

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and other organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 47% and 5%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient service revenue for the year ended May 31, 2012 and 48% and 14%, respectively, for the year ended May 31, 2011 Laws and regulations governing the Medicare, Medicaid, and other programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. The net patient service revenue for the years ended May 31, 2012 and 2011 increased (decreased) \$1,351,970 and (\$229,139), respectively, due to removal of allowances previously estimated that are no longer necessary as a result of final settlements and years that are no longer likely subject to audits, reviews, and investigations

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has implemented a Recovery Audit Contractor (RAC) program under which claims subsequent to October 1, 2007, are reviewed by contractors for validity, accuracy, and proper documentation. A demonstration project completed in several other states resulted in the identification of potential overpayments, some being significant. If selected for audit, the potential exists that the Hospital may incur a liability for a claims overpayment at a future date. The Hospital is unable to determine if it will be audited and, if so, the extent of the liability of overpayments, if any As the outcome of such potential reviews is unknown and cannot be reasonably estimated, it is the Hospital's policy to adjust revenue for deductions from overpayment amounts or additions from underpayment amounts determined under the RAC audits at the time a change in reimbursement is agreed upon between the Hospital and CMS

Note 3 - Concentration of Credit Risk

The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and many are insured under third-party payor agreements. The ultimate collectability from third-party payors is dependent upon the financial stability of the underlying third-party payor.

With regard to self-pay receivables, the Hospital's patient base consists primarily of residents of Western Idaho and Eastern Oregon. Ultimate collection of self-pay receivables is partially dependent on the underlying economic conditions in those areas. The economic conditions within the geographic region the Hospital serves, as well as the financial stability of the responsible party, are taken into consideration in determining the allowance for uncollectible accounts.

Note 6 - Joint Venture Partnership Agreements

The Hospital has entered into certain joint ventures with other health care providers, to provide certain services including

The Hospital has a joint venture partnership agreement with St. Luke's Regional Medical Center, named St. Luke's Idaho Elks Rehabilitation Services (SLIERS), through which they jointly provide rehabilitation services for the benefit of the communities they serve. The Hospital owns 50% interest in the joint ventures, and accounts for the joint venture using the equity method of accounting. The initial capitalization was limited to the joint venture's working capital needs and was funded equally by the two parties. Profits and losses are allocated and distributed between the partners in relation to the proportionate share of each partner's respective capital account to the total capital of the joint venture. The joint venture's scope of services includes adult and pediatric rehabilitation services that are provided in space leased from the Hospital. Income from the joint venture is included in other revenue and is considered a part of operations.

Effective June 1, 2006, the Hospital entered a second joint venture with St. Luke's Regional Medical Center, named Wound Care and Hyperbaric Center (WCHC), through which they jointly provide wound clinic and hyperbaric services for the benefit of the communities they serve. In accordance with the joint venture agreement, the Hospital's initial capital contribution was \$350,000 in cash, equipment, and start-up costs as well as its prior wound clinic operations. Effective October 1, 2010, the Hospital acquired 100% ownership of the Wound Care Meridian site in exchange for an 80% reduction in the existing investment. The 80% reduction in the WCHC equaled \$3,500,000 which was exchanged by the partners and recorded as a reduction in Due to joint ventures on the Hospital's books. This results in a 10% interest in any future earnings of the Boise site. Profits and losses are allocated and distributed between the partners in relation to the proportionate share of each partner's respective capital account to the total capital of the joint venture. Income from the joint venture is included in other revenue and is considered a part of operations.

The Hospital performs certain administrative functions related to the day-to-day operations of SLIERS and WCHC The Hospital is paid an administrative fee for these services

Note 7 - Employee Retirement Plan and Deferred Compensation Benefits

Employee Retirement Plan

The Hospital has a defined contribution plan for all eligible employees. Contributions charged to operations under the plan totaled \$289,978 and \$428,189, for the years ended May 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively

Deferred Compensation Benefits

The Hospital has deferred compensation agreements with certain former employees. These former employees are receiving retirement benefit payments over a specified period as provided for in their agreements. The Hospital has obtained life insurance policies on these individuals to fund the Hospital's obligations under the agreements.

During 2007, the Hospital also expanded a deferred compensation agreement with certain current employees in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457(b). Under the agreement, the Hospital contributes to the participant's plan and the participant selects investments from alternatives offered by the plan. The funds are held in trust accounts with a custodian, who is under contract with the Hospital to manage the plan. The deferred compensation is payable to the employee upon death, disability, or retirement.

Note 11 - Permanently and Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. The contributions received and income earned from temporarily restricted net assets is used to fund special programs, purchase library materials and capital equipment, or with the passage of time are available for Hospital operations. Net assets of \$21.027 and \$44.138 were released from donor restrictions for use in operations during 2012 and 2011, respectively

Permanently restricted net assets are those to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity. The income earned from permanently restricted net assets is used to provide educational scholarships or educational opportunities to Hospital employees. Realized investment gains and unspent investment earnings revert back to the corpus in the year earned.

Note 12 - Endowment

The Hospital's endowment consists of one fund established for the purposes of education. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Directors of the Hospital has interpreted the Idaho Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (IPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Hospital classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by IPMIFA. In accordance with IPMIFA, the organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds

- a) The duration and preservation of the fund
- b) The purposes of the organization and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- c) General economic conditions
- d) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- e) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- f) Other resources of the organization
- g) The investment policies of the organization

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Hospital has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Hospital must hold in perpetuity, and are invested in interest bearing investments.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Hospital relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Hospital targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

Consistent with the endowment agreement, the Hospital appropriates for distribution the interest and dividend income earned on the invested endowment assets. Accordingly, endowment assets are invested in interest and dividend bearing investments

Note 13 - Contingencies

Medical Malpractice Insurance

The Hospital maintains a claims-made policy for professional liability coverage, with excess coverage provided

through modified claims-made policies. The Hospital has a \$25,000 deductible requirement in relation to this coverage. The claims-made policies provide primary and excess coverage up to the policy limits for claims filed within the period of the policy term. The Hospital, based upon information available, has determined that no significant liability exists for potential losses incurred, but not reported, at May 31, 2012.

Litigation in the Ordinary Course of Business

The Hospital is involved in litigation and regulatory investigations arising in the ordinary course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without a material effect on the Hospital's financial statements at May 31, 2012.

Current Laws and Regulations

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments Compliance with these laws and regulations, specifically those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. As of February 14, 2013, management believes that the Hospital is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

Note 14 - Restatement and Correction of Error

During the year, management determined that, certain errors related to accounts receivable, investment in joint ventures, due to joint/from ventures and deferred compensation were not properly recorded.
