# NOTE 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization. Holy Cross Hospital, a division of Taos Health Systems, Inc (Hospital), located in Taos, New Mexico, is a not-for-profit 49-bed acute care hospital. The Hospital provides inpatient, outpatient, and emergency care services for residents of Taos County and surrounding areas. Admitting physicians are practitioners in the local area and employees of the hospital

In 2008, the Hospital established two 100% owned affiliates, MOMs and Taos Surgical Specialists (TSS) MOMs operates as an obstetrics and gynecology clinic and TSS is a surgery clinic. The Hospital also holds a majority interest in a subsidiary, Taos Sports Medicine Service, LLC (Taos Sports Medicine). Taos Sports Medicine contains two divisions, Taos MRI Services and Taos Center for Rehabilitation and Sports Medicine. The Hospital has a 50% ownership interest in Taos MRI Services, and a 66.7% ownership interest in Taos Center for Rehabilitation and Sports Medicine. The accompanying financial statements include all activities and accounts of the Hospital, MOMS, TSS, and Taos Sports Medicine. All transactions between these entities have been eliminated in consolidation. The outside investor's noncontrolling interest in Taos. Sports Medicine is included in the Hospital's financial statements as a noncontrolling interest in subsidiary.

The Hospital has a management agreement with Quorum Health Resources, a healthcare management company, to supervise and direct the daily operations of the Hospital The agreement expires in May 2014 Management fees were \$1,119,848 and \$915,958 in 2011 and 2010 The Hospital was provided other services by Quorum outside of the management agreement, which amounted to \$139,129 and \$173,064 in 2011 and 2010, respectively Fees for the other services provided by Quorum are included in the caption *Other Purchased Services* in the accompanying statements of operations

Basis of Presentation. Financial statement presentation follows the requirements of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) for not-for-profits Under this section, the Hospital is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets unrestricted net assets and temporarily restricted net assets

Use of Estimates. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period Actual results could differ from those estimates

# NOTE 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Recent Accounting Pronouncements In January 2010, the FASB issued guidance to improve disclosures about fair value measurements. The new guidance requires additional disclosures about transfers between levels within the fair value hierarchy and clarifies existing disclosure requirements regarding classes of assets and liabilities measured at fair value. The new guidance requires the Hospital to (a) disclose separately the amounts of significant transfers into and out of each level of the fair value hierarchy and describe the reasons for those transfers, (b) the Plan's policy for determining when transfers between levels of the fair value hierarchy are recognized, and (c) present information about purchases, sales, issuances, and settlements on a gross basis in the reconciliation of the beginning and ending balance of Level 3 fair value measurements. The new guidance is effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2009, except for the Level 3 reconciliation disclosures which are effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2010. The adoption of this guidance has been incorporated into the consolidated financial statements for the year ended May 31, 2011.

In August 2010, the FASB issued a new accounting standard related to the accounting by an insured entity for claims incurred under claims-made insurance and retroactive insurance contracts. Under this accounting standard, unless conditions that allow for the right of offset exist, offsetting prepaid insurance and receivables for expected recoveries from insurers against a recognized incurred but not reported liability or the liability incurred as a result of a past insurable event is no longer appropriate. The application of this guidance will result in claim liabilities and related insurance recoveries being recorded on a gross basis. This accounting guidance will be applied as of the beginning of the period of adoption with a cumulative effect adjustment recorded in equity as of the beginning of the period. The new accounting standard will be effective for the Hospital for its fiscal year ended May 31, 2012. The Hospital is currently evaluating the impact the adoption of this accounting standard will have on its consolidated financial statements and related disclosures.

In August 2010, the FASB issued a new accounting standard that will require the measurement of the amount of charity care provided to be based on the direct and indirect costs of providing that care This standard will be effective for the Hospital for its fiscal year ended May 31, 2012, with retrospective application to all periods presented The Hospital does not believe that the adoption of this standard will have a material effect on its consolidated financial statements

# NOTE 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Cash and Cash Equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents include all cash balances and highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less The Hospital places its temporary cash investments with high credit quality financial institutions At times, such deposits exceed FDIC insurance coverage, however, the Hospital has not experienced any losses in such accounts

Fair Value Measurements. The Hospital is required to follow a framework for measuring fair value under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States and provide disclosures about fair value measurements. Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Fair value is based on the assumptions market participants would use when pricing an asset or liability. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets (observable inputs) and the lowest priority to the Hospital's assumptions (unobservable inputs). Fair value measurements are required to be separately disclosed by level within the fair value hierarchy. For assets and liabilities recorded at fair value, it is the Hospital's policy to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when developing fair value measurements.

Except for certificates of deposit, investments are reported at fair value Certificates of deposit are carried at cost, which approximates fair value

Short-term Investments. Short-term investments consist of investments with original maturities between three months and one year. The short-term investments consist of certificates of deposit. At times, such investments may be in excess of the FDIC insurance limit, however, the Hospital has not experienced any losses in such accounts.

*Inventories*. Inventories consist of supplies and are stated at cost using the first-in first-out method

Investments. Investments are measured at fair value in the balance sheet Realized gains and losses on investments, and interest and dividend income are included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law As all investment securities are classified as available for sale, unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses and are recorded as changes in net assets Certificates of deposit exceed federal depository insurance and therefore are subject to custodial credit risk Management does not expect any losses in such accounts

# NOTE 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Assets Limited as to Use. Assets limited as to use primarily include investments held in brokerage accounts as collateral for the outstanding notes payable and designated assets set aside by the Board of Trustees (Board) for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes

Patient Accounts Receivable. Patient accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances Estimated provisions for doubtful accounts are recorded to the extent it is probable a portion or all of a particular account will not be collected. The Hospital determines if patient accounts receivable are past-due based on the date the service was performed, and the Hospital does not charge interest on past-due accounts

In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Company considers a number of factors, including the age of the accounts, changes in collection patterns, the composition of patient accounts by payor type, the status of ongoing disputes with third party payors and general industry conditions

Property and Equipment, Net Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life (3 to 40 years) of each class of depreciable assets and is computed on the straight-line method Equipment under capital leases is amortized on the straight-line method over a shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets

Investment Accounted for Under the Equity Method. The Hospital has a 50% ownership interest in Holy Cross Physicians Health Organization, Inc, a Physician Hospital Organization (PHO) created to present a united group of health care providers to negotiate contracts with managed care organizations. This investment is accounted for under the equity method of accounting Under the equity method, the original investment is recorded at cost and adjusted by the Hospital's share of undistributed earnings or losses of this entity

Net Assets and Changes Therein. Net assets and income, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions

Accordingly, the net assets of the Hospital and changes therein are classified and reported as follows

Unrestricted - Unrestricted net assets represent those resources that are not restricted by donors, or for which donor-imposed restrictions have expired

# NOTE 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Temporarily Restricted - Temporarily restricted net assets reflect donor-imposed restrictions that require the Hospital to use or expend the related assets as specified The restrictions are satisfied either by the passage of time or by the satisfaction of donor specified use

The Hospital records contributions as temporarily restricted if they are received with donor stipulations that limit their use through either purpose or time restrictions. When donor restrictions expire, that is, when a time restriction ends or a purpose restriction is fulfilled, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. Temporarily restricted contributions received and expended in the same accounting period are recorded in the unrestricted net asset category.

Excess of Revenues Over Expenses The statement of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets)

Net Patient Service Revenue. The Hospital has arrangements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed cost, discounted charges, and per diem payments Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net amounts realizable from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Charity Care. The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue The amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under the Hospital's charity care policy aggregated approximately \$4,404,735 and \$3,948,579 in 2011 and 2010, respectively

Advertising Costs. Advertising costs are expensed as incurred Advertising expense totaled \$187,661 and \$102,443 for the years ended May 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively

# NOTE 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Income Taxes. The Hospital is a tax-exempt organization and is not subject to federal or state income taxes, except for unrelated business income, in accordance with Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code In addition, the Hospital qualified for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation Unrelated business income tax, if any, is insignificant and no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements

The Hospital adopted the provisions of FASB, relating to accounting for uncertain tax positions on June 1, 2009, which had no financial statement impact to the Hospital The Hospital recognizes the tax benefit from any uncertain tax positions only if it is more likely than not that the tax positions will be sustained on examination by the tax authorities, based on the technical merits of the position Any such tax benefit is measured based on the largest benefit that has a greater than 50% likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement

The Hospital had no unrecognized tax benefits which would require an adjustment to the June 1, 2009 beginning balance of net assets and had no unrecognized tax benefits at May 31, 2011 or 2010 The Hospital files an exempt organization return with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) The Hospital is no longer subject to income tax examinations by the IRS for tax years through May 31, 2008

Financial Statement Reclassifications Certain 2010 financial information has been reclassified to conform to the 2011 presentation. These reclassifications did not affect the excess of revenues over expenses, total assets, total liabilities, or total net assets

Subsequent Events Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the balance sheet date but before financial statements are issued The Hospital recognizes in the financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the balance sheet, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the financial statements The Hospital's financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the balance sheet but arose after the balance sheet date and before the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued

The Company has evaluated subsequent events through September 27, 2011, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued

### NOTE 2. NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

Arrangements with Third-Party Payors. The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

Medicare. Inpatient acute care services and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Inpatient non-acute services and defined capital, and medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary.

Medicaid Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries through October 31, 2010 are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary

The New Mexico Medicaid program implemented a new hospital outpatient payment reimbursement based on a simplified Medicare APC method effective November 1, 2010 The prospective payment system (OPPS) reimbursements were set to 100% of the Medicare standard rate Under the new payment method cost reports will still be required, however cost report settlements are discontinued

Other third-party payors The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively-determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively-determined daily rates

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 36% and 34%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended 2011, and 35% and 21%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue, for the year ended 2010 Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term

#### NOTE 5. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Management uses a framework for measuring fair value That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements) The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows

Basis of Fair Value Measurement –

Level 1	Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the plan has the ability to access
Level 2	Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments without quoted market prices, but for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly
Level 3	In puts to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The Hospital has no Level 3 investments. In addition, the Hospital had no transfers between levels during the year ended May 31, 2011 and 2010.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value There have been no changes in the methodologies used at May 31, 2011 and 2010

Equities securities are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded

Mutual funds are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Hospital at year end using prices quoted by the relevant pricing agent

Corporate bonds are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the bond is traded

Federal agency mortgage-backed securities are backed by U S Government sponsored and federal agencies The fair value is determined using quoted market prices, recent market transactions and spread data for similar instruments Mortgage-backed securities are valued based on quoted prices in active markets for similar securities and are therefore considered Level 2 Measurements

During 2007, the Hospital entered into a Note Payable for the purchase of a parcel of land for the location of a clinic in Peñasco, New Mexico, totaling approximately 1 1 acres The Note Payable is secured by the underlying parcel

During 2002, the Hospital issued \$8,000,000 in Hospital Revenue Bonds (Series 2001 Bonds), the proceeds of which were used to fund the expansion, equipping, and furnishing of the Hospital to meet the rising demand of health care services The Series 2001 Bonds were paid off in 2009 with the issuance of various notes payable through the Hospital's brokerage The new notes are at varying interest rates and are collateralized by the Hospital's investment portfolio with the same broker

#### NOTE 10. PENSION PLAN

In June 1998 a collective bargaining agreement was entered into by the Hospital and the Professional Performance Association, affiliated with District 1199 NM, National Union of Hospital and Health Care Employees, AFSCME AFL-CIO As part of this agreement, a defined contribution pension plan (Plan) was established under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code as of that same date This agreement expired as of May 31, 2002 On June 1, 2008, an amended collective bargaining agreement was entered into by the aforementioned parties

Under the amended agreement, the Hospital agreed to match Plan contributions dollar for dollar, up to \$550 per fiscal year, increased to \$605 effective June 1, 2009, for participating employees who are members of the bargaining unit at a 0.4 FTE rate or higher, plus 18% of the amount by which the Hospital's excess of revenues over expenses exceeds 5% of total revenues Future contributions will be determined as new collective bargaining agreements are negotiated. There have been no changes to the amended agreement during fiscal year 2011

A similar contribution will be made for participating employees who are not members of the bargaining unit These employees receive a discretionary contribution which is five to ten percent of their annual salaries determined annually by management

The contribution allocated to participating employees who are members of the bargaining unit will be based on a service weighted formula where each year of service shall earn one point Each eligible non-per diem employee over the age of 21 shall receive a distribution based on the ratio of her/his points divided by the total points of all bargaining unit employees' times the total amount of the distribution. The contribution allocated to participating employees who are not members of the bargaining unit will be based on a simplified formula. All participants will vest in the Plan on a six-year graduated schedule but will be fully vested no later than their sixty-fifth birthday.

The Hospital accrued \$230,041 and \$139,603 as of May 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, as its contribution to the Plan

#### NOTE 11. COMMITMENTS

On December 1, 2001, the Hospital entered into a thirty-year facility lease agreement with the County of Taos, New Mexico Under the lease agreement the Hospital was required to make payments necessary to amortize the Series 2001 Bonds discussed in Note 8 As the Series 2001 Bonds are no longer outstanding, the Hospital has committed to pay for a new ambulance every two years, estimated at a total cost not to exceed \$105,000 Such cost is amortized over the two year period and recorded as rent expense

The Hospital has various operating leases for buildings and equipment Total expense approximated \$1,112,195 in 2011 and \$1,051,800 in 2010 for all operating leases. #### NOTE 12. CONTINGENCIES

Labor Agreements. At May 31, 2011, 313 of the Hospital's 500 employees and at May 31, 2010, 371 of the Hospital's 521 employees work under collective bargaining agreements All of the employees working under collective bargaining agreements are represented by unions whose existing labor agreements will expire on various dates during the fiscal year ending March 31, 2012

Employee Health Insurance The Hospital maintains a stop-loss agreement with an insurance company to limit its losses on individual claims related to group employee insurance Under the current terms of this agreement, the Hospital's claims liability is limited to \$70,000 per employee per plan year, subject to an individual participant lifetime maximum of \$930,000 As of May 31, 2011 and 2010, the Hospital accrued employee insurance claims of \$261,689 and \$348,215, respectively, which are included in accounts payable in the accompanying consolidated balance sheet

Stop-Loss premiums and claims payments totaling \$1,872,500 and \$1,981,510 were expended during the years ended May 31, 2011 and 2010, respectively, and are included in the *Employee Benefits* expense in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations

Professional Liability Insurance. The Hospital maintains claims-made commercial insurance related to professional and general liability risks. The first level coverage includes losses of \$1,000,000 per occurrence subject to a \$3,000,000 aggregate loss. The second level excess coverage further covers individual losses up to \$5,000,000.

#### NOTE 12. CONTINGENCIES (CONTINUED)

The Hospital maintained a deductible of \$150,000 on these policies through April 2012 The annual premium for these policies is included in insurance expense in the accompanying consolidated financial statements, and approximated \$1,035,600 in 2011 and \$920,000 in 2010 The current policies expire April 1, 2012 In prior years, the Hospital maintained similar claims-made policies, and certain claims as discussed below are covered under those policies

In the ordinary course of business, claims alleging malpractice and other matters are filed against the Hospital In addition, further claims may be filed for incidents that have occurred, including some of which the Hospital is not presently aware The claims are in various stages of processing, and some may ultimately be brought to trial The Hospital has recorded reserves, which are recorded net of any underlying insurance coverage, for various asserted and unasserted claims based on management's best estimate of the probable outcome of those matters Such reserves may change in future periods as more information becomes available to management

Workers' Compensation Insurance. The Hospital is insured under the New Mexico Hospital Workers' Compensation Group for the purpose of providing insurance coverage for workers' compensation. The policy is a retrospectively rated policy whose premiums accrue based on the ultimate cost of the experience of a group of participating health care entities. The Hospital expensed approximately \$433,900 and \$473,300 in workers' compensation premiums during 2011 and 2010, respectively. Such amounts are included in *Employee Benefits* expense in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations.

Cost Report Settlements. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been final settled for fiscal years through May 31, 2009, and Medicaid cost reports have been final settled for fiscal years through May 31, 2008 In management's opinion, the estimated third-party settlement payable of \$521,586 and receivable of \$93,261 at May 31, 2011 is adequate to provide for the cost of settling all cost reports However, there is at least a reasonable possibility that such estimates will change in the near term as all open cost reports are subject to audit by Medicare and Medicaid

In connection with the completion of the fiscal year 2010 cost report, management discovered the Hospital's costs attributed to Medicare Part A patients was significantly lower than prior years' cost levels Accordingly, there was a significant drop in the level of supplemental cost-based reimbursement received from the Rural Community Hospital Demonstration Project, which is further described below

Rural Community Hospital Demonstration Project The Hospital participates in a CMS demonstration project (project) to test the advisability and feasibility of establishing

#### NOTE 12. CONTINGENCIES (CONTINUED)

rural community hospitals to provide Medicare covered in patient hospital services in rural areas. Under the project, the Hospital receives reimbursement based on the reasonable costs of providing such services to Medicare beneficiaries as defined by the project. The Hospital participated in the project through its initial five year demonstration period ending May 31, 2010 and in April 2010 the project was extended through the Hospital's fiscal year end May 31, 2015. In April 2011, the hospital elected not to participate in the project for the remaining period due to the unexpected increase in patients enrolled in Medicare Advantage versus Medicare in fiscal year 2010. As a result of the declining enrollment, in fiscal year 2011, the Hospital refunded payments received from Medicare of \$1,761,259 and \$2,136,000 during fiscal years 2011 and 2010, respectively. The amounts are netted with net patient service revenue in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations.

Sole Community Provider Funding. The Hospital receives Sole Community Provider Funding to compensate the Hospital for providing health care to the indigent population in Taos County The funding is subject to annual reviews and approvals by Taos County as well as the State of New Mexico Human Services Department In fiscal years 2011 and 2010, the Hospital recognized Sole Community Provider Funding of \$8,443,029 and \$6,902,257, respectively Such amounts are reported as Net Patient Service Revenue in the accompanying consolidated financial statements This funding is essential to the Hospital's financial results and management believes this program will continue to be funded at levels similar to prior years

#### NOTE 13. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Hospital provides credit, in the normal course of business, to patients located primarily in Taos, New Mexico, and their respective insurance companies The Hospital performs ongoing credit evaluations of its patients and their respective insurance companies and does not require collateral with the extension of credit


