# NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **NATURE OF ACTIVITIES**

WCTC Foundation, Inc (Foundation) is a not-for-profit corporation whose purpose is to solicit, hold, manage, invest, and expend endowment funds and other gifts, grants, and bequests exclusively for the maintenance and benefit of the Waukesha County Technical College (WCTC)

The Foundation's financial statements are not included in the basic financial statements of WCTC. The criteria used to determine the composition of the financial reporting entity are based on oversight responsibilities exercised by WCTC's Board of Trustees. The manifestations of oversight include financial interdependency, selection of governing authority, designation of management, ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matters. The Foundation is a separate legal entity and operates with an independent governing body that is not under the control of the WCTC Board of Trustees. The WCTC Board of Trustees does not have the ability to influence the operations or approve the budgets of the Foundation.

# BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting

# CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For financial statement purposes, the Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less, when purchased, to be cash equivalents.

#### INVESTMENTS

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at fair value with realized and unrealized gains and losses included in the Statements of Activities

Investments are reported at fair value. The market values of investments are generally determined based on quoted market prices or estimated fair values provided by external investment managers or other sources. Investment transactions are recorded on the trade date Realized gains and losses on the sale of investments are calculated based on the specific identification of the securities sold.

The Foundation's Board of Directors has adopted a policy whereby funds will only be invested as individual investments or as mutual funds in common stock, preferred stock, U.S. government and agency securities, certificates of deposit, commercial paper of prime quality, convertible securities, corporate bonds, or money market funds.

# NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are stated at cost if purchased or fair market value at date of the gift if donated. All acquisitions of property and equipment in excess of \$200 and all expenditures for improvements and betterments that materially prolong the useful lives of assets are capitalized Maintenance, repairs, and minor improvements are expensed as incurred. When assets are retired or otherwise disposed of, their costs and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and resulting gains or losses are included in income.

Donated property and equipment are recorded as increases in unrestricted net assets at their estimated fair market value as of the date received. Contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as temporarily restricted contributions. The Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Foundation reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time

Property and equipment are depreciated using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives.

Buildings Land improvements Equipment 30-40 years 10 years 5 years

Depreciation expense was \$72,618 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and June 30, 2011.

#### **NET ASSETS**

Net assets, revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation are classified and reported as follows

Unrestricted Net Assets

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that either expire by passage of time or can be fulfilled and removed by actions of the Foundation pursuant to those stipulations

Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the Foundation to use all or part of the income earned on relative investments for general or specific purposes

# NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

# REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenues are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets, unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets. Gains and losses on investments are reported as increases or decreases in unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulations or by law. It is the Foundation's policy to show temporarily restricted revenues for which the restriction has been met within the same year of the receipt as unrestricted revenue. Expirations of temporary restrictions (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications from temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets, when receipt and expiration of restriction occur in different years.

#### **CONTRIBUTIONS**

Contributions, including contributions receivable, are recognized as revenues in the period received. Conditional promises are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of gift. Contributions to be received after one year are discounted at a rate commensurate with the risk involved. Amortization of the discount is recorded as additional contribution revenue and used in accordance with donor-imposed restrictions, if any, on the contributions. Allowance is made for uncollectible contributions based upon management's judgment and analysis of the creditworthiness of the donors, past collection experience and other relevant factors. The allowance for uncollectible contributions was \$-0- as of June 30, 2012 and 2011. All contributions are expected to be collected within one year. There were no pledges collateralized or limited in use

# **ESTIMATES**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

#### RECLASSIFICATIONS

For comparability, certain 2011 amounts have been reclassified to conform with classifications adopted in 2012. The reclassifications have no effect on reported amounts of net assets or change in net assets.

# NOTE 2 - CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

## NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Foundation follows current authoritative guidance, which provides a framework for measuring, reporting and disclosing fair value under generally accepted accounting principles. The guidance applies to all assets and liabilities that are measured, reported and/or disclosed on a fair value basis.

As defined in the guidance, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Foundation uses various valuation methods including the market, income and cost approaches. The assumptions used in the application of these valuation methods are developed from the perspective of market participants pricing the asset or liability. Inputs used in the valuation methods can be either readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. Whenever possible the Foundation attempts to utilize valuation methods that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation methods the Foundation is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Assets and liabilities measured, reported and/or disclosed at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories.

- Level 1 Quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable market based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data

A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement

**Money market funds** - The fair value of short-term investments, consisting primarily of money market funds, is classified as Level 1

**Mutual funds** - Mutual funds are classified as Level 1 if they are traded in an active market for which closing prices are readily available

**Exchange-traded products** - Investments in equity securities are measured at fair value using quoted market prices. They are classified as Level 1 as they are traded in an active market for which closing stock prices are readily available.

While the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different estimate of fair value at the reporting date

#### NOTE 4 - COMPENSATED ABSENCES

#### Vacation

The Foundation employees are granted vacation in varying amounts, based on position and length of service. Vacation pay is accrued when earned. The liability also includes salary-related payments, including social security taxes and Medicare taxes. The accrued vacation pay liability at June 30, 2012 and 2011 amounted to \$51,770 and \$47,834, respectively. This amount can be carried over to the subsequent year and is considered short-term.

#### Sick

Employees who have been employed by the Foundation for a minimum of fifteen years and who retire, resign, or die, shall be paid for accrued sick leave compensated in the amount of sixty percent of their current salary rate for the number of days for which they qualify. Sick pay is accrued when earned The liability also includes salary-related payments, including social security taxes and Medicare taxes. The accrued sick pay liability at June 30, 2012 and 2011 amounted to \$13,359 and \$10,642, respectively. This amount can be carried over to subsequent years and is considered long-term.

#### **NOTE 5 - INCOME TAXES**

The Foundation has received a tax determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service indicating that it is a tax-exempt organization as provided for in Section 501(c)(3) of the U S Internal Revenue Code and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation. Therefore, it is exempt from federal and state income taxes, except for taxes pertaining to unrelated business income. No provision has been made for income taxes in the accompanying financial statements because the Foundation has no significant unrelated business income. In accordance with a change in its bylaws, effective February 27, 2009 the Foundation received designation as a Type I supporting organization.

#### NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Foundation was formed to solicit, hold, and invest contributions for the benefit of WCTC The Foundation is governed by a 22 member Board of Directors that includes four members who are employees and officers of WCTC. The Foundation leases space in its Morris Street Building and Workforce Development Center to WCTC (see note 8).

The Foundation leases the grounds on which the Workforce Development Center is located from WCTC for \$1 per year plus \$4 per square foot, adjusted annually for the change in the Consumer Price Index, for facility operating and maintenance costs. These costs totaled \$183,722 and \$178,701 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The original lease term expiration date was December 31, 2004. In July 2004 the lease was renewed for a five year term commencing January 1, 2005 and expiring December 31, 2009. In August 2009, the Foundation renewed the lease for an additional five year term commencing January 1, 2011 and an expiration date of December 31, 2014. The present value of the difference between the fair value to rent the land and the amount paid by the Foundation over the life of the lease has been reflected as land on the balance sheet, resulting in an increase to temporarily restricted net assets. The asset is being amortized to rent expense over the life of the lease. WCTC recognized \$2,152 and \$2,299 as rent expense for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, and will do so for each subsequent year over the term of the lease.

WCTC paid \$174,039 and \$168,970 to the Foundation for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 respectively, for services received by WCTC from the Foundation.

## NOTE 8 - LEASE REVENUE

The Foundation leases space in its Workforce Development Center building to WCTC, Waukesha County, and the State of Wisconsin A lease with the State of Wisconsin was renewed for a period of five years commencing January 1, 2010 Leases with Waukesha County and WCTC were renewed for a period of five years commencing January 1, 20011 These monthly rentals include certain operating and capital maintenance costs which are annually adjusted by the consumer price index Rental income of \$245,995 and \$237,012 are included in revenue for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively

The Foundation also leases space in its apartment building to WCTC for \$9,600 per month. A five year lease beginning on July 1, 2011 runs through June 2016.

#### NOTE 9 - ENDOWMENT

The Foundation follows current authoritative guidance on classifying net assets associated with donor-restricted endowment funds held by organizations that are subject to an enacted version of Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA). A key component of the guidance is a requirement to classify the portion of a donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified as permanently restricted net assets as temporarily restricted net assets until appropriated for expenditure. The State of Wisconsin adopted a version of UPMIFA effective August 4, 2009.

The Foundation's endowment consists of approximately 47 individual funds established for a variety of purposes. Its endowment includes donor-restricted endowment funds. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law - The Foundation's governing board has interpreted the UPMIFA enacted in the State of Wisconsin as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of the gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund

The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified as permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Foundation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds.

- 1 The duration and preservation of the fund
- 2 The purposes of the Foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- 3. General economic conditions
- 4. The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- 5. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- 6. Other resources of the Foundation
- 7 The investment policies of the Foundation

## NOTE 9 - ENDOWMENT (CONTINUED)

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters - The Foundation has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Foundation must hold in perpetuity or for donor-specified periods. Under this policy, as approved by the governing board, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that exceed prevailing money market interest rates while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. The Foundation expects its endowment funds, over time, to provide an average annual rate of approximately 5% annually. Actual returns in any year may vary from this amount.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives - To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Foundation relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Foundation targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy - The Foundation has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year 5% of its endowment fund's average fair value over the prior 12 quarters through the calendar year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Foundation considered the long-term expected return on its endowment Accordingly, over the long term, the Foundation expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment to grow at a level that meets or exceeds increases in the Consumer Price Index. This is consistent with the Foundation's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return

## **NOTE 10 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS**

The objective of a financial statement audit is the expression of an opinion on the financial statements. We conducted the audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. These standards require that we plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are free of material misstatement, whether caused by error or fraud. Our audit included examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, and evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. Our audit does not relieve management or Board of Directors of their responsibilities.

No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during 2012.

We noted no transactions entered into by the Foundation during the year that were both significant and unusual, and of which, under professional standards, we are required to inform you, or transactions for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected.

The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements were:

• The Market Value of Investments: Management's estimate of the market value of investments was based on information provided from the Foundation's investment brokers.

We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the estimates in determining that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. There were no misstatements identified.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, concerning a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditors' report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Foundation's financial statements, or a determination of the type of auditors' opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter. Management has indicated that they have forwarded these representations to our primary contact within the governance structure.

Significant Issues

Independence

#### **Recent Accounting Developments**

### Not-For-Profit Advisory Committee

The Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") created a Not-for-Profit Advisory Committee to provide focused input and feedback to the FASB on the industry. This includes analysis of existing guidance, current and future issues and to assist the FASB Board in its communication of standards and guidance to the not-for-profit sector. In November 2011, the FASB added two new projects to its agenda as a result of recommendations made by the Not-for-Profit Advisory Committee

- Review of not-for-profit financial statement presentation
  - Examining revisions to net asset classification definitions
  - Improving clarity of the statements of activities and cash flows
  - Adding additional commentary and analysis by management regarding the financial health and operations of the organization
  - Streamlining disclosures
- Research the other means of communication in which not-for-profits share their financial story with donors, creditors, and other stakeholders to determine if there are best practices the FASB should promote.

Currently, there are no proposed dates for these projects to be completed.

#### Fair Value Measurement

In May 2011, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update 2011-04, "Fair Value Measurement: Amendments to Achieve Common Fair Value Measurement and Disclosure Requirements in U.S. GAAP and IFRSs" ("ASU 2011-04"). ASU 2011-04 is intended to improve consistency in the application of fair value measurement and disclosure requirements between accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP") and International Financial Report Standards ("IFRS"). The FASB has amended the fair value wording requirements for measuring and disclosing information within U.S. GAAP. The update is segregated into the following:

- Clarify intent of existing requirements
- Change in a requirement for measurement or disclosure

ASU 2011-04 is effective for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011 (i.e. 2013).

#### Revenue Recognition

The FASB revised and reissued another exposure draft of Accounting Standards Update, "Revenue Recognition (Topic 605): Revenue from Contracts with Customers". This exposure draft is a joint clarification project between the FASB and the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB"). The Proposed Standard would supersede most of the current guidance regarding revenue recognition. The core principle of the Proposed Standard is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled for delivery of the goods or services. Recognizing revenue would follow a five step process.

The Proposed Standard also includes additional quantitative and qualitative disclosure requirements.

Contributions and other public support is excluded from the scope of the exposure draft.

The FASB anticipates that this standard will require retrospective application when adopted. There is not an expected application date; however, the FASB does not plan to issue the statement with an effective date any earlier than reporting periods beginning on or after January 1, 2015 for public entities. It is expected that nonpublic entities will have an additional year to implement

#### Leases

The FASB and IASB have published an exposure draft to propose an update for the treatment for leases. The new accounting model for leases under the proposed update would be to capitalize all leases, both capital and operating, as assets and liabilities on the statement of financial position.

- a lessee would recognize an asset representing its right to use an underlying asset during the term of the lease and a liability to make lease payments. The lessee would amortize the right of use asset over the expected lease term or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is shorter. Interest expense on the liability would be incurred over the term of the lease.
- a lessor would apply either a performance obligation approach or a derecognition approach to
  account for the assets and liabilities arising from a lease. The accounting approach for the
  lessor depends on the exposure to significant risks or benefits associated with the underlying
  asset during or after the expected term of the lease.

The FASB anticipates re-opening the comment period on the proposed draft in the second half of 2012.

We recommend that management determine the potential implications these pronouncements may have on the Foundation upon implementation. We would be happy to discuss any of these items with you.
