






Note 1 - Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

Avera St. Benedict Health Center (Center) operates a 25-bed critical access hospital, a 47-bed nursing home, a 28-bed assisted living center and rural health clinics located in Parkston, Tripp and Lake Andes, South Dakota. The Center is organized as a South Dakota nonprofit corporation and is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Center operates under the tenets of the Roman Catholic Church and in accordance with the philosophy and values established for Avera Health, the sole member of the Center and a sponsored ministry of the Benedictine and Presentation Sisters.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use.

Patient and Resident Receivables

Patient and resident receivables are uncollateralized patient, resident and third-party payor obligations. Unpaid patient and resident receivables, excluding amounts due from third-party payors, with invoice dates over 90 days old for patient receivables and 90 days old for resident receivables, have interest assessed at 1 percent per month. Payments of patient and resident receivables are allocated to the specific claims identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, are applied to the earliest unpaid claim.

Patient and resident accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill, the Center records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Center's process for calculating the allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients has not significantly changed from June 30, 2011 to June 30, 2012. The Center does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write offs from third-party payors. The Center has not significantly changed its charity care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal years 2012 or 2011.

Physician and Employee Notes Receivable

The Center issues notes to physicians and employees as part of its recruitment process. Notes are repayable over a minimum of a two-year period to a maximum of a three-year period and are issued at current interest rates ranging from 0% to 5.25%. The notes are issued with forgiveness provisions over the life of the note to encourage retention. Based on historical analysis, it is anticipated that the balance of the notes will be forgiven. At June 30, 2012 and 2011, notes receivable from physicians and employees totaled \$138,147 and \$0. The physician and employee notes receivable are included in other receivables on the balance sheet.

Supplies

Supplies are valued at lower of cost (first in, first out) or market.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements and debt redemption over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes, assets held by trustees under an indenture agreement and assets held by the Avera Health Foundation. Assets limited as to use that are required for obligations classified as current liabilities are reported in current assets.

Interest in Net Assets of Avera Health Foundation

Avera Health Foundation, an affiliate of the Center, solicits contributions and holds funds on behalf of the Center. The Center's interest in these funds is recorded in assets limited as to use in the accompanying financial statements. Changes in the funds held by the Foundation are recorded as changes in interest in net assets of Avera Health Foundation in the accompanying financial statements.

Investments and Investment Income

Investments with readily determinable market values are stated at fair value. The fair value of all debt and equity securities with readily determinable fair values are based on quotations obtained from national and foreign securities exchanges. The fair value of certificates of deposit is recorded at historical cost, plus accrued interest. The Center has adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 825. ASC 825 permits entities to choose to measure many financial instruments and certain other items at fair value. All investments are classified as trading securities, therefore investment income or loss (including interest income, dividends, net changes in unrealized gains and losses, and net realized gains and losses) is included in revenues in excess of expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Investment income on funds held under indenture agreements is recorded as other operating revenue while all other investment income is recorded as nonoperating revenue in the statement of operations.

The Organization, through its affiliation with Avera Health, participates in the Avera Pooled Investment Fund, a fund administered by Avera Health. The Pooled Investment Fund has a portion of its holdings in alternative investments, which are not readily marketable. These alternative investments include partnerships and other interests that invest in hedge funds, real asset funds, and private equity/venture capital funds, among others. Many of these alternative investments have fair values that are determined using the net asset value (NAV) provided by the investment manager. NAV is a practical expedient to determine the fair value of investments that do not have readily determinable fair values and prepare their financial statements consistent with the measurement principles of an investment company or have the attributes of an investment company. Investment income, including interest, dividends, realized gains and losses, and unrealized gains and losses are allocated to participants of the Avera Pooled Investment Fund based upon their pro rata share of the investments.

Cash Surrender Value of Life Insurance

Life insurance policies are measured at the surrender value under the contract which represents the amount of cash available through settlement of life insurance contracts as of the date of the balance sheet.

Fair Value Measurements

The Center has determined the fair value of certain assets and liabilities in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, which provides a framework for measuring fair value.

Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Valuation techniques should maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

A fair value hierarchy has been established, which prioritizes the valuation inputs into three broad levels. Level 1 inputs consist of quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the related asset or liability. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs related to the asset or liability.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions in excess of \$5,000 for the hospital and \$1,000 for the nursing home are capitalized and recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed on the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives of property and equipment are as follows:

Land improvements	3-25 years

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets, and are excluded from revenues in excess of expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the related obligation is outstanding using the effective interest method and the straight-line method. Amortization of deferred financing costs is included in interest expense in the financial statements.

Impairment of Long-lived Assets

The Center considers whether indicators of impairment are present and performs the necessary analysis to determine if the carrying values of assets are appropriate. No impairment was identified for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011.

Income Taxes

The Center is organized as a (South Dakota) nonprofit corporation and has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Center is annually required to file a Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, the Center is subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to its exempt purpose. The Center has determined it is not subject to unrelated business income tax and has not filed an Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return (Form 990T) with the IRS.

The Center believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken affecting its annual filing requirements, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Center in perpetuity.

Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

The Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Center at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient and resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

The Center recognizes patient and resident service revenue associated with services provided to patients and residents who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered, as noted above. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Center's uninsured patients and residents will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Center records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients and residents in the period the services are provided. Net patient and resident service revenue, but before the provision for bad debts, recognized for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 from these major payor sources, is as follows:

Revenues in Excess of Expenses

Revenues in excess of expenses excludes transfers of assets to and from related parties for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions which were restricted by donors.

Charity Care

To fulfill its mission of community service, the Center provides health care services to patients and residents who meet certain criteria under its Charity Care Policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Since the Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient and resident service revenue. The estimated cost of providing these services was \$103,000 and \$141,000 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, calculated by multiplying the ratio of the gross charges for the Center by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing charity care to its patients.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Center are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor stipulated time restriction or purpose restriction are met or accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the statement of operations.

Advertising Costs

The Center expenses advertising costs as incurred.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Reclassifications

Reclassifications have been made to the June 30, 2011 financial information to make it conform to the current year presentation. The reclassifications had no effect on previously reported operating results or changes in net assets.

Subsequent Events

The Center has evaluated subsequent events through September 28, 2012, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 - Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

The Center has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Center at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare – Hospital: The Hospital is licensed as a Critical Access Hospital (CAH). The Hospital is reimbursed for most acute care services at cost plus one percent with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Center and are subject to audits thereof by the Medicare intermediary. The Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medical fiscal intermediary through the year ended June 30, 2010.

Medicare – Clinics: The clinics are designated as Provider Based Rural Health Clinics by the Medicare program. As a result, clinical services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are reimbursed at cost.

Medicaid: Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Clinical and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology.

Wellmark - Blue Cross: Services rendered to Wellmark - Blue Cross subscribers are reimbursed under prospectively determined percentage of charges and fixed payment rate methodologies.

Medicare and Medicaid – Nursing Home: The Center participates in the Medicare program for which payments for resident services is made on a prospectively determined per diem rate which varies based on a case-mix resident classification system. The Center is reimbursed for Medicaid nursing home resident services at established billing rates which are determined on a cost-related basis subject to certain limitations as prescribed by the South Dakota Department of Social Services regulations. These rates are subject to retroactive adjustment by field audit.

The Center has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial and managed care insurance carriers and other organizations. The basis for payment to the Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 40% and 11% of the Center's gross patient service revenue for the year ended June 30, 2012 and 39% and 13% for the year ended June 30, 2011. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare, Medicaid, and other programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

Note 9 - Endowment

The Center's endowment consists of a portion of their interest in the net assets of the Avera Health Foundation (Foundation). The Avera Health Foundation includes endowment funds which have been established for a variety of purposes. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments (if any), are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. The Center's permanently restricted endowment funds are donor restricted and totaled \$45,033 and \$44,865 at June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Center has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Center classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Center in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Center considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- (1) The duration and preservation of the fund
- (2) The purposes of the Foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of the Foundation
- (7) The investment policies of the Foundation

Funds with Deficiencies

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor requires the Foundation to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, deficiencies of this nature are reported in unrestricted net assets. There were no such deficiencies that were deemed material as of June 30, 2012 and 2011.

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Avera Health Foundation has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the Center must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period. Under these policies, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that meet the price and yield investment returns established by the Avera Pooled Investment Committee while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. The Center expects its endowment funds with the Avera Health Foundation, over time, to provide an average rate of return of approximately 6%-8% annually. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Foundation relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Foundation targets a diversified asset allocation including equity securities, fixed-income securities, hedge funds, and private equity to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Avera Health Foundation Board of Directors determines the annual spending rate and distribution amounts based on a review of the average market value of the endowment funds over the most recent 20 quarters. Local governing boards review the spending rate and distribution information and determine if payouts that would invade the corpus would be fiscally responsible.

Note 10 - Self-Insurance Programs

The Center participates in various self-insured programs administered by Avera Health, including pooled-risk workers' compensation, and employee health and dental insurance.

Under the programs, Avera Health has recognized an exposure to possible liability in an amount necessary to reasonably provide for the expected losses of the participants. The amount of the exposure, as determined by independent actuaries in consultation with Avera Health for the workers' compensation program and actuarial templates in the case of health and dental insurance, has been funded by payments into a custodial account to be used for payment of claims and related expenses.

The programs include a combination of self-insurance and commercial insurance. The expenses of the Center for contributions to the self-insurance portion of the programs were as follows for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011:

Workers' compensation claims have been asserted against the participating facilities and the program by various claimants. The claims are in various stages of processing and some may ultimately be brought to trial. Counsel is unable to conclude as to the ultimate outcome of the actions. There are other known incidents occurring through June 30, 2012, that may result in the assertion of additional claims and other claims may be asserted arising from services provided in the past.

There are also known health insurance claims that have been submitted subsequent to June 30, 2012, and it is likely there are also other claims that still have not been submitted for services provided prior to June 30, 2012.

While it is possible that the settlement of asserted claims and claims which may be asserted in the future could result in liabilities in excess of amounts for which the programs have provided, management believes that the excess liability, if any, should not materially affect the financial position of the Center at June 30, 2012.

Note 11 - Pension Plan

Substantially all employees are covered by a noncontributory defined contribution pension plan whereby the Center contributes up to 4% of eligible covered compensation and a maximum of 5% if the employee voluntarily contributes 3%. Total pension expense was \$355,617 and \$345,046 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011.

Note 12 - Malpractice Insurance

The Center has malpractice insurance coverage to provide protection for professional liability losses on a claims-made basis subject to a limit of \$1 million per claim and \$3 million annual aggregate. The Center is also insured under an excess umbrella liability policy with a limit of \$35 million. Should the claims-made policy not be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term, but reported subsequently, would be uninsured.

Note 13 - Related Party Transactions

Note 16 - Change in Accounting Principle

As of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, the Center adopted the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2011-07, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities*, as allowable. In accordance with the implementation guidance, the Center retroactively applied the presentation requirements to 2011. The impact on 2011 was a decrease to unrestricted revenues, gains, and other support of \$243,148, and a decrease to total expenses of \$243,148 in the statement of operations (and changes in net assets). There was no impact on operating income or net assets.
