Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

Community Health Partners, Inc. d/b/a Unity Health Center (the Health Center) is located in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Health Center is licensed to operate 102 acute care and 12 rehabilitation beds. The Health Center primarily earns revenues by providing inpatient, outpatient, emergency, skilled nursing and rehabilitation care services to patients in Pottawatomie County, Oklahoma.

As discussed in *Note 15*, the Health Center entered into an Asset Purchase Agreement to sell substantially all of the assets owned by the Health Center in connection with its operations and transfer substantially all non-bond debt liabilities effective July 1, 2012. Therefore, the accompanying consolidated financial statements for 2012 are as of and for the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012.

Principles of Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Health Center and the Unity Health Foundation (the Foundation). All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Health Center considers all liquid investments, other than those limited as to use, with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers and certificates of deposit.

Effective July 21, 2010, the FDIC's insurance limits were permanently increased to \$250,000. At June 30, 2012, the Health Center's cash accounts did not exceed federally insured limits.

Pursuant to legislation enacted in 2010, the FDIC will fully insure all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts beginning December 31, 2010 through December 31, 2012, at all FDIC-insured institutions.

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. The investments in joint venture and Heartland are recorded under the equity method of accounting (cost plus equity in the joint venture's undistributed net income or loss since acquisition). Other investments are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income; realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value; and realized gains and losses on other investments.

Investment return that is initially restricted by donor stipulation and for which the restriction will be satisfied in the same year is included in unrestricted net assets. Other investment return is reflected in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets held by trustees and assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Health Center are included in current assets.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Health Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Health Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Health Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011

The Health Center's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients increased from 80% of self-pay accounts receivable at September 30, 2010, to 85% of self-pay accounts receivable at September 30, 2011. This increase was the result of negative trends experienced in the collection of amounts from self-pay patients in fiscal year 2011.

Supplies

The Health Center states supply inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. Assets under capital lease obligations are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

The estimated useful lives for each major depreciable classification of property and equipment are as follows:

Buildings and improvements	5–40 years
Land improvements	3–15 years
Equipment	5–20 years

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

The Health Center capitalizes interest costs as a component of construction in progress, based on the weighted-average rates paid for long-term borrowing. Total interest incurred was:

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt. Such costs are being amortized over the term of the respective debt using the straight-line method.

Assets Held for Sale

Assets are classified as held for sale when their carrying value will be recovered principally through a sales transaction rather than through continuing use. At June 30, 2012, the Health Center has classified all of the property and equipment as held for sale due to the pending transaction discussed in *Note 15*.

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Health Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Health Center at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known.

Charity Care

The Health Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Health Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

Contributions

Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Conditional contributions are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

Income Taxes

The Health Center and Foundation have been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the Health Center and Foundation are subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

The Health Center and Foundation file tax returns in the U.S. federal jurisdiction. With a few exceptions, the Health Center and Foundation are no longer subject to U.S. federal examinations by tax authorities for years before 2008.

Excess of Revenues over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets).

Transfers Between Fair Value Hierarchy Levels

Transfers in and out of Level 1 (quoted market prices), Level 2 (other significant observable inputs) and Level 3 (significant unobservable inputs) are recognized on the period beginning date.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR). Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula, as determined by the State, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). Payments under both programs are contingent on the Health Center continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the fiscal intermediary. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program.

The Health Center recognizes revenue ratably over the reporting period starting at the point when management is reasonably assured it will meet all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period.

In 2011, the Health Center completed the first-year requirements under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs and continued to meet meaningful use objectives in 2012. For the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012 and the year ended September 30, 2011, the Health Center has recorded revenue of approximately \$650,000 and \$2,240,000, respectively, which is included in other revenue within operating revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. No revenue was recognized by the Health Center for the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012, for the Medicare incentive program as the Health Center did not attest to meeting meaningful use for the year ended September 30, 2012.

Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program (SHOPP)

On January 17, 2012, CMS approved the State of Oklahoma's Supplemental Hospital Offset Payment Program (SHOPP). The SHOPP program is retroactive back to July 1, 2011, and is currently scheduled to sunset on December 31, 2014. The SHOPP program is designed to assess Oklahoma hospitals a supplemental hospital offset fee which will be placed in pools after receiving federal matching funds. The total fees and matching funds will then be allocated to hospitals as directed by legislation.

During the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012, the Health Center received approximately \$3,186,000 in SHOPP funds and paid approximately \$1,685,000 in SHOPP assessment fees, which are the estimated annual amounts to be received and paid by the Health Center over the term of the SHOPP program. The SHOPP revenue is recorded as part of net patient service revenue and the SHOPP assessment fees are recorded as part of other expenses on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the September 30, 2011, financial statements to conform to the June 30, 2012, financial statement presentation. These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the Independent Accountants' Report, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Health Center recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payer coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Health Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Health Center's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Health Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for uncollectible accounts is presented on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as a component of net patient service revenue.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011

The Health Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Health Center at amounts different from its established rates. These payment arrangements include:

- Medicare Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. The Health Center is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Health Center and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor. The Health Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare administrative contractor through September 30, 2010.
- Medicaid Inpatient and outpatient services provided to the State's Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed on a prospective per-discharge method with no retroactive adjustments. Outpatient services are reimbursed on a fee schedule basis with no retroactive adjustments. These payment rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

The Health Center has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Health Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

The Health Center invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and such a change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Note 5: Investments in Joint Ventures

Heartland Healthcare Reciprocal Risk Retention Group (Heartland)

The Health Center is a subscriber (member) of Heartland and has an approximate 12% ownership (equity) interest in Heartland. Heartland was formed as an unincorporated association approved by the State of Vermont to provide hospital professional liability and general liability coverage to its subscribers. The Health Center's investment in Heartland amounted to approximately \$783,000 at both June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011.

The Health Center purchases its professional liability (medical malpractice) and general liability insurance coverage from Heartland (see *Note 6*). For the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012 and the year ended September 30, 2011, the Health Center paid approximately \$629,000 and \$676,000, respectively, to Heartland for the coverage.

Shawnee Surgical Realty, LLC (SSR)

SSR owns an outpatient surgery facility in Shawnee, Oklahoma. SSR earns revenue by leasing the facility to the Health Center. In April 2006, the Health Center entered into a lease agreement with SSR effective August 2007. The lease term is for 17 years and covers all of the space in the outpatient surgery facility owned by SSR.

The Health Center has an approximate 25% ownership in SSR and receives approximately 25% of the gain or loss of SSR. Based on the operating agreement, the Health Center appoints one of the five board members of SSR. The Health Center's investment in SSR amounted to approximately \$728,000 and \$771,000 at June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011, respectively.

Note 6: Medical Malpractice Coverage and Claims

The Health Center is a member of Heartland, an entity approved by the State of Vermont to provide hospital professional liability and general liability coverage to its subscribers. Heartland was formed in order to stabilize the cost and availability of hospital professional and general liability insurance by taking advantage of the self-funding capabilities of a homogenous group of health care providers. Heartland members are provided hospital professional and general liability insurance under claims-made policies on a fixed premium basis. See *Note 5* for additional information about Heartland.

The Health Center purchases medical malpractice insurance under a claims-made policy. Under such a policy, only claims made and reported to the insurer during the policy term, regardless of when the incidents giving rise to the claims occurred, are covered. The Health Center also purchases excess umbrella liability coverage, which provides additional coverage above the basic policy limits up to the amount specified in the umbrella policy.

In 2012, the Health Center adopted the provisions of Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2010-24, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries, which eliminates the practice of netting claim liabilities with expected insurance recoveries for balance sheet presentation. Claim liabilities are to be determined without consideration to insurance recoveries. Expected recoveries are presented separately. Prior to the adoption of ASU 2010-24, accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America required a health care provider to accrue only an estimate of the malpractice claims costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported where the risk of loss had not been transferred to a financially viable insurer. There was no material impact of the ASU adoption to the Health Center's financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011

Based on the Health Center's claims experience, an accrual has been made for the Health Center's portion of medical malpractice costs under its malpractice insurance policy, amounting to approximately \$100,000 and \$0 as of June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011, respectively. It is reasonably possible this estimate could change materially in the near term.

(A) Series 2004 Hospital Revenue Refunding Bonds (the Bonds) consist of Hospital Revenue Bonds in the original amount of \$10,475,000 dated February 1, 2004, which bear interest at 3.375% to 5%. The Bonds are payable in annual installments through October 1, 2014. The Health Center is required to make monthly deposits to the debt service fund of approximately \$105,000. Due to the anticipated sales proceeds (see *Note 15*), the Bonds were paid in full on June 29, 2012.

The Oklahoma Development Finance Authority (the Authority) issued the Bonds on behalf of the Health Center. The Bonds are secured by the net revenues and accounts receivable of the Health Center and the assets restricted under the bond indenture agreement. The Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Authority.

The indenture agreement requires that certain funds be established with the trustee. Accordingly, these funds are included as assets limited as to use held by trustee in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The indenture agreement also requires the Health Center to comply with certain restrictive covenants, including minimum insurance coverage, maintaining a historical debt service coverage ratio of at least 1.2 to 1.0, a minimum days cash on hand requirement and restrictions on incurrence of additional debt.

When the Bonds were issued, they were sold at a premium of approximately \$465,000. The outstanding balance of the Bonds at June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011, is as follows:

Note 9: Self-Insured Plans

The Health Center sponsors a health care plan for its employees. This plan is self-insured to the extent of the deductible amounts under the excess risk insurance policies the Health Center has obtained. Accruals for unpaid claims in the amounts of approximately \$550,000 and \$350,000 are included in other accrued expenses on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011, respectively.

The Health Center sponsors a workers' compensation plan that is self-insured to the extent of the deductible amounts under the excess risk insurance policies the Health Center has obtained. The Health Center has obtained a letter of credit for \$850,000, as required by state law, to support this self-insured program. Accruals for unpaid claims in the amounts of approximately \$1,741,000 and \$1,543,000 are included in other accrued expenses on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets at June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011, respectively.

Note 10: Charity Care and Other Community Benefits

In support of its mission, the Health Center voluntarily provides free care to patients who lack financial resources and are deemed to be medically indigent. Because the Health Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported in net patient service revenue.

The Health Center's estimated cost to provide charity care, based upon cost as determined by the Health Center's most recent Medicare cost-to-charge ratio, for the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012 and the year ended September 30, 2011, is approximately \$312,000 and \$842,000, respectively.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011

In addition to uncompensated charges, the Health Center also commits significant time and resources to endeavors and critical services which meet otherwise unfilled community needs. Many of these activities are sponsored with the knowledge that they will not be self-supporting or financially viable. Such programs include health screening and assessments, prenatal education and care, community educational services and various support groups.

Note 11: Functional Expenses

The Health Center provides health care services primarily to residents within its geographic location, including acute inpatient, emergency care, outpatient diagnostic, skilled nursing and outpatient surgery. Expenses related to providing these services are summarized as health care services. General and administrative expenses include interest expense.

Note 12: Pension Plans

Defined Contribution Plan

The Health Center has a defined contribution pension plan covering substantially all employees who have at least one year of service and are age 21 or older. The Board of Directors annually determines the amount, if any, of the Health Center's contributions to the plan. Pension expense was approximately \$579,000 and \$706,000 for the 9-month period ended June 30, 2012 and the year ended September 30, 2011, respectively.

Deferred Compensation Agreement

The Health Center has a deferred compensation agreement for the sole purpose of retaining physicians under Section 457(f) of the Internal Revenue Code. The agreement is funded by investments held by the Health Center. This deferred compensation agreement was terminated during the year ended September 30, 2011, and all funds were paid to the physicians.

Note 13: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Accounting Standards Codification Topic 820, Fair Value Measurements (Topic 820), defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also specifies a fair value hierarchy which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. Topic 820 describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies and inputs used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy.

Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, investments are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 investments include money market mutual funds, exchange-traded equity securities and corporate bonds. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of investments with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows and are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 2 investments include U.S. government and agencies securities and certificates of deposit. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, investments are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. There were no Level 3 investments as of June 30, 2012 or September 30, 2011.

Note 14: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the following:

Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Admitting Physicians

The Health Center is served by three physician groups whose patients each comprise over 10% of the Health Center's gross patient service revenue.

Litigation

In the normal course of business, the Health Center is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the Health Center's self-insurance programs (discussed elsewhere in these notes) or by commercial insurance; for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The Health Center evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

Current Economic Conditions

The current protracted economic decline continues to present hospitals with difficult circumstances and challenges, which in some cases have resulted in large and unanticipated declines in the fair values of investments and other assets, large declines in contributions, constraints on liquidity and difficulty obtaining financing. The accompanying consolidated financial statements have been prepared using values and information currently available to the Health Center.

Current economic conditions, including the high unemployment rate, have made it difficult for certain of the Health Center's patients to pay for services rendered. As employers make adjustments to health insurance plans or more patients become unemployed, services provided to self-pay and other payers may significantly impact net patient service revenue, which could have an adverse impact on the Health Center's future operating results. Further, the effect of economic conditions on the state may have an adverse effect on cash flows related to the Medicaid program.

Given the volatility of current economic conditions, the values of assets and liabilities recorded in the accompanying consolidated financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments in investment values and allowances for accounts receivable that could negatively impact the Health Center's ability to meet debt covenants or maintain sufficient liquidity.

Note 15: Subsequent Event

On April 3, 2012, the Health Center entered into the "Asset Purchase Agreement" with SSM Health Care of Oklahoma, Inc. (SSM) to sell substantially all of the assets owned by the Health Center in connection with its operations (exclusive of cash, investments and patient accounts receivable). As a result of the signing of the Asset Purchase Agreement (APA), the Health Center reclassified all of its property and equipment to assets held for sale and ceased depreciation of those assets (see *Note 7*).

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2012 and September 30, 2011

The APA was effective July 1, 2012. The purchase price was remitted by SSM to the Health Center on June 29, 2012, and is reflected as deferred revenue on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Effective July 1, 2012, the Health Center reorganized and changed its name to Avedis Foundation (the Foundation).

The following table summarizes the approximate amounts paid by SSM for the purchase and the approximate amounts of the assets sold and liabilities assumed recognized at the sale date.

As part of the APA, the Health Center and SSM can adjust the purchase price paid based on changes in the estimated amount of working capital included in the APA compared to the actual amounts as of June 30, 2012. The proposed adjustment to the purchase price is not expected to be significant.

The Foundation has also pledged to match 75% of any approved capital expenditure made by SSM at the hospital facility as part of the APA. This conditional pledge by the Foundation is limited to \$15,000,000 of matching funds and will not begin until SSM first spends \$20,000,000 for approved capital expenditures. The matching funds are eligible through July 1, 2019.
