Dear Mr. Copeland:

You asked us to express an opinion concerning the fair market value of 3,062,465 shares of common stock (the "Subject Shares" or the "Block") in Harte-Hanks, Inc. ("Harte-Hanks" or the "Company") held by the Shelton Family Foundation as of June 30, 2011 (the "Valuation Date"). Harte-Hanks is a Delaware corporation whose shares are publicly traded on the New York Stock Exchange ("NYSE") under the symbol HHS. We understand the Subject Shares may be subject to the following restrictions: (a) Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") Rule 144; (b) a discount due to the size of the Subject Shares relative to the number of shares actively traded; and (c) corporate policies regarding insider trading. The sole purpose of this appraisal is to assist you in establishing the fair market value of the Subject Shares for federal income tax calculations.

The term "fair market value" means the price at which the Subject Shares would change hands between a willing buyer and a willing seller when the former is not under any compulsion to buy and the latter is not under any compulsion to sell, both parties having reasonable knowledge of relevant facts.

In reaching our conclusion with respect to fair market value, we took into account applicable factors set forth in Revenue Ruling 59-60, 1959-1 CB 237, including:

- The nature of the business and the history of the enterprise from its inception;
- The economic outlook in general and the condition and outlook of the specific industry in particular;
- The book value of the stock and the financial condition of the business;
- The earning capacity of the company;
- The dividend-paying capacity of the company;
- Whether the enterprises has goodwill or other intangible value; and
- Prior sales of the stock of corporations engaged in the same or similar line of business, having their stocks actively traded in a free and open market, either on an exchange or over-the-counter.

We also considered the factors in Revenue Ruling 77-287, 1977-2, CB 319, which provides valuation guidelines of securities for federal tax purposes that cannot be resold immediately because they are restricted from resale pursuant to federal securities laws. The factors considered in the valuation included but were not limited to the following:

- The latest public quarterly and annual reports of the Company;
- Copies of agreements relating to shares held by insiders in the Company;
- Summaries of analysts' opinions indicating interest in buying or selling shares in the Company;
- The trading prices and trading volume of the related class of traded securities;
- The relationship of the parties concerning the restricted stock; and

 Whether the block being valued represents a majority or minority ownership interest.

In accordance with general valuation principles and guidelines set forth in Revenue Rulings 59-60 and 77-287, we conducted our analysis by utilizing procedures deemed relevant to the valuation, including:

<u>Investigation</u> - We gathered data regarding the financial condition and operating performance of the Company. The scope of our investigation included review of documents provided by and discussions with representatives of the Shelton Family Foundation. We are independent of any party involved.

Analysis - We analyzed information, including: (a) the national economic outlook; (b) the outlook for the direct marketing industry; (c) the Company's financial condition and operating performance based on information in filings with the SEC; (d) expectations of future operating performance based on analysts' reports; (e) information regarding trading activity obtained from the capital markets; and (f) other information deemed relevant.

<u>Approaches, Methods, and Procedures</u> - We selected and applied appropriate valuation approaches, methods, and procedures to develop the conclusion of value pursuant to the valuation assignment.

<u>Documentation</u> - We documented and will retain information and work product upon which we relied in reaching our conclusion. This report presents a summary of our analysis. We previously presented a comprehensive report detailing the analysis and conclusions.

Fundamental Position of the Company

We relied on SEC Form 10-K for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2010; SEC Form 14A the 2011 Definitive Proxy Statement; SEC Form 10-Q for the quarter ended March 31, 2011; the 2010 and 2009 Annual Reports; and information provided on the Company's website (*www.harte-hanks.com*) for this analysis. A summary of the financial statements is presented in Exhibit A.

Corporate Overview

Harte-Hanks is a worldwide direct and targeted marketing company with operations in two segments: (1) direct and interactive marketing and (2) shopper publications. The Company is the successor to a newspaper business started in West Texas in the early 1920s by Houston Harte and Bernard Hanks. In 1972, the Company offered its common stock to the public and was listed on the NYSE. In 1984, the Company went private in a leveraged buyout initiated by management. The Company went public again in 1993 and was listed on the NYSE. The Company sold all remaining traditional media operations (consisting of newspapers, television, and radio companies) in October 1997 to focus on direct and interactive services and shopper publications.

Harte-Hanks manages operations through two operating segments: Direct Marketing, which operates both nationally and internationally, and Shoppers, which operates in local and regional markets in California and Florida.

Direct Marketing

The Direct Marketing segment offers integrated, multichannel, and data-driven solutions for various brands. It helps its customers gain insight into their customers' behaviors from their data and create multichannel marketing programs. This segment provides capabilities and resources to provide a range of marketing services and data

management software, in media from direct mail to e-mail, including agency and creative services, database marketing solutions, data quality software and services with Trillium Software, digital marketing and social networking services, direct mail and supply chain management, fulfillment and contact centers, and lead generation. This segment services several markets, including retail, high-tech/telecom, financial services, and pharmaceutical/healthcare. In general, Harte-Hanks believes it is able to provide services to new industries and markets by modifying existing services and applications as opportunities are presented. Depending on the needs of clients, Direct Marketing is offered in an integrated approach through 34 facilities worldwide, 12 of which are located outside of the U.S. Each of these facilities possesses some specialization and is linked with other offices to support the clients' needs.

Direct Marketing uses various capabilities and technologies by which to capture, analyze, and disseminate customer and prospect data during the course of customer contact. With these data, the Company can help clients identify, reach, influence, and nurture their customers. Harte-Hanks focuses both on business-to-business and business-to-consumer environments, and develops data-driven strategies for customer acquisition and retention as well as customer contact in many different ways, such as direct mail, email, and telephone calls. Harte-Hanks also helps clients measure their marketing and customer-care campaigns by providing them with knowledge that can be applied to refine campaigns, even during the marketing campaign.

In 2010, 2009 and 2008, Direct Marketing had revenues of \$601.3 million, \$586.0 million, and \$732.7 million, respectively, which accounted for approximately 70 percent, 68 percent, and 68 percent of total revenues, respectively.

Shoppers

Shoppers is the largest owner, operator, and distributor of shopper publications in North America, based on weekly circulation and revenue. Shoppers consists of weekly advertising publications that are distributed free by standard mail to households and businesses in a specific geographic area. Shoppers offers advertisers a targeted, local advertising system, with virtually 100 percent penetration in their distribution area. Shoppers is particularly effective in large markets with high media fragmentation in which major metropolitan newspapers generally have low penetration. Shoppers also provides advertising and other services through its websites, PennySaverUSA.com and *TheFlyer.com.* These websites are online advertising portals that bring buyers and sellers together through online products, including local classifieds, business listings, coupons, special offers, and "Power Sites®." Power Sites are template-based websites specifically designed to help small- and medium-sized business owners establish a web presence and easily improve their lead generation. As of March 31, 2011, the Company was publishing approximately 6,000 Power Sites weekly. During 2008, Shoppers formally changed the names of its print publications to PennySaverUSA.com in California and The Flyer.com in Florida.

As of December 31, 2010, Shoppers delivered over 11,215,000 shopper packages in five major markets each week covering the greater Los Angeles market (5,121,000 shoppers), the greater San Diego market (1,641,000 shoppers), northern California (2,275,000 shoppers), South Florida (1,151,000 shoppers), and the greater Tampa market (1,026,000 shoppers). The Company's publications in California account for approximately 80 percent of Shoppers weekly circulation.

As of March 31, 2011, Harte-Hanks published more than 950 individual Shoppers each week that were distributed to zones with circulation of approximately 12,000 each. This distribution system allows single-location, local advertisers to saturate a single


geographic zone, while enabling multiple-location advertisers to saturate multiple zones. This system also gives large and small advertisers alike a cost-effective way to reach their target markets. Harte-Hanks believes its zoning capabilities and production technologies have enabled it to saturate and target areas in a number of ways, including geographic, demographic, lifestyle, behavioral and language, and allows advertisers to target their customers effectively.

In 2010, 2009 and 2008, Shoppers had revenues of \$259.2 million, \$274.2 million, and \$350.1 million, respectively, accounting for approximately 30 percent, 32 percent, and 32 percent of total revenues, respectively.

As a result of the difficult economic environment in California and Florida, Harte-Hanks curtailed more than 1,400,000 in circulation from July 2008 to February 2009 that consisted of approximately 850,000 in circulation in California and approximately 550,000 in circulation in Florida. After the February circulation curtailment, Shoppers circulation still reached approximately 11,215,000 addresses each week. Harte-Hanks continues to evaluate all circulation performance and may make further circulation reductions in response to difficult economic conditions in these two states.

Prices and Dividends

The historic stock-prices and volume for Harte-Hanks together with dividend payment dates are presented in the chart below:



Valuation Principles Regarding the Subject Shares

The average of the high and low stock price of Harte-Hanks' common stock on June 30, 2011, was \$8.205 per share. However, the Subject Shares could not be readily sold at this price because the Block, although not legally restricted from trading, was expected to be treated as though restricted under SEC Rule 144.

Additional restrictions include blockage and insider trading restrictions. We considered the size of the Block relative to historical trading volume to determine the applicability of a discount for the inability of the market to absorb the Subject Shares. Moreover, because David Copeland is a member of the Board of Directors, he may be privy to material nonpublic information that would subject them to insider trading restrictions and might preclude them from selling on demand. Our analysis considered the impact of these trading restrictions on the fair market value of the Subject Shares.

We considered various means of disposing of restricted stock. Generally, a holder of restricted stock can dispose of the shares by using three alternative methods. First, the holder could sell the restricted stock in a private placement. Second, the holder could register the restricted stock and conduct a secondary offering at the holder's own expense. Third, the holder could gradually sell restricted stock into the public market over an extended time period, which is commonly called the "dribble-out method" and represented the most probable method of disposing of the Subject Shares.

Restricted Security Discount Analysis

The first step in our restricted security discount analysis was to examine the requirements imposed under SEC Rule 144. We then considered a review of several major studies conducted by the SEC and others that analyzed the transaction price for sales of restricted securities compared with the publicly traded stock price of the same company at the same point in time. We calculated the appropriate restricted stock discount using an option pricing methodology for each group of shares sold, and calculated a value indication for the Subject Shares by taking a weighted average of the number of shares at the end of each dribble out period.

SEC Rule 144 allows a holder of restricted securities considered to be an affiliate to sell the greater of 1.0 percent of the total outstanding stock or the average of the four-week trading volume preceding the Valuation Date over a three-month period. In Harte-Hanks' SEC Form 10-Q for the quarter ended March 31, 2011, the Company reported 63,776,043 shares issued and outstanding as of April 15, 2011 (the latest information available prior to the Valuation Date). Therefore, 1.0 percent of the common stock outstanding as of the Valuation Date was 637,760 shares. The average weekly trading volume in the four calendar weeks preceding the Valuation Date for Harte-Hanks' common stock was 1,704,725 (Exhibit B).

The cost of locking in the current price during the period of trading the restrictions under SEC Rule 144 can be estimated using the Black-Scholes-Merton model. The Black-Scholes-Merton model is the most often used and cited option valuation methodology.

We applied the Black-Scholes-Merton model to determine the cost of preserving the average of the high and low price (\$8.205) as of the Valuation Date. We used the model to estimate the cost of a put option because options in Harte-Hanks' common stock are not publicly traded. The calculations were used to develop the value of a put option at the first available trading window, which was August 2, 2011, and subsequent quarterly trading windows. Our calculations used the average of the high and low stock price of Harte-Hanks on the Valuation Date as both the current stock price and the exercise price. The risk-free interest rate was the one-month U.S. treasury bill rate at the Valuation Date, as reported by the Federal Reserve. The volatility was based on the assumptions used in the Company's financial statements as of December 31, 2010. Dividend yield was based on the most recent dividend rate and were assumed to remain constant over all dribble-out periods.

A weighted average discount for each quarter was calculated by dividing the number of shares sold by the total shares in the Block and multiplying the result by the discount for the quarter. Exhibit B summarizes the weighted average discounts for each disposition period. We concluded the total discount from the publicly traded price applicable to SEC Rule 144 restrictions was 6.5 percent (rounded) as of June 30, 2011.

Blockage Discount Analysis

The International Glossary of Business Valuation Terms defines a "blockage discount" as an amount or percentage deducted from the current market price of a publicly traded

stock to reflect the decrease in the per share value of a block of stock that is of a size that could not be sold in a reasonable period of time given normal trading volume.

The price quoted for Harte-Hanks' shares is generally for small blocks of stock. We analyzed the average daily and weekly trading volume of Harte-Hanks' common stock in relation to the size of the Subject Shares in order to determine if a discount from the quoted market price would be required in order to sell the Subject Shares without upsetting the supply/demand balance.

To estimate the appropriate blockage discount, our analysis considered Harte-Hanks' financial performance in addition to the following:

- Empirical research on price impacts of block trades;
- Summary of analysts recommendations on Harte-Hanks' common stock;
- Major shareholders;
- Large block trading analysis of Harte-Hanks' common stock;
- Analysis of high trading volume days of Harte-Hanks' common stock; and
- Prior court cases on blockage discounts.

The Block (3,062,465 shares) comprised approximately 4.8 percent of the shares outstanding (63,776,043 shares) and 6.89 percent of the float (44,470,000 shares). The Block represented 10.6 times the average daily trading volume (289,900 shares, see Exhibit C) based on the year preceding the Valuation Date. However, by dribbling out the Subject Shares into smaller blocks of 1,704,725 shares, liquidity could be improved. This smaller block represents 5.9 days of trading volume.

From the block trading data (all trades 5,000 shares and greater), we analyzed the block trading activity in which the block trades exceeded 500,000 shares for a period of 24 months preceding the Valuation Date. As shown in Exhibit C, the date with largest block trades occurred on June 30, 2010, when a large block of 1,763,311 shares was traded. Overall, large block trades are not common, but when large block trades do occur, they appear to have a slightly depressing effect on the prevailing stock price (based on the average of the high and low for the date of trade) for Harte-Hanks of approximately -0.2 percent. However, we observed no block trades comparable in size to the Subject Shares (3,062,465 shares).

We also analyzed high-volume days to determine the historical sensitivity of the Harte-Hanks' stock price to volume traded. As shown in Exhibit D, the days on which daily trading volume exceeded 900,000 shares showed a decrease in the closing stock price from the previous day and three days prior to the high volume day. The days of high trading volume also showed a slight decrease in stock price of about 2.5 percent from the prior day's trading price, and an even greater impact on the trading price three days prior to the large volume activity days.

Based on the previous analyses, we concluded an additional 2.0 percent discount from the publicly traded price applicable to the dribble-out block as of June 30, 2011. If, however, the Subject Shares are not dribbled out, then a separate large blockage discount would be appropriate and would be significant.

Insider Trading Restrictions

SEC Rule 10b-5 provides for insider trading restrictions. In addition, Harte-Hanks has various policies in place that restrict officers, directors, and other persons deemed "insiders" from freely trading their shares.

Both SEC Rule 10b-5 and Harte-Hanks' own restrictions on insider trading apply to the Subject Shares because two directors of the Shelton Family Foundation are also on the Board of Directors for Harte-Hanks. Therefore, the Shelton Family Foundation (i.e., the holder of the Subject Shares) could be prevented from selling if the directors had material inside information.

Harte-Hanks' policy limits the number of days the Subject Shares would be available for trading by approximately one-half the trading days. This assumes there will be no specific events occurring that might affect trading in the stock. Thus, the ability of the holder of the Subject Shares to sell the Block in the short term could be severely restricted. Due to the increased risk associated with this additional trading restriction, we estimated the discount applicable to the Subject Shares was 4.0 percent.

Summary and Conclusion Regarding the Fair Market Value of the Block

For the Subject Shares, we considered the impact of selling the Block under the volume restrictions imposed by SEC Rule 144. We also recognized the valuation concept of a blockage discount, which considers that the Subject Shares might not be sold on the open market without disturbing the supply/demand balance as well as insider trading restrictions for the Block. Based on the information presented above, we concluded the fair market value per share of the Block was \$7.22 as of June 30, 2011, which represented a cumulative discount of 12.0 percent from the freely traded market price of \$8.205 per share (the average of the high and low stock price on June 30, 2011). The discount was derived in a multiplicative manner by using a 6.5 percent discount for dribbling out the Subject Shares, an additional 2.0 percent discount for blockage, and a 4.0 percent discount insider trading restrictions.

Conclusion

Based on and subject to the facts, limiting conditions, and assumptions presented in this report and attached exhibits, the fair market value of one share of common stock in Harte-Hanks, Inc. was reasonably represented in the amount of \$7.22 as of June 30, 2011. Therefore, the fair market value of 3,062,465 shares of common stock in Harte-Hanks, Inc. held by the Shelton Family Foundation was reasonably represented in the amount of \$22,110,997 as of June 30, 2011. This value represents a 12.0 percent adjustment from the average of the high and low stock price as of June 30, 2011.

Limiting Conditions and Assumptions

This conclusion is subject to the terms and conditions of our engagement letter. This opinion should be limited to transactions having an effective date of June 30, 2011.
