Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Years Ended June 30, 2012 and 2011

NOTE A--ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

Norton Community Hospital (the Hospital) is a tax-exempt entity with operations located in the cities of Norton and Clintwood, Virginia. The Hospital's membership consists of Mountain States Health Alliance (the Alliance) and Community Healthcare Foundation (the Foundation), which maintain a 50.1% and 49.9% interest in the Hospital, respectively. The Hospital owns and operates a 129 bed acute care hospital and a home health agency. The Hospital is the sole member or sole shareholder of the following subsidiaries, which are included in the Hospital's consolidated financial statements:

- Dickenson Community Hospital (DCH) is a tax-exempt entity which operates a 25 bed critical access hospital in Clintwood, Virginia.
- Norton Community Physician Services, LLC (NCPS), formed November 1, 2008, is a limited liability corporation that consists of physician practices and pharmacies.
- Community Physicians Services Corp (CPSC) was a taxable corporation that consisted of physician practices and pharmacies. During 2009, NCPS was formed to perform substantially the same operations as CPSC. CPSC was dissolved in February 2012.
- Community Home Care (CHC) is a taxable corporation that provides home medical equipment.

During 2012, the Hospital became a member of the Mountain States Health Alliance Obligated Group (MSHA OG) as an obligated issuer under the terms of the Alliance's Amended and Restated Master Trust Indenture dated as of February 1, 2000.

NOTE B--SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Principles of Consolidation: The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital and its subsidiaries after elimination of all significant intercompany accounts and transactions. The Hospital classifies those activities directly associated with its mission of providing healthcare services, as well as other activities deemed significant to its operations, as operating activities.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as of the date of the consolidated financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Estimates associated with contractual allowances, allowances for uncollectible accounts, net patient service revenue, tax positions, accrued professional liability, and pension and postretirement benefit liabilities are particularly susceptible to material change in the near term. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements - Continued

NOTE B--SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Cash and Cash Equivalents: Cash and cash equivalents include all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased. Cash and cash equivalents designated as assets limited as to use or uninvested cash in trading securities portfolios are not included as cash and cash equivalents on the Consolidated Balance Sheets.

Trading Securities, Held-to-Maturity Securities and Assets Limited as to Use: The Hospital records investments in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 954-320, Investments-Debt and Equity Securities. Assets limited as to use include assets held by a trustee under bond indenture agreements and designated assets set aside by the Hospital for future capital improvements, over which the Hospital retains control, and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes.

At June 30, 2012 and 2011, investments in which the Hospital has the positive intent and ability to hold to maturity are accounted for in the held-to-maturity portfolio and consist mainly of corporate bonds and municipal obligations, which are carried at amortized cost. Substantially all other investments (including assets limited as to use) of the Hospital are classified as trading securities. Management will annually evaluate the held-to-maturity investment portfolio and recognize any "other-than-temporary" losses as deductions from the Performance Indicator (described below). Management's evaluation will consider the amount of decline in fair value, as well as the time period of any such decline. Management does not believe any investment in the held-to-maturity portfolio to be other-than-temporarily impaired at June 30, 2012 and 2011.

All marketable equity securities with readily determinable fair values are considered trading securities and reported at fair value based on quoted market prices. Other investments without readily determinable fair values are reported at fair market value pursuant to FASB ASC 825, Financial Instruments. Management classifies trading securities and assets limited as to use as short-term or long-term based upon the Hospital's need relative to specific current liabilities.

Realized gains and losses on investments and assets limited as to use are computed using the specific identification method for cost determination. Investment income is reported net of related investment fees.

Inventories: Inventories, consisting primarily of medical supplies, are stated at the lower of cost or market with cost determined by the first-in, first-out method.

Property, Plant and Equipment: Property, plant and equipment is stated on the basis of cost or, if donated, at the fair value at the date of gift. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method based on the estimated useful life of the asset. Equipment held under capital lease obligations is amortized under the straight-line method over the shorter of the lease term or

estimated useful life. Amortization of equipment held under a capital lease obligation is reported as part of depreciation expense in the accompanying Consolidated Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets. Renewals and betterments are capitalized and depreciated over their useful life, whereas costs of maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred.

The Hospital reviews long-lived assets for impairment whenever circumstances and situations change indicating that the carrying value of these assets may not be recoverable. At June 30, 2012, management believes there are no such impairments, although it is reasonably possible management's estimate may change in the near term.

Deferred Financing Costs: Deferred financing costs relate to the issuance of bonds payable and are being amortized over the life of the bonds principally using the straight-line method.

Estimated Professional Liability: Insurance liabilities include estimated reserves for reported and unreported professional liability claims based on historical data and actuarial assumptions.

Net Patient Service Revenue/Receivables: Net patient service revenue is reported on the accrual basis in the period in which services are provided at the estimated net realizable amounts, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Patient accounts receivable are reported net of both an estimated allowance for uncollectible accounts and an estimated allowance for contractual adjustments. The contractual allowance represents the difference between established billing rates and estimated reimbursement from Medicare, Medicaid and other third-party payment programs. Current operations are charged with an estimated provision for bad debts based upon historical experience, known collection risks and other environmental factors, including the age of the receivables. Additions to the allowance for uncollectible accounts result from the provision for bad debts. Patient accounts written off as uncollectible are deducted from the allowance for uncollectible accounts.

Charity Care: The Hospital accepts all patients regardless of their ability to pay. A patient is classified as a charity patient by reference to certain established policies of the Hospital and various guidelines outlined by the Federal Government. These policies define charity as those services for which no payment is anticipated and, as such, charges at established rates are not included in net patient service revenue. Charges foregone, based on established rates, totaled approximately \$4,000,000 and \$2,300,000 during 2012 and 2011, respectively. The estimated costs of providing those services totaled approximately \$814,000 and \$468,000 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The estimated costs of providing charity care

are based on a calculation which applies a ratio of costs to charges analysis with indirect costs allocated under a reasonable and systematic approach.

Excess (Deficit) of Revenue, Gains and Support Over Expenses and Losses: The Consolidated Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets include the caption Excess (Deficit) of Revenue, Gains and Support Over Expenses and Losses (the Performance Indicator). Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the Performance Indicator include pension and postretirement liability adjustments, assets contributed and used for capital and transfers of assets to and from affiliates, if any.

Income Taxes: The Hospital is classified as an organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. As such, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying consolidated financial statements for the Hospital. CHC is a taxable entity and accounts for income taxes in accordance with FASB ASC 740, Income Taxes (Note K). At June 30, 2012, tax returns for fiscal years 2009 through 2011 are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service.

The Hospital had no uncertain tax positions at June 30, 2012 and 2011. As such, no interest or penalties were recognized in the consolidated Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets related to unrecognized tax benefits.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets: Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. When a donor or time restriction expires; that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is fulfilled, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets as net assets released from restrictions.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments: The fair value of the Hospital's financial instruments, other than certain investments which are discussed in Note C and long-term debt discussed in Note E, approximates their carrying value due to the nature and terms of these assets and liabilities. Patient accounts receivable; other assets; accounts payable and accrued expenses; accrued salaries, compensated absences and amounts withheld; estimated amounts due to third-party payors, net; the current portion of the pension benefit liability; due to Member and other affiliates, net amounts have short maturities or will otherwise be settled within a short period of time. The fair value of financial instruments reported as part of other long-term liabilities is not estimable, due to the unpredictable timing of payments and the nature of the estimates involved.

In January 2010, the FASB issued ASU 2010-06, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures (Topic 820) Improving Disclosures about Fair Value Measurements (ASU 2010-06). ASU 2010-06 requires new disclosures regarding significant transfers in and out of Levels 1 and 2, as

well as information about activity in Level 3 fair value measurements. In addition, ASU 2010-06 clarifies existing disclosures regarding input and valuation techniques, as well as the level of disaggregation for each class of assets and liabilities. The Hospital adopted ASU 2010-06 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011, except for the disclosures regarding the activity in Level 3 fair value measurements, which became effective for the Hospital beginning July 1, 2011. The adoption of ASU 2010-06 did not have a significant impact on the consolidated financial statements.

Date of Management's Review: The Hospital has evaluated all events and transactions that occurred after June 30, 2012 through December 17, 2012, the date that the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued. During this period, management did not note any material recognizable subsequent events that required recognition or disclosure in the June 30, 2012 consolidated financial statements other than the item disclosed in Note Q.

New Accounting Pronouncements: In July 2011, the FASB issued ASU 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities. The ASU requires the change of presentation of the estimated provision for bad debts in the consolidated statements of operations from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue, net of contractual deductions and discounts, along with additional disclosures about the policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts, and qualitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Hospital retroactively adopted ASU 2011-07 in fiscal year 2012. Management believes the adoption of ASU 2011-07 did not have a material impact on the consolidated financial statements.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU 2010-24, Health Care Entities - Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries. The amendments in the ASU clarify that a health care entity may not net insurance recoveries against related claim liabilities. In addition, the amount of the claim liability must be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. Prior to this Update, healthcare entities were permitted to net insurance recoveries against the accrual for malpractice claims or similar liabilities. The amendments in this ASU became effective for the Hospital during 2012. However, there was no material impact on the accompanying consolidated financial statements upon adoption (Note M).

Reclassifications: Certain 2011 amounts have been reclassified to conform to the 2012 presentation.

At June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital held debt securities and uninvested cash of \$11,151,832 and \$10,717,966 in a held-to-maturity portfolio, respectively. Such securities had net unrealized gains of \$747,311 and \$681,759 at June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. No security within the held-to-maturity portfolio had been at an unrealized loss position for over one year as of June 30, 2012 or 2011. The contractual maturities of held-to-maturity securities at June 30, 2012 are \$1,183,068 due in less than one year, \$4,813,948 due in one to five years and \$5,154,816 due after five years.

At June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital held trading securities in certain investments structured as a limited liability company of approximately \$541,000 and \$492,000, respectively. The Hospital has elected the fair value option, pursuant to FASB ASC 825, for its investments in this limited partnership. The objective of this election was to report the entire portfolio on the same measurement basis, thereby eliminating the mixed-attribute approach and better reflecting the overall economic position and result of the investment portfolio. The fair value of these instruments is estimated by the fund manager based upon estimated market prices of the underlying assets.

Investment fees of approximately \$56,000 and \$62,000 were recognized during the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, and are deducted from interest and dividends in the accompanying Consolidated Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets.

Total net unrealized gains/(losses) related to trading securities and assets limited as to use as of June 30, 2012 and 2011 were approximately \$(298,000) and \$86,000, respectively.

The Hospital did not hold any trading securities which individually exceeded 10% of the trading security portfolio at June 30, 2012 or 2011.

Series 2011 Bonds: During 2012, the Alliance issued variable rate tax-exempt Hospital Revenue Bonds through the Industrial Development Authority of Smyth County, Virginia totaling \$49,875,000 (Series 2011 Bonds) under the Mountain States Health Alliance Obligated Group (MSHA OG), of which \$11,663,856 of the proceeds were allocated to the Hospital, a member of the MSHA OG, and used to refinance the Series 2001 Bonds, discussed below, and to fund certain capital improvements and equipment acquisitions. The Hospital's portion of the bond

obligation is included in the accompanying 2012 Consolidated Balance Sheet and its future principal maturities are included in the schedule below.

Series 2001 Bonds: The Series 2001 Bonds were subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption on December 1, in each of the years 2012 through 2022 in amounts ranging from \$710,000 to \$1,340,000 at a redemption price of 100% of principal amount so redeemed. During 2012, the Hospital paid off the outstanding balance of the 2001 Bonds with proceeds received from the Series 2011 Bonds discussed above. The Hospital recognized a loss of \$587,162 on the early extinguishment of the Series 2001 Bonds which is included as part of nonoperating losses in the accompanying 2012 Consolidated Statement of Operations and Changes in Net Assets.

The loan agreement between the Hospital and the Industrial Development Authority of the City of Norton, Virginia, related to the Series 2001 Bonds contained certain requirements regarding the maintenance of specified financial liquidity and debt service ratios, deposits to trustee funds, permitted indebtedness, use of facilities and disposals of property. Management believed the Hospital was in compliance with all such covenants at June 30, 2011. There are no specific covenants required by the Hospital regarding the Series 2011 Bonds as such bonds were issued to the MSHA OG; however, management believes the MSHA OG is in compliance with all financial and operating covenants as of June 30, 2012.

Deductibles and copayments under third-party payment programs, which are included within the third-party payor amount above, are the patient's responsibility and the Hospital considers these amounts in its determination of the provision for bad debts based on prior collection experience. Accounts receivable are also reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill, the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible.

The difference between discounted rates and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Hospital's allowance for doubtful accounts totaled \$3,809,277 and \$10,004,120 at June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The allowance for doubtful accounts decreased from 55% of patient accounts receivable, net of contractual allowances, at June 30, 2011 to 30% of patient accounts receivable, net of contractual allowances, as of June 30, 2012. Write-offs, net of recoveries, for the years ending June 30, 2012 and 2011 were approximately \$14,600,000 and \$11,300,000, respectively, and relate primarily to self-pay patients. Write-offs of third-party accounts were not significant in the years ending June 30, 2012 and 2011. The Hospital has not experienced significant changes in write-off trends and has not changed its charity care policy for the year ended June 30, 2012. The provision for bad debts associated with the Hospital's ancillary service lines are not significant.

NOTE G--THIRD-PARTY REMIBURSEMENT

The Hospital renders services to patients under contractual arrangements with Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross and various other commercial payors. The Medicare program pays for inpatient services on a prospective basis. Payments are based upon diagnosis related group assignments, which are determined by the patient's clinical diagnosis and medical procedures utilized. The Hospital also receives additional payments from Medicare based on the provision of services to a disproportionate share of Medicaid and other low income patients. Most Medicare outpatient services are reimbursed on a prospectively determined payment methodology. The Medicare program also reimburses certain other services on the basis of reasonable cost, subject to various prescribed limitations and reductions.

The Medicare program pays for inpatient and outpatient services provided by critical access hospitals on the basis of reasonable costs computed through the filing of the annual Medicare cost report. These payments are subject to various prescribed limitations and reductions.

The Virginia Medicaid program reimbursement for inpatient hospital services is also based on a prospective payment system using both a per case and per diem methodologies. Additional payments are made for the allowable costs of capital. Payments for outpatient services are based on Medicare cost reimbursement principles and settled through the filing of an annual Medicaid cost report.

Amounts earned under the contractual agreements with the Medicare and Medicaid programs are subject to review and final determination by fiscal intermediaries and other appropriate governmental authorities or their agents. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final

settlements are determined. Management believes that adequate provision has been made for any adjustments which may result from such reviews. However, due to uncertainties in the estimation, it is at least reasonably possible that management's estimate will change in 2013, although the amount of any change cannot be estimated. During the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, net patient service revenue decreased by approximately \$541,000 and \$421,000, respectively, relating to adjustments of prior years' estimates and final settlements of prior periods.

Participation in the Medicare and Medicaid programs subjects the Hospital to significant rules and regulations. Failure to adhere to such regulations could result in fines, penalties or expulsion from the program. Management believes that adequate provision has been made for any adjustments, fines or penalties which may result from final settlements or violations of other rules or regulations. Management has represented that the Hospital is in substantial compliance with these rules and regulations as of June 30, 2012.

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, preferred provider organizations and employer groups. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

NOTE H-PENSION AND OTHER POSTRETIREMENT BENEFIT PLANS

Norton Community Hospital Retirement Plan: Effective January 1, 1975, the Hospital established the Norton Community Hospital Retirement Plan, a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan for employees covered by the terms of a collective bargaining agreement between the Hospital and union employees.

The plan provides benefits to retired, terminated and active employees and their beneficiaries based on earnings and years of credited service. Effective December 31, 2006, the plan was frozen to new participants. The funding policy is to contribute annually such amounts as are necessary to provide assets sufficient to meet the benefits to be paid to the plan's participants and to keep the plan actuarially sound.

Other Postretirement Benefit Plan: The Hospital provides health and life insurance for current and retired employees under the collective bargaining agreement when the employee becomes eligible for these benefits by satisfying certain age and/or service requirements. Spouses of eligible retirees are eligible for healthcare benefits. All dependent benefits cease when the retiree dies. During 2012, the Hospital amended the plan to exclude all non-vested employees from future benefits, which resulted in the recognition of a curtailment gain totaling \$518,509 for the year ended June 30, 2012.

NOTE I--OTHER RETIREMENT PLANS

The Hospital sponsors a defined contribution plan for the benefit of its employees. The Hospital contributes 3% of eligible employee compensation annually. Additionally, the Hospital sponsors a separate defined contribution plan for the benefit of the employees under a collective bargaining agreement. The Hospital contributes 4% of eligible employee compensation annually, up to \$1,000, to this plan. Contribution expenses under the terms of these plans totaled approximately \$743,000 and \$615,000 during the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

NOTE J--CONCENTRATIONS OF RISK

The Hospital has locations in Wise and Dickenson Counties of Virginia, which is a geographic concentration. The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The Hospital routinely invests in investment vehicles as listed in Note C. The Hospital's investment portfolio is managed by outside investment management companies. Investments in money market funds, equities and other vehicles that are held by safekeeping agents are not insured or guaranteed by the U.S. government; however, management believes that credit risk related to these investments is minimal.

The Hospital is under two collective bargaining agreements with the United Steel, Paper and Forestry, Rubber, Manufacturing, Energy, Allied Industrial and Service Workers International Union which extend through February 2, 2014 and January 31, 2015, respectively, and cover certain employees of the Hospital and DCH. Approximately 40% and 19% of employees of the Hospital and DCH, respectively, are covered under the collective bargaining agreements.

At June 30, 2012, the Hospital has deposits in financial institutions in excess of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation's (FDIC) limits. Management believes that credit risk related to these deposits is minimal.

NOTE K--INCOME TAXES

CPSC and CHC account for income taxes under the provisions of FASB ASC 740, *Income Taxes*. Both CPSC and CHC file separate federal and state tax returns. CPSC was dissolved during 2012 and filed final federal and state tax returns for the period ending February 21, 2012. All net operating loss carryforwards expired with the filing of the final returns.

Due to net operating losses, CPSC did not incur or pay income taxes for the period ended February 21, 2012 and the year ended June 30, 2011, respectively. CHC paid net income taxes of \$49,000 and \$8,000 for federal and state, respectively, for the year ending June 30, 2012. CHC paid net income taxes of \$40,000 and \$12,287 for federal and state, respectively, for the year ended June 30, 2011.

CHC has a net deferred tax liability arising from depreciation as of June 30, 2012 and 2011 of \$64,442. The provisions for federal and state income taxes differ from the application of federal and state income tax rates to income before income tax expense due primarily to timing differences related to depreciation.

NOTE L--RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Hospital had amounts due from a member and other affiliates totaling \$165,781 and \$58,489 at June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. At June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital had amounts due to a member and other affiliates totaling \$375,698 and \$621,671, respectively. The payable amounts relate primarily to costs incurred by the Alliance or affiliates of the Alliance on behalf of the Hospital. Corporate allocation expense from the Alliance and recognized by the Hospital during the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 was approximately \$4,004,000 and \$3,288,000, respectively.

NOTE M--COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Malpractice and Workers' Compensation: The Hospital is covered under the Alliance's \$25,000,000 umbrella liability policy that attaches over the 2012 self-insurance limits of \$10,000,000 per claim and a \$15,000,000 annual aggregate retention. At June 30, 2012, the Hospital is involved in litigation relating to medical malpractice, workers' compensation and other claims arising in the ordinary course of business. There are also known incidents occurring through June 30, 2012 that may result in the assertion of additional claims, and other unreported claims may be asserted arising from services provided in the past. The Hospital has established an accrual of approximately \$812,000 and \$1,188,000 for incurred but unreported claims as of June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, based on historical data and actuarial assumptions. The discount rate utilized was 5% at June 30, 2012 and 2011. Management estimates that none of the asserted claims will ultimately settle above the self-insurance retention levels and, accordingly, has not recognized any insurance recovery receivables at June 30, 2012.

The Hospital is not self-insured for workers' compensation claims and maintains workers' compensation insurance through commercial carriers with 2012 coverage limits of \$1,000,000 per accident or employee. Management has not identified any significant workers' compensation claims outstanding as of June 30, 2012 and, accordingly, has not recognized any insurance recovery receivables.

Additionally, the Hospital is self-insured for employee health claims and recognizes expense each year based upon actual claims paid and an estimate of claims incurred but not yet paid.

Operating Leases: The Hospital leases certain equipment and facilities under operating lease arrangements. For the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital incurred approximately \$843,000 and \$947,000, respectively, in rent expense under these leasing arrangements. Future

DCH leases its medical facility and grounds from the Dickenson County Industrial Development Authority. Total lease expense incurred during the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011 and future minimum lease payments are included in the table and paragraph above. During the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Dickenson County Industrial Development Authority forgave facility lease payments totaling \$140,089 and \$130,089, respectively, which have been reflected as other operating revenue and other expenses in the accompanying Consolidated Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets. During 2012, the Dickenson County Industrial Development Authority amended the lease agreement to extend the term through September 2018, during which time DCH will pay \$5,000 each month.

Estimated future minimum payments under various noncancellable maintenance contracts at June 30, 2012 totals, in the aggregate, approximately \$231,000 through 2013.

Healthcare Industry: The healthcare industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government healthcare program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, Medicare fraud and abuse, and under provisions of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, patient records privacy and security. Recently, government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by healthcare providers, such as the Medicare Recovery Audit Contractor program. Management does not believe the increase in government activity will have a material adverse impact on the consolidated financial statements. However, due to uncertainties in the estimation, it is at least reasonably possible that management's estimate will change in 2013, although the amount of any

change cannot be estimated. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government healthcare programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.

In March 2010, Congress adopted comprehensive healthcare insurance legislation, the Patient Care Protection and Affordable Care Act and Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act. The legislation, among other matters, is designated to expand access to substantially all citizens by 2019 through a combination of public program expansion and private industry health insurance. Implementing regulations are generally required for these legislative acts which are to be adopted over a period of years and, accordingly, the specific impact of any future regulations is not determinable.

NOTE N-OPERATING EXPENSES BY FUNCTIONAL CLASSIFICATION

The Hospital does not present expense information by functional classification because its resources and activities are primarily related to providing healthcare services. Further, since the Hospital receives substantially all of its resources from providing healthcare services in a manner similar to a business enterprise, other indicators contained in these consolidated financial statements are considered important in evaluating how well management has discharged their stewardship responsibilities.

NOTE O--FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

FASB ASC 820 emphasizes that fair value is a market-based measurement, not an entity-specific measurement. Therefore, a fair value measurement should be determined based on the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. As a basis for considering market participant assumptions in fair value measurements, FASB ASC 820 establishes a fair value hierarchy.

Valuation Hierarchy: FASB ASC 820 establishes a three-level valuation hierarchy for disclosure of fair value measurements. The valuation hierarchy is based upon the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. The three levels are defined as follows:

- Level 1 inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Level 2 inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets, and inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Other Long-Term Liabilities: It is not practical to estimate the fair market value of certain other long-term liabilities due to uncertainty of when these amounts may be paid. Estimates of reported and unreported professional liability claims and pension and post-retirement liabilities are discounted to approximate their estimated fair value. Other long-term liabilities are not discounted and are not significant.

Long-Term Debt and Capital Leases: The fair value of long-term debt is estimated based upon quotes obtained from brokers. For long-term debt with variable interest rates, the carrying value approximates fair value.

The Hospital's capital lease obligations were negotiated with various entities and are considered unique. It is not practical to estimate the fair value of these obligations under current conditions.

NOTE Q--SUBSEQUENT EVENT

Subsequent to June 30, 2012, the MSHA OG issued variable rate tax-exempt Hospital Revenue Bonds through the Industrial Development Authority of Wise County, Virginia totaling \$9,785,000 which was allocated to the Hospital to finance capital improvements, equipment acquisitions and to pay issuance costs associated with the bonds. The timely payment of the bonds is secured by an irrevocable transferable direct-pay letter of credit.
