The emphasis is to present information about current issues, promote understanding, and assist members in making informed decisions or taking appropriate actions on their own. All PTA members are encouraged to support issues that will improve the education and welfare of children, however, even though the organization may take a stand for or against an issue or legislation, members are always free to form and express their own opinions and take actions or vote according to their own judgement.
- > At times during the year, members of Lake Washington PTSA Council who take a keen interest in legislative matters meet to discuss issues, advocacy topics, etc. Local and state officials are sometimes invited to assist in issue education.

Part II-B (addressing 1-f)

Lake Washington PTSA Council made a \$500 donation to the Lake Washington Citizens Levy & Bond Committee to support their work. The levy committee is responsible for running the school district levy and bond campaigns. This includes publicizing the election and solicitation of voter support to ensure a successful election. In non-election years, the committee works to educate the public on the importance of levy and bond dollars, how they are used to support the educational program, and why they are essential to schools. In addition, the council encourages each local PTA to make an annual donation to the Levy & Bond Committee to support their activities.

Part II-B (addressing 1 g and h)

- > Members are always encouraged to contact their legislators either by phone, e-mail, or written correspondence. A few will take time to make appointments and meet directly with their representatives or speak with them when they are available locally. Legislators' Town Hall meetings are advertised when known.
- > The Lake Washington PTSA Council actively participates in and promotes Focus Day, a state-wide event organized by Washington State PTA that takes place each year during the state legislative session. Attendees spend the day at the State Capitol building. Activities include issue education, a rally on the Capitol steps with speeches from key PTA leaders, legislators, the governor, etc., and time for individual or small group appointments with each participant's state representatives. For Focus Day 2012, the council rented a bus in order to facilitate transportation to the event, eliminating the obstacles and stress of traffic congestion and parking for members who wished to attend. In January, 2012, approximately 65 people from the Lake Washington PTSA Council and the local PTA units in the Lake Washington School District attended Focus Day.

- > Emergency Management meetings are held 3-4 times during the year. Representatives from 40 PTA units attend as well as others who are interested and the school district's risk management director. Presentations are arranged for each meeting by the council's chair and cover topics such as maintaining emergency supplies at each school, conducting mock drills, and emergency logistics. Representatives are able to problem-solve as a group and share ideas and resource to facilitate, coordinate, and streamline emergency preparedness at every school. Direct participation of PTA representatives affects safety and disaster response for every student, staff member, and parent in the school district - district enrollment is @ 24,000 students
- > Council sends 2 representatives from the Emergency Management group to a 2-day training seminar sponsored by Washington State University. Classes are offered in every aspect of emergency planning, disaster response, and logistics coordination. Information is shared with PTA volunteers and staff across the district. - \$550
- > Council prepares a monthly electronic newsletter with distribution to @ 800 PTA leaders, school principals, administrators, and school board members. A total of 10 issues are created from September to June. Contents include information about PTA activities, PTA resources, leadership news, calendar of events, school district news, articles on current or timely topics, and Washington State PTA information. Local PTA units are encouraged to share their activities as well.
- > Council maintains a web site that is used to post current information and resource material for the 40 local PTA/PTSA units. The site provides links to the school district, Washington State PTA, National PTA, and some local PTA/PTSA units. It is a valuable tool for council in serving the needs of the local units and can be accessed by anyone. - \$167 - number served unknown, but in the 100's
- > Using Constant Contact, council distributes weekly e-news that contains reminders, breaking news and announcements. Council also communicates to local PTA/PTSA unit leaders through e-mail groups, enabling council to send appropriate information, reminders, or urgent messages to PTA leaders holding a certain office or with shared interest. Ability to deliver information to targeted groups as needed increases awareness and provides timely information rapidly, improving communication to all PTA leaders. - \$184 - @ 800
- > Council held an orientation evening in the spring of 2012 for newly elected local unit officers and board members. Topics covered were basic leadership training, operational guidelines, legal obligations, and non-profit restrictions and requirements as well as specific information about Washington State PTA and the local school district. No cost. @ 100 in attendance
- > A workshop is held each spring for school principals and local PTA leaders to facilitate development of common goals, working relationships, and partnerships between school administrators and PTA leadership teams. \$332 - @ 150 from 41 schools

> Two nominating committee workshops are held to educate members from the 41 local units about the responsibilities and procedures of a nominating committee. - @ 50 people

> Each fall, representatives from council attend the Washington State PTA Legislative Assembly. A selection of classes is offered, ranging from how to be an advocate to issue education and strategic planning. Delegates also debate and prioritize issues to form Washington State PTA's legislative platform for the next legislative session. 6 board members attended; council paid for 1 - \$270

> Focus Day in Olympia is planned by Washington State PTA. Council promotes participation in this event. The day includes issue education, a rally on the steps of the Capitol, and time to meet with legislators. To facilitate attendance, council rented a bus, making it easier for members to participate without the problems of traffic and parking. - \$592 - @ 65 in attendance

> Two sessions were held by council's legislative team to gather members from all the local PTA units who have an interest in advocacy. Sessions were loosely organized, allowing participants to discuss issues, plan advocacy strategy, network, and otherwise expand their knowledge of PTA advocacy and current issues. In the first session, the state senator and 2 representatives from the district were in attendance to offer a recap of the legislative session, answer questions, and provide a look ahead to the 2013 legislative session.

Mix of old and new members helps beginning advocates gain confidence and historical perspective. \$65 @ 25 in attendance per session

> Council presidents, and/or other officers, attend the Washington State PTA Convention where they receive leadership training specific to their roles as council officers. (Council is a district-wide PTA that mentors and serves the local PTA units.) Other training and educational classes are available over the 3-day event. Delegates also attend general sessions to hear various speakers and to vote on the business of the state organization. Council budgets and pays for registration and hotel accommodations. In May, 2012, 9 council board members attended convention, though many were there to represent their local unit as a voting delegate. The 2 voting delegates from council were the incoming presidents. Two others went as visiting delegates. - \$1,768

> On Friday during the Washington State PTA Convention, the council offers pre-ordered box lunches for any person attending from this area. Each person pays for their own lunches or has the cost picked up by their local PTA unit. This is not a fund-raising event; the cost per person is based on the caterer's charges. Lunches are delivered to the convention site at a designated time and place.

Facilitating lunch in this manner allows everyone time (while eating) to participate in an informal session with council leaders as well as network and share ideas. - \$385 - @ 35 people

> The Washington State PTA Leadership Conference is open to all PTA leaders and offers advanced training for more experienced leaders. In 2011, 3 people from Lake Washington PTSA Council attended. Due to their roles on the regional leadership team, there was no cost for 2 of those people. - \$277

> Washington State PTA has a new conference for Emerging Minority Leaders. The purpose is to encourage active participation and acceptance of leadership roles in PTA among minority populations. This is coupled with a developing outreach program that seeks to make minority parents comfortable as school and PTA volunteers. As our parent populations become more diverse, it is necessary to have a concerted effort at including everyone. One person attended from council - \$21

> Two regional workshops are held each year for additional leadership classes or other classes of interest to parents and educators. In the 2011-2012 fiscal year, @ 20 council leaders attended these workshops. - \$45

> 15 Council board members attended the PTA & the Law class offered regionally by Washington State PTA. This class provides training about the legal aspects of a non-profit organization and is offered annually. - \$45

Line 30: Community & Volunteer Involvement and Recognition

Total of \$10,609

> Lake Washington PTSA Council plans and sponsors the annual Founders' Day Luncheon. This event celebrates the accomplishments of PTA and recognizes outstanding volunteers. Awards include those for PTA/volunteer service, special service at the council level of PTA, outstanding educators, outstanding child advocates, and community members and/or organizations whose work or volunteer efforts contribute to the welfare of children and youth in the community. The event also honors winners of the Reflections Art Competition who present entries or have visual work on display. Attendance is from all district schools and PTAs, central administration, school board, and community guests. - \$8,454 - @ 260 in attendance

> Throughout the year, the council executive committee members give small gifts or cards of thanks to people who have done an outstanding job. At the close of the year, outgoing board members each received a \$10 gift card for Starbucks. The council board honored outstanding local units of the year with a gift of candy they could share with their boards. Other cards or small gifts are given to those who assist council throughout the year, such as the office custodian and the district receptionist. - \$655

> Council makes a transfer of \$1,000 from its operating account to its scholarship fund in honor of the district administrators, school board president, and LWEA president who work with council throughout the year. Revenue neutral - Honors @ 20 people

> Council makes an annual donation to support the work of the Levy & Bond Committee - \$500

Line 31: Support to Local Units and Local Unit Leadership

- > Through monthly council meetings, an average of 60 unit officers from the 40 PTA units are kept up to date on all aspects of PTA and issues of concern to PTA and parents. Meetings are structured to include input from the school district, school board, and education association. Outside organizations that serve children are sometimes invited to share their programs. Most meetings include a featured presentation. Topics range from district information to child and youth development. Time is also devoted to networking among PTA leaders. Sometimes this is done in geographic areas to discuss commonalities and transitions between schools. Other times, groups are formed by elementary, junior high, and high school in order to share programs and ideas appropriate for each school level. Meetings are a vital part of the council's role of mentoring local PTA units. Valuable information, mini-training and problem-solving through networking and sharing build awareness and strengthen leadership skills. - \$540
- > Council publishes a leadership directory each fall that is distributed to council and unit leaders. It includes school district information, state and national PTA connections and listings of local PTA leaders. The directory serves as a resource for unit leaders and aids in networking across the district. - \$121
- > Primarily through e-mail, but sometimes by phone, council continuously communicates with local unit leaders as important information is made available or needs are discovered. Council's area vice-presidents each serve a feeder pattern of schools, with about 6 schools in each area. These vice-presidents work to establish a connection with each of their local PTA units, keeping in contact throughout the year and attending some of the meetings and events. Having a personal connection with someone on the council board facilitates communication with local leaders and makes it more likely that they will reach out for assistance and advice, thus preventing major mistakes that could be problematic or jeopardize their legal status. - No cost - 7 AVPS serving 40 PTA units
- > Council's web site is a major source of information for local unit leaders. It contains resource materials, current news and announcements, meeting notices, and more. Past newsletters are archived. Links are provided to the Washington State PTA, National PTA, school district, local PTA units, and others, providing easy access to current events, news, and legislative issues. In addition, council can be found on Facebook, a tool used by many of the younger PTA leaders.
