INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the general fund of Civic San Diego (Corporation), formerly Centre City Development Corporation, Inc., a component unit of the City of San Diego, California, as of and for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, which collectively comprise the Corporation's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Corporation's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Corporation's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and the general fund of the Corporation as of June 30, 2012 and 2011, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated November 16, 2012, on our consideration of the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters for the year ended June 30, 2012. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information as listed in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audits of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

As management of Civic San Diego, formerly Centre City Development Corporation, Inc. (Corporation), a component unit of the City of San Diego (City), we offer readers of the Corporation's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Corporation for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011. The information contained in the Management's Discussion and Analysis is unaudited and represents management's analysis for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011. The audited financial statements can be found beginning on page 11. The purpose of Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) is to inform the reader on management's insights about the reporting entity and to increase the readers' understanding and the usefulness of the financial reports as well as providing accessible information about the entity and its operation, successes, challenges and the future. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with additional information that has been furnished.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Corporation's basic financial statements. The Corporation's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: (1) Government-Wide Financial Statements, (2) Fund Financial Statements, and (3) Notes to the Basic Financial Statements. The basic financial statements are also accompanied by required supplementary information, which includes this Management's Discussion and Analysis and the Budgetary Comparison Schedule for the general fund.

<u>Government-Wide Financial Statements</u> The Government-Wide Financial Statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Corporation's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Assets (Deficit) presents information of all the Corporation's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as Net Assets (Deficit). Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Corporation is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information showing changes in the Corporation's net assets during the most recent year and the preceding year. All changes in net assets are reported when the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues, and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g. depreciation and earned but unused compensated absences).

The Government-Wide Financial Statements can be found on pages 11 and 12 of this report.

<u>Fund Financial Statements</u> A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Corporation uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. The Corporation uses a general fund for recording its activities.

Governmental Funds Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating near-term financing requirements. Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for the Corporation's general fund with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By

doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the Corporation's near-term financial decisions. Both the general fund balance sheet and statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between the general fund and governmental activities. The general fund financial statements can be found on pages 13 through 16 of this report.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis The Corporation is financially reliant on the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego (Agency), now the Successor Agency to the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego (Successor Agency). As of the year ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010, respectively, the Corporation had the following assets, liabilities and net assets (deficit):

The net assets of the Corporation's governmental activities increased in 2012 by \$141,236, producing net assets of \$3,339. The change in net assets is a result of an increase in program revenue resulting from the Corporation seeking reimbursement for expenses incurred during the year and the payout to former employees for their accrued compensated absences, which are expensed in the period earned, but the Corporation does not get reimbursed until the obligations are paid. With the elimination of the former Redevelopment Agency, the Corporation has gone through a 60% reduction in staffing levels. As employees were released from employment, any accrued compensated absences were paid out to the employee. The Corporation in turn, under its agreement with the former Redevelopment Agency, sought reimbursement for these expenditures as incurred, thus resulting in an increased net asset balance. Further, net assets increased by the change in the fair value of the Corporation's investment offset by depreciation of the Corporation's assets.

In 2012, cash balances decreased primarily as a result of increased accounts receivable balances for which the Corporation has expended cash but not yet collected for the expenditures from the Agency as of the end of the fiscal year, a partial repayment of the working capital advance from the Agency offset by an increase in accrued expenses. In 2011, the net deficit of the Corporation's governmental activities increased by \$125,181 producing a net deficit of (\$137,897) primarily due to depreciation of capital assets, an increase in compensated absences, and offset by interest income and the change in the fair value of the Corporation's investment. Cash decreased as a result of a repayment of a portion of the working capital advance from the Agency, a reduction in accounts payable resulting in an outflow of cash offset by a reduction in accounts receivable during the course of the year.

The net assets increased by \$141,236 in 2012 primarily due to a decrease in the Corporation's expenses due to a reduction in staffing during the fiscal year and by the change in the fair value of the Corporation's investment offset by depreciation of the Corporation's capital assets. In 2011, net assets decreased by \$125,181 primarily due to depreciation of capital assets offset by a reduction due to unreimbursed payroll expenses associated with compensated absences.

General Fund Financial Analysis The Corporation's general fund financial statements include only the current inflows and outflows of spendable resources and related balances at the end of the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

The general fund excludes capital assets, the liability associated with compensated absences, and the long-term advance payable to the Agency, whereas the government-wide statement of net assets includes capital assets and such liabilities. Compared to 2011, the 2012 cash and investments balance decreased by \$375,948 or 46% while total liabilities of the general fund increased by \$19,178 or 29%. Cash decreased as a result of the repayment of \$36,000 against the outstanding advance received from the Agency and the payment of compensated absences of \$347,316 as a result of the reduction in force due to the restructuring and reorganization of the Corporation as well as attrition in personnel. Fund balance decreased due to the partial repayment of the Agency advance partially offset by unrealized gain on investments. Compared to 2010, the 2011 cash balance decreased by \$186,334 or 19% while total liabilities decreased by \$67,203 or 50%. Cash decreased primarily as a result of the repayment of \$220,000 against the outstanding advance received by the Agency. Liabilities increased primarily as a result of more expenses incurred closer to year-end than in the prior year.

The Comparative Statements of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance provide a "look back" for two years comparing the various expenditures of the Corporation. Overall, expenditures for the years ended June 30, 2012, 2011 and 2010 were \$6,215,073, \$7,189,717 and \$6,869,659, respectively. In Fiscal Year 2012, expenditures decreased by 14% or \$974,644 from 2011. Expenditures increased in 2011 compared to 2010 by 5% or \$320,058.

(formerly Centre City Development Corporation, Inc.) Management's Discussion and Analysis (Continued) (Unaudited)

The most significant changes within the expenditures are as follows:

- ➤ The Salaries and Benefits decreased in 2012 by \$244,887, or 5%, to \$4,715,072 due to vacant positions and attrition in personnel. Similarly, 2011 decreased by \$124,892, or 2.5%, to \$4,959,961 due to similar reasons.
- ➤ Legal, Computer and Auditing Services decreased in 2012 by \$447,518 or 58%, from 2011 as a result of a decrease in legal services due to decreased legal activity. In 2011, it increased by \$260,661, or 50%, due to an increase in legal services resulting from potential claims and other legal activities.
- Furniture and Equipment expenditures decreased in 2012 by \$18,953, or 44%, from 2011 as a result of less furniture and equipment purchases during the year. In 2011, Furniture and Equipment decreased by \$62,711, or 59%, from 2010 due to similar reasons.
- ➤ Marketing, Printing and Reproduction decreased in 2012 by \$52,097, or 39%, from 2011 due to a decrease in the production of brochures and flyers and a decrease in reproduction costs. In 2011, Marketing, Printing and Reproduction decreased by \$26,998, or 17%, primarily due to a decrease in the production of brochures and flyers.
- ➤ Insurance expenditures increased by \$9,733, or 33% in 2012 due to an increase in property liability insurance and the Directors and Officers Liability insurance. In 2011, Insurance expenditures increased by \$5,372, or 22%, from 2010 due to an increase in property liability insurance.
- ➤ Recruitment increased by \$3,457 or 105% from 2011 due to an increase in advertising costs associated with public notice advertisements. Prior to 2012, public notice advertisements were paid from project related funding. In 2012, such costs were not included in the Agency's Enforceable Obligation Payment Schedule.
- ➤ Other Expenses in 2012 decreased by \$53,388, or 23%, from 2011 primarily due to cost cutting efforts associated with the restructuring of the Corporation. Equal opportunity expenses decreased by \$27,771, or 95%, as the Corporation did not hold the annual outreach event Subs for Subs. Auto and business expenses decreased by \$16,459, or 40%, due to cost reduction efforts. In 2011, Other Expenses increased by \$25,465, or 12%, from 2010 due primarily to an increase in equal opportunity, office supplies/computer software, postage, and auto and business expenses.
- ➤ Payment on advance from the Agency decreased by \$184,000 due a decrease in the Fiscal Year 2012 budget advance from the former Redevelopment Agency so that the advance equals 15% of the approved budget.

Budget Comparisons

The Budgetary Comparison Schedules can be found on pages 27 and 28 of this report. The Fiscal Year 2012 expenditures were under budget by \$1,946,927 or 24%. The most significant budget to actual variances were savings in Salaries and Benefits in the amount of \$1,266,928, or 21%, which was primarily due to unfilled positions, attrition in personnel and reduction in force due to the reorganization of the Corporation. Significant savings were also in Legal, Computer and Auditing Services in the amount of \$270,291, or 45%, primarily due to savings in legal and computer web services.

The Fiscal Year 2011 expenditures were under budget by \$1,177,283 or 14%. The most significant budget to actual variances were savings in Salaries and Benefits in the amount of \$1,078,039, or 18%, which was primarily due to unfilled positions and attrition in personnel.

The Corporation may from time to time make budgetary line item adjustments for a net budget change of zero dollars to accommodate the Corporation's administrative operating activities. Budget adjustments are presented to the Board for review and approval. In Fiscal Year 2012, the Corporation's Board approved budget adjustments at the June 20, 2012 Board Meeting, Agenda 725, Item 10.

Next Year's Budget

In response to the California Supreme Court's decision to uphold the constitutionality of AB x1 26, the legislation eliminating redevelopment, the Office of the Mayor reorganized and formed a new corporate structure for the City's two non-profit corporations that provided redevelopment and economic development services in downtown and southeastern San Diego. On June 25, 2012, the City, as the designated Successor Agency to the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego (Successor Agency), and the sole member of the Corporation, amended both the Corporation's and Southeastern Economic Development Corporation's (SEDC) Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, restructuring and reorganizing the two non-profit corporations into a single corporation named Civic San Diego, a California nonprofit public benefit corporation. As a result, SEDC has become a subsidiary corporation of Civic San Diego, effective August 1, 2012.

The Corporation and Successor Agency recently adopted the Fiscal Year 2013 Budgets. The Fiscal Year 2013 administrative portion of the budget for Civic San Diego is \$5,895,000, representing a decrease of \$3,988,000 or 40.5% from the combined SEDC and the Corporation's Fiscal Year 2012 Budget. The decrease reflects:

A decrease of \$3,126,000 or 44% for salaries as a result of the elimination of 26.8 positions and in the FY 2013 Budget.

A decrease of \$862,000 or 31% for non-personnel expenses primarily a result of reductions associated with the consolidation of the two entities and reduced staffing levels and activities.

The Fiscal Year 2013 Budget is broken down by function and will primarily be funded through permit application fees, parking meter revenues, and revenues from administrative and project management fees performed for the City solely in its capacity as the designated successor agency to the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego in the wind-down process underway pursuant to AB x1 26.

The Successor Agency to the former Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego is the primary funding source for the Corporation; therefore, any reduction in the former Redevelopment Agency's funding could substantially alter the services provided by the Corporation.

On behalf of the City, the Corporation carries out certain municipal functions such as planning and design review within the Centre City area. The City Council created the Corporation originally to administer redevelopment, but subsequently has added the administration of the design review process and planning functions, consistent with the community plan and planned district ordinances, within the Centre City area. Additionally, the City has designated the Corporation as the Downtown Community Parking District Advisory Board (Downtown CPD), whose boundaries are concurrent with those of the Centre City area, to oversee, implement and manage parking within the Centre City area.

The Corporation has recently explored the imposition of permit processing fees to applicants in connection with the Corporation's activities, as it relates to the design review and planning, similar to fees that other jurisdictions assess. Additionally, the Corporation, acting as the Downtown CPD, oversees and implements a budget of approximately \$2.5 million to \$3 million annually to carry out the functions of the Downtown CPD.



Notes to the Basic Financial Statements For the Years Ended June 30, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 1 – ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

Centre City Development Corporation, Inc. (Corporation), now Civic San Diego (effective June 28, 2012), is a not-for-profit public benefit corporation organized in February 1975 to administer certain redevelopment projects in downtown San Diego and to provide redevelopment advisory services to the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego (Redevelopment Agency), now the City of San Diego (City) as the Successor Agency. The Corporation is primarily funded by contributions from the former Redevelopment Agency.

On June 25, 2012, the City, as the designated Successor Agency to the former Redevelopment of the City of San Diego (Successor Agency), and the sole member of the Corporation, amended both the Corporation's and Southeastern Economic Development Corporation's (SEDC) Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, restructuring and reorganizing the two non-profit corporations into a single corporation named Civic San Diego, a California nonprofit public benefit corporation. The Amendment of Restated Articles of Incorporation for the Corporation and for SEDC were filed and accepted by the Secretary of State of California on June 28, 2012 and August 1, 2012, respectively. Since the Articles of Incorporation for SEDC were not accepted and approved until August 1, 2012, SEDC was not considered to be a component unit of Civic San Diego for the year ended June 30, 2012, and therefore, SEDC's financial activities are not included in the financial statements of Civic San Diego.

The Corporation is a component unit of the City since the City is financially accountable for the Corporation.

The Corporation's governing board is approved by the City Council of the City of San Diego. The Corporation's budget was approved annually by the former Redevelopment Agency and is now approved by the City. The Corporation provided services to the former Redevelopment Agency and the City. The City Council's function is to appoint the Board of Directors of the Corporation and to act as the former Redevelopment Agency, represented by the Corporation, in the downtown (Centre City) area. The Corporation administers redevelopment plans adopted by the former Redevelopment Agency including the Horton Plaza Redevelopment Plan adopted in July 1972 and the Centre City Redevelopment Project. The Centre City Redevelopment Project was created in May 1992 by the merger of the former Marina and Columbia Redevelopment Plans adopted in December 1976, the Gaslamp Redevelopment Plan adopted in 1982, and the expansion of the project area with approximately 1,000 additional acres of land. Responsibilities are carried out by the Corporation, pursuant to an operating agreement with the former Redevelopment Agency, to implement the redevelopment process in the Centre City Area. The Corporation now, on behalf of the former Redevelopment Agency, carries out the wind-down functions of the former project areas administered by Centre City Development Corporation and Southeastern Economic Development Corporation, as well as other planning, parking, and economic development functions on behalf of the City of San Diego.

The Corporation hosted the Horton Plaza Theatres Foundation (Foundation), a not-for-profit organization, to operate and maintain one or more legitimate theatres in the City of San Diego, in its office. The Corporation provided in-kind administrative services totaling \$72,309 for the months of July 2011 through March 2012, and \$89,514 for the year ended June 30, 2011. Due to the dissolution of the Redevelopment Agency, the Corporation will no longer provide administrative services to the Foundation.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting / Measurement Focus

The accounts of the Corporation are organized on the basis of fund accounting, where the Corporation's general fund is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of the general fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures. Generally, governmental resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The Corporation's government-wide financial statements include a statement of net assets (deficit) and a statement of activities. These statements present summaries of the Corporation's governmental activities.

These financial statements are presented on an "economic resources" measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Accordingly, all of the Corporation's assets and liabilities, including long-term assets and liabilities, are included in the accompanying statement of net assets (deficit). The statement of activities presents changes in net assets. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized in the period in which they are earned while expenses are recognized in the period in which the liability is incurred.

Certain types of transactions are reported as program revenues for the Corporation, such as operating grants and contributions.

Amounts reported as program revenues are classified as operating grants and contributions that are received primarily from the former Redevelopment Agency and the City of San Diego. When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Corporation's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

The Corporation reports only one governmental fund (general fund), which is the Corporation's operating fund that accounts for all financial resources of the Corporation.

General Fund Financial Statements

General Fund financial statements include a balance sheet and a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance. An accompanying schedule is presented to reconcile and explain the differences in fund balance and the net change in fund balance as presented in these statements to the net assets and change in net assets presented in the government-wide financial statements.

The General Fund is used to account for the activities of the Corporation's operations. As with all governmental funds, the General Fund is accounted for on a current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Accordingly, only current assets and current liabilities are included on the balance sheet. The statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance presents increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in fund balance.

Notes to the Basic Financial Statements For the Years Ended June 30, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the Corporation considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days after year-end. Expenditures are recorded in the accounting period in which the related fund liability is incurred. However, expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments are recorded only when payment is due at year-end.

The reconciliation of the fund financial statements to the government-wide financial statements is provided to explain the differences created by the integrated approach of Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34.

Cash

The Corporation's cash consists of cash on hand and on deposit.

Investments

Investments are reported at fair value in accordance with the GASB Statement No. 31, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Investments and External Investment Pools. Note 3 contains additional information related to the Corporation's cash and investments.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are reported in the statement of net assets (deficit). Capital assets are defined as assets with an initial cost of more than \$5,000 and a useful life of greater than one year. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Compensated Absences

Accumulated leave benefits (accrued vacation and sick leave) are accrued when incurred in the government-wide financial statements. The Corporation provides personal time off (PTO) leave to cover both vacation and sick leave for regular full-time employees. The Corporation's policy permits full-time regular employees to earn between 144 hours to 224 hours annually based on length of service. Regular part-time employees working 20 or more hours per week shall accrue PTO on a prorated basis. PTO leave may be accumulated up to a maximum of twice the number of hours accrued annually based on the employee's length of service.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Net Assets

In the government-wide financial statements, net assets are classified in the following categories:

<u>Invested in Capital Assets, Net of Related Debt</u> – This amount consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by outstanding debt that is attributed to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of the assets. The Corporation did not have any debt outstanding related to capital assets at June 30, 2012 and 2011.

<u>Restricted Net Assets</u> – This amount is restricted by external creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws and regulations of other governments. The Corporation did not have any restricted net assets at June 30, 2012 and 2011.

<u>Unrestricted Net Assets</u> – This amount is all net assets that do not meet the definition of "invested in capital assets, net of related debt" or "restricted net assets."

Fund Balances

Fund balances presented in the governmental fund financial statements represent the difference between assets and liabilities and are classified into the following categories based upon the type of restrictions imposed on the use of funds:

Nonspendable – This classification includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

<u>Restricted</u> – This classification includes amounts that have constraints placed on the use of resources that are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. The Corporation did not have any restricted fund balance at June 30, 2012 and 2011.

<u>Committed</u> – This classification includes amounts that can be used only for the specific purposes determined by a formal action by the entity's highest level of decision-making authority. The Corporation did not have any committed fund balance at June 30, 2012 and 2011.

<u>Assigned</u> – This classification includes amounts intended to be used by the entity for specific purposes but do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed. The Corporation did not have any assigned fund balance at June 30, 2012 and 2011.

<u>Unassigned</u> – This classification is the residual amount for the Corporation's general fund and includes all spendable amounts not contained in the other classifications.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Management believes that the estimates made are reasonable.

The Corporation reduces restricted amounts first when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted (committed, assigned or unassigned) amounts are available. The Corporation reduces committed amounts first, followed by assigned amounts, and then unassigned amounts when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of those unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

At June 30, 2012 and 2011, the bank balances were \$477,999 and \$984,130, respectively. The difference between the book balances and the bank balances were due to deposits in transit and outstanding checks. Of the bank balances for 2012 and 2011 as noted above, \$250,000 was covered by federal depository insurance (FDIC). The remaining balances for both years were collateralized by securities held by the financial institution and are considered to be held in the name of the Corporation.

Investments

The Corporation received shares of stock as a result and by-product of purchasing a life insurance policy with Standard Insurance Company (Company), a mutual life insurance company. The purchase of the life insurance policy entitled the Corporation to membership interests and ownership in Standard Life Insurance Company. In 1998, the Board of Directors of Standard Insurance Company directed management to develop a plan of demutualization. The plan would convert the Company's form of organization from a mutual life insurance company to a publicly held, stock life insurance company. Demutualization was approved on September 28, 1998 and upon conversion to a stock company, policyholders' membership interest, was extinguished and eligible members received consideration in the form of stock, cash or an increase in policy values.

On April 21, 1999, the Corporation received consideration in the form of holding company stock. The Corporation received 1,036 shares in Stancorp Financial Group, with a stock value of \$11,976. On December 9, 2005, the Corporation received an additional 1,036 shares of stock dividend with a stock value of \$53,520. As of June 30, 2012 and 2011, the Corporation owned a total of 2,072 shares of stock. As of June 30, 2012 and 2011, the fair value of the stock based on quoted market prices was \$76,996 and \$87,418, respectively. The Corporation's investment in stock is not subject to interest rate, credit, or custodial credit risk.

NOTE 5 – LONG-TERM LIABILITIES

Prior to the dissolution of the former Redevelopment Agency, the Redevelopment Agency, at its full discretion, provided the Corporation with a working capital advance in order for the Corporation to fund its operating costs and expenditures while the Corporation waits to receive its monthly reimbursement for eligible expenditures. The amount of the working capital advance is adjusted on an annual basis, and is generally determined in an amount that is approximately equal to 15% of the Corporation's approved budget. As a result of the decrease in the Corporation's operating budget, the Corporation made a repayment on the advance to the successor agency of the former Redevelopment Agency of \$36,000 during the year ended June 30, 2012. Full repayment of the working capital advance is due upon termination of the Corporation providing services.

NOTE 6 – PENSION PLANS

The Corporation has a Money Purchase Pension Plan, subject to the Employee Retirement Income Retirement Income Act (ERISA) under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) section 401(a), covering all full-time permanent employees. The plan is a defined contribution plan under which benefits depend solely on amounts contributed by the Corporation to the plan plus investment earnings. Employees are eligible to participate on the first day of the month following 90 days after their date of employment. During each year, the Corporation contributes semi-monthly an amount equal to 8% of the total semi-monthly compensation for all full-time permanent employees. The Corporation's contributions for each employee are fully vested after six years of continuous service. The Corporation's total payroll (excluding benefits) for fiscal year 2012 was approximately \$3,036,746. The Corporation's contributions were calculated using the base salary amount of all full-time permanent employees of \$3,091,295. The Corporation made the required 8% contribution amounting to \$220,572 (net of forfeitures) for fiscal year 2012. The Corporation's total payroll for fiscal year 2011 was \$3,371,460. The Corporation's contributions were calculated using the base salary amount of all full-time permanent employees of \$3,280,034. The Corporation made the required contribution amounting to \$222,821 (net of forfeitures) for fiscal year 2011.

NOTE 6 – PENSION PLANS (Continued)

In addition, the Corporation has a Tax Deferred Annuity Plan under section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 covering all full-time permanent employees. The plan is a defined contribution plan under which benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan by the employer and the employees, plus investment earnings. Employees are eligible to participate on the first day of the month following 90 days after their date of employment. During each plan year, the Corporation contributes semi-monthly an amount equal to 16% of the total semi-monthly compensation for all full-time permanent employees. The Corporation's contributions for each employee are fully vested at the time of contribution. The Tax Deferred Annuity Plan includes amounts deposited by employees prior to the Corporation becoming a contributor to the plan. The Corporation made the required 16% contribution amounting to \$491,512 for fiscal year 2012 and \$524,806 for fiscal year 2011.

The fiduciary responsibilities of the Corporation consist of making contributions and remitting deposits collected. The pension plans are not component units of the Corporation and are therefore not reported in the basic financial statements.

NOTE 7 – NET DEFICITS

The unrestricted net deficit in the amount of \$76,953 and \$258,917 as of June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, is primarily related to the accrued compensated absences liability owed to all employees, offset by the fair value of investments. Compensated absences are expensed in the period in which the employee benefits are earned, but the Corporation cannot seek reimbursement, thereby recognizing revenue, until the benefits are actually paid. As such, the Corporation's unrestricted net deficit increases or decreases in relation to whether the compensated absences liability increases or decreases.

NOTE 8 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Corporation is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disaster.

The Corporation is presently involved in certain matters of litigation that have arisen in the normal course of conducting the Corporation's business. Corporation management believes, based upon consultation with the Corporation's attorneys, that these cases, in the aggregate, are not expected to result in a material adverse financial impact on the Corporation. The Corporation is covered by various insurance policies for property, liability, workers' compensation and errors and omissions, with deductibles that vary from \$1,000 to \$25,000. The Corporation's management believes that the insurance programs are sufficient to cover any potential losses should an unfavorable outcome materialize.

There were no claim settlements that exceeded insurance coverage during the past three fiscal years.

There is also a contingent per copy rental charge of \$0.006 for copies in excess of 110,000 per month on the main copier and \$0.006 for black and white copies on the second copier in excess of 13,000 per month with \$0.089 for color copies on the second copier in excess of 5,000 per month. A third copier has a \$0.0084 charge for black and white copies and a \$0.0890 charge on prints in excess of 250 per month.

Rental costs associated with all leases totaled \$826,739 and \$776,601 for 2012 and 2011, respectively.

NOTE 9 – ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Successor Agency to the former Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego is the primary funding source for the Corporation; therefore, any reduction in the Successor Agency's funding could substantially alter the services provided by the Corporation.

In response to the California Supreme Court's decision to uphold the constitutionality of AB x1 26, the legislation eliminating redevelopment, the Office of the Mayor reorganized and formed a new corporate structure for the City's two non-profit corporations that provided redevelopment and economic development services in downtown and southeastern San Diego. On June 25, 2012, the City, as the designated Successor Agency, and the sole member of the Corporation, amended both the Corporation's and Southeastern Economic Development Corporation's (SEDC) Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws, restructuring and reorganizing the two non-profit corporations into a single corporation named Civic San Diego, a California nonprofit public benefit corporation. Civic San Diego will have the ability to perform multiple functions on behalf of the City, including the wind down of redevelopment, continued land use permitting and planning, management of the downtown parking district, economic development and other projects as authorized by the City in accordance with applicable law. As a result, effective August 1, 2012, SEDC has become a subsidiary corporation of Civic San Diego. At such time that any of SEDC's remaining liabilities and duties are released, Civic San Diego may dissolve SEDC.

On behalf of the City, the Corporation carries out certain municipal functions such as planning and design review within the Centre City area. The City Council created the Corporation originally to administer redevelopment, but subsequently has added the administration of the design review process and planning functions, consistent with the community plan and planned district ordinances, within the Centre City area. Additionally, the City has designated the Corporation as the Downtown Community Parking District Advisory Board (Downtown CPD), whose boundaries are concurrent with those of the Centre City area, to oversee, implement and manage parking within the Centre City area.

The Corporation instituted permit processing fees for applicants in connection with the Corporation's activities, as it relates to the design review and planning, similar to fees that other jurisdictions assess. Additionally, the Corporation, acting as the Downtown CPD, oversees and implements a budget of approximately \$2.5 million to \$3 million annually to carry out the functions of the Downtown CPD.

With regards to the fiscal year ending June 30, 2013, the Corporation expects that all operations should continue as budgeted. Funding for the Corporation has been included in the Successor Agency's Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule, which was submitted to and approved by the State Department of Finance.

NOTE 1 – BUDGETARY INFORMATION

The Corporation prepares its annual budget on the modified accrual basis of accounting in a format required by the successor agency to the former Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego. The budget is approved by the Corporation's Board of Directors (Board) and the former Redevelopment Agency. The Corporation's expenditures are controlled at the line item level with transfers between line items requiring Board approval, and transfers between salaries and benefits and all other line items requiring both Board approval, as well as approval from the successor agency to the former Redevelopment Agency.

For the year ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, expenditures for the payment on advance from the successor agency to the former Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego exceeded the final budgeted amount by \$36,000 and \$220,000, respectively. Actual expenditures exceeded the final budgeted amount because the Corporation does not budget for the repayment on the advance from the successor agency to the former Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego.

For the year ended June 30, 2011, expenditures for equal opportunity exceeded the final budgeted amount by \$4,296 due to increased expenditures associated with the annual outreach event Subs for Subs, which is held every June.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

Management of the Corporation is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Corporation's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Corporation's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the Board of Directors of the Corporation, and the City Council of the City of San Diego, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF CENTRE CITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION, INC.

KIM JOHN KILKENNY and STEVEN RELYEA certify that:

- 1. They are the Chairmen of the Board and Secretary, respectively, of Centre City Development Corporation, Inc., a California nonprofit public benefit corporation ("Corporation").
- 2. The Articles of Incorporation of this Corporation are amended and restated to read as follows:

"ARTICLE I NAME

The name of the Corporation is Civic San Diego ("Corporation").

ARTICLE II PURPOSES

- A. This Corporation is a nonprofit public benefit corporation and is not organized for the private gain of any person. It is organized under the Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law for charitable purposes.
- B. This Corporation was incorporated on March 31, 1975 and was formerly known as Centre City Development Corporation, Inc.
- C. The specific purposes of this Corporation are to: (i) engage in economic development, land use permitting and project management services which under California law, can be done by contract with or delegated by the City of San Diego ("City"), or the City solely in its capacity as the designated successor agency to the Redevelopment Agency of the City of San Diego ("Successor Agency"); (ii) enter into agreements, contracts or memoranda of understanding with any public or corporate entity, including the City, in furtherance of the purposes for which the Corporation is formed; (iii) engage in any other activities in furtherance of the purposes for which the Corporation is formed; and (iv) receive, invest and utilize for the purposes for which the Corporation is formed (a) gross receipts from activities related to the Corporation's exempt functions, and (b) funds and property acquired through solicitation of contributions, donations, grants, gifts, bequests and the like.

ARTICLE III LIMITATION ON CORPORATE ACTIVITIES

- A. This Corporation is organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- B. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, this Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or (b) by a corporation contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- C. No substantial part of the activities of this Corporation shall consist of carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in or intervene in any political campaign (including the publishing or distribution of statements) on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public office.

ARTICLE IV DEDICATION AND DISSOLUTION

- A. The property of this Corporation is irrevocably dedicated to charitable purposes, and no part of the net income or assets of this Corporation shall ever inure to the benefit of any director, officer or member thereof or to the benefit of any private person. Upon the dissolution or winding up of this Corporation, its assets remaining after payment, or provision for payment, of all debts and liabilities of the Corporation shall be distributed to the City, to be used solely for public purposes, or if the City does not accept the assets or is not then in existence, to a nonprofit fund, foundation, or corporation which is organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes and which has established its tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- B. If the Corporation holds any assets in trust, or if the Corporation is formed for charitable purposes, then such assets shall be disposed of on dissolution in conformity with these Articles of Incorporation or the Bylaws of the Corporation subject to complying with the provisions of any trust under which such assets are held. The disposition shall be in such manner as may be directed by decree of the Superior Court of the county in which the Corporation has its principal offices, on petition thereof by the Attorney General or by any person concerned in the liquidation, in a proceeding to which the Attorney General is a party. Such decree of the Superior Court may be waived if the Attorney General makes a written waiver of objections to the disposition.

ARTICLE V

The City of San Diego, a municipal corporation, is the sole member of the Corporation."

- 3. The foregoing amendment and restatement of Articles of Incorporation has been duly approved by the board of directors.
- 4. The foregoing amendment and restatement of Articles of Incorporation has been duly approved by the sole member, the City of San Diego, acting by and through its City Council.
