NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

September 30, 2012 and 2011

1. Organization

Exeter Hospital, Inc. (the Hospital) is a not-for-profit acute care hospital which primarily serves residents of New Hampshire. The Hospital is controlled by Exeter Health Resources, Inc. (Resources), a not-for-profit corporation which functions as the parent company to the Hospital.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Estimates are used when accounting for the allowance for doubtful accounts, long-lived assets, insurance costs, employee benefit plans, contractual allowances, third-party payor settlements and the assessment of litigation and contingencies. It is reasonably possible that actual results could differ from those estimates.

Classification of Net Assets

Gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of donated assets. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. When a donor restriction expires (when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as either net assets released from restrictions (for noncapital related items) or as net assets released from restrictions used for capital purchases (capital related items). Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity. During fiscal 2012 and 2011, the Hospital appropriated all earnings on these funds to offset the costs of patient care activities in accordance with the intent of the donor. Income earned on permanently restricted net assets, including net realized and unrealized appreciation on investments, is included in the statement of operations as unrestricted resources.

In accordance with the *Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act* (UPMIFA), the Hospital considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (a) the duration and preservation of the fund; (b) the purpose of the organization and the donor-restricted endowment fund; (c) general economic conditions; (d) the possible effect of inflation and deflation; (e) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments; (f) other resources of the organization; and (g) the investment policies of the organization.

Performance Indicator

For purposes of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major or central to the provision of health care services are reported as operating revenue and expenses. Peripheral transactions are reported as nonoperating gains or losses

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The statement of operations also includes excess of revenues and other support, and nonoperating gains (losses) over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues and other support, and nonoperating gains (losses) over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include net assets released from restrictions for capital purchases, pension liability adjustments, and transfers to affiliates for other than goods and services.

Income Taxes

The Hospital is a not-for-profit corporation as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and is exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. Management evaluated the tax positions of the Hospital and has concluded that it has maintained its tax-exempt status, does not have any significant unrelated business income, and has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements.

With few exceptions, the Hospital is no longer subject to income tax examination by the U.S. federal or state tax authorities for years before 2008.

Net Patient Service Revenues

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates and also provides a discount for patients without insurance from these rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. Changes in these estimates are reflected in the financial statements in the year in which they occur.

Charity Care

The Hospital has a formal charity care policy under which patient care is provided without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria. The Hospital rendered charity care in accordance with its formal charity care policy. The Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, and therefore such amounts are not reported as revenue.

The Hospital determines the costs associated with providing charity care by calculating a ratio of cost to gross charges, and then multiplying that ratio by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to patients eligible for free care. The costs of caring for charity care patients for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011 were \$4,823,178 and \$4,990,463, respectively. There were no funds received from gifts and grants to subsidize charity care services provided for the years ended September 30, 2012 or 2011.

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include short-term investments and secured repurchase agreements which have an original maturity of three months or less when purchased.

The Hospital maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Hospital has not experienced any losses on such accounts.

Accounts Receivable and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid. For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which accounts for patients who are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the discounted rates and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Inventories

Inventories of supplies and pharmaceuticals are carried at the lower of cost determined on a first-in, first-out method or market.

Funds Held by Trustee Under Revenue Bond Agreements

Funds held by trustee under revenue bond and interest rate swap collateral asset agreements are recorded at fair value and are comprised of short-term investments, guaranteed investment contracts and United States Government obligations.

Investments and Investment Income

Investments are measured at fair value in the balance sheets. Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, and interest and dividends) is included in the excess of revenues and other support, and nonoperating gains (losses) over expenses as the Hospital has elected to reflect changes in fair value of investments and investments limited as to use in nonoperating gains, including both increases and decreases in value whether realized or unrealized, unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law, in which case it would be reported as a change in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Endowment, Investment and Spending Policies

The Hospital has adopted the investment policy for the management and investment of board designated and endowment funds as approved by the Executive Committee (the Committee) of the Exeter Health Resources Board of Trustees. The Committee has adopted a five year investment horizon for the board designated and endowment funds such that the changes and duration of investment losses are carefully weighed against the long term potential for appreciation of assets. The investment policy will, however, be reviewed whenever there are material changes to the organization's financial forecasts

The goal of the board designated and endowment funds is to support the Hospital's future capital expenditures and other major program needs and to generally increase the financial strength of the organization.

Under the investment policy, the board designated and endowment funds are invested in a prudent manner with regard to preserving principal in real terms while achieving returns which at least rank in the top one-quarter of an appropriate peer group of actively managed portfolios, exceed an appropriate benchmark index (net of management fees) and rank in the top one-quarter of the Cambridge Associates Universe of comparable managers (where appropriate).

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at time of purchase, or fair value at time of donation, less reductions in carrying value based upon impairment and less accumulated depreciation. The Hospital's policy is to capitalize expenditures for major improvements and charge maintenance and repairs as expenditures which do not extend the lives of the related assets. The provision for depreciation is computed on the straight-line method at rates intended to amortize the cost of the related assets over their estimated useful lives. Assets which have been purchased but not yet placed in service are included in construction and projects in progress and no depreciation expense is recorded.

Bond Issuance Costs/Original Issue Discount

The bond issuance costs incurred to obtain financing for construction and renovation programs and the original issue discount are being amortized by the bonds outstanding method over the life of the bonds. Bond issuance costs are included in other assets. The original issue discount is presented as a reduction of the face amount of bonds payable.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The fair value of financial instruments is determined by reference to various market data and other valuation techniques as appropriate. Financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, investments, accounts receivable, assets limited as to use or restricted, accounts payable, estimated third-party payor settlements and long-term debt.

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The fair value of all financial instruments other than long-term debt approximates their relative book value as these financial instruments have short-term maturities or are recorded at fair value. See note 8. The fair value of the Hospital's long-term debt is estimated using discounted cash flow analyses, based on the Hospital's current incremental borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements, and is disclosed in note 6.

Pension Plan

The Hospital participates in the pension plan of Resources. Resources has a contributory account balance defined benefit plan which covers substantially all employees. Resources' funding policy is to contribute annually at a rate intended to provide for the cost of benefits earned during the year determined in accordance with funding requirements of the Department of Labor. The plan benefits are based on the employee's annual compensation during the term of employment. For financial reporting purposes, an allocation of the projected benefit obligation, the fair value of plan assets, the funded status of the plan, and benefit costs is made by an independent actuary based upon former and current employees of the Hospital covered by the plan.

Employee Fringe Benefits

The Hospital has an earned time plan. Under this plan, each employee earns paid leave for each period worked. These hours of paid leave may be used for vacations, holidays or illnesses. Hours earned but not used are vested with the employee and are paid to the employee upon termination. The Hospital accrues a liability for such paid leave as it is earned.

Professional Liability Loss Contingencies

Effective December 11, 2003, Resources created a revocable self-insurance trust to fund the related actuarially-determined liability for incurred but unpaid claims. The Hospital pays malpractice premiums to Resources to fund its share of the liability. At September 30, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital carries on its balance sheets a reserve for professional liability claims of \$6,457,301 and \$5,231,660, respectively, which relate to claims outstanding and estimates of claims incurred but not reported at the Hospital. The Hospital also records a receivable from the self-insurance trust (which has assets of \$8,915,085 and \$7,078,690 at September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively) related to estimated recoveries under coverages provided by the self-insurance trust. The possibility exists, as a normal risk of doing business, that professional liability claims in excess of the trust fund and insurance coverage may be asserted against Resources and the Hospital.

With respect to all litigation matters, Resources and the Hospital consider the likelihood of a negative outcome. If Resources and the Hospital determine the likelihood of a negative outcome is probable and the amount of the loss can be reasonably estimated, Resources and the Hospital record an estimated loss for the expected outcome of the litigation. If the likelihood of a negative outcome is not considered to be probable but is considered to be reasonably possible and Resources and the Hospital are able to determine an estimate of the possible loss or a range of loss, Resources and the Hospital disclose that fact together with the estimate of the possible loss or range of loss. However, it is difficult to predict the outcome or estimate a possible loss or range of loss in some instances because litigation is subject to significant uncertainties. Resources' and the Hospital's policy is to record legal and professional fees as incurred.

See also note 13 related to contingencies and litigation.

Subsequent Events

Management of the Hospital evaluated events occurring between the end of its fiscal year and December 20, 2012, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued ASU No. 2011-07, Health Care Entities (Topic 954): Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities. The ASU is effective for fiscal years ending after December 15, 2012, with early adoption permitted. Changes to the presentation of the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue in the statement of operations are applied retrospectively to all prior periods presented. The ASU states that a health care entity that recognizes significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time the services are rendered, even though it does not assess the patient's ability to pay, must present bad debts as a reduction of net patient revenue and not as a separate item in operating expenses. The change in presentation, as required by this guidance, is not expected to significantly impact the Hospital's balance sheets, statements of operations or cash flows.

In August 2010, the FASB issued ASU No. 2010-24 which addresses the diversity in the accounting for medical malpractice and similar liabilities and their related anticipated insurance recoveries by health care entities that mostly have netted insurance recoveries against the accrued liability, although some have presented the anticipated insurance recovery and the liability on a gross basis. The amendments to Topic 954 clarify that a health care entity should not net insurance recoveries against a related claim liability; the amount of the claim liability should be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. This ASU is effective for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012, and the impact of this accounting pronouncement, which required the Hospital to show a liability for professional liability claims and an amount due from its parent company's self-insurance trust, is discussed in the "professional liability loss contingencies" section above.

The Hospital maintains contracts with the Social Security Administration (Medicare) and the State of New Hampshire Division of Health and Human Services (Medicaid). The Hospital is paid a prospectively determined fixed price for Medicare and Medicaid inpatient acute care services depending on the patient's diagnostic related group classification. Medicare's payment methodology for outpatient services is based upon a prospective standard rate for procedures performed or services rendered. Capital costs and certain Medicaid outpatient services are also reimbursed on a prospectively determined fixed price. The Hospital receives payment for other Medicaid outpatient services on a reasonable cost basis which are settled with retroactive adjustments upon completion and audit of related cost finding reports. The percentage of net patient service revenue earned from the Medicare and Medicaid programs (excluding disproportionate share payments in 2011) was 27% and 2%, respectively, in 2012 and 30% and 1%, respectively, in 2011.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs. The Hospital believes that it is in substantial compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. There is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates could change by a material amount in the near term. Differences between amounts previously estimated and amounts subsequently determined to be recoverable or payable are included in net patient service revenues in the year that such amounts become known. The differences between amounts previously estimated and amounts subsequently determined to be recoverable from third-party payors was not significant in 2012 or 2011.

The Hospital also maintains contracts with Anthem Health Plans of New Hampshire (Anthem) and various other payors which pay the Hospital for services based on charges with varying discounts.

Medicaid Enhancement Tax and Medicaid Disproportionate Share

Under the State of New Hampshire's (the State) tax code, the State imposes a Medicaid enhancement tax (MET) equal to 5.5% of the Hospital's net patient service revenues, with certain exclusions. The amount of tax recognized by the Hospital for the fiscal years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011 was \$9,996,453 and \$10,483,866, respectively.

In the fall of 2010, in order to remain in compliance with stated federal regulations, the State of New Hampshire adopted a new approach related to Medicaid disproportionate share funding retroactive to July 1, 2010. Unlike the former funding method, the State's approach led to a payment that was not directly based on, and did not equate to, the level of tax imposed. As a result, the legislation created some level of losses at certain New Hampshire hospitals, while other hospitals realized gains. In addition, as part of the State of New Hampshire's biennial budget process for the two-year period ending June 30, 2013, the State eliminated disproportionate share payments to certain New Hampshire hospitals, including the Hospital. As a result, during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2012, the Hospital paid the State of New Hampshire's MET based on 5.5% of net patient service revenues, with certain exclusions but will not receive disproportionate share payments.

In 2012, no disproportionate share payments were received by the Hospital. In fiscal 2011, the Hospital received disproportionate share payments that totaled \$7,417,253. This amount is recognized on the disproportionate share line of the statement of operations.

In response to the State's actions, the Hospital and several other New Hampshire hospitals have collectively filed a lawsuit against the State. The outcome of the lawsuit, as well as the future impact on the Hospital is uncertain at the date of these financial statements.

In addition, the Hospital has amended MET returns for State fiscal years 2009 through 2011 based upon guidance from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) that certain exclusions can be deducted from net patient service revenues. The State disagrees with the CMS guidance and has indicated its intent to audit the amended returns. The outcome of the amended returns and related audits is uncertain at the date of these financial statements.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments

The CMS Electronic Health Records (EHR) incentive programs provide a financial incentive for the "meaningful use" of certified EHR technology to achieve health and efficiency goals. To qualify for incentive payments, eligible organizations must successfully demonstrate meaningful use of certified EHR technology through various stages as defined by CMS. The Hospital filed its Stage I and Stage II meaningful use attestations with CMS. Revenue totaling approximately \$1,350,000 and \$1,500,000 associated with these meaningful use attestations was recorded as other revenues for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The Hospital's receivable for these payments due from CMS is included in prepaid expenses and other current assets and was paid in full subsequent to year end.

4. Concentration of Credit Risk

The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local area residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from patients and third-party payors at September 30 was as follows:

In February 2012, the Hospital, in conjunction with the Authority, issued \$32,565,000 of tax-exempt revenue bonds (Series 2012). The proceeds of the Series 2012 bonds were principally used to advance refund the previously outstanding Series 2001A Bonds.

Under the terms of the loan agreements of the Series 2012, 2003, 2001A (prior to advance refunding) and Series 2001B bonds and an amended and restated Master Trust Indenture dated February 1, 2012 between the Hospital, Healthcare (collectively comprising the "Obligated Group" as defined in the Indenture), and a Master Trustee, the Hospital and Obligated Group have granted the Authority a first security interest in all gross receipts and a mortgage lien on existing and future property, plant and equipment. In addition, under the terms of the respective loan agreements and Master Trust Indenture, the Hospital and Obligated Group are required to meet certain covenant requirements. At September 30, 2012, the Hospital and Obligated Group were in compliance with these requirements.

The Series 2003 and 2001B bonds are subject to remarketing from time to time. To enhance the marketability of the bonds and in order to provide the availability of funds for the payment of the tendered bonds, the Authority has provided for the remarketing of the bonds. To the extent that the remarketing may not be successful, the Authority, the Hospital and Obligated Group have provided for the purchase of such bonds by entering into letters of credit with a bank. Under these letters of credit, the bank will purchase the Series 2003 and Series 2001B bonds that have been tendered and not remarketed. Amounts advanced under the letters of credit and not reimbursed to the bank by the thirtieth day will automatically be converted into a term loan to either the Hospital or Obligated Group. The term loan will be amortized over a period equal to one-half the remaining original amortization of the Series 2003 or 2001B bonds. The letters of credit also secure the Series 2003 and 2001B bonds, which allows the Trustee to draw up to \$17,473,126 and \$10,649,589 under the Series 2003 and 2001B bonds, respectively, for repayment of principal and interest. Drawings on the letters of credit will bear interest as defined in the agreements, and are subject to change based on the credit rating assigned to the borrower. The letters of credit under the Series 2003 and 2001B bonds expire on February 28, 2015 and March 4, 2015, respectively, and may be extended by the parties. No amounts have been drawn on either letter of credit agreement at September 30, 2012.

As a result of the above 2012 transactions and modifications, the Hospital recognized a loss on bond refinancing of \$997,134 in 2012, which primarily relates to the write-off of unamortized bond issuance costs and redemption premiums and other fees paid.

The Hospital and Healthcare have agreements with the Authority which provide for the establishment of various funds, the use of which is generally restricted to the payment of debt. These funds are administered by a trustee and income earned on certain of these funds is similarly restricted.

In January 2004, the Hospital and Healthcare entered into an interest rate swap agreement that effectively converted \$10,000,000 of Series 2003 bonds to a fixed rate basis of 3.115% through January 2011. In August 2005, the Hospital and Healthcare entered into an interest rate swap agreement that effectively converted the remaining Series 2001B bonds, excluding the approximate \$4.6 million allocated to Healthcare, to a fixed rate through 2023 and also effectively converted the portion of the Series 2001B bonds previously swapped and all of the Series 2003 bonds to a fixed rate of 3.635% through October 2033.

In anticipation of the advance refunding of the Series 2001A bonds during fiscal 2012 and the issuance of the Series 2012 variable rate bonds in February 2012, the Hospital and Healthcare entered into a forward interest rate swap agreement in August 2005, which became effective October 2011, that effectively converts all of the outstanding variable rate debt on the Series 2012 bonds to a fixed rate of 3.708% through October 2031. The swap agreement requires a portion of the exposure to be collateralized by the Hospital. At September 30, 2012 and 2011, there was a collateral asset in the amount of \$3,010,000 and \$3,060,000, respectively, required by the swap agreement included in current portion of funds held by trustee under revenue bond agreements.

The interest rate swap agreements meet the definition of derivative instruments. Consequently, the fair value of the swaps (a liability of \$12,916,482 and \$12,267,751 at September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively) is reported in accrued pension and other liabilities in the accompanying balance sheets and the change in fair value of \$648,731 and \$2,903,636 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, is reported as nonoperating losses in the statements of operations. On a monthly basis, the Hospital pays or receives the difference between the fixed and variable rates as applied to the notional amount. The resulting difference is charged to nonoperating losses. Such other charges totaled \$1,932,690 and \$874,111 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The swaps, while serving as economic hedges, do not qualify as accounting hedges.

Total interest paid on long-term debt, exclusive of payments related to the swap agreements, was \$1,249,924 and \$2,164,257 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. No capitalized interest was recorded for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011.

8. Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, provides a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles. FASB ASC 820 defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles and enhances disclosures about fair value measurements.

As defined in FASB ASC 820, fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Hospital uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Hospital often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Hospital utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Hospital is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

Level 1 – Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange. Level 1 also includes U.S. Treasury and federal agency securities and federal agency mortgage-backed securities, which are traded by dealers or brokers in active markets. Valuations are obtained from readily available pricing sources for market transactions involving identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Valuations for assets and habilities traded in less active dealer or broker markets. Valuations are obtained from third party pricing services for identical or similar assets or habilities.

Level 3 – Valuations for assets and habilities that are derived from other valuation methodologies, including option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques, and not based on market exchange, dealer or broker traded transactions. Level 3 valuations incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets or liabilities.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Hospital performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities that are subject to FASB ASC 820. At each reporting period, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

For the fiscal years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets and liabilities has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used:

Fixed Income Investments (Debt Securities)

The fair value for debt instruments is determined by using broker or dealer quotations, external pricing providers, or alternative pricing sources with reasonable levels of price transparency. The Hospital mainly holds corporate bonds, municipal bonds, and U.S. governmental and federal agency debt instruments, which are generally classified as Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

Marketable Equity Securities

Marketable equity securities, including certain mutual funds, are valued either based on stated market prices and at the net asset value of shares held by the Hospital at year end, if available, or for investments that are not actively traded in a securities exchange, the fair value is stated at the value of proportionate share of total fund net assets. Underlying plan investments within these funds are readily available and stated at quoted market prices, which generally results in the classification as Level 1 or 2 within the fair value hierarchy.

Alternative Investments and Inflation Hedging

The Hospital invests in alternative and inflation hedging investments that consist of certain limited partnership interests in investment funds, which, in turn, invest in diversified portfolios predominantly comprised of equity and fixed income securities, as well as options, futures contracts, and some other less liquid investments. Management has approved procedures pursuant to the methods in which the Hospital values these investments at fair value, which ordinarily will be the amount equal to the prorata interest in the net assets of the limited partnership, as such value is supplied by, or on behalf of, each investment from time to time, usually monthly and/or quarterly by the investment manager. These investments are classified as Level 2 or 3, depending on the nature of the underlying assets and valuation methodologies used as reported by the fund managers.

Hospital management is responsible for the fair value measurements of investments reported in the financial statements. Such amounts are generally determined using audited financial statements of the funds and/or recently settled transactions. Because of inherent uncertainty of valuation of certain alternative investments, the estimate of the fund manager or general partner may differ from actual values, and differences could be significant. Management believes that reported fair values of its alternative investments at the balance sheet dates are reasonable.

The Hospital's global equity funds consist of funds which invest in a wide variety of equity securities issued throughout the world. The fair value of the investments in this category has been estimated using the net asset value per share of the funds.

Investment Strategies

Fixed Income Investments (Debt Instruments)

The primary purpose of fixed income investments is to provide a highly predictable and dependable source of income, preserve capital, and reduce the volatility of the total portfolio and hedge against the risk of deflation or protracted economic contraction.

Marketable Equity Securities

The primary purpose of the domestic and non-U.S. equity investments is to provide appreciation of principal and growth of income with the recognition that this requires the assumption of greater market volatility and risk of loss. The total equity portion of the portfolio will be broadly diversified according to economic sector, industry, number of holdings and other characteristics including style and capitalization. The Hospital may employ multiple equity investment managers, each of whom may have distinct investment styles. Accordingly, while each manager's portfolio may not be fully diversified, it is expected that the combined equity portfolio will be broadly diversified.

Alternative Investments and Inflation Hedging

The primary purpose of alternative and inflation hedging investments is to provide further portfolio diversification and to reduce overall portfolio volatility by investing in strategies that are less correlated with traditional equity and fixed income investments. Alternative investments may provide access to strategies otherwise not accessible through traditional equities and fixed income such as derivative instruments, real estate, distressed debt and private equity and debt.

Fair Value of Other Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Hospital in estimating the "fair value" of other financial instruments in the accompanying financial statements and notes thereto:

Cash and cash equivalents: The carrying amounts reported in the accompanying balance sheets for these financial instruments approximate their fair values.

Accounts receivable and accounts payable: The carrying amounts reported in the accompanying balance sheets approximate their respective fair values due to the short maturities of these instruments.

Long-term debt: The fair value of the notes payable and long-term debt, as disclosed in Note 6, was calculated based upon discounted cash flows through maturity based on market rates currently available for borrowing with similar maturities.

Interest rate swap agreements: The valuation of the interest rate swap agreements is estimated by a third-party based on the anticipated cash flows under the swap agreements over their duration at market interest rates.

Plan Assets

The primary investment objective of the Hospital's Retirement Plan is to provide pension benefits for its members and their beneficiaries by ensuring a sufficient pool of assets to meet the Plan's current and future benefit obligations. These funds are managed as permanent funds with disciplined longer-term investment objectives and strategies designed to meet cash flow requirements of the plan. Funds are managed in accordance with ERISA and all other regulatory requirements.

Management of plan assets is designed to maximize total return while preserving the capital values of the fund, protecting the fund from inflation, and providing liquidity as needed for plan benefits. The objective is to provide a rate of return that meets inflation plus 5%, over a long-term horizon.

The Plan aims to diversify its holdings among sectors, industries and companies. No more than 5% of the total stock portfolio valued at market may be invested in the common stock of any one corporation. No more than 5% of the outstanding shares of any one company may be held. No more than 20% of stock valued at market may be held in any one industry category as defined in the Standard & Poor's S&P 500 index. Fixed income securities of any one issuer shall not exceed 5% of the total bond portfolio at the time of purchase. Holdings of any individual issue must be 50% or less of the value of the total issue, excluding U.S. Treasury or other federal agencies or repurchase agreements involving such issues.

A periodic review is performed of the pension plan's investment in various asset classes. The current asset allocation target is 80% equities with an allowable range of 50% to 80%, and 20% fixed income with an allowable range of 20% to 50%.

10. Related Party Transactions

During 2012 and 2011, the Hospital was charged approximately \$4,437,000 and \$5,262,000, respectively, in administrative and other fees by Resources. During 2012 and 2011, the Hospital had net transfers of \$16,238,232 and \$15,063,668, respectively, to affiliates for operating and other purposes. At September 30, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital was owed \$1,820,779 and \$2,883,419, respectively, from Resources and affiliates. During 2012 and 2011, Resources released \$69,146 and \$131,062, respectively, of temporarily restricted net assets to the Hospital to offset patient care expenses and for capital acquisitions.

11. Community Benefits (Unaudited)

The Hospital provides numerous community service programs such as patient transport, community education programs, health screenings, health publications and other health information services in addition to providing charitable services and funding the difference between Medicaid reimbursement and the cost of providing those services. In addition, the Hospital also directly subsidizes area community health service agencies which are in support of the Hospital's mission to improve the health of the community. The net cost of providing such benefits was \$17,631,019 and \$18,576,144 for the years ending September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

13. Contingencies and Litigation

Resources currently maintains professional malpractice liability insurance and general liability insurance coverage under a combination of policies. The insurance for the professional liability coverage is primarily written on a "claims-made" basis and the commercial general liability coverage is primarily maintained on an "occurrence" basis. These coverages apply after a self-insured retention of \$1.0 million per incident and \$4.0 million annual aggregate for fiscal 2012 and 2011. In addition, insurance coverage does not generally cover punitive damages or defense costs.

In May 2012, it was discovered by affiliated physicians that several patients in the Hospital's cardiac cath lab had contracted the hepatitis C virus. The Hospital began an investigation immediately, and promptly reported the outbreak to the New Hampshire Department of Health & Human Services. Investigations related to this matter are ongoing into alleged criminal activity of an ex-employee (a technician in the cardiac cath lab) that may be linked to the hepatitis C infection of 32 hospital patients.

As of December 20, 2012, several lawsuits have been filed against the Hospital related to this matter. Other unrelated co-defendants have also been named in these lawsuits. The Hospital currently denies liability in these suits, and is in the process of defending against these suits. A preliminary liability of the fiscal 2012 self-insurance limit has been established by the Hospital. Based on the opinion of Hospital management in discussion with legal counsel, the ultimate outcome of these matters is currently uncertain, and an estimate of possible loss or a range of loss to the Hospital or amounts that may be reimbursed from excess insurance or co-defendants cannot be reasonably estimated and are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements. Management considers it highly unlikely and a remote possibility that aggregate claims in these suits would exceed the amounts available under insurance coverage.
