The Entity

Vernon Memorial Healthcare, Inc. (the "Organization") is a nonprofit, nonstock corporation that operates a 25-bed critical access hospital that provides comprehensive inpatient, outpatient, home health, hospice, and clinical health care services to the residents of Vernon County and the surrounding area

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization follows accounting standards set by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) The ASC is the single source of authoritative accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) to be applied to nongovernmental entities in the preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the accompanying financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that directly affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from these estimates

Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents, excluding amounts limited as to use or restricted

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Accounts Receivables and Credit Policy

Accounts receivable are uncollateralized patient obligations that are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. These obligations are primarily from local residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. The Organization bills third-party payors on each patient's behalf, or if a patient is uninsured, the patient is billed directly. Once claims are settled with the primary payor, any secondary insurance is billed, and patients are billed for co-pay and deductible amounts that are the patients' responsibility. Payments on accounts receivable are applied to the specific claim identified on the remittance advice or statement. The Organization does not have a policy to charge interest on past due accounts.

The carrying amounts of accounts receivable are reduced by allowances that reflect management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected. Management provides for contractual adjustments under terms of third-party reimbursement agreements through a charge to gross patient service revenue and a credit to the accounts receivable. In addition, management provides for probable uncollectible amounts, primarily uninsured patients and amounts patients are personally responsible for, through a charge to operations and a credit to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of historical collection likelihood and the current status of individual accounts Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable.

Accounts receivable are recorded in the accompanying balance sheets net of contractual adjustments and an allowance for doubtful accounts

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost, determined on the first-in, first-out (FIFO) method, or market

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Assets Limited as to Use and Investment Income

Assets limited as to use represent funds designated by the Board of Directors for necessary capital improvements and a hospice house, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes, amounts set aside to fund donor-restricted contributions, assets set aside under terms of a bond trust indenture agreement, and deferred compensation plan assets. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Organization have been classified as current assets.

Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is reported as other income and is included in the revenue in excess of expenses unless the income is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from revenue in excess of expenses unless the investments are trading securities. Realized gains or losses are determined by specific identification.

The Organization monitors the difference between the cost and the fair value of its investments. If the investments experience a decline in value that the Organization determines is other than temporary, the Organization records a realized loss in investment income.

Fair Value Measurements

The Organization measures fair value of its financial instruments using a three-tier hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows.

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access

Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are observable for the asset or liability
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs

Property, Equipment, and Depreciation

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost or, if donated, at fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives range from three to fifteen years for major movable equipment, and from ten to fifty years for land improvements, buildings, and fixed equipment. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included with depreciation expense in the accompanying financial statements.

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Property, Equipment, and Depreciation (Continued)

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from revenue in excess of expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The Organization periodically evaluates the recoverability of its long-lived assets, which consist primarily of property and equipment with finite useful lives, whenever events or changes in circumstance indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable. If the recoverability of these assets is unlikely because of the existence of factors indicating impairment, an impairment analysis is performed using a projected undiscounted cash flow method. Management must make assumptions regarding estimated future cash flows and other factors to determine the fair value of these respective assets. If the carrying amounts of the assets exceed their respective fair values, the carrying value of the underlying assets would be adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss would be recognized. No impairment loss was recognized in 2012 or 2011.

Asset Retirement Obligation

Accounting guidance on asset retirement and environmental obligations clarifies when an entity is required to recognize a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation. Management has considered this accounting guidance, specifically as it relates to its legal obligation to perform asset retirement activities, such as asbestos removal, on its existing properties. Management believes that there is an indeterminate settlement date for the asset retirement obligations because the range of time over which the Organization may settle the obligation is unknown and cannot be estimated. As a result, management cannot reasonably estimate the liability related to these retirement activities as of September 30, 2012 and 2011.

Unamortized Bond Issue Costs

Costs related to issuance of long-term debt are amortized over the life of the related debt using the straight-line method

Net Assets

Unrestricted net assets consist of investments and otherwise unrestricted amounts that are available for use in carrying out the mission of the Organization and include those expendable resources designated for special use by the Organization's Board of Directors. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity

For 2012 and 2011, the Organization had no permanently restricted net assets

Revenue in Excess of Expenses

The accompanying statements of operations and statements of changes in net assets include the classification revenue in excess of expenses, which is considered the operating indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from the operating indicator include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.

Net Patient Service Revenue

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Charity Care

The Organization provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Organization maintains records to identify the amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under the charity care policy. Because the Organization does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue in the accompanying statements of operations.

Electronic Health Record Incentive Funding

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("ARRA") provides for incentive payments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs for certain hospitals and physician practices that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health record ("EHR") technology. These provisions of ARRA, collectively referred to as the Health Information. Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (the "HITECH Act"), are intended to promote the adoption and meaningful use of health information technology and qualified EHR technology.

The Organization recognizes revenue for EHR incentive payments when there is reasonable assurance that the Organization will meet the conditions of the program, primarily demonstrating meaningful use of certified EHR technology for the applicable period. The demonstration of meaningful use is based on meeting a series of objectives. Meeting the series of objectives in order to demonstrate meaningful use becomes progressively more stringent as its implementation is phased in through stages as outlined by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS)

Amounts recognized under the EHR incentive programs are based on management's best estimates, which are based in part on cost report data that is subject to contractor audit, accordingly, amounts recognized are subject to change. In addition, the Organization's attestation of its compliance with the meaningful use criteria is subject to audit by the federal government or its designee.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Contributions and Donor-Restricted Gifts

Contributions are considered available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Organization are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statements of operations and statements of changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

Unemployment Compensation

The Organization elected reimbursement financing under provisions of the Wisconsin unemployment compensation laws. Unemployment claims are paid to the State of Wisconsin as incurred. The Organization has obtained a line of credit to meet state funding requirements.

Advertising Costs

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred

Income Taxes

The Organization is a nonprofit corporation as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and is exempt from federal taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code The Organization is also exempt from state income taxes on related income

In order to account for any uncertain tax positions, the Organization assesses whether it is more likely than not that a tax position will be sustained upon examination of the technical merits of the position, assuming the taxing authority has full knowledge of all information. If the tax position does not meet the more likely than not recognition threshold, the benefit of that position is not recognized in the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Income Taxes (Continued)

The Organization is also engaged, to a limited extent, in activities which the Internal Revenue Service considers unrelated to the Organization's exempt purpose and, therefore, taxable. These activities, however, annually result in net operating losses for income tax purposes. The Organization does not presently anticipate that a tax benefit from these net operating losses will be realized in the future. Accordingly, any potential deferred tax asset resulting from the availability of net operating loss carryforwards is offset by a valuation allowance of equal amount. No deferred tax assets and liabilities have been recognized since no other differences exist between the financial and tax bases of reporting the Organization's assets and liabilities.

The Organization recorded no assets or liabilities for uncertain tax positions or unrecognized benefits in 2012 or 2011 Federal returns for the years ended September 30, 2009, and beyond remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service

The Organization's policy is to recognize interest and penalties related to income tax matters in income tax expense when incurred. As of September 30, 2012 and 2011, there were no material tax penalties, or interest related to tax penalties, recorded by the Organization in the financial statements.

Real Estate Taxes

The majority of real estate owned by the Organization is exempt from real estate taxes by the State of Wisconsin and its political subdivisions. The Organization is responsible for paying a portion of the real estate taxes on the medical office building attached to the hospital

New Accounting Pronouncements

In August 2010, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2010-23, *Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure* This ASU amends ASC Topic 954 and requires entities to use cost as the measurement basis for charity care disclosures, including both direct and indirect costs. Entities are also required to disclose the method used to determine these costs, such as directly from a costing system or through an estimation process. The guidance in this ASU was adopted by for the Organization for the year ended September 30, 2012. The amount of charity care for the year ended. September 30, 2011, reflected in Note 5, has been restated to reflect estimated cost.

In August 2010, ASU No 2010-24, *Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries*, was issued ASU 2010-24 is effective for the Organization for the year ended September 30, 2012 ASU 2010-24 addresses the diversity in the accounting for medical malpractice and similar liabilities and their related anticipated insurance recoveries by health care entities that mostly have netted insurance recoveries against the accrued liability, although some have presented the anticipated insurance recovery and the liability on a gross basis. The ASU clarifies that a health care entity should not net insurance recoveries against a related claim liability, and the amount of the claim liability should be determined without the consideration of insurance recoveries. The adoption of this new guidance at September 30, 2012, did not result in the recording of any receivables or payables at September 30, 2012. Management will continue to review the guidance going forward and when it is reasonably estimatable and probable that a claim and recovery have been awarded, an asset and liability will be recorded in the financial statements at that time

In July 2011, the FASB issued ASU No 2011-07, *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad De bts, and Allowance for D oubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities* The ASU amends ASC Topic 954 and requires health care entities to change the presentation of their statements of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue. Entities are also required to enhance disclosures about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. In addition, this guidance requires disclosure of qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts. The guidance in this ASU is effective for the Organization's year ending September 30, 2013.

Subsequent Event

Subsequent events have been evaluated through February 8, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors

The Organization has agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement at amounts that vary from the Organization's established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows

Hospital Services

Medicare – The Organization is designated as a critical access hospital (CAH) with reimbursement based upon cost for inpatient and outpatient services with the exception of certain lab and radiology services, which are reimbursed based on fee schedules. Professional services provided by physicians and other clinicians are reimbursed based upon prospectively determined fee schedules.

Medicaid – The Organization's reimbursement is based on a form of cost, determined prospectively based on prior filed cost reports, for inpatient and outpatient services with the exception of certain lab and therapy services, which are reimbursed based on fee schedules Professional services provided by physicians and other clinicians are reimbursed based upon prospectively determined fee schedules

Others – The Organization has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, preferred provider organizations, and State of Wisconsin county agencies. The basis for payment to the Organization under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors (Continued)

Clinic Services

Certain physician and professional services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries qualify for reimbursement as Medicare-approved rural health clinic services Qualifying services are reimbursed based on a cost reimbursement methodology. All other physician and professional services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries are paid based on prospectively determined fee schedules.

Accounting for Contractual Arrangements

The Organization is reimbursed for certain cost reimbursable items at an interim rate, with final settlements determined after audit of the Organization's related annual cost reports by the respective Medicare and Medicaid contractors. Estimated provisions to approximate the final expected settlements after review by the contractors are included in the accompanying financial statements. The Organization's cost reports have been audited by the Medicare contractor through September 30, 2009, and the Medicaid contractor through September 30, 2008.

Medicaid Reimbursable Costs

Through June 30, 2010, the Organization's hospital services were reimbursed for cost-based Medicaid services at tentative rates received during the year. The final settlement of reimbursable amounts was retrospectively determined by the State of Wisconsin (the "State") using cost reports that are filed annually and subsequently audited by the Medicare program (in conjunction with its audits of both Medicare and Medicaid reimbursable amounts)

Prior to 2012, the State had completed relatively few hospital Medicaid settlements with CAHs. The Organization was designated a CAH as of October 19, 2004, and the respective reimbursable hospital Medicaid cost settlements for all subsequent periods from October 1, 2005, through June 30, 2010, remained unresolved by the State through September 30, 2011. During 2012, the State completed settlements for the years ended September 30, 2006 to 2008. This resulted in the Organization being entitled to receive additional settlements of approximately \$456,000, which increased net patient service revenue in 2012.

Differences between the Organization's estimates and subsequent final settlements by the State will be included in future statements of operations and disclosed, if material, in those future years in which the financial settlements occur

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors (Continued)

Wisconsin Hospital Assessments

Under legislation created by the State of Wisconsin, eligible CAHs, including the Organization, are required to pay the State an annual assessment. The assessment period is the State's fiscal year, which runs from July to June. The assessment is based on each hospital's gross inpatient revenue, as defined, and was effective July 1, 2010. The revenue generated from the assessment is to be used, in part, to increase overall reimbursement under the Wisconsin Medicaid program through the development of an access payment system. Under the new CAH payment system, the Wisconsin Medicaid program will pay a hospital-specific amount per discharge for inpatient and outpatient services, determined based on prior hospital cost reports, plus an additional access payment. In exchange for receiving these access payments, the State eliminated retrospective cost report settlements to CAHs effective July 1, 2010.

Medicaid Electronic Health Record Incentive Funding

During 2012, the Organization applied for and received funding from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services under the EHR Incentive Program. The funding period for the Medicaid EHR Incentive Program is based on eligible hospitals submitting applications to the Medicaid program prior to each federal fiscal year ending on September 30. It was determined by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services that the Organization was entitled to approximately \$575,000 in funding and has recognized this amount in other operating revenue in the financial statements in 2012 based on when the attestation occurred. The Organization anticipates that additional funding will be available from the Medicaid EHR Incentive Program in subsequent years and will record amounts when future applications are filed and funding can reasonably be determined

Note 5 Charity Care

The Organization provides health care services and other financial support through various programs that are designed, among other matters, to enhance the health of the community including the health of low-income patients. Consistent with the mission of the Organization, care is provided to patients regardless of their ability to pay, including providing services to those persons who cannot afford health insurance because of inadequate resources or are underinsured.

Patients who meet certain criteria for charity care, generally based on federal poverty guidelines, are provided care without charge or at a reduced rate, determined based on qualifying criteria as defined in the Organization's charity care policy and from applications completed by patients and their families

The estimated cost of providing care to patients under the Organization's charity care policy was approximately \$697,000 and \$644,000 in 2012 and 2011, respectively. The cost was calculated by multiplying the ratio of cost to gross charges for the Organization times the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing the charity care.

Other benefits for the community also include health screenings, community education through seminars and classes, and other health-related services

Management assesses individual investment securities as to whether declines in market value are other than temporary and result in an impairment. For equity securities, the Organization considers whether it has the ability and intent to hold the investment until a market price recovery. Evidence considered in this includes the reasons for the impairment, the severity and duration of the impairment, changes in value subsequent to year-end, the issuer's financial condition, and the general market condition in the geographic area or industry the investee operates in. For debt securities, if the Organization has made a decision to sell the security or if it's more likely than not the Organization will sell the security before the recovery of the security's cost basis, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred. If the Organization has not made a decision or does not have an intent to sell the debt security, but the debt security is not expected to recover its value due to a credit loss, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred.

Investments, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of certain investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Note 7 Fair Value Measurement

Following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value

Money market funds are valued at historical cost, which approximates fair value. Quoted market prices are used to determine the fair value of investments in equity securities, which are primarily invested in common stock. Mutual funds are valued at quoted market prices, which represent the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Organization at year-end. Fixed income securities are primarily invested in corporate bonds and are valued using quotes from pricing vendors for identical or similar assets based on recent trading activity, other observable market data, or historical bond pricing and interest rates

The methods described for fair value calculations may produce a calculation that may be different from the net realizable value or not reflective of future values expected to be received. The Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, however, the use of these various methodologies and assumptions may produce results that differ in the estimates of fair value at the financial reporting date.

The variable rate (Series 2002B) bonds are remarketed daily through U S. Bank as the initial remarketing agent under a remarketing agreement. For the fiscal year ended September 30, 2012, interest rates ranged from 08% to 35%. For the fiscal year ended September 30, 2011, interest rates ranged from 06% to 31%. A charge of 10% is assessed for the remarketing of these bonds. The Series 2002B bonds are secured by an irrevocable standby letter of credit from U S. Bank National Association in the amount of \$1,129,663. Annual fees approximating 1.5% are assessed for the use of this letter of credit. The letter of credit extends through April 1.5, 2014. The bonds have historically been successfully remarketed, thus the bonds, less the current maturities, are recorded as long-term debt. If the bonds are not remarketed and there is no event of default per the letter of credit, the letter of credit would be drawn on to pay the bonds. If the letter of credit is drawn upon, the amount drawn, plus applicable interest, would be due. The aggregate rate of interest and fees, based on the charges noted above, of the Series B 2002 bonds ranged from 1.68% to 1.95% during 2012 and 1.66% to 1.91% during 2011.

Note 12 Malpractice Insurance

The Organization's professional liability insurance for claim losses of less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$3,000,000 per year covers professional liability claims incurred during a policy year, regardless of when the claim is filed ("occurrence-based" coverage). The Organization is insured against losses in excess of these amounts through its mandatory participation in the Patients' Compensation Fund of the State of Wisconsin. The professional liability insurance policy is renewable annually by the insurance carrier for the annual period extending to July 1, 2013.

In addition, umbrella coverage is maintained for claims in excess of the professional liability limits to a maximum of \$5,000,000 per occurrence and \$5,000,000 per year. This additional coverage is renewable annually by the insurance carrier and has been extended to July 1, 2013.

Note 13 Deferred Compensation

The Organization has a deferred compensation plan under Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code. The plan is intended primarily for certain members of management to defer compensation until retirement. Investments, primarily in mutual funds, designated for deferred compensation under this plan are recorded as other assets and the accrued liabilities are recorded as other long-term liabilities.

Note 14 Retirement Plan

The Organization has a defined contribution 401(k) savings plan covering substantially all employees. The Organization matches employee contributions up to 6% of covered earnings. The retirement expense for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, totaled \$955,508 and \$942,671, respectively

Note 15 Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Organization to possible credit risk consist principally of accounts receivable, cash deposits in financial institutions in excess of insured limits, investments, and surplus operating funds

Accounts receivable consist of amounts due from patients, their insurers, or governmental agencies (primarily Medicare and Medicaid) for health care provided to the patients. The majority of the Organization's patients are from Viroqua, Wisconsin, and the surrounding area.

The Organization maintains depository relationships with area financial institutions that are Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insured in stitutions. On November 9, 2010, the FDIC issued a final rule implementing Section 343 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act that provides for unlimited insurance coverage of non-interest-bearing transaction accounts through December 31, 2012 Beginning January 1, 2013, non-interest-bearing transaction accounts will no longer be insured. In addition, interest-bearing balances are insured up to \$250,000. At September 30, 2012, the amount of the Organization's bank balances in excess of FDIC limits was approximately \$14,740,000. In order to limit its credit risk with respect to these deposits, the Organization has executed repurchase agreements with the bank collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities with a market value at September 30, 2012, of approximately \$1,560,000.

Note 16 Self-Funded Health Insurance

The Organization sponsors a self-funded health insurance plan for substantially all employees. The Organization's liability is limited through its arrangement with a commercial insurance carrier to indemnify it against losses in excess of prescribed specific and aggregate limits (stop-loss coverage). Losses from claims incurred are accrued based on estimates incorporating the Organization's past experience, as well as other considerations including the nature of each claim and relevant trend factors. Self-funded health care expense for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, was approximately \$4,434,000 and \$4,770,000, respectively.

A liability of \$750,000 for claims outstanding has been recorded at September 30, 2012 and 2011 Management believes this liability is sufficient to cover estimated claims, including claims incurred but not yet reported

Note 18 Laws and Regulations

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and billing regulations. Government activity with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of such regulations by health care providers has increased. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayment for patient services previously billed. Management believes that the Organization is in compliance with applicable government laws and regulations. While no significant regulatory inquiries have been made of the Organization, compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

CMS uses recovery audit contractors (RACs) to search for potentially inaccurate Medicare payments that may have been made to health care providers and that were not detected through existing CMS program integrity efforts. Once a RAC identifies a claim it believes is inaccurate, it makes a deduction from or addition to the provider's Medicare reimbursement in an amount estimated to equal the overpayment or underpayment. As of September 30, 2012, the Organization has not been notified by the RAC of any potential reimbursement adjustments.
