

#### Note 1: Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Nature of Operations

The combined financial statements of Shannon Health System (the System) include the accounts of the following entities

The Trustees of Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital (the Shannon Trust), a testamentary trust, is the sole corporate member of the System and the Medical Center The ownership structure of the combined group is as follows

- Shannon Health System The System's sole member is the Shannon Trust. The System owns or controls Shannon Medical Management. In 2012, the System became the sole member of Shannon Clinic and Shannon Medical Management.
- Shannon Medical Center The Medical Center's sole member is the Shannon Trust The Medical Center is the sole member or owns 100% of Shannon Business Services. Shannon Real Estate Services, and Shannon Rural Health Clinics In 2012, the sole membership of Shannon Clinic was transferred from the Medical Center to the System
- Regional Cancer Treatment Center During 2012, the Medical Center became the majority owner of Regional Cancer Treatment Center, LP (RCTC) The System owns 72 32% of RCTC, with the remaining interest in the partnership owned by unrelated entities In years prior to 2012, RCTC had been accounted for using the equity method of accounting

The System primarily earns revenues through the provision of inpatient, outpatient, emergency care and physician services to residents in San Angelo, Texas and surrounding areas of west Texas

#### **Principles of Combination**

The combined financial statements of the System include the System, the Medical Center, and their respective controlled entities. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in combination.

### Noncontrolling Interest

Noncontrolling interest represents the 27 68% interest in RCTC that the System does not own Losses attributable to the noncontrolling interest will be allocated to the noncontrolling interest even if the carrying amount of the noncontrolling interest is reduced below zero

# Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Uncollectible Accounts and Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

In 2012, the System changed its method of presentation and disclosure of patient service revenue, provision for uncollectible accounts and the allowance for doubtful accounts in accordance with Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

The major changes associated with ASU 2011-07 are to reclassify the provision for uncollectible accounts related to patient service revenue to a deduction from patient service revenue and to provide enhanced disclosures around the System's policies related to uncollectible accounts. #### Interest in Net Assets of the Shannon Trust

The Shannon Trust and the Medical Center are financially interrelated organizations. The Medical Center is the named beneficiary of the Shannon Trust and accounts for its interest in the net assets of the Shannon Trust (Interest) in a manner similar to the equity method. Changes in the Interest are included in change in net assets. Transfers of assets between the Shannon Trust and the Medical Center are recognized as increases or decreases in the Interest.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

#### Cash

Effective July 21, 2010, the FDIC insurance limits were permanently increased to \$250,000 Pursuant to legislation enacted in 2010, the FDIC fully insured all noninterest-bearing transaction accounts beginning December 31, 2010 through December 31, 2012, at all FDIC-insured institutions. At September 30, 2012, the System's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$1,705,000. The increased unlimited insurance for noninterest-bearing accounts has not been extended past December 31, 2012, and the System's deposits insured at September 30, 2012, may become uninsured subsequent to that date

#### Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. The investment in equity investee is reported on the equity method of accounting. Other investments are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value, and realized gains and losses on other investments. Investment return that is initially restricted by donor stipulation and for which the restriction will be satisfied in the same year is included in unrestricted net assets.

Other investment return is reflected in the combined statements of operations and changes in net assets as unrestricted or temporarily restricted based upon the existence and nature of any donor or legally imposed restrictions

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

#### Assets Whose Use is Limited or Restricted

Assets whose use is limited or restricted include (1) assets restricted by donors for specific purposes. (2) assets held by trustees under deferred compensation arrangements and (3) assets held by trustees under self-insurance trust arrangements. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the System are included in current assets.

#### Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the System analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the System analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary

For receivables associated with self-pay patients which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill, the System records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

#### Self-insured Employee Health Claims

The System is self-insured for its exposure to risk of loss from employee health claims. An estimated liability is accrued for employee health claims at September 30, 2012 and 2011, and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not yet reported.

#### Supplies

The System states supply inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the average cost method, or market

#### Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost and are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. Assets under capital lease obligations and leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets, unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

#### Long-lived Asset Impairment

The System evaluates the recoverability of the carrying value of long-lived assets whenever events or circumstances indicate the carrying amount may not be recoverable. If a long-lived asset is tested for recoverability and the undiscounted estimated future cash flows expected to result from the use and eventual disposition of the asset is less than the carrying amount of the asset, the asset cost is adjusted to fair value and an impairment loss is recognized as the amount by which the carrying amount of a long-lived asset exceeds its fair value.

No asset impairment was recognized during the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011

#### Goodwill

Goodwill relates to the purchase of additional interest in RCTC and a prior year purchase of a surgery center. Goodwill is tested annually for impairment. If the implied fair value of goodwill is lower than its carrying amount, a goodwill impairment is indicated and goodwill is written down to its implied fair value. Subsequent increases in goodwill value are not recognized in the financial statements. No impairment was recognized during the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011.

#### Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the System has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose

#### Net Patient Service Revenue

The System has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the System at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered, and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known

#### Charity Care

The System provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the System does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue.

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

#### **Contributions**

Gifts received with donor stipulations are reported at estimated fair value as either temporarily or permanently restricted support. When a donor restriction expires (*i.e.*, when a time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions.

#### Estimated Malpractice and General Liability Costs

An annual estimated provision is accrued for the self-insured portion of medical malpractice and general liability claims, and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported

### Workers' Compensation Costs

The Medical Center is a self-insured subscriber to the Texas Workers' Compensation Insurance Program. An annual estimated provision is accrued for the self-insured portion of employee injury claims, and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported, based on the System's loss history.

#### Income Taxes

The System has been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the System is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income. Subsidiaries that are not exempt from income taxes had no material tax liability.

The System files tax returns in the U S federal jurisdiction. With a few exceptions, the System is no longer subject to U S federal examinations by tax authorities for years before 2009.

#### Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The combined statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include discontinued operations, unrealized gains and losses on other-than-trading securities, certain changes in pension liabilities, contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets), and net assets acquired from noncontrolling interest

### Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR) Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Payments under both programs are contingent on the System continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the administrative contractor. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program

The System recognizes revenue under the grant accounting model using the cliff recognition approach. Under this approach, revenue is recognized once meaningful use status has been met for the full reporting period

In 2012, the System completed the first-year requirements under the Medicaid program and has recorded revenue of approximately \$1,560,000, which is included as a component of other operating revenue in the accompanying combined statements of operations and changes in net assets

#### Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2011 combined financial statements to conform to the 2012 combined financial statements presentation These reclassifications had no effect on the change in net assets

#### Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The System has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the System at amounts different from its established rates These payment arrangements include

• Medicare – Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates or fee schedule amounts. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. The System is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the System and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor. Physician and related services provided to Medicare beneficiaries are reimbursed under a fee schedule methodology.

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

Medicaid – Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a prospective payment system. Outpatient services are reimbursed based on a mixture of fee schedules and reimbursed costs. The System is reimbursed for cost reimbursable services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the System and audits thereof by the Medicaid program. Physician services are reimbursed based on fee schedule amounts.

Approximately 40% of net patient service revenue is from participation in the Medicare and state-sponsored Medicaid programs for both the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

In 2011, the Medical Center participated in the State of Texas' Disproportionate Share Program (Dispro) and Upper Payment Limit (UPL) private programs. Under the private UPL program, various governmental agencies make intergovernmental transfers (IGT) on behalf of the Medical Center. These transfers are used by the state of Texas Medicaid program to draw down federal funding for the Medical Center based on its UPL gap, which is approximately equal to the difference in what Medicare would have paid and what Medicaid actually paid for patient care. The state generally remits these amounts to the Medical Center on a quarterly basis, and such UPL receipts are included in net patient service revenue.

On December 12, 2011, the United States Department of Health and Human Services approved a Medicaid Section 1115(a) waiver (Waiver) demonstration project entitled "Texas Health Transformation Quality Improvement Program" This demonstration will expand existing Medicaid managed care programs to additional counties and established two funding pools that will assist providers with uncompensated care (UC) costs and promote health system transformation. The demonstration project is effective from December 12, 2011 to September 30, 2016, and may have a material impact on the amount of DSH and UPL funding received by the Medical Center. During 2012, payments previously paid under the UPL program were paid under the UC provisions of the Waiver. Transitional UC payments were established to approximate previous UPL funding.

Funds received under the UC, UPL and Dispro programs the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, were approximately \$14,408,000 and \$17,207,000 respectively

During March 2012. CMS issued new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) ratios used for calculating Medicare Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) reimbursement for federal fiscal years (FFYs) ending September 30, 2006 through September 30, 2009. In August 2012, CMS issued the SSI ratio for FFY ending September 30, 2010. As a result of these new SSI ratios. U.S. hospitals must recalculate their Medicare DSH reimbursement for the affected years and record adjustments for any differences in estimated reimbursement as a part of their annual cost report settlement process. As a result of these new SSI ratios, the Medical Center estimates it will repay approximately \$2,300,000 in Medicare DSH funds. This liability is included in estimated amounts due to third party payers on the combined balance sheets.

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. Settlements under reimbursement agreements with Medicare and Medicaid programs are estimated and recorded in the period the related services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as the service years are no longer subject to audit, review or investigation. Annual cost reports required under the Medicare and Medicaid programs are subject to routine audits, which may result in adjustments to the amounts ultimately determined to be due to the Medical Center under the reimbursement programs. These audits often require several years to reach their final determination of amounts earned under the programs. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term.

The System has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the System under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

#### Note 3: Concentration of Credit Risk

#### Accounts Receivable

The System grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of who are area residents and are insured under third-party payer agreements. The mix of net receivables from patients and third-party payers at September 30, 2012 and 2011 is

#### Note 5: Risk Management

#### Medical Malpractice Claims

The System is self-insured for medical malpractice risks for both its hospital and physician health care operations. The System purchases excess loss insurance for claims that exceed varying amounts, subject to aggregate excess loss limits. Losses from asserted and unasserted claims identified under the System's incident reporting system are accrued based on estimates that incorporate the System's past experience, as well as other considerations, including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. Accrued malpractice losses have been estimated by professional insurance consultants and have been discounted at a rate of 3.0% in 2012 and 2011. The System has accrued estimated losses totaling approximately \$3,930,000 and \$4,375,000 at September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. It is reasonably possible that the System's estimate of losses will change by a material amount in the near term

#### Employee Health Insurance

The System is self-insured for employee health claims, subject to certain reinsurance limits for claims exceeding self-insured limits. A reserve has been established for unpaid claims and claims incurred but not reported based on consideration of prior claims experience, recently settled claims, frequency of claims and other economic and social factors. The System had recorded a reserve for employee health claims of approximately \$1,504,000 and \$1,555,000 at September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, which is included with accrued expenses and other liabilities on the accompanying combined balance sheets. It is reasonably possible that the System's estimate will change by a material amount in the near term

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

#### Workers' Compensation

The Medical Center is a self-insured subscriber to the Texas Workers' Compensation Insurance Program. The Medical Center accrues its estimate of all incurred and reported claims plus estimated incurred but not reported claims based on the Medical Center's loss history. It is reasonably possible that the Medical Center's estimate will change by a material amount in the near term.

#### General Liability

The System is self-insured for general liability risks. The System purchases excess loss insurance for claims exceeding self-insured limits. The System accrues its estimate of all incurred and reported claims plus estimated incurred but not reported claims based on the System's loss history. As of September 30, 2012 and 2011, no amount had been accrued based on such experience. It is reasonably possible that the System's estimate will change by a material amount in the near term

### Note 6: Promise Payable

The Medical Center has promised to support indigent activities in certain counties and as a result has recorded a promise payable of approximately \$850,000 and \$2,284,000, which is included in accrued expenses on the combined balance sheets at September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively

#### Note 11: Pension Plan

The System has a noncontributory defined benefit pension plan covering all employees who meet the eligibility requirements (the Employee Plan). The Employee Plan was frozen on July 1, 2005. In 2012, it was determined that the Employee Plan was going to be terminated. As discussed in Note 17, the Medical Center effectively terminated the plan subsequent to year end. The Medical Center's funding policy is to make the minimum annual contribution that is required by applicable regulations, plus such amounts as the Medical Center may determine to be appropriate from time to time. The Medical Center expects to contribute approximately \$17,967,000 to the Employee Plan in 2013.

The Medical Center also has a Supplemental Executive Retirement Plan (SERP) covering certain members of management. The Medical Center's funding policy is to contribute the amount of pension benefit payments at the time the benefit is paid. The Medical Center does not expect to contribute to the SERP in 2013.

#### Pension Plan Assets

Level 2 plan assets include U.S. Treasury and Agency obligations and hedge fund. The Medical Center did not hold any Level 3 securities in pension plans at September 30, 2012 and 2011.

#### **Defined Contribution Plan**

The System maintains a defined contribution retirement plan in which employees who have completed at least three months of service are eligible to participate. Participants may contribute up to 50% of pre-tax compensation. For each eligible participant, the System will make the following matching contributions. (1) 100% of the employee's contribution not in excess of 3% of the employee's compensation, plus (2) 50% of the employee's contribution between 3% and 5% of the employee's compensation. The System makes additional contributions ranging from 2.8% to 13.2% depending on the employee's total compensation. Employees are fully vested in the System's matching contributions when they are paid, while additional contributions are vested over a six-year period. The System recognized approximately \$9,316,000 and \$8,724,000 in expense related to this plan during the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively

#### **Deferred Compensation Plan**

The System also offers a nonqualified deferred compensation plan for certain physicians and executives Benefits generally vest over a period of five years. Amounts accrued related to this plan were approximately \$11.747,000 and \$8.847,000 at September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

#### **Note 12: Related Party Transactions**

The System receives contributions, which are listed as assets released from restrictions on the combined statements of changes in net assets, from the Shannon Trust. The System also received contributions from the Shannon Trust of approximately \$17,009,000 and \$6,152,000 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Approximately \$7,000,000 of the contribution made in 2012 was provided to purchase capital assets and the balance was restricted to use in terminating the defined benefit pension plan

The Medical Center holds a non-controlling membership interest in the Service Organization of Concho Valley (the Organization) Organized in 2010, the Organization's primary purpose is to improve the health care of residents in west Texas through multiple means. A member of management of the Medical Center serves on the Board of Directors of the Organization. The Medical Center contributed \$4,317,000, and \$3,150,000 to the Organization in 2012 and 2011, respectively that was recorded as other operating expense in the combined statement of operations and changes in net assets during the year ended September 30, 2012.

### Note 13: Acquisition

Prior to April 5, 2012, the date of purchase, the Medical Center owned a 37 97% interest in Regional Cancer Treatment Center (RCTC) which was accounted for under the equity method of accounting. On April 5, 2012, the Medical Center acquired an additional 34 35% interest in RCTC for a total interest of 72 32% which is a controlling interest in RCTC. The increase in ownership to 72 32% was accounted for under the acquisition method of accounting whereby the total implied fair value was allocated to assets acquired and liabilities assumed based on their estimated fair value at the date of the acquisition. The majority of assets and liabilities acquired were short-term in nature and the unordinary carrying value of the assets and liabilities approximated fair value RCTC's operations are included in the financial statements of the Medical Center from the date of the purchase of the incremental interest.

The Medical Center paid \$2,695,454 for the additional 34 35% interest. The excess of the implied fair value of approximately \$7,822,000, over the fair value of the identifiable assets acquired, net of liabilities assumed was recorded as goodwill totaling approximately \$1,805,000. The Medical Center expects the acquisition will allow it to provide more comprehensive health care services in its current service area and achieve cost savings through elimination of certain duplicative administrative and other functions.

The re-measurement of the Medical Center's 37 97% prior ownership interest to fair value at April 5, 2012, resulted in a gain of approximately \$683,000 that was recorded as other income in the statement of operations and changes in net assets during the year ended September 30, 2012

#### Note 14: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Accounting Standards Codification Topic 820. Fair Value Measurements (Topic 820), defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy, which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. Topic 820 describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value as follows

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

The following is a description of the inputs and valuation methodologies used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying combined balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy

#### Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, investments are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 investments include money market funds, exchange traded mutual funds and equity securities. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of investments with similar characteristics or discounted cash flows. Level 2 investments include corporate bonds, and U.S. Treasury and Agency securities. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, investments are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. The System does not hold any Level 3 investments.

Quoted market prices are used to determine the fair value of Level 1 items For Level 2 investments, inputs include maturity and coupon rates and/or closing prices of similar securities from comparable industry financial data

### Note 15: Significant Estimates and Concentrations

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require disclosure of certain significant estimates and current vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations. Those matters include the following

#### Allowance for Net Patient Service Revenue Adjustments

Estimates of allowances for adjustments included in net patient service revenue are described in  $Notes\ 1$  and 2

#### Investments and Assets Limited as to Use

The System invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying combined balance sheets.

#### General Liability and Malpractice Claims

Estimates related to the accrual for general liability and medical malpractice claims are described in *Notes 1* and 6

### Notes to Combined Financial Statements September 30, 2012 and 2011

#### Risk Sharing Arrangement

Effective March 1, 2012, the Medical Center entered a risk sharing arrangement with SHA, LLC, a Texas health maintenance organization, to share risk related to certain covered Medicaid managed care members residing in the Medical Center's service area. Pursuant to this agreement, the Medical Center will pay or receive funds depending on the medical loss ratio (MLR) related to covered members. A MLR below 87% will result in the Medical Center receiving funds, while MLR above 89% will require the Medical Center to make a payment to SHA, LLC. This agreement expires on August 31, 2013, at which time the amounts owed under the contract will be determined. As of September 30, 2012, the Medical Center has accrued \$426,417 in potential payments under this agreement.

#### Litigation

In the normal course of business, the System is, from time to time, subject to allegations that may or do result in litigation. Some of these allegations are in areas not covered by the System's self-insurance program (discussed elsewhere in these notes) or by commercial insurance, for example, allegations regarding employment practices or performance of contracts. The System evaluates such allegations by conducting investigations to determine the validity of each potential claim. Based upon the advice of counsel, management records an estimate of the amount of ultimate expected loss, if any, for each of these matters. Events could occur that would cause the estimate of ultimate loss to differ materially in the near term.

#### Health Care Reform

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) will substantially reform the United States health care system The legislation impacts multiple aspects of the health care system. including many provisions that change payments from Medicare. Medicaid and insurance companies Starting in 2014, the legislation requires the establishment of health insurance exchanges, which will provide individuals without employer provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance It is possible that some employers currently offering insurance to employees will opt to have employees seek insurance coverage through the insurance exchanges The reimbursement rates paid by insurers participating in the insurance exchanges may be substantially different than rates paid under current health insurance products. Another significant component of the PPACA is the expansion of the Medicaid program to a wide range of newly eligible individuals. In anticipation of this expansion, payments under certain existing programs, such as Medicare disproportionate share, will be substantially decreased 
Each state's participation in an expanded Medicaid program is optional The state of Texas has currently indicated it will not expand the Medicaid program, which may result in revenues from newly covered individuals not offsetting the System's reduced revenue from other Medicare/Medicaid programs

The PPACA is extremely complex and may be difficult for the federal government and each state to implement. While the overall impact of the PPACA cannot currently be estimated, it is reasonably possible that it will have a negative impact on the System's net patient service revenue. Additionally, it is possible that the System's will experience payment delays and other operational challenges during PPACA's implementation.

### Asset Retirement Obligation

As discussed in *Note 16*, the System has recorded a liability for its conditional asset retirement obligations (ARO) related to asbestos contained in buildings that the System owns

### Pension Benefit Obligations

The Medical Center has two noncontributory defined benefit pension plans, whereby it agrees to provide certain postretirement benefits to eligible employees. The benefit obligation is the actuarial present value of all benefits attributed to service rendered prior to the valuation date. It is reasonably possible that events could occur that would change the estimated amount of this liability materially in the near term.

### Note 16: Asset Retirement Obligation

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that an ARO associated with the retirement of a tangible long-lived asset be recognized as a liability in the period in which it is incurred or becomes determinable (as defined by the standard) even when the timing and/or method of settlement may be conditional on a future event. The System's conditional ARO is primarily related to asbestos contained in buildings that the System owns Environmental regulations exist that require the System to handle and dispose of asbestos in a special manner if a building undergoes major renovations or is demolished


