

## Note 1 - Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

### **Organization**

Craig Hospital, a not-for-profit corporation located in Denver, Colorado, provides a wide range of treatment and rehabilitative services for spinal, brain, and other nervous system related injuries to patients from Colorado and other states

Craig Hospital Foundation (the "Foundation"), a not-for-profit corporation located in Denver, Colorado, was formed to promote and improve public health and welfare and the general well-being of mankind through the development and provision of health care services The Foundation supports Craig Hospital's charitable and educational purposes and contributes its funds for these programs

Rehabilitation Documentation Services, LLC ("RDS"), is a for-profit wholly owned limited liability company

### Basis of Presentation

The consolidated financial statements, which include the accounts of Craig Hospital and its wholly owned subsidiary, RDS, and the affiliated Foundation (collectively, the "Hospital") are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation

### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period Actual results could differ from those estimates

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include amounts on deposit in demand accounts and investments with an original maturity of three months or less whose use is not limited, excluding balances held in the investment portfolio The Hospital continually monitors its positions with, and the credit quality of, the financial institutions with which it invests Throughout the year, the Hospital held balances of cash and cash equivalents in excess of the federally insured limit

### Investments and Investment Return

Investment in equity securities and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values, with unrealized gains and losses included in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. Investment income is reported as other income. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in temporarily restricted net assets.

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

## Note 1 - Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

### Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use consist of designated assets set aside by the Board of Directors for capital improvements, endowment funds, and a supplemental executive retirement plan ("SERP") The Board of Directors retains control over Board-designated assets and may, at its discretion, subsequently use these assets for other purposes

### **Inventories**

Inventories, consisting of medical and other operating supplies, are stated at the lower of cost or market on a first-in, first-out basis

## Land, Buildings, and Equipment

Land, buildings, and equipment are recorded at cost Depreciation and amortization are recorded using the straight-line method over the shorter of the estimated useful life or lease term of the related assets, which ranges from 3 years to 40 years

The Hospital's capitalization policy requires individual assets to be capitalized if the original cost or fair value at date of donation exceeds \$1,000 and the asset life is greater than one year

### Contributions Receivable

Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years, if any, are recorded at the present value of estimated future cash flows. The discounts on these pledges are computed using a risk-free interest rate applicable to the year in which the promise is expected to be received, net of an allowance for uncollectible accounts, if necessary. The allowance method is used to determine uncollectible contributions receivable. The discount on contributions receivable for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011 was \$26,952 and \$35,704, respectively. The allowance is based on management's estimate and analysis of specific pledges. As of September 30, 2012, the allowance for uncollectible contributions receivable was \$146,214. Management determined that an allowance for uncollectible contributions receivable was not necessary as of September 30, 2011.

### **Long-Lived Assets**

Long-lived assets to be held and used are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the related carrying amount may not be recoverable. When required, impairment losses on assets to be held and used are recognized based on the fair value of the asset Long-lived assets to be disposed of are reported at the lower of carrying amount or fair value less cost to sell. No impairment losses were recorded as of September 30, 2012 and 2011

## Note 1 - Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

#### Deferred Debt Issuance Costs

Deferred debt issuance costs include bond fees and are amortized using the effective interest method over the original term of the related debt of 17 years

### Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions, which, by donor restriction, were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets) Income from discontinued operations is also excluded from excess of revenues over expenses

### Net Patient Service Revenues

Net patient service revenues are reported at estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated adjustments under agreements with third-party payors. Adjustments are recorded on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

### Charity Care and Contractual Allowances

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue Charity care provided during the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, based on cost of services provided, totaled \$1,340,536 and \$975,427, respectively In addition, the Hospital also provides medical services to patients covered under state Medicaid programs at less than established rates, which are recorded as contractual adjustments These contractual adjustments totaled \$9,632,676 and \$7,616,046 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively

#### Contributions

Contributions and bequests are available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor Contributions are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. In-kind donations are recorded at fair value at the date of gift. In the absence of donor specification that income and gains on donated funds are restricted, such income and gains are reported as unrestricted income.

## Note 1 - Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by the donor to a specific time period or purpose. Temporarily restricted net assets as of September 30, 2012 and 2011 are available for support of various patient programs, as well as capital improvements. Permanently restricted net assets are to be maintained in perpetuity, the income from which is available for program support Permanently restricted net assets consist of endowment funds, the income from which is available to support various patient programs

### **Endowment Fund**

During 2004, the Foundation's Board of Directors set aside \$3,000,000 in an endowment fund for the purpose of protecting the future excellence of Craig Hospital During 2008, an additional \$1,000,000 was set aside from the proceeds from the sale of a subsidiary of Craig Hospital During 2012, the Board of Directors approved the release of \$4,925,000 of Board-designated endowment funds for the purpose of paying for future expansion at the Hospital The remaining Board-designated endowment funds are valued at approximately \$271,000 as of September 30, 2012 and are included in unrestricted net assets

### **Income Tax Status**

The Hospital and the Foundation qualify as tax-exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code RDS is a limited liability company and is not a taxpaying entity for federal income tax purposes, therefore, no income tax expense has been recorded in the consolidated financial statements Members are taxed individually on their shares of RDS' earnings

The Hospital applies a more-likely-than-not measurement methodology to reflect the financial statement impact of uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. After evaluating the tax positions taken, none are considered to be uncertain, therefore, no amounts have been recognized as of September 30, 2012 and 2011.

If incurred, interest and penalties associated with tax positions are recorded in the period assessed in other programs and costs No interest or penalties have been assessed as of September 30, 2012 and 2011

Tax years that remain subject to examination include 2009 through the current period for the federal return and 2008 through the current period for the Colorado return

### Recently Adopted Accounting Pronouncements

Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") No 2010-23 — Health Care Entities (Topic 954): Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure — a consensus of the FASB Emerging Issues Task Force ASU No 2010-23 addresses the diversity in the accounting for charity care disclosures. The amendments to Topic 954 require that the measurement of charity care for disclosure purposes be based on the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care ASU No 2010-23 was effective for the Hospital on October 1, 2011

### Recently Issued Accounting Pronouncements

In July 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board issued Accounting Standards Update No 2011-07, an amendment to Accounting Standards Codification Topic 954, *Health Care Entities*, which requires health care organizations that do not assess the collectibility of a receivable before recognizing revenue to present their provision for bad debt related to patient service revenue as a deduction from revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts, on their statement of income This guidance is effective for the Hospital in fiscal year 2013 and will require the Hospital to change the presentation of their consolidated statements of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts associated with patient service revenue from an operating expense to a deduction from net patient service revenue

#### Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the 2011 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2012 presentation

### Medicare and Medicaid

Services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid based on diagnosis related groups ("DRGs") and are subject to audit and retroactive adjustment Laws and regulations governing these programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change in the near term Management believes that the Hospital is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations related to the Medicare and Medicaid programs

## Other Third-Party Payors

The Hospital has negotiated payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes per diem rates and discounts from established charges

#### **Note 6 - Fair Value Measurements**

The Hospital values its financial assets and liabilities based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The following fair value hierarchy prioritizes and ranks the level of market price observability used in measuring financial assets at fair value. Market price observability is impacted by a number of factors, including the type of investment and the characteristics specific to the investment. Investments with readily available active quoted prices for which fair value can be measured from actively quoted prices generally will have a higher degree of market price observability and a lesser degree of judgment used in measuring fair value.

Financial instruments measured on a recurring basis and reported at fair value are classified and disclosed in one of the following categories

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that are accessible at the reporting date The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to Level 1 inputs
- Level 2 Pricing inputs are other than quoted prices in active markets, which are either directly or indirectly observable as of the reporting date, and fair value is determined through the use of models or other valuation techniques
- Level 3 Pricing inputs are unobservable for the investment and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the investment The inputs into the determination of fair value require significant management judgment or estimation

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

## Note 6 - Fair Value Measurements (continued)

In certain cases, the inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, an investment's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Hospital utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs to the extent possible. These classifications (Levels 1, 2, and 3) are intended to reflect the observability of inputs used in the valuation of investments and are not necessarily an indication of risk or liquidity.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value

Government obligations, equity securities, bond funds, and mutual funds: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the securities are traded

Certificates of deposit, corporate debt, international bonds, and mortgage-backed securities Valued based on prices currently available on comparable securities of the issuer or other issuers with similar credit ratings

Other financial instruments not measured at fair value on a recurring basis include cash and cash equivalents, receivables, accounts payable, accrued expenses, and long-term debt. With the exception of long-term debt, the financial statement carrying amounts approximate their fair values due to their short-term nature. The carrying amount of long-term debt approximates fair value due to its floating rate structure.

There were no changes to the Hospital's valuation techniques during the year

In June 2003, the Hospital issued Colorado Health Facilities Authority Variable Rate Demand Revenue Refunding Bonds Series 2003 ("2003 Bonds") in the amount of \$15,000,000 The 2003 Bonds were issued to provide for the advance refunding of the Colorado Health Facilities Authority Hospital Revenue Bonds Series 1993 ("1993 Bonds") and the Colorado Health Facilities Authority Variable Rate Demand Revenue Bonds Series 2001 ("2001 Bonds")

The 2003 Bonds mature annually through 2020 The 2003 Bonds bear interest at one or more variable rates (0 19% at September 30, 2012) unless converted to a fixed interest rate. The 2003 Bonds currently bear interest at a weekly interest rate that is payable on the first day of March, June, September, and December. The 2003 Bonds are redeemable at any time on or after December 1, 2004 as a whole or in part plus accrued interest to the redemption date. The 2003 Bonds are secured by a letter of credit that expires in December 2012.

## Note 8 - Long-Term Debt (continued)

The terms of the 2003 Bonds and letter of credit agreement contain restrictions regarding the issuance of additional debt and the encumbrance or disposition of certain assets and require the Hospital to maintain certain minimum levels of debt service and other financial ratios. Additionally, the Indenture of Trust for the 2003 Bonds requires that certain funds be established and controlled by the trustee to satisfy debt service requirements for as long as any of the bonds remain outstanding. The Hospital is required to deposit monies directly with or to the account of the trustee for payments to the bondholders. As of September 30, 2012 and 2011, there were no payments due to the trustee or on deposit with the trustee.

#### Note 9 - Benefit Plans

The Hospital has a defined contribution retirement plan (the "Plan"), which is administered by a designated insurance company and includes a group of investment alternatives from which employees may choose Contributions are made on behalf of qualified employees eligible for benefits at varying levels based on years of service to the Hospital Contributions may also include a matching amount up to 4% of qualified voluntary employee contributions Employer basic and matching contributions vest at 20% per year for prior service commencing with the employee's completion of two years of employment The Hospital's contributions to the Plan were approximately \$2,200,000 and \$2,000,000 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively

## Note 9 - Benefit Plans (continued)

In addition, the Hospital established a Section 457(f) supplemental executive retirement plan ("SERP") for the exclusive benefit of certain executives. Certain forfeiture provisions apply to the SERP as defined in the SERP agreements in which funds would revert back to the Hospital. The balance of the SERP fund as of September 30, 2012 and 2011 is \$1,054,800 and \$957,793, respectively. The balance of the related liability is \$1,300,051 and \$1,163,437 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The difference of \$245,251 and \$205,644 as of September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively, is the contributions approved by the Board of Directors to be paid to the SERP in the year following each of the respective years noted above. Total contributions to the SERP fund were approximately \$240,000 and \$220,000 for the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. In March 2011, two new accounts were created at Great West Life and Annuity Insurance Company \$130,000 was placed in a 457(f) Mutual Choice Plan, and \$110,000 was placed in a Company Owned Life Insurance ("COLI"). The Hospital funded these two accounts in the same manner in 2012. These accounts were created to replace the original 457(f) that was established prior to 2011. The original 457(f) still maintains a balance but no longer receives additional contributions.

The Hospital has a post-employment medical and prescription drug benefit plan ("PERP") available to eligible retired employees who meet defined service requirements. The PERP is being phased out for current and future participants through 2015, and all benefits are expected to be paid within the next three years. The PERP is unfunded. The accumulated post-retirement benefit obligation related to the PERP totaled \$439,420 and \$633,981 as of September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The benefit obligation has been calculated using a discount rate of 2.5%, with assumed 10% annual increases in the health care cost trend rates. Benefits paid to PERP beneficiaries totaled approximately \$93,000 and \$168,000 during the years ended September 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively

### **Note 10 - Grants and Contracts**

The Hospital has entered into agreements with various agencies of the US government and other organizations to perform research and related projects. The grants and contracts are subject to various expense restrictions and are subject to audit to determine compliance with the agreements. Indirect costs are recovered based upon provisional rates. Adjustments to reflect actual indirect costs are made through the adjustment of future indirect cost rates. Management believes that any costs questioned in audits and future indirect cost adjustments will not be material in relation to the Hospital's accompanying consolidated financial statements. Accordingly, no allowances have been established

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments Compliance with these laws and regulations, specifically those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time Recently, federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenues from patient services Management believes that the Hospital is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations

The Hospital maintains professional liability insurance through a "claims-made" commercial insurance policy. The policy provides coverage up to specified policy limits for claims filed within the period of the policy term. The Hospital, based upon information provided by its insurance carrier, has determined that the estimated liability for potential losses incurred but not reported at September 30, 2012 is not material to the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

The Hospital has entered into contracts for the design and construction of an improvement project it is currently undertaking. As of September 30, 2012, the Hospital has entered into contracts totaling approximately \$6,952,000 for its improvement and expansion project over its existing facilities. The total budget of this project is \$90 million and the Hospital has incurred approximately \$1,872,000 in related costs through September 30, 2012

#### Self-Funded Benefit Plan

The Hospital provides self-funded contributory medical and dental coverage to eligible employees. The coverage was previously provided through the Craig Hospital Health Benefit Trust (the "Trust"), a voluntary employee beneficiary association. The Trust was dissolved effective December 31, 2009, and all coverage was assumed by the Hospital. The Hospital, as well as the participating employees, make contributions to fund the benefits provided under this plan. As of September 30, 2012 and 2011, the estimated liability for claims incurred but not reported was \$800,000 and \$1,000,000, respectively, and is included in accounts payable and accrued expenses in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The insurance premiums collected by the Hospital are scheduled for increases, as necessary, in order to fund reserves to maximum liability and provide funding for all estimated incurred but not reported claims

The Hospital provides a wide range of treatment and rehabilitation services for spinal, brain, and other nerve-related injuries to patients from Colorado and other states, as well as research and educational activities for the community Expenses related to providing these services are as follows

### **Note 13 - Investments in Endowments**

The Hospital's endowments consist of various funds established for a variety of purposes, including supporting graduates, continuing the peer-mentor program, ensuring the future excellence of Craig Hospital, and general purposes The endowments include both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions

The Hospital classifies the portion of a donor-restricted endowment that is perpetual in nature as permanently restricted net assets. The remaining portion of accumulations to donor-restricted endowment funds that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as dictated by the donor, or in absence of donor stipulation, as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Hospital in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by the Colorado Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act

The Hospital has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of endowment assets

The Finance Committee of the Foundation is responsible for selecting the asset mix and managers for the endowments of the Foundation The target asset allocation is 65% in equities with the remaining balance in fixed income instruments

## Note 13 - Investments in Endowments (continued)

The Board of Directors approves distributions from the funds designated by the Board of Directors to function as endowments through the annual budget process Expenditures from the donor-restricted endowment funds are controlled by the Hospital's Board of Directors consistent with the donors' intents

During 2012, the donor of a \$50,000 permanently restricted endowment modified the restriction to a temporarily restricted purpose Accordingly, the \$50,000 contribution was released from permanently restricted endowments and transferred into temporarily restricted net assets Also during 2012, the Board of Directors approved the release of \$4,925,000 of Board-designated endowment funds These funds were transferred for the purpose of paying for future expansion at the Hospital

### **Note 14 - Subsequent Events**

The Hospital has evaluated all subsequent events through the auditors' report date, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available for issuance

In December 2012, the Hospital issued Colorado Health Facilities Authority Hospital Revenue Bonds (Craig Hospital Project) Series 2012 (the "Series 2012 Bonds") in the amount of \$37,595,000 The purpose of the bond issuance is to fund an improvement project for the Hospital as well as to refund the outstanding balance of the 2003 Bonds (Note 8) The Series 2012 Bonds mature annually at escalating amounts through 2042 Interest rates are defined by the bond agreement and payable on the first day of June and December of each year, commencing June 1, 2013 The Series 2012 Bonds are redeemable at any time on or after December 1, 2022, in whole or in part, plus accrued interest to the redemption date
