The Garfield Foundation (the "Foundation") has approved a grant to the European Environmental Bureau (EEB) for its Zero Mercury Working Group Mercury Treaty Negotiations Strategy Meeting. The grant will support EEB to work in coordination with the Mercury Policy Project and Natural Resources Defense Council to organize a Zero Mercury Working Group (ZMWG) strategy meeting to be held in Brussels, Belgium in April 2012.

EEB has been designated the recipient of the U.S. \$10,000 award to be utilized for the designated purpose between March 1, 2012-July 15, 2012.

### Reporting Requirements & Schedule:

• Final narrative and project expenditure reports, submitted by July 31, 2012

The narrative report will describe how grant funds have been spent and the progress and/or challenges associated with the grant activities & deliverables outlined in Section I. The narrative report will also include reflective evaluation and describe how the grant's outcomes are affecting beneficiaries.

The expenditure report will detail all project costs occurring during the grant period in accordance with the approved budget outlined in the proposal. All income (i.e., private, government and in-kind contributions) generated for the project during the grant period will also be reported.

    - Discuss and finalize the ZMWG position for INC4 and begin discussions and preparations for INC5.
    - Prepare NGOs for the upcoming regional and İNC4 meetings to enhance NGO effectiveness in the mercury treaty negotiations.
    - Enhance and strengthen cooperation among the ZMWG member organizations.
    - Update 'ZMWG members on internal developments and planning, such as governance and fundraising, and develop a plan of work for the Lumex and Communications Task Forces.

2. EEB has no shareholders or members who have a proprietary interest in its income and assets. ### **Executive Summary**

This proposal emerges as Yangareko's long partnership with Garfield Foundation is coming to an end after building many strong grassroots-based alliances with local county governments in the Bolivian Gran Chaco. It also emerges at a point where Yangareko must adapt itself as an institution to the new Bolivian Constitution and the new laws that have changed the environment in which NGOs and local communities engage in Bolivia. In short, Yangareko is having to re-organize itself away from the consultant team model by which it worked efficiently in the past toward a standard employee with benefits model and meeting the Bolivian government's across the board mandate to raise all salaries by 10% as of January 2011. Yangareko is also re-organizing itself to reflect the indigenous assumption of roles that had been discouraged in the past - including the possibility of executive director and board membership. The challenges are to re-organize, adapt to the continuing inflation of costs, and at the same time respond to the opportunity to upscale the Parapeti watershed work to involve all six counties along the Parapeti (expanding from the four where Yangareko worked in the past). This opportunity vastly expands the outcomes that can be hoped to be achieved by the Upriver-Downriver project which only assumed it would be possible to start at the level of one TCO downriver in one or two additional counties. The upriver-downriver project had low funding for the first year to enable approach to the different actors and explore the possible outcomes to be targeted in the second year. This exploratory phase opened up the possibility of the eight county alliance, the ideal coordinating structure for managing the entire Parapeti watershed, and an excellent final result from Garfield's ten years of support in the Gran Chaco.

Since the initiation of its work, supported by Garfield Foundation, Yangareko has focused on territorial planning, first in the Parapeti river watershed and later in the Pilcomayo river watershed.

In Huacareta Yangareko assisted the consolidation of the Protected Area Natural de Manejo Integrado Municipal - Cordillera de los Milagros in its entire extension, spanning from the Parapeti basin to the Pilcomayo basin, to enforce and attend with efficiency the issues related to conservation of biodiversity, accompanying the environmental recovery in degraded areas involving communities, and using the technical tools of zonification and basic management plans for planning and trainings in surrounding areas.

The project focused on the municipio of Huacareta (788,000 acres, largely forested, with a population of 12,000 people), where work was begun in the Parapeti basin as a geographic area, ecologically and

biologically rich containing contrasting elements and ectotonal transitional zone in between the two watersheds. As the Cordillera de los Milagros Municipal Protected Area is the mountain ridge point of linkage between the two watersheds/basins, there were important biodiversity reasons to continue to work moving down Parapetl area, and also to the Pilcomayo in order to increase protection and management of the biodiverse areas.

Highlights of the results of those projects include: Land Use Management Plan for the Bañado River Watershed in Monteagudo municipio; Land Use Zonification of the Area of Influence of the Parapeti River in Municipio Villa Vaca Guzmán (Muyupampa); Land Use Zonification of the Area of Influence of the Parapeti River in the Municipio San Pablo de Huacareta; Land Use Zonification of the Area of Influence of the Nacamin – Añimbo Watershed (Pilcomayo Basin); and Land Use Zonification in Rosario del Ingre in the Pilcomayo Watershed Area.

At organizational level, Yangareko worked in the constitution and strengthening of the Bañado Watershed Committee (Comité de Gestión Intercomunal de la Cuenca del río Bañado- CGRB), and supported the creation of the Area Natural de Manejo Integrado de la Subcuenca del río Bañado in Monteagudo municipio; strengthening of the Environmental and Natural Resources Projects Unit of the municipal government focusing on protection of the Reserva Municipal Cordillera de los Milagros of San Pablo de Huacareta, and strengthening of the Parapeti Watershed Committee (Comité de Seguimiento Intercomunal de la Cuenca del río Parapeti - Huacareta).

The projects also achieved: strengthening of the Environmental Unit of the Mancomunidad of Municipios of the Chaco de Chuquisaca (MMCH); enhanced interest of the Monteagudo municipio government to strengthen the Interinstitutional Commission of the Environment (CIMA) to encourage better collaboration among projects and institutions and the Integrated Management Project of the Sauces-Zapallar Micro-watershed, to develop pilot experiences; and the realization of studies on the Perception of Communities in relation to Environmental Risks, diagnostic on industrial forestry, and a study on the relations between projects and communities, as well as other many other activities and results at specific locations for the 37 communities of the Bañado Watershed, as detailed in project reports to the Garfield Foundation.

The activities were within several components, beginning with studies to understand and document the situations in which are living the indigenous and campesino communities, including the relations with the haciendas of the area of Parapeti and the Pilcomayo, focused in strengthen organizational initiatives of civil society, strengthen the sub-alcaldias (sub-county district governments), work with communities on reforestation and recuperation of degraded areas, among others.

For the Pilcomayo Watershed, were included neighboring municipios and provinces, in order to support the indigenous people whose lives are linked to the Pilcomayo (Weenhayek in Bolivia and Wichi in Argentina) to support a Weenhayek initiative to establish relationships via specific families of the Weenhayek, who live downriver from the Huacareta municipio, near to Villa Montes, to support their initiatives and work of a cultural and intra-cultural natural with their Argentine counterparts and with other peoples who are concerned about the Pilcomayo, in order to strengthen the trinational Chaco indigenous movement.

In relation to monitoring work, Yangareko has mapped and periodically monitored the Bolivian Chaco for threats and impacts, as well as entered into bordering provinces of Bolivia and Paraguay. To achieve a base map, derived from ground-truthing permanently is almost impossible, but nonethless the monitoring information that has been distributed to the county government was in turn used as statistics regarding environmental changes in their own official county documents.

Yangareko also contributed to scientific research through an agreement with the Universidad San Francisco Xavier de Chuquisaca, to collect botanical specimens in the counties of Huacareta, Entre Rlos, Villa Montes and Charagua. The specimens are being identified at the Herbarium in Sucre, but a large number could not be identified there; some of those were identified at the National Herbarium in La Paz.



Two projects focused on institutional networking. Collaboration with the Comite del Gran Chaco enabled that trinational network to meet and share insights. And the regional Coloquios project enabled Yangareko to facilitate the exchange of experiences and diverse discussions around important topics related to environmental wellbeing, protected areas, indigenous territories, and other diverse topics of interest to academics, indigenous representatives, and wildlife specialists.

Yangareko is currently focusing on institutional strengthening of local governments and grassroots organizations in the Middle and Lower Parapeti in Charagua in Santa Cruz department (state) and in the Pilcomayo River watershed in Tarija Department (state). Additional effort is critically needed to establish a relationship between the counties of Azurduy, Huacareta, Monteagudo y Villa Vaca Guzmán in Chuquisaca department (state) and Camiri, Charagua, Pailón y San José de Chiquitos in Santa Cruz department (state), all eight counties have interests in good watershed management of the Parapeti. The efforts in this watershed are directed principally toward the survival of Kaa Iya National Park of the Gran Chaco, which depends on the Parapeti River for water.

In relation to the current situation in the country, those private institutions with classic orientations toward social development and which have worked long to prevent desequilibrium in the past, are now waiting to see the direction that the country is going to take, as the current direction is inconsistent and contradictory in its discourse regarding conservation, development and economic growth. Indigenous organizations are trying to see how they can relate to government in new ways (as identified in the Local Initiatives 3 project). Grassroots organizations are also vacilating and waiting to see where and how/where to present their needs/demands although they are identified with the representativity of the government.

This situation positions Yangareko to take positive action in accord with the strategy determined some years ago, to maintain a direct relationship with county governments and from there with grassroots and indigenous organizations. Yangareko founders made the decision to step down and renew the board membership after these first ten years, and to renew it in relation to the new Bolivian context.

The amount requested is \$90,000 (\$40,000 first year; \$50,000 second year) for the period from June 2011 to December 2012.

### The proposal

Introduction. The principal objective of this proposal is to achieve a level of institutional strengthening that will permit Yangareko to take action within the current situation of the country while at the same time broadening the international relations of Yangareko, to bring in other sources of funding and thereby maintain a sustained rhythm of coordinated county and watershed planning.

During this period, Yangareko will make a significant effort to prepare and circulate attractive proposals, and will also need to be explaining why Garfield has discontinued its assistance after ten years because that is a question that will be asked.

The specific objectives of the proposal are:

- Conclude the institutional relationship with Garfield and the personnel who were dependent on Yangareko since 2001, as required under new Bolivian law within the new Constitution. This will put Yangareko in compliance with the new law and position Yangareko to seek funding from other donors.
- As framed within the new directions of the country, orient Yangareko into a position to be able to increase assistance in the counties of the Chaco to increase the environmental consciousness of the population at community level, at the level of community organizations, as well as in the local government for promoting conservation, helping to constructing the power they need to take decisions for the long-term.

During this project period, Yangareko will focus on finding new resources for executing projects and sustaining itself so that the important conservation work can be continued.

In preparation for this transition, Yangareko has achieved a solid, dedicated core technical team linked to a solid team of administration and accounting and fully capable of executing actions in different counties and areas as needed. The structure with which Yangareko worked initially was the efficient modality of consultants working in rural areas with no employee "benefits". In the past two years, the government has developed new laws and demanded that all receive adequate compensation for their years of service.

With this final support from Garfield, Yangareko will be positioned to take on new work under the new frameworks in Bolivia.

Issues Remaining to be Addressed by Yangareko in future years (2012-2017), in collaboration with new donors

- Still weak or wrong civil participation for decisions taking in conservation of biodiversity at watersheds.
- Contradictions between what are saying and what really happens in the field.
- Weak international institutional and inter-institutional relation.
- Loss of diversity in the Parapeti and Pilcomayo watershed influence areas.
- Difficulties to understand the political vision of the government.

Expected Outcomes for new proposals that will be developed for the oncoming years (2012-2015)

- New institutional cooperation for Yangareko to continue his work in the Parapeti and Pilcomayo watersheds influences areas.
- Support for plans and projects for conservation and sustainable use in the Chaco.
- Strengthening Municipio government, in terms of integration of the communities in Environmental and Natural Resources Projects, and organizational decisions.
- Continuity zoning of indigenous area, to continue involving the population in biodiversity conservation activities.
- Continuity in implement nurseries and reforestation in the riverbanks and in the steep deforested areas
- Strengthening alliances with governmental and other nongovernmental agencies for preparation of specific management plans, permitting specific planning for determined areas and resources.

<u>Background</u>: Describe your organization history and accomplishments and, if funding is being sought for an ongoing project, describe the project's history and accomplishments).

The experiences and learning developed in Yangareko as a result of the support of The Garfield Foundation in the themes of watershed-basins, particularly in the Upper Parapeti, and upper-middle Pilcomayo watershed, with the purpose of focusing on the issues of biodiversity conservation via the involvement and active participation of civil society and related government agencies (i.e., good governance) brings with it new challenges and themes that was necessary to document and socialize in new areas, and in this way, in response to the demand and interest.

This proposals has been developed as a need to close the wide circle of broad collaboration between the Garfield Foundation and Fundacion Yangareko and other institutional and inter institutional initiatives.

The work of Fundacion Yangareko under the Parapeti 1, Parapeti 2 and Pilcomayo-Parapeti II agreements from The Garfield Foundation has been related to the Parapeti river basin as a natural corridor contributing to the protection of the Kaa Iya del Gran Chaco National Park and its associated



ANMI buffer areas, focusing on the completion of the work proposed for those projects, and a additional project in the middle lower basin area known as Charagua municipality.

Highlights of the results of that work include: Zoning for Land Use Management Plans for the Bañado River Watershed in Monteagudo municipio, Land Use Zonification of the Area of Influence of the Parapeti River in Municipio Villa Vaca Guzmán (Muyupampa); Land Use Zonification of the Area of Influence of the Parapeti River in the Municipio San Pablo de Huacareta; the constitution and strengthening of the Bañado Watershed Committee (Comité de Gestión Intercomunal de la Cuenca del río Bañado- CGRB); support to the creation and strengthening of the Environmental and Natural Resources Projects Unit of the municipio government of San Pablo de Huacareta Environmental and Natural Resources Projects Unit of the municipio government of San Pablo de Huacareta focusing on protection of the Reserva Municipal Cordillera de los Milagros.

In addition, other activities included: strengthening of the Environmental Unit of the Mancomunidad of Municipios of the Chaco (MMCH, joining five municipios); enhanced interest of the Monteagudo municipio government to strengthen the Interinstitutional Commission of the Environment (CIMA) to encourage better collaboration among projects and institutions and the Integrated Management Project of the Sauces-Zapallar Micro-watershed, to develop pilot experiences; and the realization of studies on the Perception of Communities in relation to Environmental Risks, diagnostic on industrial forestry, and a study on the relations between projects and communities, as well as other many activities and results at specific locations in the 37 communities of the Bañado Watershed (e.g., advancing reforestation activities in 30 communities), as detailed in project reports to the Garfield Foundation.

As an added value, the existing relations and knowledge from the past work in the Parapeti River basin permitted to build a natural relationship between the two river basins, which are joined by the Cordillera de los Milagros nature reserve which straddles the ridge between the two that runs the length of the Huacareta municipio, separating it into two ecologically different parts.

The Municipio San Pablo de Huacareta (county), as a geographic area, has a natural benefit of containing the contrasts of the two watersheds – on the one hand its territory touches the source of the Parapeti River and on the other side it is bounded by the Pilcomayo River. This gives the area special characteristics that make the area significantly different from other municipios-counties in the Chaco.

At the same time, the Cordillera de los Milagros establishes a point of linkage between the two watersheds-basins, which meet via the mediation of this mountain range ridge, which was an important reason to continue the work begun in Parapeti 2 with the municipal protected area of "Reserva Cordillera de los Milagros" Huacareta, from the Parapeti to the Pilcomayo.

All proposals supported by Garfield Foundation pointed to realize diverse activities to increase the knowledge of Parapeti and Pilcomayo watersheds, based basically in the territorial space of the Chaco muncipios in Chuquisaca (Huacareta, Monteagudo and Villa Vaca Guzman) and in Santa Cruz department (Camin, Charagua, Pailón and San Jose municipal areas) and in Tarija department (Villa Montes municipal area).

The Local Initiatives 3 project provided Yangareko and Garfield with a better understanding of how indigenous communities are adjusting to the new Bolivia, and what kinds of assistance they may seek from donor agencies and other collaborators.

This proposal is marked by the central theme of continuity adapted to changes, under a new board, in the changing political contest; a continuity based on strengthening and building on achievements to date but with new strategic lines in keeping with the new operating structure under Bolivian law, with with new leadership and within the constraints of growing inflation.

Mission & Strategy (what is the mission of your organization? Describe your organization's strategy for achieving its mission and how the proposed project fits into the strategy).

Fundacion Yangareko is a nonprofit organization, constituted to fill an urgent need for an effective, grassroots-driven NGO working in and around protected areas, indigenous territories, and associated watersheds in the Gran Chaco and Amazonian regions where biodiversity and livelihoods are threatened by inappropriate development and land use. Yangareko facilitates dialogue and interchanges of knowledge, perspectives and experiences to build consensus for seeking common way forward. Yangareko works through teams that include technical specialists and community members seeking to develop new solutions based on traditional and scientific knowledge and implemented by local institutions.

Yangareko's working theory of change is that, given that local people manage biodiversity on a day to day basis, if they share their knowledge and are joined in local organizations and interactive discussion forums, then a critical mass of people will change their own behavior and take advantage of opportunities to influence key decision-makers, and in turn decision-makers will respond by taking action to support solutions that are good for society and nature. Yangareko has proven its ability to follow this strategy to deliver results in collaboration with others, ranging from work with the indigenous organization CPI-Chaco to the trinational Comite del Gran Chaco.

The area of Yangareko's work as an institution is focused on the conservation of biodiversity and preservation of the environment, and it is based on on-the-ground work in selected areas where effort is made to help people find a sustainable balance between the wellbeing of the population in harmony with their natural environment.

To achieve its institutional goals, Yangareko works in strengthening local governments (county level) with civil society organizations of the communities and peoples of indigenous peoples, campesinos, who are seeking to create and consolidate consciousness about sustainable conservation of the natural environment based on use of natural resources in accord with their potential for sustainable use, orienting the local population's decisions toward management of the ecosystem they occupy or in which they intervene. In those meanings all the activities planned by Yangareko had relation to the Monitoring Project funded by Garfield Foundation, which also contributes to development of institutional strategies.

This proposal comes at a time of a slowdown in the continuation of actions, taking time for the basic immediate necessity to adapt and strengthen Yangareko vision and mission at this time of transition.

<u>Project Significance</u>: Describe the problem being addressed. What are the project's short-term and long-term goals? Why is the project important? What are the potential challenges?

The project is oriented toward: strengthening the institutional issues needed to take decisions for short, medium and long-term to construct and consolidate a healthy institution with new team with additional resources to complete the current Upriver-Downriver project, taking advantage of the unexpected interest (arisen since the time that project began its planning phase last year) of the county governments in coordinating watershed management up and down the Parapeti

Yangareko team has traveled to meet with the county executives all along the Parapeti; and all the county executives want to set up a coordinated Watershed and River management District for managing the Parapeti river, from its source down to Kaa Iya, all the way to the Concepcion Lake in San Jose de Chiquitos. This would be a crowning achievement culminating the Garfield and Yangareko work along the Parapeti for the past ten years, to protect Kaa Iya biodiversity as well as the waters of the river that nourishes people, animals, birds and wetlands. The vision is to achieve a Parapeti River/Watershed Management District in place and drawing funding from the different county & autonomous government budgets as well as from national and foreign donors. This would consolidate the grassroots-linked governance structure between local communities watershed committees (modeled after the Monteagudo and Huacareta community watershed committees) and their eight local governments coordinating along the entire river (Azurduy, Huacareta, Monteagudo, Villa Vaca Guzman -aka Muyupampa, Camiri, Charagua, Pailon, and San Jose de Chiquitos counties)



Under other projects, Yangareko has done the groundwork in four of these eight counties (Huacareta, Monteagudo, Muyumpampa, and recently Charagua), so this would upscale to the other four.

This as the most viable way to engage the Charagua government (in the current Upriver-Downriver project) as they have been slow to sign the collaboration agreement and are most interested in engaging with upriver counties whose activities affect downriver Charagua. The new team brings the credibility of increased indigeneity to this table which is being created in the "new" Bolivian context, and will strengthen the Lowland Chaco indigenous position within the national and subregional context.

GF began its support to the Chaco with a grant to Yangareko to do initial studies of how to support watershed management along the entire Parapeti, to contribute to protection of critical water for Kaa Iya. Hence this project brings GF to the end of its support of what was envisioned as a longterm goal in its initial support.

Work Plan (describe the project including objectives, activities, and implementation schedule. List any deliverables you expect the project to produce and the anticipated completion date).

The two main objective of the proposal, is to:

- Assist the consolidation of the institutional structure, to attend with efficiency the issues related to legal changes and changing strategies for conservation of biodiversity.
- Wrap up the Garfield relationship with final achievement of an multi-county Parapeti river watershed institution.

The specific objectives are:

- Assist Yangareko to re-organize itself under its new board, with a new executive director, and with new relations to allied institutions (Yeporaka, CABI, Charagua county, and other organizations and institutions).
- Technical support to define a new workplan for Yangareko for a short and medium term (next five years).
- · Support the activities related to closing projects with Garfield's Foundation support.
- Advise organizations and institutions related to Yangareko (Yeporaka, CABI, CGRB, Charagua, Huacareta, Villa Montes municipalities, etc.) in seeking funding in relation to biodiversity conservation.

### **Activities**

Yangareko will support the following activities.

 Analyze with the Board and technical team past accomplishments and lessons learned during the first decade of Yangareko's existence, and position that past work as a basis to go forward within the new governmental context.

[For this, is necessary to work with the new team and other allied institutions (Yeporaka, CABI, etc.) within the new Constitution and labor laws in Bolivia.]

- Financial adjustment for compensating the long-term personnel.
- Internal planning to define a work plan for Yangareko for a short and medium term for the next five years

- Periodic internal workshops for planning new steps for the short and medium term, and reviewing advances.
- Complete activities and close the UpRiver DownRiver and Local Initiatives projects.
- Provide advice and technical assistance to the institutions allied with Yangareko (CABI, Yeporaka, CGRB, etc) to seek funding in relation to biodiversity conservation and sustainable development.
- Prepare and submit final reports, audit, and other documentation to Garfield Foundation.

For this proposal Yangareko will implement concrete actions for an adequate process to adapt the institutional actuation under the new country context. The goal is to have good outcomes of this transition in terms of achieving a good "close" to GF's association with Yangareko leaving Yangareko re-organized and positioned to act in the new Bolivian context while still committed to the same long-term goals as in 2001 when it was founded. The renewed Yangareko will seek to continue to build municipal and intermunicipal strong relations, to coordinate with government agencies at Santa Cruz, Chuquisaca and Tarija departments level (Gobernaciones, Gobiernos Municipales/counties) and with community organizations.

The central commitment of Yangareko is a strong relation to biodiversity and the environment issues. This grant also supports Urundei to consolidate itself as an organization with a strong track record of results and an information base that attracts new donors.

Fundación Urundei has been designated the recipient of the U.S. \$190,000 award to be utilized for the designated purpose between June 1, 2011–December 31, 2012.

  - Establish a technical team of professionals to gather and analyze ground-trusted information from the key zones identified in satellite imagery from the Chaco-Yungas project and working to bolster the human resources necessary to achieve the projected outcomes of Chaco-Yungas project;
  - Complete core activities in the Chaco-Yungas corndor related to the 2009 Garfield Foundation grant and consolidating Uninder's programmatic reputation in Argentina;
  - Design and distribute questionnaires to gather socio-economic information from the population in select areas important for conservation and ecosystem integrity to help understand attitudes toward conservation and the barriers for applying the existing environmental laws;
  - Gather information about the environmental services, and public attitudes about them, from different ecological zones in order to design interventions that will conserve important biodiversity;
  - Disseminate information regarding the benefits of conservation actions and natural environmental services via workshops and other events that engage the public, relevant agencies, collaborators, and potential donors; and,
  - Reach out to promising donors identified by a fundraising advisor, and using the information base constructed by Urunder's projects to demonstrate a convincing rationale for conservation and sustainable development projects in key areas of the Gran Chaco.
  - \* Please refer to the proposal for the details of activities and budget associated with this grant.
- 2. Fundación Urundei has no shareholders or members who have a proprietary interest in its income and assets. In the event that Fundación Urundei were to be liquidated or dissolved, under the laws and customs applicable, or under the governing instruments, all its assets would be distributed to another not-for-profit organization for charitable, religious, scientific, literary or educational purposes. Fundación Urundei is not controlled by or operated in connection with any other organization.
- 3. The laws and customs applicable to Fundación Urundei:
  - a) Do not permit it to engage in activines that are not for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes or to attempt to influence legislation by propaganda or otherwise.
  - b) Do not permit it directly or indirectly to participate or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public office.
  - c) Do not permit any of its income or assets to be distributed to, or applied for the benefit of, a private person or non-charitable organization other than pursuant to the conduct of Fundación Urundei's charitable activities, or as payment of reasonable compensation for service rendered or a payment representing the fair market value of property which Fundación Urundei has purchased.



- 4. The entire grant funds will be used for the charitable purpose of enabling Fundación Urundei to complete the activities described in detail in the attached proposal. Fundación Urundei will not use any portion of the grant funds, including any interest earned thereon, for any other purpose without prior written approval by the Foundation.
- 5. Fundación Urundei will not use the grant funds for any purpose that would be prohibitive were it an American organization as described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- 6. Fundación Urundei will repay any portion of the amount of the grant that is not used for the project in accordance with the terms of this agreement.
- 7. Fundación Urundei agrees to supply the Foundation with such other information as may be necessary or desirable to permit the Foundation to exercise its responsibility for the supervision of the grant as required by the Internal Revenue Code.

#### 8. Termination:

- a) For Cause. If the Foundation determines at any time that Fundación Urundei has failed to comply with any term of this Agreement, the Foundation may thereupon terminate the Agreement, in whole or in part, by giving written notice to Fundación Urundei. Such notice shall become effective upon receipt or as indicated in the termination notice.
- b) Ifor Convenience. For its Convenience, the Foundation may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving written notice to Fundación Urundei. Such notice shall become effective thirty (30) days after its receipt or as is indicated in the termination notice.

The Foundation shall not be obligated to pay for any expenses incurred by Fundación Urundei after the effective date of any notice of termination. Upon its effective date, Fundación Urundei shall stop work and take all reasonable steps to preserve and protect all work products produced to date and comply with instruction from the Foundation as to the disposition thereof. Upon termination, Fundación Urundei shall promptly submit to the Foundation a final narrative report, a final financial report, and any unexpended project funds.

- 9. Fundación Urundei agrees to maintain records of receipts and expenditures and to make its books and records available to the Foundation at reasonable times.
- 10. A written instrument executed by both the Foundation and Fundación Urundei may modify this agreement.
- 11. Fundación Urundei agrees not to use any portion of the grant
  - a) To carry on propaganda, or otherwise to attempt to influence legislation (within the meaning of section 4945(d)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States);
  - b) To influence the outcome of any specific public election, or to carry on, directly or indirectly, any voter registration drive (within the meaning of section 4945(d)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States);

#### **Executive Summary**

Urunder's transitional proposal will enable Urundei to complement the skeleton budget in the Yungas-Chaco grant to contract the technical consultants essential to develop land use/ resource management plans requested by landowners in the Chaco-Yungas corridor, and cover gaps in core costs through the end of 2012. This 2011-2012 work is key to consolidating Urundei's relationships and upscaling processes for significant results. The envisioned 2011 and 2012 budgets incorporate the continuing 30% inflation rate in Argentina, and the nationally-mandated increase in salaries and benefits. This grant will enable Urundei to complete its commitment for GF project activities and bridge counterpart for expected new donors. Urundei will reach out to donors selected as promising by a fundraising consultant, and use results of the monitoring work as the researched basis for new projects. During 2011 and 2012, Urundei will consolidate itself as a mature institution that can gain support from Argentine sources in addition to finding new US/European funding.

This investment will enable Garfield Foundation to fulfill its ten-year biodiversity strategy commitment with the goal of leaving strong local institutions that support conservation and sustainable development in the Gran Chaco of Argentina and Bolivia.

The conception of this proposal is based in the consideration of institutional strengthening of Urundei, accompanying a final phase of actions projected by the Garfield Foundation's Biodiversity Program. This strengthening and final phase is occurring as the Garfield Program is approaching ten years of existence, during which time it has attended to diverse institutional and interinstitutional initiatives over this decade, principally with a focus on actions for the conservation of the biodiversity in the region of the Gran Chaco of South America.

The fight for the needs of conservation is an unequal struggle against the forces of development that are capable of destroying rapidly while the renewal force of nature is slow although sure. The forests that remain are linked to protected areas and private conservation areas under control of indigenous peoples and private property holders, areas that one way or another have achieved maintenance of forest patches including those



in maccessible areas or nonproductive areas. These are the areas where it is viable to regulate the pressures over natural resources now. Unless these areas are integrated into the larger landscape of the neighboring ecosystems, there is little probability for long-term survival of biodiversity. Undoubtedly these adaptive and growing impact of conservation actions at the same time seem small confronting the accelerating impact of development, which, despite the good will and strength of private cooperation (donors) has entered into a weakened phase, and of this Garfield was not exempt. The global economy and the fall of the stock market caused changes in relation to the possibilities of continuing the same dynamic actions toward more sustainable development and the hope of small growth.

The work being done by Fundacion Urundei in Argentina is new. For two years, Urundei has focused on research/learning and looking for interinstitutional collaboration with private entities and universities in both Argentina and Bolivia. In Argentina, Urundei has focused on building its foundation around the "neighborhood" of El Rey National Park (60 years old) and assisting private landowners there to establish a more formal buffer zone with economic benefits from not cutting the forest -- especially oriented to ecotourism and rural tourism as appropriate and viable for the zone. In the area of communication, the diffusion of information and transmission of the reality via images has an impact but enters into a competition over who produces the best propaganda. Flence, Urundei has entered into alternative tools such as You Tube.

An additional aspect where Urunder has built on actions and lessons from Bolivia, is the monitoring of threats and impacts, with news contributing to the frustration seeing how far humans go in destroying forest in order to establish other land uses. Viewing the extensive changes from satellite images, one sees the lack of controls. One wonders to what extent knowledge can ever lead to knowledge-based political decisions when they are decisions taken by the current government in power at any moment, and also in light of the fact that it seems impossible to stop the current rapid economic growth process. Undoubtedly scarce resources grow in their value, and it seems that the human efforts follow the ebb of the resources also increasing their value. This happened with wood of diverse tree species that have now gone extinct, as well as is happening with oil, with minerals, with wildlife, etc.

In the midst of this changing panorama, one has to be innovative, seeking alternatives that may influence the population that is causing the ecological damage so they stop thinking only of the advantage to themselves in their short lives on this Earth. In consequence, this Urundei proposal focuses on the situations where assistance, despite being short-term and in a process of closing the Garfield program, without promising to change the world, serves to construct a solid base on which to reach results in achieving new strategic alliances for the longerterm. Deepening and documenting the experience accumulated by an institution so young as Urundei is a first step, so in the dynamic context, it is possible to adapt to the evolving situation, to work from viable platforms, and give satisfaction to have completed a process that was linked to good intentions that translated into all that Garfield has assisted.

Therefore, this proposal includes strengthening alliances with institutions that have experience and are linked to decision makers, that have experience working in private conservation, indigenous and criollo communities, with an eye to other potential allies. In sum the proposal strengthens strategic relationships and planning.

The geographic area of action is ample, considering that ecosystems do not exist in isolation, but are affected by their neighboring ecosystems. As such, in the Chaco, the Yungas (ecotonal cloud forests), the "valleys" and the higher puna are all areas to be explored for potential allies.

The conservation corridors that include protected areas and development of proposals to expand/recognize these is also a component linked to alliance building.



Taking into account the stage of Urunder's institutional consolidation and its context within Argentina and the world, having established agreements to collaborate with public and academic institutions, having carried out work in Bolivia with Bolivian technical teams that were trained under Yangareko, and having gathered and analyzed existing information about the focal geographic areas of interest. Urunder has achieved the point where it is essential to incorporate the necessary human resources to complete the fieldwork in the El Rey project and startup intensive field work in Yungas-Chaco corridor (as soon as 2nd traunch is received in August). In February 2011, Urunder put out a call for interest from junior-level professionals in Salta in order to identify the best candidates that can contribute to Urunder now and into the future, to complete the projects at hand, and demonstrate the capacity required to negotiate new projects with new sources of funding. The second key aspect of this period 2011-2012 is the need to cover the core institutional costs while completing the ongoing projects and identifying new proposals that meet the interests of collaborating institutions and potential donors.

The period of the proposal is June 2011-December 2012. The amount sought is \$190,000

#### C. Proposal

#### 1. Introduction

The lifetime and actions of Fundación Urundei in Argentina are quite new; it was registered as an NGO at the end of July in 2008 and opened its office in 2009. In this short period, Urundei has sought to gain spaces in relating to public institutions and with academic and private institutions abroad and nationally, to work in relation to protected areas, private properties, buffer zones, corridors and communities. Urundei has also begun to create a track record of actions that define its institutional as it meets the challenges along the way. The monitoring and registering of threats, and creating base maps over which to build maps of this information over this extensive area in which rapid impacts are occurring faster and faster, creates challenges in terms of updating and ground uniting of changes visible in satellite images constantly. Monitoring the area has required prolonged and frequent travel to keep up with the changes. Communication efforts that show the reality of the situation via video testimonies and images has certainly had impact, despite the difficulties encountered in opening space for others to share their video testimonies.

The vision and mission of work to gain the participation of local people, in generate awareness among them, is very important for conservation although until now there has been limited impact due to lack of involvement of the institutions that are related to natural resources management and environment. In other words, in the difficult conditions in Argentina, it is still necessary to work hard to improve governance - "the sum of the multiple ways as individuals and public and private institutions manage or can manage common issues, in a continuing process by means of which diverse and conflicted interests can find an common way forward, to adopt cooperative action."

The proposal covers institutional strengthening so that each member of the team maintains the province of Salta as the core area and from there works to identify the key transition areas between ecosystems—the forest transitions, the transition between ecotonal mountain forest and lowland Chaco forest, and the puna and intermixed "valleys" with long histories of agriculture (since pre Hispanic times). The work will focus on the biodiversity and the provision of ecological services flowing across this landscape.

This work requires bringing Argentine technical specialists into the Urundei team, both social and biological/environmental. It also requires updated equipment to better manage the information in forms that are appreciated by government agencies and those who take decisions. And it requires covering core institutional costs during this period of completing ongoing projects while seeking new donors.

#### 2. Mission and Strategy

The mission of Urundei is to promote the conservation of biological diversity and natural resources in collaboration with private and public sectors in the Gran Chaco of South America, to help people find a sustainable balance between people and the environment.

The objectives of Fundation Uninder are:

- Conserve biodiversity through: sustainable production and protected areas at trinational, binational, provincial, community and private levels; watershed management; training, audiovisual and other communication outreach; workshops, coloquia, roundtables, and meetings
- Promote and finance projects implemented directly or through third parties to support sustainable development; strengthen the rights of populations affected by environmental problems in urban and rural areas by means of conferences, forums, and other similar activities; promote the sustainable development through research, studies and voluntary works; promote the education and general public interest in environmental themes to strengthen conservation action by private citizens; encourage environmental responsibility of private business, associations of private businesses, or any other productive sector;
- Carry out studies about environmental issues and spread information about the studies and knowledge so
  they are accessible to affected populations by urban and rural environmental problems who can in turn
  deliberate among themselves to propose legal reforms and new technical regulations;
- Join in agreements for cooperation, collaboration and interchanges with public and private entities, governmental and nongovernmental, in relation to socio-environmental and sustainable development studies and projects.

Urunder's working theory of change is that change can be generated by the people who live on the lands, with the rivers, and near the forests if they are given the opportunity to be involved in dialogue, assessments and efforts to understand how to better manage ecosystems for conservation and wellbeing of all. Urunder seeks to involve private agricultural producers who have major impacts on the environment. Urunder works through teams that include technical specialists who will seek to develop collaborate in generating solutions based on traditional and scientific knowledge and implemented by local landowners and their workers. To achieve its institutional goals, Urunder works in alliances with others to create and consolidate consciousness about sustainable conservation of the natural environment based on use of natural resources in accord with their potential for sustainable use, orienting the decisions toward management of the ecosystem they occupy or in which they intervene.

The project fits Urunder's strategy to develop alliances with others through working with teams that have technical specialists to contribute information that will lead to better ecosystem management in the Gran Chaco.

#### 3. Significance of the project

This proposal contributes additional funding to strengthen Urundei and the outcomes of the Garfield support by complementing the other Garfield projects that are in the process of termination during the 18 month period proposal. The proposal is aimed toward the following objectives:

#### General Objective

Strengthen Urundei at the national and international levels, so that it becomes known to major institutions for its capacity and trackrecord of work oriented to conservation and sustainable development, and receives new support for building its trajectory.

#### Specific Objectives

i) Consolidate relations with institutions and specialized professionals



- b) Build a technical competent technical team capable of achieving conservation project activities
- c) Renovate and acquire equipment according to the needs for supporting this technical team.
- d) Consolidate institutional relations at private and public, national and international levels.
- e) Provide consistent and scientifically-valid information related to environmental services as necessary to sustain conservation.
- f) Make use of/leverage the existing public and private institutions to support and further Urunder's actions in the area of technical and financial cooperation.
- g) Encourage the development and adoption of policies related to the conservation of ecosystems, environmental services, sustainable management of natural resources, and the environment.
- h) Articulate inter institutional strategies for conservation and sustainability, spreading successful experiences.

#### 4. Work plan and timetable

Summary of Activities:

- Build a competent technical team to gather and analyze ground-trusted information from the key zones
  identified in satellite imagery, and bolster the human resources to achieve the projected outcomes of
  Chaco-Yungas project.

- Map key areas for environmental services, areas that should receive conservation attention both private and public.
- Socialize and discuss this information in workshops and other events.
- Open and build communication with other strategic donors and fundraise for continued activities.

#### Challenges to the project

This institutional strengthening of Urundei, as the final phase of Garfield support, will face the challenges of all young institutions in finding support and alliances amongst institutions that have already established lines of collaborating, as well as the restrictions that many such as IUCN put on recognizing organizations only after having three years of existence (which Urundei will achieve at the end of July 2011). Urundei fills a gap in Gran Chaco conservation that needs to be filled, and Urundei is committed to filling that gap, and has made good progress in the first two years, particularly in relation to working with private conservation.

The main challenge is to gain sufficient long-term alliances with international cooperation to be able to do the necessary and urgent conservation work in the Gran Chaco. Lack of information is a challenge, but this project aims to fill that gap, particularly in relation to environmental services and sustainability based on alternative production patterns. Another challenge is the rapid economic growth and high inflation rate (30% last year, and expected to run at similar rate this year into the foreseeable future), because it undermines budgets from existing projects whose budgets were based on lower expectations of costs to be incurred.

#### 5. Monitoring and evaluation

Uninder will monitor and report progress by reviewing progress internally within the team at six month intervals and report progress to Garfield.

#### 6. Collaboration and coordination

A key objective is to achieve collaborators and coordinate with the relevant institutions in order to achieve greater attention to conservation across the landscape corridors emanating from/within Salta province. Urundei will build on existing agreements signed with the Environment ministry of Salta, the Catholic University of Salta, the National University at Salta, and the park authorities for El Rey National Park. Urundei is also a member of the Chaco Network, which includes some 40 institutions working in Paraguayan, Bolivian and Argentine Chaco. The expectation is that in addition there will soon be an agreement with Rural Society of Salta, a key representative organization of private landowners. During the progress of this project, additional collaboration will be achieved with other donors and allies who are identified in the course of this project.

#### 7. Diversity

The area includes diverse local ecosystems and ecotones, as well as diverse populations of indigenous and peasant communities as well as ranches and agro industrial holdings. The team includes women who have experience involving men and women in projects.

#### 8. Team

The professional team of Urundei will be expanded to meet the needs of the work on part-time or fulltime basis. The existing equipment of Urundei will be used although it will be necessary to replace/upgrade some equipment. This budget will (over the period of this project) effectively increase the lines available for the team in the budgets of existing projects, necessary in light of the inflation and new national regulations
