Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinion

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of VNA Care Network Foundation, Inc. and Affiliates as of December 31, 2012 and 2011, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Our audits were performed for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic consolidated financial statements of the Association taken as a whole. The consolidating information is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the consolidated financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the consolidated financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2012 AND 2011

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

The VNA Care Network Foundation, Inc. (Foundation) is a non-stock, not-for-profit corporation organized in Massachusetts. The Foundation's primary purposes are to act as a holding company, maintain an investment portfolio, fundraise, and provide management services to affiliated health care providers providing services to patients in the central and eastern Massachusetts area.

Subsidiaries

VNA Care Network, Inc. (Network) is a non-stock, not-for-profit corporation organized in Massachusetts, whose primary purpose is to provide home health care services.

VNA Care Hospice, Inc. (Hospice) is a non-stock, not-for-profit corporation organized in Massachusetts, whose primary purpose is to provide hospice and palliative care services.

VNA Care Advantage, Inc. (Advantage) is a non-stock, not-for-profit corporation organized in Massachusetts, whose primary purposes are to provide personal care, homemaker, and child care services.

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Foundation and its subsidiaries: Network, Hospice, and Advantage. These agencies will collectively be referred to as the Association. The affiliations are through a common board membership. All significant inter-company balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Income Taxes

The Association consists of four public charities under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. As public charities, the Association is exempt from state and federal income taxes on income earned in accordance with its tax exempt purpose. Unrelated business income is subject to state and federal income tax. Management has evaluated the Association's tax position and concluded that the Association has no unrelated business income or uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements. Management believes the Association is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2009.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use.

Temporary Investments

Temporary investments include investments in liquid debt instruments with original maturities of more than three months, excluding assets limited as to use and temporary investments within the investment pool.

Investments

Investments in equity and debt securities are reported at fair value. Investment income, realized gains and losses, and other than temporary impairments on investments are included in the excess of revenue over expenses unless otherwise stipulated by the donor or State law. Unrealized gains and losses are reported as an increase or decrease in unrestricted net assets, unless otherwise stipulated by the donor or State law. The Association reviews investments where the fair value is significantly below cost and in cases where the decline is considered to be other than temporary, an adjustment is recorded to reflect this amount in the excess of revenue over expenses.

<u>Investments (continued)</u>

Investments, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall market volatility. As such, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the balance sheets, statements of operations, and changes in net assets.

Investment in Limited Liability Company

Beginning April 3, 2008, Advantage had a one-half interest as a member in Home Staff, LLC, a limited liability company organized in Massachusetts to provide private duty home health aide services. Advantage's investment in Home Staff is accounted for on the equity method, and Advantage's activities include its share of the net income of the limited liability company. A summary of the limited liability company's audited financial information is as follows:

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Association analyzes its past history and identifies trends for all funding sources in the aggregate. In addition, balances in excess of one year are 100% reserved. Management regularly reviews data about revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. Amounts not collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted are applied against the allowance for doubtful accounts. The Association has not changed its methodology for estimating the allowance for doubtful accounts during the years ended December 31, 2012 and December 31, 2011.

The moderate decrease in the allowance for doubtful accounts during the year ended December 31, 2012 was primarily a result of management's determination that the balance had excessive reserves that were not warranted.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements, designated assets set aside by the board of directors and temporarily and permanently restricted net assets.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation on property and equipment is calculated on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the consolidated financial statements. The Association's capitalization threshold is \$5,000.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Association has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Association are reported at fair market value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported as fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets released from restriction. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Promises to Give

Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-free interest rates applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Amortization of the discounts is included in contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are substantially met.

Gifts of Long-lived Assets

Gifts of long-lived assets, such as land, buildings, or equipment, are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expiration of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Patient Service Revenue

Standard charges for services to all patients are recorded as revenue when services are rendered. Clients unable to pay full charge, who do not have other third-party resources, are charged a reduced amount based on the Association's published sliding fee scale. Reductions in full charge are recognized when the service is rendered.

Excess (Deficit) of Revenues Over Expenses

The statements of operations reflect the excess (deficit) of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets, which are excluded from the excess (deficit) of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which, by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets).

Contributed Services

A number of volunteers have donated substantial amounts of their time to Network's and Hospice's program services. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for these volunteer services, since the contributed services did not meet the criteria for recognition under Accounting Standards Codification Topic 958-605-25-16.

Goodwill

On September 18, 2012, the Association purchased a business unit of a hospital located in central Massachusetts that provided home health and hospice services. The cost of the purchase was \$2,800,000, which included furniture and equipment amounting to \$332,765. The remaining goodwill, valued at the time of the purchase, amounted to \$2,467,235. Goodwill is tested annually for possible loss on the impairment of the asset's value. Total goodwill assets amounted to \$2,467,235 and \$0 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Prior to the fiscal year ended December 31, 2011, goodwill was reported from the Association's previous home care acquisitions. Due to the competitive environment specific to the service areas involved in the goodwill, the length of time since acquisition and the inability to distinguish patient service revenue generated from the acquisition, in 2011 the Association fully recognized the impairment of goodwill. The total reported loss on impairment of goodwill (amortization expense) for the year ended in December 31, 2011 was \$944,053. There was no reported loss on impairment of goodwill for the year ended December 31, 2012.

Recently Issued Accounting Pronouncements

Provision for Bad Debts

In July 2011, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued <u>Financial Accounting Standards 2011-07 - Health Care Entities - Topic 954-Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities.</u>

Recently Issued Accounting Pronouncements (continued)

The objective of the update is to provide financial statement users with greater transparency about a health care entity's net patient service revenue and the related allowance for doubtful accounts.

The amendment requires certain health care entities to change the presentation of their statement of operations by reclassifying the provision for bad debts from an operating expense to a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts).

Additionally, those health care entities are required to provide enhanced disclosure about their policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts. The amendment also requires disclosures of patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) as well as qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The amendment is effective for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2012. The amendment to the presentation of the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue in the statement of operations is applied retroactively to all prior periods presented. The Association adopted the amendment for the year ended December 31, 2012.

Fair Value Measurements

In May 2011, the FASB issued <u>Accounting Standards Update 2011-04</u>, <u>Amendments to Achieve Common Fair Value Measurements and Disclosure Requirements in U.S. GAAP and IFRS, (ASU 2011-04)</u>.

ASU 2011-04 amended ASC 820 to converge the fair value measurement guidance in U.S. GAAP and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). Some of the amendments clarify the application of existing fair value measurement requirements, while other amendments change a particular principle in ASC 820. In addition, ASU 2011-04 requires additional fair value disclosures. The amendments are to be applied prospectively and are effective for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011. The Plan adopted the amendment as of January 1, 2012.

Cash and cash equivalents included in investments and assets limited as to use are not considered cash and cash equivalents for cash flow purposes.

Investments other than alternative investments and the investment in a limited liability corporation are maintained in an investment pool. Each investment fund is allocated realized and unrealized gains and losses based upon units. Units are calculated using the market value approach determined on the last day of the month the transaction took place.

NOTE 2 INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

Investments at December 31, 2011 have been reclassified in the amount of \$559,802 decreasing mutual equity funds and increasing alternative investments.

Financial accounting standards have established a valuation hierarchy for disclosure of the inputs to valuation used to measure fair value. This hierarchy prioritizes the inputs into three broad levels as follows:

- Level 1 inputs quoted prices traded daily in active markets.
- Level 2 inputs other than quoted prices for active markets that are traded less frequently than daily.
- Level 3 inputs unobservable inputs.

The fair value of all of the Association's investments are measured on a recurring basis using level 1 inputs, with the exception of the alternative investments and the investment in the limited liability corporation, which are considered Level 3 inputs.

The primary hedge fund valuation basis are audited financial statements and unaudited interim financial statements of the underlying portfolio funds. Where applicable, futures and forward contracts are based on the settlement price on the exchanges where they are traded, and when there is no settlement price, value will be based upon last trade price. In certain instances, modifications to the valuation may be determined, in good faith, based on such factors the hedge fund manager's judgment.

The REITs valuation is based on the underlying publicly traded securities included in the portfolio of the fund owned by the Association. The fund is reported as a level 3 because it is not publicly traded.

The limited liability corporation valuation basis is the audited financial statements.

Permanently restricted net assets amounted to \$2,262,508 for years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, which consisted of contributions to be held in perpetuity, the income from which is expendable to support operations.

NOTE 6 ENDOWMENTS

There are no board designated endowments. Donor restricted endowments consisted of an investment portfolio managed by a contracted investment manager with oversight by the Association's investment committee. As required by generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

NOTE 6 ENDOWMENTS (CONTINUED)

The State of Massachusetts continues to be guided by the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA). The Association has interpreted UPMIFA as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor- restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Association classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment and (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment (also known as historical cost). Net appreciation in excess of the historical cost is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Association in a manner consistent with the standard of procedure prescribed by UPMIFA.

From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Association to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States, there were no deficiencies of this nature that are reported in unrestricted net assets as of December 31, 2012 and 2011.

The Association has adopted spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. The spending policy is determined as a percentage (allowed by UPMIFA) of the three-year rolling average of the combined funds available for release under the spending policy, plus the endowment funds. The endowment assets consist of a balanced portfolio of cash, certificates of deposits, debt and equity securities.

NOTE 7 LINE OF CREDIT

On December 1, 2008 the Foundation entered into a revolving line of credit in the amount of \$7,000,000 with TD Bank in which Network is the Guarantor. The interest rate on the line is set at 0.5% above the Wall Street Journal prime rate (3.25%), which equated to 3.75% at December 31, 2012. The line of credit is secured by all assets of the Association. There was no outstanding balance at December 31, 2012 and 2011.

Under the terms of the agreement, Association must comply with certain covenants relating to maintaining a minimum balance of \$28,000,000 in unrestricted net assets at all times and other financial covenants. At December 31, 2012 and 2011, there were no known reportable violations.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs. The Association believes that it is in substantial compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. However, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates could change by a material amount in the near term. Differences between amounts previously estimated and amounts subsequently determined to be recoverable or payable are included in net patient service revenues in the year that such amounts become known.

Network has a policy of providing health care services without charge to patients who are unable to pay. Such patients are identified based on financial information obtained from the patient and subsequent analysis. Since Network does not expect payment, estimated charges for charity care are not included in revenue. Network estimates the costs associated with providing charity care to patients who are eligible for free care by multiplying the number of free care visits by the cost per visit, by service type, as determined by the Medicare cost report methodology. The estimated costs incurred in these activities amounted to \$104,828 and \$60,903 for the years December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Network also provides medically necessary services to Medicaid patients at costs exceeding Medicaid reimbursement, which Network considers to be partial charity care. Network estimates the loss from providing services to Medicaid patients by applying the difference between the Medicaid visit reimbursement rate, by service type, and the cost of providing those services under the Medicare cost report methodology. The estimated costs incurred in these activities amounted to \$1,235,240 and \$1,176,990 for the years December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

NOTE 9 PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE (CONTINUED)

Network provides other patient care services that are either not covered by insurance providers or are reimbursed at rates below the cost of providing these services. Network estimates the cost of this charity care by applying the difference between the insurance providers' visit reimbursement rate, by service type, and the cost of providing those services under the Medicare cost report methodology. The estimated costs incurred in these activities amounted to \$191,160 and \$227,900 for the years December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Hospice provides a subsidy for free or reduced residential rates in each of their hospice houses, which Hospice considers to be charity care. Hospice estimates the cost of this charity care by applying the ratio of uncompensated room occupancy to total room occupancy to the total cost of operating each of the houses. The cost of providing free or reduced residential rates in the hospice houses amounted to \$207,644 and \$235,262 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

The Association also provides resources and services to support numerous initiatives aimed at contributing to the physical and psychological well being of individuals in the Association's community. The Association is able to provide these services with a component of funds received through local community support and state grants. Local community support consists of contributions and the United Way.

NOTE 10 MALPRACTICE INSURANCE

The Association insures its medical malpractice risks on a claims-made basis. There were no known malpractice claims outstanding at December 31, 2012, which in the opinion of management, will be settled for amounts in excess of insurance coverage; nor are there any unasserted claims or incidents which require loss accrual. The Association intends to renew coverage on a claims-made basis and anticipates that such coverage will be available.

NOTE 12 PENSION PLAN

The Association has adopted a defined contribution pension plan under the Internal Revenue Code 401(k) covering substantially all of its full-time employees. The pension expense related to the 401(k) plan amounted to \$730,384 and \$525,958 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

During 2006, the Association established an unqualified deferred compensation plan under Internal Revenue Code Section 457(b) and 457(f) for certain key employees. Under this plan, participating employees can elect to defer their compensation within the Internal Revenue Code limits. NOTE 14 CONCENTRATIONS OF RISK

The Association maintained cash balances in excess of \$250,000 in banks, which are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. The financial institutions have strong credit rating and management believes the credit risk related to the deposits is minimal.

The Association grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of whom are local residents and are insured under third-party payer agreements. At December 31, 2012, Medicare represented 55% of gross accounts receivable. No other individual payer source exceeded 10% of the gross accounts receivable balance.

NOTE 15 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Beginning 2008, Advantage became a one-half interest member in Home Staff, LLC, a limited liability company organized in Massachusetts to provide private duty home health aide services.

NOTE 16 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS (CONTINUED)

For the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, Network and Hospice purchased home health aide services from Home Staff, LLC, in the amount of \$735,397 and \$496,199, respectively.

Management provided management and administrative services to Home Staff, LLC, in the amount of \$39,691 and \$50,586 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011.

At December 31, 2012 and 2011 the total net balance due (to) and due from amounted to \$37,123 and (\$9,478), respectively.

NOTE 17 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

On February 1, 2013 Atrius Health, Inc., a Massachusetts nonprofit, tax-exempt corporation, became the sole member of Foundation.

In November 2012, the Foundation signed a non-binding letter of intent with the Visiting Nurse Association of Boston Foundation, Inc to explore potential affiliation. The Foundation began due diligence procedures in December 2012 that continued in 2013. No agreement has been signed as of April, 24, 2013.

For financial reporting purposes, subsequent events have been evaluated by management through April 24, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issue.
