## 1. Organization

Hudson Valley Hospital Center ("HVHC") is an acute care hospital providing healthcare services to residents of Westchester and Putnam Counties in the State of New York. The Hospital is organized under the not-for-profit corporation law of the State of New York and is exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code

The sole member of HVHC is Westchester Putnam Health Management Systems, Inc. ("Health Management"), a State of New York not-for-profit organization, which is also exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In March 2010, HVHC became the sole corporate member of the Foundation of Hudson Valley Hospital Center (the "Foundation"), a not-for-profit organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Health Management is the sole stockholder of Hudson Valley Ventures, Inc., A.C. Ventures, Inc., and KNOWA Ventures, Inc., New York for-profit corporations, and GI Ventures, Inc., which is a New York non-for-profit corporation

On November 10, 1997, Health Management, Riverside Healthcare System, Inc. and Sound Shore Health System, Inc. entered into a healthcare alliance. As a result, Pinnacle Healthcare, Inc. ("Pinnacle") was formed for the charitable purpose of benefiting and supporting the healthcare alliance. Pinnacle was incorporated under Section 102(a)(5) of the State of New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law and is the sole member of each of the three healthcare systems. As of December 31, 2007, Riverside Healthcare System, Inc. was no longer part of Pinnacle. Health Management divested its entire interest in Pinnacle effective August, 2011. The return of capital contribution was not material to the consolidated financial statements.

HVHC prepares consolidated financial statements to include the financial position and results of operations of the Foundation, as HVHC is the sole corporate member of the Foundation (collectively, the "Hospital") The financial statements of the other affiliated organizations are not included in the Hospital's consolidated financial statements

## 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

## **Principles of Consolidation**

The consolidated financial statements of the Hospital include the accounts of the Foundation and have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America on the accrual basis of accounting All significant intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated in consolidation

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. The most significant estimates relate to reserves for contractual allowances, bad debt and settlements with third party payors. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

#### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and highly liquid short-term investments with original maturity dates of three months or less from date of acquisition, which are not included in assets whose use is limited or investments

At December 31, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital had cash balances in a financial institution that exceeded federal depository insurance limits Management believes that the credit risk related to these deposits is minimal

#### **Inventories**

The Hospital values its inventories, included in supplies and prepaid expenses, at the lower of cost or market using the FIFO (first-in, first-out) method

#### **Investments**

The long term focus of the Hospital's investment portfolio is to support the Hospital's mission by providing a reliable source of funds for current and future use. All investments reported in the consolidated balance sheets are considered trading securities.

Equity securities and debt securities are carried at market value based on the last reported sales price at the end of the fiscal year. Fixed income securities are valued by the investment managers using pricing services from financial institutions.

Income from these investments, realized gains and losses, unrealized appreciation and depreciation and dividends on security transactions are included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by the donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses are determined by comparison of specific costs of acquisition to market values at the last day of the fiscal year.

Purchases and sales of securities are reflected on a trade-date basis Realized gains and losses on sales of securities are determined on an average-cost basis Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date and interest income is recorded as earned on an accrual basis

## **Assets Whose Use is Limited**

Assets whose use is limited ("AWUIL") primarily includes funds externally restricted under bond indenture agreements for plant replacement

#### Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment, including certain revenue producing equipment purchases are carried at cost and those acquired by gifts and bequests are carried at appraised or fair market value established at date of contribution. Capitalized leases are recorded at present value at the inception of the leases. When assets are retired or otherwise disposed of, the cost and the related depreciation are removed from the accounts, and any gain or loss is reflected in current operations. Repairs and maintenance expenditures are expensed as incurred. The Hospital provides for depreciation of property, plant and equipment including revenue producing equipment, on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows.

Land improvements20 yearsBuildings30–40 yearsFixed and movable equipment3–15 years

## **Capitalized Interest**

Interest costs incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets are capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. These costs are amortized over the life of the related capital assets constructed.

## **Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets**

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity.

#### **Donor-Restricted Gifts**

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

### **Charity Care**

Effective January 1, 2007, the New York State Public Health Law required all hospitals to implement financial aid policies and procedures. The law also requires hospitals to develop a summary of its financial aid policies and procedures that must be made publically available. All standards set forth in the law are minimum standards.

The Hospital provides a significant amount of partially or totally uncompensated patient care to patients who are unable to compensate the Hospital for their treatment either through third-party coverage or their own resources. Patients who meet certain criteria under the Hospital's charity care policy are provided care without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because charity care amounts are not expected to be paid, they are not reported as revenue. The amount of charges foregone for total uncompensated care (includes uncompensated care reported as bad debt expense), based on established rates provided under the Hospital's policy for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011 was approximately \$15.6 million and \$13.9 million, respectively. Of the Hospital's \$155.5 million and \$13.6.0 million of total expenses reported in 2012 and 2011, respectively, an estimated \$4.7 million and \$4.1 million is attributable to providing services to charity patients. The estimated costs of providing charity services is based on a calculation which applies a ratio of costs to charges to the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients. The ratio of costs to charges is calculated based on the Hospital's total expenses divided by gross patient service revenues.

#### **Performance Indicator**

The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses as the performance indicator. During fiscal 2012 and 2011, there was approximately \$0.9 million and \$1.2 million, respectively, in changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, related to net assets released from restriction for capital

The Hospital differentiates its operating activities through the use of operating income before other nonoperating income as an intermediate measure of operations. For the purposes of display, investment income, which management does not consider to be components of the Hospital's operating activities as well as grant and contribution revenue for capital, EHR incentive revenue, gain on sale of capital, gain on the refinancing of debt are excluded from the operating income and reported as nonoperating revenues in the consolidated statements of operations.

#### Reclassification

Certain amounts in the 2011 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation

## **Recent Accounting Pronouncements**

In July 2011, the FASB issued ASU 2011-07, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Services Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities—ASU 2011-07 includes amendments to FASB's ASC Topic 954, Health Care Entities—The objective of the update is to provide financial statement users with greater transparency about a health care entity's net patient service revenue and the related allowance for doubtful accounts—The amendments require health care entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time services are rendered, even though they do not immediately assess the patients' ability to pay, to present the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) on their statement of operations—The guidance is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2011—The Hospital adopted this new guidance in fiscal 2012

#### Restatement of the 2011 Consolidated Financial Statements

The Hospital has restated the 2011 consolidated financial statements to correct the accounting in the following two areas

The Hospital increased its liabilities for and receivables related to Insurance, in accordance with Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries This standard prohibits offsetting of conditional or unconditional liabilities with anticipated insurance recoveries from third parties

In addition, the Hospital corrected the presentation of loans provided to physicians in the consolidated Statement of Cash Flows

## **Subsequent Events**

The Hospital performed an evaluation of subsequent event through April 30, 2013, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were issued. The Hospital has determined that all events or transactions, including estimates, required to be recognized in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, are included in the consolidated financial statements.

## 3. Net Patient Service Revenue, Accounts Receivable and Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates (i.e., gross charges). Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments.

Billings relating to services rendered are recorded as net patient service revenues and patient accounts receivable in the period in which the service is performed, net of contractual and other allowances which represent differences between gross charges and the estimated receipts under such programs. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payers. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

The process for estimating the ultimate collection of receivables involves significant assumptions and judgments. The Hospital has implemented a monthly standardized approach to estimate and review the collectibility of receivables based on the payer classification and the period the receivable have been outstanding. Past due balances over 90 days from date of billing and over a specified amount are considered delinquent and are reviewed individually for collectibility. Account balances are written off against the allowance when management feels it is probable the receivable will not be recovered. Historical collection and payer reimbursement experience is an integral part of the estimation process related to reserves for doubtful accounts. In addition, the Hospital assesses the current state of its billing functions in order to identify any known collection or reimbursement issues in order to assess the impact, if any, on reserve estimates, which involves judgment. The Hospital believes that the collectibility of its receivables is directly linked to the quality of its billing processes, most notably those related to obtaining the correct information in order to bill effectively for the services provided. Revisions in reserve for doubtful accounts estimates are recorded as an adjustment to provision for bad debts.

A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payers follows

- Medicare Payments Inpatient acute care services and outpatient services rendered to
  Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary
  according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other
  factors
- Non-Medicare Payments The New York Health Care Reform Act of 1996, as updated, governs payments to hospitals in New York State Under this system, hospitals and all non-Medicare payers, except Medicaid, workers' compensation and no-fault insurance programs, negotiate hospital's payment rates If negotiated rates are not established, payers are billed at hospitals established charges Medicaid, workers' compensation and no-fault payers pay hospital rates promulgated by the New York State Department of Health on a prospective

basis Adjustments to current and prior years' rates for these payers will continue to be made in the future

There are also various other proposals at the federal and state level that could, among other things, reduce payment rates. The ultimate outcome of these proposals, regulatory changes, and other market conditions cannot presently be determined.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 38 percent and 39 percent and 6 percent, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient service revenue for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively

On February 19, 2004, the Secretary of Health and Human Services confirmed that hospitals can provide discounts for uninsured patients, which allowed the Hospital to implement a discount policy in accordance with state law. The Hospital's goal was to create a financial aid program that is consistent with the mission, values, and capacity of the Hospital, while considering an individual's ability to contribute to his or her care. The Hospital has a discount policy and provides discounts to uninsured patients. Under this policy, the discount offered to uninsured patients is reflected as a reduction to net patient service revenue at the time the uninsured billings are recorded.

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely) For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts The Hospital has not changed its charity care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal year

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third party payors and others for services rendered and includes estimated retroactive revenue adjustments due to future audits, reviews and investigations. Federal and state regulations provide for certain retrospective adjustments to current and prior years' payment rates based on industry-wide and hospital-specific data. The Hospital has estimated the potential impact of such retrospective adjustments based on information presently available and adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the services are rendered and are adjusted in future periods as additional information becomes available or final settlements are determined. The 2012 and 2011 net patient service revenue increased by approximately \$4.1 million and \$0.2 million, respectively, due to the net result of changes in third party allowances previously estimated. The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited and finalized by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through December 31, 2008.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Noncompliance with such laws and regulations could result in fines, penalties, and exclusion from such programs. The Hospital is not aware of any allegations of noncompliance that could have a material adverse effect on the consolidated financial statements and believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

The Hospital grants credit without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of gross receivables from patients and third-party payors at December 31, 2012 and 2011, was as follows

#### 4. Investments and Assets Whose Use is Limited

Fair Value Accounting establishes a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles and enhances disclosures about fair value measurements. Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Fair value requires an organization to determine the unit of account, the mechanism of hypothetical transfer, and the appropriate markets for the asset or liability being measured.

The guidance establishes a hierarchy of valuation inputs based on the extent to which the inputs are observable in the marketplace. Observable inputs reflect market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity and unobservable inputs reflect the entities own assumptions about how market participants would value an asset or liability based on the best information available. Valuation techniques used to measure fair value must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The standard describes a fair value hierarchy based on three levels of inputs, of which the first two are considered observable and the last unobservable, that may be used to measure fair value.

The following describes the hierarchy of inputs used to measure fair value and the primary valuation methodologies used by the Hospital for financial instruments measured at fair value on a recurring basis. The three levels of inputs are as follows

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Inputs other than Level 1 that are observable, either directly or indirectly, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the same term of the assets or liabilities

Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are based on one or more of three valuation techniques. The three valuation techniques are as follows

- Market approach Prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets or liabilities,
- Cost approach Amount that would be required to replace the service capacity of an asset (i.e. replacement cost), and
- Income approach Techniques to convert future amounts to a single present amount based on market expectations (including present value techniques, option-pricing models, and lattice models)

A financial instrument's categorization within the valuation hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Inputs are used in applying the various valuation techniques and broadly refer to the assumptions the market participants use to make valuation decisions. Inputs may include price information, credit data, liquidity statistics and other factors.

Mutual funds and money market funds - Fair value estimates for mutual funds and money market funds are based on market data for the same or comparable instruments and transactions in establishing the prices and/or do not trade on a regular basis in active markets (Level 2)

There are no investments with unobservable inputs that cannot be corroborated by observable market data and therefore classified as Level 3

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Hospital believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different estimate of fair value at the reporting date

#### 5. Promises to Give

The Hospital's unconditional promises to give received by the Foundation included in pledges receivable at December 31, 2012 and 2011 were \$4.0 million and \$3.7 million, before allowance for doubtful accounts, respectively. The Foundation determined that allowance for doubtful accounts of \$1.7 million and \$1.4 million were necessary at December 31, 2012 and 2011.

Additionally, the Foundation receives contributions under deferred giving arrangements whereby donors are guaranteed an investment return on the contribution during the donors' lifetime or a specified number of years. The Foundation recognizes the fair market value of its share of the gifts received.

Assets acquired through capital leases are included with property, plant and equipment at December 31, 2012 and 2011. The related amortization expense is included in depreciation and amortization expense in the consolidated statements of operations. ## 7. Physician Loan Receivable

Included in other assets is a net loan receivable recorded by the Hospital due from Westchester Medical Practice, P C ("WMP") in the amount of \$9.4 million and \$7.6 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. This receivable is related to a line of credit agreement established on January 1, 2007 whereby \$12.0 million can be drawn down by WMP over 6 years and starting in 2013 principal and interest are to be paid to the Hospital in accordance with the agreement. The Hospital has included a reserve of \$1.0 million against the gross amounts outstanding as of December 31, 2012 and 2011.

## 8. Capital Lease Obligations

The Hospital capitalized certain lease agreements which are accounted for in accordance with capital lease guidance. The Hospital's capital lease obligations are collateralized by the underlying equipment and bear interest at rates between 1.73% to 6.47%

- a In October 1993, the Hospital entered into a mortgage note with the New York State Medical Care Facilities Finance Corporation (MCFFA) to borrow \$22.7 million. The mortgage note is insured by the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) pursuant to Section 242 of the National Housing Act and is secured by substantially all of the property, buildings, equipment and gross receipts of the Hospital. The proceeds of the mortgage were used to finance an expansion and renovation project at the Hospital. MCFFA was succeeded by the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York (DASNY). The mortgage note called for monthly payments of principal and interest at 6.35% and was scheduled to mature in November 2020. On August 6, 2007, the mortgage note was modified to reduce the interest rate to 5.375% and shorten the maturity to October 1, 2019. On August 1, 2011, this mortgage was refinanced at a reduced fixed interest rate of 2.6% with the same October 1, 2019 maturity date. The mortgage note was assigned from DASNY to Prudential Huntoon Paige Associates, LTD. As a result of the refinance, the Hospital recognized a gain of approximately \$2.3 million in the consolidated statement of operations for the year ended December 31, 2011.
- b In October 2007, the Hospital entered into a supplemental mortgage note with the DASNY to borrow up to \$71.7 million. The supplemental mortgage note is insured by the FHA under Section 241 of the National Housing Act. The proceeds of the mortgage loan were used to develop, construct and equip a new patient tower at the Hospital's campus. The supplemental loan, which was advanced for construction as the project progressed, is a second mortgage to the Section 242 loan described above and is subject to the financial covenants.

The supplemental mortgage note called for payments of interest only, at the rate of 6 2% through February 28, 2010 Commencing March 1, 2010 the interest rate was reduced to 5 0% and the note calls for monthly payments of principal and interest in the amount of \$0 4 million through March 1, 2035 During 2011, the Hospital received an advance of \$1 0 million, to complete the renovation project

Pursuant to the mortgage notes and related documents, the Hospital is, among other things, required to maintain specific financial ratios, maintain a Mortgage Reserve Fund and obtain approval from FHA and DASNY to incur additional indebtedness if certain profitability and liquidity covenants are not met. The measures of financial performance include current ratio, debt service coverage, days in accounts payable, days in accounts receivable and days cash on hand. At December 31, 2012 and 2011, the Hospital was in compliance with these covenants.

#### **Line of Credit**

The Hospital has a \$1 0 million line of credit with Wells Fargo Bank available for general operating purposes. The Hospital did not borrow against the line of credit during 2012 and 2011.

## 10. Commitments and Contingencies

The Hospital is involved in litigation arising in the course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Hospital's future financial position or results from operations

#### 11. Insurance

The Hospital maintains a commercial claims-made policy for its medical malpractice insurance. The policy does not represent a transfer of risk for claims and incidents incurred but not reported ("IBNR") to the insurance carrier. Therefore, the Hospital has recorded an undiscounted estimated malpractice liability related to IBNR of approximately \$2.4 million and \$2.1 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively

The Hospital is insured for workers compensation claims on an occurrence basis through Pennsylvania Manufacturers Association

Total amounts accrued under medical malpractice and workers' compensation insurance programs as long-term liabilities approximate \$12.3 million and \$11.7 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011. Amounts recognized as insurance receivables related to the claims approximate \$9.3 million and \$9.6 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011 and are included in insurance receivables in the consolidated balance sheets. Insurance recoveries are measured on the same basis as the liability subject to the need for valuation allowance for uncollectible amounts.

## 12. Pension Plan

The Hospital provides pension coverage for its eligible employees through a defined contribution pension plan (the "Plan") Under the Plan, the Hospital contributes 4% to 5 5% of each eligible employee's annual compensation for each Plan year. The Hospital recorded pension expense of \$3 1 million and \$2 9 million in 2012 and 2011, respectively

#### 13. Functional Expenses

HVHC provides general health care services to residents within its geographic location, including general acute care with a full range of inpatient and outpatient services. Expenses related to providing these services for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011 are as follows

## 14. Related Party Transactions

#### Hudson Valley Ventures, Inc.

Hudson Valley Ventures, Inc. ("Ventures") is a for-profit corporation incorporated in 1991. Ventures subleases office building space to the Hospital. For the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, rental payments aggregated \$29,823 and common charges aggregated \$41,525 in 2012 and \$37,350 in 2011.

As of December 31, 2012 and 2011, Ventures owed the Hospital \$2.8 million and \$1.8 million, respectively. These amounts represent various expenses incurred by the Hospital on behalf of Ventures, and are included in other long-term assets in the consolidated balance sheets.

#### A.C. Ventures. Inc.

A C Ventures, Inc ("A C") is a for-profit corporation incorporated in 1994. The corporation was formed to purchase and lease office space to various physicians in Cold Spring, New York and Putnam Valley, New York

A C subleases office building space to the Hospital For the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, rental payments aggregated \$0.2 million

As of December 31, 2012 and 2011, A C owed the Hospital \$1.1 million and \$1.0 million, respectively. These amounts represent various expenses incurred by the Hospital on behalf of A C, and are included in other long-term assets in the consolidated balance sheets.

## KNOWA Ventures, Inc.

KNOWA Ventures, Inc ("KNOWA") is a for-profit corporation incorporated in 1995. The corporation was formed to lease and sublease office space to various physicians in Yorktown, New

York During 1997 and 1996, the Hospital loaned KNOWA approximately \$1.1 million to pay for the lease rental and renovations to the office space

As of December 31, 2012 and 2011, KNOWA owed the Hospital \$0.7 million. These amounts represent various expenses incurred by the Hospital on behalf of KNOWA, and are included in other long-term assets in the consolidated balance sheets.

## Westchester Putnam Health Management Systems, Inc.

As of December 31, 2012 and 2011, Health Management owed the Hospital \$8 8 million and \$9 0 million, respectively The Hospital funded Health Management approximately \$9 0 million to build a parking garage on Health Management property. The project was completed in early 2011 Starting in 2011, the balance owed to the Hospital is reduced by rental expense the Hospital owes monthly to Health Management for the use of the garage. This along with various expenses incurred by the Hospital on behalf of Health Management is included in other long-term assets in the consolidated balance sheets.

#### GI Ventures, Inc.

GI Ventures, Inc (GI) is a not-for-profit corporation incorporated in 2011. This corporation was formed to have a 12% ownership interest in an Endoscopy Center called Hudson Valley Center. As of December 31, 2012, GI Ventures owed the Hospital \$72,029. These amounts represents GI Ventures' share of capital contributions to Hudson Valley Center.

The Hospital has established an allowance for uncollectible accounts associated with the related party receivables described above in the amount of approximately \$1.3 million and \$1.0 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011

The Foundation's principal activity is the solicitation, receipt, holding, investment and administration of gifts, contributions and grants primarily for the benefit and support of the Hospital and other not-for-profit entities affiliated with the Hospital

Temporarily restricted net assets are those funds whose use has been limited by donors to a specified time period and/or purpose. Temporarily restricted net assets are available for the funding of health care services and capital acquisitions. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be held in perpetuity and the income is expendable to support various health care services. Resources arising from the results of operations or assets set aside by the Board of Trustees are not considered to be donor restricted.

On September 17, 2010, New York State enacted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) UPMIFA governs management and spending of donor – restricted endowment funds and permanently restricted gifts UPMIFA allows organizations to appropriate funds for spending from underwater endowments provided it is deemed prudent under the organization's spending policies in the absence of specific donor directives Guidance issued in 2008 provides accounting guidance in terms of UPMIFA

New York's law also contains aspects which differ from the general law including specific written policy requirements and standards to ensure prudent spending, presumption of imprudence calculation and written notification for spending on underwater endowments to endowment donors. The adoption of this guidance did not have a material impact on the Hospital's consolidated financial statements.

Management of the Hospital have interpreted accounting pronouncements as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the donor restricted endowments funds, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Hospital classifies permanently restricted net assets as the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. The Hospital considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds.

- The duration and preservation of the fund
- The purposes of the Hospital and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- General economic conditions
- The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- Other resources of the Hospital
- The investment policies of the Hospital

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Hospital relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Hospital targets a diversified asset allocation of 25%-50% equity-based investments, 35% fixed income 15%-25% cash investments in accordance with the Hospital investment policy.

#### 16. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

#### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheet for cash and cash equivalents approximates its fair value

#### Investments

Fair values, which are the amounts reported in the consolidated balance sheets, are based on quoted market prices, if available, or estimated using quoted market prices for similar securities

#### **Assets Whose Use is Limited**

These assets consist primarily of cash, long-term investments, and interest receivable. The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheets approximately is its fair value.

## **Accounts Payable and Accrued Expenses**

The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheets for accounts payable and accrued expenses approximates its fair value

## **Estimated Third-Party Payor Settlements**

The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheets for estimated third-party payor settlements approximates its fair value

#### **Long-Term Debt**

Fair value of the Hospital's FHA insured mortgage notes are based on current traded value, which approximates \$83.0 million and \$83.6 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The carrying value of the Hospital's FHA debt are \$76.7 million and \$79.6 million at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The fair value of the Hospital's remaining debt approximates its carrying value.
