## Introduction

2012 has been a watershed year for the American Security Project, as our web presence has exploded and our media exposure followed suit. With over 100,000 "hits" on our website, we are now in demand by all the major news outlets and are followed closely and supported by our corporate members, university partners, foundations and our individual contributors.

ASP is in demand because our country has begun to recognize that bitter, partisan debate on a number of issues has added little to our national defense, and in fact may have weakened it.

Our consistent messages on climate change and American competitiveness are but two examples of our work, and have garnered considerable mention on the Hill, on cable networks (i.e. CNN, The Weather Channel), and in the press. ASP has but one aim – to educate in order to improve our national defense. And we have made great strides towards this aim in 2012.

ASP has a modest staff and budget and operates very frugally. We use facts to educate and will take on issues from a non-partisan perspective, hence our board of Republicans, Democrats, businessmen and women, and retired military. In this era of constrained budgets, ASP has indeed managed to do more with tight resources, as is shown in this report.

## **Energy and Climate Security**

#### **Energy Policy**

In March, ASP published an updated version of its "American Energy Choices" white paper, which outlines the energy options for the U.S. to power its economy. The report details the benefits and drawbacks of different sources of energy, using three categories: energy security, economic security, and environmental security.

The world wide respone to the CSR resulted in an invite to our CEO BGen Cheney to be a panelist with Vice President Al Gore for three hours of hiis worldwide telecast "Climate Reality Report" in November. The Weather Channel picked up the report as well and featured Gen Cheney on one of its morning shows following Hurricane Sandy."

In April, as gasoline prices spiked, ASP released a report on the causes and effects of rising gasoline prices. The paper dispelled the myth that America can drill its way to energy security, concluding that the only way to reduce vulnerability to fossil fuels is to use less of them.

Throughout 2012, ASP expanded its work on the role of biofuels in mitigating risk for the U.S. military. This included a series of blog posts, a fact sheet, and an event on Capitol Hill featuring CEO BGen Stephen Cheney, USMC (Ret.), as well as other retired military.

In early October, ASP released a report on nuclear power, highlighting the opportunity that exists for small modular reactors (SMRs). The report detailed several advantages that smaller reactors could have over conventional ones – advantages in cost, flexibility and safety. We emphasized the need for a path forward for nuclear power, both in terms of American competitiveness and for addressing climate change.

At the end of October, ASP published a paper on "Critical Energy Choices for the Next Administration." ASP released the report on the eve of the Presidential election, and it outlined some of the opportunities that the next administration should pursue.

Recommendations included balancing America's fossil fuel abundance while pursuing a faster transition to cleaner sources of energy, steps to address climate change, avoiding geopolitical pitfalls in the Middle East, and investing in next-generation energy.

#### Climate Change

Over the summer, ASP's Energy and Climate team delved deeper into the issues of the Arctic, which is rapidly becoming more important for national security. ASP published a fact sheet on climate change and energy in the Arctic, and a "Perspectives" piece on offshore oil drilling.

In November, ASP published the "Climate Security Report," a three-part publication connecting climate change to national security, co-authored by Catherine Foley and Andrew Holland. The report

linked climate change to emerging threats around the world and to homeland security. This report was the culmination of research and writing that began in June, and it was released the same week as Hurricane Sandy, thus receiving heightened attention – particularly on our perspective for domestic security and climate change.

ASP also published several fact sheets derived from key findings in the "Climate Security Report." One entitled, "Climate Change, The Arab Spring and Food Prices," describes the link between disrupted food production from drought and the connection to instability in the Middle East. A second fact sheet, "Military Basing and Climate Change," describes the five most vulnerable U.S. military installations around the world to climate change.

### **American Competitiveness**

2012 saw the publication of key reports on our nations competitiveness. In November we launched a major White paper detailing the issues that encompasses competitiveness, and highlight key steps that the United States needs to make. The report: American Competitiveness: an issues of national security, was launched with ASP board members Gov. Christine Todd Whitman, Mr. Raj Fernando and LtGen John Castellaw. The launch was also tied in with a series of op-eds, blog posts and appearances on Cable news channels such as CNN.

The year also saw the publication of reports highlighting the link between STEM and support for science with our national security. We have partnered with the American Geophysical Union on these issues, and in a number of events.

As part of this program of study, we have also produced a report, blog posts and op-eds in how we can strengthen our defense industrial base, while recognizing the budgetary and economic environment.

As summer ended, we hosted an event with US Chamber of Commerce CEO and President Mr Thomas Donoure, discussing the links between American competitiveness and national security – and the need to ratify the Law of the Sea Treaty. Our work on Law of the Sea also included a number of reports, events and blog posts throughout the year.

#### **Fusion Energy**

In February, ASP published a fact sheet on fusion energy, emphasizing its importance for long-term energy security. In June, ASP convened fusion scientists from around the country for a discussion on the next steps for commercializing Magnetic Fusion Energy. The speakers spoke about the progress that fusion science has made, obstacles that remain, and the pathway forward. The keynote speaker was ASP Board Member General Lester Lyles, USAF (Ret.).

ASP conducted research on the extensive footprint that the fusion industry has across America, and produced a map depicting the hundreds of businesses, universities and research institutions that constitute the fusion industry. ASP published the map in August and circulated it among congressional staffers on Capitol Hill.

In September, ASP published a fact sheet on the National Ignition Facility (NIF), a world-class laboratory in California that researches Inertial Confinement Fusion. The NIF is making extraordinary progress on fusion energy research, using the world's largest lasers.

### **Nuclear Security**

SP has expanded its nuclear program with a steady series of events, op-eds, fact sheets and blog posts. ASP's nonpartisan nuclear team is now an established part of the Washington D.C. think tank scene.

At the end of 2012 ASP hosted former Undersecretary of State for Arms Control and International Security Ellen Tauscher who will speak to a large audience on missile defense and relations with Russia.

The nuclear security team has been very busy following the Iran talks, missile defense and nuclear issues related to the National Defense Authorization Act, the defense budget, nuclear policy, and preparing for next year's issues which may include more reductions in the U.S. nuclear force.

ASP produced an extensive side-by-side comparison of the Senate and House Defense Authorization bills, and papers ranging from Iran, the nuclear budget, and missile defense. ASP produced several op-eds by ASP Consensus members, including former flag officers Kerrick, Adams, and Cheney. These publications have been very well received in Washington.

ASP's nuclear team continues to amplify our work through extensive social media engagement. The Nuclear Security Twitter feed now has has over 1,400 followers. Our weekly roundup of top nuclear news stories has become a useful resource for experts as well as a general audience. Regular blog posts on Iran, North Korea, and other critical nuclear issues contributed to the growth of ASP's website.

ASP will continue to build on this work in 2013. Planned papers include an overview of missile defense, the U.S. nuclear triad, and an update on Iran sanctions. ASP's nuclear team will continue to work with ASP's affiliated national security experts and military leaders to host events and write op-eds on Iran, nuclear budget, and other nuclear security issues that will be highly relevant in the coming year.

### **Asymmetric Operations and Terrorism**

In 2012, ASP continued its groundbreaking policy research into the global struggle with terrorism, the drawing down of the war in Afghanistan, and how we can understand new asymmetric challenges. ASP wrote several widely-cited reports tracking metrics in the war in Afghanistan and drawing lessons for policymakers, analyzing the strategic frameworks of employing lethal drone strikes, and understanding the critical national security challenges we'll face over the next four years.

ASP continued its tradition of publishing essay collections featuring contributions from innovative defense and foreign policy thinkers. The two collections, focused on the war on terrorism in the aftermath of Osama bin Laden's death and the new critical challenges facing our national security, were widely praised as well-written and insightful.

ASP staff traveled extensively in 2012, giving talks about our core subject areas to a diverse audience. In January, ASP staff presented research into the war in Afghanistan at an event at the Center for National Policy. In March, ASP staff traveled to the Command General Staff College in Ft. Leavenworth, KS, to teach a series of seminars for Majors about how to plan for the political and economic challenges of post-conflict stability operations. That same month, ASP staff also traveled to the Center for International Policy Studies at the University of Ottawa, to discuss the strategic challenges of humanitarian interventions.

In April, ASP staff traveled to Bratislava, Slovakia, to participate in the Bratislava Global Security Forum and present on a panel about humanitarian interventions. In May, ASP staff hosted Senators Jean Shaheen (D-NH) and Dick Durbin (D-IL) at the Chicago NATO Summit for a discussion about the Senate's role in foreign policymaking. That same month, ASP staff also gave a talk at the Muslim Public Affairs Council on the foreign policy benefits of Trans-Atlantic relations between American and European Muslims.

ASP staff also presented our research into drones at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York in November, and on the future of U.S. military engagement in Afghanistan at the George Washington Elliott School in December. ASP staff also hosted a discussion about the future of Afghan-Pakistani relations with Ahmed Rashid and Liam Fox at the Halifax International Security Forum in November.

In 2012, ASP dramatically increased its presence in the media. Our Asymmetric Operations research was mentioned 37 times in major media outlets, to include Reuters, PBS, U.S. News and World Report, the New York Times, the Guardian, the Christian Science Monitor, the Washington Post, the Financial Times, and Bloomberg Government.

ASP staff was featured 14 times on TV and radio, totaling more than 300 minutes of air time. ASP staff also published more than 75 op-eds in a range of outlets, including The Atlantic, PBS Need to Know, Salon, CNN, Foreign Policy, and The Hill.

Lastly, ASP also engaged the Congressional staffs and policymakers more than ever. ASP staff had high-level engagements with senior officials at the Departments of State and Defense, and hosted routine discussions about ASP topics with senior professional staff of the House and Senate Armed Services Committees, as well as the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

### **Public Diplomacy and Strategic Communications**

This has been an exciting year for ASP's research in the fields of public diplomacy and strategic communications. Though this is the first year ASP has tackled these subjects in depth, we have established ourselves as a respected, valued, and strategically minded public diplomacy institution.

Believing that the way in which America communicates its message overseas has both immediate and long-term national security implications, to orient the public diplomacy discussion around how to accomplish national security objectives. As part of this, ASP has been raising questions about metrics and how to effectively measure the success of public diplomacy programs.

#### AMERICAN SECURITY PROJECT

ASP's work is certainly being noticed by important people in the "PD" community, and is receiving a great deal of attention from interested and relevant parties. In June, ASP held its first PD event featuring the State Department's Under Secretary for Public Diplomacy and Public Affairs, Tara Sonenshine. The announcement of this event was resoundingly hailed as a significant accomplishment and dramatically raised the profile of ASP. Staff from the Under Secretary's office is in regular contact with ASP, and we are one of the few organizations she follows on Twitter.

In August, ASP launched its first major publication on this topic: The New Public Diplomacy Imperative, a comprehensive exploration of the state of American public diplomacy and international strategic messaging. This report served not only as an initial statement on ASP's view of public diplomacy as a vital element of national security, but included case studies and practices intended to inform the public, policy makers, and practitioners on how to best strengthen America's message overseas.

The report was received exceedingly well by policymakers, academics, and practitioners alike, and has been described as a "must read." After reading the report, Under Secretary Sonenshine informed ASP that it was discussed by senior public diplomacy leadership and would be circulated to staff and posts overseas. The publication of the report also resulted in ASP staff's nomination and acceptance into the Public Diplomacy Council, one of the premier groups of prominent officials, practitioners and thinkers in the field. Additionally, ASP staff has spoken to a graduate level class at American University, where the report was made required reading.

ASP has also published several other materials, including fact sheets on USIA and the National Security Need for Public Diplomacy, which featured a collection of bipartisan quotes from contemporary and historical government figures. A perspective paper on the Fulbright Program looked into the national security implications of student exchange and the benefits it creates for America.

### ASP's University Partnership Program

SP has continued to expand its University Partnership Program. Future leaders at universities all across America need to be educated about a range of national security issues. ASP aims to promote informed debate about the appropriate use of national power in order to cultivate strategic responses to 21st century challenges.

### The Consensus for American Security

ounded in 2010, the Consensus is now made up of over sixty national security experts: Republicans, Democrats, retired senior officials, former cabinet members and ambassadors, cabinet members, as well as a cadre of retired military flag officers.

The Consensus works across all of ASP's policy issues, advising fellows as well as engaging with the wider community. ASP assists the Consensus in establishing and defining national security issues in a strategic non-partisan framework.

### ASP Social Media Engagement and ASP in the Media

A SP has continued to brief policy makers and promote our work in the public environment with all of the national security issues.

2012 saw a great expanded social media presence with the re-design of ASP's website, but also wide engagement over Twitter, Scridb, YouTube, Flikr, Facebook and Slideshare. We also ensure that our public events include a podcast of the audio and many are recoded for Youtube video.

During the year we have conduced a wide range of podcasts and video clips with our fellows and special guests, as well producing a high-rated series of PowerPoint slideshows on key topics.

2012 saw the first issues of American Security Quarterly. This quarterly magazine brought together some of the key writing of many ASP fellows, board

Our weekly newsletter has gained many followers this year, distributed to over 3000 individuals. We also produce a daily In Case You Missed It – a collection of key national security news stories of the day, which is added to our blog and emailed out to those that sign up via our website. Using the document site Scribd, we


have produced a series of Need to Know collections, bringing together our factsheets on our issues, and one on national security in general.




