This program operates in different ways for effectiveness

- Care Paks™. This program ships individual boxes to individual soldiers, and also larger boxes to entire units for distribution to unit members.
- Larger In-Kind Donations. This program is a larger version of the Care Pak program. Companies donate larger quantities of goods to us when they find us through the website, word of mouth, news, or the license plates. Goods are shipped via 40' cargo containers or other innovative means.
- Postage. We often provide postage to ship goods others have gathered.
- The partial number of persons served in 2012 exceeded \$1,395,612
- The number of domestic and overseas locations served exceeded 21,000

The Care Share Program, is a sub-program that provides stock to a great many troop-support groups for their care packages. In the Care Goods Program, SOT solicits, receives, inspects, and ships personal care items which have been specifically requested by the troops. A list of appropriate items is maintained on SupportOurTroops.Org. People across America send these things to us. This program enables us to tangibly show the troops they are thought of daily by us back here, and give them a little touch of

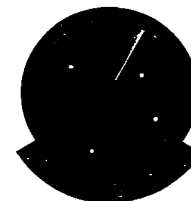

This service program is a consolidated, editable, searchable list of all charities and organizations doing anything benefitting the active duty troops or their families. Hundreds are listed. The activity serves all troop-related charities, groups and organizations, which the public wants to find and access. It therefore ultimately serves and benefits the troops themselves. People have a difficult time finding out how to help, where to help, and who is doing what. People need a known avenue through which to connect to such groups. This service program is operated through the SupportOurTroops.Org website because that is the only means of delivery by which everyone, everywhere, can get at the information instantly in a trustworthy manner when they want to do something.

Most states print the official SupportOurTroops.org website address on the *Support Our Troops!* license plates. Participants in the Seal of Assurance™ program use it. It is thus widespread. This apex position is used to provide this badly needed and highly useful service to other troop-support groups and to the public. People can submit additional charities, organizations, or events which benefit the troops or their families. The listing is searchable by location, or particular service activity, and each listing includes complete contact information. People can link up and help each other. Groups can post things they need for packages. People who want to help assemble packages or otherwise do something can find places to do so.

This is not the mere dissemination of information. This is a service facilitating everyone wanting to help. It is an activity connecting up those who want to do something with the groups and charities through which they can do it

- The value of this program is not monetized, because the monetary and in-kind benefits it generates flow through the other organizations which are located through this index. The value of this service program generated for the troops and the families is extensive
- Thousands of people benefit from this program monthly, from all 50 states. The troops benefit from this program as a result of people being able to find charities, groups, and organizations through which they can act on their desire to do things for the troops.



- For example, on behalf of all of the troop-related groups across America which send care packages to the troops, SupportOurTroops.Org each Fall issues news releases to all radio stations, all television stations, all daily newspapers, and all weekly newspapers in America inviting people to use this easy program to send items to the troops. People simply go to SupportOurTroops.Org, click on the Christmas Box Icon, pick the group they want to send care box goods to, and send the goods directly to that troop-support group. The things the troops principally request are posted there. The care box rules are posted there. These press releases result in many radio and newspaper interviews and an increased amount of gift goods for the deployed troops via all troop-support groups by getting everyone connected up, the people, the troops, the message, and the groups.

5. -- THE SEAL OF ASSURANCE™ PROGRAM: facilitating more giving to all troop-support groups.

Confusion abounds and many people contact SOT for information about whether a group claiming to help the troops or their families is legitimate and actually provides the assistance they claim. People are uncertain as to which groups are real and therefore a great many people "almost give", but don't, because they are afraid of being duped. SOT® is the accrediting agency of the Seal of Assurance program which helps facilitate more giving to all groups. In this program, Support Our Troops® examines troop-related charities against a list of objective criteria and if they responsibly benefit the troops or their families, authorizes their use of the Seal of Assurance™. A second aspect of the Seal of Assurance™ program authorizes use of the mark on products which makers and sellers represent benefit the troops, after it is determined that an appropriate amount of the purchase price does in fact benefit the troops and their families.

The forum enables people in all 50 states to join for free and interact with other people who



agree the troops and their families deserve our moral and material support. People may join for free and set up their own webspace, pictures and downloads similar to YouTube™ and MySpace™. Users can add an event or additional group. SOT maintains the ability to access one of the largest media and news distribution services in America. We are able to send news items, press releases and other public relations items to particular editors, beats, programs, shows, sections, and the like at newspapers, magazines, radio, television, and internet. We use this to promote troop-related events and activities for other groups as well as SOT. It yields radio and TV interviews, and increased coverage regarding supporting America's troops and their families. SOT uses this service to promote the events and projects of other troop-support groups, as well as those of Support Our Troops®.

The Education Fund Program enhances the morale and welfare of troops and their family members. Morally, should the children of deployed troops be delayed in going to college while we who are they are protecting get our kids off to college on time? Various state and federal laws provide limited education benefits for children of deceased soldiers. But what about kids of living deployed soldiers? Spouses? Recent veterans? Existing educational benefit statutes do not provide college assistance for children of deployed National Guard members. Yet, military logistical support (communication, transportation, and the like) were moved down to the Guard level several decades ago. The result is that when the nation deploys for peacekeeping, disaster relief, peacekeeping or conflict, working moms and dads are deployed. They are paid much less than they were earning or making, sometimes about one-third. If our neighbor is deployed to look out us, we have a moral obligation to look out for them and their family members. This program is another part of properly doing so.

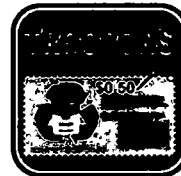

The Troopons® Program is a highly innovative program that enhances the well-being of military families stationed domestically and overseas by sending them clipped food, baby, and non-food manufacturer coupons to make their dollar go farther. Some save 70% off their foods bills now! Troopons® are what people can do with coupons they don't use -- even expired ones.

In 2012 SOT commissioned a survey of troops regarding the Troopons program. It was administrated by a qualified Ph.D. survey specialist to assure scientific validity The results demonstrate military families stationed around the world depend on Troopons to help make ends meet.

The typical Troopons user is a two-parent family with young children

- 95% of Troopons users are married
- 72% have young children
- 80% of the adults are in their 20s and 30s
- About 40% have annual household incomes under \$ 30,000.

The #1 reason families use Troopons is to save money.

- Over half said they use Troopons because they "need to save money."
- 20% said they use Troopons to "make ends meet."
- 10% said they are able to purchase items they could not afford otherwise.

Users of Troopons receive real financial assistance

- 60% said the savings from Troopons goes to paying other bills.
- 25% said the savings go to their child's education

Valuation Generally accepted accounting principles and tax law and diverge for the purposes of reporting the functioning of this program's service to our beneficiaries. No tax guidance from the Service exists on how to report these types of program for Form 990 purposes. People may be of different opinions as to how to properly report this unique program for Form 990 purposes. In such a situation the rule is that reporting is driven by the specific facts and circumstances, based on a reasonable approach having a rational basis. In this case, the specific facts and circumstances were investigated at length by reviewing the Form 990 and external audits prepared by other major charities reporting large dealings in rewards program points and frequent flyer miles -- a comparable donative item as discussed below. In capsule, the general practice in the charitable marketplace is to report the use these items at the value thereof as delivered to their beneficiaries at the point of transaction

The standard definition of "fair market value" is the price at which property would change hands between a willing buyer and a willing seller, neither being under compulsion to buy or sell, and both having reasonable knowledge of the relevant facts. Furthermore, the presumed market in which these hypothetical parties transact their business is the one in which the item is most commonly sold to the public (the term "public" normally referring to the retail customer who is the ultimate consumer). As a result, fair market value is generally determined in the market most commonly used by the ultimate consumer

Coupons are generally considered to have little to no fair market value. One reason is because the ultimate consumer typically acquires and redeems them in the same market in which there are few significant restrictions affecting access thereto and where the cost of acquisition can be as little as the price of the local newspaper (or free with online coupons). However, in this case the ultimate consumer's access to the redeemed coupons is severely limited – popular magazines and print publications are not readily available to military families in foreign countries, U.S. hometown newspapers are not delivered to their doorsteps on Sunday, and in order to protect against fraud most military commissaries will not accept online coupons. They are themselves non-profits operations and have no profit out of which to sustain losses to such fraud. Further, active-duty military families on domestic military bases with deployed family members most often do not have the ability to acquire the local newspaper, magazines or other such print publications. In other words, the market in which the ultimate consumer redeems the coupons is different than the market of acquisition. Therefore, fair market value in the instant case cannot be properly based upon the value in the more familiar market of acquisition.

Given the above facts, the valuation approach followed in the instant case is based on the methodology adopted by other major charities delivering the closest comparable items to those in the Troopons® program – frequent flyer miles, hotel reward nights and points, and credit card rewards prizes and points. The fact that in rewards programs the ultimate consumer market is generally the same as the market of acquisition (e.g. frequent flyer miles can be used by a donor or donee at any time and in any place to purchase airfare) does not detract from the fact these charities must still determine fair market value in the ultimate consumer market. Based on review and discussion with such charities, the most appropriate methodology is to base fair market value on the actual dollar benefit ultimately conferred upon the charitable beneficiary (e.g. the exact dollar amount of airfare credit given).

- Using this methodology, the fair market value of the Troopons redeemed in 2012 was \$10,489,934.
- The number of people benefitting from this program in 2012 exceeded 7,500
- Note: Assumptions had to be made in computing the number of persons served, even though based on the survey results. The mode or “most typical” answer is the proper measure of central tendency to report based on the survey results. The “most typical” answer (called the “mode”) is a measure of central tendency. The most typical survey response was that the typical family uses Troopons three times per month, and saves between \$26 and \$50 per month. Therefore, 38 savings times three visits times twelve months yields a divisor of 1,368, which divided into the total yields 7,668.

An alternative valuation methodology was also investigated based upon prices charged in the online marketplace for bundled coupons which would have yielded a \$1,573,490.12 value in 2012 (or approximately 15% of the coupon face amount). This methodology was rejected for several reasons. First, merchants and manufactures have recently indicated their position that the practice of bundling and selling coupons is in violation of their rights and therefore illegal which clearly establishes a floor for value for such items (as the value of goods are necessarily higher after prohibition due to the resulting scarcity) but does not provide a ceiling or a reasonable method for determining how much higher from the floor the value should be. Second, this "marketplace" comprises only .02% to 1% of the total clipped coupons used, if that even, and therefore the marketplace is actually the usage of the other 99%. Third, the buyer is typically responsible for shipping and handling when purchasing coupons through these online sites that charges for which fluctuate and vary. Fourth, tying value to shipping and handling charges would be to tie it to an arbitrary charge often used to cloak profit in the TV sales and online sales industries

Finally, considering that the total fair market value of the redeemed coupons are reflected in SOT's financial statements as both a revenue and expense item (i.e. there is no net overstatement whatever the value) it was concluded that the most useful and accurate information (in the form of the actual dollar value placed into charitable beneficiaries' hands) should be presented because that is the best criteria for the reader to determine the program's effectiveness.

Therefore the first methodology presented above was followed as it is the most reasonable approach having a rational basis is the foregoing, because those facts and circumstances best match to the facts and circumstances.

The Organization presents each of the above results to provide the reader with a full description of the program, the methods of valuation employed, and the results of identified valuation methodologies so that the reader may be fully informed for own purposes.

Actual Manner of Service and Benefit. This program activity affects human welfare, and provided actual services and benefits as follows.

Military stores on overseas bases accept manufacturer coupons from here, even ones expired up to six months. People send SOT coupons and SOT sends them to the base stores overseas for military families to use to reduce their grocery bills, especially when they are living in countries with



currency exchange rates off bases that are better than the dollar, meaning their pay does not go as far as it would at home. It's a fun easy way to make a difference in their lives.

"My husband went to the ACS today to pick up some coupons for us brought home your box. I was so touched when I opened it this was a lot more than I ever expected and way to much just to keep for ourselves. The Troopons® program was launched in 2010 and is a highly innovative program that enhances the well-being of overseas families by sending them food and non-food manufacturer coupons to make their hard-earned pay go further. This program relates to the type of food and nonfood coupons one may clip out of magazines or the newspaper. Here at home it's easy -- our papers arrive full of coupons. Overseas, for military families, it doesn't. And here at home military families don't always get the magazines and newspapers that provide coupons. So what can we do? Well, this is America. We can do anything! So everyone has pitched in by clipping and sending us envelopes and boxes full of food and nonfood coupons. We then sort them by expired and unexpired, bulk pack, and send them to military stores on bases in various countries overseas and within the U.S. Military stores on the overseas base where they shop accept manufacturer coupons from here - even expired up to six months. And commissaries on bases here at home of course accept unexpired coupons.

This reduces military families' grocery bills by up to seventy percent (70%) thereby freeing up some of their hard-earned pay for other necessities or niceties.

It's an easy way to make a difference in lives of overseas military families. *It costs participants nothing. Participants without a dime to spare can contribute hundreds of dollars to military families by clipping coupons. Absolutely amazing.*

The results of the 2012 Troopons Survey demonstrate users stretch their grocery budget.

- Over a third of families reported saving between \$26 and \$50 per month with Troopons
- 29% reported savings between \$51 and \$150 per month.
- Nearly 10% reported savings over \$150 per month

13 - THE FRAUD SENTRY PROGRAM: protecting troop-support groups and donors.

Program Beneficiaries: 1st Tier: members of the public desiring to help the troops; 2nd Tier: deployed troops and their families.

Program Actual Service/Benefit/Activity: prevention of troop-related fraud, and education of people on the finding of legitimate places in which they can help bolster the troops



Lowest are those who scam the troops, cheat off their backs, or interfere with good people who are trying to help them. SupportOurTroops Org operates the fraud sentry and remediation program to both try and prevent troop-related fraud, and to educate people in finding a legitimate place in which through they can bolster the troops. This helps ensure that the generosity of people who support America's troops is not abused.

This is a service program which SupportOurTroops Org operates to benefit the public and all groups working to benefit the troops. As we learn about current troop-related frauds we (a) post them on the program web page, (b) endeavor to shut them down, (c) post cautionary information on our fraud remediation web page to inform all involved, and (d) notify appropriate authorities and fraud prevention agencies to take enforcement action.

Internet dating website scam. This scam arose in late 2009. In this scam people pretend to be deployed troops or troops stationed in foreign countries. After establishing a relationship they eventually will ask for the advancement or transmittal of money in a number of ways based on a number of reasons.

The SupportUStroops.org "Volunteer Contract" Fraud. SOT became aware of this scam in August 2010 when we were contacted by several victims. We immediately took steps to take over the domain name being used to commit this fraud. We then arranged a redirect to point that domain to our fraud page in order to inform people about the scam and educate them on locating helpful ways that they can do things for the troops in a safe manner. In this fraud people were offered the opportunity to receive packages from certain types of donors and resend them forward to the troops in exchange for compensation and disclosure of large amounts of personal information. The fraud was posted on CareerBuilder.com. The perpetrators of this fraud were based in the Czech Republic.

- Thousands of people from all 50 states, and the troops worldwide, benefit from the protections of this program.



14. – OPERATION HONOR GUARD™ PROGRAM: assuring dignity, respect and gratitude during military funerals.

501c3 Categorization b, d

Program Period: 2011, 2012 forward

Program Geographic Locations: all 50 states.

Program Beneficiaries: 1st Tier: families of fallen soldiers; 2nd Tier: members of the public desiring to support the families of fallen soldiers and show respect to the fallen soldier

Program Actual Service/Benefit/Activity: protection of families of fallen soldiers during funeral services from interruption and further pain, while honoring the memory of the lost soldier.



Operation Honor Guard™ was been created by Support Our Troops® as a defensive measure to assure that the proper dignity, respect and gratitude are given to fallen American soldiers and their families during military funerals.

On March 2, 2011 the Supreme Court in *Snyder v Phelps, et al*, (2011), ruled that while “hate speech” is illegal in other contexts, the First Amendment protects the right of ne'er-do-wells to visibly and audibly protest in the face of family members at the funerals of their beloved sons and daughters who have recently died in military service to us and our country.

Thankfully, this freedom of speech also applies to those of wishing to politely and properly honor the life of these fallen soldiers and their families by delivering in positive manner the respect and gratitude due them during this time of bereavement and loss.

Therefore in honor of Marine Lance Corporal Matthew Snyder, and all those like him whose sacrifice has been so disrespected, and in support of the valiant battle that his parents fought on behalf of Matthew and his fellows, Support Our Troops® created Operation Honor Guard™.

Actual Manner of Service or Benefit.

In this program, SupportOurTroops.Org will arrange, and if need be fund the expenses of, local high school bands to line the roadside in full uniform, each member with a small American flag on their band hat, softly playing wonderful traditional American songs as the family arrives for the funeral, as well as during the proceedings and the departure. SupportOurTroops.Org will also arrange for the necessary permits and all necessary instructions for the band.

Just as these fallen soldiers have sacrificed to guard and protect us and our families, awesome American youths with the wisdom to appreciate that will stand in the gap to honor and guard the dignity of the funeral ceremony by protecting the family from interruption and pain, while honoring the memory of the lost soldier.

This is especially important due to the undesirables who, acting for their own personal gain, have shamelessly and selfishly sought to intrude upon a painfully private and tender moment meant only for family and friends



Operation Honor Guard™ insulates the family, to whom America owes so much for what they have given, from any undue and unwarranted negative distractions caused by unwelcome visitors. They don't need a confrontation. They don't need a circus. They need the positive support this program affords.

It assures that what these families mostly see, and in the background softly hear throughout the ceremony, are Americans who appreciate and respect them and their lost loved one.

Affectionately self-named "military brats," military youth experience childhood and teen pressure to the tenth power: PRIDE, SERVICE, COMMUNITY, DIVERSITY, SEPARATION, TRADITION, RECOGNITION, LOSS, TRANSITION, WORRY.

Operation Military BRAT® was created to address the unique pressures which military children experience at a much higher degree than do civilian youth. SOT is working with and developing programs that increase the well-being of military youth via summer camps and events, free soldiers' nights at local sporting events, better public awareness of their presence and needs, connection of civilian youth with them, and other activities bringing military kids together with their peers.

One of the main goals of Support Our Troops® is to shore up the barricades and help keep military families intact. Many of our efforts focus on military children and solo parents struggling to feed, clothe and educate them.

As a nation we ask a great deal of these young families as they defend us. It is our moral duty to back them up in return.

The statistics are staggering. Since 2001, over 2 million servicemembers have deployed to overseas combat assignments leaving behind over 3 million immediate family members, more than a third of which are children. Incredibly, 72 percent of these kids are school aged and half of them are under the age of eight.



Military families and military children are among the most mobile of populations. Further, because these families are Guard and Reserve, they are geographically dispersed throughout the country and often live too far from military bases and installations to access the available support services. Recent research shows that among other things, they confront amplified challenges to their emotional well-being and functioning.

Over seventy percent of military families currently live "outside the gate" and some distance from military installations. Therefore developing programs that serve military families in their own locales is important for effectiveness and SOT is therefore examining development of smartly-organized programs built on or incorporated into existing groups and structures.

Trustworthiness and dependability are paramount. SOT® was deliberately designed as a public purpose organization registered in all fifty states and the District, in order to subject it to oversight by 50 state regulators. SOT holds to a strict donor privacy policy. SOT holds to a strict beneficiary privacy policy. The Governance Interlink Program is growing and will be increasingly active in bolstering the troops and their families with direct local input and interaction. The issuance of each state *Support Our Troops!* license plate involves an examination of the organization by the state legislature or a state agency. The maintenance of these plates involves continued state-level examination and reporting. Because SOT handles state license plate revenue in some cases, and in some states is required to collect motor vehicle license plate revenue for the state and remit it to them, SOT is likely the most heavily monitored and safest troop-support charity in America.
