NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2012 AND 2011

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Nature of Activities -

The American Academy of Periodontology (the Academy) is a nonprofit organization organized under the laws of the State of Illinois. Its main purpose is to advance the art and science of periodontology and by its application, maintain and improve the health of the general public. It was founded as a society in 1914.

The financial statements were available to be issued on May 3, 2013, with subsequent events being evaluated through this date.

Basis of Accounting -

The financial statements are presented using the accrual method of accounting, in which revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred.

Basis of Presentation -

The Academy reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The following is a description of each class:

Unrestricted - Unrestricted net assets are net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily restricted - Temporarily restricted net assets include contributed net assets for which donor-imposed time and purpose restrictions have not been met and the ultimate purpose of the contribution is not permanently restricted. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Permanently restricted - Permanently restricted net assets include contributed net assets, which require by donor restriction that the corpus be invested in perpetuity and only the income be made available for program operations in accordance with donor restrictions.

Revenue Recognition -

Membership dues and journal subscriptions are amortized annually into revenue over the life of the membership and subscription, respectively. Initiation fees, advertising, annual meeting, and communications and conference workshop revenues are recognized when earned.

Contributions are recorded as revenue and other support in the period that the funds are pledged to the Academy. Contributions are reported as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of donor restrictions.

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES: (Continued)

Royalties and Other Corporate Support -

In 2012 and 2011, the Academy received corporate support primarily related to events associated with the annual membership meeting. This revenue is recognized in the statement of activities in the period of the related event. The Academy also receives royalties under certain publication and member service arrangements.

Cash and Cash Equivalents -

The Academy considers all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Credit Risk -

Financial instruments which potentially subject the Academy to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash. The Academy places its cash and deposits with high credit quality financial institutions, however, deposits may exceed the federally insured limits from time to time.

Accounts Receivable -

Accounts receivable are stated at the amount the Academy expects to collect from outstanding balances. Bad debts are charged to the statement of activities in the year which the amount is determined uncollectible. If the allowance method of accounting for uncollectible accounts was used, it would not have a material effect on the financial statements.

Investments -

All investments are carried at fair market value. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the statement of activities.

Inventory -

Inventory, which consists of the Academy's publications, is stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost determined by the moving average method. Shipping and handling costs are part of inventory cost.

Furniture and Equipment -

Furniture and equipment are recorded at cost or at fair market value, if donated. The Academy follows the practice of capitalizing all expenditures for furniture and equipment in excess of \$1,000. Depreciation of furniture and equipment is provided using the straight-line method over an estimated useful life of five years. Maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Gains or losses that are realized from the retirement or sale of furniture and equipment are included in the statement of activities. The accompanying statement of financial position does not include the cost or accumulated depreciation for assets that have been fully depreciated. Depreciation expense was \$70,151 and \$92,585 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES: (Continued)

Use of Estimates -

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Although estimates are considered to be fairly stated at the time that the estimates are made, actual results could differ.

Functional Allocation of Expenses -

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

(3) FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

The Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) for Fair Value Measurements establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1:

Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets.

Level 2:

Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from, or corroborated by, observable market data by correlation or other means.

(3) FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS: (Continued)

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3

Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2012 and 2011.

Mutual Funds. Valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held at year end.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Academy believes their valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

(4) EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT SAVINGS PLAN:

The Academy adopted a 401(k) retirement savings plan in December, 1996. Under the terms of the plan, the Academy contributes 5% of participant compensation and also matches participant compensation using a tiered structure that is based upon years of service. The Academy made contributions based upon these terms of \$298,003 and \$310,845 in 2012 and 2011, respectively.

(5) TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS:

The contributions to the Grace Rogers Spalding Journal Endowment Fund are restricted for the publication of special issues of the Journal of Periodontology. The assets of this fund are included in investments. Earnings and expenses are not required to be allocated to this fund.

(6) AMERICAN ACADEMY OF PERIODONTOLOGY FOUNDATION:

During 1990, the Academy established the American Academy of Periodontology Foundation (the Foundation) as a separate legal entity. The Academy's contributions to the Foundation have been reported with the liaison function in the accompanying financial statements. The due from Foundation receivable balances for 2012 and 2011 relates to expenses paid on behalf of the Foundation.

(7) INCOME TAXES:

The Academy has received a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service indicating that it is exempt from federal income taxes under the provision of the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(6); however, the Academy remains subject to the payment of income taxes on net earnings from unrelated business income. During 2012 and 2011, the Academy reported unrelated business income from advertising of approximately \$260,000 and \$460,000, respectively.

Income tax expense, as presented in the accompanying statement of activities, represents management's estimate of the unrelated business income tax to be incurred for the tax-reporting year. Actual information is not available until the various cost allocations are prepared and the income tax filings are complete.

The Academy files income tax returns in the U.S. federal jurisdiction and Illinois. With few exceptions, the Academy is no longer subject to U.S. federal, state and local, or non-U.S. income tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2009. The Academy does not expect a material net change in unrecognized tax benefits in the next twelve months.

(9) LEASE COMMITMENT:

In March, 2012, the Academy signed a lease extension; the extension does not expire until January 31, 2024. The Academy, in signing this lease agreement, is amortizing rental abatements over the term of the lease. The lease extension also provides for additional rental charges based upon increases in real estate taxes and operating expenses incurred by the lessor. Rent and building services expenses for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011 amounted to \$512,127 and \$436,384, respectively.

The lease includes scheduled increases in rental payments. The excess of rent expense recognized for financial statements and the cumulative effect of these differences is included in deferred rent.
