INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Trustees
The Herbert H. and Grace A. Dow Foundation
Midland, Michigan

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Herbert H. and Grace A. Dow Foundation (the "Foundation"), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2012 and 2011, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Foundation's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Herbert H. and Grace A. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AS OF AND FOR THE YEARS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2012 AND 2011

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Organization — The Herbert H. and Grace A. Dow Foundation and its division, the Dow Gardens (collectively, the "Foundation"), are under common management and are organized collectively as a private foundation. The Foundation's primary source of funding is from investment dividend, interest, and capital gain income. The Foundation awards grants to qualifying organizations within the state of Michigan to improve the educational, religious, economic, and cultural lives of Michigan residents. In addition, funds are used for operations of the Dow Gardens which are included in the accompanying financial statements. The Dow Gardens displays trees, shrubs, flowers, and horticulture exhibits designed for public enjoyment and education. Also, the Dow Gardens staff performs maintenance of the Foundation's land and buildings.

Basis of Financial Presentation — The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis and in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of Estimates — The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Net Asset Classification — Net assets and revenues, gains and losses are classified based on donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

- Unrestricted Resources over which the trustees have discretionary control.
- Temporarily Restricted Those resources subject to donor imposed restrictions which will be satisfied by actions of the Foundation or passage of time.
- Permanently Restricted Resources subject to donor imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation.

The Herbert H. and Grace A. Dow Foundation has no temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Revenue Recognition — Revenues are recognized when earned and when a benefit has been received. Contributions in kind made and received by the Foundation are recorded at market value as of the date of gift.

Cash and Cash Equivalents — Cash and cash equivalents include time deposits and readily marketable securities with original maturities of three months or less.

Investment Risk — Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities and the level of uncertainty related to changes in value of investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in values in the near term could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments — In the normal course of business, the Foundation invests in various financial assets and incurs various financial liabilities.

The carrying amounts reported in the statements of financial position for cash, other receivables, accrued interest and dividends, accounts payable and accrued expenses, and deferred federal excise taxes approximate fair value based on their short-term nature. The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instruments:

Investments at Fair Value — The carrying amount is stated at fair value, based on quoted market prices, where available. For securities not actively traded, fair values were estimated using values obtained from independent pricing services or quoted market prices of comparable instruments (see Note 2).

Investments in Private Equity Partnerships at Fair Value — The Foundation invests in certain alternative investments, primarily in the form of limited interests in private equity partnerships. Market values represent the Foundation's pro rata interest in the net assets of each limited partnership, based primarily on audited financial information supplied by the general partner. Realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments represent the difference between the original cost of investments and the sales proceeds (realized) or the fair market value at the end of the year (unrealized). Because of the inherent uncertainty of the valuation of private equity partnerships, the market values reflected in the accompanying financial statements may differ significantly from realizable values (see Note 2).

Grants Payable — The carrying amount represents the estimated fair value based on the present value of discounted cash flows (see Note 4).

Property and Equipment — Land, buildings, machinery, and equipment purchased are carried at cost, less accumulated depreciation. Donated property is stated at estimated fair value on the date of donation. Maintenance and repairs are charged to operating expenses as incurred. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated service lives of the respective assets. Fully depreciated assets are retained in property and depreciation accounts until they are removed from service.

Tax Status — The Foundation is an organization exempt from federal income taxation under Section 501(c)(3) and is a private foundation as described in Section 509(c) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"). The Foundation is subject to federal excise taxes. It is also subject to federal and state income taxes on its unrelated business taxable income.

Adoption of Accounting Pronouncements — In January 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2010-06, Improving Disclosures about Fair Value Measures. It required entities to disclose separately the amounts of significant transfers into and out of Level 1 and Level 2 fair value measurements along with the reasons for those transfers. In addition, it also required entities to present separately information about purchases, sales, issuances, and settlements on a gross basis rather than as one set number in the reconciliation for fair value measurements using significant unobservable inputs (Level 3). The update also clarified that entities should disclose the level of disaggregation for assets and liabilities measured at fair values based on the nature and risk of the investment. The ASU was effective for the Foundation beginning December 30, 2010, for the transfer disclosures and December 31, 2011, for showing purchases and sales, issuances,

and settlements gross in the reconciliation of the fair value measurements. The adoption of this guidance had no effect on the statements of financial position or statements of activities and changes in net assets, but resulted in additional disclosure presented in Note 8.

In May 2011, the FASB issued ASU No. 2011-04. This ASU is the result of joint efforts by the FASB and International Accounting Standards Board to develop a single, converged fair value framework, that is, converged guidance on how (not when) to measure fair value and on what disclosures to provide about fair value measurements. While the ASU is largely consistent with the existing fair value measurement principles in U.S. GAAP, it expands the existing disclosure requirements for fair value measurements and makes other amendments. Many of these amendments are being made to eliminate unnecessary wording difference between U.S. GAAP and International Financial Reporting Standards. The guidance was effective for the Foundation beginning January 1, 2012. The adoption of this guidance did not have any effect on the statements of financial position or statements of activities and changes in net assets, but resulted in additional disclosures presented in Note 8.

2. INVESTMENTS

Investments are used to provide income to fulfill awarded grants and operations of the Foundation. Investments at December 31, 2012 and 2011, include the following:

The Dow Chemical Company Common Stock — Published market quotations do not necessarily represent realizable values, particularly where sizable holdings of a company's stock exist, as in the case of the Foundation's holdings of The Dow Chemical Company common stock.

Mutual Funds, Bond Funds, and Other Equity Secur ities — Marketable securities are valued on the basis of quoted market prices at year-end. Investment income and expenses are reported on the accrual basis, and investment transactions are reported on a trade-date basis. Net realized gains (losses) and change in net unrealized market appreciation (depreciation) are determined by comparing cost to proceeds and fair market value, respectively. Cost is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Private Equity Partnerships (Alternative Investments) — Alternative investments primarily comprise limited interests in private equity partnerships. Management's estimates of fair values of alternative investments are based on information provided by the external investment and fund managers or the general partners. Management also obtains and considers the audited financial statements of these investments when evaluating the overall reasonableness of the recorded value. Alternative investments, which do not have readily determinable market values as of December 31 are valued based on the Foundation's pro rata share of the net assets of each limited partnership based primarily on the audited financial information provided by the investment manager or general partner. Underlying investments in these funds may include equities, fixed-income securities, commodities, currencies, and derivatives. Audited information is only available annually based on the partnership's or fund's year-end. Because of the inherent uncertainty of valuations, recorded amounts in the statements of financial position may

differ from the values that would have been reported, had a ready market existed. Included in the investment balance at December 31, 2012 and 2011, the Foundation had no unsettled trade purchases and no unsettled sales.

At December 31, 2012 and 2011, the Foundation had commitments to contribute approximately \$24,160,888 and \$10,193,884, respectively, in additional capital under the terms of various agreements covering alternative partnership investments over the next 10 years.

Investment Return — Investment return comprises dividends, interest, and realized and unrealized gains and losses. The components at December 31, 2012 and 2011, are as follows:

4. GRANTS PAYABLE

Grants that are pledged and to be paid in less than one year are recorded as current liabilities at their stated values. Grants that are pledged and to be paid after one year are recorded as long-term payables at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using the Foundation's incremental borrowing rates applicable to the years in which the contributions were pledged. The discount rate was 0% and 0.5% for 2012 and 2011, respectively.

5. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

On September 12, 2000, the Board of Trustees approved the establishment of Internal Revenue Code Section 401(k) plan for the Foundation's employees. The 401(k) plan replaced the Simplified Employee Pension Plan (SEP) on October 1, 2000. The 401(k) plan, consistent with the SEP, provides for an employer contribution of 6% of the employee's gross annual pay for all employees employed for more than one year. Contributions totaled approximately \$63,084 and \$62,357 for the 401(k) plan for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

6. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk consist of cash and cash equivalents and investment securities.

The Foundation places its temporary cash and money market accounts with creditworthy, high-quality financial institutions and investment companies. A significant portion of the funds exceed the maximum Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) limit or are not insured by the FDIC or related entity.

7. TAXES

The Foundation is exempt from income tax under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), but is subject to an excise tax of 1% to 2% of its net investment income, including realized gains, as defined by the Code. In addition, the Foundation is subject to unrelated business income taxes for certain rental properties.

The Foundation is required to make minimum distributions on an annual basis under Code 4942. The Foundation must distribute \$781,973 and \$501,266 by December 31, 2012 and 2011, to meet the payout requirement for 2012 and 2011, respectively. Failure to distribute the required amount would result in additional excise taxes.

8. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820-10 (formerly, FASB Statement No. 157) emphasizes that fair value is a market-based measurement, not an entity-specific measurement. Therefore, a fair value measurement should be determined based on the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. As a basis for considering market participant assumptions in fair value measurements, FASB ASC 820-10 establishes a fair value hierarchy that distinguishes between market participant assumptions based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity (observable inputs that are classified within Levels 1 and 2 of the hierarchy) and the reporting entity's own assumptions about market participant assumptions (unobservable inputs classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy). The fair value hierarchy is as follows:

Level I — Quoted (unadjusted) prices for identical assets in active markets

Level 2 — Other observable inputs, either directly or indirectly, including:

- · Quoted prices for similar assets in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets in nonactive markets (few transactions, limited information, noncurrent prices, high-variability over time, etc.)
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset (interest rates, yield curves, volatilities, default rates, etc.)
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by other observable market data

Level 3 — Unobservable inputs that cannot be corroborated by observable market data

In instances in which the inputs used to measure fair value fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy, the fair value measurement has been determined based on the lowest-level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. The Foundation's assessment of the significance of a particular item to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgment, including the consideration of inputs specific to the asset.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies the Foundation used for instruments measured at fair value, as well as the general classification of such instruments pursuant to the valuation hierarchy:

Level 1 securities include exchange-traded securities whose fair value is derived using quoted prices in active markets. In instances where quoted market prices are not readily available, the fair value is estimated using quoted market prices and/or other market data for the same or comparable instruments and transactions in establishing the prices, discounted cash flow models, and other pricing models. These models are primarily industry standard models that consider various assumptions, including time value and yield curve, as well as other relevant economic measures. The Foundation classifies these securities as Level 2 within the fair value hierarchy. In situations where there is little or no market activity for same or similar financial instruments, the Foundation estimates fair value using information provided by the external investment and fund managers or the general partners and classifies these assets as Level 3.
