Note 1 - Organization and Principles of Consolidation

Benefis Health System, Inc. (Benefis) was organized August 1, 2008, to help facilitate diversification of services. Benefis is organized as a Montana nonprofit organization and is operated in a manner that is fully consistent with federal tax exempt status, pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Benefis activity is included in the supplementary consolidating schedules in the Benefis Health System Administration columns.

In July 2008, Benefis Healthcare System amended its articles of incorporation and changed its name to Benefis Hospitals, Inc. Benefis Hospitals, Inc. (formerly known as Benefis Healthcare System) is a 507-bed facility consisting of a 349-bed acute care hospital; a 146-bed long-term care facility; and a 12-bed hospice located in Great Falls, Montana, which provides health care and other related services, including long-term care, cancer services, cardiac services, and women and children's services. Benefis' service area covers 44,814 square miles in north central Montana. Benefis Hospitals, Inc. is organized as a Montana nonprofit organization and is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and its sole member is Benefis.

Benefis Spectrum Medical, Inc. (formerly known as Spectrum Medical, Inc.) (Spectrum) provides home oxygen and home care services, rents and sells durable medical equipment, and sells medical supplies and pharmaceuticals. Spectrum also provides medical services for detention facilities, consulting, and transportation services. Spectrum was incorporated under the laws of Montana and is wholly owned by Benefis. As of January 1, 2007, Spectrum was reorganized as a nonprofit organization exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC and its sole member is Benefis.

Benefis Healthcare Employee Health Plan Trust (the Health Trust) provides health benefits for certain incurred medical and dental expenses of Benefis employees. It is subject to the provision of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended. The Health Trust is exempt for tax purposes under IRC Section 501(c)(9).

Great Falls Athletic Club, LLC, dba The Peak Health & Wellness Center (The Peak) operates a health club facility in Great Falls, Montana. The Peak is organized as a Montana limited liability company of which 51% is owned by Benefis. For tax purposes, any income or loss is passed through to Benefis.

Benefis Medical Group (formerly known as Benefis Physician Associates, Inc. and Benefis Healthcare Practitioners, Inc.) (BMG) is a professional services corporation that provides physician income security by facilitating employment of physicians and/or providing income guarantees. BMG also provides some administrative and business services to physicians in the Great Falls community who desire to outsource those services associated with their practices. The sole member of BMG is Benefis.

Benefis Sletten Hi-Line Cancer Center, LLC (BSHCC) provides radiation and chemotherapy treatment for cancer patients through an outpatient facility located in Havre, Montana. BSHCC is organized as a Montana single-member limited liability company whose sole member owner is Benefis. For tax purposes, any income or loss is passed through to Benefis.

Orthopedic Center of Montana, LLC (OCM) is organized as a Montana limited liability company of which Benefis owns 50%. The purpose of the company is to develop, manage, and coordinate operations of OCM. For tax purposes, any income or loss is passed through to Benefis.

Note 1 - Organization and Principles of Consolidation (continued)

BBB, LLC (BBB) is organized as a Montana limited liability company of which Benefis owns 60%. The purpose of BBB is to develop, own, manage, lease, and operate the building in which a center for the provision of medical and surgical orthopedic services to patients operates. For tax purposes, any income or loss is passed through to Benefis.

Orthopedic Center of Montana Ambulatory Surgery Center, LLC (ASC) is organized as a Montana limited liability company of which Benefis owns 50%. The purposes of the company are to establish, own, manage, lease, and operate an ambulatory surgery center dedicated to the provision of orthopedic surgical services, pain management services, and other services as determined by the board of managers. For tax purposes, any income or loss is passed through to Benefis.

Benefis Health System Foundation (formerly known as Benefis Healthcare Foundation) (the Foundation) was organized in 1998 as a not-for-profit organization for the charitable purpose of enabling the provision of health care services to the community by raising funds for and on behalf of Benefis, other health care related not-for-profit organizations, and individuals in need. On December 13, 2011, the Foundation amended its Articles of Incorporation, appointing Benefis as the sole member and giving full control of the Foundation to Benefis (Note 18).

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Benefis and its affiliates, Benefis Hospitals, Inc., Spectrum, The Health Trust, The Peak, BMG, BSHCC, OCM, BBB, ASC, and the Foundation (collectively referred to as the Organization). All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated.

On June 21, 2006, the Organization, represented by Benefis, entered into a Disaffiliation Agreement (Agreement) with Providence Health, a former affiliate. The Agreement provided that as of September 30, 2006, Benefis would no longer be affiliated with or sponsored by Providence Health. The Agreement required Benefis to comply with certain conditions and restrictions. The Organization must remain a faith-based health care organization as demonstrated by certain covenants for at least the next 10 years.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies

Use of estimates - The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and cash equivalents - Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use. At times, deposits exceed Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insured limits.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Patient and resident receivables - Patient and resident receivables are uncollateralized patient, resident, customer, and third-party payor obligations. Payments of patient and resident receivables are allocated to the specific claims identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, are applied to the earliest unpaid claim. The carrying amount of patient and resident receivables is reduced by a valuation allowance that reflects management's estimate of amounts that will not be collected from patients, residents, and third-party payors. Management reviews patient and resident receivables by payor class and applies percentages to determine estimated amounts that will not be collected from third parties under contractual agreements and amounts that will not be collected from patients or residents due to bad debts and charity care. Management considers historical write-off and recovery information in determining the estimated bad debt provision.

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Organization analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Organization analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Organization records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Organization's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients increased from 78% of self-pay accounts receivable at December 31, 2011, to 82% of self-pay accounts receivable at December 31, 2012. In addition, self-pay write-offs increased \$3,700,000 from approximately \$12,200,000 for year ended December 31, 2011 to \$15,900,000 for year ended December 31, 2012.

Supplies - Supplies, consisting principally of surgical, medical, and pharmaceutical supplies, are stated at lower of cost (first in, first out) or market.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Assets limited as to use - Assets limited as to use include assets set aside for future capital improvements, over which the board of directors retain control and may at their discretion subsequently use for other purposes, assets restricted by donors, and assets held by trustees under indenture and other agreements. Also included in assets limited as to use are the funds held for long-term purposes to be used for certain self-insurance programs for the health trust and workers' compensation trust and donor-restricted purposes. Certificates of deposit, common stocks, government obligations, marketable debt securities, and mutual funds are carried at fair value. Other assets limited as to use are carried at cost, which approximates fair value. Assets limited as to use that are available for obligations classified as current liabilities are reported in current assets.

Property and equipment - Property and equipment acquisitions equal to or greater than \$2,000 are capitalized and recorded at cost. The cost of property and equipment, and the related accumulated depreciation, are removed from the accounts when sold or retired, and the resulting gain or loss is recognized. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives of property and equipment are as follows:

Land improvements10-40 yearsBuildings and improvements15-40 yearsEquipment3-30 years

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. Investment income earned or investment losses incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets are recorded as an offset to the costs of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets and are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when donated or when acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

The Organization assesses potential impairment to its long-lived assets when there is evidence that events or changes in circumstances have made recovery of the carrying value of the assets unlikely.

Deferred financing costs - Deferred financing costs are amortized over the outstanding period of the related obligation using the interest method.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Equity investments - Investments in jointly owned companies in which Benefis has a 20% to 50% interest or otherwise exercises significant influence are accounted for on the equity method and are carried at cost, adjusted for Benefis' proportionate share of its undistributed earnings or losses.

Beneficial interest in Benefis Health System Foundation - Prior to acquiring control of the Foundation (Note 1), Benefis was a specified beneficiary of certain assets of the Foundation. In accordance with accounting standards, Benefis recognized a beneficial interest in those assets as receivable and temporarily and permanently restricted net assets through December 13, 2011.

Self-insurance reserves - The provisions for the reserves in the self-insured health trust and the workers' compensation trust include estimates of the ultimate costs for both the reported claims and the claims incurred but not reported.

Temporarily and permanently restricted net assets - Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity.

Net patient and resident service revenue and payable to contractual agencies - The Organization has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Organization at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient and resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payors, and others for services provided, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are provided and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. Estimates of final settlements to or from third-party payors are included in estimated third-party payor settlements in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Permanently restricted endowment net assets are stipulated by the donor as such and consist of the original principal to be held in perpetuity. Generally, net appreciation, realized and unrealized, unless restricted by the donor, is available for appropriation by the Organization for the uses and purposes for which the endowment fund is intended.

Charity care - The Organization provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policies without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Organization does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as patient service revenue. The costs the Organization incurred to provide charity care were approximately \$5,900,000 and \$8,800,000 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The Organization has estimated these costs by multiplying its ratio of costs to gross charges to the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing charity care.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Other operating revenue - Other operating revenue primarily includes revenues generated from cafeteria, rentals, vendor rebates, other ancillary services, and joint venture gains and losses.

Other operating expenses - Other operating expenses primarily include expenses related to insurance, taxes, repairs and maintenance, temporary staffing, travel, education, professional dues, subscriptions, recruiting, and licenses.

Excess of revenues over expenses - Excess of revenues over expenses excludes unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, transfers of assets to and from related parties for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions that were restricted by donors.

Donor-restricted gifts - Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When donor-stipulated time restrictions or purpose restrictions are met or accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the consolidated statements of operations.

Investment income - Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses unless the investments are trading securities. Gains and losses on the sale of securities are determined using the specific-identification method.

Derivative instruments - The Organization has five interest rate swaps, which qualify as cash flow hedges. The details of each swap are as follows:

The first swap expires March 2017 and fixes the interest rate paid on the BBB note payable at 6.62%. The outstanding balance of the BBB note payable was \$15,541,607 and the variable rate was 5.00% as of December 31, 2012.

The second swap expires May 2019 and fixes the interest rate paid on one of The Peak's notes payable at 5.97%. The outstanding balance of this note payable was \$3,712,098 and the variable rate was 5.00% as of December 31, 2012.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

The third swap expires January 2021 and fixes the interest rate paid on the other of The Peak's notes payable at 7.17%. The outstanding balance of this note payable was \$3,388,290 and the variable rate was 5.00% as of December 31, 2012.

The fourth swap expires June 2030 and fixes the interest rate paid on one of the Series 2011B Revenue Bonds at 3.71%. The outstanding balance of this note payable was \$17,000,000 and the variable rate was 1.27% as of December 31, 2012.

The fifth swap expires May 2025 and fixes the interest rate paid on the Benefis note payable at 3.48%. The outstanding balance of this note payable was \$16,879,745 and the variable rate was 1.71% as of December 31, 2012.

The derivative financial instruments are reported at fair market value on the consolidated balance sheets. Changes in the fair market value of the derivative are recorded each period on the consolidated statements of operations below excess of revenues over expenses.

Montana State Hospital Utilization Fee - During 2003, the Montana State Legislature passed an act imposing a utilization fee on hospital facilities for inpatient bed days, and authorized the Department of Revenue to collect and deposit fees in a state special revenue account for funding increases in Medicaid payments to Montana hospitals (Montana State Hospital Utilization Fee). The state special revenue account received an appropriation from a federal special revenue fund to match the state special revenue collected through the utilization fee, thereby providing increased Medicaid reimbursement for Montana hospitals in the state fiscal years ending June 30, 2004, through June 30, 2011. See Note 4 and Note 8 for information on the associated account balances as of December 31, 2012 and 2011.

Federal income tax - The Organization is a not-for-profit corporation and has been recognized as tax exempt pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC. The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRC except to the extent of unrelated business taxable income as defined under IRC Sections 511 through 515. Effective January 1, 2009, the Organization adopted accounting for uncertain tax positions. The accounting standard prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement process for uncertain tax positions. The Organization had no uncertain tax positions as of December 31, 2012 or 2011.

Fair value measurements - Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e., the "exit price") in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Organization classified its investments and derivatives based upon an established fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value (Note 16). The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurement).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under the standard are described below:

Level 1: Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities.

Note 2 - Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Level 2: Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments without quoted market prices, but for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3: Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and are unobservable.

A financial instrument's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

Change in accounting principles - The FASB has issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2011-07, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities.* The Medical Center has early adopted the provisions of ASU 2011-07 as of and for the year ended December 31, 2012. These changes in accounting principles did not change any component of the consolidated balance sheets or statements of operations and changes in net assets with exception to reclassifying the provision of bad debts for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, from expenses to revenue, which amounted to \$26,791,131 and \$15,730,000, respectively.

Subsequent events - Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the consolidated balance sheet date but before the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued. The Organization recognizes in the consolidated financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the consolidated balance sheets, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the consolidated financial statements. The Organization's consolidated financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the consolidated balance sheets but arose after the consolidated balance sheet date and before the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued.

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through March 18, 2013, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were issued, and concluded that there were no events or transactions that need to be disclosed.

Reclassifications - Certain amounts reported in the 2011 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2012 financial statement presentation.

Note 3 - Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

The Organization has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare - (Approximately 49% of gross patient service revenues for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011) Inpatient acute care services provided to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. As a sole community hospital, the Organization is paid the higher of the Organization's updated sole community payment, adjusted for patient acuity, or the combined total of federal operating DRG payments, indirect medical education, and disproportionate share. Inpatient capital is paid on a prospectively determined rate and added to the inpatient operating reimbursement. Inpatient non-acute services, certain outpatient services, and graduate medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The majority of Medicare outpatient services are reimbursed under a prospective payment methodology (Ambulatory Payment Classification System). Benefis Hospitals, Inc.'s Medicare cost reports have been settled by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through December 31, 2007. Benefis Hospitals, Inc.'s classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with Benefis Hospitals, Inc.

Medicaid - (Approximately 11% of gross patient service revenues for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011) Inpatient acute care services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology. Through December 31, 2008, the Organization was reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports and settlements thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary. Benefis Hospitals, Inc.'s Medicaid cost reports have been processed through the year ended December 31, 2007. Beginning with the year ended December 31, 2009, there are no cost report settlements.

Blue Cross - Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Blue Cross subscribers are paid at a percentage of charges. The prospectively determined discount is not subject to retroactive adjustment.

Resident services - The Organization is reimbursed for resident services at prospective per diem rates that are determined on an inflation-adjusted basis subject to certain limitations as prescribed by the Montana Department of Health and Human Services regulations. Under the Medicare program, payment for resident services is made on a prospectively determined per diem rate, which varies based on a casemix adjusted patient classification system.

Other - The Organization has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and other organizations. The basis for payment to the Organization under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates. Laws and regulations governing Medicare, Medicaid, and other programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates may change by a material amount in the near term.

The Organization recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Organization recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Organization's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Organization records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized in the period from these major payor sources, is as follows.

Temporarily restricted net assets of \$4,170,421 and \$3,274,065 are available for health care services and other various program purposes at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Permanently restricted net assets of \$14,272,108 and \$13,591,901 at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively, are restricted to investments to be held in perpetuity, the income from which is expendable to support various services (Note 12).

Note 12 - Endowment

The Organization has an endowment as a result of the acquisition of the Foundation by the Organization (Note 18). The Foundation's endowment consists of four separate investment pools established for a variety of purposes. This endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Foundation's board of directors to function as endowments. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the board of directors to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of relevant law - The board of directors of the Foundation is in the process of determining its policy under the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) regarding the need to preserve the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Foundation considers the following factors when making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- 1. The duration and preservation of the fund
- 2. The purpose of the Foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- 3. General economic conditions
- 4. The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- 5. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- 6. Other resources of the Foundation
- 7. The investment policies of the Foundation

Endowment spending policy - It is the goal of the Foundation to provide annual distributions to support the programs it has identified within its various missions. This goal needs to be balanced with an equally important goal of growing the principal of the pools in real terms. The finance committee of the Foundation's board of directors has taken into consideration the impact cash withdrawals play upon the volatility of a portfolio over time. Taking this into account, the finance committee of the Foundation's board of directors has set annual withdrawal policy limits for each pool.

Note 12 - Endowment (continued)

Investment return objective - The investment pools of the Foundation are maintained to provide total return through capital appreciation, dividends, and interest income. They are to be invested using sound practices that emphasize long-term investment fundamentals because the Foundation has a time horizon sufficiently long that performance is to be measured over multiple market cycles. It is hoped that through careful management of these assets, the total return will be sufficient to both support the annual distribution needs of the Foundation's programs and continually grow the overall principal of the pools in real terms, while also taking into account the rate of inflation.

Risk tolerance - It is the goal of the Foundation to maximize the return of its investment pools with a reasonable and prudent level of risk. The Foundation's finance committee recognizes and acknowledges that there is a relationship between the level of risk assumed and the level of return that can be expected in an investment account. In establishing risk tolerances for each pool, the finance committee has considered both the financial ability to withstand this risk and the willingness to accept this volatility.

Asset allocation - The Foundation recognizes that the strategic allocation of assets across broadly defined financial, asset, and specific investment classes is critical in reducing the volatility of the portfolio and in achieving its long-term performance objectives. Taking into account the Foundation's return objectives and risk tolerance, the Foundation's finance committee has set the general asset allocation rules that detail the asset mix between equity and fixed income for each pool.

Strategies - The investment objective and risk-level strategies defined below are ranked in descending order from most aggressive to most conservative:

Aggressive growth strategy - Primary goal is to build significant wealth over time. This strategy is characterized by a willingness to accept a high level of risk in pursuit of above-average returns.

Growth strategy - Primary goal is capital appreciation through investing in assets that are expected to grow at an above-average rate compared with its industry or the overall market. This strategy has a moderate to high risk.

Growth and income strategy - Primary goal is to preserve the real value of the capital while achieving at least a moderate income stream. This strategy requires assuming at least a moderate risk.

Income and growth strategy - Primary goal is a relatively stable income stream with a secondary goal of growth and rising income potential. This strategy has a lower to moderate risk.

Income strategy - Primary goal is preservation of capital. This strategy is conservative and may provide some current income and little or no opportunity for growth.

Funds with deficiencies - From time to time, the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Foundation to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. Deficiencies result from unfavorable market fluctuations that occur after the investment of permanently restricted contributions. There were no such deficiencies as of December 31, 2012.

Note 13 - Benefit Plans

Qualified pension plans - Benefis Hospitals, Inc., Spectrum, BMG, and Benefis Health System Administration have a defined contribution pension plan under Internal Revenue Code Section 403(b) covering all employees upon employment. Upon completion of one year of service, with at least 1,040 hours, for those employees with a contribution percentage of at least 2.5%, Benefis Hospitals, Inc., Spectrum, BMG, and Benefis Health System Administration contribute a matching percentage, which increases from 5% to 7% depending on the number of years of service.

The Peak has a defined contribution pension plan qualified under the Internal Revenue Code as a Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees (SIMPLE) that provides benefits to employees who have earned at least \$5,000 during the previous two years. Under the SIMPLE, The Peak provides a matching contribution of up to 2% of the employee's wages.

BMG also had a defined contribution plan (401(k)) available to the employees until June 24, 2010. BMG matched 200% of the employee's contribution up to a maximum of 6% of the employee's compensation.

Note 13 - Benefit Plans (continued)

Nonqualified deferred compensation plan - Benefis provides a Section 457 nonqualified deferred compensation plan for certain employees.

Pension expense under the plans totaled \$4,179,711 and \$3,971,954 for the years ended December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

Note 14 - Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Organization grants credit without collateral to its patients and residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from third-party payors, patients, and residents at December 31 was as follows:

Note 16 - Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Organization in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments. The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, accounts payable, accrued expenses, and estimated third-party payor settlements reported in the consolidated balance sheets approximates the fair value of these instruments. The fair value of long-term debt is estimated using either current traded values or discounted cash flow analyses based on borrowing rates currently available to the Organization for similar arrangements. The estimated fair value of long-term debt reported at the carrying amount in the consolidated balance sheets is approximately \$235,177,000 and \$278,040,000 at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. These instruments are categorized as Level 2 in the fair value hierarchy (Note 2). Fair values of assets whose use is limited are based on quoted market prices, if available, or estimated using quoted market prices for similar securities. Fair values of interest rate swaps included in other long-term liabilities in the consolidated balance sheets are based on observable significant inputs.

Note 17 - Commitments and Contingencies

Professional liability - Professional liability claims have been asserted against Benefis by certain claimants and are in various stages of investigation and litigation. Benefis is insured through a captive insurance company that provides coverage on a claims-made basis subject to a limit of \$1,000,000 per claim with an annual aggregate limit of \$3,000,000. Benefis has purchased excess liability coverage that provides coverage for claims in excess of the \$3,000,000 annual aggregate limit.

Note 17 - Commitments and Contingencies (continued)

Benefis has recorded a liability of \$5,344,313 and \$5,945,473 at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. The balance is included in other current and long-term liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets for an estimated liability related to the deductibles and other expenses associated with reported and unreported professional liability claims.

Workers' compensation - Benefis maintains a self-insurance program for workers' compensation. Insurance policies through commercial insurance carriers are in force to provide coverage for claims in excess of self-insurance limits. Benefis has recorded a liability for the estimated future costs of claims for which payments will be made. At December 31, 2012 and 2011, the estimated liability for future claims costs totaled \$4,716,101 and \$4,672,783, respectively. These amounts are included in other long-term liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. The calculation for the 2011 liability included a discount of 1%.

Employee Health and Welfare Trust - Benefis has a self-insured plan (the Health Trust) for its group health and dental insurance whose estimated liabilities of \$925,364 and \$1,225,364 at December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively, are included in other current liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Insurance policies through commercial insurance companies are in force to provide coverage for certain claims in excess of self-insurance limits.

Litigation, claims, and disputes - The Organization is subject to the usual contingencies in the normal course of operations relating to the performance of its tasks under its various programs. In the opinion of management, the ultimate settlement of litigation, claims, and disputes in process will not be material to the consolidated financial position of the Organization.

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with those laws and regulations, specifically those relating to Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenues from patient and resident services. Management believes that the Organization is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

Guarantees - Benefis is a guarantor of all the debt for The Peak, which is included in the consolidated financial statements. Benefis is also the guarantor for 60% of the BBB debt and 50% of the ASC debt.

Commitments - The Organization has signed contracts that have committed it to construction costs of approximately \$13,500,000.


Note 18 - Acquisition of Benefis Health System Foundation

The Foundation was established in 1998 with the merger of the Montana Gift of Life Foundation and Montana Deaconess Foundation as a new Montana nonprofit corporation, and it obtained federal tax exemption pursuant to Section 501(3) of the IRC and public charity status pursuant to IRC Section 170(b)(1)(A)(vi). From its establishment, the Foundation's primary mission has been to raise funds to support Benefis and improve and enhance health care services for people throughout north central Montana. As a result, Benefis had certain representation on the Foundation board and approval rights regarding certain issues. Times have certainly changed since 1998 and today's health care realities call for more integration among all parts of the health care delivery system. To facilitate that integration and to enhance collaboration, coordination, and cost effectiveness, the board of the Foundation, on December 13, 2011, approved changes to its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws that made Benefis the sole and controlling member of the Foundation and modified its name to the Benefis Health System Foundation. As the sole member of the Foundation, Benefis elects the board of the Foundation and has reserve powers over certain fundamental issues affecting the Foundation's governance and operation. This amendment also provided Benefis with absolute control over all aspects of the Foundation, including the sole voting interest. In accordance with applicable accounting standards, this has been treated as an acquisition on the date that Benefis acquired the control of the Foundation. In the acquisition of the Foundation, Benefis acquired the following assets and assumed the following liabilities:
