Organization: Kalispell Regional Medical Center, Inc. (the Hospital), located in Kalispell, Montana, is a not-for-profit acute-care hospital. The Hospital has provided inpatient, outpatient and emergency care services for residents of northwestern Montana from the time it was incorporated in Montana in 1973. The Hospital also became the sole corporate member of Kalispell Regional Healthcare Foundation (the Foundation) in May 2011. The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation located in Kalispell, Montana, whose primary purposes are to manage and administer investments and provide funding in support of the Hospital and similar not-for-profit organizations. The Hospital has obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service stating that it is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, except for unrelated business income.

The Hospital is also an affiliate of Kalispell Regional Healthcare System (KRHS), formerly Northwest Healthcare Corporation KRHS is a Montana not-for-profit corporation organized in 1982 to act for the benefit of and on behalf of the Hospital and other related affiliates. Other affiliates of KRHS, which are affiliates of the Hospital, are Northwest Horizons, Inc. (NWH), Applied Health Services, Inc. (AHS), Flathead Hospital Development Company, LLC (FHDC), HealthCenter Northwest, LLC (HC), Northwest Orthopedics & Sports Medicine, LLC (NOSM), Peak Orthopedics & Sports Medicine (POSM), and Summit Medical Fitness Center, Inc. (SMFC)

**Principles of consolidation and basis of presentation:** The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital and the Foundation, as described above, for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated upon consolidation.

Management estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Cash and cash equivalents: Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by Board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements

The Hospital and the Foundation each maintain a cash sweep account, the funds of which are held in overnight repurchase agreements. These debt security investments are held overnight, maturing the following day, and are considered cash and cash equivalents. These accounts are not covered within the federally insured limits for bank depository accounts, but rather are fully collateralized at the bank with U.S. government agency securities. The nature of cash and cash equivalents as of March 31, 2013, is as follows.

**Investments:** The Hospital invests in a professionally managed portfolio of securities, which includes common stocks, mutual funds and money market funds. Investments are measured at fair value, based on quoted market prices.

#### **Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements**

#### Note 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Management determines the appropriate classification of the securities at the time they are acquired and evaluates the appropriateness of such classifications at each balance sheet date. The Hospital has classified its securities as trading securities. Trading securities are measured and carried at fair value, and unrealized holding gains and losses, realized gains and losses, and interest and dividends are included in the excess of revenues over expenses, unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law

The Hospital's investments are inherently exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risks associated with these investments and the level of uncertainty related to potential changes in the value of such investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risk factors in the near term could affect the carrying value of individual investments and related amounts reported in the Hospital's financial statements, and such amounts could be material

Fair value measurements: The carrying amounts of financial instruments, including cash, cash equivalents, accounts receivable, accounts payable, accrued liabilities and short-term borrowings, approximate fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments. The Hospital uses quoted market prices for its long-term debt when available. When quoted market prices are not available, fair value is estimated based on current market interest rates and credit spreads for debt with similar maturities. The fair value of long-term debt incorporates a credit valuation adjustment to appropriately reflect the Hospital's own nonperformance risk.

Patient accounts receivable: Accounts receivable for the Hospital are stated at net realizable value For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides contractual allowances based on these amounts Additionally, the Hospital provides for an allowance against patient accounts receivable for an amount that could become uncollectible. The Hospital estimates this allowance based on the aging of accounts receivable, historical collection experience and other relevant factors.

Assets limited as to use: Assets limited as to use primarily include assets held by trustees under indenture agreements and designated assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Hospital have been classified as current assets in the consolidated balance sheets at March 31, 2013 and 2012.

Contributions receivable: Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at fair value, which is measured as the present value of their future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-adjusted interest rates applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Amortization of the discounts is included in contribution revenue. An allowance for pledges is recorded based primarily on historical collection experience. If it is determined that a contribution receivable will not be collected, the amount is written off to the allowance account. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are substantially met.

Land, buildings and equipment: Land, buildings and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Assets acquired under capital leases are amortized based on the straight-line method over the shorter of the period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the asset. Such amortization is included in depreciation in the consolidated financial statements. Improvements and replacements of land, buildings and equipment are capitalized at cost. Maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred. The cost of land, buildings and equipment sold or retired and the related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is recorded in the period of such retirement.

Interest capitalized on internally generated and borrowed funds expended for construction is a component of the cost of plant additions to be allocated to future periods through the provision of depreciation Capitalization of interest ceases when the plant addition is placed into service. The Hospital capitalized \$1,803,000 and \$1,819,000 of interest expense in the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

**Financing costs:** Financing costs incurred in connection with long-term obligations are deferred and amortized over the life of the obligations using the effective-interest method. Financing costs are presented on the consolidated balance sheet net of accumulated amortization.

Professional malpractice liability: The Hospital has obtained claims-made medical malpractice liability insurance coverage through a risk reciprocal group, of which KRHS owns approximately 4 35 percent and 4 17 percent as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Hospital's investment in the risk reciprocal group as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, is approximately \$1,820,000 and \$1,760,000, respectively, which is included in investment in risk reciprocal group in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. As of March 31, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital has recorded a liability of approximately \$1,980,000 and \$2,428,000, respectively, for these claims that have been incurred but not reported, which is included in the accounts payable and accrued liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. As of March 31, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital has a receivable for the estimated amount of recovery of approximately \$3,024,000 and \$4,522,000, respectively, recorded in estimated insurance recoveries in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. The related claim liability of \$3,317,000 and \$4,522,000, respectively, is recorded in estimated claims liability. The Hospital discounts the ultimate cost of claims at a discount rate of 2 0 percent and 2 5 percent as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Self-insurance workers' compensation: The Hospital participates in a self-insurance workers' compensation program with KRHS KRHS has established self-insurance funds for the deductible portion of workers' compensation insurance coverage. KRHS' funding for the estimated deductible portion of self-insured workers' compensation insurance coverage is based on the self-insurance funds' estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and actuarially determined estimates of claims incurred but not yet reported. Self-insured workers' compensation retention in 2013 and 2012 was \$500,000 per occurrence KRHS has recorded a liability of approximately \$2,037,000 and \$2,309,000 as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, for those claims that have been incurred but not yet reported, which is included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities in the KRHS consolidated balance sheets. As of March 31, 2013 and 2012, KRHS has a receivable for the estimated amount of recoveries of approximately \$831,000 and \$855,000, respectively, recorded in estimated insurance recoveries in the KRHS consolidated balance sheets. KRHS discounts the ultimate cost of claims at a discount rate of 2 0 and 2 5 percent as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

**Self-insurance health and dental program:** The Hospital has established self-insured medical and dental plans for its employees. The accrued liabilities for the self-insured components of these plans include estimates of the costs for the incurred but not reported claims. These estimates are included in accrued salaries, wages and benefits in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets and were approximately \$1,324,000 and \$1,445,000 as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

**Temporarily and permanently restricted net assets:** Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital or the Foundation has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of changes in net assets under the caption, "Contributions and other"

Permanently restricted net assets are assets to be maintained permanently by the Hospital or the Foundation Generally, the donors of these assets permit the Hospital to use all or part of the income earned on related investments for general or specific purposes

**Excess of revenues over expenses:** The consolidated statements of operations include excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses include permanent transfers of net assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which, by donor restriction, were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets)

Net patient service revenue: The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Contractual adjustments arising under reimbursement arrangements with third-party payors are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for bad debts is presented on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations as a component of net patient service revenue.

Charity care: The Hospital provides health care services to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Since the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts, they are not reported as net revenue. The estimated cost of providing these services was \$7,821,000 and \$7,786,000 for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, calculated by multiplying the ratio of cost to gross charges for the Hospital by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients

Incentive revenue: The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 included provisions for implementing health information technology under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (HITECH). The provisions were designed to increase the use of electronic health record (EHR) technology and establish the requirements for a Medicare and Medicaid incentive payment program beginning in 2011 for eligible providers that adopt and meaningfully use certified EHR technology. Eligibility for annual Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period. Initial Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments are available to providers that adopt, implement or upgrade certified EHR technology. Providers must demonstrate meaningful use of such technology in subsequent years to qualify for additional Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments.

The Hospital is entitled to receive Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments for the adoption of certified EHR technology, as the Hospital has satisfied the statutory and regulatory requirements. The Hospital accounts for HITECH incentive payments as a gain contingency. Income from Medicare and Medicaid incentive payments is recognized as revenue after the Hospital has demonstrated that it complied with the meaningful use criteria over the entire applicable compliance period. The Hospital recognized revenue from Medicare incentive payments totaling \$2,542,000 and \$108,000 for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Additionally, the Hospital recognized Medicaid payments totaling \$408,000 and \$809,000 for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The incentive payments are included in other operating revenue in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. Income from incentive payments is subject to retrospective adjustment as the incentive payments are calculated using Medicare cost report data that is subject to audit. Additionally, the Hospital's compliance with the meaningful use criteria is subject to audit by the federal government.

Contributions: Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Hospital or the Foundation are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of changes in net assets as net assets released from restriction. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

**Income taxes:** The Hospital is operated as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the federal Internal Revenue Code and applicable sections of the Montana statutes. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the Hospital's tax-exempt purpose may be subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Hospital qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2). No provision for income taxes is reflected in these statements. The Hospital is no longer subject to U.S. federal tax examinations by tax authorities for the fiscal years before 2009.

The Hospital adopted the provisions of Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 740, Income Taxes ASC 740 clarifies the accounting for uncertainty in income taxes recognized in an organization's financial statements in accordance with the ASC and prescribes a recognition threshold and measurement standard for the financial statement recognition and measurement of an income tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return. The Hospital has reviewed its tax positions for all open tax years and has concluded no reserves are required.

Recent accounting pronouncements: The Hospital adopted Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No 2011-07, *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provisions for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities,* during the year ended March 31, 2013 This ASU requires health care entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time services are provided, even though they do not assess the patient's ability to pay, to present the provision for bad debt related to patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue rather than an operating expense in the statements of operations. The ASU also requires additional disclosures related to sources of patient service revenue and changes in the allowance for bad debts. The adoption of this ASU changed where the provision for bad debt was presented within the consolidated statements of operations, however, it did not affect operating income. The provision for bad debt for the year ended March 31, 2012, in the amount of \$12,186,000 has been retroactively reclassified in accordance with the guidance.

**Comparative data/reclassifications:** Certain amounts presented in the prior year have been reclassified to be consistent with the current-year presentation, with no impact on changes in net assets or net assets as previously reported

**Subsequent events:** The Hospital and the Foundation evaluated events and transactions occurring subsequent to March 31, 2013, through June 14, 2013, the date the consolidated financial statements were issued. During this period, there were no subsequent events requiring recognition in the consolidated financial statements. Additionally, there were no nonrecognized subsequent events requiring disclosure.

# Note 2. Net Patient Service Revenue, Contractual Arrangements with Third-Party Payors, and Allowance for Bad Debts

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

Medicare: Inpatient acute-care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. The Medicare program reimburses the Hospital for outpatient services on a prospective payment system known as Ambulatory Payment Classifications (APCs) The Hospital is reimbursed for covered services at a tentative rate, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary The most recent year that the fiscal intermediary has completed an audit of the Hospital's Medicare cost report is 2008 Future changes in the Medicare program and reduction of funding levels could have an adverse effect on the Hospital Laws and regulations governing the Medicare program are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. The 2013 net patient service revenue decreased approximately \$323,000 as a result of final settlements and years that are no longer subject to audits, reviews and investigations. The 2012 net patient service revenue increased approximately \$1,800,000 due to removal of allowances previously estimated that are no longer necessary as a result of final settlements and years that are no longer subject to audits, reviews and investigations

# Note 2. Net Patient Service Revenue, Contractual Arrangements with Third-Party Payors, and Allowance for Bad Debts (Continued)

**Medicaid:** Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed under a prospective payment system. The Hospital is reimbursed at a tentative rate, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary. The most recent year that the fiscal intermediary has completed an audit of the Hospital's Medicaid cost report is 2008.

Approximately 35 percent of the Hospital's net patient service revenue was derived from the Medicare program, and 6 percent was derived from the Medicaid program in 2013 and 2012, the continuance of which is dependent upon governmental policies

The Hospital also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements included discounts from established charges. Approximately 20 percent and 19 percent of the Hospital's net patient service revenue in 2013 and 2012, respectively, was derived from Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for bad debts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts an provides contractual allowances bases on these amounts. Additionally, an allowance for bad debt and provision for bad debt is provided for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the patient is responsible. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for bad debt.

The Hospital's allowance for bad debts accounts was 17 6 percent and 18 1 percent of accounts receivable at March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively In addition, the Hospital's write-offs were \$15,098,945 and \$10,802,097 for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a portion of the Hospital's patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a provision for bad debts related to patients in the period the services are provided. Patient services revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for bad debts), recognized in the year ended March 31, 2013, from these major payor sources, and is as follows.

Montana State Bed Tax: All Montana hospital facilities are subject to a Montana State Bed Tax program by which a utilization fee is assessed based on inpatient bed days. Under this program, the State Department of Revenue is authorized to collect and deposit fees in a state special revenue account for funding increases in Medicaid payments to Montana hospitals. The state special revenue account receives an appropriation from a federal special revenue fund to match the state special revenue collected through the utilization fee, thereby providing increased Medicaid reimbursement for Montana hospitals.

The total utilization fee paid in January by the Hospital for the fiscal years 2013 and 2012 was \$1,764,000 and \$1,746,000, respectively. The increased Medicaid payment received from the state special revenue account by the Hospital for the fiscal years 2013 and 2012 totaled \$5,087,000 and \$4,198,000, respectively. Thus, the net Montana State Bed Tax effect in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations was \$3,323,000 for 2013 and \$2,452,000 for 2012 and is included in net patient revenues in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations.

In November 2010, the Hospital issued the Montana Facility Finance Authority Health Care Facilities Revenue Bonds, Series 2010 (the 2010 Bonds), in the principal amount of \$57,115,000, maturing annually through July 1, 2040 The 2010 Bonds bear interest at an effective rate ranging from 3 00 percent to 5 25 percent and are payable in annual installments on July 1 of each year

The 2010 Bonds are secured by certain gross receipts and receivables of the Hospital, including patient accounts receivable and contract rights. The bond agreement requires, among other restrictions, that the Hospital maintain a minimum debt service coverage ratio. Management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with these requirements.

The Hospital has granted to the Montana Facility Finance Authority an interest in certain equipment as security for the private issue bonds

#### Note 7. Transactions With Affiliates

The Hospital transferred \$4,018,000 and \$5,973,000 during the fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively, to the parent entity, KRHS, to maintain funds for operations of KRHS and its affiliates

The Hospital has a \$6,000,000 variable-rate, revolving demand loan to Northwest Horizons, Inc. (NWH), with a maturity date of October 27, 2013. There were no amounts outstanding as of March 31, 2013 and 2012.

#### Note 8. Retirement Plan

The Hospital has a defined contribution retirement plan with 401(k) provisions covering all eligible employees of the Hospital Employees may make elective deferrals into the plan up to the maximum allowed by the Internal Revenue Code. In addition to employee contributions, the Hospital may make contributions of up to 6 percent of eligible compensation to all eligible employees.

Employees are eligible to make contributions to the plan on the first day of the calendar quarter following their date of hire Employees are eligible to receive the employer contribution after attaining the age of 21 and completing one year of service in which the employee worked at least 1,000 hours Employees are immediately 100 percent vested in their contributions and are 100 percent vested in the employer contributions after six years of employment

Contributions to the plan charged to operations were \$3,445,000 and \$3,280,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are included in salaries, wages and benefits in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. All plan assets are held in trust for payment of future benefits.

The Hospital has two additional unfunded deferred compensation plans, the 457(b) Plan and the 457(f) Plan, that are only available to a select group of management and highly compensated employees. The 457(b) Plan liability was \$1,416,000 and \$983,000 as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and the 457(f) Plan liability was \$1,257,000 and \$965,000 for the same time periods, which represent employee contributions and interest earnings

#### Note 10. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Hospital in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments

Assets limited as to use: The Hospital has adopted ASC 820 for financial assets and liabilities. Assets and liabilities recorded at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets are categorized based upon the level of judgment associated with the inputs used to measure their fair value. The valuation techniques used to measure fair value under the ASC are based upon observable and unobservable inputs. The ASC established a three-level valuation hierarchy for disclosure of fair value measurements. The valuation hierarchy is based upon the transparency of inputs to the valuation of an asset or liability as of the measurement date. Input levels, as defined by the ASC, are as follows.

Level 1 Quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

Level 2 Observable market-based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data

Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data

In determining the appropriate levels, the Hospital performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities that are measured and reported at fair value on a recurring basis

**Future minimum lease commitments:** The Hospital leases certain office space, medical facilities and medical equipment under noncancelable operating lease arrangements. The lease terms vary, as do the Hospital's renewal options. The leases provide for minimum monthly rental payments.

Rent expense totaled \$5,626,000 and \$5,067,000 for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and is included in supplies and other in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. Of these amounts, \$2,500,000 and \$2,157,000 of rent expense for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, were with affiliated entities.

**Litigation and compliance with laws and regulations:** The Hospital is involved in litigation arising in the normal course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Hospital's future financial position or results of operations.

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursement for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs, together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed. After consultation with legal counsel, management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with the fraud and abuse regulations as well as other applicable government laws and regulations. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time.

Medical malpractice liability insurance: The Hospital has purchased medical malpractice liability insurance coverage to provide protection for professional liability losses on a claims-made basis. If the claims-made policy is not renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term, but reported subsequently, are uninsured. As of March 31, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital has recorded a liability of approximately \$1,980,000 and \$2,428,000, respectively, for those claims that have been incurred but not yet reported, which is included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. The Hospital discounts the ultimate cost of claims at a discount rate of 2.0 percent and 2.5 percent as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Recovery audit contractors program: The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) approved implementing the permanent recovery audit contractors (RAC) program in October 2009. This program uses RACs to search for potentially improper Medicare payments that may have been made to health care providers and that were not detected through existing CMS program integrity efforts.

## Note 11. Commitments and Contingencies (Continued)

Since January 2010, the RAC has requested 3,047 records from the Hospital, totaling \$18,096,299 in Medicare reimbursement. In 64 percent of the cases, the RAC identified no overpayments, and the Hospital is awaiting responses on 17 percent of those cases in the amount of \$3,020,985. The RAC has identified some overpayments, however, the Hospital has agreed with the RAC in only 5 percent of the overpayments, totaling \$243,391. The Hospital is currently in the appeals process in 624 cases, or 58 percent, in the amount of \$3,107,909. The appeals process can proceed through five levels. Currently, the 624 cases in appeal are in one of four appeal levels. The Hospital has been successful in appealing 24 percent of appealed cases, in the amount of \$1,254,979, with the majority of this success occurring prior to level two. The American Hospital Association (AHA) has reported that 75 percent of RAC findings are overturned in the appeals process after exhausting all five levels of appeal.

Health care reform: In March 2010, President Obama signed the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) into law PPACA will result in sweeping changes across the health care industry, including how care is provided and paid for A primary goal of this comprehensive reform legislation is to extend health coverage to approximately 32 million uninsured legal U S residents through a combination of public program expansion and private sector health insurance reforms. To fund the expansion of insurance coverage, the legislation contains measures designed to promote quality and cost efficiency in health care delivery and to generate budgetary savings in the Medicare and Medicaid programs. Given that the final regulations and interpretive guidelines have yet to be published, the Hospital is unable to fully predict the impact of PPACA on its operations and financial results. The Hospital's management expects that in the coming years, patients that were previously uninsured and unable to pay for care will have basic insurance coverage, and amounts for reimbursement for services from both public and private payors will be reduced and made conditional on various quality measures. Management of the Hospital is studying and evaluating the anticipated impacts and developing strategies needed to prepare for implementation, and is preparing to work cooperatively with other constituents to optimize available reimbursement.
