Note 1 – Nature of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization – Holy Cross Hospital, a division of Taos Health Systems, Inc. (Hospital), located in Taos, New Mexico, is a not-for-profit 49-bed acute care hospital. The Hospital provides inpatient, outpatient, and emergency care services for residents of Taos County and surrounding areas. Admitting physicians are practitioners in the local area and employees of the hospital.

In 2008, the Hospital established two 100% owned affiliates, MOMs and Taos Surgical Specialists (TSS). MOMs operates as an obstetrics and gynecology clinic and TSS is a surgery clinic. The Hospital also holds a majority interest in a subsidiary, Taos Sports Medicine Service, LLC (T.S.M.). Taos Sports Medicine contains two divisions, Taos MRI Services and Taos Center for Rehabilitation and Sports Medicine. The Hospital has a 50% ownership interest in Taos MRI Services, and a 66.7% ownership interest in Taos Center for Rehabilitation and Sports Medicine. The accompanying financial statements include all activities and accounts of the Hospital, MOMS, TSS, and Taos Sports Medicine. All transactions between these entities have been eliminated in consolidation. The outside investor's noncontrolling interest in Taos Sports Medicine is included in the Hospital's financial statements as a noncontrolling interest in subsidiary.

The Hospital has a management agreement with Quorum Health Resources, a healthcare management company, to supervise and direct the daily operations of the Hospital. The agreement expires in May 2014. Management fees were \$1,174,945 and \$1,238,084 in 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Hospital was provided other services by Quorum outside of the management agreement, which approximated \$82,000 and \$150,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively. Fees for the other services provided by Quorum are included in the caption *Purchased Services* in the accompanying statements of operations.

Basis of presentation – Financial statement presentation follows the requirements of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958-205, *Not-for-Profit Entities—Presentation of Financial Statements*. Under this guidance, the Hospital is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates contained in the Hospital's financial statements include the allowance for doubtful accounts, contractual allowance, estimated third-party payor settlements and depreciation and amortization.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Recent accounting pronouncements – During the year ended May 31, 2013, the Hospital adopted FASB ASU 2011-07, Health Care Entities (Topic 954) *Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities* The amendments in the guidance require that health care entities that have a policy of providing services to patients and recording significant patient service revenue regardless of their ability to pay to present bad debt expense separately as a deduction from patient service revenue. This presentation applies only to bad debts on patient service revenue; bad debt expense related to other sources of revenue will continue to be reported as operating expense. In addition, upon adoption, such health care entities are required to include expanded disclosures related to patient service revenue and patient accounts receivable. The Hospital's financial statements reflect the classification of bad debt expense as a deduction from patient service revenues, and also include the required expanded disclosures.

Cash and cash equivalents – Cash and cash equivalents include all cash balances and highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less. The Hospital places its temporary cash investments with high credit quality financial institutions. At times, such deposits exceed FDIC insurance coverage; however, the Hospital has not experienced any losses in such accounts.

Fair value measurements — The Hospital is required to follow a framework for measuring fair value under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States and provides disclosures about fair value measurements. Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Fair value is based on the assumptions market participants would use when pricing an asset or liability. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets (observable inputs) and the lowest priority to the Hospital's assumptions (unobservable inputs). Fair value measurements are required to be separately disclosed by level within the fair value hierarchy. For assets and liabilities recorded at fair value, it is the Hospital's policy to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when developing fair value measurements.

Except for certificates of deposit, investments are reported at fair value. Certificates of deposit are carried at cost, which approximates fair value.

Short-term investments – Short-term investments consist of investments with original maturities between three months and one year. The short-term investments consist of certificates of deposit. At times, such investments may be in excess of the FDIC insurance limit; however, the Hospital has not experienced any losses in such accounts.

Inventories – Inventories consist of supplies and are stated at cost using the first-in first-out method.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Investments – Investments are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Realized gains and losses on investments, and interest and dividend income are included in the excess of revenues over expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. As all investment securities are classified as available for sale, unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses and are recorded as changes in net assets. Certificates of deposit exceed federal depository insurance and therefore are subject to custodial credit risk. Management does not expect any losses in such accounts.

Assets limited as to use – Assets limited as to use primarily include investments held in brokerage accounts as collateral for the outstanding notes payable and designated assets set aside by the Board of Directors (Board) for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes.

Patient accounts receivable — Patient accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect from third-party payors, patients, and others. Estimated provisions for doubtful accounts are recorded to the extent it is probable a portion or all of a particular account will not be collected. The Hospital determines if patient accounts receivable are past-due based on the date the service was performed, and the Hospital does not charge interest on past-due accounts.

In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Hospital considers a number of factors, including the age of the accounts, changes in collection patterns by major payor source, the composition of patient accounts by major payor source, the status of ongoing disputes with third party payors and general industry conditions.

Contractual allowances represent the amounts which reduce patient accounts receivable to amounts that are considered to be due from third-party payors based on existing contracts the Hospital has with these payors. The contractual allowance percentages are updated several times per year by payor class and line of business. Contractual allowances are deducted from gross patient accounts receivable on the consolidated balance sheets.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts, if necessary. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, the Hospital records a significant allowance for doubtful accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible.

The Hospital's allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients was approximately 70% of self-pay accounts receivable at May 31, 2013. During the year ended May 31, 2013, the Hospital wrote off self-pay receivables of approximately \$7.6 million, and the Hospital did not change its charity care or uninsured discount policies. The Hospital does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor does it have significant write-offs from third-party payors.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Management believes that the allowances for doubtful accounts and contractual allowances are adequate. Because of the uncertainty regarding the ultimate collectability of patient accounts receivable, there is a possibility that recorded estimates of the allowance for doubtful accounts and contractual allowances will change by a material amount in the near term.

Property and equipment, net – Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Assets are capitalized if the cost is greater than \$2,000. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life (3 to 40 years) of each class of depreciable assets and is computed on the straight-line method. Equipment under capital leases is amortized on the straight-line method over a shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Investment accounted for under the equity method – The Hospital has a 50% ownership interest in Holy Cross Physicians Health Organization, Inc., a Physician Hospital Organization (PHO) created to present a united group of health care providers to negotiate contracts with managed care organizations. This investment is accounted for under the equity method of accounting. Under the equity method, the original investment is recorded at cost and adjusted by the Hospital's share of undistributed earnings or losses of this entity.

Net assets and changes therein – Net assets and income, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Accordingly, the net assets of the Hospital and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted – Unrestricted net assets represent those resources that are not restricted by donors, or for which donor-imposed restrictions have expired.

Temporarily restricted – Temporarily restricted net assets reflect donor-imposed restrictions that require the Hospital to use or expend the related assets as specified. The restrictions are satisfied either by the passage of time or by the satisfaction of donor specified use.

The Hospital records contributions as temporarily restricted if they are received with donor stipulations that limit their use through either purpose or time restrictions. When donor restrictions expire, that is, when a time restriction ends or a purpose restriction is fulfilled, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. Temporarily restricted contributions received and expended in the same accounting period are recorded in the unrestricted net asset category.

Excess of revenues over expenses – The statement of operations includes excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purpose of acquiring such assets).

Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Net patient service revenue – The Hospital has arrangements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed cost, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net amounts realizable from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts (but before the provision for uncollectible accounts), recognized during the year ended May 31, 2013, is as follows:

Charity care – The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue.

Advertising costs – Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense totaled \$1,374 and \$115,836 for the years ended May 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Income taxes – The Hospital is a tax-exempt organization and is not subject to federal or state income taxes, except for unrelated business income, in accordance with Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In addition, the Hospital qualified for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation. Unrelated business income tax, if any, is insignificant and no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

The Hospital recognizes the tax benefit from uncertain tax positions only if it is more likely than not that the tax positions will be sustained on examination by the tax authorities, based on the technical merits of the position. The tax benefit is measured based on the largest benefit that has a greater than 50% likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement.

The Hospital had no uncertain tax positions at May 31, 2013 or 2012.

Financial statement reclassifications – Certain 2012 financial information has been reclassified to conform to the 2013 presentation. These reclassifications did not affect the excess of revenues over expenses, total assets, total liabilities, or total net assets.

Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Subsequent events – Subsequent events are events or transactions that occur after the balance sheet date but before financial statements are issued. The Hospital recognizes in the financial statements the effects of all subsequent events that provide additional evidence about conditions that existed at the date of the balance sheet, including the estimates inherent in the process of preparing the financial statements. The Hospital's financial statements do not recognize subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that did not exist at the date of the balance sheet but arose after the balance sheet date and before the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

The Company has evaluated subsequent events through October 22, 2013, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 – Net Patient Service Revenue

Arrangements with third-party payors – The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare – Inpatient acute care services and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Inpatient non-acute services and defined capital, and medical education costs related to Medicare beneficiaries are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary.

Medicaid – Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries through October 31, 2010 are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital was reimbursed at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicaid fiscal intermediary.

The New Mexico Medicaid program implemented a new hospital outpatient payment reimbursement based on a simplified Medicare APC method effective November 1, 2010. The prospective payment system (OPPS) reimbursements were set to 100% of the Medicare standard rate. Under the new payment method cost reports will still be required, however cost report settlements are discontinued.

Other third-party payors – The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes prospectively-determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively-determined daily rates.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 25% and 13%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended May 31, 2013, and 25% and 12%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue, for the year ended May 31, 2012.

Note 5 - Fair Value Measurements

Management uses a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurement) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Basis of Fair Value Measurement -

- **Level 1** Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity can access at the measurement date.
- **Level 2** Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.
- **Level 3** Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The Hospital has no Level 3 investments. In addition, the Hospital had no transfers between levels during the year ended May 31, 2013 and 2012.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at May 31, 2013 and 2012.

Equity securities are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Mutual funds are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Hospital at year end using prices quoted by the relevant pricing agent.

Note 10 - Pension Plan

In June 1998 a collective bargaining agreement was entered into by the Hospital and the Professional Performance Association, affiliated with District 1199 NM, National Union of Hospital and Health Care Employees, AFSCME AFL-CIO. As part of this agreement, a defined contribution pension plan (Plan) was established under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code as of that same date. This agreement expired as of May 31, 2002. On April 1, 2012, an amended collective bargaining agreement was entered into by the aforementioned parties.

Under the amended agreement, the Hospital agreed to match Plan contributions dollar for dollar, up to \$705 per fiscal year effective April 1, 2012, for participating employees who are members of the bargaining unit. For employees earning more than \$35,250 annually and who contribute at least \$705 annually, the Hospital will match dollar-for-dollar the employee's contribution up to 2% of the employee's annual compensation not to exceed \$2,500 annually.

A similar contribution will be made for participating employees who are not members of the bargaining unit. These employees receive a discretionary contribution which is five to ten percent of their annual salaries determined annually by management.

Note 10 - Pension Plan (continued)

The contribution allocated to participating employees who are members of the bargaining unit will be based on a service weighted formula where each year of service shall earn one point. Each eligible non-per diem employee over the age of 21 shall receive a distribution based on the ratio of her/his points divided by the total points of all bargaining unit employees' times the total amount of the distribution. The contribution allocated to participating employees who are not members of the bargaining unit will be based on a simplified formula. All participants will vest in the Plan on a six-year graduated schedule but will be fully vested no later than their sixty-fifth birthday. The Hospital contributes to the pension plan on a bi-weekly basis, and no amounts were due the pension plan at May 31, 2013 and 2012.

Note 11 - Charity Care

The Hospital provides charity care to patients who are financially unable to pay for health care services they receive. The Hospital's policy is not to pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care. The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges foregone for services and supplies furnished under its charity care policy. Note 12 - Commitments and Contingencies

The Hospital has entered into an agreement with the County of Taos, New Mexico to pay for a new ambulance every two years in lieu of facility lease payments. The estimated total cost of the commitment over the two year period is approximately \$105,000, and is amortized over the two year period and recorded as rent expense.

Labor agreements – At May 31, 2013, 300 of the Hospital's 432 employees and at May 31, 2012, 265 of the Hospital's 479 employees work under collective bargaining agreements. All of the employees working under collective bargaining agreements which are set to expire on May 31, 2015.

Employee health insurance – The Hospital maintains a stop-loss agreement with an insurance company to limit its losses on individual claims related to group employee insurance. Under the current terms of this agreement, the Hospital's claims liability is limited to \$70,000 per employee per plan year, subject to an individual participant lifetime maximum of \$930,000. As of May 31, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital accrued employee insurance claims of \$298,409 and \$364,358, respectively, which are included in accounts payable in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets.

Stop-loss premiums and claims payments totaling \$1,906,798 and \$1,705,288 were expended during the years ended May 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are included in the employee benefits expense in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations.

Professional liability insurance – The Hospital maintains claims-made commercial insurance related to professional and general liability risks. The first level coverage includes losses of \$1,000,000 per occurrence subject to a \$3,000,000 aggregate loss. The second level excess coverage further covers individual losses up to \$5,000,000. The Hospital maintained a deductible of \$150,000 on these policies. The current policies expire June 1, 2014. The annual premium for these policies is included in insurance expense in the accompanying consolidated financial statements, and approximated \$1,107,115 in 2013 and \$1,284,550 in 2012. In prior years, the Hospital maintained similar claims-made policies, and certain claims as discussed below are covered under those policies.

Note 12 - Commitments and Contingencies (continued)

In the ordinary course of business, claims alleging malpractice and other matters are filed against the Hospital. In addition, further claims may be filed for incidents that have occurred, including some of which the Hospital is not presently aware. The claims are in various stages of processing, and some may ultimately be brought to trial. The Hospital has recorded reserves, which are recorded net of any underlying insurance coverage, for various asserted and unasserted claims based on management's best estimate of the probable outcome of those matters. Such reserves may change in future periods as more information becomes available to management.

Workers' compensation insurance – The Hospital is insured under the New Mexico Hospital Workers' Compensation Group for the purpose of providing insurance coverage for workers' compensation. The policy is a retrospectively rated policy whose premiums accrue based on the ultimate cost of the experience of a group of participating health care entities. The Hospital expensed approximately \$299,000 and \$237,400 in workers' compensation premiums during 2013 and 2012, respectively. Such amounts are included in employee benefits expense in the accompanying consolidated statement of operations.

Cost report settlements – The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been final settled for fiscal years through May 31, 2008, and Medicaid cost reports have been final settled for fiscal years through May 31, 2011. In management's opinion, the estimated third-party settlement receivable of \$670,896 at May 31, 2013 and payable of \$436,747 at 2012, respectively, was adequate to provide for the cost of settling all cost reports. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Estimates are continually monitored and reviewed, and as settlements are made or more information is available to improve estimates, differences are reflected in current operations.

Sole community provider funding — The Hospital receives Sole Community Provider Funding to compensate the Hospital for providing health care to the indigent population in Taos County. The funding is subject to annual reviews and approvals by Taos County as well as the State of New Mexico Human Services Department. In fiscal years 2013 and 2012, the Hospital recognized Sole Community Provider Funding of \$2,402,934 and \$6,611,013, respectively. Such amounts are reported as Net Patient Service Revenue in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Management expects to receive a similar amount of funding in fiscal year 2014 as in fiscal year 2013, however, funding in periods beyond calendar year-end 2013 is uncertain. This funding has been essential to the Hospital's financial results and as a result of the decline in funding and uncertainty over future funding, management has implemented a variety of measures aimed at reducing costs and enhancing revenue. See also Note 15.

Note 13 – Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Hospital provides credit, in the normal course of business, to patients located primarily in Taos, New Mexico, and their respective insurance companies. The Hospital performs ongoing credit evaluations of its patients and their respective insurance companies and does not require collateral with the extension of credit.

Note 15 – Subsequent Event

Subsequent to May 31, 2013 and effective September 13, 2013, management implemented a reduction in force, which management estimates will save approximately \$1.2 million in expenses on an annualized basis.

Also, subsequent to May 31, 2013 and to be made effective May 31, 2013 upon final agreement of the parties, the parties to the Taos Sports Medicine joint venture reached agreement on an intent to dissolve the joint venture. The transaction is not expected to trigger any financial obligations on the part of the Hospital that would require recognition of additional costs or liabilities. The impact to the fiscal year 2014 financial statements is not expected to be significant.
