NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Organization

Elliot Hospital is a not-for-profit acute care hospital which serves residents of Southern New Hampshire. Elliot Health System (the System) is the sole member of Elliot Hospital.

The sole corporate member for Elliot Physician Network (EPN), a not-for-profit network of primary care physicians, and Elliot Professional Services (EPS), a not-for-profit network of specialty care physicians, is Elliot Hospital. These consolidated financial statements reflect the combined financial position, results of operations and cash flows of EPN, EPS and Elliot Hospital. These entities are collectively referred to as "the Hospital" in these consolidated financial statements.

Elliot Hospital (excluding EPN and EPS) and the System comprise the Obligated Group as defined under a Master Trust Indenture dated October 1, 2003 (as amended) under the 2003 and 2009 bond offerings. See note 5.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of Elliot Hospital, EPN and EPS. All significant intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidation.

Charity Care

The Hospital has a formal charity care policy under which patient care is provided without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients who meet certain criteria. The Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, and therefore they are not reported as revenue. See note 9 with respect to costs of charity care.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include short-term investments and secured repurchase agreements which have an original maturity of three months or less when purchased.

The Hospital maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Hospital has not experienced any losses on such accounts.

Net Patient Service Revenues

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, per diem payments and fee schedules. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined. Changes in these estimates are reflected in the consolidated financial statements in the year in which they occur.

NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients, the Hospital provides a discount approximately equal to that of its largest private insurance payors. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided.

Accounts Receivable and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the thirdparty payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

The Hospitals' allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients decreased from 84% of self-pay accounts receivable at June 30, 2012 to 83% of self-pay accounts receivable at June 30, 2013. The Hospital's self-pay bad debt writeoffs increased \$6,119,254 from \$51,369,434 in 2012 to \$57,488,688 in 2013. The net change in the allowance as a percentage of self-pay accounts receivable and bad debt writeoffs was a result of collection trends.

Income Taxes

Elliot Hospital, EPN and EPS are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. Management evaluated the Hospital's tax positions and concluded the Hospital has maintained its tax-exempt status, does not have any significant unrelated business income and had taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the consolidated financial statements. With few exceptions, the Hospital is no longer subject to income tax examination by the U.S. federal or state tax authorities for years before 2010.

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Performance Indicator

For purposes of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major or central to the provision of health care services are reported as operating revenue and expenses. Peripheral transactions are reported as nonoperating gains or losses.

The consolidated statements of operations also include excess (deficiency) of revenues and nonoperating gains (losses) over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess (deficiency) of revenues and nonoperating gains (losses) over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include net assets released from restrictions for capital purchases, pension adjustments, and transfers to or from affiliates.

Classification of Net Assets

Gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of donated assets. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. When a donor restriction expires (when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as either net assets released from restrictions (for noncapital related items) or as net assets released from restrictions used for capital purchases (capital related items). Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained in perpetuity.

Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Investments and Investment Income

Investments, including funds held by trustee under revenue bond agreements, are measured at fair value in the consolidated balance sheets. Interest and dividend income on unlimited use investments and operating cash is reported within operating revenues. Investment income or loss on assets whose use is limited (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, and interest and dividends) is included in the excess (deficiency) of revenues and nonoperating gains (losses) over expenses as the Hospital has elected to reflect changes in the fair value of investments and assets whose use is limited, including both increases and decreases in value whether realized or unrealized in nonoperating gains or losses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law, in which case it is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Beneficial Interest in Perpetual Trusts

The Hospital has an irrevocable right to receive income earned on certain trust assets established for its benefit. Distributions received by the Hospital are restricted by the donor for use in nursing education and women's and children's services. The Hospital's interest in the fair value of the trust assets is included in assets whose use is limited. Changes in the market value of beneficial trust assets are reported as increases or decreases to permanently restricted net assets.

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Investment Policies

The Hospital's investment policies provide guidance for the prudent and skillful management of invested assets with the objective of preserving capital and maximizing returns. The invested assets include endowment, specific purpose and board designated (unrestricted) funds.

Endowment funds are identified as permanent in nature, intended to provide support for current or future operations and other purposes identified by the donor. These funds are managed with disciplined longer-term investment objectives and strategies designed to accommodate relevant, reasonable, or probable events.

Temporarily restricted funds are temporary in nature, restricted as to time or purpose as identified by the donor or grantor. These funds have various intermediate/long-term time horizons associated with specific identified spending objectives.

Board designated funds have various intermediate/long-term time horizons associated with specific spending objectives as determined by the Board of Trustees.

Management of these assets is designed to maximize total return while preserving the capital values of the funds, protecting the funds from inflation, and providing liquidity as needed. The objective is to provide a real rate of return that meets inflation, plus 4.5%, over a long-term time horizon (greater than 7 to 10 years).

The Hospital targets a diversified asset allocation that places emphasis on achieving its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Spending Policy for Appropriation of Assets for Expenditure

In accordance with the *Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act* (UPMIFA), the Hospital considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (a) the duration and preservation of the fund; (b) the purpose of the organization and the donor-restricted endowment fund; (c) general economic conditions; (d) the possible effect of inflation and deflation; (e) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments; (f) other resources of the organization; and (g) the investment policies of the organization.

Spending policies may be adopted by the Hospital, from time to time, to provide a stream of funding for the support of key programs. The spending policies are structured in a manner to ensure that the purchasing power of the assets is maintained while providing the desired level of annual funding to the programs. The Hospital currently has a policy allowing interest and dividend income earned on investments to be used for operations with the goal of keeping principal, including its appreciation, intact.

2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Inventories

Inventories of supplies and pharmaceuticals are carried at the lower of cost, determined on a weighted-average method, or market.

Bond Issuance Costs/Original Issue Discount

The bond issuance costs incurred to obtain financing for construction and renovation programs and the original issue discount are being amortized by the straight-line method over the life of the bonds. The original issue discount is presented as a reduction of the face amount of bonds payable.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at time of purchase, or fair market value at time of donation, less reductions in carrying value based upon impairment and less accumulated depreciation. The Hospital's policy is to capitalize expenditures for major improvements and charge maintenance and repairs as expenditures which do not extend the lives of the related assets. The provision for depreciation is computed on the straight-line method at rates intended to amortize the cost of the related assets over their estimated useful lives. Assets which have been purchased but not yet placed in service are included in construction in progress and no depreciation expense is recorded.

Federal Grant Revenue and Expenditures

Revenues and expenses under federal grant programs are recognized as the related expenditure is incurred.

Advertising Expense

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred and totaled approximately \$1,407,000 and \$1,419,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Retirement Benefits

The Hospital participates in a defined benefit pension plan for certain of its employees, the Elliot Health System Pension Plan (the Plan), which is sponsored by the System.

Effective July 1, 2006, the Plan was amended to close the Plan to employees hired after June 30, 2006. Eligible employees hired prior to July 1, 2006 are grandfathered under the Plan and will continue to accrue benefits as long as they remain at a participating System entity and in an eligible status.

2. <u>Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)</u>

The System's funding policy is to contribute amounts to the Plan sufficient to meet minimum funding requirements set forth in the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974*, plus such additional amounts as might be determined to be appropriate from time to time. The Plan is intended to constitute a plan described in Section 414(k) of the Internal Revenue Code, under which benefits derived from employer contributions are based on the separate account balances of participants in addition to the defined benefits under the Plan.

The System provides, and the Hospital participates in, a defined contribution program for all eligible employees hired on or after July 1, 2006. Under this program, eligible employees may receive annual employer contributions to a System sponsored tax sheltered annuity plan or 401(k) plan up to 3% of annual base pay.

The System also provides discretionary matching contributions to a tax sheltered annuity plan or 401(k) plan equal to up to one-half of the employee's contribution to a maximum of 4% of their annual base pay. Total expense incurred by the Hospital was \$2,971,061 and \$2,641,597 under these defined contribution plans for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The System sponsors deferred compensation plans for certain qualifying employees. The amounts ultimately due to employees are to be paid upon the employees attaining certain criteria, including age. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, \$7,555,005 and \$6,473,051, respectively, is reflected in assets whose use is limited and \$7,454,997 and \$6,323,039, respectively, in other long-term liabilities related to such agreements.

Workers' Compensation

The Hospital participates in a self-insured irrevocable workers' compensation trust, sponsored by the System, to fund anticipated losses for workers' compensation claims. The System maintains an excess insurance policy to limit its exposure on claims to \$550,000 (\$500,000 in 2012) per occurrence. Reserves for claims made and potential unreported claims have been established to provide for incurred but unpaid claims. The amount of the reserve has been determined by an actuarial consultant.

Employee Health and Dental Insurance

The Hospital participates in a self-insurance plan for employee health and dental, sponsored by the System. Under the terms of the plan, employees meeting certain eligibility requirements and their dependents are eligible for participation and, as such, the System is responsible for the administration of the plan and any resultant liability incurred. The System maintains individual stop-loss insurance coverage.

Employee Fringe Benefits

The Hospital has an earned time plan. Under this plan, each qualifying employee earns paid leave for each pay period worked. These hours of paid leave may be used for vacations, holidays or illnesses. Hours earned but not used are vested with the employee and are paid to the employee upon termination subject to certain limits. The Hospital accrues a hability for such paid leave as it is earned.

Malpractice Loss Contingencies

Prior to February 1, 2011, the System, including the Hospital, was insured against malpractice loss contingencies under claims-made insurance policies. A claims-made policy provides specific coverage for claims made during the policy period. The System maintained excess professional and general liability insurance policies to cover claims in excess of liability retention levels. Effective February 1, 2011, the System, including the Hospital, insures its medical malpractice risks through a multiprovider captive insurance company. Premiums paid are based upon actuarially determined amounts to adequately fund for expected losses. At June 30, 2013, there were no known malpractice claims outstanding for the Hospital which, in the opinion of management, will be settled for amounts in excess of insurance coverage, nor were there any unasserted claims or incidents which required specific loss accruals. The captive retains and funds up to actuarial expected loss amounts, and obtains reinsurance at various attachment points for individual and aggregate claims in excess of funding in accordance with industry practices. The Hospital's interest in the captive at June 30, 2013 represents approximately 50% of the captive, although control of the captive is equally shared by participating hospitals. The Hospital has recorded its interest in the captive's equity, totaling approximately \$1,863,000 and \$2,716,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, in other assets on the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Changes in the Hospital's interest are included in nonoperating gains (losses) on the accompanying consolidated statements of operations. The Hospital has established reserves to cover professional liability exposures for incurred but unpaid or unreported claims. The amounts of the reserves have been determined by actuarial consultants. The possibility exists, as a normal risk of doing business, that malpractice claims in excess of insurance coverage may be asserted against the Hospital.

In accordance with Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2010-24, "Health Care Entities" (Topic 954): Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries (ASU 2010-24), at June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital recorded a liability of \$5,626.851 and \$2,047,309, respectively, related to estimated professional liability losses covered under the captive. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital also recorded a receivable of \$5,626,851 and \$2,047,309, respectively, related to estimated recoveries under insurance coverage for recoveries of the potential losses. These amounts are included in self-insurance reserves and other liabilities, and other assets, respectively, on the consolidated balance sheets.

Litigation

The Hospital is involved in litigation and regulatory reviews arising in the ordinary course of business. After consultation with legal counsel, management estimates that these matters will be resolved without material adverse effect on the Hospital's financial position, results of operations or cash flows.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The fair value of financial instruments is determined by reference to various market data and other valuation techniques as appropriate. Financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, investments, accounts receivable, assets whose use is limited or restricted, accounts payable, estimated third-party payor settlements and long-term debt.

The fair value of all financial instruments other than long-term debt approximates their relative book value as these financial instruments have short-term maturities or are recorded at fair value as disclosed in note 13. The fair value of the Hospital's long-term debt is estimated using discounted cash flow analyses, based on the Hospital's current incremental borrowing rates for similar types of borrowing arrangements, and is disclosed in note 5 to the consolidated financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Estimates are used when accounting for the allowance for uncollectible accounts, long-lived assets, insurance costs, employee benefit plans, contractual allowances, third-party payor settlements and contingencies. It is reasonably possible that actual results could differ from those estimates. Adjustments made with respect to the use of estimates often relate to improved information not previously available.

Reclassifications

Certain 2012 amounts have been reclassified to permit comparison with the 2013 consolidated financial statements presentation format.

Subsequent Events

Management of the Hospital evaluated events occurring between the end of its fiscal year and September 19, 2013, the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

The Hospital maintains contracts with the Social Security Administration (Medicare) and the State of New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (Medicaid). The Hospital is paid a prospectively determined fixed price for Medicare and Medicaid inpatient acute care services depending on the type of illness or the patient's diagnostic related group classification. Reimbursement for Medicare for outpatient services is based upon a prospective standard rate for procedures performed or services rendered. Capital costs and certain Medicare and Medicaid outpatient services are also reimbursed on a prospectively determined fixed rate. The Hospital receives payment for other Medicare and Medicaid inpatient and outpatient services on a reasonable cost basis which are settled with retroactive adjustments upon completion and audit of related cost finding reports. The percentage of net patient service revenue earned from the Medicare and Medicaid programs was 27% and 6%, respectively, in 2013 and 27% and 5%, respectively, in 2012.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action including fines, penalties and exclusion from the Medicare and Medicaid programs. The Hospital believes that it is in substantial compliance with all applicable laws and regulations. However, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates could change by a material amount in the near term. Differences between amounts previously estimated and amounts subsequently determined to be recoverable or payable are included in net patient service revenues in the year that such amounts become known. The differences between amounts previously estimated and amounts subsequently determined to be recoverable from third-party payors increased net patient service revenues by approximately \$3,100,000 and \$2,200,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Hospital also maintains contracts with Anthem Blue Cross, Cigna, Harvard Pilgrim Health Care, certain commercial carriers, managed care plans and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge and per day, discounts from established charges and fee schedules.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Payments

The CMS Electronic Health Records (EHR) incentive programs provide a financial incentive for the "meaningful use" of certified EHR technology to achieve health and efficiency goals. To qualify for incentive payments, eligible organizations must successfully demonstrate meaningful use of certified EHR technology through various stages defined by CMS. The Hospital filed its Stage I Year 2 meaningful use attestations with CMS. Revenue totaling \$2,225,853 and \$1,176,750 associated with these meaningful use attestations was recorded as other revenue for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. In addition, receivable amounts of \$1,215,707 and \$1,176,750 were recorded in other assets at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Under the terms of the Series 2009A bonds payable to the Business Finance Authority of the State of New Hampshire and Series 2003B bonds payable to the New Hampshire Health and Education Facilities Authority (collectively, the Authorities) at June 30, 2013, debt service reserve funds are required to provide for payment of principal and interest if the Obligated Group fails to make required payments. The funds are held by a trustee and can be returned to the Obligated Group as the requirements of the fund (which are equal to the maximum amount of principal and interest due in any one future year) are decreased. The Obligated Group's agreement with the Authorities for the Series 2009A and 2003B bonds grants the Authorities a security interest in the Hospital's gross receipts and a mortgage on the Hospital's existing and future facilities and equipment. In addition, under the terms of the master indenture, the Obligated Group is required to meet certain covenant requirements. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Obligated Group was in compliance with these requirements.

Interest paid totaled \$9,232,192 and \$9,333,536 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. There was no interest capitalized for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012.

In 2011, the Hospital entered into a \$2.5 million note payable to finance a land purchase. Interest is payable annually at the rate of 4.75%. The outstanding principal balance is due and payable on the earlier of March 16, 2016 or ten days after the issuance of a building permit for construction of a structure on the purchased property.

Aggregate annual principal payments required under the bond, note and capital lease agreements for each of the five years ending June 30, 2018 are approximately \$2.602,000, \$2,671,000, \$5,304,000, \$2,920,000 and \$3.044,000, respectively.

The fair value, based on current market rates, of the Hospital's notes payable and long-term debt was approximately \$160,864,000 and \$168,409,000 as of June 30. 2013 and 2012, respectively.

During 2012, the Hospital entered into a \$15,000,000 unsecured line of credit agreement with a bank which is due on demand. The line of credit agreement bears interest at LIBOR plus 1.15% (1.35% at June 30, 2013). At June 30, 2013 and 2012, there were no borrowings outstanding under this agreement.

Management of the assets is designed to maximize total return while preserving the capital values of the fund, protecting the fund from inflation, and providing liquidity as needed for plan benefits. The objective is to provide a rate of return that meets inflation, plus 5.5%, over a long-term horizon.

In addition to the total return goal, the portfolio is constructed to hedge a portion of the interest rate risk of the Plan's liability. The portion of the interest rate risk hedged is the percent of assets allocated to fixed income investments multiplied by the Plan's funded status. The fixed income asset class is structured to reduce the volatility of the funded status by matching the duration of the Plan's liability which is currently approximately 18 years. The current strategic asset allocation target for the fixed income portfolio is 50% of total plan assets, which is designed to hedge approximately 35% of the plan liability.

These funds are managed as permanent funds with disciplined longer term investment objectives and strategies designed to meet cash flow requirements of the plan. Funds are managed in accordance with ERISA and all other regulatory requirements.

13. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value of a financial instrument is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Hospital uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Hospital often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Hospital utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Hospital is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

Level 2 – Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in less active dealer or broker markets. Valuations are obtained from third party pricing services for identical or similar assets or liabilities.

Level 3 – Valuations for assets and liabilities that are derived from other valuation methodologies, including option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques, and not based on market exchange, dealer or broker traded transactions. Level 3 valuations incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets or liabilities.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Hospital performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities that are subject to fair value measurements. At each reporting period, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets and habilities has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used:

Marketable Equity Securities

Marketable equity securities are valued based on stated market prices and at the net asset value of shares held by the Hospital at year end, which generally results in classification as Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

Fixed Income Securities

The fair value for debt instruments is determined by using broker or dealer quotations, external pricing providers, or alternative pricing sources with reasonable levels of price transparency. The Hospital holds U.S. governmental and federal agency debt instruments, municipal bonds, corporate bonds and foreign bonds, which are primarily classified as Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

13. Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

Limited Partnership Interests in Hedge Funds

The Hospital invests in certain alternative investments that consist of limited partnership interests in investment funds, which, in turn, invest in diversified portfolios predominantly comprised of equity and fixed income securities, as well as options, futures contracts, and some other less liquid investments. Management has approved procedures pursuant to the methods in which the Hospital values these investments at fair value, which ordinarily will be the amount equal to the pro-rata interest in the net assets of the limited partnership, as such value is supplied by, or on behalf of, each investment from time to time, usually monthly and/or quarterly by the investment manager. These investments are classified as Level 3.

Hospital management is responsible for the fair value measurements of alternative investments reported in the consolidated financial statements. Such amounts are generally determined using audited financial statements of the funds and/or recently settled transactions. Because of inherent uncertainty of valuation of certain alternative investments, the estimate of the fund manager or general partner may differ from actual values, and differences could be significant. Management believes that reported fair values of its alternative investments at the balance sheet dates are reasonable.

Beneficial Interests in Perpetual Trusts

The Hospital is the beneficiary of two perpetual trusts held by a third party. Under the terms of the trusts, the Hospital has the irrevocable right to receive the income earned on the assets of the trusts in perpetuity, but never receives the assets held in the trusts. The Hospital has transparency into the holdings of the trusts. These investments are generally classified as Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

Employee Benefit Plan and Other

Underlying plan investments within these funds are stated at quoted market prices. These investments are generally classified as Level 1 within the fair value hierarchy.

The Hospital's Level 3 investments consist of so called alternative investments, which total approximately \$2,075,000 and \$2.811,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The alternative investments consist of interests in three funds that are not actively traded. One of the funds, which consists of a private equity fund, is invested with Lehman Brothers, which has seen certain divisions declare bankruptcy in September 2008 and is undergoing liquidation. For this fund, which has a carrying value of \$324,184 at June 30, 2013, risk exists as the assets are held in a division of Lehman Brothers that has filed for bankruptcy protection. While insurance coverage exists to protect assets in the event of a bankruptcy, recoverability cannot be assured since eventual losses at Lehman Brothers may exceed the insurer's ability to pay claims.

Investments, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. As such, it is reasonably possible that changes in the fair value of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets and statements of operations.

Investment Strategies

Fixed Income Securities (Debt Instruments)

The primary purpose of fixed income investments is to provide a highly predictable and dependable source of income, preserve capital, and reduce the volatility of the total portfolio and hedge against the risk of deflation or protracted economic contraction.

Marketable Equity Securities

The primary purpose of equity investments is to provide appreciation of principal and growth of income with the recognition that this requires the assumption of greater market volatility and risk of loss. The total equity portion of the portfolio will be broadly diversified according to economic sector, industry, number of holdings and other characteristics including style and capitalization. The Hospital may employ multiple equity investment managers, each of whom may have distinct investment styles. Accordingly, while each manager's portfolio may not be fully diversified, it is expected that the combined equity portfolio will be broadly diversified.

Limited Partnership Interests in Hedge Funds

The primary purpose of alternative investments is to provide further portfolio diversification and to reduce overall portfolio volatility by investing in strategies that are less correlated with traditional equity and fixed income investments. Alternative investments may provide access to strategies otherwise not accessible through traditional equities and fixed income such as derivative instruments, real estate, distressed debt and private equity and debt.

Fair Value of Other Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Hospital in estimating the "fair value" of other financial instruments in the accompanying consolidated financial statements and notes thereto:

Cash and cash equivalents: The carrying amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets for these financial instruments approximate their fair values.

Accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued expenses: The carrying amounts reported in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets approximate their respective fair values due to the short maturities of these instruments.

Long-term debt The fair value of the notes payable and long-term debt, as disclosed in note 5, was calculated based upon discounted cash flows through maturity based on market rates currently available for borrowings with similar maturities.

14. Medicaid Enhancement Tax

Under the State of New Hampshire's tax code, the State imposes a Medicaid Enhancement Tax (MET) equal to 5.5% of net patient service revenues, with certain exclusions. The amount of tax incurred by the Hospital for fiscal 2013 and 2012 was \$11,674,727 and \$16,107,100, respectively.

In the fall of 2010, in order to remain in compliance with stated federal regulations, the State of New Hampshire adopted a new approach related to Medicaid disproportionate share funding retroactive to July 1, 2010. Unlike the former funding method, the State's approach led to a payment that was not directly based on, and did not equate to, the level of tax imposed. As a result, the legislation created some level of losses at certain New Hampshire hospitals, while other hospitals realized gains. In addition, as part of the State of New Hampshire's biennial budget process for the two-year period ended June 30, 2013, the State eliminated disproportionate share payments to certain New Hampshire hospitals, including Elliot Hospital. As a result, during the fiscal years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital paid the State of New Hampshire's MET based on 5.5% of net patient service revenues, with certain exclusions but did not receive disproportionate share payments.

In response to the State's actions, the Hospital reorganized its structure and implemented other cost reducing initiatives. Costs associated with this reorganization included in 2012 operations totaled approximately \$2,328,000.
