

This community health problem cannot be ignored and requires careful planning and forethought Fortunately, WellSpan has done both

We take measures to care for those who have no insurance and are unable to pay We offer discounted care to individuals whose income falls within 300 percent of federal poverty guidelines Additionally, all uninsured patients, regardless of whether they qualify for charity care, receive discounts similar to those offered by private insurance companies We offer free care to patients who participate in our charity care program

Together with our community partners, we support programs to take primary care and other services into urban and rural communities, improve access to oral health care and help people establish a "medical home" with a primary care physician

Helping the uninsured make community health connections

Wally, age 35, arrives at WellSpan's HealthConnect van at the York County School of Technology with a painfully swollen, bruised index finger on his right hand

The nail is dark and the finger is stiff Wally slammed the door shut on his finger as he tried to prevent a child from running into his car door



"No good deed goes unpunished," jokes Wally

Wally has no health insurance He works as a temp since losing his fulltime job last year

Sarah, Wally's wife, does not work enough hours to afford a health insurance premium They do not pay for health insurance in order to meet their expenses for shelter, food and raising their 10-yearold son, Dennis

While Wally is being examined, Sarah talks with a care coordinator about her depression She realizes she would feel better if she took her antidepressant, but the cost is too high

She shares her worries about Wally not being able to work because of his injured finger, she worries that she might be late to work and that it could lead to her losing her job

The HealthConnect staff consists of physicians, nurse practitioners, care coordinators, drivers/clerks, volunteers, administrative and maintenance staff. They provide care and help families make the health connections they need

Wally needs an antibiotic for his finger Wally and Sarah want to pay for the prescription because personal pride is important to them

The staff calls the Healthy Community Pharmacy, a program of Healthy York Network's community effort to address needs of people who are uninsured and underinsured The pharmacy is able to fill the prescription for an affordable fee and it will be ready in an hour

A Healthy York Network application is given to the family with instructions on where, when and how to complete and deliver it for review Wally and Sarah understand that it is not insurance, but a discount program for support

Wally takes the order to have an X-ray completed and is told that the provider will call him with results Wally knows that he can come back to HealthConnect for follow up, if needed The goal, however, is for Wally and Sarah to develop a relationship with a primary care provider for ongoing care

WellSpan can help them reach that goal

Before they leave the HealthConnect van, they receive information about the importance of good dental hygiene, toothbrushes and some kid-friendly reading materials about dental hygiene for Dennis Sarah also gets a phone number for Crisis Intervention, in case her depression and negative thoughts get worse

Staff members reinforce Wally and Sarah's positives—their parenting skills, their commitment to each other and their willingness to partner with HealthConnect to make a positive impact on their health

They also receive a card with the date of their visit to HealthConnect, the names of staff members they met and a phone number for non-urgent questions

Wally and Sarah are among the more than 800 patients the HealthConnect team treated from July 2012 through June 2013

"Our job is to help the uninsured make community health connections," said Kelly Osmolinski-Smith, manager of Community Health Connections "Our goal is a healthier community despite the individual's resources Our patients are our neighbors in York and Adams counties"

WellSpan's HealthConnect is a community-based medical outreach program designed to "connect" uninsured families with the medical services and health care programs that they need through a mobile service regularly provided in York and Adams counties.



In 2013, WellSpan Health provided over \$205 million in care for the uninsured and underinsured

The net cost of care provided in 2013

- Charity Care \$22 1 million in free care to patients who participated in our charity care program
- Medicare \$88 9 million in cost greater than what was paid to WellSpan by Medicare
- Medicaid \$68 million in cost greater than what was paid to WellSpan by Medicaid
- Uncompensated Care \$26 million in services to patients who received care for which they did not pay and who did not participate in the charity care program

Healthy Communities



Collaboration is vital to making an impact on our community health

At WellSpan, we wholeheartedly agree with the World Health Organization's assessment that health is "a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being, not merely the absence of disease or infirmity" And we recognize the dangers and issues facing a community that cannot achieve this level of health

To help our communities become healthy places to live, work and play, we are constantly planning for the future, developing partnerships, building community assets, engaging citizens, and sponsoring initiatives Our efforts are broad based and wide reaching, but so is the need We believe that our progress, on all fronts, continues to make a difference

Saving victims of sudden cardiac arrest through community action

A 19-year-old Gettysburg College student takes a routine jog through the battlefield Suddenly, she grows weak and collapses It's a sudden cardiac arrest

Each year, more than 350,000 Americans suffer the same experience Less than 10 percent survive

An automated external defibrillator (AED) can make all the difference It sends an electric shock to the victim's heart to restore a normal rhythm

"An AED's shock to the heart—when applied within six minutes after the event—significantly increases a person's chance of survival," said Deb Sheets, RN, WellSpan Community Health Improvement

Sheets is the coordinator of WellSpan's Operation Heartbeat program, which places AEDs across rural Adams County Operation Heartbeat AEDs can be found in a variety of public spaces, and inside every police cruiser in the county

"In many emergencies, police officers arrive on the scene first," Sheets explained "So we're placing AEDs in patrol cars and making sure the officers are trained on them"



Fortunately for the young college student, Operation Heartbeat also stocks the ranger vehicles at Gettysburg National Military Park As she lay unconscious, an alert ranger retrieved an AED and applied its two sticky pads to her chest The briefcase-sized device went to work, analyzing her abnormal heartbeat and delivering its lifesaving shock

The student made a full recovery She graduated in the spring of 2013 and returned to thank the rangers

At least five other people have been saved with Operation Heartbeat AEDs since the program's inception in 2001

"When one of our AEDs saves a life, we recognize the law enforcement officer or community member who played a part in that save," said Kevin Alvarnaz, director, WellSpan Community Health Improvement

Recently, Operation Heartbeat replaced its 70 aging AEDs with brand new units—and added a dozen new ones—thanks to funding from a federal grant Nancy Newton, a grants officer with WellSpan, said federal officials were impressed by public outpouring for the program

"All of the different police departments were so supportive of this project," Newton said "So were the Gettysburg Adams Chamber of Commerce and the national military park"

The federal grant also enabled Operation Heartbeat to begin offering free CPR and AED classes to the public

"It's not just about placing AEDs out there in the community," Alvarnaz said "It's about training lay people in AED use, so that they feel ready to respond in the case of an emergency"

Sometimes healthier living starts with simple behavior changes

At WellSpan, we recognize that unhealthy behaviors can harm an individual, a family and an entire community We also recognize that simple behavior changes and access to the right information can make all the difference in promoting lifelong wellness That's why we create, support and contribute to numerous programs designed to lay the groundwork for healthier living

Annual leadership conferences inspire 7th-graders across York and Adams counties

The impact of bullying. Managing feelings of isolation. Lessons on Internet and cellphone safety. Self-discovery and goal setting. Avoiding unhealthy behaviors.

These are just a few of the important topics that seventh grade students across York and Adams counties receive during special one-day leadership conferences each October

Supported by WellSpan, the annual young women's and young men's leadership conferences in both counties are designed to educate, encourage and empower young people



Seventh grade girls and boys are the focus of the conferences for a reason Research shows that selfesteem among kids often declines around seventh-grade

"It's a really difficult time in their life as they're growing up," said Dianne Moore, RN, manager, Women's Health and Clinical Quality, WellSpan, who helps to coordinate events in both counties "We're trying to plant seeds with some

positive messages about reaching their greatest potential and about the importance of being a leader "

At both young women's conferences, held respectively at Gettysburg College and York College, the girls listen to a keynote presentation on important topics and then attend workshops on issues ranging from health and body image to peer pressure and healthy relationships to career choices

The speeches and workshops give the students "take-home" messages Every topic is aimed at this age group Each presenter provides a take-home message that enhances the students' personal leadership and their wellness

Separate, same-day leadership events for the boys feature a keynote speaker and guests who discuss key issues aimed specifically to the male audience

The young people who experience the events have shared how it allowed them to talk openly about the common problems they face, like friendship and relationship issues, reaching their goals and overcoming self-consciousness

Students have shared personal stories on the challenges of breaking away from a crowd and forging their own path. The conference teaches students about following their dreams and finding ways to make those dreams a reality

They also learn that their dreams can sometimes be clouded by unhealthy behavior - like using drugs or alcohol, developing eating disorders, joining a gang or being involved in unhealthy friendships or relationships

"The age group is mature enough to absorb the information and start building a foundation for lifetime skills and good decision-making," said John Wagner co-chair of the planning committee for the Adams County leadership conferences

Chronic Care



Living better with a chronic illness

For 125 million Americans, chronic illness is a never-ending problem that in many cases limits their lives, their sense of freedom and joy Yet, with prevention, education, detection, treatment and care, many of these chronic conditions can be managed and even alleviated Clearly, a better life is a better plan To help achieve it, WellSpan works with individuals across south central Pennsylvania and northern Maryland on a variety of services and programs conceived and designed to improve the lives of those with chronic illness

Heart disease patients learning the art of stress reduction

The future for patients suffering from heart disease is uncertain

They must cope with changes in lifestyle and limitations One question on the minds of many of these patients is, "How long do I have to live?"

"Heart disease patients often experience up and down times and this plays on their emotions," said Joann Smith, a nurse practitioner with the Heart Failure Clinic, WellSpan Gettysburg Hospital



"They often experience depression, anxiety, fatigue and pain"

Recognizing this, the
WellSpan Center for
Mind/Body Health
collaborated with the Heart
Failure Clinic, part of
WellSpan Heart and
Vascular, to develop a
stress reduction class for
cardiac outpatients The
class was open to anyone in
the community with a

cardiac diagnosis, along with their family member or caregiver

Julie Falk, a nurse and yoga instructor who trained at the Center for Mindfulness at the University of Massachusetts Medical School, is teaching the eight-week class to 18 patients

She teaches meditation and gentle yoga as tools for relaxation and to identify conscious thought patterns that foster stress

"Once people mindfully evaluate the way they think and behave, they are able to reduce their sources of stress," offered Falk She said many patients with heart disease have difficulty keeping their mind in the present

"They are constantly projecting into the future," said Falk "We work with them to learn to live in the present moment, which is the only time we can ever influence anything Learning to use their breath to calm and re-orient themselves gives them some control"

Smith and Falk agree that patients have responded well to the stress reduction class

"Most patients realize that stress has had a big impact on their lives," said Smith "It can affect their sleep, their mood and their outlook on life

"Patients tell me that the class is helping them," added Smith "I can see a difference in their attitudes"

Smith, Falk and nurse Laura James are using a grant from the Beryl Institute to conduct a research project with the group

In preparing the research proposal, a lot of literature supporting this type of program for cancer patients was found. There were, however, only a few published studies showing the benefits of mindfulness-based stress reduction training and its effect on cardiac patients.

As part of the study, class participants had their depression, anxiety, fatigue and pain measured pre-class Those factors will be measured post-class

"We're giving patients the tools to help them reduce stress," said Smith "This is not just another pill"

Smith and Falk are optimistic that the study will show positive results

Plans are to offer the class again and to perhaps extend it to patients with other chronic diseases in the future

At WellSpan, we believe in the power of new ideas, new approaches, new discoveries and new people That's why we sponsor programs that train the next generation of physicians, nurses and other clinical professionals These programs allow us to stay abreast of new techniques to prevent, detect, diagnose and treat medical problems, and ensure an adequate supply of essential clinicians for the future

WellSpan's York Cancer Center is helping to lead the fight against Breast Cancer

Rita Allison, 59, of York, was in her last year of teaching at Dallastown's Loganville-Springfield Elementary when she was diagnosed with stage 1 breast cancer Her treatment plan required two surgeries followed by 33 radiation treatments

Prior to beginning radiation, the team at WellSpan's York Cancer Center informed her of

her eligibility for a clinical breast trial to determine if radiation therapy is more effective with or without Herceptin in preventing subsequent occurrences of breast cancer Allison was selected to be part of the control group for the study

"I think it is great," says Allison "I am thrilled to be part of something that has the potential to advance breast cancer treatment"



As part of the clinical trial, Allison receives check ups and mammograms every six months for five years

"I feel safer because of the regular check ups," remarks Allison "Once you finish radiation, it's like—now what? But being part of this study has allowed me to help advance treatment and get very regular monitoring. I feel safer "

Allison was so grateful for the care that she received at the York Cancer Center that she and a friend started volunteering at WellSpan

"I am so fortunate to be where I am today and be able to give back I split my time between volunteering in pediatrics and at the cancer center I just love it I am blessed"



Achievements

In 2013, WellSpan continued its efforts to create a health system that supports the changing needs of individuals and families in south central Pennsylvania and northern Maryland

These efforts have been recognized with the following achievements:

- WellSpan York Hospital received the Get with the Guidelines—Resuscitation Gold Quality Achievement Award from the American Heart Association
- WellSpan received a \$125,000 grant from the Highmark Foundation to form a regional learning collaborative around "super utilizers" of health care
- WellSpan York Hospital participated in a national clinical trial that was named
 The Clinical Trial of the Year by The Society for Clinical Trials The clinical trial
 aimed to find out whether anti-seizure medication works better when given as an
 I V directly into a vein or when given as shot in the muscle
- WellSpan York Hospital was one of 15 Pennsylvania hospitals to receive a Silver Medal of Honor from the U S Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) for their successful donation and organ transplant outcomes
- WellSpan York Hospital's Level 1 Trauma Program was ranked among the best in the country for traumatic brain injury (TBI) and shock patient outcomes, according to the Trauma Quality Improvement Program
- WellSpan Gettysburg Hospital received recognition from The Leapfrog Group and VHA Mid-Atlantic APEX (Achieving Patient Care Excellence) for its patient safety efforts
- WellSpan York Hospital, was one of five hospitals in central Pennsylvania, recognized by U S News and World Report as one of the Best Regional Hospitals in its 2012-13 Best Hospitals publication
- Facing Cancer Together, an interactive community education partnership of WellSpan Health and WITF Public Media, earned a Mid-Atlantic Emmy Award for Outstanding Achievement in Community Service
- WellSpan Gettysburg Hospital's breast cancer program received a three-year accreditation from the National Accreditation Program for Breast Cancers (NAPBC) The breast cancer program is one of only 30 accredited centers in Pennsylvania It is the only one in Adams, Franklin and York counties and northern Maryland

- WellSpan York Hospital maintained its Joint Commission-designated Primary Stroke Center for two additional years
- WellSpan was named the winner of the 2012 Most Improved Safety Award by Walsh Integrated
- Received a NRC Picker symposium award as one of two "Most Improved Organizations" in the pediatric category The award recognized York Pediatric Medicine and Springdale Pediatric Medicine's significant increase in the percentage of patients rating their doctor a 9 or 10 on the NRC Picker patient survey
- WellSpan York Hospital's Family Medicine Residency program, which operates
 Tar Wars in York County, received an award at the national conference Tar
 Wars educates children about the benefits of being tobacco-free
- Implemented a mandatory flu vaccine policy for all of its staff members, volunteers, physicians, vendors, contractors and health care students
- Announced a partnership with the City of York that will establish a WellSpan Police Training Center, a facility that will enhance the skills and competencies of area police officers as well as provide secure storage of evidence for crime investigations
- WellSpan York Hospital received a three-star rating, the highest possible, in cardiac surgery performance by The Society of Thoracic Surgeons
- WellSpan York Hospital named as a Blue Distinction Center for Spine Surgery and Knee and Hip Replacement by Capital Blue Cross
- The York Cancer Center was reaccredited for three years, including six commendations, by the American College of Surgeons Committee on Cancer

WellSpan remained steadfast in its focus on building a healthy community and providing care to all, including the most vulnerable citizens, by:

- Continuing to sponsor innovative outreach efforts and providing \$22 1 million in free care and an additional \$26 million in services which were not reimbursed
- Providing a safety net of care for uninsured and underinsured individuals through such services as Healthy York Network, HealthConnect, WellSpan York Hospital Community Health Center, and WellSpan Medical Group
- Sponsoring the annual Adams County Community Health Summit, which addressed key mental health issues facing people of all ages in our local communities

- WellSpan co-sponsored the Go Local for Health Summit held in Gettysburg which addressed issues of affordable and accessible healthy eating and recreational opportunities in south central Pennsylvania
- Developing a wide range of educational opportunities for today's healthcare professionals while working to prepare the next generation of physicians, nurses and healthcare workers

WellSpan worked to create a more coordinated, efficient and viable health care system by:

- Continuing to develop an electronic health record as a means to coordinate care among physicians and enhance the patient's ability to access their personal health care information
- Enrolling more than 35,000 patients in the MyWellSpan patient portal which allows patients to access their health care information in a convenient and timely manner



\$1,294,788,000







TOTAL HOSPITAL ADMISSIONS*





(Gettysburg Hospital, York Hospital, Apple Hill Surgical Center and WellSpan Surgery & Rehabilitation Hospital)



TOTAL PRIMARY CARE VISITS







Generous Supporters

From board members to hospital greeters to hospice aides, community members have for more than a century served WellSpan Likewise, thousands of individuals and businesses have advanced WellSpan Health's mission with financial contributions to its two local foundations. Our community's continued generosity supports our charitable mission of service and enables WellSpan to continue preparing and planning to support the future health needs of our region.

In fiscal year 2013, funds raised by WellSpan's philanthropic organizations allowed WellSpan to

- Help the most vulnerable children in our community, those who have been victims of sexual abuse, through funding of the Sexual Assault Forensic Examiner program by both our Kids First Campaign and Book Nook Bonanza event
- Fund WellSpan VNA Home Care through the Monopoly Tournament, as well as through the Dedi Sykes Educational Endowment, which provides opportunities for VNA staff to further their clinical education
- Fund patient assistance through the Cancer Patient Help Fund, Joe Jerardi Fund, and Dialysis Patient Help Fund, providing critical support for rent, food, transportation, and utilities for financially qualified patients over and above any charity care provided to them
- Provide funding for multiple years of support for the Cribs for Kids program, which provides a safe sleeping environment for families and their newborns who could not otherwise afford a crib
