Applying for a Grant

The grant process will now be conducted through the online system on the foundation's website (http://foundationcenter.org/grantmaker/birminghamfdn/apply.html). Grant applicants will first submit a letter of inquiry, and if accepted, will receive email notification to complete a grant application. Grant applicants will be able to copy and paste and/or upload documents straight to the grant application. Applications can also be saved and completed later if not all information is available.

Limitations

Grants are limited to organizations, which qualify as public charity for 501(c)(3) tax exemption.

Grants are not normally made for operating budgets, deficits, fund-raising campaigns, general research, scholarships, political campaigns, or loans.

Grants are not made to individuals, to other private foundations, for sectarian religious activities, or for the efforts to influence legislation unless grant-related.

Grants are awarded for a limited period of time, such as 1-3 years.

Most grant awards will be in the range of \$2,500 to \$50,000.

Vision

The Birmingham Foundation was created as a private foundation in May 1996 with assets from the sale of the South Side Hospital. The Foundation seeks grantees who will match its vision and priorities as it invests in the health of the local community. The neighborhoods in its target area include: Allentown, Arlington, Arlington Heights, Beltzhoover, Bon Air, Carrick, Duquesne Heights, Knoxville, Mt. Oliver, Mt. Washington, and South Side.

Community Initiatives

As part of its vision and mission and in addition to its grantmaking, the Birmingham Foundation also dedicates resources to a number of other evolving initiatives that respond to community needs. During this year, that included:

Houses an online edition of the **Birmingham Directory**, a resource guide to health and human services providers in South Pittsburgh on the Foundation's website www.birminghamfoundation.org.

Creation and publication of the **2013 Summer Fun in the South Guide** for local children, youth and teens to increase awareness and access to positive summer activities. The Foundation publishes the guide as an insert in the local newspaper, and distributes an additional 6,000 copies to local schools and nonprofit organizations.

As part of its 15th Anniversary celebration activities, the Foundation donated 500 reusable cloth shopping bags to food pantries in the South Pittsburgh area and donated 200 BPA-free water bottles to kids attending summer camp programs in the Hilltop. It also released an online 15th Anniversary Report, highlighting the work of 10 Foundation grantees in South Pittsburgh, including testimonials from program participants.

The Foundation also hosts meetings for the **Minority Emergency Preparedness Task Force**, which assesses the emergency preparedness needs of Hilltop communities.

Technical assistance is also provided on an ongoing basis to grantees, other nonprofit organizations, local officials and community leaders with the purpose of increasing capacity, networking and leveraging other resources.

BIRMINGHAM FOUNDATION Brief Overview

The Birmingham Foundation is a private (independent) community-focused foundation dedicated to health-related and human services grantmaking in South Pittsburgh. Our Board of Directors is guided by this vision statement: The Foundation serves as a change agent for improved health and wellness in South Pittsburgh through the dynamic use of resources such as grantmaking, information-sharing, partnering and leveraging of assets.

Founded in 1996 as a private foundation with assets from the sale of South Side Hospital to UPMC, the Birmingham Foundation has awarded over \$14.5 million in grants to over 175 organizations since grantmaking began in 1997. Our target area includes 13 communities, among which are Allentown, Arlington, Beltzhoover, Carrick, Knoxville, Mt. Oliver, Mt Washington, and the South Side (zip codes 15203, 15210 and 15211).

Our priority areas include: improving youth outcomes, improving health care outcomes, and strategies for neighborhood development. Focus areas also include vulnerable populations and health disparities. Letters of interest are accepted year-round with grants awarded in April and November. Visit our website at www.birminghamfoundation.org for grant guidelines and application instructions.

In addition to grantmaking, the Foundation serves as a resource partner to develop and share information and promote collaboration on health-related issues through summits, convening groups, and publications. The latter include, *The Birmingham Directory, a* resource guide to health, human services and community services in South Pittsburgh, *Reweaving the Social Fabric,* a community health assessment, an annual *Summer Fun in the South* youth program guide, and biannual reports. The Foundation has played a role in the formation of several local efforts, including the South Pittsburgh Coalition for Peace and Hilltop Health Ministries Consortium. The Foundation convenes meetings of the Minority Emergency Preparedness Task Force and was previously fiscal agent for the Hilltop Alliance.

The Foundation is ably guided by a very active 11-member Board of Directors which represents the community in making decisions regarding both our grantmaking investments and our financial investments. Board Chair Terry Wirginis, one of five founding members whose commitment continues, leads the Board. Directors include Maurita Bryant, Hugo Churchill, Don Gordon, Carey Harris, Beth Marcello, Mike Marcu, Kenneth McCrory, William Simmons, Eileen Smith, and Biff Swager. Floyd R. Ganassi is an *Emeritus Chair* and Jane Roesch and Roberta Smith are *Emeritus Directors*.

Foundation staff includes Executive Director Mark Bibro and Administrative Assistant, Chris Mason.
