St Anthony's Medical Center and Affiliates (the "Medical Center") primarily earns revenue by providing inpatient, outpatient and emergency care services to patients in the St Louis metropolitan area. The Medical Center also provides home care and physician services in the same geographic location.

Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements of the Medical Center include the accounts of St Anthony's Medical Center, St Anthony's Foundation, St Anthony's Charitable Foundation, Heart Specialty Associates, LLC and St Anthony's Physician Organization all of which are under common control The Medical Center is a 75 percent owner in South County PET Imaging, LLC, an imaging center and a 52 percent owner in Plaza Surgery Services Company, an outpatient surgery center. The accounts of these entities are included in the Medical Center's consolidated financial statements. All significant inter-company transactions and balances have been eliminated in the consolidation. Noncontrolling interest are not significant and are included in unrestricted net assets in the consolidated financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

Cash Equivalents

The Medical Center considers all liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market accounts with brokers and certificates of deposit

At June 30, 2013, the Medical Center's cash accounts exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$93,962

Investments and Investment Return

Investments in equity securities having a readily determinable fair value and in all debt securities are carried at fair value. Other investments are valued at the lower of cost (or fair value at time of donation, if acquired by contribution) or fair value. Investment return includes dividend, interest and other investment income, realized gains and losses on investments carried at fair value, and

realized gains and losses on other investments. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses as reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets held by trustees and assets set aside by the board of directors for future capital improvements over which the board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Medical Center are included in current assets.

Patient Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, the Medical Center analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts.

For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Medical Center analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payer has not yet paid, or for payers who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely)

For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Medical Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated or provided by policy) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts

Supplies

The Medical Center states supply inventories at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method or market

Property and Equipment

Property, land improvements and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost and are depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of each asset. Assets under capital lease obligations are depreciated over the shorter of the lease term or their respective estimated useful lives.

The estimated useful lives for each major depreciable classification of property and equipment are as follows

Buildings and improvements	10 - 60 years
Land improvements	5 - 25 years
Equipment	3 - 10 years

Donations of property and equipment are reported at fair value as an increase in unrestricted net assets unless use of the assets is restricted by the donor. Monetary gifts that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. The expiration of such restrictions is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets when the donated asset is placed in service.

The Medical Center capitalizes interest costs as a component of construction in progress, based on interest costs of borrowing specifically for the project, net of interest earned on investments acquired with the proceeds of the borrowing

Deferred Financing Costs

Deferred financing costs represent costs incurred in connection with the issuance of long-term debt Such costs are being amortized over the term of the respective debt using the straight-line method

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Medical Center has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose

Excess (Deficiency) of Revenues Over Expenses

The consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets include excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess (deficiency) of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, changes in fair value of interest rate swaps, changes in minimum pension liability and certain other items

Change in Accounting Principle

In 2013, the Medical Center changed its method of presentation and disclosure of patient service revenue, provision for uncollectible accounts and the allowance for doubtful accounts in accordance with Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities The major changes associated with ASU 2011-07 are to reclassify the provision for uncollectible accounts related to patient service revenue to a deduction from patient service revenue and to provide enhanced disclosures are the Medical Center's policies related to uncollectible accounts. The change had no effect on prior year change in net assets

Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payers and others for services rendered and include estimated retroactive revenue adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition in revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and such estimated amounts are revised in future periods as adjustments become known

Charity Care

The Medical Center provides care without charge or at amounts less than its established rates to patients meeting certain criteria under its charity care policy. Because the Medical Center does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, these amounts are not reported as net patient service revenue. The Medical Center's direct and indirect costs for services furnished under its charity care policy aggregated approximately \$5,484 and \$8,369 in 2013 and

2012, respectively The cost of charity care provided is determined by computing a ratio of cost (total operating expense) to gross charges and multiplying that ratio by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing care to charity patients

In addition to the uncompensated care, the Medical Center maintains a community benefits program designed to positively impact the health status of the communities served. These services include outreach programs (designed to deliver health care services to under-served communities), medical education and research activities and direct cash and in-kind charitable contributions. Direct cash contributions to unrelated organizations supporting missions consistent with the Medical Center were \$548 and \$726, for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Contributions

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are accrued at estimated fair value at the date each promise is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions. Receipt of contributions which are conditional are reported as liabilities until the condition is eliminated or the contributed assets are returned to the donor.

Estimated Malpractice Costs

An annual estimated provision is accrued for the self-insured portion of medical malpractice claims and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported

Self-insurance

The Medical Center is self-insured for a portion of its exposure to risk of loss from employee health and worker's compensation claims. Annual estimated provisions are accrued for the self-insured portion of employee health and workers compensation claims and includes an estimate of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not yet reported.

Income Taxes

All of the not-for-profit entities of the Medical Center have been recognized as exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of state law. However, the Medical Center is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

The Medical Center files tax returns in the U S federal and state jurisdictions. With few exceptions, the Medical Center is no longer subject to examinations by taxing authorities for years before 2010.

Electronic Health Records Incentive Program

The Electronic Health Records Incentive Program, enacted as part of the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*, provides for one-time incentive payments under both the Medicare and Medicaid programs to eligible hospitals that demonstrate meaningful use of certified electronic health records technology (EHR) Payments under the Medicare program are generally made for up to four years based on a statutory formula. Payments under the Medicaid program are generally made for up to four years based upon a statutory formula, as determined by the state, which is approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Payment under both programs are contingent on the hospital continuing to meet escalating meaningful use criteria and any other specific requirements that are applicable for the reporting period. The final amount for any payment year is determined based upon an audit by the fiscal intermediary. Events could occur that would cause the final amounts to differ materially from the initial payments under the program

The Medical Center recognizes revenue ratably over the reporting period starting at the point when management is reasonably assured it will meet all of the meaningful use objectives and any other specific grant requirements applicable for the reporting period

In 2012, the St Anthony's Physician organization completed the first-year requirements under the Medicare program and has recorded revenue of approximately \$669, which is included in other revenue within operating revenues in the consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets

In 2013, the Medical Center completed the first-year requirements under the Medicare program and has recorded revenue of approximately \$5,712, which is included in other revenue within operating revenues in the consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date of the Independent Auditor's Report, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued

Note 2: Net Patient Service Revenue

The Medical Center recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payer coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Medical Center recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Medical Center's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Medical Center records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. This provision for uncollectible accounts is presented on the statement of operations as a component of net patient service revenue.

The Medical Center has agreements with third-party payers that provide for payments to the Medical Center at amounts different from its established rates These payment arrangements include

Medicare Inpatient acute care services and substantially all outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic and other factors. Certain inpatient nonacute services and defined medical education are paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Medical Center is reimbursed for certain services at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Medical Center and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor.

Medicaid Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are reimbursed based on prospectively determined rates

Managed Care and Other The Medical Center has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Medical Center under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges and prospectively determined daily rates.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are complex and subject to interpretation and change. As a result, it is reasonably possible that recorded estimates will change materially in the near term

The fair value of alternative investments has been estimated using the net asset value per share of the investments. Alternative investments held at June 30, 2013 and 2012, consisted of private equity funds, real estate investment trusts and limited partnerships. Total unfunded commitments at June 30, 2013 and 2012, were \$2,314 and \$3,264. A majority of the funds the Medical Center holds have nonredeemable interests.

Certain investments in debt, marketable equity securities and alternative investments are reported in the consolidated financial statements at an amount less than the historical cost. Total fair value of these investments at June 30, 2013 and 2012, were \$63,490 and \$65,015, which is approximately 24 percent and 25 percent, respectively, of the Medical Center's assets limited as to use and investment portfolio. The declines in recent years primarily resulted from recent increases in market interest rates and failure of certain investments to maintain consistent credit quality ratings or meet projected earnings targets.

Except as discussed below, management believes the declines in fair value for these securities are temporary. Should the impairment of any of these securities become other than temporary, the cost basis of the investment will be reduced and the resulting loss recognized in excess of revenues over expenses in the period the other-than-temporary impairment is identified. In 2013 and 2012, the Medical Center recorded other-than-temporary impairment losses of \$473 and \$2.963, respectively

The Medical Center's investments in marketable equity securities consist of investments in a diverse portfolio of common stocks. The Medical Center evaluated the near-term prospects of the issuer in relation to the severity and duration of the impairment. Based on that evaluation and the Medical Center's ability and intent to hold those investments for a reasonable period of time sufficient for a forecasted recovery of fair value, the Medical Center does not consider those investments to be other-than-temporarily impaired at June 30, 2013.

Other-than-temporary Impairment

Upon acquisition of a security, the Medical Center decides whether it is within the scope of the accounting guidance for beneficial interests in securitized financial assets or will be evaluated for impairment under the accounting guidance for investments in debt and equity securities and alternative investments

The accounting guidance for beneficial interests in securitized financial assets provides incremental impairment guidance for a subset of the debt securities within the scope of the guidance for investments in debt and equity securities. For securities where the security is a beneficial interest in securitized financial assets, the Medical Center uses the beneficial interests in securitized financial asset impairment model. For securities where the security is not a beneficial interest in securitized financial assets, the Medical Center uses debt and equity securities impairment model.

The Medical Center routinely conducts periodic reviews to identify and evaluate each investment security to determine whether an other-than-temporary impairment has occurred. For each security in the investment portfolio, an extensive, regular review is conducted to determine if an other-than-temporary impairment has occurred. Various inputs to the economic models are used to determine if an unrealized loss is other-than-temporary. If the Medical Center determines that a given security position will be subject to a write-down or loss, the Medical Center records the expected credit loss as other-than-temporary impairment included in excess of revenues over expenses.

Beneficial Interest in Trust

The Medical Center is the beneficiary of a trust administered by an unrelated party. The beneficial interest in the assets of the trust is included in the Medical Center's consolidated financial statements as Assets Limited as to Use. The trust is funded by the Medical Center to provide tuition assistance to students who reside in the St. Anthony's Medical Center service area and are seeking careers in health care and to children of Medical Center employees.

Note 5: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value.

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- **Level 3** Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies and inputs used for assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis and recognized in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets, as well as the general classification of such assets and liabilities pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no significant changes in the valuation techniques during the year ended 2013. For assets classified within Level 3 of the fair value hierarchy, the process used to develop the reported fair value is described below.

Investments

Where quoted market prices are available in an active market, investments are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using quoted prices of investments with similar characteristics or independent asset pricing services and pricing models, the inputs of which are market-based or independently sourced market parameters, including, but not limited to, yield curves, interest rates, volatilities, prepayments, defaults, cumulative loss projections and cash flows. Such investments are classified in Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, investments are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. See the table below for inputs and valuation techniques used for Level 3 investments.

The value of certain investments, classified as alternative investments, is determined using net asset value (or its equivalent) as a practical expedient. Investments for which the Medical Center expects to have the ability to redeem its investments with the investee within 12 months after the reporting date are categorized as Level 2. Investments for which the Medical Center does not expect to be able to redeem its investments with the investee within 12 months after the reporting date are categorized as Level 3.

Fair value determinations for Level 3 measurements of investments are the responsibility of the finance department. The finance department receives quarterly fund statements which are used to generate fair value estimates on a quarterly basis. The finance department challenges the reasonableness of the assumptions used and reviews the methodology to ensure the estimated fair value complies with accounting standards generally accepted in the United States.

Interest Rate Swap Agreements

The fair value is estimated using forward-looking interest rate curves and discounted cash flows that are observable or that can be corroborated by observable market data and, therefore, are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy

Beneficial Interest in Trust

Fair value is estimated at the present value of the future distributions expected to be received over the term of the agreement. Due to the nature of the valuation inputs, the interest is classified within Level 2 of the hierarchy

Note 6: Professional Liability Claims

The Medical Center is self-insured for the first \$4,000 per occurrence of medical malpractice risks. The Medical Center purchases insurance coverage above the self-insurance limits. Losses from asserted claims and from unasserted claims identified under the Medical Center's incident reporting system are accrued based on estimates that incorporate the Medical Center's past experience, as well as other considerations, including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. Accrued malpractice losses have been discounted at a rate of 4.5 percent.

Based upon the Medical Center's claims experience, an accrual had been made for the Medical Center's estimated medical malpractice costs, including costs associated with litigating or settling claims, under its malpractice insurance policy, amounting to approximately \$17.091 and \$17.318 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. It is reasonably possible that this estimate could change materially in the near term

The bonds variable rate of interest varies with the Medical Center's credit rating as defined and was approximately the one-month LIBOR plus 9 percent at June 30, 2013. The bonds synthetic fixed rate was 2.73 percent at June 30, 2013, after consideration of related swap agreements (see Note 8). The Bonds are payable in annual installments through February 1, 2053. The Bonds are subject to a mandatory tender through February 1, 2020.

The trust indenture requires the Medical Center to comply with certain restrictive covenants including maintaining minimum insurance coverage, a historical debt service coverage ratio of 1 10 and restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt

Upon issuance and delivery of the 2013 Bonds the Medical Center redeemed its outstanding 2005 and 2006 bonds in the total principal amount of \$137.350 This advance refunding transaction resulted in an extinguishment of debt since the Medical Center was legally released from its obligation on the 2005 and 2006 bonds at the time of the redemption

(B) The Series 2005 Auction Rate Certificate Revenue Bonds consisted of Health Facilities Revenue Bonds in the original amount of \$86,600 dated December 1, 2005. The Bonds were payable in annual installments through December 1, 2030. The Bonds were subject to redemption prior to the maturity date thereof at a redemption price of 100 percent of the principal amount plus accrued interest. The Authority issued the Bonds on behalf of the Medical Center. The proceeds of the bond issue were loaned to the Medical Center under a trust indenture and loan agreement, dated January 9, 2006.

The trust indenture also required the Medical Center to comply with certain restrictive covenants including maintaining minimum insurance coverage, a historical debt service coverage ratio of 1 10 and restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt

The Series 2005 Revenue Bonds were secured by the gross revenues of the Medical Center The Bonds were not guaranteed by the Authority

The Series 2005 Revenue Bonds were redeemed in the current year with the issuance of the Series 2013 Bonds

(C) The Series 2006 Auction Rate Certificate Revenue Bonds consisted of Health Facilities Revenue Bonds in the original amount of \$70,000 dated June 1, 2006. The Bonds were payable in annual interest only installments through December 1, 2009, and principal and interest installments through December 1, 2036. The Bonds were subject to redemption prior to the maturity date thereof at a redemption price of 100 percent of the principal amount plus accrued interest. The Authority issued the Bonds on behalf of the Medical Center. The proceeds of the bond issue were loaned to the Medical Center under a trust indenture and loan agreement, dated June 29, 2006.

The trust indenture required that certain funds be established with the trustee. Accordingly, these funds were included in assets limited as to use in the financial statements. The trust indenture also required the Medical Center to comply with certain restrictive covenants included maintaining minimum insurance coverage, a historical debt service coverage ratio of 1.10 and restrictions on the incurrence of additional debt.

The Series 2006 Revenue Bonds were secured by the gross revenues of the Medical Center and the assets restricted under the bond trust indenture. The Bonds have not been guaranteed by the Authority

The Medical Center has a \$45 million revolving bank line of credit expiring in April 23, 2014. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, there were no borrowings against this line. The line is collateralized by substantially all of the Medical Center's assets. Interest varies with the 30-day LIBOR plus an applicable margin based upon the Medical Center's long-term credit rating from Standard & Poor's Ratings Service.

Note 8: Derivative Financial Instruments

Cash Flow Hedge

As a strategy to maintain acceptable levels of exposure to the risk of changes in future cash flows due to interest rate fluctuations, the Medical Center entered into two new interest rate swaps for its floating rate debt in the current year. The Medical Center terminated the two previous interest rate swap agreements as part of the 2013 Revenue Bond issuance.

Under the new interest rate swap agreements. Medical Center receives interest from the counterparty at 67 percent of the one month LIBOR rate and pays the counterparty at a rate of 1 847 percent on a notional amount of \$172,740 at June 30, 2013 Under the agreement, the Medical Center pays or receives the net interest amount monthly, with the monthly settlements included in interest expense

Under the first terminated agreements, the Medical Center received interest from the counterparty at 67 percent of the monthly LIBOR rate and paid the counterparty at a rate of 3 583 percent on a notional amount of \$72,650 as of June 30, 2012

Under the second terminated agreement, the Medical Center received interest from the counterparty at 67 percent of the monthly LIBOR rate and paid the counterparty at a rate of 3 899 percent on a notional amount of \$68,050 as of June 30, 2012

Management has designated the interest rate swap agreements as cash flow hedging instruments. For derivative instruments that are designated and qualify as a cash flow hedge, the effective portion of the gain or loss on the derivative is reported as a component of unrestricted net assets and reclassified into excess revenues over expenses in the same period or periods during which the hedged transaction affects earnings. Gains and losses on the derivative representing either hedge ineffectiveness or hedge components excluded from the assessment of effectiveness are recognized in current revenues over expenses. The terminated swaps were determined ineffective and the new swaps are considered effective.

(A) The pooled separate accounts invest in a variety of common stocks, mutual funds and fixed securities such as asset-backed securities, mortgage-backed securities and corporate bonds

The Medical Center sponsors defined contribution plans covering substantially all employees. The Plans consist of both a 401(k) plan and a 403(b) plan. Contributions under the Plans include employee contributions, subject to Internal Revenue Service limitations, and a matching contribution equal to 50 percent up to the first 1 percent of the participant's compensation and 25 percent of the next 3 percent. Employees are eligible to participate upon employment and become fully vested in the matching contribution upon completion of three years of service. The Medical Center's expense related to these plans was \$1,324 and \$1,296 for fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively

The Medical Center also sponsored an additional defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees. The contributions under this Plan are based on years of service. Plan expense under this Plan was \$5,716 and \$6,959 in fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Note 12: Profit Participation

The Medical Center sponsors a profit sharing program whereby up to 25 percent of the operating income will be shared with the employees up to \$2,000. The Medical Center had no expense related to the profit sharing program for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Note 13: Operating Leases

Previously, the Medical Center sold six medical office buildings and began leasing the space through a sales leaseback transaction. Under the terms of the transaction the Medical Center recognized an initial gain of \$2,646 and a deferred gain of \$8,304 which is being amortized over the term of the leases. Included in operating income is amortization of \$833 for 2013 and 2012.

Litigation

The Medical Center is subject to claims and law suits that arise primarily in the ordinary course of business. It is the opinion of management that the disposition or ultimate resolution of such claims and law suits will not have a material adverse effect on the consolidated financial position, results of operations or cash flows of the Medical Center.

Pension and Other Postretirement Benefit Obligations

The Medical Center has a noncontributory defined benefit pension and postretirement health care plan whereby it agrees to provide certain postretirement benefits to eligible employees. The benefit obligation is the actuarial present value of all benefits attributed to service rendered prior to the valuation date based on the projected unit credit cost method. It is reasonably possible that events could occur that would change the estimated amount of this liability materially in the near term

Investments

The Medical Center invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the accompanying balance sheets

Current Economic Conditions

The current protracted economic decline continues to present hospitals with difficult circumstances and challenges, which in some cases have resulted in large and unanticipated declines in the fair value of investments and other assets, large declines in contributions, constraints on liquidity and difficulty obtaining financing. The consolidated financial statements have been prepared using values and information currently available to the Medical Center.

Current economic conditions, including the rising unemployment rate, have made it difficult for certain of our patients to pay for services rendered. As employers make adjustments to health insurance plans or more patients become unemployed, services provided to self-pay and other payers may significantly impact net patient service revenue, which could have an adverse impact on the Medical Center's future operating results. Further, the effect of economic conditions on the state may have an adverse effect on cash flows related to the Medicaid program.

Given the volatility of current economic conditions, the values of assets and liabilities recorded in the consolidated financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments in investment values (including defined benefit pension plan investments) and allowances for accounts and contributions receivable that could negatively impact the Medical Center's ability to meet debt covenants or maintain sufficient liquidity

Note 16: Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) will substantially reform the United States health care system. The legislation impacts multiple aspects of the health care system, including many provisions that change payments from Medicare. Medicaid and insurance companies. Starting in 2014, the legislation requires the establishment of health insurance exchanges, which will provide individuals without employer-provided health care coverage the opportunity to purchase insurance. It is anticipated that some employers currently offering insurance to employees will opt to have employees seek insurance coverage through the insurance exchanges. It is possible the reimbursement rates paid by insurers participating in the insurance exchanges may be substantially different than rates paid under current health insurance products. Another significant component of the PPACA is the expansion of the Medicaid program to a wide range of newly eligible individuals. In anticipation of this expansion, payments under certain existing programs, such as Medicare disproportionate share, will be substantially decreased. Each state's participation in an expanded Medicaid program is optional.

The PPACA is extremely complex and may be difficult for the federal government and each state to implement. While the overall impact of the PPACA cannot currently be estimated, it is possible it will have a negative impact on the Medical Center's net patient service revenue. In addition, it is possible the Medical Center will experience payment delays and other operational challenges during PPACA's implementation.
