Garrison Memorial Hospital delivers primary health care to a population of approximately 3,600 in McLean County. We operate a 22-bed Critical Access Hospital and a 28-bed skilled nursing facility. We also operate a rural health clinic in Garrison, North Dakota. Our facility employs approximately 154 people. Garrison Memorial Hospital makes medical care accessible to the entire community it serves. It operates a 24-hour, Level 4 state certified emergency room, providing emergency care to all people regardless of their ability to pay. In 2012/2013 we had 1,398 emergency room visits. We also had 323 acute days of care, 4,711 swing bed days, 9,657 days of skilled nursing care, and 5,238 clinic visits. Garrison Memorial Hospital's charity care policy provides discounted and free services to patients who lack the resources to be fully responsible for the healthcare they receive. The Charity Care policy is designed to ensure the population served by Garrison Memorial Hospital has access to needed healthcare services. In fiscal year 2012/2013, Garrison Memorial Hospital and its clinic had \$63,865 in charity care and Indian Health Services and \$229,171 in bad debt write offs. Our rural health clinic offers a sliding fee schedule to uninsured and underinsured patients, which is mandated by the National Health Service Corps Program. In 2012/2013, Garrison Memorial Hospital's payer mix was 37% Medicare, 19.5% Medicaid, 1.5% Indian Health Services, 17% self-pay and 25% commercial insurance. All payers are charged the same regardless of insurance.



Note 1 - Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

Organization and Principles of Consolidation

St Alexius Medical Center (Medical Center) operates a 308-bed acute care hospital, including a 19-bed transitional care unit, in Bismarck, North Dakota. The Medical Center also operates a 25-bed acute care hospital in Turtle Lake, North Dakota, and several clinics. The Medical Center is organized as a North Dakota nonprofit corporation and has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Medical Center is the sole member of Garrison Memorial Hospital (Garrison), a 22-bed acute care hospital and 26-bed nursing facility in Garrison, North Dakota. Garrison has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Medical Center also owns 100% of the St. Alexius Heart and Lung Clinic, LLC (Heart and Lung).

The Board of Directors of the Medical Center consists of no fewer than eleven persons and no more than fifteen persons. At least five members of the Board of Directors are required to be members of the Benedictine Sisters of the Annunciation, B M V, a religious community. The remaining directors may be members of the civic community. Various members of the religious community also comprise at least the majority of the governing boards of other entities separately incorporated in the State of North Dakota, as follows:

- Benedictine Sisters of the Annunciation, B M V
- University of Mary

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Medical Center, Garrison, and Heart and Lung (collectively referred to as St. Alexius). All significant inter-company balances and transactions have been eliminated in the consolidated financial statements.

Income Taxes

The Medical Center and Garrison are organized as North Dakota nonprofit corporations and have been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as exempt from federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The Medical Center and Garrison are annually required to file a Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) with the IRS. In addition, The Medical Center and Garrison are subject to income tax on net income that is derived from business activities that are unrelated to their exempt purposes. The Medical Center and Garrison file an Exempt Organization Business Income Tax Return (Form 990T) with the IRS to report their unrelated business taxable income.

St. Alexius believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken affecting its annual filing requirements, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements. St. Alexius would recognize future accrued interest and penalties related to unrecognized tax benefits and liabilities in income tax expense if such interest and penalties are incurred. The Medical Center's and Garrison's federal Form 990T filings are no longer subject to federal tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2008.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Fair Value Measurements

St. Alexius has determined the fair value of certain assets and liabilities using a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles.

Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. A fair value hierarchy has also been established, which prioritizes the valuation inputs into three broad levels.

Level 1 inputs consist of quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the related asset or liability. Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs related to the asset or liability.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less, excluding assets limited as to use.

Patient and Resident Receivables

Patient receivables are uncollateralized patient, resident, and third-party payor obligations. Payments of patient and resident receivables are allocated to the specific claims identified on the remittance advice or, if unspecified, are applied to the earliest unpaid claim.

Patient and resident accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectability of accounts receivable, St. Alexius analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third party coverage, St. Alexius analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts, if necessary (for example, for expected uncollectible deductibles and copayments on accounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid, or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely). For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), St. Alexius records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates, if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

St. Alexius' process for calculating the allowance for doubtful accounts for self-pay patients has not significantly changed from June 30, 2012 to June 30, 2013. St. Alexius does not maintain a material allowance for doubtful accounts from third-party payors, nor did it have significant write offs from third-party payors. St. Alexius has not significantly changed its charity care or uninsured discount policies during fiscal years 2013 or 2012.

Supplies

Supplies are stated at lower of cost (first in, first out) or market.

Equity Investments

Investments in jointly owned companies in which St. Alexius has a 20% to 50% interest or otherwise exercises significant influence are recorded under the equity method of accounting. Under the equity method, the initial investment is recorded at cost, adjusted for St. Alexius' proportionate share of their undistributed earnings or losses, net of any additional investments or distributions. St. Alexius' share of net earnings or losses of these companies is included in other operating revenue.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes, and assets held by trustees under bond indenture agreements. Assets limited as to use that are available for obligations classified as current liabilities are reported as current assets.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions in excess of \$1,000 are capitalized and recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Amortization is included in depreciation in the financial statements. The estimated useful lives of property and equipment are as follows:

Land improvements	5-25 years
Buildings and fixed equipment	5-40 years
Major movable equipment	3-20 years

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as additions to unrestricted net assets and are excluded from revenues in excess of (less than) expenses unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when donated or when acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Rental Property

Rental property consists of certain property that is not used in operations and is available for rental to third parties. Rental income, net of depreciation expense on this property, is recorded as other income.

Deferred Financing Costs and Original Issue Discounts

Deferred financing costs are amortized over the period the related obligation is outstanding using the bonds outstanding method. Amortization of deferred financing costs is included in depreciation and amortization in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Original issue discounts are amortized to interest expense over the period the related obligation is outstanding using the bonds outstanding method. Amortization of original issue discount is included in interest expense in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in revenues in excess of (less than) expenses unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from revenues in excess of (less than) expenses unless the investments are trading securities.

Interest Rate Swap

St. Alexius uses derivative financial instruments primarily to optimize borrowing costs under its financing strategy. St. Alexius entered into derivative contracts, known as interest rate swaps, which effectively change the interest rate of its borrowings. These contracts hedge interest rate exposure for periods consistent with their underlying exposures and do not constitute investments independent of these exposures. St. Alexius does not hold or issue financial instruments for trading purposes.

Interest rate swaps converted a portion of St. Alexius' floating rate bank debt into fixed rate debt on notional amounts. The notional amounts of derivative financial instruments do not represent actual amounts exchanged by the parties, but instead represented the amounts on which the contracts were based. The floating interest rate payments under these swaps are based on a LIBOR rate plus 1%, the sum of which is multiplied by 69%. Interest to be paid or received on these contracts currently adjusts interest expense.

Self-Funded Health Insurance Reserves

Self-funded health insurance reserves include claims reported as of the balance sheet date and estimates (based on projections from historical data) of health care costs expenses incurred but not paid. Estimates are continually monitored and reviewed, and as settlements are made or estimates adjusted, differences are reflected in current operations.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by St. Alexius has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by St. Alexius in perpetuity. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, St. Alexius did not have any permanently restricted net assets.

Revenues in Excess of (Less Than) Expenses

Revenues in excess of (less than) expenses excludes unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities, transfers of assets to and from related parties for other than goods and services, change in fair value of effective interest rate swap hedges, and contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions which were restricted by donors

Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

St Alexius has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to St Alexius at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient and resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods, as final settlements are determined.

St Alexius recognizes patient and resident service revenue associated with services provided to patients and residents who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered, as noted above. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, St Alexius recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of St Alexius' uninsured patients and residents will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, St Alexius records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients and residents in the period the services are provided. Net patient and resident service revenue, but before the provision for bad debts, recognized for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 from these major payor sources, is as follows:

Charity Care

St Alexius provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than established rates. Because St Alexius does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue. The amount of charges foregone for services provided under St Alexius' charity care policy were approximately \$4,656,000 and \$4,621,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012. Total direct and indirect costs related to these foregone charges were \$2,105,000 and \$2,220,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, based on an average ratios of cost to gross charges.

Electronic Health Record Incentive Payments

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) amended the Social Security Act to establish incentive payments under the Medicare and Medicaid programs for certain hospitals and professionals that meaningfully use certified Electronic Health Records (EHR) technology.

To qualify for the EHR incentive payments, hospitals and physicians must meet designated EHR meaningful use criteria. In addition, hospitals must attest that they have used certified EHR technology, satisfied the meaningful use objectives, and specify the EHR reporting period. This attestation is subject to audit by the federal government or its designee. The EHR incentive payment to hospitals for each payment year is calculated as a product of (1) an initial amount, (2) the Medicare share, and (3) a transition factor applicable to that payment year.

St. Alexius recognizes EHR incentive payments as revenue when there is reasonable assurance that St. Alexius will comply with the conditions attached to the incentive payments. EHR incentive payments are included in other operating revenue in the accompanying financial statements. The amount of EHR incentive payments recognized are based on management's best estimate and those amounts are subject to change with such changes impacting the period in which they occur.

Donor-restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When donor stipulated time restrictions or purpose restrictions are met or accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the statement of operations.

Advertising

St. Alexius expenses advertising costs as they are incurred. Advertising costs for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 were approximately \$475,000 and \$295,000.

Note 2 - Net Patient and Resident Service Revenue

St. Alexius has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to St. Alexius at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors is as follows.

Medicare The Medical Center is reimbursed under a prospective payment system. Acute care services provided to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. The Medical Center is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate, less sequestration reduction, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Medical Center and audits thereof by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The Medical Center's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2009.

The hospitals in Turtle Lake and Garrison are licensed as Critical Access Hospitals (CAH). Those hospitals are reimbursed for most inpatient and outpatient services at cost plus 1%, less sequestration reduction, with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Turtle Lake and Garrison hospitals and are subject to audits thereof by the Medicare intermediary. Certain services are subject to cost limits or fee schedules. Turtle Lake and Garrison's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2011.

Medicare patients may participate in Advantage Part D Medicare plans. Contractual adjustments from those plans appear in the "Other" adjustment category on the summary of patient and resident service revenue and contractual adjustments on the following page.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has implemented a Recovery Audit Contractor (RAC) program under which claims subsequent to October 1, 2007, are reviewed by contractors for validity, accuracy, and proper documentation. A demonstration project completed in several other states resulted in the identification of potential overpayments, some being significant. The potential exists that the Medical Center may incur an additional liability for a claims overpayment at a future date. The Medical Center is unable to determine the extent of the liability of overpayments, if any. As the outcome of such reviews is unknown and cannot be reasonably estimated, it is the Medical Center's policy to adjust revenue for deductions from overpayment amounts or additions from underpayment amounts determined under the RAC audits at the time a change in reimbursement is agreed upon between the Medical Center and CMS.

Medicaid Inpatient and outpatient hospital services provided to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid on a cost related basis. Inpatient services are reimbursed using Medicare interim per diem rates, decreased by 1%, and outpatient services are paid at the Medicare interim payment rates. Final cost settlements are determined based on the audited Medicare cost report.

Blue Cross Inpatient services provided to Blue Cross subscribers are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are reimbursed at outpatient payment fee screens or at charges less a prospectively determined discount. The prospectively determined discount is not subject to retroactive adjustment.

St. Alexius has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and other organizations. The basis for payment to St. Alexius under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

St. Alexius is reimbursed for private pay and Medicaid residents at a prospectively determined rate as prescribed by North Dakota Department of Human Services regulations. St. Alexius also participates in the Medicare program for nursing facility residents for which payment for services is made on a prospectively determined per diem rate which varies based on a case-mix adjusted resident classification system.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare, Medicaid, and other programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term. Net patient and resident service revenue for the year ended June 30, 2013 increased by approximately \$2,346,000 due to changes in estimates and final settlements of prior year cost reports. Net patient and resident service revenue for the year ended June 30, 2012 increased by approximately \$749,000 due to changes in estimates and final settlements of prior year cost reports.

The interest rate swap related to the Municipal Industrial Development Act Revenue Bonds, Series 2007, was issued at market terms so that it had no fair value at its inception. The carrying amount of the swap has been adjusted to its fair value at the end of the year which, because of changes in forecasted levels of LIBOR, resulted in reporting a liability of \$110,212 and \$167,236 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, for the fair value of the future net payments forecasted under the swap. The liability is classified as noncurrent since management does not intend to settle it during 2014. Since the critical terms of the swap and the note were the same, the swap was assumed to be completely effective as a hedge, and none of the change in its fair value was included in revenues in excess of (less than) expenses. Accordingly, all of the adjustment of the swap's carrying amount was reported as an other change in unrestricted net assets.

During 2012, the Medical Center refinanced the Health Care Facilities Revenue Bonds and a portion of the Health Care Revenue Bonds, Series 1998A. This resulted in a loss on refinancing of \$2,734,842, which is reported as other income (loss) in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 9 - Cooperative Laundry Facility

St. Alexius and Sanford Health Bismarck (formerly Medcenter One, Inc., an unrelated nonprofit organization) jointly own Central Dakota Hospital Laundry, Inc. (CDHL), a cooperative association that provides all laundry services for both hospitals. CDHL's operating costs, interest expense, debt payment requirements, and other specified funding requirements are allocated and charged to each facility based upon its proportionate share of the total pounds of laundry processed. St. Alexius' payments to CDHL were \$777,685 in 2013 and \$766,486 in 2012.

Note 10 - Pension Plan

St. Alexius has a defined contribution pension plan under which employees become participants upon reaching age 21 and completion of one year of service. Employee contributions up to the maximum allowed under the Internal Revenue Code and employer contributions of 3% of employee compensation are deposited with the plan trustee who invests the plan assets. Total pension plan expense for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$4,020,169 and \$3,710,105.

Note 14 - Electronic Health Record Incentive Payments

St. Alexius recognized revenue of approximately \$583,000 for the year ended June 30, 2012 related to Medicaid EHR incentive payments. These incentive payments are included in other revenue in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 15 - Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions are used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instruments for which it is practicable to estimate that value.

Cash Equivalents

The carrying amount approximates fair value because of the short maturity of those instruments.

Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable

Accounts receivable has been recorded at net realizable value which is believed to approximate fair value. Account payable approximates fair value because of the short time for which accounts payable are outstanding.

Investments

The fair value of U.S. Treasury, corporate, and government obligations is estimated based on quoted market prices for those or similar investments. For other investments, for which there are no quoted prices, a reasonable estimate of fair value could not be made without incurring excessive costs.

Long-Term Debt

The fair value of long-term debt is based on current traded value. Management has estimated the fair value of these obligations to be approximately \$64,014,000 and \$68,783,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Note 16 - Commitment and Contingencies

Lease Agreements

The Medical Center entered into a five-year lease and management agreement, renewable for up to three additional five-year terms, with Turtle Lake Community Hospital (Turtle Lake) during 1991. The current agreement with Turtle Lake expires in the year 2015.

Malpractice Insurance

St Alexius has malpractice insurance coverage to provide protection for professional liability losses on a claims-made basis subject to a limit of \$1 million per claim and an annual aggregate limit of \$3 million. Should the claims-made policy not be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during its term, but reported subsequently, would be uninsured.

Self-Funded Health Insurance

St Alexius is self-insured for health and dental insurance. In connection therewith, St Alexius charged to operations amounts representing the employer's portion of actual claims paid adjusted for the actuarially determined estimates of liabilities relating to claims resulting from services provided prior to the respective plan period. St Alexius has a stop-loss policy that limits the organization's liability to \$75,000 per member. The liability relating to self-insured health and dental insurance was \$1,084,583 and \$1,134,692 at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Litigations, Claims, and Disputes

St Alexius is subject to the usual contingencies in the normal course of operations relating to the performance of its tasks under its various programs. In the opinion of management, the ultimate settlement of any litigations, claims, and disputes in process will not be material to the financial position of St Alexius.


The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations, specifically those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenues from patient and resident services.

Note 17 - Changes in Accounting Principles

During the year ended June 30, 2013, St Alexius adopted the provisions of ASU No. 2011-07, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities*. In accordance with the implementation guidance, St Alexius retroactively applied the presentation requirements to 2012. The impact on 2012 was a decrease to total revenues, gains, and other support of \$9,544,159, and a decrease to total expenses of the same amount in the consolidated statements of operations (and changes in net assets). There was no impact on operating income or net assets.

Note 18 - Subsequent Events

St Alexius has evaluated subsequent events through September 20, 2013, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.
