Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Lutheran Charity Association, d/b/a Jamestown Regional Medical Center as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Entity

Lutheran Charity Association, d/b/a Jamestown Regional Medical Center, Inc. (the "Medical Center") is organized as a North Dakota nonprofit corporation and operates a 25-bed critical access hospital in Jamestown, North Dakota.

The Medical Center is the sole beneficiary of fund-raising activities sponsored by Jamestown Regional Medical Center Foundation, Inc. ("Foundation"), a North Dakota nonprofit corporation. The Medical Center's Board of Directors nominates the Foundation's Board members.

Principles of Consolidation

The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Medical Center and the Foundation (collectively referred to as the "Organization"). All material intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization follows accounting standards contained in the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC). The ASC is the single source of authoritative accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) to be applied to nongovernmental entities in the preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP.

Use of Estimates in Preparation of Consolidated Financial Statements

The preparation of the accompanying consolidated financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that directly affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Cash Equivalents

The Organization considers all highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents, excluding amounts held as assets limited as to use and investments. The Organization had no cash equivalents at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Patient Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy

Patient accounts receivable are uncollateralized patient obligations that are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. These obligations are primarily from local residents, most of whom are insured under third-party payor agreements. The Organization bills third-party payors on the patient's behalf, or if a patient is uninsured, the patient is billed directly. Once claims are settled with the primary payor, any secondary insurance is billed, and patients are billed for copay and deductible amounts that are the patient's responsibility. Payments on accounts receivable are applied to the specific claim identified on the remittance advice or statement.

The Organization does not have a policy to charge interest on past due accounts.

Patient accounts receivable are recorded in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets net of contractual adjustments and allowances for doubtful accounts, which reflect management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected. Management provides for contractual adjustments under terms of third-party reimbursement agreements through a reduction of gross revenue and a credit to contractual allowances accounts. In addition, management provides for probable uncollectible amounts, primarily for uninsured patients and amounts patients are personally responsible for, through a reduction of gross revenue and a credit to a valuation allowance.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Patient Accounts Receivable and Credit Policy (Continued)

In evaluating the collectibility of patient accounts receivable, the Organization analyzes past results and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for uncollectible accounts. Specifically, for receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Organization analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts for expected uncollectible amounts for which the third-party payor has not yet paid or for payors who are known to be having financial difficulties that make the realization of amounts due unlikely. For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Organization records a provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts.

Supplies Inventory

Supplies inventory is valued at the lower of cost, determined using the first-in, first-out method, or market.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Certificates of deposit are carried at cost plus accrued interest.

Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) on funds held by a trustee for principal and interest payments is reported as other revenue. All other investment income (including realized gains and losses, interest, and dividends) is reported as investment income and is included in expenses in excess of revenue unless the income is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from expenses in excess of revenue unless the investments are trading securities. Realized gains or losses are determined by specific identification.

The Organization monitors the difference between the cost and fair value of its investments. A decline in market value of an individual investment security below cost that is deemed to be other than temporary results in an impairment, and the Organization reduces the investment's carrying value to fair value. A new cost basis is established for the investment, and any impairment loss is recorded as a realized loss in investment income.

Assets Limited as to Use

Assets limited as to use include assets designated by the Board of Directors for self-funded health insurance benefits, over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes, and assets held by a trustee under the bond indenture agreement. Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Organization have been classified as current assets.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Fair Value Measurements

The Organization measures fair value of its financial instruments using a three-tier hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets.
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability.
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Property, Equipment, and Depreciation

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost or, if donated, at fair value at the date of donation. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included with depreciation expense in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Estimated useful lives range from 2 to 20 years for equipment and from 3 to 40 years for land improvements, buildings, and fixed equipment.

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support and are excluded from expenses in excess of revenue, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support in temporarily restricted net assets. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported as net assets released from restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Asset Impairment

The Organization reviews its property and equipment periodically to determine potential impairment. If an impairment exists, an impairment loss is recognized. In 2013, the Organization recognized impairment losses on improvements made to a modular office building that totaled \$401,984.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Asset Retirement Obligations

ASC Topic 410, Accounting for Conditional Asset Retirement Obligations, clarifies when an entity is required to recognize a liability for a conditional asset retirement obligation. The Organization has considered ASC Topic 410 specifically as it relates to its legal obligation to perform asset retirement activities on its existing properties. The Organization believes there is an indeterminate settlement date for the asset retirement obligations because the range of time over which the Organization may settle the obligation is unknown and cannot be estimated. As a result, the Organization cannot reasonably estimate the liability related to these asset retirement activities as of June 30, 2013 and 2012.

Unamortized Debt Issue Costs

Costs related to the issuance of long-term debt are amortized over the life of the related debt using the bonds outstanding method. Amortization of debt issue costs is included in depreciation and amortization in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations.

Pledges Receivable

Unconditional promises to give with payments due in future periods (i.e., pledges receivable) are reported at the net present value of expected future receipts, less an allowance for estimated uncollectible amounts. Pledges are treated as temporarily restricted net assets until collected (inherent time restriction), unless the donor intended the pledge to be used to support activities of the current period. Pledges intended to support current activities are recorded as unrestricted support in the period the promise is received. Pledges intended to support the endowment fund are included in permanently restricted net assets.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Cash Surrender Value of Life Insurance

The Organization is the owner and sole beneficiary of individual life insurance policies. Increases in the cash surrender value and dividends received from these life insurance policies are recorded as other income in the accompanying consolidated statements of operations.

Charitable Gift Annuities

Charitable gift annuities are recorded at fair value at the date received. The Organization records a liability for the present value of the payments due under terms of the annuity contract.

A contribution is recorded for the difference between the fair value of the gift and the liability recorded. Investment income and gains and losses are charged to the appropriate investment account, and annuity payments are charged to the liability account. Periodically, an adjustment is made to the liability to record gain or loss due to recomputation of the liability based on revised life expectancy. Upon death of the donor annuitant, the Organization recognizes the existing liability as a change in the value of the annuity, and the related asset is available for use by the Organization.

Self-Funded Health Insurance

The Organization self-funds health benefits for eligible employees and their dependents. Health insurance expense is recorded on an accrual basis. An accrued liability is recorded at year-end, which estimates the incurred but not yet reported claims. The Organization has stop loss insurance to cover catastrophic claims.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Deferred Rent

Deferred rent consists of a single prepayment received for all base rent due under terms of a ground lease agreement with the developer of a medical office building constructed on land adjacent to the Organization's hospital building. The Organization has the option to purchase the medical office building at intervals specified in the ground lease agreement. If the Organization chooses to exercise the option to purchase the medical office building, any prepayments would be refundable to the developer. The prepaid rents are being amortized into rental revenue on a straight-line basis over the 99-year term of the ground lease agreement.

Net Assets

Unrestricted net assets consist of investments and otherwise unrestricted amounts that are available for use in carrying out the mission of the Organization and include those expendable resources that have been designated for special use by the Organization's Board of Directors. Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity.

Expenses in Excess of Revenue

The accompanying consolidated statements of operations include the classification "expenses in excess of revenue," which is considered the operating indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets that are excluded from the operating indicator include changes in net unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities; permanent transfer of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services; and contributions of long-lived assets, including assets acquired using contributions that by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Patient Service Revenue

The Organization recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered. Certain third-party payor reimbursement agreements are subject to audit and retrospective adjustments. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

For uninsured patients who do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard rates for services provided (or on the basis of discounted rates, if negotiated or provided by policy). On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, the Organization records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided.

Charity Care

The Organization provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Organization maintains records to identify the amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under the charity care policy. Because the Organization does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as net patient service revenue.

The estimated cost of providing charity to patients under the Organization's charity care policy is calculated by multiplying the Organization's ratio of cost to gross charges by the gross uncompensated charges associated with providing charity care.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Contributions

Contributions are considered available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Organization are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions upon which they depend are substantially met.

Contributions are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions.

Advertising Costs

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Medical Center and Foundation are tax-exempt corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and are exempt from federal and state income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code.

In order to account for any uncertain tax positions, the Organization determines whether it is more likely than not that a tax position will be sustained on examination by the taxing authorities, based on the technical merits of the position, assuming the taxing authority has full knowledge of all information. If the tax position does not meet the more likely than not recognition threshold, the benefit of the tax position is not recognized in the financial statements. The Organization has not recorded any assets or liabilities related to uncertain tax positions or unrecognized tax benefits as of June 30, 2013 or 2012.

The Organization's federal returns for tax years 2009 and beyond remain subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 3, 2013, which is the date the consolidated financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors

The Organization has agreements with third-party payors that provide for reimbursement at amounts that vary from its established rates. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows:

Medicare - Inpatient and outpatient hospital services are paid based on a costreimbursement methodology. Certain professional services provided by physicians are reimbursed based on prospectively determined fee schedules.

Medicaid - Inpatient and outpatient services are paid based on a cost-reimbursement methodology. Inpatient services are reimbursed during the year using Medicare interim per diem rates, decreased by one percent. Outpatient services are reimbursed during the year at Medicare outpatient interim payment rates.

Others - The Organization also has entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Organization under these agreements includes prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined daily rates.

Accounting for Contractual Arrangements

The Organization is reimbursed for cost-reimbursable items at interim rates, with final settlements determined after audit of the the Organization's related annual cost reports by the respective Medicare and Medicaid fiscal intermediaries. Estimated provisions to approximate the final expected settlements after review by the intermediaries are included in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. The Organization's cost reports have been audited by the Medicare fiscal intermediary through June 30, 2011.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

Note 2 Reimbursement Arrangements With Third-Party Payors (Continued)

Laws and Regulations

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state, and local governments. Compliance with these laws and regulations, particularly those relating to the Medicare and Medicaid programs, can be subject to government review and interpretation, as well as regulatory actions unknown and unasserted at this time. Recently, federal government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations by health care providers of regulations, which could result in the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments of previously billed and collected revenue from patients' services. Management believes the Organization is in substantial compliance with current laws and regulations.

CMS uses recovery audit contractors (RACs) to search for potentially inaccurate Medicare payments that might have been made to health care providers and that were not detected through existing CMS program integrity efforts. Once the RAC identifies a claim it believes is inaccurate, the RAC makes a deduction from or addition to the provider's Medicare reimbursement in an amount estimated to equal the overpayment or underpayment. As of June 30, 2013, the Organization has not been notified by the RAC of any potentially significant reimbursement adjustments.

The estimated cost of providing charity care to patients under the Organization's charity care policy was approximately \$438,376 and \$455,952 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Management assesses individual investment securities as to whether declines in market value are other than temporary and result in an impairment. For equity securities, the Organization considers whether it has the ability and intent to hold the investment until a market price recovery. Evidence considered in this includes the reasons for the impairment, the severity and duration of the impairment, changes in value subsequent to year-end, the issuer's financial condition, and the general market condition in the geographic area or industry the investee operates in. For debt securities, if the Organization has made a decision to sell the security, or if it's more likely than not the Organization will sell the security before the recovery of the security's cost basis, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred. If the Organization has not made a decision or does not have an intent to sell the debt security, but the debt security is not expected to recover its value because of a credit loss, an other-than-temporary impairment is considered to have occurred.

Because the Organization has the intent and ability to hold investment securities until a market price recovery or maturity, investment securities at June 30, 2013 and 2012, are not temporarily impaired. No impairment losses were recognized by the Organization during 2013 and 2012.

Note 6 Fair Value Measurements

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

Money market funds - The fair value of money market funds is established by using \$1 as the net asset value (NAV). Money market funds are classified as Level 2.

Mutual funds - The fair value of mutual funds is based on quoted market prices that represent the NAV of shares held by the Organization at year-end.

Corporate equities - The fair value of corporate equities is valued using quoted market prices.

US government obligations, mortgage-backed securities, corporate bonds, and beneficial interest in perpetual trust - The fair value of fixed-income securities is estimated using a variety of techniques including quoted market prices of similar items, broker/dealer quotes, or models using market interest rates or yield curves. The underlying investments of the perpetual trust include both equity and fixed income securities.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Donor-Restricted Endowments

The Board of Directors of the Organization has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA), as adopted by the State of North Dakota, as requiring the Organization to preserve the fair value of the donor's original gift, as of the date of the gift, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Organization classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of the donor's gifts to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of a donor's subsequent gifts to the permanent restricted endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA.

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Organization, and (7) the Organization's investment policies.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters, and Strategies

The Organization has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowments while seeking to preserve the fair value of the endowment assets. Under the Organization's investment policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the endowment assets are invested in a manner to protect principal, grow the aggregate portfolio value in excess of the rate of inflation and achieve an effective annual rate of return that is equal to or greater than the designated benchmarks for the various types of investment vehicles, and ensure that any risk assumed is commensurate with the given investment vehicle and the Organization's objectives.

To achieve its investment goals, the Organization targets an asset allocation that will achieve a balanced return of current income and long-term growth of principal while exercising risk control. The Organization's asset allocations include a blend of equity and debt securities and cash equivalents.

Note 15 Defined Contribution Retirement Plans

The Organization has a voluntary defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all employees. The Organization matches employee contributions up to a maximum contribution of 1.5% of the employee's compensation. The Organization's retirement plan expense under this plan totaled \$382,133 and \$133,043 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

The Organization also has a noncontributory money purchase pension plan (the "Money Purchase Plan") covering substantially all employees. The Organization's contributions to the Money Purchase Plan are based on annual compensation and integrated with the Social Security Wage Base. The Organization's retirement plan expense under the Money Purchase Plan totaled \$418,648 and \$809,508 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. At June 30, 2013 and 2012, accrued pension costs were \$204,000 and \$408,000, respectively.

Note 16 Professional Liability Insurance

The Organization's professional liability insurance for claim losses of less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$5,000,000 per year covers professional liability claims reported during a policy year ("claims made" coverage). The professional liability insurance policy is renewable annually and has been renewed by the insurance carrier for the annual period extending through January 1, 2014.

Under a claims-made policy, the risk for claims and incidents not asserted within the policy period remains with the Organization. Although there exists the possibility of claims arising from services provided to patients through June 30, 2013, which have not yet been asserted, the Organization is unable to determine the ultimate cost, if any, of such possible claims, and accordingly, no provision has been made for them.

Note 18 Self-Funded Insurance

The Organization has a self-funded health care plan that provides medical and dental benefits to employees and their dependents. Employees share in the cost of health benefits. Health care expense is based on actual claims paid, reinsurance premiums, administration fees, and unpaid claims at year-end. The Organization buys reinsurance to cover catastrophic individual claims over \$35,000.

Health care expense was \$1,486,777 and \$1,331,553 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. A liability of \$115,600 for claims outstanding at June 30, 2013 and 2012, has been recorded in accrued liabilities in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. Management believes this liability is sufficient to cover estimated claims, including claims incurred but not yet reported.

Note 19 Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Organization to possible credit risk consist principally of accounts receivable, cash deposits in excess of insured limits, and investments.

Accounts receivable consist of amounts due from patients, their insurers, or governmental agencies (primarily Medicare and Medicaid) for health care provided to the patients. The majority of the Organization's patients are from Jamestown, North Dakota, and the surrounding area.

The Organization maintains depository relationships with area financial institutions that are Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insured institutions. Depository accounts at these institutions are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000. At June 30, 2013, the Organization exceeded the insured limits by approximately \$5,757,000. In addition, other investments held by financial institutions are uninsured.

Note 20 Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2012 consolidated financial statements to conform to the 2013 classifications.
