(1) Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following is a summary of the organization and significant accounting policies of The Community Hospital Association (Hospital) These policies are in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America

A Organization

The Hospital (a Nebraska corporation, not-for-profit) operates a 25-bed Critical Access Hospital The Hospital also operates rural health clinics, home health, hospice and an orthopedic clinic. In addition, the Hospital is the sole corporate member of Community Hospital Health Foundation (Foundation) and the sole shareholder of Red Willow Medical Holding Company (Red Willow). The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of all three organizations All intercompany transactions have been eliminated in the consolidation.

The Budget Reconciliation Act of 1997 (Act) contained many provisions impacting Medicare reimbursement for Health Services. The Act established the Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program to assist states and rural communities to improve access to essential health care services through critical access hospitals and rural health networks.

During fiscal year 2006, the Hospital's Board of Directors approved the Hospital's plan to obtain Critical Access Hospital (CAH) designation CAH's are acute care facilities that provide emergency, outpatient and short-term inpatient services. Medicare reimburses CAH's on a reasonable cost basis. The Hospital's application to become certified as a CAH was approved by Nebraska Health and Human Services System and the certification was effective December 1, 2005.

The Foundation was established primarily for the benefit of the Hospital All funds raised in excess of operating expenses will be disbursed to or be held for the benefit of the Hospital as required to comply with donor imposed restrictions

Red Willow was acquired to maintain and make available its building facility for space to perform medical, clinical and/or administrative functions for the benefit of the Hospital and the people serviced by the Hospital and its medical staff

B Industry Environment

The health care industry is subject to numerous laws and regulations of federal, state and local governments. These laws and regulations include, but are not necessarily limited to, matters such as licensure, accreditation, government health care program participation requirements, reimbursements for patient services, and Medicare and Medicaid fraud and abuse. Government activity has increased with respect to investigations and allegations concerning possible violations of fraud and abuse statutes and regulations by health care providers. Violations of these laws and regulations could result in expulsion from government health care programs together with the imposition of significant fines and penalties, as well as significant repayments for patient services previously billed.

Management believes that the Hospital is in compliance with applicable government laws and regulations as they apply to the areas of fraud and abuse. While no regulatory inquiries have been made which are expected to have a material effect on the Hospital's consolidated financial statements, compliance with laws and regulations is subject to future government review and interpretation as well as regulatory actions unknown or unasserted at this time

As a result of recently enacted federal healthcare reform legislation, substantial changes are anticipated in the United States healthcare system. Such legislation includes numerous provisions affecting the delivery of healthcare services, the financing of healthcare costs, reimbursement of healthcare providers and the legal obligations of health insurers, providers and employers. These provisions are currently slated to take effect at specified times over approximately the next decade

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

C Use of Estimates

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the consolidated financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates

D Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation or other arrangements under bond indenture agreements

E Patient Receivables, Net

The Hospital reports patient accounts receivable for services rendered at net realizable amounts from third-party payers, patients and others Accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for doubtful accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, the Hospital analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payer sources of revenue to estimate the appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts and provision for bad debts. Management regularly reviews data about these major payer sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for doubtful accounts For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, the Hospital analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for doubtful accounts and a provision for bad debts for those accounts over a certain age based on discharge that make the realization of amounts due unlikely For receivables associated with self-pay patients (which includes both patients without insurance and patients with deductible and copayment balances due for which third-party coverage exists for part of the bill), the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for doubtful accounts

The Hospital also maintains a charity care policy as described in Note 1(N)

F Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost, determined by the first-in, first-out valuation method, or market

G Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the accompanying consolidated balance sheets. The Hospital's securities have been classified as other than trading securities in the accompanying consolidated financial statements. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in excess of revenue over expenses unless the revenue or expense is restricted. Unrealized gains and losses on investments that are considered temporary are excluded from excess of revenue over expenses and are included as changes in unrestricted net assets unless the investments are trading securities. Periodically, the Hospital and consolidated entities review their investments to determine whether any unrealized losses are other-than-temporary. During 2013 and 2012, there were no investment declines that were determined to be other-than-temporary.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

H Assets Limited as to Use

Under Loan Guarantee - These deposits are required by the Hospital's Farmers Home Administration, United States Department of Agriculture Ioan agreements. Proceeds from the sale of capital assets are restricted for Ioan repayments on future capital additions. These investments are recorded at cost, which approximates market. All income is reported as nonoperating gains in the consolidated statements of operations. See Note 5 for discussions regarding these funds.

By Board of Directors - Periodically, the Hospital has set aside assets for future capital improvements and employee health insurance claims over which the Board retains control and may, at its discretion, subsequently use for other purposes. Investments consist of cash and cash equivalents, certificates of deposit and related accrued interest recorded at fair value, which approximates cost. All income is reported as nonoperating gains in the consolidated statements of operations.

Under Deferred Compensation Plan - See Note 16 Investments consist of mutual funds

I Property and Equipment

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. All acquisitions over \$5,000 are capitalized Depreciation is provided over the estimated life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method based upon useful lives set forth using the general guidelines from the American Hospital Association Guide for Estimated Useful Lives of Depreciable Hospital Assets

Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the consolidated financial statements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenue over expenses, unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed into service.

J Other Assets

Other assets includes the Hospital's interest in joint ventures and unamortized deferred financing costs, relating to the Hospital's direct loans with the United States Department of Agriculture (Note 8), which are being amortized over the life of the notes on a straight-line basis. Amortization expense of \$14,636 in 2013 and \$14,636 in 2012 is included with depreciation and amortization in the consolidated statements of operations, respectively

K Net Assets

The financial statements report net assets and changes in net assets in three classes that are based upon the existence or absence of restrictions on use that are placed by its donors, as follows

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Unrestricted Net Assets — Unrestricted net assets are resources available to support operations. The only limits on the use of unrestricted net assets are the broad limits resulting from the nature of the organization, the environment in which it operates, the purposes specified in its corporate documents and its application for tax-exempt status, and any limits resulting from contractual agreements with creditors and others that are entered into in the course of its operations

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets – Temporarily restricted net assets are resources that are limited by donor imposed stipulations for use for a particular purpose or in a particular future period. The organization's unspent contributions are classified in this class if the donor limited their use

When a donor's stipulation is satisfied, either by using the resources in the manner specified by the donor or by the passage of time, the expiration of the stipulation is reported in the financial statements by reclassifying the net assets from temporarily restricted to unrestricted net assets

Permanently Restricted Net Assets – Permanently restricted net assets are resources whose use by the organization is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by being used in accordance with a donor's stipulation nor by the passage of time. The portion of the organization's donor-restricted endowment funds that must be maintained in perpetuity are classified in this net asset class.

L Endowment Funds

The Foundation follows the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) Subtopic 958-205, for all Endowment Funds, including any changes required to net asset classification of donor-restricted endowment funds and the incremental disclosure requirements for all endowment funds (including both donor-restricted and board-designated endowment funds)

M Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, reimbursed costs, discounted charges and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors. Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

N Charity Care

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because the Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue in the consolidated statements of operations. Management's disclosure of charity care costs are described in Note 3.

The Hospital is dedicated to providing comprehensive healthcare services to all segments of society, including the aged and otherwise economically disadvantaged. In addition, the Hospital provides a variety of community health services at or below cost

O Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received, which is then treated as cost. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

P Tax Exempt Status and Income Taxes

The Hospital and Foundation are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and are exempt from federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code The Internal Revenue Service has established standards to be met to maintain tax-exempt status In general, such standards require the Hospital and Foundation to meet a community benefit standard and comply with various laws and regulations

Red Willow is a for-profit corporation Red Willow had \$9,778 and \$16,898 of taxable income, incurred and paid \$1,467 and \$2,535 of federal income tax, and incurred and paid \$546 and \$943 of state income tax for the fiscal years ending December 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively As of June 30, 2013, Red Willow had no tax liability

The Hospital, Foundation and Red Willow account for uncertainties in accounting for income tax assets and liabilities using guidance included in FASB ASC 740, *Income Taxes* The Hospital, Foundation and Red Willow recognize the effect of income tax positions only if those positions are more likely than not of being sustained At June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital, Foundation and Red Willow had no uncertain tax positions accrued These entities are no longer subject to income tax examinations for the years ended prior to June 30, 2010

Q Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The carrying amounts of all financial instruments approximate estimated fair value. Cash and cash equivalents, receivables and payables are reasonable estimates of their fair values due to their short term nature. Investments, including assets limited as to use and deferred compensation liabilities, are stated at fair value as discussed in Note 4. The carrying value of long-term debt approximates fair value since the rates closely reflect current market rates.

R Performance Indicator

The consolidated statements of operations include the excess of revenue over expenses as the performance indicator. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from the performance indicator, consistent with industry practice, include the change in unrealized gains and losses on other than trading securities and net assets released from restrictions

S Reclassification

Certain amounts in the 2012 consolidated financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2013 reporting format

T Subsequent Events

The Hospital considered events occurring through September 11, 2013 for recognition or disclosure in the consolidated financial statements as subsequent events. That date is the date the consolidated financial statements were issued.

(2) Net Patient Service Revenue

The Hospital recognizes patient service revenue associated with services provided to patients who have third-party payor coverage, such as Medicare, Medicaid or commercial insurance, on the basis of contractual rates for the services rendered at the time of the provision of services. For uninsured patients that do not qualify for charity care, the Hospital recognizes revenue on the basis of its standard gross rates for services provided at the time of the provision of services. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of the Hospital's uninsured patients will be unable or unwilling to pay for some or all of the services provided. Thus, the Hospital records a significant provision for bad debts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. Patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts, and the provision for bad debts, recognized in the period from these major payor sources, is as follows.

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows

Medicare - All inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries in a Critical Access Hospital are paid based on Medicare defined costs of providing the services Inpatient nonacute services, outpatient services and rural health clinic services related to Medicare beneficiaries are also paid based on a cost reimbursement methodology. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at a tentative rate with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital and audits thereof by the Medicare administrative contractor.

Homecare services are paid at prospectively determined rates per episode of care. Certain professional services provided to Medicare beneficiaries are paid on fee schedule amounts.

The Hospital's classification of patients under the Medicare program and the appropriateness of their admission are subject to an independent review by a peer review organization under contract with the Hospital The Hospital's Medicare cost reports have been audited by the Medicare Administrative Contractor through June 30, 2011

The "Budget Control Act of 2011" requires, among other things, mandatory across-the-board reductions in Federal spending, also known as sequestration. The "American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012" postponed sequestration for two months. As required by law, President Obama issued a sequestration order on March 1, 2013. In general, Medicare claims with dates of service or dates of discharge on or after April 1, 2013, will incur a two percent reduction in Medicare payment.

Medicaid - All inpatient acute services and outpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries in a Critical Access Hospital are paid based on Medicaid defined costs of providing the services. From July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2012, Medicaid changed reimbursement paid to 97 5% of defined costs. Effective July 1, 2012, Medicaid changed reimbursement paid to 99% of defined costs. The Hospital is reimbursed for cost reimbursable items at tentative rates with final settlement determined after submission of annual cost reports by the Hospital

Commercial Insurance - The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these agreements includes discounts from established charges and prospectively determined rates.

Revenue from the Medicare and Medicaid programs accounted for approximately 46% and 5%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended 2013, and 45% and 6%, respectively, of the Hospital's net patient revenue for the year ended 2012. Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates may change by a material amount in the near term

(3) Charity Care

In accordance with its mission objectives, the Hospital provides financial assistance to patients who lack financial resources to pay for the services they receive, and the Hospital recognizes the special concerns of individuals and households with limited financial resources or who are otherwise vulnerable within our community. Financial assistance is provided to patients with demonstrated inability to pay as contrasted with bad debt that results from an unwillingness to pay, thus, charity care does not include bad debt

Included in the provision for contractual allowances is the value at standard charges of these services to patients who are unable to pay, which was \$1,416,079 and \$1,032,727 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. That amount is eliminated from net patient service revenues when it is determined they qualify under the Hospital's charity care policy. The estimated cost incurred by the Hospital to provide these services to patients who are unable to pay was approximately \$895,754 and \$740,508 for the years ended. June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The estimated cost of these charity care services was determined using a ratio of costs to gross charges and applying that ratio to the gross charges associated with providing care to charity patients for the period. Gross charges associated with providing care to charity patients includes only the related charges for those patients who are financially unable to pay and qualify under the Hospital's charity care policy and that do not otherwise qualify for reimbursement from a governmental program. During the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Hospital received no funds to help defray the costs of indigent care.

In addition, the Hospital provides services that are related to the Hospital's mission providing healthcare for all individuals in our community regardless of their ability to pay, but do not fall within the Charity Care policy. These services include community wellness fairs, Medicare Hardship determinations, discounts for individuals who do not meet the charity care guidelines for medical indigence, the Every Woman Matters program, and many others. The Hospital does receive various funds to help defray portions of the cost of care of these programs. The value at standard charges of these services which were not paid was \$382,676 and \$309,853 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and the amount of those charges are eliminated to arrive at net patient service revenues.

(4) Fair Value Measurements

Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC Topic 820 Subtopic 10 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to measurements involving significant unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are as follows

- Level 1 Inputs are quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Hospital has the ability to access at the measurement date
- Level 2 Inputs are other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly through either corroboration or observable market data
- Level 3 Inputs are unobservable for the asset or liability. Unobservable inputs reflect the entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability (including assumptions about risk) developed based on the best information available in the circumstances.

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which a fair value measurement in its entirety falls is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety

The following methods and assumptions were used to estimate the fair value for each class of financial instrument measured at fair value

Cash and cash equivalents – The fair value of cash and cash equivalents consisting primarily of deposit accounts and money market accounts, are classified as Level 1 as these funds are valued using quoted market prices

Certificates of deposit – Investments in certificates of deposit are classified as Level 2 based on multiple sources of information, which may include market data and/or quoted market prices from either markets that are not active or are for the same or similar assets in active markets

Mutual funds – Mutual funds are classified as Level 1 as they are traded in an active market for which closing prices are readily available

Corporate bonds – Corporate bonds are classified as Level 2 based on multiple sources of information, which may include market data and/or quoted market prices from either markets that are not active or are for the same or similar assets in active markets

For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets and liabilities has been consistent

(9) Endowment

Foundation endowments consist of funds established to invest permanently restricted donations. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by Board of Directors to function as endowments and beneficial interest in trust assets, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions

The Board of Directors of the Foundation has interpreted Nebraska Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (NUPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the whole dollar value of the original gift as of the gift date of donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Foundation classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. Absent any donor-imposed restrictions, interest, dividends and net appreciation of donor-restricted endowment funds is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Foundation in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by NUPMIFA

In accordance with NUPMIFA, the Foundation considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds

- 1 The duration and preservation of the fund
- 2 The purposes of the Foundation and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- 3 General economic conditions
- 4 The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- 5 The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- 6 Other resources of the Foundation
- 7 The investment policies of the Foundation

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Foundation has adopted investment policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while complying with all donor-imposed restrictions. Under this policy, as approved by the Board, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that maximizes total returns over long periods of time primarily through capital appreciation Endowment assets are invested in a combination of the following. Equities (50-80%), Fixed Income (15-50%), and Short-Term Investments (5-20%)

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act contains specific financial incentives designed to accelerate the adoption of electronic health record (EHR) systems among health care providers. During 2013 the Hospital qualified for the financial incentive payments by attesting it met specific criteria set by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid services (CMS). Management's attestation is subject to audit by the federal government or its designee. The EHR incentive payment will be earned and received through various payments through 2015. The incentive amount is computed using several elements, one of which includes using the value of undepreciated assets required to implement the EHR system. For the year ended June 30, 2013, the Hospital has elected to record \$266,725 of the incentive payment as other operating revenue in the period earned, and defer the remaining amount of the incentive related to future Medicare reimbursement. In addition, the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services provides EHR incentive payments that will be earned and received through various payments through 2015. A payment of \$190,000 was received during the year ended June 30, 2012 and recorded as other revenue. The amounts recognized are based on management's best estimates and are subject to change, which would be recognized in the period in which the change occurs.

(12) Professional Liability Insurance

The Hospital carries a professional liability policy (including malpractice) which provides \$500,000 of coverage for injuries per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate coverage. In addition, the Hospital carries a general liability policy which also provides \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate coverage. The Hospital qualifies under the Nebraska Hospital Medical Liability Act (the Act). The Excess Liability Fund under the Act, on a claims-made basis, pays claims in excess of \$500,000 for losses up to \$1,750,000 per occurrence. The statute limits covered claims above \$1,750,000 and, in connection therewith, the Hospital carries an umbrella policy which also provides an additional \$3,000,000 of professional liability coverage per occurrence and aggregate coverage. These policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis covering only those claims which have occurred and are reported to the insurance company while the coverage is in force.

The Hospital could have exposure on possible incidents that have occurred for which claims will be made in the future, should professional liability insurance not be maintained, should coverage be limited and/or not available, or should the Act change

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require a healthcare provider to recognize the ultimate costs of malpractice claims or similar contingent liabilities, which include costs associated with litigating or settling claims, when the incidents that give rise to the claims occur. The Hospital does evaluate all incidents and claims along with prior claim experience to determine if a liability is to be recognized. For the years ending June 30, 2013 and 2012, management determined no liability should be recognized for asserted or unasserted claims. Management is not aware of any such claim that would have a material adverse impact on the accompanying consolidated financial statements.

(13) Rental Income

The Hospital and Red Willow are the lessors of certain space under various two, three, five and ten-year noncancelable operating leases. Rental income is recorded monthly as earned in other revenue.

(14) Pension Plan

The Hospital has a noncontributory, defined contribution pension plan established under section 401(a) of the internal revenue code for substantially all full-time and eligible part-time employees. After a one year eligibility period, the Hospital contributes 7% of each employee's salary, up to statutory limits, into individual, self-directed accounts. Each employee is fully vested after three years of qualified employment. Employees of Community Hospital Health Foundation are also covered under this plan. Contributions totaled \$809,321 and \$764,249 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 respectively.

In addition, the Hospital has a contributory, defined contribution tax deferred annuity plan established under section 403(b) of the internal revenue code available to all employees. Contributions are voluntary and are allowed up to the statutory limits. All contributions are accounted for in individual, self-directed accounts which fully vest immediately.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements June 30, 2013 and 2012

Because of the types of plans, there are no actuarial assumptions used in determining costs nor can there be any actuarial gain or loss. Any gain or loss in pension fund investments is reflected in the participating employee's benefits. The value of the vested earned benefits can never exceed the assets of the fund since the benefits are determined by the value accumulated for each employee.

(15) 457(b) Deferred Compensation Plan

The Hospital also offers additional deferred compensation plans for its executive officers in accordance with Internal Revenue Code 457(b). The plan permits eligible employees to defer a portion of their salaries until future years. Employees may defer up to the maximum amount allowed by Section 457(b) of the Code into a separate investment account in which the executive has the right to direct the investment of the funds in accordance with investment guidelines established by the Hospital. The deferred compensation is not available to the employees until retirement, separation from employment, death, unforeseeable emergency or attaining age 65. The employer is the beneficial owner of all assets the employee places in the plan. The employee is fully vested in all amounts credited to his or her account.

The deferred compensation assets related to this plan in the amount of \$112,222 and \$69,427 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, are included within the accompanying consolidated balance sheets as assets limited as to use A liability of \$112,222 and \$69,427 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, based on the fair value of the investments, has also been included within the accompanying consolidated balance sheets as deferred compensation liabilities

(16) Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Hospital is located in McCook, Nebraska The Hospital grants credits without collateral to its patients, most of who are local residents and are insured under third-party payor agreements. The mix of receivables from patients and third-party payors was as follows

Note 1: Basis of Presentation

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of The Community Hospital Association (the Hospital), which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as of June 30, 2013, and the related consolidated statements of activities, cash flows and functional expenses for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated September 11, 2013

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the consolidated financial statements, we considered the Hospital's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hospital's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hospital's internal control.

Report on Compliance for Each Major Federal Program

We have audited The Community Hospital Association's (the Hospital) compliance, with the types of compliance requirements described in the *OMB Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on its major Federal program for the year ended June 30, 2013. The Hospital's major federal program is identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to its federal programs

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance of the Hospital's major federal program based on our audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and OMB Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the Hospital's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion on compliance for each major federal program. However, our audit does not provide a legal determination of the Hospital's compliance

Opinion on Each Major Federal Program

In our opinion, the Hospital complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on its major Federal program for the year ended June 30, 2013

Report on Internal Control Over Compliance

The management of the Hospital is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the types of requirements referred to above. In planning and performing our audit of compliance, we considered the Hospital's internal control over compliance with the type of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major Federal program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for the major Federal program and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Hospital's internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of OMB Circular A-133 Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose
