Note A - Nature of the Organization

Appalachian Regional Healthcare. Inc (the Corporation) currently operates eleven hospitals in Kentucky and West Virginia. In addition to providing inpatient and outpatient hospital services, the Corporation operates thirty multispecialty clinics, nine home health agencies, nine durable medical equipment stores, and ten retail pharmacies, as well as other healthcare programs.

The Corporation operates hospitals in the following Kentucky communities. Hazard, Perry County (258 acute beds and 20 rehabilitation beds). Hazard Psychiatric Hospital, Perry County (100 psychiatric beds), Harlan, Harlan County (120 acute beds and 30 psychiatric beds). South Williamson, Pike County (113 acute beds), Middlesboro, Bell County (96 acute beds), Whitesburg, Letcher County (90 acute beds), McDowell, Floyd County (25 acute beds), West Liberty, Morgan County (25 acute beds) and Hyden, Leslie County (25 acute beds) In addition, the Corporation operates hospitals in Beckley, Raleigh County (99 acute beds and 60 psychiatric beds) and Hinton, Summers County (25 acute beds), West Virginia The Corporation operates home health agencies, durable medical equipment stores, retail pharmacies and multi-Specialty clinics in the majority of these communities

The ARH Foundation for Healthier Communities. Inc. (the Foundation), the membership of which is controlled by the Corporation's Board of Trustees, was established to solicit contributions from the general public, with the specific purpose to support and complement the healthcare mission of the Corporation. Funds are distributed as determined by the Foundation's Board of Trustees. The Foundation's assets, liabilities, net assets, results of operations, and changes in net assets have been included in the Corporation's consolidated balance sheets and related consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets and cash flows. The Foundation's net assets as of June 30, 2013 and 2012 were approximately \$837,000 and \$553,000, respectively.

The Corporation jointly operated a diagnostic imaging center (the Imaging Center) in Hazard. Kentucky, which opened in 2010 Under the agreement, the Corporation owned 60% and two radiologists owned 40% of the Imaging Center. Effective January 1, 2013, the Corporation purchased the shares from the two radiologists and now owns 100% of the operation

In August 2011, the Corporation formed a wholly owned subsidiary. ARH Mary Breckinridge Health Services. Inc (MBHS) which in turn then entered into an agreement to purchase assets of Mary Breckinridge Hospital (MBH) and related healthcare entities in Hyden. Kentucky The Corporation acquired the majority of the assets and liabilities of MBH. MBHS's assets, liabilities, net assets, results of operations, and changes in net assets have been included in the Corporation's consolidated balance sheets and related consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets and cash flows. The MBHS's net assets as of June 30, 2013 and 2012 were approximately \$3,377,000 and \$3,219,000, respectively.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting The financial statements of the Corporation are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America The Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) as produced by the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) is the sole source of authoritative GAAP for non-governmental entities.

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies consistently followed by the Corporation in the preparation of its financial statements

- 2 <u>Use of Estimates</u> The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) which require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements Actual results could differ from those estimates
- 3 <u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u> Cash and cash equivalents include highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less at the time of acquisition
- 4 <u>Short Term Investments</u> Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends and net gains or losses of affiliated companies) is included in the surplus of revenues over expenses as other income.
- Patient Accounts Receivable and Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts Patient accounts receivable consist of amounts due from government programs (e.g., Medicare and Medicaid) and non-government payors (e.g., self-pay and commercial payors) Management believes there is minimal credit risks associated with the receivables from government programs. Non-government receivables are from various payors that are subject to differing economic conditions. Management continually monitors and adjusts the allowance for uncollectible accounts associated with credit risk.

The Corporation's ability to collect outstanding receivables is critical to its results of operations and cash flows. To provide for accounts receivable that could become uncollectible in the future, the Corporation establishes an allowance for uncollectible accounts to reduce the carrying value of such receivables to their estimated net realizable value. The primary uncertainty of such allowances lies with uninsured patient receivables and deductibles, co-payments or other amounts due from individual patients.

The Corporation has an established process to determine the adequacy of the allowance for uncollectible accounts that relies on a number of analytical tools and benchmarks to arrive at a reasonable allowance. No single statistic or measurement determines the adequacy of the allowance for uncollectible accounts. Some of the analytical tools that the Corporation utilizes include, but are not limited to, historical cash collection experience by payor, revenue trends by payor classification and aged accounts from date of service by payor. Accounts receivable are written off after collection efforts have been followed in accordance with the Corporation's policies.

Below is a summary of the activity of the allowance for uncollectible accounts for the year ended June 30, 2013

- 6 <u>Inventories</u> Inventories, which primarily consist of pharmaceuticals and medical supplies, are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market
- Assets Limited as to Use. Resources that are designated for special uses are reported as assets limited as to use Assets limited as to use include assets held by trustees under indenture and other trust agreements and designated assets set aside by the Board of Trustees for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes. The Corporation also records donor restricted contributions as assets limited as to use

The Corporation's policy is to fund depreciation as cash is available. Amounts funded are intended for the replacement, expansion, or improvement of the Corporation's facilities and repayment of long term debt. Funds on deposit with a trustee in connection with bond indebtedness are to be used only for payment of interest or retiring indebtedness (debt service fund) or capital projects (project funds). Funds were also on deposit with trustees in connection with the Corporation's malpractice self-insurance.

Amounts required to meet current liabilities of the Corporation have been reclassified in the consolidated balance sheets.

Physician Commitments The Corporation has committed to provide financial assistance pursuant to recruiting agreements with various physicians practicing in the communities it serves. In consideration for a physician relocating to one of its communities and agreeing to engage in private practice for the benefit of the respective community, the Corporation may commit to loan certain amounts of money to the physician. Typically the loans are paid out over a period of one or two years, and are designed to help the physician establish his or her practice. As of June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Corporation held approximately \$1,270,000 and \$737,000, respectively, in notes receivable from physicians where cash had been advanced. These amounts are included in other receivables on the consolidated balance sheets.

The Corporation follows GAAP in accounting for its physician commitments. According to GAAP, a guarantor is required to recognize, at the inception of a guarantee, a liability for the fair value of the obligation undertaken in issuing the guarantee. The Corporation had committed to advance a maximum amount of \$5.834,972 and \$4,966,000 to physicians as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The actual amount of such commitments to be subsequently advanced to physicians is valued at approximately \$282,000 and \$120,000 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. This valuation depends upon the financial results of a physician's private practice during the guaranteed period. An offsetting asset related to the term of service of the physician is also recorded. These assets will be expensed over the term of the agreements, which range from one to five years. Generally, amounts advanced under a recruiting agreement may be forgiven pro rata over the term of the agreement, contingent upon the physician continuing to practice in the respective community.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Property and Equipment Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. The estimated useful life of equipment is primarily based on the American Hospital Association's (AHA) Estimated Useful Lives of Depreciable Hospital Assets. Revised 2004 Edition. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease terms or the estimated useful lives of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the consolidated financial statements. Interest costs incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets are capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets.

Contributed property and equipment is recorded at fair value at the date of donation. In the absence of donor stipulations regarding how long the contributed assets must be used, the Corporation has adopted a policy of implying a time restriction on contributions of such assets that expires over the assets' useful lives. As a result, all contributions of property and equipment, and of assets contributed to acquire property, and equipment, are recorded as restricted support.

- 10 <u>Reserve for Self-insurance</u>. The provision for estimated malpractice, general liability and workers' compensation claims includes independent actuarial estimates of the ultimate costs for both reported claims and claims incurred but not reported
- 11 <u>Deferred Revenue</u>. Deferred revenue represents amounts received by the Corporation related to grants, the Hazard Psychiatric Hospital and home health agency reimbursement. The Corporation is the recipient of certain grant awards whereby deferred revenue is recognized for funds received prior to the occurrence of the associated costs.

The Corporation has an agreement through June 30, 2014 with the Commonwealth of Kentucky to operate a 100-bed psychiatric hospital in Hazard. Kentucky Under the terms of the agreement, the Commonwealth of Kentucky reimburses the Corporation for operating the hospital, subject to contract limits Deferred revenue represents amounts received or expected to be received by the Corporation under the terms of the contract in advance of incurring the actual expenses. The agreement has been renewed bi-annually since 1991.

- 12 <u>Temporarily Restricted Net Assets</u> Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Corporation has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as receipt are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying consolidated financial statements.
- 13 <u>Consolidated Statements of Operations and Changes in Net Assets</u> For purposes of display, transactions deemed by management to be ongoing, major or central to the provision of healthcare services are reported as revenues and expenses. Changes in net assets that are excluded from surplus of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments, contributions of long-lived assets and minimum pension liability adjustments

14 Net Patient Service Revenue: The Corporation has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Corporation at amounts different from its established rates. The Corporation targets its Kentucky-based hospitals' charges to not exceed ten percent of state medians for all Kentucky-based hospitals. The West Virginia hospitals' rates are in accordance with the directives of the Health Care Authority of West Virginia Payment arrangements include prospectively determined rates per discharge or visit, reimbursed costs, discounted charges, and per diem payments. Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with third-party payors.

Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted, if necessary, in future periods as final settlements are determined or as years are no longer subject to audit, review and investigation.

15 <u>Charity Care and Community Benefit (unaudited)</u>. The Corporation and its precursor, the Miners Memorial Hospital Association, have a historic presence in the Central Appalachian Mountain region. For nearly 50 years, the Corporation has addressed the healthcare needs of the residents of Eastern Kentucky and Southern West Virginia, adhering to its mission of "improving health and promoting the well-being of all the people in Central Appalachia in partnership with our communities."

The Corporation accepts all patients regardless of their ability to pay. Because the Corporation does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, they are not reported as revenue in the consolidated statements of operations and changes in net assets. The Corporation provided charity care which aggregated, at its costs, approximately \$22,631,000 and \$23,369,000 during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. These figures do not include the amounts by which governmental program payments fail to cover costs.

ASU No. 2010-23. Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure, requires that a healthcare entity report the amount of charity care provided at the entity's estimated costs instead of at gross charges. For the Corporation, the effective date for this ASU was the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012.

The Corporation is a signatory to a "Confirmation of Commitment" of the AHA voluntary guidelines publicly demonstrating the Corporation's ongoing commitment to ensuring that compassion extends from the bedside to the billing office. Management believes that following the AHA's Hospital Billing and Collection Practices. Statement of Principles and Guidelines (Guidelines) is an approach that will help ensure patients are afforded dignity and assistance in the disposition of their healthcare bill. Regarding the individual Guidelines, the Corporation has implemented policies allowing for sliding fee schedules, extended payment periods, discounts to the under- and uninsured, alternative credit options, and assistance with state, federal and other aid programs.

In accordance with its mission, the Corporation commits substantial resources to sponsor a broad range of services to all members of the community, irrespective of economic circumstances. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012, the Corporation provided each of its ten communities with an abundance of community-oriented services. Annually, each facility, in addition to the uncompensated care noted above, provides countless health screenings, community health education, support groups, CPR instruction, maternity classes, and disease management support groups. The Corporation also sponsors and donates cash and in-kind contributions to a number of local and national organizations, including the local school systems and civic groups.

Note B - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

16 <u>Tax-Exempt Status</u> The Corporation is a not-for-profit corporation as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue code (IRC) and is exempt from Federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the IRC However, the Corporation is subject to Federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

GAAP requires the Corporation to evaluate its tax positions and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if it has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). The Corporation has evaluated its tax positions and has concluded that there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the consolidated financial statements. The Corporation is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions, however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Corporation believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2009.

17 <u>Subsequent Events</u> Subsequent events for the Corporation have been considered through the date of the Independent Auditor's Report which represents the date the financial statements were available to be issued

Note C - Net Patient Service Revenue

The Corporation has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments at amounts different from established rates. A summary of the significant payment arrangements with major third party payors is described in the following paragraphs.

The Corporation participates in the Medicare and Medicaid Programs Approximately 52% and 12%, respectively, of the Corporation's 2013 net patient service revenue was derived from services to patients covered by these Programs. Comparable percentages for 2012 were 51% and 15%, respectively. Changes in the Medicare and Medicaid Programs and the potential reductions of funding levels could have an adverse impact on the Corporation

In the healthcare industry, laws and regulations governing Medicare and Medicaid are complex and subject to interpretation. Compliance with such laws and regulations can be subject to future government review and interpretation as well as significant regulatory action including fines and penalties and exclusion from the Programs. The Corporation believes that it is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

Services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid Program beneficiaries are primarily paid based upon prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Four of the Corporation's hospitals have been granted Critical Access Hospital status by Medicare. Under the Critical Access Hospital designation, services rendered to Medicare and Medicaid Program beneficiaries are reimbursed under a cost reimbursement methodology.

For cost reimbursed services and certain other exceptions to the prospective payment systems, the Corporation receives interim payments from Medicare and Medicaid Final settlements are determined after submission of annual cost reports filed by the Corporation and audit or desk review thereof by Medicare and Medicaid Management feels that adequate provision has been made for the effects, if any, of audits or desk reviews by either Program

The Corporation has entered into payment agreements with certain Medicaid managed care organizations, commercial insurance carriers, health maintenance organizations, and preferred provider organizations. The bases for payment to the Corporation under these agreements include prospectively determined rates per discharge, discounts from established rates, and prospectively determined daily or visit rates

Note C - Net Patient Service Revenue (Continued)

The Commonwealth of Kentucky and the State of West Virginia impose taxes on healthcare providers at rates ranging from 20% to 25% of certain net patient revenues. The states' legislation also provides for limited reimbursement of services provided to qualifying indigent care patients. Effective July 1, 2006, the Kentucky General Assembly froze the dollar amounts for provider taxes at the providers' 2006 levels.

Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows.

- Level 1. Quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities. An active market for the asset or liability is a market in which the transaction for the asset or liability occurs with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.
- Level 2 Observable market-based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities or model-derived valuations
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data. These inputs reflect a company's own assumptions about the assumptions a market participant would use in pricing the asset or liability.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

On March 2, 2012 the Corporation's operations in West Liberty. Kentucky were devastated by the tornado that struck the community. The hospital was closed to inpatients for a two month period while repairs were made to the building. The homecare store (durable medical equipment) and the home health agency were relocated along with other operations in the community. Most of the loss was covered by insurance which totaled \$5,400,000.

Note G - Line of Credit

The Corporation currently had a twelve-month line of credit with a financial institution for \$5,000,000. The interest rate on this line of credit was at the prime rate for 2013 and 2012 (3.25% at June 30, 2013 and 2012) with a floor of 5%. Interest payments were due monthly with all accrued and unpaid interest and principal balances due at maturity. The line of credit had no outstanding balance as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The line of credit matures annually on August 31. Management did not renew the line of credit for \$5,000,000 on August 31, 2013.

Further, the Series 2012-5 Note is guaranteed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The Series 2012-5 Note contains certain covenants, which among other things, restrict the granting of liens or other encumbrance on any mortgaged property. Inc Series 2012-6 Note (Series 2012-6 Note) was issued in the amount of \$2.013.341 with an interest rate that adjusts each Quarter based on the "Wall Street Journal" prime interest rate, not to be less than 5%. As of June 30, 2013, the effective interest rate was 5%. The Series 2012-6 Note contains special features for optional redemption by the Issuer beginning December 19, 2012, at redemption prices expressed as percentages of the principal amount to be redeemed plus interest accrued to the redemption date. The Series 2012-6 Note is secured by the Corporation's gross revenues as well as a mortgage interest in the Corporation's Kentucky hospitals. The Series 2012-6 Note contains certain covenants, which among other things, restrict the granting of liens or other encumbrance on any mortgaged property, limit additional long-term indebtedness and require certain debt transaction tests. As of June 30, 2013, management is not aware of any violations of these covenants. The Series 2012-6 Note matures December 19, 2032.

In January of 2013, the Corporation issued \$9,867,000 notes to the United States Department of Agriculture in the form of a promissory note (Series 2012 Note). The proceeds of these loans were used to refinance outstanding debt and to fund a portion of an expansion project at the Hazard facility. The first principal payment will be due January 25, 2017. The Series 2012 Note is secured by the Corporation's gross revenues as well as a mortgage interest in the Corporation's Kentucky hospitals. The Series 2012 Note contains certain covenants, which among other things, restrict the granting of liens or other encumbrance on any mortgaged property. Iimit additional long-term indebtedness and require certain debt transaction tests. As of June 30, 2013, management is not aware of any violations of these covenants. The Series 2012 Note matures on January 25, 2053 with an annual fixed interest rate of 3 125%.

Note H - Long-term Debt (Continued)

In March of 2013, the Corporation issued \$13,500,000 notes to the United States Department of Agriculture in the form of two promissory notes for \$6,800,000 and \$6,700,000 (Series 2013-1 Master Note and Series 2013-2 Master Note, respectively). The proceeds of these loans were used to renovate the exterior and interior of the Beckley hospital and refund certain outstanding debt noted above. The first principal payment will be due March 19, 2016. The Series 2013-1 Master Note and Series 2013-2 Master Note are secured by the Corporation's gross revenues as well as a mortgage interest in the Corporation's Kentucky hospitals. The Series 2013-1 Master Note and Series 2013-2 Master Note contain certain covenants, which among other things, restrict the granting of liens or other encumbrance on any mortgaged property, limit additional long-term indebtedness and require certain debt transaction tests. As of June 30, 2013, management is not aware of any violations of these covenants. The Series 2013-1 Master Note and Series 2013-2 Master Note, mature on March 19, 2053 with an annual fixed interest rate of 3 125%

In December of 2012, the Corporation issued \$25,000,000 City of Hazard. Kentucky Healthcare Revenue Bond Anticipation Notes Series 2012 (Series 2012 BAN) The Series 2012 BAN carries a fixed interest rate of 1%. The proceeds of the Series 2012 BAN will be used to fund the construction of capital additions at the Hazard. Kentucky facility. The Series 2012 BAN matures on December 1, 2013 and is backed by a USDA commitment to permanent funding of the project upon completion. The Series 2012 BAN secured by the Corporation's gross revenues as well as a mortgage interest in the Corporation's Kentucky hospitals. The Series 2012 BAN contains certain covenants, which among other things, restrict the granting of liens or other encumbrance on any mortgaged property, limit additional long-term indebtedness and require certain debt transaction tests. As of June 30, 2013, management is not aware of any violations of these covenants.

In May 2012, the Corporation issued \$12,259,838 notes to the United States Department of Agriculture in the form of two promissory notes for \$7,000,000 and \$6,932,000 (Series 2012A Master Note and Series 2012B Master Note, respectively). The proceeds of these loans were primarily used to expand an Obstetrics unit at the Whitesburg ARH Hospital. A smaller portion will be used to renovate outpatient rehabilitation and oncology units in South Williamson. The first principal payment on both of these notes will be on April 16, 2015 and due every April 16th thereafter until maturity. The term of each note is 40 years and the interest rate on each loan is 3 375%

In October 1997, the Corporation issued \$95,000,000 of Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority Hospital System Refunding and Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series 1997 (Series 1997 Bonds) The proceeds of the Series 1997 Bonds were used to repay the Variable Rate Series 1984 Health Care System Revenue Bonds and a portion of the Variable Rate Series 1991 Health Care System Revenue Bonds (Series 1991 Bonds), and the remainder (approximately \$48 million) was used to improve and furnish the Corporation's hospital facilities. The Series 1997 Bonds were scheduled to mature on October 1, 2022, but were paid off, in full, on December 21, 2012 Principal payments were payable on October 1 of each year. Interest payments were payable semiannually on April and October 1 of each year.

The Series 1997 Bonds had interest rates reflecting the maturity year. The interest rates for bonds maturing in 2012 were 5.88%. The Series 1997 Bonds contained special features for optional redemption by the Issuer that began on April 1, 2008 at redemption prices expressed as percentages of the principal amount to be redeemed plus interest accrued to the redemption date. The Series 1997 Bonds were secured by the Corporation's gross revenues. The Series 1997 Bonds contained certain covenants, which among other things, restricted the granting of liens or other encumbrance on any present or future property, limited additional long-term indebtedness and required certain debt transaction tests. As of June 30, 2013, management is not aware of any violations of these covenants.

Note H - Long-term Debt (Continued)

In February 2007, the Corporation issued \$7,000,000 of Healthcare System Revenue Bonds. Series 2007 (Project Bonds) \$4,600,000 is a promise to pay to the City of Hazard. Kentucky, a de jure political subdivision, and \$2,400,000 is a promise to pay to the County of Pike, a de jure political subdivision. The City of Hazard Project Bonds were scheduled to mature on February 14, 2017 and the Pike County Bonds were scheduled to mature on June 1, 2022, but both were paid off, in full, on December 21, 2012. Principal payments and interest payments were payable on a monthly basis. The Project Bonds had a fixed interest rate of 4.95%.

In August 2007, the Corporation issued \$4,600,000 of Healthcare System Revenue Bonds. Series 2007 (Project Bonds), the entirety of which is a promise to pay to the County of Perry, a de jure political subdivision. The Perry County Project Bonds were scheduled to mature on August 1, 2022, but were paid off, in full, on December 21, 2012. Principal payments and interest payments were payable on a monthly basis. The Project Bonds had a fixed interest rate of 4.95%

Note J - Pension and Retirement Plans

The Corporation has three non-contributory defined benefit pension plans. Appalachian Regional Healthcare. Inc. Restated Non-Contributory Pension Plan, Appalachian Regional Healthcare, Inc. Retirement Plan, and Appalachian Regional Healthcare. Inc. Administrative Retirement Plan (the Plans), covering most employees. Each plan provides benefits of stated amounts for each year of service. The Corporation's funding policy is to contribute amounts to the Plans sufficient to meet all minimum funding requirements set forth in the Employee Retirement Income Security. Act of 1974 (ERISA), as well as the Pension Protection Act of 2006, as amended

Note J - Pension and Retirement Plans (Continued)

During fiscal 2008, the Corporation froze the Administrative and Retirement Plans to new participants. Effective June 30, 2009 the Corporation froze the benefits for all active employees in the Administrative Plan as well as for employees in the Retirement Plan not covered by a collective bargaining agreement and began offering a defined contribution 403(b) plan. Pursuant to the agreement reached with the Southern United Nurses (SUN), benefits were frozen for those employees effective January 1, 2013 in the Retirement Plan covered by a collective bargaining unit. They will be offered a defined contribution 403(b) plan. Pursuant to the agreement with USWA, April 1, 2013, the Pension Plan was frozen to new participants. New employees after that date are offered a Defined Contribution 403(b) plan.

The Corporation was granted a waiver by the IRS of the minimum funding standard under Section 412(d) of the IRC and Section 303 of ERISA related to its three defined benefit plans in 2009. The waiver is applicable to the final contribution for the plan year beginning July 1, 2007 and was due March 2009, totaling approximately \$8,330,000. The waiver was granted to the Corporation, contingent upon the Corporation providing collateral to the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation. In addition, the Corporation is required to make timely required contributions to the Plans during the term of the waiver. Management has complied with the terms of the waiver.

Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows.

- Level 1. Quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities. An active market for the asset or liability is a market in which the transaction for the asset or liability occurs with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.
- Level 2 Observable market-based inputs or unobservable inputs that are corroborated by market data, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities or model-derived valuations
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are not corroborated by market data. These inputs reflect a company's own assumptions about the assumptions a market participant would use in pricing the asset or liability.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value

Interest bearing cash Valued at cost which approximates fair value

Mutual funds Valued at net asset value ("NAV") of shares held by the Plans at year end The NAV is based on the value of the underlying investment assets owned by the fund, minus its liabilities, and then divided by the number of shares outstanding The NAV is a quoted price in an active market

Fixed income securities Valued at the NAV as calculated by the vendor or broker/dealer

Collective trust funds Valued at the NAV of units held by the Plans at year end provided by the issuer of the fund. The NAV is quoted on a private market that is not active, however, the unit price is based on the value of the underlying investment assets owned by the fund, minus its liabilities, and then divided by the number of shares outstanding

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Note K - Medical Malpractice Insurance

Effective February 16, 2003, the Corporation became self-insured for medical malpractice and general liability losses. Losses from asserted and unasserted claims identified under the Corporation's incident reporting system, as well as claims incurred but not yet reported, are accrued based on estimates that incorporate past experience, as well as other considerations, including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. The Corporation has employed independent actuaries to estimate the ultimate costs of the settlement of such claims. The Corporation recorded a malpractice liability (discounted at 0% as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively) of \$34,156,277 and \$29,173,145 as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Effective January 1, 2009, the Corporation obtained high-deductible, claims-made coverage for medical malpractice losses. The policy provides overall coverage of \$10,000,000 per occurrence/\$10,000,000 in aggregate, The Corporation retains the first \$5,000,000 of losses per each claim and is insured for losses greater than \$5,000,000 up to \$15,000,000

Note L - Workers' Compensation Insurance

The Corporation was insured by ROA for workers' compensation claims prior to January 1, 2002. As a result of ROA going into receivership, to the extent that ROA funds are insufficient, the Corporation has effectively become self-insured for claims occurring prior to this date. As of June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Corporation recorded a liability (undiscounted as of June 30, 2013 and discounted at 2% as of June 30, 2012) of approximately \$6,104,000 and \$3,219,000, respectively, related to these claims

Beginning January 1, 2002, the Corporation insured its workers' compensation claims through AIK Comp (AIK), a mutual (or group) self-insurance organization. During 2004, the Corporation was notified by AIK of an assessment related to premiums for 2002 and 2003. The assessment was part of a plan submitted by AIK to the Commonwealth of Kentucky to maintain adequate reserves for claims. Based upon the formula prepared by AIK and management's estimates, the Corporation recorded an additional liability of \$5,555,000 as of June 30, 2005.

AIK is now in receivership with the Commonwealth of Kentucky and is currently the subject of a rehabilitation proceeding pending before the Franklin Circuit Court. On June 15, 2005, the Rehabilitator filed a Modified 2005 Assessment Plan and Reorganization Plan (2005 Assessment Plan) with the Franklin Circuit Court. The 2005 Assessment Plan includes an assessment of the 2004 year and two months ending February 28, 2005. Based upon the 2005 Assessment Plan, the Corporation has recorded a liability in the amount of \$2,411 as of both June 30, 2013 and 2012. An additional contingent callable promissory note was held in the amount of \$796,676 for the years then ended. The Rehabilitator has qualified the Corporation for a payment plan to satisfy its pro rata share of the amended 2005 assessment.

Purportedly, all Group Members of AIK may have been subject to joint and several liability for the satisfaction of fund deficits for their respective years of participation. As part of the Corporation's compliance with the provisions of the 2005 Assessment Plan, the Corporation will be released from any joint and several liability for AIK's deficit upon the full payment of the Corporation's pro rata share of the amended 2005 assessment

A small number of AIK group members have appealed the provisions of the 2005 Assessment Plan. The appeal is currently pending before the Kentucky Court of Appeals. Additionally, issues related to third-party culpability have been appealed, and are currently pending before the Kentucky Supreme Court.

Based upon information currently available regarding the status of AIK, management believes its reserves to be adequate relative to any adverse rulings through the court system. As of both June 30, 2013 and 2012, the Corporation recorded a liability of \$799,000.

Note L - Workers' Compensation Insurance (Continued)

Effective January 1, 2005 and 2007, the Corporation converted to high deductible workers' compensation programs for its employees. Under these programs, the Corporation retains the first \$975,000 and \$900,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively, of losses per each claim and is insured for losses greater than \$975,000 and \$900,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. For claim years prior to fiscal 2011 the retention was \$750,000. In connection with these policies, the Corporation obtained \$12,432,000 in irrevocable stand-by letters of credit which were terminated by the Corporation on August 7, 2013. The Corporation established a workers compensation trust in fiscal 2013. The balance in the trust as of June 30, 2013 was \$12,249,491. Losses from asserted and unasserted claims identified under the Corporation's incident reporting system, as well as claims incurred but not yet reported, are accrued based on estimates that incorporate past experience, as well as other considerations, including the nature of each claim or incident and relevant trend factors. The Corporation has engaged independent actuaries to estimate the ultimate costs of the settlement of such claims. These actuarially determined costs have been undiscounted for the year ended June 30, 2013 and discounted 2% for the year ended June 30, 2012.

Note M - Fair Values of Financial Instruments

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Corporation in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments.

Long-term Debt The fair values of long-term debt are based on quoted market prices for the same or similar issues, giving consideration to interest rates, maturity and other factors. The fair value of total long-term debt was approximately \$112,470,000 and \$100,240,000 at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively

Cash. Investments and Other items for Which Fair Value Disclosure is Required The carrying amount reported in the consolidated balance sheets for such items is either fair value or approximates fair value, due to their short-term nature

Note N - Commitments and Contingent Liabilities

Operating Leases

Grants

Certain facilities were financed in part by federal grants. Under the terms of the grants, the Corporation must operate the facilities as designated for a stated number of years or a portion of the grants are to be refunded.

Note O - Functional Expenses

The Corporation provides general healthcare services to residents within its geographic location. For 2013 and 2012, approximately 89% and 90%, respectively, of the Corporation's expenses relate to healthcare services and 11% and 10%, respectively, relate to general and administrative costs. General and administrative costs include all non-patient care, and non-revenue producing functions.

Included within general and administrative expenses are fundraising expenses of approximately \$105,000 and \$138,000 and advertising expenses of approximately \$743,000 and \$755,000 in 2013 and 2012, respectively. These costs are expensed as incurred

Note P - Healthcare Reform

Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

On March 23, 2010. The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (the Act) was signed into law. The effects of this legislation on hospitals are wide-ranging and potentially dramatic. In particular, the Act imposes additional requirements on hospitals seeking to obtain or maintain charitable tax-exempt status as defined under Section 501 of the IRC. Hospitals seeking to obtain or maintain charitable tax-exempt status must now

- 1 Conduct a community health needs assessment Hospitals must conduct a community health needs assessment once every three years and then adopt and implement a strategy addressing the needs associated with the assessment
- 2 Establish written financial assistance and emergency care policies
- 3 Limit billed charge amounts for emergency or other medically necessary care to patients eligible for financial assistance
- 4 Prohibit the use of "extraordinary" collection efforts on patients who qualify for financial assistance

Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

Charitable hospitals seeking to obtain or maintain charitable tax-exempt status must meet the new requirements by fiscal years beginning after March 23, 2010, with the exception of the community health needs assessment which is required for fiscal years beginning after March 23, 2012

The Corporation believes it is in compliance with the Act Final regulations have not yet been issued regarding all of the new requirement. The Corporation is in the process of understanding the requirements of the Act and is implementing plans for continued compliance.

Note P - Healthcare Reform (Continued)

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

On February 17, 2009, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (the Recovery Act) was signed into law. A major component of the Recovery Act is its emphasis on improving health information technology (also known as HIT) The federal government believes the implementation of technology will ultimately increase the quality and reduce the cost of healthcare

To accomplish the improvement of HIT, the Recovery Act includes payment incentives for qualifying professionals. Physicians and hospitals that are considered early adopters of electronic health records (EHR) can become eligible to receive a significant amount of money from Medicare or Medicaid.

The Corporation applied for and received approximately \$11,778,000 and \$2,237,000 in Medicaid HIT funds for fiscal years ending June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The Corporation intends to apply for additional funds in the coming years. The funds and any funds from future applications are dependent on reaching certain metrics and various states of "meaningful use" as defined by the Recovery Act

Note Q - Subsequent Event

On October 7, 2013, the Corporation through its subsidiary ARH Tug Valley Health Services, Inc., entered into an Asset Purchase Agreement with Health Management Associates (HMA).
