As discussed herein, Douglas Hospital, Inc (an affiliate of Wellstar Health System, Inc) operates as a charitable organization consistent with the requirements of Internal Revenue Code section 501 (c) (3) and the "community benefit standard" of IRS Revenue Ruling 69-545 In this regard, the governing body of the organization and/or its parent is composed of prominent citizens in the community, medical staff privileges in the hospital are available to all qualified physicians in the area consistent with the size and nature of the facility, the hospital operates a full-time emergency room open to all regardless of ability to pay, the hospital provides care to the needy members of the community consistent with its charity care policy regardless of their ability to pay for these services The hospital's excess funds are generally applied to expansion and replacement of existing facilities and equipment, amortization of indebtedness, improvement of patient care, community benefit activities, and charity care Douglas Hospital committed approximately \$15.3 million in capital expenditures for the year to meet the technology and program needs of the community we serve Douglas Hospital, Inc was organized in 1992 The hospital affiliated with the Northwest Georgia Health System in 1993 In 1994 Northwest Georgia Health System helped form the PROMINA Health System and changed its name to Promina Northwest Health System In 1998 Promina Northwest changed its name to Wellstar Health System and is now totally independent of PROMINA Douglas Hospital is subordinate to, and subject to the authority of Wellstar Health System and its governing boards including the Hospital Authority of Douglas County Wellstar Douglas provides a full range of inpatient and outpatient services characteristic of a community hospital The hospital is licensed to operate 108 beds and is presently staffed to operate 102 beds The original hospital was constructed in 1974 and has had three major structural additions since 1985 The following stats constitute the overall program services provided during the reporting period ended June 30, 2013 Adult Discharges-6,927 Med & Surgical Short Stay Cases-137 Emergency Room Visits-62,118 Outpatient Surgical Cases-3,978 Inpatient Surgical Cases-1,153 Outpatient Procedures Non-ED OP Radiology-39,700 GI Laboratory-1,299 Total FTEs Paid-714 Community Benefit Reporting Community Outreach-\$421,642 Unreimbursed Charity Care (at cost)-\$9,183,659 Medicaid Shortfalls (at cost)-\$2,116,682 Total Community Benefit-\$11,300,341 As an affiliate of Wellstar Health System, Douglas Hospital participates in many community and educational programs for the overall health and benefit of the area that we serve Some examples of those programs are Community Health/Education--screenings and educational opportunities such as defensive driving for teens (offered at a minimal cost), smoking cessation, heart smart school, CPR and others Community Activities--sponsors blood drives, provides funding to school health programs for medical and dental care for the underserved population Community Events--Latino Day for the community Hispanics to have a variety of screenings for health related issues In all a total of over 200,000 area residents participated in some type of education or screening in health issues Over 2,000 couples participated in prenatal educational offerings sponsored by WellStar Sponsorships-- Wellstar's Laundry services Department partnered with a local homeless shelter, MUST Ministries, to donate retired and faded scrubs to new arrivals at the shelter MUST has integrated housing programs in Cobb, Cherokee, and Douglas counties (the heart of Wellstar's service area) Recognition and Accomplishments- Douglas Hospital continues to be accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) All of the Wellstar system hospitals (including Douglas) have been awarded "Accreditation with Distinction" by the Commission on Laboratory Accreditation of the College of American Pathologists (CAP) CAP awards are considered one of the most stringent in laboratory quality assurance in the industry The Wellstar Cancer Program is accredited by the American College of Surgeons The expansion of the cancer program has resulted in an increase in the services provided for cancer patients at both Douglas and Paulding Hospitals The Wellstar Respiratory Care is accredited by the American Association for Respiratory Care with its "Recognition for Quality" Wellstar Health System is number five in the Top 100 Integrated Healthcare Networks as published by SDI It is also the highest ranked integrated network in the state Wellstar is named in the 100 Best Companies List by "Working Mothers" magazine and as a National Employer Team Member by AARP for its work on behalf of more mature workers within the organization Wellstar was also named for a sixth year in a row to the Companies that Care Honor Roll This distinction represents employers who create positive work environments for its employees and who are also active community partners WellStar Douglas Hospital was awarded the Business Beautification Award for the month of July 2012 by Keep Douglasville Beautiful The Keep Douglasville Beautiful Board of Directors presents the award to a local business each quarter throughout the year for their efforts in community growth In October WellStar completed the system-wide implementation of a new cleaning process called Xenex The process uses ultraviolet light technology/machines to decontaminate rooms in five to 12 minutes This includes patient rooms, emergency departments, public restrooms, supply rooms and nursing stations Independent studies and lab samples have shown that the system is 20 times more effective than regular cleaning protocols for eliminating harmful bacteria and many other organisms All hospitals have a least one machine in operation WellStar Douglas Hospital's Neurodiagnostic/Electroencephalography (EEG) Laboratory was granted a five-year accreditation by the Laboratory Accreditation Board of the American Board of Registration of Electroencephalographic and Evoked Potential Technologists The accreditation was based on an evaluation of the quality of the EEGs performed in the lab and on a review of the lab's policy and procedures manual To better serve behavioral health patients who visit WellStar Douglas Hospital's Emergency Department, the system began using an innovative technology to offer telemedicine The technology is provided in a partnership with TeleHealth and allows psychiatrists at WellStar Cobb Hospital to securely and conveniently evaluate Douglas patients and expedite their discharge With the success of the pilot program the system plans to expand to Paulding Hospital, which, like Douglas does not have an on-site psychiatrist WellStar Kennestone Hospital launched an initiative called Best In Georgia (BIG) with a goal to improve patient safety and well-being across the system A multidisciplinary team of physicians and other team members meet on a monthly basis to evaluate performance measures at the hospital As many consumers research healthcare performance measures in sources such as Health Grades and US News and World Report as well as other online sites it is important to focus on improving the hospital's position in the public Cobb, Douglas, Paulding and Windy Hill hospitals have also joined in this initiative at their respective hospitals Douglas Hospital began construction during the reporting period on its Intensive Care Unit expansion and the Emergency Department renovation The \$18 million project is projected to be completed in late 2014 and will double the number of ICU beds Plans also include relocating the cafeteria and new triage/treatment rooms in the Emergency Department The project will add an additional 43,270 square feet to the campus and 10,702 square feet will be renovated

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

WellStar Health System, Inc. (WellStar) is a multidimensional integrated healthcare organization, headquartered in Marietta, Georgia, which provides inpatient, outpatient, physician care, and emergency services for residents of northwest Georgia. The significant accounting policies used by WellStar in preparing and presenting its combined financial statements follow:

(a) *Organization and Business*

The combined financial statements include the accounts of WellStar and its controlled affiliates, including Kennestone Hospital, Inc., Cobb Hospital, Inc., Douglas Hospital, Inc., Paulding Medical Center, Inc., WellStar Foundation, Inc. (WellStar Foundation), CHS Foundation, Inc., Community Assurance Company, Ltd. (CAC), WellStar Health Ventures, LLC d/b/a WellStar OrthoSport, an outpatient rehab service, and WellStar Medical Group, LLC, a multi-specialty group of WellStar owned physician practices.

All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in combination.

The Board of Trustees (the Board) of WellStar has the authority to approve appointments of the members of the boards of trustees of all affiliates. The Board includes at least one representative from each of the affiliates.

(b) *Use of Estimates*

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires that management make estimates and assumptions affecting the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenue, and expenses, as well as disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Significant items subject to such estimates and assumptions include the determination of the allowances for uncollectible accounts and contractual adjustments, self-insurance reserves, estimated third-party payor settlements, and the actuarially determined benefit liability related to WellStar's pension plan. In particular, laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates associated with these programs will change by a material amount in the near term.

(c) *Cash Equivalents*

WellStar considers investments in highly liquid debt instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

(d) *Investments and Investment Income*

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at fair value in the combined balance sheets. Fair value is measured in accordance with relevant accounting literature and discussed in note 16 to the combined financial statements.

Investment income items (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) are included in unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses in the combined statements of operations, unless restricted by the donor or law

(e) *Assets Limited as to Use*

Assets limited as to use primarily include assets set aside by the Board for future capital improvements, over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes, assets held by trustees under indenture agreements, assets held under self-insurance funding arrangements and donor restricted assets. Amounts required to meet related current liabilities of WellStar are classified as current assets in the accompanying combined balance sheets

(f) *Costs of Borrowing*

Bond issuance costs and bond discounts and premiums are amortized over the terms of the related bond issues

Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. Capitalized interest specifically related to tax-exempt borrowings is recorded net of income earned on related trusteed assets

(g) *Property and Equipment*

Property and equipment are stated at cost. Provisions for depreciation are computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the assets. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized using the straight-line method over the shorter of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation and amortization in the combined financial statements

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used, and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed into service. Contributions restricted to the purchase of property and equipment or other restricted purposes which restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets in the accompanying combined financial statements

(h) *Inventories*

Inventories, consisting principally of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals, are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or replacement market

(i) *Other Assets*

Other assets include, among other things, investments in joint ventures and costs in excess of the fair value of the net tangible assets of certain acquired businesses (goodwill). Investments in partnerships are accounted for using the equity method

(j) *Impairment of Long-Lived Assets*

Long-lived assets, such as property and equipment and purchased intangibles, are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Recoverability of assets to be held and used is measured by a comparison of the carrying amount of an asset to estimated undiscounted future cash flows expected to be generated by the asset. If the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its estimated future cash flows, an impairment charge is recognized to the extent that the carrying amount of the asset exceeds its fair value.

(k) *Goodwill*

WellStar applies the provisions of FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958, *Not-for-Profit Entities*, as it relates to subsequent accounting for goodwill and other intangible assets acquired in an acquisition.

Goodwill is an asset representing the future economic benefits arising from other assets acquired in a business combination that are not individually identified and separately recognized. Goodwill is reviewed for impairment at least annually. The goodwill impairment test is a two-step test. Under the first step, the fair value of the reporting unit is compared to its carrying value (including goodwill). If the fair value of the reporting unit is less than its carrying value, an indication of goodwill impairment exists for the reporting unit and WellStar must perform step two of the impairment test (measurement). Under step two, an impairment loss is recognized for any excess of the carrying amount of the reporting unit's goodwill over the implied fair value of that goodwill. The implied fair value of goodwill is determined by allocating the fair value of the reporting unit in a manner similar to a purchase price allocation and the residual fair value after this allocation is the implied fair value of the reporting unit goodwill. Fair value of the reporting unit is determined using the market approach. If the fair value of the reporting unit exceeds its carrying value following step one, step two is not performed.

WellStar performs its annual impairment review of goodwill each July 1 and when a triggering event occurs between annual impairment tests.

During 2013, WellStar did not identify any material reporting unit at risk of failing step one of the goodwill impairment test. The fair value of all reporting units is substantially in excess of their carrying value and therefore no impairment loss was recorded in fiscal 2013.

(l) *Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets*

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by WellStar is restricted by donors for a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by WellStar in perpetuity.

FASB ASC 958, *Not-for-Profit Entities*, provides guidance on the net asset classification of donor restricted endowment funds for a not-for-profit organization that are subject to an enacted version of the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act of 2006 (UPMIFA) and also requires disclosures about endowment funds, both donor-restricted endowment funds and board-designated endowment funds.

WellStar has historically and to-date received a limited amount of donor-restricted endowment funds. The Board has interpreted Georgia's State Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (SPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. Income from WellStar's donor-restricted endowment funds is generally restricted to specific donor-directed purposes, and is therefore accounted for within temporarily restricted net assets until expended in accordance with the donor's wishes. WellStar oversees individual donor-restricted endowment funds to ensure that the fair value of the original gift is preserved.

WellStar invests donor-restricted endowment funds within the framework of WellStar's overall investment management program.

(m) *Unrestricted Revenue, Gains, and Other Support in Excess of Expenses and Losses*

The combined statements of operations include unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses include assets released from restriction used for the purchase of property and equipment and the recognition of pension and post retirement liability adjustments arising during the current period.

(n) *Net Patient Service Revenue*

Net patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services rendered, including estimated retroactive adjustments due to future audits, reviews, and investigations. Retroactive adjustments are considered in the recognition of revenue on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered, and such amounts are adjusted in future periods as adjustments become known or as years are no longer subject to such audits, reviews, and investigations.

WellStar applies the provisions of FASB Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-07, *Healthcare Entities (Topic 954)*. ASU 2011-07 requires the classification of the provision for uncollectible accounts associated with patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) rather than as an operating expense. ASU 2011-07 also requires enhanced disclosure about healthcare entities' policies for recognizing revenue and assessing uncollectible accounts, and disclosures of patient service revenue and qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for uncollectible accounts.

(o) *Charity Care*

WellStar provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policies without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. Because WellStar does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care, such amounts are not reported as revenue.

During 2012, WellStar adopted the provisions of FASB ASU 2010-23, *Health Care Entities (Topic 954) Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure*. ASU 2010-23 amends ASC Subtopic 954-605, *Health Care Entities – Revenue Recognition* to require that cost be used as the measurement basis for charity care disclosure purposes. The method used to estimate such costs as well as any funds received to offset or subsidize charity services provided should also be disclosed.

(p) *Income Taxes*

WellStar and all but one of its affiliates have been recognized as exempt from Federal income tax under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(a) as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) and, therefore, related income is generally not subject to Federal or state income taxes. CAC is a controlled foreign corporation not subject to Federal tax.

WellStar applies FASB ASC 740, *Income Taxes*, which addresses accounting for uncertainties in income tax positions. It also provides guidance on when tax positions are recognized in an entity's financial statements and how the values of these positions are determined. There is no impact on WellStar's combined financial statements as a result of the application of ASC 740.

(q) *Contributions*

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to WellStar are reported at estimated fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give are recognized when the conditions are substantially met while indications of intentions to give are not recorded. Gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use or timing of use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restrictions.

(r) *Derivative Instruments and Hedging Activities*

At the effective date of any hedge accounting election, WellStar designates the associated derivative as either (1) a hedge of the fair value of a recognized asset or liability or of an unrecognized firm commitment (fair value hedge) or (2) a hedge of a forecasted transaction or the variability of cash flows to be received or paid related to a recognized asset or liability (cash flow hedge). WellStar formally assesses, both at inception and on an ongoing basis, whether the derivatives that are used in hedging transactions are highly effective in offsetting changes in fair values or cash flows of hedged items. When it is determined that a derivative is not highly effective as a hedge or that it has ceased to be a highly effective hedge, WellStar discontinues hedge accounting prospectively. To the extent that hedge ineffectiveness is associated with these changes in fair value, it is recognized in unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses. WellStar monitors the effectiveness of interest rate swaps designated as hedges on a quarterly basis.

Should hedge accounting be discontinued because it is determined that the derivative no longer qualifies as an effective cash flow hedge, WellStar continues to carry the derivative on the combined balance sheet at its fair value with subsequent changes in fair value included in unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses. Gains and losses that were accumulated in unrestricted net assets are amortized on a straight-line basis over the remaining life of the derivative in the determination of unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses.

WellStar does not currently apply hedge accounting to its derivative instrument.

(s) *Asset Retirement Obligations*

WellStar recognizes the fair value of its liability for legal obligations associated with asset retirements in the period in which it is incurred, if a reasonable estimate of the fair value of the obligation can be made. When the liability is initially recorded, WellStar capitalizes the cost of the asset retirement obligation by increasing the carrying amount of the related long-lived asset. Over time, the liability is accreted to its present value each period, and the capitalized cost associated with the retirement obligation is depreciated over the useful life of the related asset. Upon settlement of the obligation, any difference between the cost to settle the asset retirement obligation and the recorded liability is recognized as a gain or loss in the combined statements of operations.

(t) *Retirement Benefits*

WellStar applies the recognition, measurement, and disclosure provisions of FASB ASC 715, *Compensation – Retirement Benefits*. ASC 715 requires that WellStar recognize the unfunded status of its defined benefit pension plan and post retirement plan on its combined balance sheet, measure plan assets and benefit obligations as of fiscal year-end and apply the applicable disclosure requirements. ASC 715 also provides guidance on an employer's disclosures about plan assets of a defined benefit pension or other postretirement plan.

(u) *Recently Adopted Accounting Standards*

During 2012, WellStar adopted the provisions of the FASB ASU 2010-24, *Health Care Entities (Topic 952) Presentation of Insurance Claims and Related Insurance Recoveries*. ASU 2010-24 amends ASC Subtopic 954-450, *Health Care Entities – Contingencies*, to clarify that a health care entity should not net insurance recoveries against a related liability and that the claim liability should be determined without consideration of insurance recoveries. The application of ASU 2010-24 for WellStar's fiscal year 2012 and did not have a significant financial reporting impact.

During 2013, WellStar adopted the provisions of the FASB ASU 2011-04, *Amendments to Achieve Common Fair Value Measurements and Disclosure Requirements in U.S. GAAP and IFRSs*. ASU 2011-04 amended ASC 820 to converge the fair value measuring guidance in U.S. generally accepted accounting principles and International Financial Reporting Standards. Some of the amendments clarify the application of existing fair value measurement requirements, while other amendments change a particular principle in ASC 820. In addition, ASU 2011-04 requires additional fair value disclosures. The application of ASU 2011-04 only affects fair value measurement disclosures. Adoption of ASU 2011-04 did not have an effect on Wellstar's fiscal 13 combined balance sheet or the combined statement of operations.

(v) *Subsequent Events*

WellStar has evaluated subsequent events through October 18, 2013, the date the combined financial statements were issued.

(w) *Reclassifications*

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2012 combined financial statements to conform to the current year presentation.

On November 15, 2012, WellStar issued Revenue Anticipation Refunding Certificates Series 2012 in the original principal amount of \$108.5 million to provide funds to refund the Hospital Authority of Cobb County Revenue Anticipation Refunding and Improvement Certificates Series 2003 and to pay for certain costs of issuance. The proceeds of the 2012 Revenue Anticipation Refunding Certificates were deposited in a defeasance trust. The Series 2012 Certificates bear interest at fixed rates and are supported by an intergovernmental contract with Cobb County Kennestone Hospital Authority. In accordance with relevant accounting literature, WellStar recognized a \$6.5 million loss on extinguishment resulting from the write-off of unamortized bond issuance costs, premiums, and discounts associated with the Series 2003 Certificated refunded. The loss is included in unrestricted revenue, gains and other support in excess of expenses and losses in the accompanying 2013 combined statement of operations.

On June 28, 2012, WellStar issued Revenue Anticipation Certificates Series 2012A and Series 2012B in the original principal amount of \$31.25 million and \$68.75 million, respectively, to finance a portion of the costs of the planning, design, acquisition, construction, installation, and equipping of a 112-bed replacement acute care hospital in Paulding County. The Series 2012A Certificates bear interest at fixed rates and are supported by an intergovernmental contract with Paulding County, Georgia. The Series 2012B Certificates bear interest at a variable rate and are secured by a direct-pay letter of credit facility expiring June 2017. Interest rates are set weekly by the remarketing agent based upon prevailing rates for the contract period related to the remarketed tranche. In the event a market for variable rate instruments is not sustained, the letter of credit agreements require the bank to purchase the certificates.

WellStar exercised its option to call the outstanding Series 2001 Certificates on October 1, 2011 and extinguished such amounts on October 7, 2011.

On November 1, 2011, WellStar issued Revenue Anticipation Refunding and Improvement Certificates, Series 2011, in the original principal amount of \$123.8 million to finance the costs of certain capital improvements, to refund all of the outstanding Series 1999 Certificates and to pay for certain costs of issuance. In accordance with relevant accounting literature, WellStar recognized a \$1.6 million loss on extinguishment resulting from the write-off of associated unamortized bond issuance costs, premiums and discounts related to the Series 1999 Certificates refunded, which is included in unrestricted revenue, gains,

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and other support in excess of expenses and losses in the accompanying 2012 combined statement of operations

The Series 2005A Certificates in the original principal amount of \$60.0 million bear interest at a fixed rate and are supported by bond insurance. The Series 2005B Certificates in the original principal amount of \$60.0 million bear interest at a variable rate and are supported by stand-by bond purchase agreements, bond insurance, and a direct-pay letter of credit facility expiring August 2015. Interest rates are set weekly by the remarketing agent based upon prevailing rates for the contract period related to the remarketed tranche. In the event a market for variable rate instruments is not sustained, the letter of credit agreements require the bank to purchase the certificates.

The 2004 and 2006 revenue certificates bear interest at variable rates and are secured by direct-pay letters of credit expiring August 2015. Interest rates are set weekly by the remarketing agent based upon prevailing rates for the contract period related to the remarketed tranche. In the event a market for variable rate instruments is not sustained, the letter of credit agreements require the bank to purchase the certificates.

The average annual interest rate on WellStar's variable rate obligations approximated 0.16% and 0.19% for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Certain trusteed assets described in note 2 and the future net revenue of WellStar are pledged as security for payment of the various series of hospital revenue certificates outlined above. Substantially all of WellStar's long-term debt agreements subject WellStar to certain debt covenants typical of such obligations.

WellStar maintains a \$21.0 million revolving line of credit with a bank for routine working capital needs. The facility is secured by deposits with the bank and expires February 15, 2014. WellStar anticipates renewal of this facility at expiration under substantially the same terms and conditions as the existing facility. There were no amounts outstanding under this facility at June 30, 2013 or 2012.

WellStar paid interest of approximately \$15.6 million and \$14.3 million in 2013 and 2012, respectively. Interest capitalized on capital projects was approximately \$1.9 million and \$3.2 million in 2013 and 2012, respectively.

(7) Derivative Instruments

WellStar synthetically converted \$60.0 million (the notional amount) of the 2005 Certificates (note 6) from variable rate debt to fixed rate debt through an interest rate swap agreement with a counterparty. In general, the swap obligates WellStar to pay interest at a fixed rate of 3.45% and receive interest at 67% of LIBOR. The notional amount amortizes in the same fashion and the swap matures at the same date as the related 2005 Certificates.

WellStar's credit risk involves the possible default of the counterparty. Collateral may be required in the future based on WellStar's credit rating, the insurer's credit rating, or market valuations of the swaps. At June 30, 2013 and through the date of these combined financial statements, no such collateral was required.

The swap's fair value, if positive, is included in other assets in the accompanying combined balance sheets. If negative, the swap's fair value is included in other long-term liabilities in the accompanying combined balance sheets. (8) Net Patient Service Revenue and Patient Accounts Receivable

Certain affiliates of WellStar have agreements with governmental and other third-party payors that provide for reimbursement to such affiliates at amounts different from established rates. Contractual adjustments

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under third-party reimbursement programs represent the difference between billings at established rates for services and amounts reimbursed by third-party payors. A summary of the basis of reimbursement with major third-party payors follows:

- *Medicare* – Inpatient and outpatient services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are generally paid at prospectively determined rates. These rates vary according to patient classification systems that are based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors. Additionally, payments for certain other reimbursable items are made at tentative rates, with final settlements determined after submission of annual cost reports and audits by the Medicare fiscal intermediary. The cost reports of all WellStar affiliates have been audited and substantially settled for all fiscal years through June 30, 2007. Net revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 39% and 34% of WellStar's net patient service revenue for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.
- *Medicaid* – Inpatient services rendered to Medicaid program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. Outpatient services are generally paid based upon cost reimbursement methodologies. WellStar's Medicaid cost reports have been final settled through June 30, 2007 for all WellStar affiliates, except for one affiliate hospital that is final settled through June 30, 2006. Net revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 15% and 14% of WellStar's net patient service revenue for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

During 2013 and 2012, net patient service revenue increased by approximately \$2.9 million and \$142 thousand, respectively, due to changes in estimates for open Medicare and Medicaid cost reports and removal of allowances previously estimated that are no longer necessary as a result of final settlements. WellStar has incorporated the most current and relevant data received from Medicare and Medicaid in the preparation of associated estimates at both June 30, 2013 and 2012. During fiscal 2012, WellStar and its affiliate hospitals entered into a settlement agreement with the Department of Health and Human Services related to its calculation of the Rural Floor Budget Neutrality Adjustment and recognized receipt of the settlement payment, net of fees, totaling \$8.8 million in patient service revenue, net of contractual allowances and discounts in the accompanying combined financial statements.

WellStar's affiliate hospitals participate in the Georgia Medicare Upper Payment Limit (UPL) program for providers participating in the State Medicaid program. WellStar's net reimbursement benefit associated with the program, totaling approximately \$7.3 million and \$4.5 million in fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively, is recognized as a reduction in related contractual adjustments in the accompanying combined statements of operations. There can be no assurance that WellStar will continue to qualify for future participation in this program or that the program will not ultimately be discontinued or materially modified.

WellStar's affiliate hospitals participate in the Georgia Indigent Care Trust Fund (ICTF). Under the provisions of the ICTF, Medicaid disproportionate share hospitals (DSH) may contribute funds to be used by the State in the Medicaid Program that are supplemented by Federal funds (combination dollars). The combination dollars are returned to DSH as additional Medicaid inpatient reimbursement. WellStar's net reimbursement benefit associated with the program, totaling approximately \$15.0 million and \$11.0 million in fiscal years 2013 and 2012, respectively, is recognized as additional Medicaid reimbursement and, therefore, is reflected as a reduction in associated contractual adjustments in the accompanying combined statements of operations.

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The State's determination related to WellStar's participation in the fiscal year 2014 plan is currently in process, and the terms of the fiscal year 2014 plan have not been finalized. Accordingly, contributions to the State plan during 2014 and related amounts to be potentially received from Medicaid during 2014 have not been established. There can be no assurance that WellStar will continue to qualify for future participation in this program or that the program will not ultimately be discontinued or materially modified.

Certain affiliates of WellStar have also entered into other reimbursement arrangements providing for payment methodologies, which include prospectively determined rates per discharge, capitated payment arrangements, discounts from established charges, and prospectively determined per diem rates.

For uninsured patients that do not qualify for community financial aid, WellStar recognizes revenue on the basis of its discounted rates for services provided. On the basis of historical experience, a significant portion of WellStar's uninsured patients are unable or unwilling to pay for the services provided. Thus, WellStar records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts related to uninsured patients in the period the services are provided. 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imaging services for a local community clinic as well as funding for nurse practitioner services for a disadvantaged population within the community

WellStar also participates in certain governmental insurance programs, including Medicare and Medicaid. Under these programs, WellStar provides care to patients at payment rates, which are determined by the Federal and state governments, regardless of WellStar's actual charges. In some cases, these programs pay WellStar at amounts, which are less than its cost of providing services.

Following is the cost to provide care to those patients qualifying for Community Financial Aid along with the unreimbursed cost of providing care to Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries and other patients. These costs are determined using a cost to charge ratio.

During 2010, the State of Georgia adopted into law the Provider Payment Agreement Act (the Act). The Act provides that each hospital shall be assessed a provider payment in the amount of 1.45% of net patient service revenue of the hospital based on the annual financial survey filed with the State of Georgia Department of Community Health and such payments be recognized as a community benefit. In fiscal 2013 and 2012, WellStar affiliate hospitals made \$15.5 million and \$14.5 million, respectively, in provider payments and recognized such payments as a reduction in net patient service revenue in the accompanying combined financial statements.

WellStar offers many wellness and educational services at little or no cost to the community. Health fairs are held throughout the year at convenient locations, providing various health screenings, such as mammograms, bone density, blood pressure, and cholesterol checks. A large number of educational programs are offered for all ages. These programs include bicycle safety, car seat safety, defensive driving, CPR, and first-aid classes. Flu shots are available to the community during flu season and health screenings, medical supplies, and immunizations are provided to children through local health departments and health fairs. The costs of these services are included in unrestricted revenue, gains, and other support in excess of expenses and losses in the accompanying combined statements of operations.

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(10) Employee Benefit Plans

(a) Pension Plan

WellStar sponsors a defined benefit pension plan (the Plan) covering all employees who have attained the age of 21 and completed one year of service as defined in the Plan. WellStar contributes an amount sufficient to fund the Plan as determined by consulting actuaries.

On November 1, 2012, WellStar amended the Plan to modify the benefit formula at normal retirement effective as of June 30, 2013.

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(b) *Other Benefits*

WellStar also has a 403(b) defined contribution benefit plan, which covers substantially all employees. Eligible employees may contribute up to 20% of compensation in any one year, subject to a regulatory limit. WellStar makes matching contributions equal to 50% of employees' contributions, not to exceed 4% of total compensation. Employees vest in WellStar contributions on a "cliff" basis after three years of service. WellStar contributed approximately \$7.9 million and \$6.9 million to the plan during the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

WellStar also sponsors an unfunded postretirement medical plan covering members of the Board of Trustees and their dependents upon retirement from completion of 12 years of Board service. The unfunded status of the plan at June 30, 2013 and 2012 is \$9.5 million and \$10.3 million, respectively, and is included in other long term liabilities in the accompanying combined balance sheets. The plan is measured as of June 30 using a discount rate of 5.40% and 4.87% at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. The assumed healthcare trend rate is 8.5% initially decreasing to an ultimate rate of 5.0%.

(11) **Business and Credit Concentrations**

WellStar grants credit to patients, substantially all of whom reside in the service areas of WellStar's affiliates. WellStar generally does not require collateral or other security in extending credit to patients, however, it routinely obtains assignment of (or is otherwise entitled to receive) patients' benefits payable under their health insurance programs, plans, or policies (e.g., Medicare, Medicaid, Managed Care, capitated, and other preferred provider arrangements and commercial insurance policies).

Patient accounts receivable are reduced by an allowance for uncollectible accounts. In evaluating the collectibility of accounts receivable, WellStar analyzes its past history and identifies trends for each of its major payor sources of revenue along with current economic factors to estimate the appropriate allowance for uncollectible accounts and provision for uncollectible accounts. Management routinely reviews data about these major payor sources of revenue in evaluating the sufficiency of the allowance for uncollectible accounts. For receivables associated with services provided to patients who have third-party coverage, WellStar analyzes contractually due amounts and provides an allowance for uncollectible accounts and a provision for uncollectible accounts, if necessary. For receivables associated with self-pay patients, WellStar records a significant provision for uncollectible accounts in the period of service on the basis of its past experience, which indicates that many patients are unable or unwilling to pay the portion of their

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bill for which they are financially responsible. The difference between the standard rates (or the discounted rates if negotiated) and the amounts actually collected after all reasonable collection efforts have been exhausted is charged off against the allowance for uncollectible accounts. WellStar did not change its community financial aid policy (which is inclusive of both charity care and discounts for qualifying patients) during fiscal 2013. WellStar does not maintain a material allowance for uncollectible accounts from third party payors nor did it have material write-offs from third party payors during 2013 and 2012.

(12) Self-Insurance Programs

WellStar has established a wholly owned captive insurance company, CAC, for the purpose of self-insuring first-dollar coverage related to general liability, professional liability, and workers' compensation risks on a claims made basis. WellStar funds CAC in amounts as determined by consulting actuaries. General and professional liability risks are self-insured at an underlying annual coverage layer totaling \$2.0 million and \$7.0 million per individual loss, respectively, and \$28.0 million for aggregate claims. Workers' compensation coverage is self-insured for individual claims up to \$500 thousand.

CAC also provides first-dollar coverage for Directors and Officers, property, and automobile policies. WellStar is also self-insured through other arrangements for employee group health insurance, generally up to \$1.0 million of lifetime coverage per employee.

Losses for all self-insured coverages are managed through the Risk Management and Claims Committee process. Identified and incurred but not reported losses are accrued based on estimates that incorporate WellStar's past experience, as well as other considerations such as the nature of each claim or incident, relevant trend factors, and advice from consulting actuaries. The identified and estimated incurred but not reported losses included in the accompanying combined balance sheets at both June 30, 2013 and 2012 have been discounted at 2.5%.

WellStar also maintains substantial excess liability coverage for amounts in excess of the above-described limits through the provisions of certain claims-made insurance policies. To the extent that any claims-made coverage is not renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance, claims based on occurrences during the term of such coverage, but reported subsequently, would be uninsured. Management believes, based on incidents identified through WellStar's incident reporting system and other reporting procedures, that any such claims would not have a material effect on WellStar's operations or financial position. In any event, management anticipates that the claims-made coverages currently in place will be renewed or replaced with equivalent insurance as the terms of these coverages expire.

(13) Asset Retirement Obligations

Asset retirement obligations arise primarily from contractual commitments to remove asbestos in WellStar facilities at the time of major renovation or demolition and removal of underground fuel tanks.

(16) Fair Value of Financial Instruments

In accordance with FASB ASC 820, WellStar has categorized its financial instruments, based on the priority of inputs used in related valuation techniques, into a three-level fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). If the inputs used to measure the financial instruments fall within different levels of the hierarchy, the categorization is based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement of the instrument.

When available, WellStar generally uses quoted market prices to determine fair value, and classifies such items as Level 1. WellStar's Level 2 securities are bonds and other debt securities whose fair values are determined by independent vendors. The vendors compile prices from various sources and may apply matrix pricing for similar bonds or loans where no price is observable in an actively traded market. If available, the vendor may also use quoted prices for recent trading activity of assets with similar characteristics to the bond being valued. WellStar does not consider any of its investment holdings to be Level 3 securities.

Fair value of a financial instrument is defined as the amount which would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between willing market participants at the measurement date.

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The fair values of WellStar's various debt instruments have been estimated using Level 2 inputs, such as interest rates currently available to WellStar for borrowings having similar character, collateral, and duration. The aggregate fair value of such instruments approximates \$506.7 million and \$534.6 million at June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively. No adjustment for such fair value measurements is reflected or required in the accompanying combined balance sheets.

WellStar has categorized its derivative instrument into the three-level fair value hierarchy. The interest rate swap entered into by WellStar is executed over the counter and valued using the net present value of the cash flow streams as no quoted market prices exist for such instruments. WellStar also employs an independent third party to perform a mark-to-market valuation assessment on the swap to assess the reasonableness of the valuation otherwise received by WellStar. The derivative instrument entered into above is classified by WellStar as Level 2 within the fair value hierarchy.

(17) Endowment

WellStar Foundation has two separate endowments. The Hodges Fund and the Tranquility Angel Fund. The Hodges Fund is comprised of one investment account established for providing nursing scholarships. Related investment income is temporarily restricted until scholarships are appropriated for expenditure by the WellStar Foundation Board. The related donor documents also call for an annual CPI adjustment to the corpus balance each year. The Tranquility Angel Fund consists of two separate investment accounts established for providing support to Hospice care patients and supporting functions. Related investment income is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until such amounts are appropriated for expenditure in accordance with the donor's intent.

(18) Information Technology Contract

WellStar has entered into a software and services agreement with a major information technology vendor.
