Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying combined financial statements of the Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) and affiliates as of and for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, and the related notes to the financial statements, as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, we have also issued our report dated October 29, 2013, on our consideration of Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> in considering Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A Organization

Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc. (Hospital) is a not-for-profit acute care hospital. On November 19, 1991, the Hospital's Board approved the use of an assumed name, Twin Lakes Regional Medical Center. The Hospital is related to other not-for-profit organizations. Grayson County Hospital District (District) is a taxing authority of the Grayson County Fiscal Court and was formed to provide debt service to the Hospital. The District formed Grayson County Public Hospital District Corporation (Public Corporation) to act as a holding company for the financing and construction of a hospital facility. The Public Corporation holds title to the building. In addition, the Public Corporation is responsible for the 2004, 2007 and 2009 bond issues which financed expansion and equipment costs. The Public Corporation has entered into a capital lease for the property to the District. Since the Hospital for all practical purposes is the sole beneficiary of the District, the financial statements of the Hospital are presented on a consolidated basis with the District.

Another related entity is the Twin Lakes Medical Foundation, Inc. (Foundation). This entity is a separate not-for-profit entity organized for the recruitment and retention of qualified medical professionals in the Grayson County, Kentseky area its primary purpose is to provide management, support services and expertise that is often unavailable to sole practitioners in rural areas. Since the Hospital, for all practical purposes, is the sole beneficiary of the Foundation, the financial statements of the Hospital are presented on a consolidated basis with the Foundation. The entity provides the following services: family practice, orthopaedics, sports medicine, general surgery, otolaryngology, neurology, internal medicine, pediatrics, pulmonology, quick care, nephrology, obstetrics and gynecology.

B Principles of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Hospital, District, Public Corporation and Foundation. All material inter-company accounts and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation.

C Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

D <u>Charity Care</u>

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain income criteria without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Hospital does not pursue collection of amounts determined to qualify as charity care.

The FASB issued ASU 2010-23, Measuring Charity Care for Disclosure (ASU 2010-23). The provisions of ASU 2010-23 are intended to reduce the diversity in how charity care is calculated and disclosed across healthcare entities that provide it. Charity care is required to be measured at cost, defined as the direct and indirect costs of providing the charity care. Funds received to offset or subsidize the cost of charity care provided, for example from gifts or grants restricted for charity care, should be separately disclosed. The cost of charity care provided was determined based on the application of a ratio of overall hospital costs to patient charges.

NOTE I - DESCRIPTION OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

E. Net Patient Service Revenue

Not patient service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors, and others for services repdeted, including estimated retroactive adjustments under reimbursement agreements with thurd-party payors.

Retroactive adjustments are accrued on an estimated basis in the period the related services are rendered and adjusted in future periods as final settlements are determined.

F Income Taxes

The Hospital as well as the Foundation are not-for-profit corporations as described in Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and are exempt from federal and state income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been reflected in the Hospital's financial statements.

Management is not aware of any activity within the Hospital or Foundation during the current or prior reporting periods that would jeopardize or otherwise call into question the Hospital or Foundation's compliance with the above internal Revenue Code section. The Organization's federal Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax (Form 990) for fiscal years 2011, 2012 and 2013 are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service for three years after they were filed. Currently, the Hospital and Foundation have no reporting requirements with any state or local tax jurisdictions.

The Hospital has investment interest in two companies as described in Note 8. The Hospital believes that it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements.

The Hospital and Foundation's policy for recording any tax related interest and penalties is to recognize these items as operating expenses; however, none were incurred or recorded during the current or prior open operating periods.

G. Investments and Investment Income

Donated investments are reported at fair value at the date of receipt, which is then treated as cost. Marketable equity securities included in investment portfolios are carried at the lower of aggregate cost (determined on an average-cost basis) or market at the balance sheet date. Other marketable securities are stated at cost, adjusted for impairments in value that are deemed to be other than temporary. The Hospital's investment in its Subsidiary is reported on the equity method of accounting that approximates the Hospital's equity in the underlying net book value of the Subsidiary.

Investment income on proceeds of borrowings that are held by a trustee, to the extent not capitalized, and investment income on deposited assets are reported as other revenue. Investment income from all other investments and investment income of endowment funds are reported as non-operating gains, investment income and gains (losses) on investments of denor-restricted funds are added to (deducted from) the appropriate restricted fund balance.

II Assets Whose Use is Limited

Assets whose use is limited include: assets set aside by the Board of Directors for future plant expansion future equipment needs, medical claims for self-insurance and potential future insurance deductibles over which the Board retains control and may at its discretion subsequently use for other purposes; and assets set aside to comply with mortgage bond covenants.

I Inventogies

Supply inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market on the FIFO method. Inventory consists of medical, dietary, and office supplies.

J. <u>Property and Equipment</u>

Property and equipment acquisitions are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over the estimated useful life of each class of depreciable asset and is computed using the straight-line method. Equipment under capital lease obligations is amortized on the straight-line method over the shorter period of the lease term or the estimated useful life of the equipment. Such amortization is included in depreciation in the financial statements. Interest cost incurred on borrowed funds during the period of construction of capital assets is capitalized as a component of the cost of acquiring those assets. The Hospital capitalizes property and equipment with an estimated life of three or more years.

Gifts of long-lived assets such as land, buildings, or equipment are reported as unrestricted support, and are excluded from the excess of revenues over expenses, unless explicit donor supulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, expirations of donor restrictions are reported when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

K Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

femporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Hospital has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Hospital in perpetuity.

L. Excess of Revenues Over Expenses

The statement of activities includes excess of revenues over expenses. Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from excess of revenues over expenses, consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities permanent transfers of assets to and from affiliates for other than goods and services, and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets). The statement of activities classifies all general hospital activities as operating and all other activities as non-operating.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

M. <u>Prepaid Expenses</u>

The benefits from some amounts paid during the current year are not realized until future periods. In these instances, the amounts applying to future periods are set up as assets on the balance sheet and charged to expenses in the period in which they apply. N. Occupancy Expense of Hospital Facility

Prior to July 1, 1982, the occupancy expense of the building and related assets belonging to Grayson County Public Hospital District Corporation and Grayson County Hospital District were recorded by Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc. as rental expense

This accounting method was changed for the year ended June 30, 1983. Under the present method these fixed assets, as well as the related cash, cash reserves and liabilities of the District have been recorded on the books of the Hospital.

O Recording Third-Party Payor Allowances

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. Major third-party payors include Medicare, Medicard/Passport and Blue Cross as well as various commercial insurance carriers. Payment methods may be per discharge, at established rates or at discount from established rates depending on payor. The difference between charges and amounts received are recorded as contractual allowances.

P <u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>

Cash and cash equivalents include investments in highly liquid debt instruments with a maturity of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation or other arrangements under trust agreements or with third-party payors.

Q. Bond Discount and Issue Costs

The bond discount and issue costs of the 2004, 2007, and 2009 bond issues are being amortized on the straight-line method over the life of the bonds

NOTE I - DESCRIPTION OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

R Patient Accounts Receivable

Patient accounts receivable are stated at net realizable amounts from patients, third-party payors and others for services rendered. The Hospital provides an allowance for doubtful accounts, which is based upon a review of outstanding receivables, historical collection information and existing economic conditions. The Hospital reserves all self pay accounts over 150 days.

Patient accounts receivable are ordinarily due twenty days after the issuance of the invoice. At the expiration of the twenty days, if no response is received from the patient, a final notice is generated. Delinquent receivables are written off based on individual credit evaluation and specific circumstances of the patient or third-party payor. If the Hospital receives no payment or communication to arrange payment the account is sent to collection and recognized as bad debt at that time. If at any time during this process the patient contacts the Hospital for payment arrangements their account is placed on contract for monthly payments. The Hospital does not assess finance or late charges on accounts receivable.

S <u>Revenue Recognition - Property Taxes</u>

Property taxes are levied on October 1st and are due and payable at that time. All unpaid taxes levied October 1st become delinquent January 1st of the following year

Property tax revenues are recognized by the District when they become available. Available includes those property tax receivables expected to be collected within sixty days after year-end. Delinquent taxes are considered fully collectible and, therefore, no allowance for incollectible taxes is provided.

The property taxes are collected by the Grayson County Sheritl and remitted to the District. Vehicle taxes are collected and remitted to the District by the County Clerk of Grayson County and are due and collected in the birth month of the vehicle's licensee.

The District does not place liens on property. At the end of April, the Sheriff's Office turns all delinquent taxes over to the County Clerk's Office. The delinquent taxes go against the land and should be paid when the property is sold

T. Nonexchange Transactions

The recognition of, respectively, assets, liabilities, and expenses/expenditures resulting from nonexchange transactions of the District are as follows:

(i) Imposed nonexchange revenues -- Property taxes are assessed January i of each year. The District does not have an enforceable legal claim to the taxes until one year from that date. However, tax bills are mailed October of the year they are assessed and collected before the end of that fiscal year, therefore, the asset/revenue is recognized when it is received.

U Advertising Costs

The Hospital and Foundation use advertising to promote their services to the community. Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Foundation advertising expense for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$46,274 and \$66,670, respectively. Hospital advertising expense for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 was \$113,203 and \$104.631, respectively.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

V Donor-restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Foundation are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give and indications of intentions to give are reported at fair value at the date the gift is received. The gifts are reported as either temporarily or permanently restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reported as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

W. Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The Hospital reviews its property for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of an asset may not be recoverable. For assets held and used, if the undiscounted cash flows estimated to be generated by those assets are less than the carrying amounts of the asset, an impairment loss has occurred. The amount of the impairment loss is equal to the excess of the asset's carrying value over its estimated fair value. No impairment loss has been recognized for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012.

X EHR Incentive Payments

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 included provisions for implementing health information technology under the Health Information Technology for Economic and Chinical Health Act (HITECH). The provisions were designed to increase the use of electronic health record (EHR) technology and establish the requirements for a Medicare and Medicaid incentive payment program beginning in 2011 for eligible providers that adopt and meaningfully use certified EHR technology. Eligibility for annual Medicare incentive payments is dependent on providers demonstrating meaningful use of EHR technology in each period over a four-year period Initial Medicaid payments are available to providers that adopt, implement, or upgrade certified EHR technology. Providers must demonstrate meaningful use of such technology in subsequent years to qualify for additional Medicaid incentive payments.

The Hospital and Foundation recognize HITECH incentive payments as grant revenue when it is reasonably assured that the meaningful use objectives have been achieved. The Hospital recognized incentive payments totaling \$1,789,465 and \$1,282,398 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 and the Foundation recognized incentive payments totaling \$85,000 and \$255,000 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 in the accompanying statements of activities. The Hospital and Foundation's compliance with the meaningful use criteria is subject to audit by the federal government

Y Fair Value

SFAS 157. Fair Value Measurements (ASC Topic 820-10) defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value is determined based on a fair value hierarchy, which requires an entity to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The standard describes three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value which are as follows:

- Level I Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

- Level 3 Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets. Level 3 assets include investments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation.

<u>NOTE 2 – CHARITY CARE</u>

The Hospital provides care to patients who meet certain criteria under its charity care policy without charge or at amounts less than its established rates. The Hospital maintains records to identify and monitor the level of charity care it provides. These records include the amount of charges forgone for services and supplies furnished under its charity care policy and equivalent service statistics. NOTE 3 – NET PATIENT SERVICE REVENUE

The Hospital has agreements with third-party payors that provide for payments to the Hospital at amounts different from its established rates. A summary of the payment arrangements with major third-party payors follows:

Inpatient acute care services rendered to Medicare program beneficiaries are paid at prospectively determined rates per discharge. These rates vary according to a patient classification system that is based on clinical, diagnostic, and other factors.

The Hospital has also entered into payment agreements with certain commercial insurance carriers and preferred provider organizations. The basis for payment to the Hospital under these arrangements includes prospectively determined daily rates and discounts from established charges.

<u>NOTE 4 – CASH AND INVESTMENTS</u>

At year end, the carrying amount of the Hospital's cash and investments was \$13,879,859. Of the total bank balance of \$14,840,278, \$1,762,633 was covered by Federal depository insurance and the remaining balance of \$13,077,645 was considered uncollateralized.

As of June 30, 2013, \$12,621,454 was pledged with securities held by the pledging banks' trust departments but not in the Hospital's name.

Custodial Credit Risk — This is the risk that in the event of failure of the counterparty to a transaction, a government will not be able to recover the value of its investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of another party. The Hospital does not have a custodial credit risk policy for investments

Interest Rate Risk — This is the risk that changes in the market interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. The Hospital does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

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NOTE 12 - LEASES

As discussed in Note 1-A, the financial statements include the activity of the District. The District has leased the hospital property from the Public Corporation with the amount of rent equal to the amount required to be accumulated in sinking funds and debt service and depreciation reserves. The District has an exclusive option to renew this lease yearly until the bonds are retired. The District may also purchase the property at any time for the remaining outstanding balance of the bonds payable, constituting a bargain purchase option and thus requiring capital lease treatment.

From the standpoint of the District, this is an operating lease. Payments by the Hospital to the District are accounted for as rental income.

Since the financial statements present a consolidation of the Hospital and the District, the effect of this operating lease has been reversed.

<u>NOTE 14 – PENSION PLANS</u>

The Hospital provides a defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all of its employees. The contributions are two-fold. Profit sharing is funded at the discretion of management. The amount funded generally is within 0%. 4%. The prior year received 1% and the current year was 0%. Additionally, the Hospital matches 50% of employee contributions up to 8% participant savings. The Hospital matched up to 2% for the prior year and 1% for the current year. The employee contribution for the prior year was \$271,183 and \$(61,038) for the current year.

The Foundation provides a separate defined contribution retirement plan covering substantially all of its employees. The contributions are two-fold Profit sharing will be funded at the discretion of management. The Foundation matched 100% of the first 1% of employee contributions and 50% of the next 6% of employee contributions for the first 15 months of this two year period of time. The Foundation did not match employee contributions for the remaining nine months. At the discretion of management, the Foundation did not contribute to profit sharing for either year. The total contributions for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 were \$97,055 and \$108,083, respectively.

<u>NOTE 15 – SELF-FUNDED HEALTH PLAN</u>

The employees of the Foundation are covered under the Hospital's health plan. The Hospital's health plan is the Twin Lakes Regional Medical Center Employee Health Care Plan, which is administered by Anthem Blue Cross and Blue Shield. The Hospital has reinsurance at a specific stop loss level of \$100,000 per employee. Under this self-funded plan, the Hospital maintains a reserve account called Health Insurance claims.

NOTE 16 - OTHER RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

In the normal course of business, because of a variety of services available, the Hospital purchases services from other related parties. A summary of those services for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012 follows.

The District maintains all of its bank accounts at The Cecilian Bank. Larry Perkins, a Director of Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc., is employed by The Cecilian Bank. The cash balances held at June 30, 2013 and 2012 were \$5.501,984 and \$5,241,645, respectively.

NOTE 17 - OTHER RISKS OF LOSS

Other risks of loss are handled by purchase of commercial insurance. These areas include employee dishonesty, malpractice, director's and officer's coverage, boiler and machinery coverage (including business interruption), commercial property, umbrella hability and workers' compensation coverage. Coverage is reviewed for adequacy by management and agents on an annual basis.

NOTE 18 - FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The following methods and assumptions were used by the Hospital in estimating the fair value of its financial instruments:

<u>Cash and cash equivalents</u> - The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for cash and cash equivalents approximates its fair value.

<u>Investments</u> - Fair values, which are the amounts reported in the statement of financial position, are based on quoted market prices, if available, or estimated using quoted market prices for similar securities.

Assets limited as to use - These assets consist primarily of cash and each equivalents. The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position is fair value.

Accounts payable and accrued expenses - The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for accounts payable and accrued expenses approximates its fair value.

F<u>stimated third-party payor settlements</u> - The carrying amount reported in the statement of financial position for estimated third-party payor settlements approximates its fair value.

<u>Long-term debt</u> - Fair values of the Hospital's revenue notes and other debt are based on current traded value.

NOTE 19 - NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

For 2013, the District implemented Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 63, "Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position." GASB Statement No. 63 identifies not position, rather than not assets, as the residual of all other elements presented in a statement of financial position. This change was incorporated in the District's 2013 financial statements, however, there was no effect on beginning not position/fund balance.

NOTE 20 - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

Dr. Sandhya Pajuja has joined Twin Lakes Family Care and Eye Center in September 2013.

NOTE 24 -NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENT

The FASB issued ASU 2011-07, Presentation and Disclosure of Patient Service Revenue, Provision for Bad Debts, and the Allowance for Doubtful Accounts for Certain Health Care Entities (ASU 2011-07). ASU 2011-07 requires healthcare entities that recognize significant amounts of patient service revenue at the time of service, even though they do not assess the patient's ability to pay, to present the provision for bad debts related to patient service revenue as a deduction from patient service revenue on the statement of activities. In addition, enhanced disclosure about the entity's policies for recognizing revenue and assessing bad debts, including disclosures of patient service revenue (net of contractual allowances and discounts) as well as qualitative and quantitative information about changes in the allowance for doubtful accounts, is required. The Hospital adopted this guidance as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, with retrospective application to all periods presented.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc., a nonprofit organization, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated October 29, 2013

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc 's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc 's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of the internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Grayson County Hospital Foundation, Inc 's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> in considering the entity's internal control and compliance.
